The second major fire in Seminole County within 30 hours destroyed the giant Lake Charm Packing House and ice plant one mile northeast of Oviedo, causing an estimated \$175,000 damage.

No one was injured in the blaze which left approximately to persons out of work.

The fire was discovered at 12:30 a. m. today and fire crews from Oviedo, Longwood, Casselberry and Goldenrod rushed to the scene to contain the blaze and prevent

it from spreading to the company's celery plant, some 50 yards away. Firemen fought the blaze

through early morning hours, and the plant was still smouldering at

10 a. m. Harold Ward, president of the Lake Charm Fruit Co., said it is not yet known how the fire started. Flames fanned by a west throne. wind burned strongly until about 4:30 a. m., he said.

The blaze enguifed 14 refrigerator cars containing several part carloads of celery. Twelve hundred boxes of temple oranges also

There Are Good **Reasons** For Growth

By GORDON J. TOLL Manager, Security Associates, Inc. The past decade of dynamic growth in Florida has been g. There are many reasons why this growth should entinue over the long term. The factors that have had favorable effects on real estate values in these counties are the steady increase in population, which in this state over the past 25 years has practicy exceeded the national average, the mild climate, and the fact that land available for development is limited in these specific areas. a specific areas.

In May, 1959, the company purchased 2,000 acres of land that was formerly owned by the Ringling Circus located between Sarasota Bay and the Gulf of Mexico on the west roast. Plans are to develop about 4,000 homesites, hotels, notels, spartments and commercial buildings.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Gov. LeRoy Collins said today inadequate local property taxes have caused a sailure in many communities to provide adequate sanitation, education and street improvements.

Collins, who opened a two-day school for county tax assessors alled by the comptroller's office, said a preview of a study ordered by him two months ago indicated there had been a failure to meet

these needs. He said the Arthur D. Little Co., which made the survey, said the failure was not caused by lack of state assistance.

"In fact, they point up that our state now renders more aid to government than a great majority of the states, and at a rate much higher than the ma-tional average," Collins said.
 "The imbalance is due, they stress, in the area of inadequate
