Metz asks city for an exemption for soup kitchen

SANFORD — Jean Metz plans to ask the city of Sanford for an exemption to a mediated settlement regarding the operation of a soup kitchen.

Metz, the director of Seminole Volunteer Enterprises Inc., wants to hold a fund-raising dinner on Oct. 27 and 28. In a letter to Sanford City Manager

Ton VanDerworp, Metz informed the city of her plans for the dinner, which will feature gator, turtle and fish.

"In the cooperative spirit, I did not want to schedule this event until I spoke with you," Metz wrote. "This meal will not be free, and we want to sell as many tickets as possible."

The request comes three months after

Metz, the city of Sanford and residents of the Sanford Historic District agreed to a mediated settlement limiting the hours of operation and the number of clients Metz could serve at the soup kitchen. The residents had sued the city, claiming the City Commission violated its zoning

ordinances by granting Metz and exemption for the number of parking spaces.

Metz had planned to serve more than 100 people a night, but only had four parking spaces at the 4th Street location of the soup kitchen.

The settlement agreement limits Metz to serving 50 clients three times per week.

Charles Rowe, director of community development for Sanford, wrote Metz a

A window to Geneva's Past

Museum filled with historical treasures

Traveling toward Mims on State Road 46, people might miss the road leading to a museum that tells the history of a community once known as Harney Cove.

The Geneva Historical Museum, located at 165 First St., is filled with memorabilia from Geneva's pioneering families. The names Sieg, Mathieux and Reibinder are found in every corner of the two-room building.

"People are totally amazed what they see when they come here," Lorraine Whiting said. "They can't believe we have so much stuff that dates so far back." Whiting is a charter member of the Geneva Historical and Genealogical Society, which was organized in 1952 by founder Alice Coffee Guyton. She currently is the chairman of the museum's committee and can often be found organizing and studying items in the historical building.

The museum was established after land was donated

85-year-old woman accused of child abuse

5-month-old child suffered an 'acute brain injury'

SANFORD — Neighbors in Lake Mary were stunned Friday upon hearing that 85-year-old Opal Lynn Jones-Steven had been arrested for Aggravated Child Abuse on a five-month boy at her home on Sun Lake Loop.

Dr. Mark Kessler, a physician with the Child Protection Team report that in his opinion the child was the victim of "inflicted" head trauma while in Jones-Steven's care.

Sheriff's Office Investigator Steve McElyea arrested the care-taker at 6:55 p.m. on Thursday — and the child was taken to South Seminole Hospital in Longwood and then transferred to Arnold Palmer Hospital in Orlando and put on a respirator.

Physicians said the child suffered "an acute brain injury" and remains the pediatric special care unit at Arnold Palmer.

Jones-Steven said the child had been sitting in front of her in a little bouncer and was playing. She said when she put him down for his nap he went limp and was unresponsive. When she could not revive him, she called 911.

Dr. Kessler told investigators the child had evidence of "acute subdural and intracerebral hemorrhage and retinal hemorrhages." It is alleged that the child was "shaken with great

