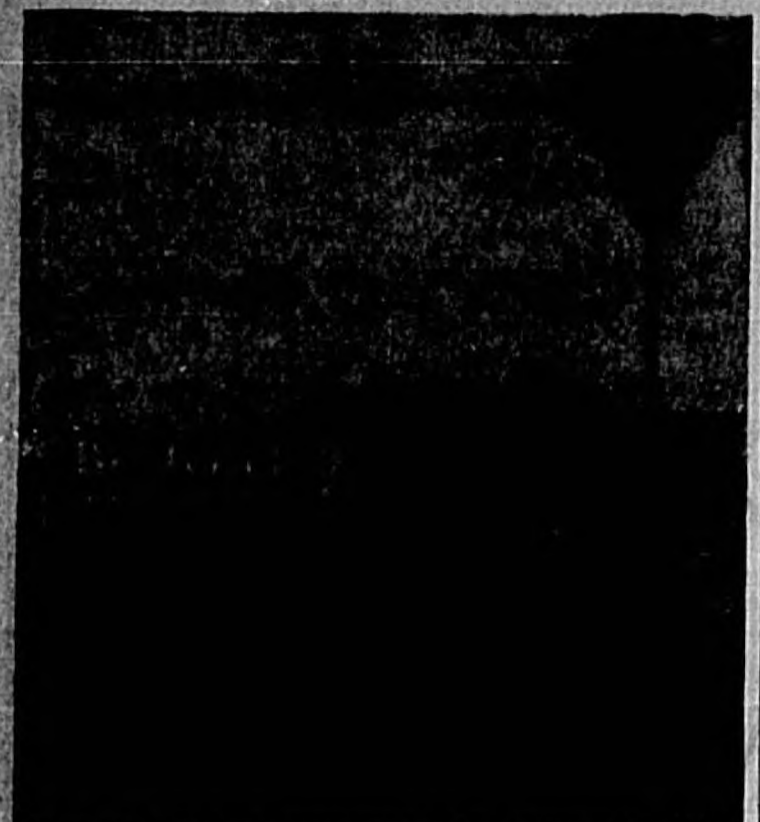

Complete Integration Goal Urged

DURHAM, N. C. (UPI)—A Negro minister, who used boycott and passive resistance as a means of ending bus segregation, urged Negroes Tuesday night to "fill the jailhouses of the South" if necessary in a drive for complete integration.

Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. of Atlanta spoke to a rally of about 800 persons called to strengthen a sit-down protest of segregated lunch counters at drug, dime and department stores. King led the successful boycott of segregated city buses at Montgomery, Ala., in 1956.

on a store lunch counter to protest segregated seating. Witnesses said the fight started when a Negro youth banged a white boy's head against a lunch counter.

North Carolina has a program of limited integration in public schools of seven cities, but King told his audience that "we are not satisfied with token integration."

Animals In Exhibit Unhurt As Gusts Damage Fair Area

Freezing Predicted For County

Freezing temperatures are forecast for Seminole County tonight following a cold snap with high winds that caused damage to tents and stands at the county fair and to homes in the area.

Temperatures dipped to 35 degrees early this morning and frost is predicted over most of the county tonight.

Heavy winds Thursday toppled the exhibit tent at the fair, located on Hwy. 172 and Joel Field, president of the fair association, said this morning that the tent will be put up again by this afternoon.

Field also reported that numerous stands were knocked over by the damaging winds.

Winds broke the wooden pegs holding up the exhibit tent and it flapped over with livestock still inside.

However, volunteers guided the animals out and no injuries were reported. Around the state, a small tornado struck a summer resort beach near Panama City Thursday, smashing 22 homes, ripping roofs from 22 others and slightly injuring one person.

George Cowgill, mayor of West Panama City Beach, 12 miles west of Panama City, estimated property damage at \$400,000.

The Weather Bureau at Miami said the weather was expected to clear today as temperatures dropped. Temperatures dropped to between 28 and 34 in northern sections of the state early today. Winds kept frost from forming.

The bureau said the outlook was for continued cold weather tonight with frost over most of the farming areas of the state Saturday morning.

Arthur Beckwith To Enter Race For Clerk Post

Arthur H. Beckwith Jr. today announced his candidacy for the office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court for Seminole County subject to the May 3 Democratic primary.

For the past 2 1/2 years Beckwith has served as deputy tax collector in the office of John L. Galloway.

"I am announcing my candidacy, not only because countless Seminole County citizens have urged me to do so, but also because I see an opportunity for genuine public service, and because I feel that I am qualified for the position," Beckwith said.

"I have great faith in the growth and development of our county. My wife and I chose to return to Seminole County at the conclusion of World War II. We are rearing our children here and we have been and are now interested in those things which make for a wholesome county with opportunity for our people."

"While the office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court is primarily an administrative position, it would be my purpose to take part in aiding the development of the county in a sound business-like manner," he said.

Beckwith, 37, is a life-long resident of Sanford; he attended the public school system of Seminole County and graduated from Seminole High School. He attended Stetson University and Temple University.

A member of First Methodist Church, Beckwith has been a member of the Official Board of the church for 11 years and teaches the Young Adult Fellowship Sunday School Class. He is a veteran of WW II, is married to the former Zona Matthews, also a life-long Sanford resident. He is the father of two boys, Jack, 10, and Kevin, three, and is a member of the American Legion and the Jaycees. The Beckwiths live at 400 W. 30th St.

A one-story frame house near the Prairie Lake Drive-In Theatre was a complete loss after a kerosene heater exploded, Casselberry Fire Chief Paul Bates said. The house belonged to a Negro family.

60 Jobless After Blaze; School Fire Cause Probed

The second major fire in Seminole County within 30 hours destroyed the giant Lake Charm Packing House and ice plant one mile northeast of Oviedo, causing an estimated \$175,000 damage.

No one was injured in the blaze which left approximately 60 persons out of work.

The fire was discovered at 12:30 a. m. today and fire crews from Oviedo, Longwood, Casselberry and Goldenrod rushed to the scene to contain the blaze and prevent it from spreading to the company's celery plant, some 50 yards away.

Firemen fought the blaze through early morning hours, and the plant was still smoldering at 10 a. m.

Harold Ward, president of the Lake Charm Fruit Co., said it is not yet known how the fire started. Flames fanned by a west wind burned strongly until about 4:30 a. m., he said.

The blaze engulfed 14 refrigerator cars containing several part carloads of celery. Twelve hundred boxes of temple oranges also burned in the packing house. The corporation is insured but not enough to completely replace the lost buildings, he said.

Ward said the company will finish its season's citrus operations with the help of Oviedo's Nelson Packing House, owned by Frank Wheeler. Lake Charm Fruit now being picked will be packed at the Nelson company. The Lake Charm company has more than 350 acres of citrus.

