### Hunting Of Fowl Predicted Good By Wildlife Service

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 2—Pre-season alarms hallelaloo to the contrary, ducks and other migratory waterfowl are now enjoying better-than-average nesting conditions in Canada, according to reports of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the American Wildlife Institute.

These good conditions for raising young and the fact that the birds returned to the breeding grounds in larger numbers and in somewhat better condition than last year, point to a banner duck hunting season this fall, in the opinion of expert observers.

The early lack of water in Canada which prompted dire prognostics of greatly depleted supplies of waterfowl may prove a left-handed blessing, according to information from competent biologists.

If there had been heavy rainfall during early Spring, in all probability ducks would have nested in shallow sloughs and potholes which would have dried up during the drought conditions that prevailed in the Prairie provinces during May and early June, biologists point out.

Rain, and plenty of it, came after the first week in June. Part of a report submitted to Frederick C. Lincoln, of the Fish and Wildlife Service, reads: "Rain has finally hit the drought area in the Canadian Prairie provinces. One newspaper stated that more rain fell in one time than at any time during the past ten years. Little run-off is expected and it appears few broods will be lost."

A later report from another province optimistically states that increases in the duck population are expected and that predators are not bad. The report confidently predicts that, because of late heavy rains, the nesting areas will hold up satisfactorily and give the fledglings ample time to reach flying age.

Paradoxically enough, too much rain has caused the loss of some young ducks in regions where the late downfall has been particularly heavy.

Favorable conditions now prevailing in the Alberta and Saskatchewan areas are expected to result in noticeable increases in mallards, pintails, shovellers, gadwalls and bluewing teal. Canvasbacks, Redheads and several other species of ducks will remain the same, Government reports indicate.

The Delta, Manitoba, Duck Station of the American Wildlife Institute reports a small increase in the canvasback, Redhead, gadwall and shoveller, with pintails and bluewing teal about alike as last year. Mallards, wigwags, greening teal and lesser scaups are reported down in this section of Canada.

Observers at the Delta Duck Station also report that nesting conditions are better than last year, but that the water level is still below normal.

## British-Japanese Friction Reaches New High Point

### England Arrests Two High Japanese As Tension Increases Between Countries

### Japan Protests Arrest Of Two London Hears Rumors Of Big Spy Ring Centering There

Friction between Japan and Great Britain reached a new high point today in the arrest of the two most prominent Japanese business men in London. Reports that others were held throughout the Empire and rumors of the existence of a big spy ring centered in London. Significantly, the arrests, which "flagged" high Japanese in London, came just two days after British sources had expressed fear that rapidly worsening Japanese-British relations might eventually provoke Japan to military action.

Japan made a "strong protest" against the arrests. One British official said the Japanese protest was "very serious" and that the British press had urged retaliation. The Japanese embassy said Secretary of State Cordell Hull and Shunroku Tabahe, London managers of great banking firms, were arrested. Embassy spokesmen said they were "very surprised" and could not imagine how they had provoked suspicion and arrest.

### Investigation Is Ordered Into Flow Of Aliens To U. S.

DETROIT, Aug. 3.—(AP)—Immigration officers received orders yesterday to find out whether an "underground railway" has been operating across the Detroit river for aliens fleeing to the United States from the European war zone.

John L. Barbock, district immigration officer, said he ordered the investigation, which was presided over by the special agent in charge, which three Polish sailors, charged with deserting a ship carrying German prisoners to Quebec, crossed from Ontario to Toronto, Michigan, the night of July 24.

The justice, Michael Bohach, Alexander Turkovich and Karol Flinski, are being held under \$20,000 bond each on charges of illegal entry.

These sailors, who claim the American consul told them they must leave the ship, are being held in a room at the Hotel Statler, where they are being held for a hearing.

## Creditors Of City Appeal To High Tribunal

### Holders Of Unrefunded Bonds Ask Supreme Court To Review Last Ruling

The City's creditors who held \$173,000 of the City's unrefunded bonds have appealed to the United States Supreme Court for a writ of certiorari in the decision of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals upholding the validity of the Pepper amendment to the Municipal Bankruptcy Act, which the City of Sanford is invoking to force these bondholders to exchange their bonds for refunding series bearing a lower rate of interest.