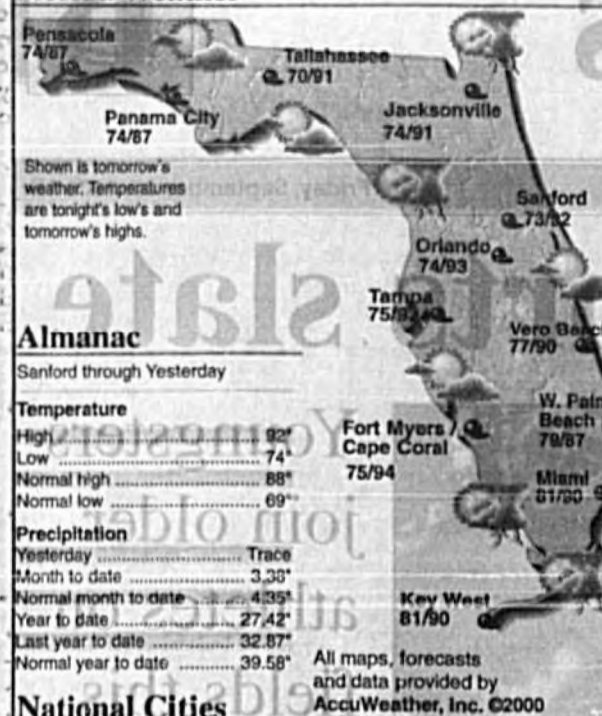

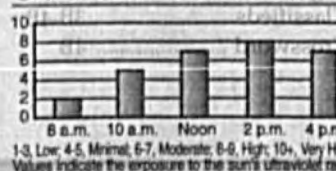

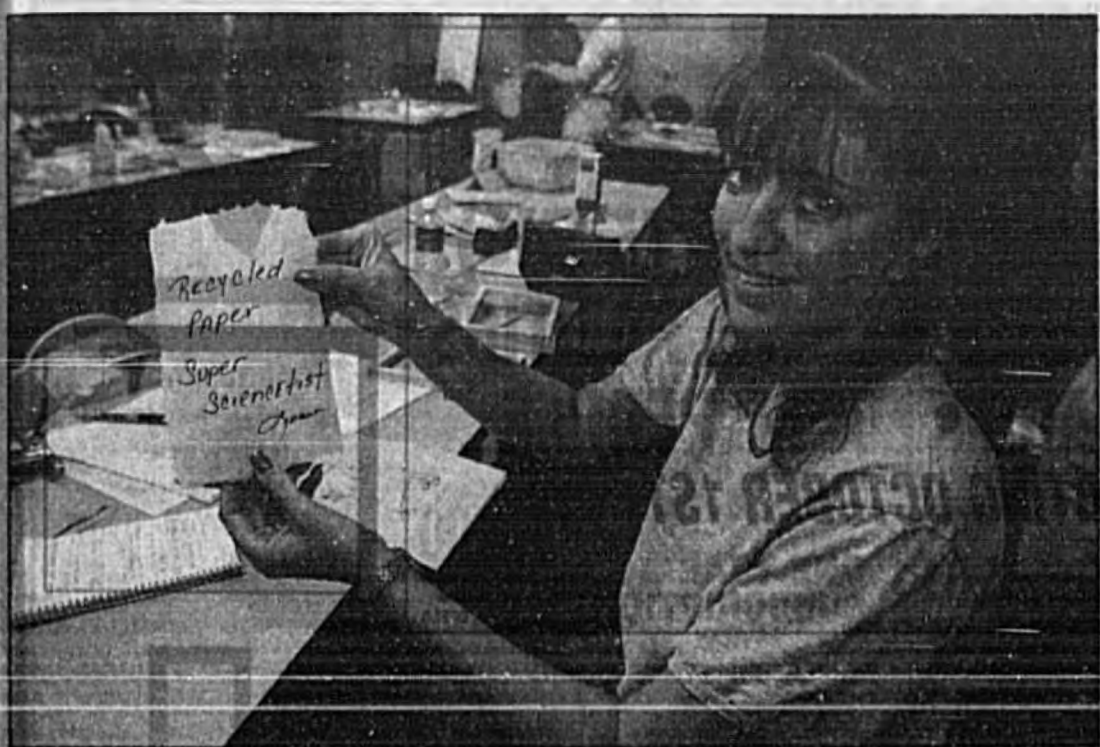

 what has happened to three much-loved Seminole High School students. At this hour, we're going to have to assist one another. That's what Seminoles do — students, teachers, everyone."  
 Coleman urged the students and staff to visit with the grief counselors at the school. She also suggested the students not watch reports of the tragedy on TV.  
 "Get your facts from us," she said.  
 Thursday's crash was tough even for veteran police officers, who earn their living confronting life and death situations.