Some of the citrus workers will be laid off but company operations will continue as far as possible, Ward said. About 90 workers were employed in the burned out packing, ice and celery pre-cooling plants, and 100 more work in the fields.

The Lake Charm Fruit Co. was right at the beginning of its ice and pre-cooling year when the fire struck. Persons in the Sanford-Orlando area who were supplied with ice and pre-cooling service by the Lake Charm plant will have to make other arrangements, Ward said.

The company has been in business since 1927. Within the past two years it modernized its equipment and re-built its office, which also was burned. Temporary office quarters have been set up in a house next to the plant.

Meanwhile, state insurance investigators and school officials today were still trying to determine the cause of the Altamonte Springs Negro School fire early Wednesday.

Estimated loss as a result of that blaze was believed to be about \$45,000, according to school officials.

Castro Raps U. S. On Plane Attacks

HAVANA (UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro demanded today that the United States halt "savage" attacks on Cuba's countryside by "pirate" planes which he said come from Florida.

In a three hour and 15 minute television speech, Castro referred specifically to a light plane which exploded in flight early Thursday near Perico, Cuba.

Castro welcomed a U. S. offer to send experts to check the nationality of the plane—a Piper Comanche—and the identity of its occupants.

It's A Boy

LONDON (UPI)—Queen Elizabeth II gave birth to a boy today, her third child and the first born to a reigning British sovereign in 103 years. The queen and her new princeling were both reported "doing well." The new arrival, whose birth touched off joyous celebrations throughout Britain and the commonwealth, automatically became second in succession to the throne.

DeBary Chamber Hears '60 Outlook

The program at the DeBary Chamber of Commerce meeting in the Stetson University dining room Wednesday consisted of two informative talks.

Dr. Gilbert L. Lyman, professor of History and Political Science, in his talk "Looking Ahead To the 1960's," stated his opinions on what the new decade will bring in regard to such diversified subjects as peace, government, business, labor, education, and religion. He stated that the great problem facing us was whether or not we can maintain our democratic system under present conditions.

City Facilities Expansion To Handle Doubled Population Is Outlined

City Manager Warren Knowles estimated Thursday that Sanford will double in size during the next 20 years and presented a 21-point program to take care of the expansion.

Knowles presented the program at the meeting of the City Planning and Zoning Board, which was to discuss the program in detail next Thursday.

The city manager's outline included:

- 1—Rebuilding or enlarging the present City Hall to take care of the city's growth.
- 2—Relocating the zoo and increasing parking facilities in that area for City Hall.
- 3—An expanded central fire station — remodeling of the present one or a new one located at another site.
- 4—Build a third fire station south of 23th St. as the city grows further south.
- 5—Development of a new water supply field, with a water treatment plant at the well field to reduce expenses. The city already is approaching the capacity of the present water supply.
- 6—A large water main south of 23th St.
- 7—Sewage treatment plant by 1970.
- 8—Sanitary landfill sites. (The present ones are being used up.) Upon completion, the sites would make excellent parks and playgrounds.
- 9—Continuation of the street repaving program to rehabilitate old street pavements. This should be an annual program so as to stretch the cost over a longer period of time, Knowles said. The city manager estimated that more than a half million dollars would be needed to do a complete job at the present rate.
- 10—Continue a program of erecting street name signs of a permanent type marker each year. Painted concrete posts require annual repainting, Knowles noted.
- 11—Sidewalk repair program. Faulty sidewalks are often the cause of claims, Knowles pointed out. Abutting property owners

should be made to recognize their responsibility, he added.

- 12—Boat marina, boat basin with docks and berths for boats.
- 13—A new yacht club facilities should be left as a private venture, Knowles explained.
- 14—A filter system in the Fort Mellon swimming pool at an approximate cost of \$75,000.
- 15—Increased parking facilities for downtown area, French Ave. area, and south of 15th St. Present private property-leased facilities cannot be counted on for more than three years, Knowles said. Present two downtown lots will no doubt be used to capacity in five to 10 years, the city manager emphasized.
- 16—Enlargement of the present utility shop building, which now is used to capacity, or construction of a new one. The present building also include a city storage yard that is leased in for the storage of water pipe, sewer pipe, sand, slag and limestone, Knowles said.
- 17—New city clay pit and borrow pits. The present pits are running out.
- 18—Additional recreation parks as the city expands more and more to the south. Knowles also noted that population growth in 20 years will require added recreation facilities for the youth.
- 19—Acquisition of site for new recreation facilities. The need will come for such facilities and an auditorium.
- 20—Expansion of police housing and jail facilities. Combined structures could be remodeled and used for city purposes at less cost than new construction.
- 21—Large terminal facilities hinging on possibility of the Sanford-Titusville Canal becoming a reality.

Starting Monday, fines will be levied on residents who don't have 1960 tags, Galloway added.

Textbook Sharing To End In Seminole Next Fall

Seminole County students will stop sharing textbooks when double sessions end in the fall, the county textbook and supply manager, Roger Harris, told the Jaycees Thursday.

Harris said some new books will be provided when new school buildings open in the fall. The county school system has funds reserved for the books, but it still will be a struggle to provide each child with his own books, Harris said.

"Pupils in grades one through four, in double sessions, now share many books. A child in an afternoon session shares his books with a pupil attending a morning session.

The textbook manager said the Legislature denied state schools the \$6 million extra needed for books in the 1959-61 period. The Legislature voted the schools the same amount—\$12-\$14 million for books they received for 1957-59. Harris said the sum was only enough to cover book replacement.

Some Seminole County school books are eight years old. The 2,400 to 2,500 more students expected in county schools next fall won't make the situation any easier, he said.

Stewart Gatchel, county director of instruction and personnel, said schools in south Seminole will be "filled to the hilt" when the fall term starts. South Seminole might face double sessions before the year is out, he added. Forty-five per cent of the county tax dollar now is used for schools.

Explaining the effect of federal grants to public schools, Gatchel said the county is trying to keep as much local control of studies as possible. When the federal government grants National Defense Education Act funds it requires local schools to have complete records, to use the money to buy equipment which meets certain standards, and to have county and state approval before the money is made available. But the government doesn't tell what price or brand equipment to buy, Gatchel said.

The federal funds are made available to schools to promote science, mathematics and foreign language studies. They must be matched by local funds.

The need for protective zoning was emphasized again Thursday night as the final comprehensive zoning hearing was held by the County Zoning Board.

The final hearing was for residents of District 4 and approximately 40 persons attended the hearing in the courthouse.

The zoning board now will study requests made at previous hearings and make its decisions at a master hearing in March.

County Zoning Director Robert Brown said the board was highly pleased that the four hearings showed residents are interested in protective zoning.

Brown said residents of District 3 who did not attend the hearing for that district because of a conflicting meeting are invited to attend a meeting of the zoning board Wednesday at 7:30 p. m. to air recommendations.

