

Israeli Planes Shot Down 4 Syrian Fighters

TEL AVIV, Israel (UPI) — Israeli warplanes shot down four Syrian MIG-21s over Lebanon today in the second such battle in three months, Israeli spokesmen said.

The command said U.S. built F-15 Eagle interceptors and Israeli-made Kfir C-2 aircraft took part in the dogfight south of Beirut.

A military spokesman said all the Israeli planes returned safely to base but gave no further details.

In Lebanon a spokesman for the pro-Israeli Christian militia said two of the Syrian MIGs were shot down over Deir Al Qamar, 25 miles south of Beirut and two others over Armon, 7 miles south of Beirut.

Both villages are in the mountainous Shur area largely inhabited by Lebanese Druse.

Syria's official Damascus radio made no mention of the dogfight.

In the June incident, the Israeli warplanes were mothered by a high-flying Grumman EC-2 Hawkeye surveillance plane that monitored the takeoff of the Syrian jets from their base even while they were taking off.

It was not known immediately if a Hawkeye, Israel's latest aircraft acquisition from the United States, accompanied the Israeli warplanes on Monday's flight over Lebanon.

Longwood Proposed Tax Rate At \$2.91 Set For Commission

Longwood taxpayers should get a slight break for fiscal 1979-1980 if the city commission tonight goes along with a proposed budget of \$1,171,260 calling for a tax rate of \$2.91 per \$1,000 assessed valuation. The new tax rate, if approved, is 4 cents per \$1,000 assessed valuation less than this year's \$2.95 tax rate.

Although the proposed budget for the coming fiscal year is about \$23,000 more than this year's \$1,048,000, an increase in the city's tax base as well as an increase in the anticipated surplus account will generate enough revenues to keep the tax rate about level, according to David Chacey, city administrator.

Chacey explained that this year's budget had carried an anticipated surplus revenue account of \$131,000, but will come closer to \$250,000.

Chacey said a 7.5 percent cost of living pay increase for all city employees, as well as

the police and fire departments account for the increased total budget for all departments. He said two new men each will be added to the police and fire departments. Much of the surplus, he said, will go to capital improvements such as road paving, storm drainage and parks and recreation.

Sun Bank VP Killed In Car Crash

Casselberry police were continuing their investigation today into a Saturday night traffic accident that killed Sun Bank of Florida Vice President Harrison H. Brinkley, 44, of Orlando was killed when the car he was driving struck a vending machine company van head-on on Seminola Boulevard about 300 feet west of Lake Drive in Casselberry. The accident occurred at 9:05 p.m.,

Florida North Hospital in Altamonte Springs where she was treated and released for minor injuries, police said. Jones was uninjured in the accident.

No charges have been filed against Jones, who police said apparently tried to pull off the road in order to avoid the collision. But police said the accident is still under investigation.

City Hall May Have First Tenant

The first tenant on the first floor of the Sanford City Hall may be the Sanford Housing Authority.

The city commission at its 7 p.m. meeting today will consider a proposal from the Housing Authority to lease 3,000 square feet of the 16,000 square foot lower level of city hall for office space.

Thomas Wilson III, executive director of the Housing Authority, in a letter to the city has asked that the commission develop a lease agreement for a one year period of time with option for renewal.

The rate for leasing space is \$4.57 per square foot. Details must be worked out by the Authority on how renovations will be accomplished and paid for and the method to be used for acquiring power service.

The options the Authority may consider are: connecting to the city power system and paying its pro rata share to the city or metering its use apart from city operations and contracting partitioning costs with a private contractor or with the city.

How Much Land For Sewer Plant?

How much land should the city of Sanford acquire for expansion of the city's sewer plant into a regional facility? City Manager Warren Knowles will urge city commissioners at a 7 p.m. meeting today to proceed with the acquisition of 8.25 acres rather than the 8.5 acres previously considered.

The property is west of the current sewer plant, located on Seminole Boulevard.

Knowles in a memo to the city commission said that although Lake Mary formally agreed to participate in the regional concept has been on going for the past three years, the past year has been filled almost entirely with "talk" — until Lake Mary formally agreed to participate a few weeks ago.

Noting the county commission is expected to discuss its possible participation in workshop session this week, Knowles said today he will urge the city to move forward with the project without the county at this point.

School Fire Guts Supply Room - Damage \$10,000

A fire of unknown origin blazed in a supply room Sunday afternoon at Goldsboro Elementary School, resulting in estimated damages of \$10,000. There were no injuries.

Charles Roberts, Principal of Goldsboro Elementary, located at 1285 W. 10th St., Sanford, said that damage was done to a neighboring classroom, but that the supply room was completely destroyed.