Thus far, the City, whose legal affairs have been handled by City Attorney Fred R. Wilson, have won every round in the court battle to force these creditors to exchange their bonds on the same basis as the 30 percent who have already refunded. The bonds held by this group bear 6 and 8 percent interest while the refunding bonds bear only 1-1/2 to 2 percent interest.

## Soviet Press Scores Finns For Attacks

### Moscow Newspapers Allege Brutalities Are Committed On Pro-Russian Labor

The Soviet press charged that Finnish workers across the border as the Finnish parliament undertook formal incorporation into the U. S. S. R. of three Baltic states and two provinces obtained from Rumania.

The supreme council (parliament) with Joseph Stalin in attendance, unanimously adopted a resolution creating the Moldavian Union republic of the U. S. S. R., the thirteenth member out of the larger part of Bessarabia, seized from Rumania, and most of the old autonomous Moldavian republic.

The council gave the remainder of Moldavia and Bessarabia, plus the territory of northern Bessarabia, to the Ukrainian republic of the U. S. S. R.

The official news agency declared Finnish police used bayonets on women and men to break up a meeting in Helsinki where demonstrators carried slogans reading "Long Live the Soviet-Finnish Friendship."

That speech followed Monday's warning by Premier A. A. Cheloff Molotov that Finland must abandon anti-Soviet trends if she expects good relations with Russia.

Mr. Molotov, Finnish President Kyyro Kaali, striving to maintain good relations with the Soviet, which obtained part of Finland after the Russian-Finnish war last winter, issued a lecture banning public gatherings without official permission.

(He directed police to disperse illegal assemblies which might threaten public order or "injure the state.")

(Groups of from 200 to 300 youths described by the police as "social democratic party committee as 'dubious characters and provocateurs,' have been demonstrating in the capital during the past few days.)

(Dissatisfaction with war compensation to the transplanted population from territory ceded to Russia has caused a split in the social democratic party with a minority faction withdrawing to organize its own wing.)

Incorporation of the Baltic states and Rumanian territory occupied by the Red army will give the Soviet union the "powerful voice" of more than 193,000,000 people, Molotov told the supreme Soviet.

In less than a year, Russia has added more than 23,000,000 people and considerable territory, beginning with the joint German-Russian partition of Poland, the Finnish-Russian war, the occupation of Bessarabia and northern Bukovina, ceded by Rumania in June, and the Baltic States of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania, whose new Communist governments voted for the Soviet union in these areas once belonged to Russia, "but had been forcibly torn from the U. S. S. R. by western imperialist powers when the U. S. S. R. was militarily weak," Molotov said.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—(AP)—The Exchange Telegraph (British News Agency) reported today that "hundreds" of Italians had been killed and much war material captured in fighting in Libya. The Italian command acknowledged one killed and three injured in a British raid on the Sardinia naval base, declared that Haifa, in the Holy Land, burned for three days after an Italian bombardment July 25 and told of further extensive strafing of the British in Africa and Egypt. Britain, busy halting its defenses against Adolf Hitler's threatened blitzkrieg, received another contingent of Australian troops today. A dispatch from Tangier, Morocco, to Genoa, France, said the British fleet at Gibraltar had sailed to join in the defense of the United Kingdom. The Petain government got on with its task of reorganizing France today by banning Freemasonry and all other secret societies and further restricted sale of foodstuffs.

In the turbulent Far East it was reported that Japan had extended her war still further. The important representation to the Government, reported by the French-Indo-Chinese agent at Peking, said that the French island colony of New Caledonia, said a dispatch to Saigon, was declared that it will not have to be French-German territory and has pledged its support to Britain.

On the war front, Nazi Aviation General Karl Schwelbisch declared the German air force in a position now to blanket attack with a paralyzing attack on the present German raids, declared by the German press as "more pin-pricks."

Fire Of New Rifles Doubles That Of Old Springfield

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July Gold Movements Reveal Slight Drop

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—Gold movements during July were considerably smaller than in June, but were still larger than in any month since April, 1939, the Federal Reserve Bank of New York reported yesterday in its "Monthly Review."

Gold held under contract for foreign account at the Federal Reserve Bank increased about \$40,000,000 for the month, the Review said, "reaching a total of about \$1,200,000,000 at the end of July. The increase in the gold stock of the United States during the last month amounted to approximately \$200,000,000, the largest gain, with the exception of June, since April, 1939."