At Thursday night's meeting, residents from Lake Howell asked for higher classifications to protect their property, and the board told the delegation it would consider the request.

Driver's License Station Relocated

Driver's license examinations will be given at a new location in Sanford starting March 1.

The Highway Patrol said today driver permit applications will be taken at the Sanford Armory, located on E. First St. near Seminoles Memorial Hospital. The same 9 a. m.-5 p. m. hours each Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday will be in effect.

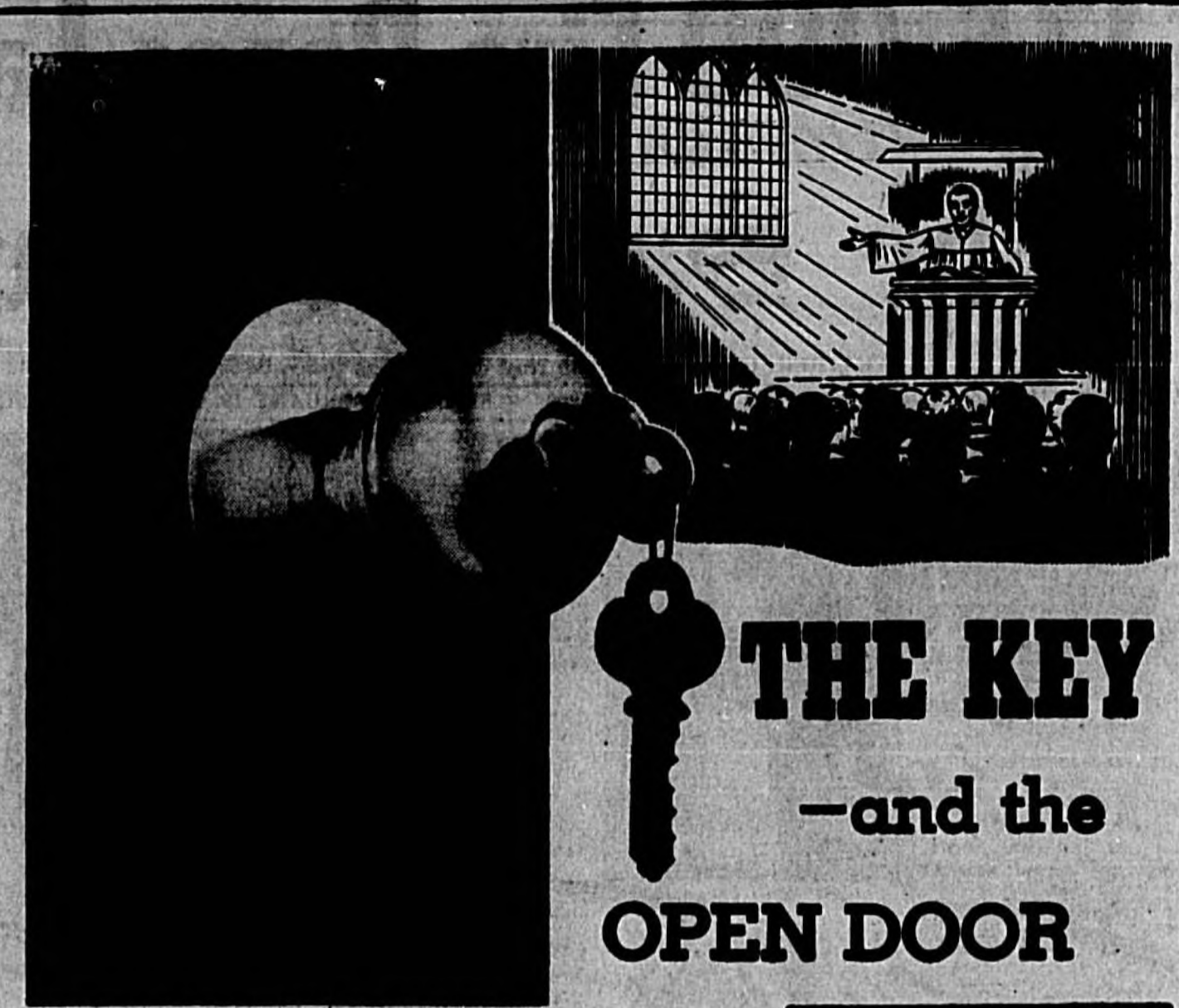

There Are Good Reasons For Growth

The past decade of dynamic growth in Florida has been amazing. There are many reasons why this growth should continue over the long term. The proportion of older people is predicted to rise steadily and they can live more comfortably and cheaply in the South. Reliable estimates point to a probable gain in Florida's permanent population from 4.7 million now to about seven million in 1970. Ten years from now there will only be the same amount of land where one can be reasonably sure of warm weather in mid-winter.

That brings us to one of the most precious things in this state. Land. During the past year, many large land companies have "gone public," offered to the public shares of their company. Among them were such giants as Arvida Corp. Arthur Vining Davis received 8,447,928 shares of Arvida's Class "A" common stock and a five per cent debenture for \$6,900,000 due July 31, 1973, as consideration for the properties. This acreage consisted of less than one per cent in improved property, such as hotels, motels, and apartment houses, operated on a seasonal basis, primarily located in Palm Beach County. The factors that have had favorable effects on real estate values in these counties are the steady increase in population, which in this state over the past 25 years has greatly exceeded the national average, the mild climate, and the fact that land available for development is limited in these specific areas.

In May, 1969, the company purchased 2,000 acres of land that was formerly owned by the Ringling Circus located between Sarasota Bay and the Gulf of Mexico on the west coast. Plans are to develop about 4,000 homesites, hotels, motels, apartments and commercial buildings.

During the year, Arvida formed the Arvida Oil Co. which plans to build and operate a chain of gasoline service stations and marine outlets throughout Florida.

It is reported that Arvida and Centex Construction Company are planning a joint development of 8,000 acres near Boca Raton, about three miles from the Boca Raton Club and owned by Arvida. The new development, reportedly to cost \$200 million, is among the first building projects undertaken by Arvida. The project will include about 10,000 "medium-priced" homes, schools, community buildings and an industrial park are planned.

Price range on Arvida for 1969 was \$28.50 high and \$16.75 low. Recent price is about \$12.50.

It is interesting at this point to note that the Florida Growth Fund, the open-end mutual fund that specializes in owning shares in corporations that are doing business in Florida, holds approximately 3,100 shares of Arvida in its portfolio. By the way, the past seven weeks when the market has experienced a tremendous decline, Florida Growth Fund has declined less than one per cent in price. That's an excellent record for such unpredictable market!