"This goes to the heart of the entire community," said Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Harriett, who knows the families of all three boys. Ben Butler's grandfather, also named Ben Butler, is a former Sanford Police Chief.  
 "You say to yourself this isn't fair," Harriett said. "Your children go to school and you don't see them again. That definitely isn't fair. A wife loses her husband and she is called a widow. A man loses his wife and he is called a widower. A child loses his parents and he is called an orphan. There isn't a word in the dictionary to call parents who lose their child. It isn't supposed to happen."  
 The need for each person,

Harriett said, is to use utmost care when driving through construction areas such as the accident site and over the crowded roads.  
 "We have more traffic than our streets allow," he said. "We need to be courteous and responsible."  
 Whitley Eckstein, a Sanford City Commissioner and long-time teacher at Seminole High, said the mood was extremely somber all day Tuesday.  
 "Many students were crying," he said. "Some knew early before Mrs. Coleman made her announcement. A couple were not far behind when the accident occurred."

## Rabbi Elbaz prepares congregation for High Holy Days

**LONGWOOD** — As Rosh Ha'Shanah approaches — the start of the Jewish New Year — more than 150 members of Congregation Beth El are preparing to attend High Holy Day Services with Rabbi Moshe M. Elbaz.

Congregation Beth El, a Conservative Synagogue located in Longwood, serves the Jewish community across Central Florida. Rabbi Elbaz said the High Holy Days Services will be conducted at the Orlando Scottish Rite Masonic Center in Winter Park (off Howell Branch Road.) They begin on Friday, Sept. 29 at 7:30 p.m.

In the book of Leviticus, Jews are instructed that on the first day of the seventh month

(First of Tishrei) a day of rest and convocation will be observed, proclaimed with the blast of horns (the Shofar).

This day, Elbaz said, has become known as Rosh Ha'Shanah, the Jewish New Year and the beginning of the Yamim Norain — the 10 Days of Repentance, the period of spiritual self-examination that culminate in Yom Kippur-Day of Atonement.

Rabbi Elbaz said that most Jews enter Rosh Ha'Shanah 5761 — The Jewish New Year of 5761 — with great anticipation in their own lives and with the renewed interest in their faith because of interest in Joe Lieberman's candidacy for vice president on the Democratic ticket.

"Many never thought this could happen," Elbaz said. "And the more they talked

about it or read about Mr. Lieberman the more involved they became in their own Jewish faith. We will be praying, of course, for all candidates, all world leaders. We are pleased, however, for Mr. Lieberman as the nation was for John Kennedy 40 years ago. Barriers are coming down."

Elbaz said that as members of a larger community and citizens of America, Jews pray constantly for world peace — Shalom.

Rabbi Elbaz has been a spiritual leader for Conservative Jews in this area for nearly 20 years. He and Jacklyn Elbaz have been married 28 years and have the children — Shuli Mesa (25), Yamiti (22) and Jonathan (11). Rabbi Elbaz said Jonathan is attending Hebrew Day School and enjoys athletics.

## Gambling OK as long as the milk is delivered

Somebody dropped a lottery ticket in the collection plate at a church on a recent Sunday.

"Wouldn't it be great," said the pastor, "if that's the winning ticket?" He was rubbing his palms together in mock joyful anticipation. He would take the winnings, he said, and pay off the church mortgage and do needed repairs on the parsonage.

Other ministers, meanwhile, believing that all gambling is wicked, would find themselves in a dilemma. Much as they could use the money for a good cause, they would find them-

selves in the position of the Baptist minister who replied, when asked what he would do if he found a lottery ticket in the collection plate, "I'd throw it away."

Where does the church stand on the matter of bingo? That is a form of gambling.

The Catholic Church takes the position that gambling is sinful only if indulged in to excess — for instance, if it takes

money away from a family that needs it. As for betting on a horse race or a football game, it can make the race or game more interesting, says a Catholic Church

spokesman. "The important thing is that it can be done in the spirit of fun."

The church draws the line, says the priest, "when a person gets all worked up over a bet or gets angry about losing. That's when betting becomes evil."

