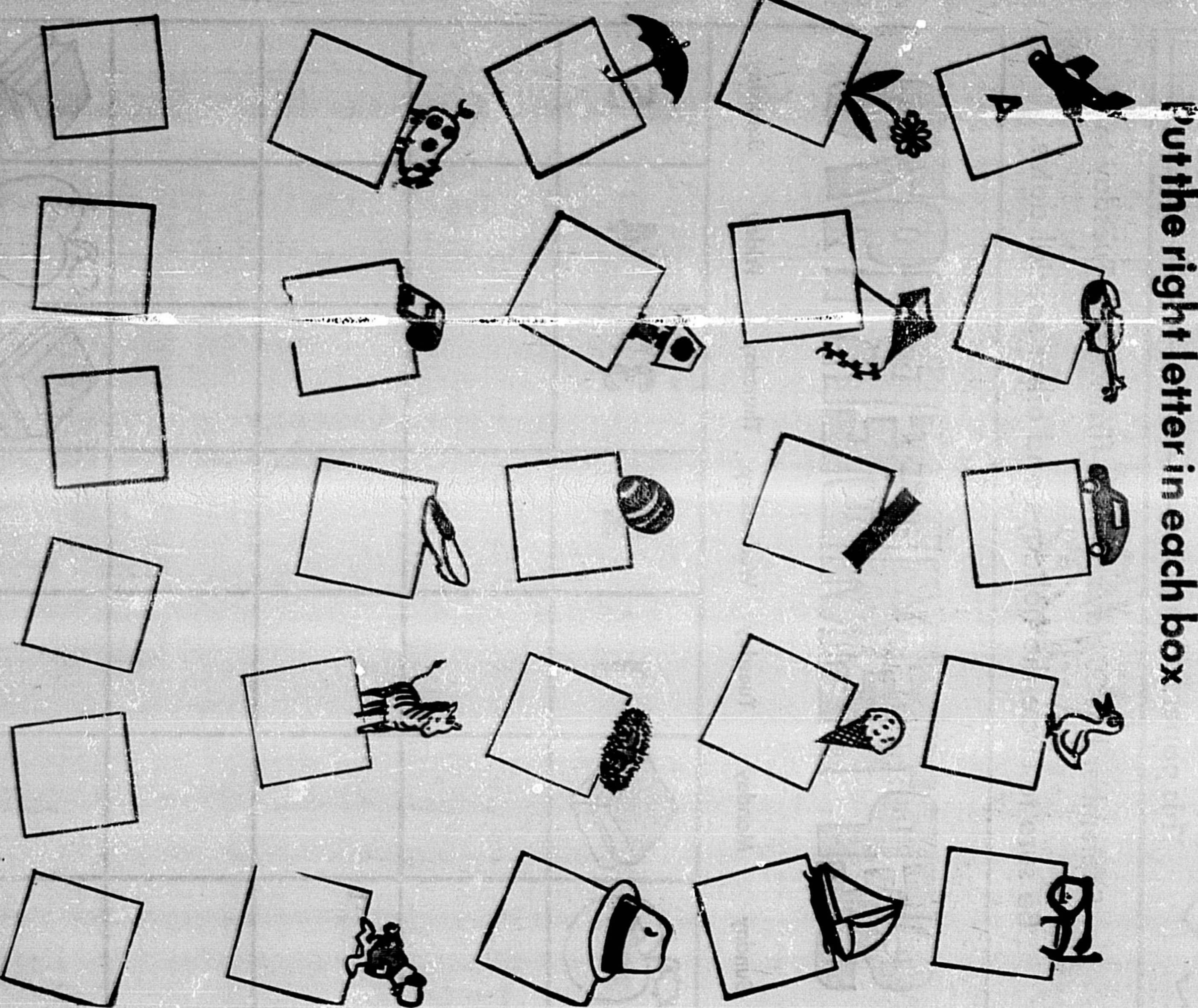
