



Water spots are most prenounced on crepes, taffetas, satins, Peau de Soie, and similar fabric constructions. Where water comes in contact with the fabric, the sizing has a tendency to pile up around the outer edge of the stained area and leaves a heavy deposit in the form of a ring. In cases like this, it is possible for you to take your finger nail and scratch the white deposit. Temporarily, the ring will disappear. But it will reappear upon absorbing moisture from the air.

It is perhaps difficult to believe, but many water stains are difficult to remove from a fabric. It takes a skilled apotter with the proper equipment and a skilled