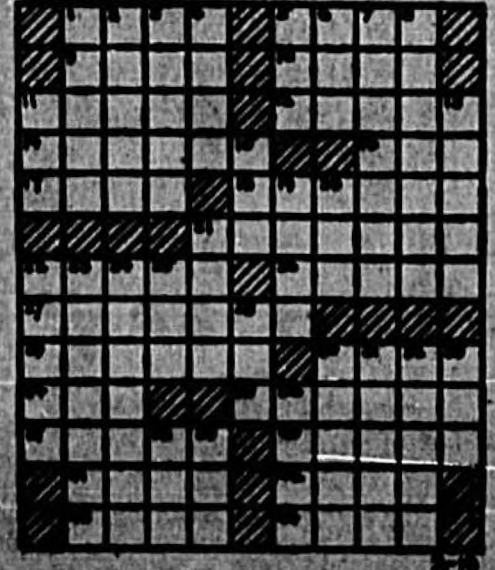
Here are some well-established Florida-based companies: Florida Power Corp. has more than doubled its customers in the past decade; Florida Power & Light, Minute Maid, Tampa Electric, and Winn-Dixie Stores.

On the more speculative side is Stockton, Whitley, Dora, mortgage bankers with extensive ownership of Florida real estate, Jim Walter Corp., a large builder of "shoe" homes, expanding rapidly and plowing back profits into the company and General Development, a big land developer.

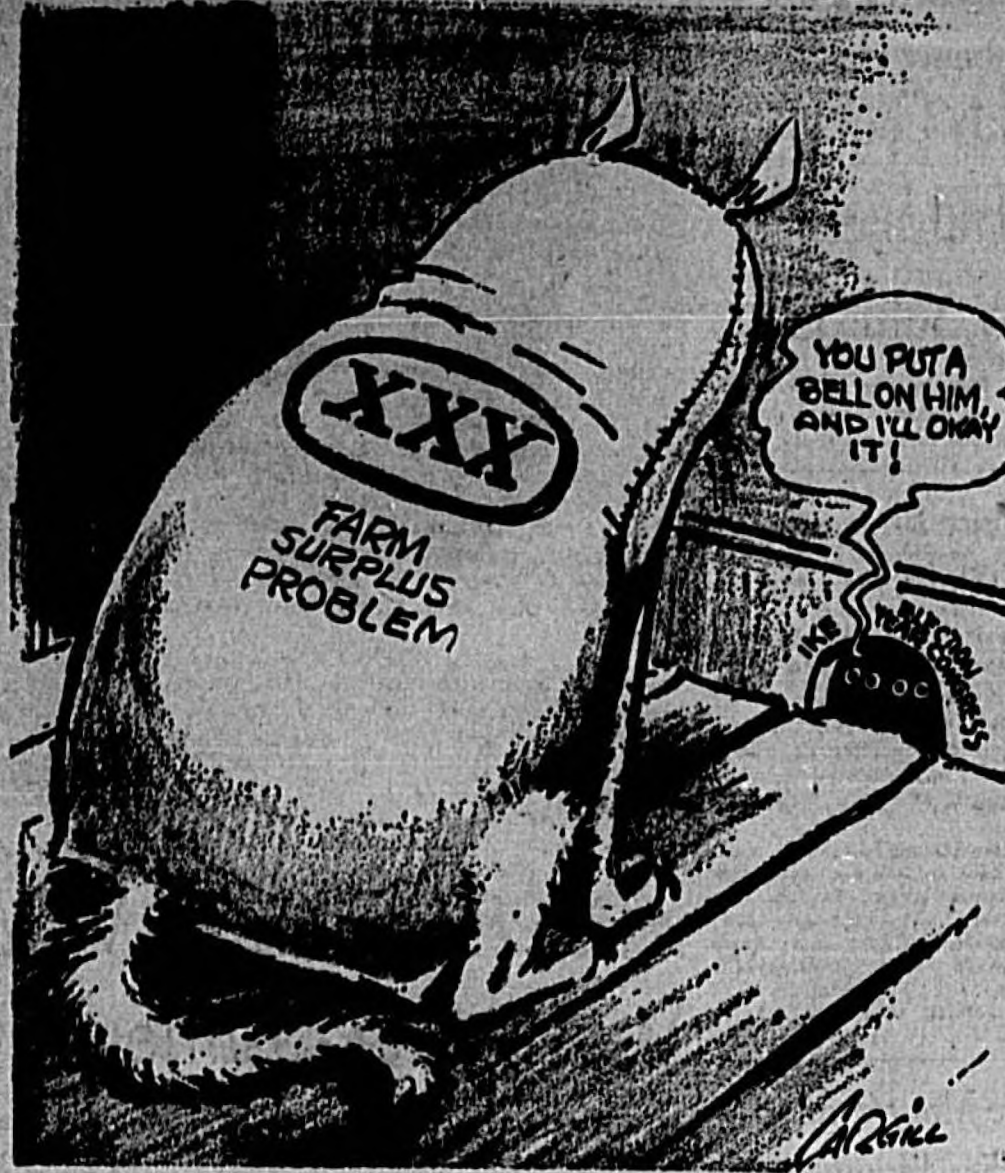

Crime Committee Lawyer Shows He Has Knack For Sniffing Out Smells

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Book authors as a rule are a sensitive lot and Robert F. Kennedy is no exception — particularly where the nose is concerned. I was aware that Kennedy, as former chief counsel of the Senate Rackets Committee, had the knack of sniffing out corruption in the labor-management field. But until I read an advance copy of the book he has written about his experiences, I didn't realize just how perceptive his nostrils are.

On page 75, for example he describes Teamster President James R. Hoffa's associates as having "the smooth faces and cruel eyes of gangsters; they wear the rich clothes, the diamond ring, the jeweled watch, the strong, sickly-sweet-smelling perfume."

At first, I couldn't figure out how he knew about the perfume. At the committee hearing I attended, the prevailing aroma was strong, sickly-sweet-smelling tobacco smoke.

Then I discovered on page 86 that Kennedy had the advantage of some close-up sniffing even during a chance encounter with Chicago teamster Joey Glimco. As he tells it:

"I was riding up in the elevator on my way to the hearing room when I was almost overcome by a heavy, sickly-sweet smell. I tried to remember what madam

was testifying that day, until I got out and, walking down the hall with Glimco to the caucus room, realized that he was the source of the oppressive odor." Kennedy's book will be published later this month under the title "The Enemy Within." By and large, I think he did a pretty good job of distilling the essence of the committee's exciting, colorful and wonderfully confused investigations. A large part of the book, as might be expected, is devoted to an unflattering account of the life and times of Hoffa. Unless Hoffa reviews it for the Teamster magazine, I guess the book gives Kennedy the last word in their celebrated feud. Kennedy, incidentally, sent Hoffa a free copy with a personal, handwritten note on the flyleaf. It reads: "I am sending you this book because I knew you would want to read it and I didn't want you to use union funds to buy one."