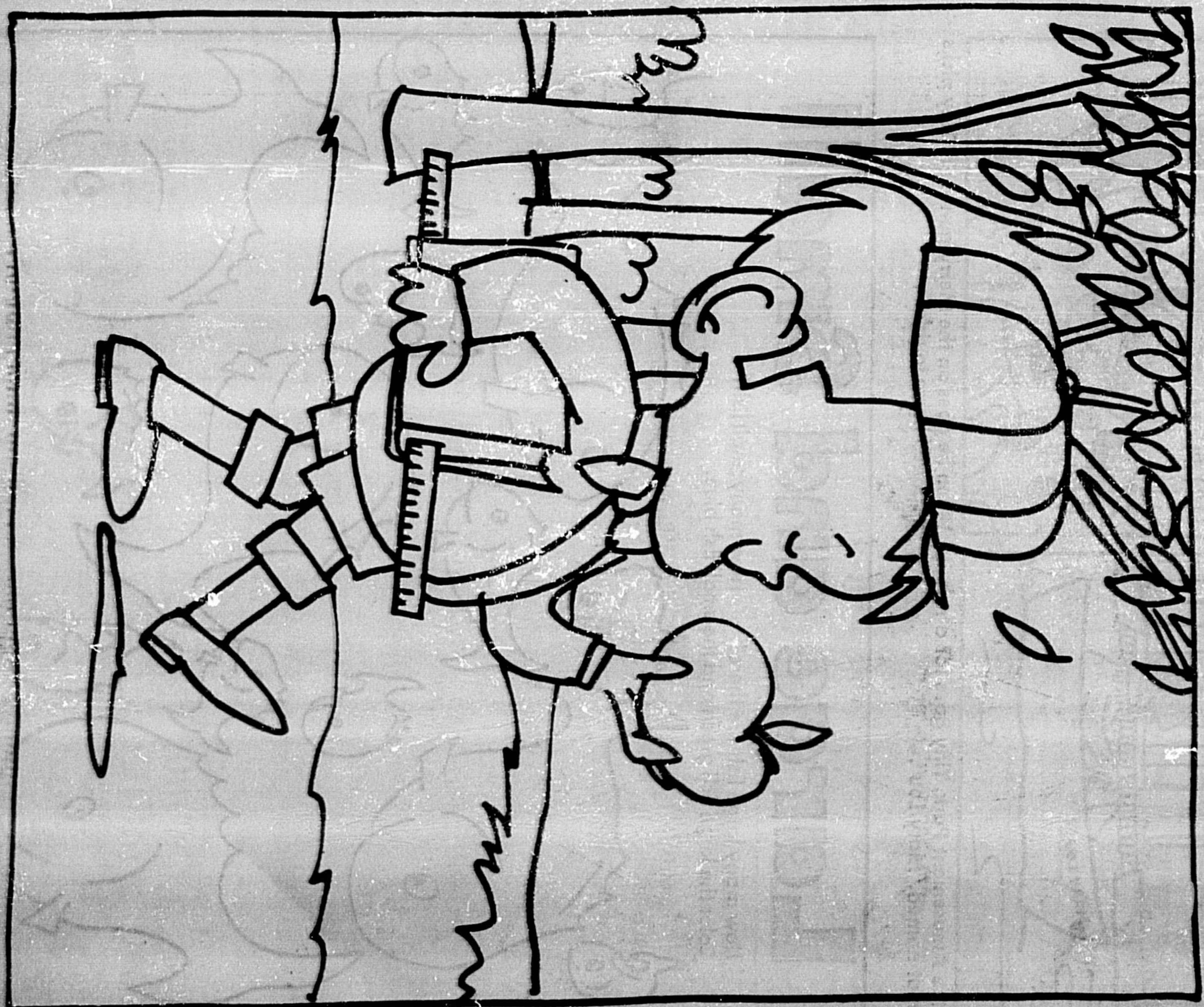