Original speculation on the cause of the fire was paper by Sanford Fire Chief George Harriet.

Harriet, said Roberts, reasoned that an electrical connection in the ceiling tiles apparently shorted, igniting the tiles which dropped on to a teacher's desk. Nobody was reported in the supply room when the fire broke out.

Further investigation of the fire is now being conducted.

The intensity of the fire caused windows to pop out and a chalkboard to buckle. A partial list of destroyed supplies included four teacher's desks, three student chairs, three circulating fans, three ditto machines, an unknown number of textbooks, a file cabinet, a chalkboard, and paper material including master carbons, reading kits and workbooks.

Roberts indicated he had no idea how long the fire was burning before it was discovered.

The supply room, which used to be a regular classroom, was also used for tutoring.

Roberts said today he will urge the city to move forward with the project without the county at this point.

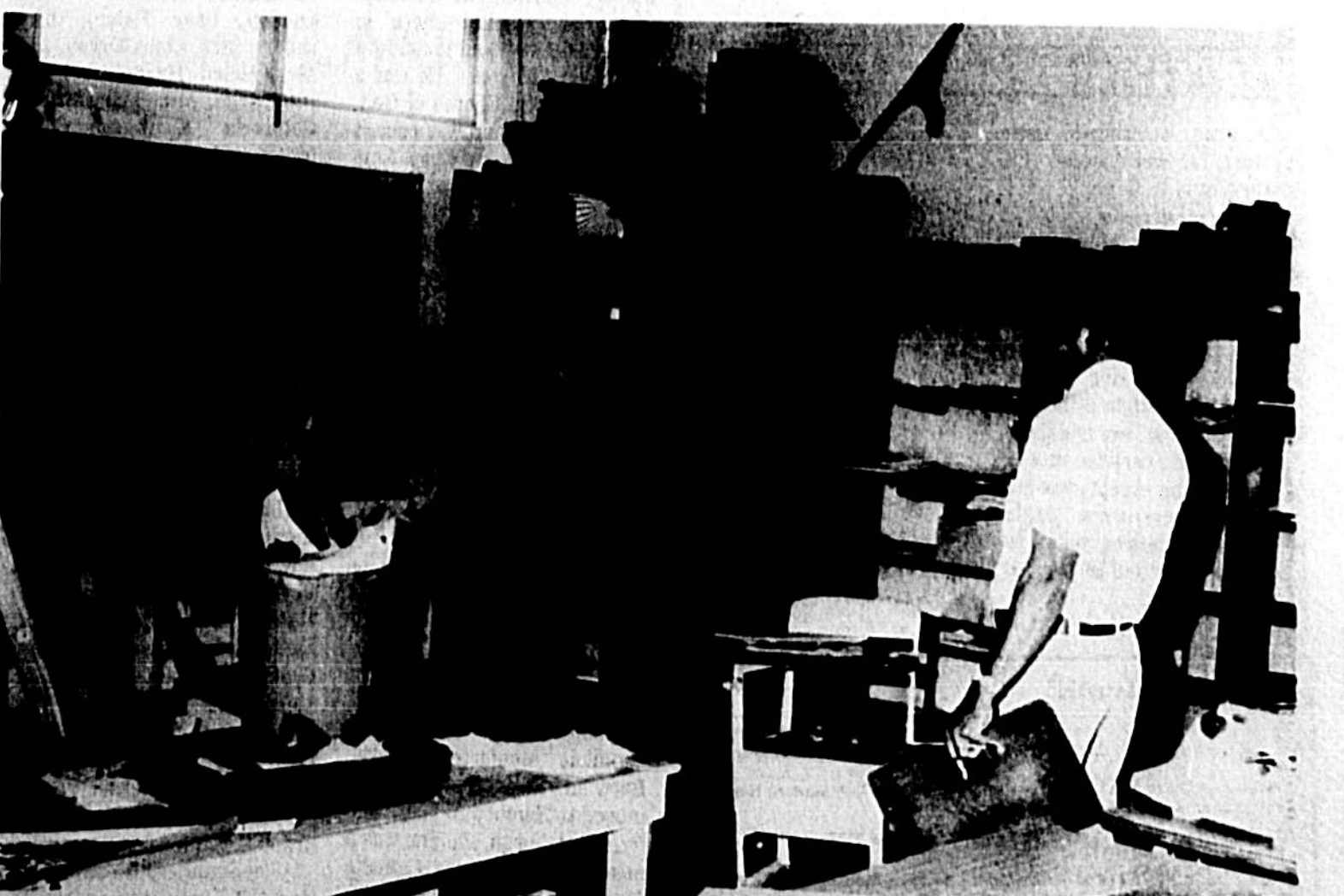
Vance Warns Of Setbacks

UNITED NATIONS (UPI) — Secretary of State Cyrus Vance warned the United Nations today that the decade now being lived in Cuba and the international spread of nuclear weapons could destroy much of the progress made in solving world problems.

