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JACK DEMPSEY ALMOST HIT BY ROBBER'S SHOT

"Ex-champ" Has Close
Call From Death As
Intruder Enters His
Room And Fires Gun
Bullet Barely
Misses His Head

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Feb. 25 (INS)—Jack Dempsey, former champion heavyweight of the world, had a narrow escape from death today when a man entered the bedroom in which he was sleeping and fired a bullet at him. The bullet missed his head by a foot or two and was imbedded in the wall.

The story of the reported assassination attempt was told by one of Dempsey's companions who went for a three-hour early morning drive today. Dempsey was sleeping in the same room with Floyd Fitzsimmons, a fight promoter of Hialeah, Fla., when the intruder entered. It was a "Stick 'em up" man, said the companion.

Dempsey leaped out of the bed and started to pursue his assailant. The man rushed from the room, however, and disappeared in the darkness. According to the story, Dempsey and Fitzsimmons dressed and made a search in the vicinity for the man. Dempsey was quite calm throughout the thrilling episode but later this morning he was "pretty shaky" about what happened.

The champion made every effort to keep the matter secret. The bullet was taken out of the wall and Dempsey had it in his possession today. Dempsey told a friend that he could see no reason why anyone should want to shoot him. He was of the opinion that it was the work of a bandit rather than an enemy.

Radio Commission Is Dealt Blow To Power

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25 (INS)—A body blow was struck today at the federal radio commission's power and its entire reorganization system. The district court of appeals handed down a decision requiring the commission to restore the wave length and frequency channels of station WGY, Schenectady, N. Y., which the commission had taken away from WGY and given to station KGO of Oakland, Calif., thereby compelling WGY to go on part time.

The case was regarded as the most important piece of radio litigation now in the courts because as the commission's powers are concerned. With this decision as a precedent it is now admitted that any station which is dissatisfied with its treatment under the commission's reorganization scheme may go into court and contest the commission's powers.

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Paulino Awarded Decision Over Christner In Tough Engagement In New York

Basque Wood Chopper Proves Himself Among Leading Contenders For Heavy Title By Overcoming Akron Battler

NEW YORK, N. Y., Feb. 22.—

An army-traveler on its stomach and the only thing that has to do with prizefights is that this is the place where a fighter can lose one, as old K. O. Christner, the man with the rubberoid torso and non-shatterable windmill, discovered last night. Old Kayo finished a unanimous second to Paulino, the prominent human being, through 10 barroom rounds last night and he did it with his left bay window, the latter deftly blocking a body attack so vindictive that the 20,000 witnesses shuddered in unison.

Old Kayo didn't shudder, he didn't even shake. He simply proved what we already knew: that rubber will bounce, but it won't break.

As a result Paulino remained a qualified candidate for the heavyweight championship, which he always has been, and Christner remained what he was—a very rough person with the heart of a pit bull and the soul of a stevedore. He never really was in the heavyweight title stakes, even after he stopped Knute Hanson and now he is definitely out like the family wash of a Monday morning. The lad wants to fight, but he really doesn't know how.

Somehow he contrived to nail Jack Sharkey with a lot of right hands the first time out, but after stalling the show from Paulino in the first three rounds, he simply couldn't figure any way of dropping that long right on a jaw that was completely surrounded by elbows and, while he was trying to settle the problem, Paulino was going to the basement stoking up with shovels-full of gloves.

Only in the first round and the last did he succeed in scoring impressively. Paulino, starting slowly in the opening heat and being crossed with three rights to the chin in a manner most disturbing, was nailed again in the final, and this time he came out from under the punch in no time frame of mind. For the first and last time during the fight, the Basque wood chopper withered under the storm. But it blew over in a moment and he ended the fight with a leather with equal gentleness.

The incident in question furnished the only possibility of a knockout throughout the rough, but futile evening. Old Kayo went in for most of the "steak and eggs" that featured the occasion, this being the only tactics he could devise once he discovered that Paulino had him whipped. Sometimes, he clutched the Basque's head under his arm and held it after the style of a barroom champion, the world over. Sometimes, he pushed his left glove into Joe Gum's countenance and, thus applying the straight arm, rushed him clear across the ring. Joe Gum wasn't so gentle either. His big hold was sort of human hammer throw, which flung Christner about through the ropes. Really, it was a bad day for all.

As I say the affair proved only what we already knew, viz that Paulino belongs and Christner doesn't. The Basque may be pretty much of a mugs fighter, but you can name the men on your index finger who can guarantee to lick him by with the Sharkey and his head under his arm and his eyes of fighting is such that it can and often does make the best of them look silly. It isn't surprising, therefore, that a crude fighter like Christner was non-placed by the demands of the occasion.