Five Youths Held On Rape Charge

Five Sanford males have been arrested on rape charges brought after an early morning incident involving 17 and 19-year-old youths and a 17-year-old Lake Mary girl.

According to sparse county reports, Vernon Jerome Dillon, 19, Apt. 26, Castle Brewer Courts; Robert Randall, 19, of 1502 West Eighth Street; Willie James Bennett, 17, of 1516 Oleander Avenue; Lamarr Roosevelt, 17, of 1500 West 15th Street, and Edward Mitchell Duval, 18, of 1517 Mangoustine Avenue, were booked at the county jail on rape charges brought after a sister of the girl called authorities and reported the incident.

According to information from L. J. Kirk, county investigator, the girl reportedly got into a car with the five men after they accosted her while she walked along Southwest Road near 13th Street.

The girl told Kirk she was taken to a wooded spot near Maclean Road where all five allegedly assaulted her. She was later released after having been returned to town, the investigator said.

A doctor's examination disclosed the girl had had intimate relations, Kirk concluded.

Gabriella Jacquet Jones, 17-year-old Sanford youth, who listed his address as 2904 Bungalow Boulevard, was arrested by Seminole Deputies O'Dell Hunt and John Wright Jr. early today on a possession and sale of marijuana charge.

According to the jail docket, Jones was charged at the Deluxe Bar by the deputies and removed to the county jail where he was booked in lieu of \$5,000 bond.

Night-Time Security Hospital To Employ Full-Time Policeman

Seminole Memorial Hospital trustees have approved to hire a full-time police officer to provide security for the hospital.

According to the minutes of the specially called meeting, the trustees approved hiring Advanced Industrial Security Service to furnish a police-maintenance type hospital operation at the hospital during 6 p.m. to 6 p.m. stat.

Dr. Thomas Largent, trustee, brought the original motion to the board to hire an emergency room guard, who would perform the hospital's security duties during the hours the hospital was approved. Now Dr. Largent feels that one man can perform the services performed by the policeman and be an additional maintenance worker.

Largent stated to The Herald he was not meeting to infer anything detrimental to the police department but rather one man could do the same tasks as present policy of having a policeman for security and a maintenance man to check boilers and do other necessary hospital tasks.

The hospital's trustees are considering the use of an extra man as Dr. Largent's reasoning in seeking the change, and not dissatisfaction with the police work.

In other trustee actions, it was decided to use two-way radio systems with antenna established on top of the hospital which doctors could be paged by radio in their cars or on their persons by the hospital.

This would mean the end of the present paging method at the hospital, whereby the hospital uses a loud speaker system that reverberates over the entire medical facility.

Oviedoan Serves On Viet Frontline

LONG BINH, VIETNAM - Pfc. Gordon M. Johnson, of Oviedo, Fla., is back from a two-month trip out west in the Republic of Vietnam.

Johnson, son of Mrs. Audrey L. Johnson, of Oviedo, is a machine gunner with Bravo Company, 2d Battalion, 1st Regiment, American Division.

The infantry company recently finished a two-month mission at Kham Duc, deep in the mountain jungle of western Vietnam, only a dozen miles from Laos.

Assigned responsibility for guarding the 6,000-foot Kham Duc air strip, Johnson and the other men of his battalion spent most of July and August patrolling dense jungle and steep mountains that completely surround the vital air strip.

Kham Duc air strip, abandoned since 1968, was reopened in early July to provide vital logistical support for a multi-thousand man Republic of Vietnam Army task force.

The task force sought to destroy and disrupt enemy supplies and "vulpy lines" flowing into Vietnam from the nearby Ho Chi Minh Trail just across the Laotian border.

During one patrol, elements of Johnson's company surprised a dozen North Vietnamese soldiers engaged in setting up an anti-aircraft position.

The prize catch was a new caliber .51 machine gun complete with elaborate anti-aircraft sights. The weapon's capture served as a welcome for Johnson's new company commander for whom this was the first mission.

On another occasion a Bravo patrol was helicoptered into a jungle cornfield which turned out to be a North Vietnamese

N. Orlando Council Faces Long Agenda

NORTH ORLANDO - Village Council faces lengthy discussions at a meeting tonight at 7:30 p.m. Under a new ruling the meeting is to be terminated by 10:30 p.m.

First on the agenda is a public hearing on ordinance 52, an amendment to the zoning laws of the municipality, which allows owners more than two dogs in each household.

A report will be given by Village Attorney Thomas Freeman on the annexation ordinance, in which the city proposes to annex the rights-of-way on SR 44 to U. S. 17-92 east to SR 419, on SR 419 from U. S. 17-92 southeasterly on SR 419 to Howell Creek Road, on U. S. 17-92 starting from the junction of SR 419 to U. S. 17-92 east on Oak Lane, Longwood, east on Oak Lane to Ridge Road and south on Ridge Road to SR 419.

Discussion will be held on the appointment of a building inspector for the municipality. Sidney Vibian Jr., who had been serving in the capacity, resigned following appointment to the County Commission. Sidney Vibian Sr. was considered and expressed an interest. However, his firm is contracting for electrical work in the village, presenting a conflict of interest.