Olympic Medal Play Begins Today

SQUAW VALLEY, Calif. (UPI)—Pigeons, politicians and patrons gave way today to the athletes who came to do competitive battle on the slopes and rinks of Squaw Valley in the VIII Winter Olympiad.

Friendship and fraternity, the order of the day for Thursday's opening ceremonies, were once again in little evidence in these strife torn games.

The first of two gold medals will be decided this afternoon—the winner of the men's cross-country skiing. But there still were grumbles among officials and athletes.

The mostly concerned the weather—Thursday's storm. It "mowed away" one of today's scheduled feature events, the men's downhill ski race which was postponed until Monday.

But with the weatherman and ground crews cooperating, the competition was expected to be sharp in the cross-country, the pairs figure skating and hockey. Three matches will extend the day's hockey schedule until nearly midnight.

The weather, after a few overnight flurries, was expected to stabilize with clear skies and a high-around mid-day—of 40. This was forecast as "good" weather for the 48 cross-country entrants. The 12 1/2 mile course, at nearby McKinney Creek, was re-prepared by crews who worked through much of the night.

Welter Champ Gets 'Reprieve'

PROVIDENCE, R. I. (UPI)—Welterweight champion Don Jordan, threatened with loss of his welterweight crown today, has been given a reprieve by the National Boxing Assn. until complete results of his medical examination are received from California.

Jordan claimed a blood ailment was the reason he hadn't defended the 147-pound title since last July 16, violating the six-month's defense rule.

But he also claimed he had recovered from the ailment and would be ready to defend against Cuban Kid Parot at Las Vegas, Nev., in May.

Stocky Sixten Jernberg of Sweden was rated the choice in the gruelling up-and-down-hill event. He had an opportune starting position—43rd, with a late post spot a decided advantage. Early skiers pack the run for the late-comers and the late starters are advised of what time they have to beat. Fin Veikko Hanulinen and Russian Nikolai Anikin ruled as the 30-year-old lumberjack's top contenders. The U. S. was given little chance of placing among the top 15.

The U. S. contestants are Leo Massa of Matawan, N. J., who is scheduled to go off sixth; Andrew Miller of Crested Butte, Colo., off 13th; Sven Johanson of Spennard, Alaska, off 21st and Joe Wilson of Lake Placid, N. Y., off 34th.

In the pairs figure skating, world champions Barbara Wagner and Robert Paul, of Toronto, Canada, were considered all but shoo-ins for the day's second gold medal. Canadian coaches think their stiffest opposition will come from another "north of the border" team—the brother and sister combine of Maria and Otto Jeinek. Czechoslovakian born but now living in Bronte, Ont., and Germans Marika Killius and Hans Baumber.

The U. S. has three pairs entered with the sister and brother team of Nancy and Ronald Ludington of Roxbury, Mass., rated Uncle Sam's best. The others are Mr. and Mrs. Ite and Ray Hadley of Seattle, Wash., and Maribel

Owen and Dudley Richards of Boston. The games were to have been strictly a day-time affair until the hockey officials blew the matches out of the outdoor ponds. Now, at least during the early stages, it will be close to the witching hour when the last event ends.

The three hockey games today match: 4 p.m.—United States and Czechoslovakia. 6:30 p.m.—Canada and the Swedes. 9 p.m.—Russia and Germany. The U.S.-Czech match is the battle of the three. Both clubs rate among the five best in the games. They are no strangers, having met twice in Los Angeles exhibition games. The Yanks won the first, the second ended in a 5-5 tie and a near free-for-all.

Thursday's driving storm, which dumped 11 inches of new snow on the valley, dampened the elaborately planned opening ceremonies. Less than 15,000 persons—the original estimate had been for upwards of 25,000—braved the dangerous, traffic clogged highways.

The vice present of the United States, Richard M. Nixon, officially opened the games; some 2,000 bewildered pigeons—masquerading as "doves of peace, friendship and fraternity," and scores of sponsoring patrons shared in the glory, all of which was bathed in a fireworks display staged by Walt Disney.

Matthews Favored In Lightweight TV Bout Tonight

NEW YORK (UPI)—Len Matthews of Philadelphia, gunning for a shot at the lightweight crown, pits his youth and power against Algerian Labouari Godth's experience and guile tonight in their TV fight at Madison Square Garden.

Matthews, 30, is favored at 11-5 because of his punch and because he demonstrated in his last bout that he again is relying more upon his punch than upon his speed. He knocked out contender Johnny Bussio in the first round on Feb. 1.

Godth, 30, is a crafty counter-fighter who depends upon his left jab, left hooks and fast footwork. He is a comparatively light hitter, who scored but 13 knock-outs in his 64 bouts.

Their 10-round will be televised and broadcast nationally by NBC at 10 p. m.

Evangelist Records Impressions Of African Trip

EDITOR'S NOTE: Evangelist Billy Graham is visiting in Southern Rhodesia at the halfway mark of the African "crusade" that has taken him through eight major West African cities and numerous villages. He has addressed crowds of unprecedented size for that part of the world and visited government leaders. Ahead of him are campaigns in five countries of Central and East Africa. At this point he was asked to record some impressions for United Press International.

By BILLY GRAMAM VICTORIA FALLS, Southern Rhodesia (UPI) — All I have read about Africa over the years

failed to prepare me adequately for what I have seen and heard and felt during the past five weeks.

I have seen the wonder and grandeur of nature. I have flown over great rain forests, towering mountains and broad rivers. I have shouted with exhilaration at the sight of great herds of elephants, water buffaloes, zebras and giraffes.

I have stood in awe at the splendor of Victoria Falls which are unequalled anywhere in the world. I have floated down the Zambesi River with hippopotami in full view, and skimmed ten feet over its surface in an airplane as crocodiles basked in the sun.

I have seen baboons in trees, and fed wild monkeys which grabbed food out of my hands.

Once I came within an inch of being dunked in the Zambesi as Africans were carrying me in a big line, the one in which the great missionary explorer David Livingstone traveled.

But my most fascinating experiences of this trip to Africa have been the many encounters with people of many tribes and tongues. I have met them in modern office buildings which rival anything in New York, and I have talked with them in primitive market places and villages where the mode of dress (and

and) and cooking pots are just like those found by the earliest explorers.

Anyone who says the West African is hostile to Americans doesn't know what he is talking about.

I did not see a hostile glance or gesture. Never have the members of my team received such cordial, warm hospitality. Most Africans seem not to associate the United States with colonialism and imperialism.

My most outstanding impression of my West African tour was the tremendous contribution Christian missionaries made to its development. I'm convinced that schools, hospitals and churches brought by missionaries have saved this part of the world from a possible bloodbath.

Everywhere I found people hungry for the Gospel. I have had the privilege of preaching to some of the largest crowds of my ministry. The people were quiet, dignified and reverent. There was no more emotional display than we have seen in America or England.