Vance's address to the 34th General Assembly was a generally optimistic progress report on the state of the world as seen from Washington, but he included sober warnings.

Vance said disarmament talks have now entered "the broadest agenda in history," and he noted "North and South have made progress on financial trade and commodity issues ... expanded trade opportunities have been opened."

But, Vance added, "Despite our emergence from the days of unrelenting hostility, the East-West relationship can deteriorate dangerously whenever one side fails to respect the security interests of the other."

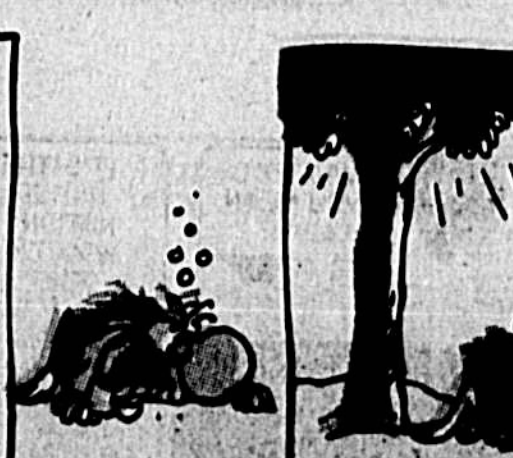

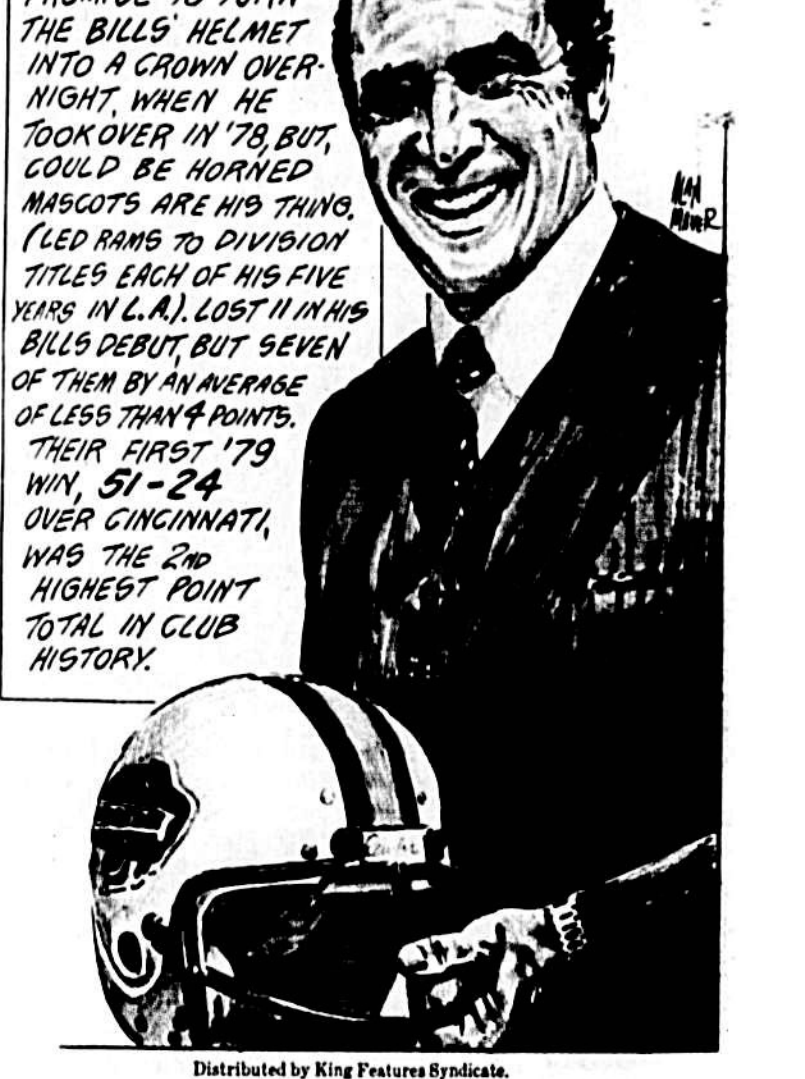