Also under consideration will be amendments to the election laws. The city will undertake conforming to the county's election law, with regard to registration. Under the present regulations, voters register each year. Under a state law, which is mandatory next year, the village will utilize the county's registration books, therefore necessitating registering only once. The possibility of the village changing the date of its municipal elections to conform to that of other area municipalities also has been advanced.

Appointments will be made to the Planning and Zoning Board to bring it up to the required five-member board. Kelly, presently a councilman, and Pat Del Villaggio, also a councilman, tendered their resignations following their election to the council. Also resigning was Floyd Green. Appointed to the council were Herb Fox (chairman), Mel Campbell and Billy Bramlett. Considered for appointment tonight are Mrs. Ann Devilder and W. Hurt.

Discussion will take place on a gas franchise for the village. Currently the municipality is being served by Suburban Propane Company with bottled gas. A request has been made by Florida Gas Corporation for a franchise to serve the village with natural gas.

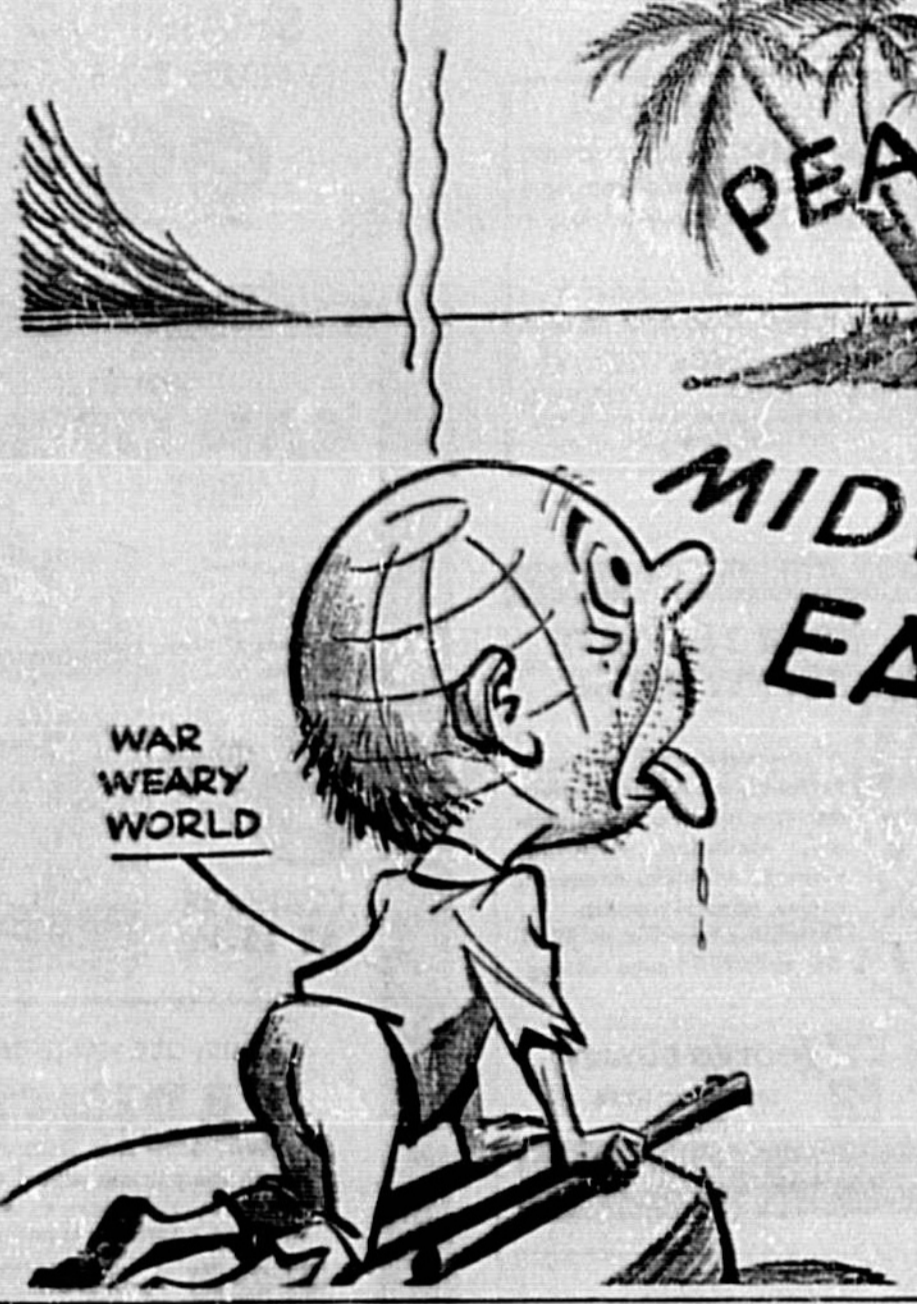

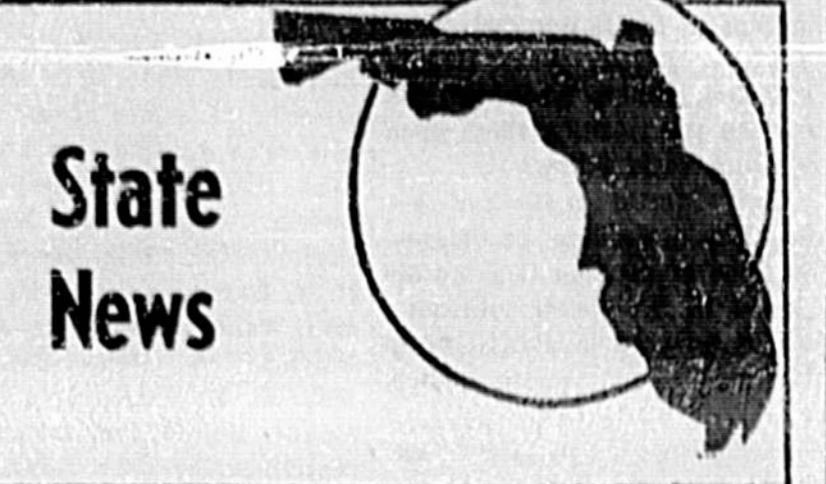

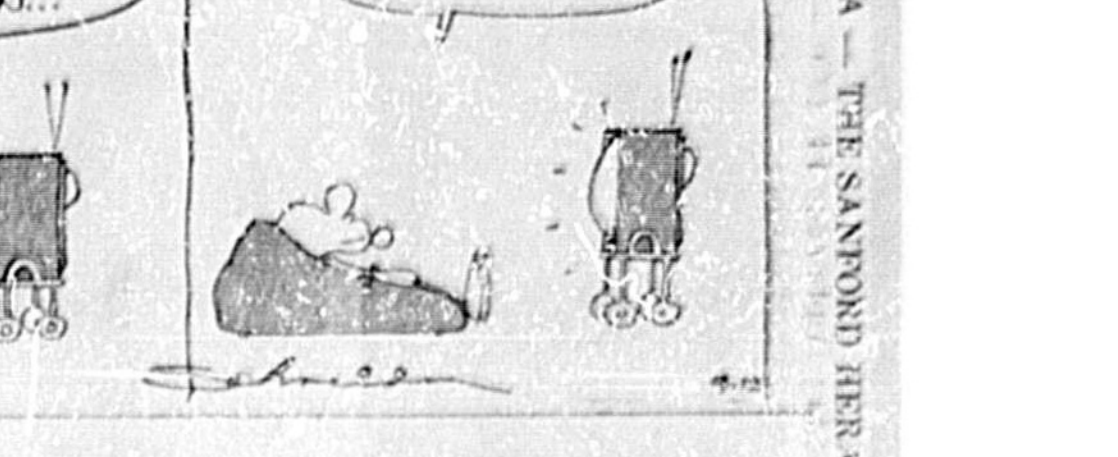

FTU Will Welcome 5,000 Students

FTU — Two years ago, Florida Technological University opened its doors to 1,500 students and launched a tradition in innovative education in Central Florida.

Later this month, an anticipated 5,000-plus students will take up studies again as FTU gears up for its third year of operation as the region's only four-year state university.

What the students will find is an expanded campus. The second phase of construction is nearly completed. With its FTU is spanning new Administration Building and soon will add the massive Science-Technology Building and adjoining Computer Science center.

Joining the incoming students will be a faculty that has increased in number from 180 on hand last year to 247 this fall. Allied Troops Pull Back

Cambodians Hit in Mortar Duel

PHNOM PENH (UPI) — Dazed, grim-faced Cambodian troops involved in Cambodia's biggest offensive of the war pulled back today in orderly fashion from the town of Tang Kouk after suffering heavy losses in a nine-hour mortar and artillery duel Sunday night and early today.