Textile Workers To Get Pay Hike

GREENSBORO, N. C. (UPI) — Thousands of workers at southern textile mills will be granted pay increases within the next 30 days, Burlington Industries, Inc., the world's largest manufacturer of textiles, said most of its hourly employees will get wage hikes within 30 days. Burlington has 44 divisions operating in 17 states and four foreign countries.

Wage increases also were announced Thursday by M. Lowenstein & Son of Anderson, S. C., Deering-Milliken Co. of Spartanburg, Spring Mills at Inman, Riverdale Mills at Enoree and Arkwright Mills at Arkwright, in South Carolina.

Hanes Knitting Co. in Winston-Salem, the Calumet Corp. of America and Chatham Manufacturing Co. in Elkin, N. C. announced increases earlier this year.

A general wage increase in the southern section of the textile industry started about the same time last year after Cannon Mills at Kannapolis, N. C., announced hikes.

Burlington went along with the increase last year but made no announcement and only "confirmed" the raise after several months. However, this year J. Spencer Love of Greensboro, chairman of the board and president of Burlington, told stockholders early in February that wage advances would be forthcoming by spring.

Love said Thursday that the policy of setting wage rates on a regional basis has been customary in Burlington "and is again being followed so that each particular type of operation can stay abreast of its own competition and area situation."

J. P. Stevens Co., another textile giant, said it was studying the possibility of granting wage increases. The company employs some 20,000 persons and has 14 mills in North Carolina and 23 in South Carolina.

Cone Mills Corp., which also has its executive headquarters here, said it had no plans for an immediate increase.

Segregationists Warned Against Vigilante Action

RALEIGH (UPI) — A Negro protest of lunch counter segregation at dime, drug and department stores spread to two more southern cities Thursday as a judge warned white opponents against "vigilante action."

Acting Raleigh City Judge Tom Ellis sentenced William B. Faulk, 35, to 60 days in jail here for striking a Negro demonstrator with a length of dog chain.

"We are not going to have the people of Raleigh taking the law into their own hands," Ellis said. "The time has not yet come when our white citizens must act as vigilantes."

The sit-down strike spread to Shelby, N. C., and Charleston, S. C., and both white and Negro college students staged demonstrations against segregated lunch counters at three stores in Nashville, Tenn.

Negro demonstrators at Charleston did not enter any stores but staged a march down King Street. At Shelby, about 30 Negroes

Finch-Tregoff Trial End Near

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — It's all over in the Finch-Tregoff murder trial but the final arguments and the verdict which could send the handsome surgeon and his young mistress to death in the gas chamber.

Opposing attorneys begin their summations Tuesday after a four-day rest. The jury of seven women and five men was expected to begin deliberations next Friday.

The panel will attempt to wade through more than a month of conflicting testimony as told by prosecution and defense witnesses and arrive at a decision on whether Dr. R. Bernard Finch, 42, and Carole Tregoff, 23, plotted and carried out the July 18 gunshot slaying of the physician's wife, Barbara Jean, 36.

Testimony in the sensational trial came to a close Thursday like it began in early January—with the quiet answers of pretty Marie Anne Lidholm, the Swedish exchange student who worked in the strife-ridden Finch household.

AF Manual Labeled Waste Of Money

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Air Force wants to make sure its servicemen know the fine points of using the knife, fork and spoon as well as how to wash officers' dogs, mix drinks, baby-sit and get bachelors dates.

Rep. Frank Kowalski (D-Conn.) Friday disclosed still another Air Force training manual—this one for cooks and other mess officers—giving the knife-fork-spoon instructions.

Kowalski, a former Army colonel, branded some sections of the pamphlet a "ridiculous and fantastic waste of the taxpayers' money." He found no fault with sections dealing with complicated kitchen equipment.

Lawmakers earlier made public manuals for orderlies and officers' club manager giving the dog-

washing, drink-mixing, baby-sitting and date-getting instructions.

The cooks' manual contained such instructions as:

"The fork is used to lift, turn or move large or small pieces of food in sanitary and practical manner. . . . Crisp handle of fork firmly and pierce object to be moved, turned, or lifted deep enough to secure a good hold. The fork also can be used to mix or separate various foods."

Knives: "A sharp piece of steel set in a handle. . . . Knives are used to cut, slice or chop foods in portions."

GOP Leader Urges 'Rights' Speed-Up

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen Friday called for a Senate speed-up on civil rights legislation despite assurances of House action by mid-March.

The Illinois senator suggested a civil rights bill might be enacted sooner if the Senate expedited its own measure. The House, he said, might accept the Senate bill and eliminate the need for any time-consuming conference on differing measures.

Dirksen said: "I want to see action."

The Senate Democratic leadership is known to feel that the simplest and safest route to passage of an election-year bill would be a reverse procedure—have the Senate accept the House measure.

The feasibility of the Democratic plan will hinge upon how much civil rights advocates would have to sacrifice in accepting the more moderate House plan.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits (R-N.Y.), a leading civil rights proponent, said he does not think accepting a House bill would be worthwhile

if it meant "giving up major substance."

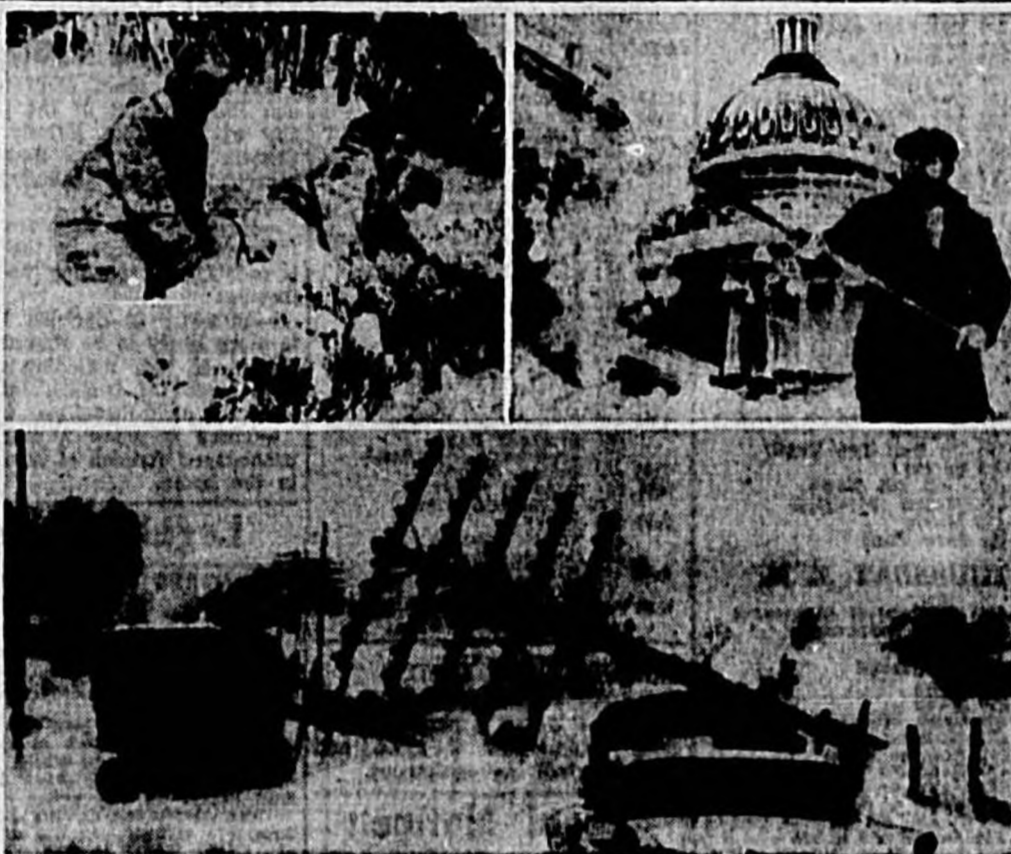
Both Dirksen and Javits said they would not object to the Senate laying aside the civil rights issue from time to time to act upon appropriations, which have priority, and non-controversial secondary legislation.