The English publication, New Statesman, says, "One would gather from the denunciations of sweepstakes that the ordinary human being, having bought a ticket, is able to think of nothing else 'till the drawing is over. The milkman, one is led to believe, forgets to deliver the milk, the postman drops the letters in the wrong boxes, etc."

Opponents of gambling will always point out, too, that the big money sweepstakes or lottery winner usually has so little experience in handling large sums of money that it is unlikely to stay with him very long. There are even many stories of the sweepstakes winner who came upon a tragic end. Take poor old Joe, his brother, Fred, and his brother-in-law, Al.

The three men, who were all employed in the same factory, held a ticket on the second-place winner in the Irish sweepstakes. Joe's share was \$430,000 while Fred and Al split the other \$430,000 evenly.

Joe knew what he wanted — a nice little farm for his wife,

Grace, and himself. "I'll get some good fishing tackle and two good shotguns and two good bird dogs and that's all," he said. "The rest of that dough is going into bonds."

His brother said that sounded wonderful to him, and Al agreed.

Two years later, Joe hadn't gotten around to buying his little farm, but he was still talking about it. He was living in an apartment and had a Japanese servant to pour his drinks. Grace was in a mental institution.

Al and Florence were divorced. Fred was paralyzed from the waist down as a result of colliding head-on with a truck in his new Lincoln. He had been drinking. His wife, Marjorie, had been killed in the same wreck.

Joe eventually died a confirmed alcoholic. Not many of us, of course, have to worry about what will happen to us if we hit it big in the lottery. In the meantime, with a lottery ticket in our hands, we can be, as the New Statesman says, "rich in our dreams — which is the only kind of riches most of us are likely to possess."

Unsupervised kids in streets drive neighbors to distraction

**DEAR ABBY:** My husband and I live in a community outside New Orleans. It is a new residential area with homes that all have nicely fenced back yards. However, when we return from work in the evenings, we encounter toddlers on the streets with their tricycles and abandoned toys — and the parents are not within three houses of their youngsters. It's an obstacle course.

Frankly, we are sick to death of taking responsibility for the safety of their children. As we pass, the parents give us dirty looks and yell things like, "Watch the kid, will ya!" as we swerve to avoid children who are not old enough to be playing in the street.

We make every effort to drive under the speed limit and are always very careful. However, at least once a week we find ourselves slamming on our brakes to avoid an unsupervised child. When tragedies happen, these parents are quick to place the blame elsewhere.

When I was a child, we were allowed to play only in a fenced yard with a padlock on the gate so we couldn't escape. Or we played in designated play areas with our parents keeping a close eye on us. We were not allowed to ride bicycles on the street until we had been taught road safety and demonstrated the skills and knowledge need-

ed to cycle on public streets without harm.

Thank you for letting me get this off my chest. It felt good to vent. I hope my letter will open the eyes of some parents to reality.

**DEAR PAMELA:** So do I. Perhaps this is the time for a public service announcement. Supervision of small children — who by definition are impulsive and quick — is a full-time job. It

requires one's full attention, particularly if the child is playing in a driveway or on a sidewalk near a street with traffic. Carrying on adult conversations, reading a magazine, running into the house "for just a moment" are distractions that can lead to tragedy in the blink of an eye. Hard work? You bet! But the joys are boundless.

**DEAR ABBY:** My sister has lived in Europe for most of my son's 9 years. She's 50 and going through a divorce. She is moving back to the United States and now wants to spend more time with my son. She also wants to start a savings account for him to pay part of his school tuition.

I am a single mother raising him alone, and the help would be appreciated. However, my sister does not give freely —

there is a price attached to everything she does. She is manipulative and controlling, and my son doesn't particularly enjoy spending time with her. When she's around, she rarely participates in our life, but expects to be fed and cleaned up after — the classic "guest" mentality.

While the college fund is something I cannot provide at this time, I don't want to have it held over my head that I or my son "owe" her in some way. Should I take the money and keep quiet for his sake, or say "no thanks"?

CAN'T DECIDE IN CALIFORNIA