"As reported by the Department of Commerce, a total of \$148,000,000 of gold was imported into the United States during the week ended July 26."

"In the following four weeks ended July 26," the review continued, "imports totaled \$322,000,000. Of this amount, \$240,000,000 came from the United Kingdom, \$22,000,000 from Canada, \$7,000,000 from South Africa, \$4,000,000 from Portugal, \$3,000,000 from Yugoslavia, \$2,000,000 from Australia, \$1,000,000 from Brazil, \$3,000,000 from Sweden, \$2,000,000 from Colombia, \$2,000,000 from Hongkong, \$2,000,000 from Spain, \$1,000,000 from the Philippines and \$900,000 from Mexico."

## Senate To Act This Week On Conscription

### Military Committee Votes 12 To 3 To Send Measure To Floor Of Senate

## Opposition Looms For Training Bill

### Army Officers Hope To Call In 400,000 Men If Bill Passes

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The Military Committee voted 12 to 3 today to send to the Senate floor the Burke-Wadsworth compulsory military training bill requiring registration of approximately 12,000,000 men from the ages of 21 to 30, inclusive.

The committee approval cleared the way for Senate consideration this week of the measure, which bore the personal endorsement of Secretary of War Stimson and was recorded by the budget bureau as being in accordance with President Roosevelt's program.

Considerable opposition to the bill was foreshadowed in the Senate, despite the fact that only three votes were recorded against it in the committee.

Senator Downey, (D-Calif.), who was present at today's committee meeting, did not vote.

Senator Johnson, (D-Colo.), Thomas, (R-Idaho) and Landon, (R-Miss.) voted "no," Landon voting by proxy.

The machinery for registrations could be set in motion if and when the bill becomes a law. But President Roosevelt could not order conscription until the bill is enacted.

## Poor Outlook Is Seen For Cotton Crops This Season

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(AP)—After getting a sales peak, a new cotton marketing season began with prospects of a dip that worried producers and Federal farm officials.

By custom the cotton marketing season opens Aug. 1—about the time that the new crop starts to market in volume.

In a decade of sharp ups and downs, the season which closed yesterday was one of the best.

State totaled about 12,800,000 bales, or 3,500,000 bales more than in the previous season. Exports amounted to 6,500,000 bales, the largest volume since 1932, after having fallen to 3,877,000 in the previous season.

But cotton exports in the Agriculture Department's report are a disappointment.

Only Great Britain and Japan remain as stable customers and neither is likely to buy heavily this season.

Official cotton export reports were expected to show a Federal program which would be a definite step toward a more stable market.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(AP)—John J. Pershing urged last night that the United States send a minimum of 50 destroyers to aid Great Britain, adding: "We shall be failing in our duty to America if we do not do it."

The World War commander of the American expeditionary forces, now in his eightieth year, said in a brief address that by sending help to the British, we can still hope with confidence to keep the war on the other side of the Atlantic ocean where the enemies of liberty, if possible, should be defeated.

It would be unthinkable, Pershing said, to send an American expeditionary force this time fighting a purely defensive action.

"I say to you tonight that tomorrow may be your last day in this country," he said.

General Pershing's address was broadcast by all networks. He spoke from his suite in a hotel here.

## Col. Lindbergh Talks To Anti-War Audience

### Suggests Considering Treaties With Nations Of Europe To Insure U. S. Peace

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Col. Charles Lindbergh, declaring domestic and foreign interests were attempting to draw the United States into war, yesterday urged to an anti-war rally of 50,000 persons that America offer Europe a peace plan.

"Let us," he said, "offer Europe a plan for the progress and protection of the western civilization of which they and we each form a part. If we refuse to consider treaties with the dominating nations of Europe, regardless of who they may be, we remove all possibility of peace."

In the past," Lindbergh recalled, "we have dealt with a Europe dominated by England and France. In the future we may have to deal with a Europe dominated by Germany."

He added that any treaties of peace plans should be backed by an impregnable national defense.

Lindbergh, who broke self-imposed silence Sept. 15 to oppose American entrance into the European war, spoke with Senator McCarren of Nevada, one of the leading Democratic Senate isolationists, and Representative James E. Van Zandt of Pennsylvania, three-time national commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, in Soldier Hall. The meeting was sponsored by the Citizens' Keep Out of War committee.