Dirksen said: "I hope we begin next week to tighten the lines a bit and extend our sessions. That has to be done if we are to pass a bill in due course."

The Senate outlook was for continuing lengthy debate, with southern opponents of civil rights holding the floor much of the time, and some action to perfect a bill.

The House Rules Committee agreed by a 7-4 vote Thursday to let the long-stalled House bill come up for debate on or after March 10—with 15 hours of general debate, and unlimited amendments.

Under the House procedure, southerners could drag out the 15 hours of debate into a couple of weeks by offering numerous amendments and demanding quorum calls.

Miller, of Islip Terrace, N. Y., was convicted of bigamy. He never seemed to have heard about divorces.

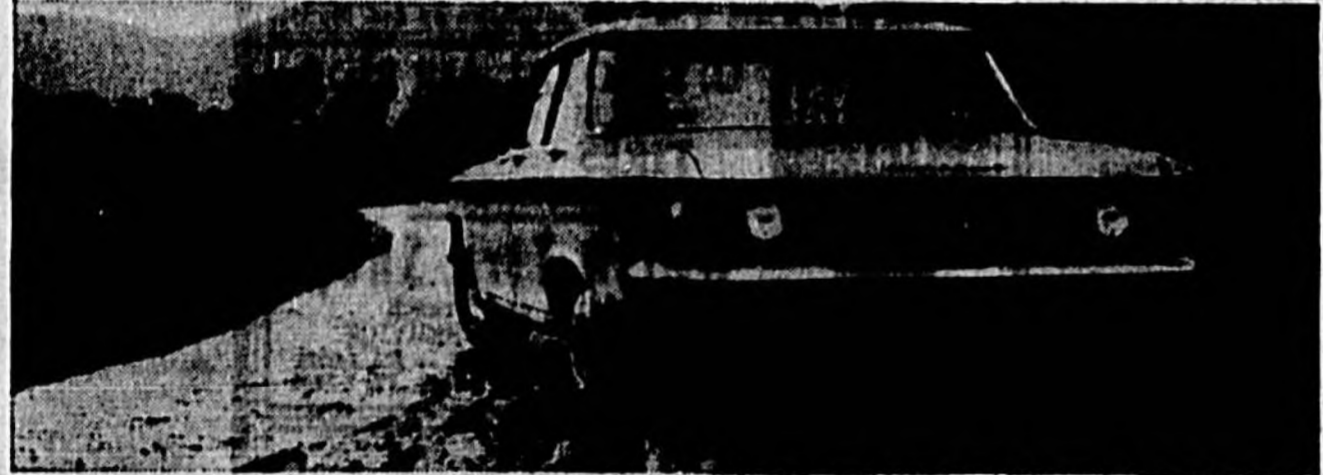

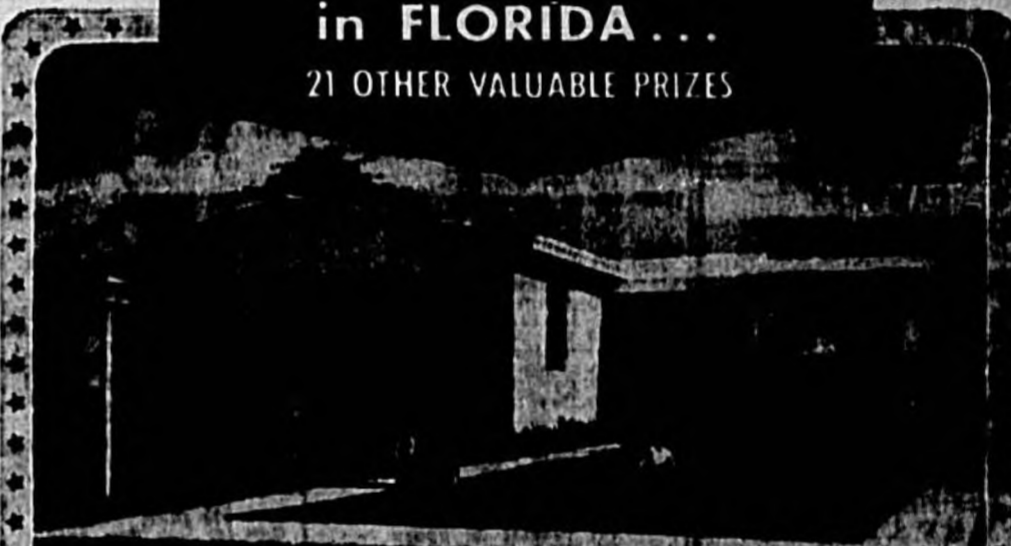

On Friday and Saturday, two action packed thrillers and a comedy will play. "Journey To The Center of the Earth," "The Hangman" and "Rally Round The Flag Boys" will be shown.

Experts Say Plant Indoor Garden Now

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (UPI) — Begin planning for indoor spring planting of flowers now, and follow these rules, says the University of Minnesota Institute of Agriculture:

Keep the plants in sunshine or bright light. Roses especially need sunlight.

Keep the soil moist, watering whenever it is dry to the touch.

Keep the plants at cool night temperatures, preferably at 60 degrees.

Keep the plants out of extremely high temperatures (over 75 degrees).

Postal Rate Hike Passage Doubtful

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Eisenhower's new plan to boost postal rates was counted as a dead letter in Congress Wednesday.

There is "not a chance in the world" that the election-year Congress will approve Eisenhower's \$554 million-a-year postal package, said a prominent member of the House Post Office Committee.

Educational TV's Next Step: Airplanes To Beam Programs

INDIANAPOLIS (UPI) — A unique experiment in educational television will literally get off the ground here when the 1960-61 school year begins in September.

Purdue University is sponsoring the project, which involves the transmission of grade school and college courses from a circling airplane to a potential audience of five million students in a six-state area.

Project sponsors are now busy lining up the airborne faculty, which will be brought to Purdue for briefings and then fan out to local stations across the nation to learn the techniques of appearing before the TV cameras.

There are 13,000 schools and colleges in the six-state area. For the cost of receivers and antennas, they may add to their curricula any course they choose from 21 to be offered by the high-flying school teachers.

The experimental project, costing \$7 million, will run for two years. If successful, other regional airborne re-transmission networks are expected to be established.

The pioneer plan is being run by the Midwest Council on Airborne Television Instruction, which is made up of nine eminent educators from Midwestern universities. They have already purchased two second-hand DC-7 planes that will be crammed with electronics equipment.

Present plans call for the two planes to alternate in flying at an altitude of 30,000 feet during the daily six-hour transmission periods over a circular course northeast of Marion, Ind.

Ground transmitters on the Purdue campus will beam both live and taped courses to the circling planes. The planes' ultra-high frequency transmitters will re-transmit the programs to Indiana, Illinois,

True Value Property Tax Need Stressed

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. LeRoy Collins said today inadequate local property taxes have caused a failure in many communities to provide adequate sanitation, education and street improvements.

Collins, who opened a two-day school for county tax assessors called by the comptroller's office, said a review of a study ordered by him two months ago indicated there had been a failure to meet these needs.

He said the Arthur D. Little Co., which made the survey, said the failure was not caused by lack of state assistance.

"In fact, they point up that our state now renders more aid to local government than a great majority of the states, and at a rate much higher than the national average," Collins said.

"The imbalance is due, they stress, in the area of inadequate local property tax support."

Full results of the study will not be made known for six weeks or more, the governor said.

Collins, who has led the fight for full cash value property assessments, said that unless local governments are able to provide more schools, sewage systems, paved streets, and sidewalks, libraries, more development and protection of natural resources, "progress can come to a dead end."

The governor said property owners more than anyone else have profited from Florida's growth, but he said they should expect fairness in taxation.

"I cannot sympathize with the man who owns property which over a span of a few years increases in sound value five times but who nevertheless screams in anguish when the value of it for tax purposes is increased two times," Collins said.

Probes Continue In 2 Costly Fires

Investigators today continued to sift the charred ruins of two buildings destroyed by fire within 20 hours late last week.

Fire raged the Lake Charm Packing House early Friday morning with damage reported to be at least \$175,000, while school officials searched the burned area where the Altamonte Springs Negro School stood.

The school fire occurred early Thursday and damage was estimated at \$85,000.

Cause of both fires was undetermined.

Supt. of Schools R. T. Milwee said today the school board will order the charred bricks salvagable materials of the building for sale soon.

Approximately 200 pupils who attended the school are continuing studies in the school annex and a neighboring church building.

The packing house fire was discovered at 12:30 a. m. Friday, and firemen from Oviedo, Longwood, Casselberry and Goldenrod fought the blaze for more than 30 hours.

The fire engulfed 14 refrigerators and damaged carloads of celery and many boxes of oranges.

About 90 workers were left without jobs.

Neo-Nazi Linked To Ku Klux Klan

VIENNA (UPI) — Austrian police today intensified an investigation into a neo-Nazi organization said to have connections with the European branch of the Ku Klux Klan.

A search of homes of members of the organization, known as "National Youth," uncovered anti-Semitic pamphlets entitled "White Brotherhood" allegedly distributed by the Klan in English and German, police reported.

Police said there were unconfirmed reports that officials last year in Klagenfurt contacted leaders of the Austrian "National Youth" which has been banned.

Free Puerto Rico Issue Greeted by Ike

JAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (UPI) — President Eisenhower arrived today at heavily guarded San Juan airport where rival groups attempted to demonstrate for and against Puerto Rico's commonwealth status with the U.S.

The president's plane landed here on the first leg of his 13,500-mile journey of personal diplomacy that will take Eisenhower to Brazil, Argentina, Chile and Uruguay in the next 10 days.

The more than 5,000 persons on hand to meet the president were kept under tight control by a strong police guard.

Rival political factions displayed banners of greeting and placards urging immediate independence for this island which has voluntary commonwealth ties with the U. S.

About 10 minutes before the president landed, representatives of opposing political factions shouted at each other across the road leading to the airport—where they had been kept at a safe distance.

Each group darted across the road occasionally and threw pamphlets at the opposing faction—one of which wanted to continue Puerto Rico's commonwealth status and the other which wanted immediate freedom. Prompt

police action separated the groups each time.

Eisenhower, smiling and relaxed, appeared to be unaware of the demonstrations as he told the crowd in his arrival remarks that he brought Puerto Rico "greetings from your fellow citizens of the 50 states of the republic."

Before departing on his Latin American tour, Eisenhower told the U. S. Sunday that the U.S. has "indestructible, incalculable" military power ample for the present and tailored to meet the needs of the future.

The president replied to Democratic critics of his defense program in a nationwide radio-TV speech Sunday night.

Reaction to the address was divided. A leading Democratic critic, Sen. Henry M. Jackson (Wash.), said the president had failed to come to grips with the real defense policy issues. He said Eisenhower failed to mention Soviet progress on missiles.

Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson said he agreed the U. S. has a powerful defense force. But he said he would press Senate missile investigations because the real issue is "whether our plans are adequate for our needs in the foreseeable future."

Chairman Overton Brooks (D-La.) of the House Space Committee said he was disappointed the president did not mention U.S. defense against intercontinental ballistic missiles or compare U.S. Soviet missile strength.

Eisenhower said he would support Senate GOP Leader M. Dirksen (Ill.) said the executive had "stated the obvious in a nutshell." He said a speech would go far to "dispel the confusion" over the defense program.

The president did not refer to any of his defense critics by name, but he said that unbiased observers recognized and respected this country's massive deterrent strength.

"We have forged a trustworthy shield of peace — an indestructible force in incalculable power, ample for today and constantly developing to meet the needs of tomorrow," he said.

"Today, in the presence of continuous threats, all of us can stand resolute and unafraid, confident in America's might as an anchor of free world security."

He and his wife, the former Rose Harkley, and their three daughters are active members of the First Methodist Church.

"I am proud to be a part of the campaign to elect Doyle Carlton governor of our state," said Southward. "He is a man of character and integrity and is ideally suited to give Florida a sound administration during the next four years."

The disaster area, centered in the region of Melouza, 100 miles southeast of Algiers, is part of the Mediterranean earthquake belt, where about 300 persons were killed 12 years ago.

The quake shook the desolate area where the Hodna and Bibans mountain ranges meet, continuing several minutes. Most of the victims were women and children who were indoors at the time. The menfolk were outdoors at work.