The eight battalion task force had met no major resistance during a 17-mile advance along Highway 4 to Tang Kouk, 52 miles north of Phnom Penh, and their mood had been festive one. The soldiers laughed and joked then, but today there was stunned silence.

LPI photographer Kiyochi Sawada said the highway was clogged with soldiers carrying their machinings and mortars as they pulled back to Svay Max, three miles south of Tang Kouk. Military officials insisted the withdrawal was not a retreat but a strategic move to permit fresh troops to replace the hard hit Cambodians.

The Cambodian high command placed official government casualties at the attack at seven dead and 87 wounded, but officers on the spot said dead and wounded were more than 100. The command said the Communists left 20 dead on the ground. U.S. observation planes reported 200 more Communist bodies sighted from the air.

The Communist attack "lasted all night," a spokesman told LPI reporter Kite Webb. The romantic mood of the offensive prior to today's withdrawal was typified by a letter sent from an officer to his girlfriend in Phnom Penh and hand carried by Misa Webb. The return address on the letter said: "Mission of the Long March."

The march had covered just 17 miles.

The government forces, driving toward Kompong Thom 33 miles further north, fought at Tang Kouk all day Sunday, but by dusk they were unable to take the village center. It was

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Israel Arrests 450 Arabs As Warning To Guerrillas

TEL AVIV (AP) — Israel has rounded up 450 Arabs, accused them of having links with Palestinian commandos who attacked four planes last week and sent word to guerrillas in Jordan that it is a warning to those not released "it will be very bad."

The Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine, the Palestinian militant group that attacked the airlines, immediately responded Sunday by promising to retaliate with complete ruthlessness.

A military spokesman in Tel Aviv said the roundup netted 350 Arab residents of the occupied Jordanian west bank and 100 from Rafta's Gaza Strip. At least 80 of those arrested were women, the spokesman said, and informants added that two were close relatives of a Dr. Itzhak Rabin, a former Front leader.

The guerrillas are holding 55 hostages to back up their demands for the release of seven commandos held in three West Bank centers — three in Switzerland, three in West Germany and one in Britain.

The hostages reportedly included five Israeli women and a number of American Jews.

The Israeli military spokesman said all those arrested were accused of "hostile incitement" and being members of the Popular Front. All were detained for interrogation, the spokesman said.

Pointing toward the Popular Front guerrillas was credited to a message Sunday, as the country's biggest newspaper called for the death penalty for all members of the radical guerrilla group.

Tel Aviv's daily newspaper Maariv said the penalty provision reserved only for Nazi war criminals should be meted out to Popular Front members as well.

Violence Not New For Middle East

In the tormented Middle East the past often mocks the present. A history riddled with terror has convinced not a few that violence works where patience fails, that ruthlessness brings results.

Hijackings and terrorization of captive passengers are perpetrated by persons professing to have lost faith in the ability or willingness of the world community to answer to their complaints. But it has been so for decades. Violence has signaled either violence; terror has foreshadowed counterterror. Often it worked, and often one side found itself mirroring the other.

Today the Arabs have organized organizations which span the political spectrum. Some espouse violence, others extremists whose acts sometimes were denounced by their own brethren at Jamning to the cause.

The 20th century has brought little respite from violence in the Middle East, and its today's violence, with superpowers armed to the teeth for overkill, each explosion tends to be more nerve-racking than its predecessor.

Zionism echoed the dreams of Jews dispersed 1,900 years ago by the Romans and persecuted since in many countries, to return to the homeland of Saul, David and Solomon. Theodor Herzl, Zionism's prophet, said, "The Jewish question can be solved only by making it a political world question."

Solons Ask Retaliation For Airliner Hijackings

WASHINGTON (AP) — The arrest and destruction of four jetliners by Palestinian guerrillas has triggered congressional demands for retaliation. Including proposals for an air quarantine of any nation harboring hijackers.

The proposals have emerged angrily along the entire political front of Congress—Republican, Democratic liberal and conservative.

A bill advanced by New York Republican Sen. Charles E. Goodell and Jacob K. Javits would require the President to take steps for an international cutoff of air traffic to nations contributing to hijackings.

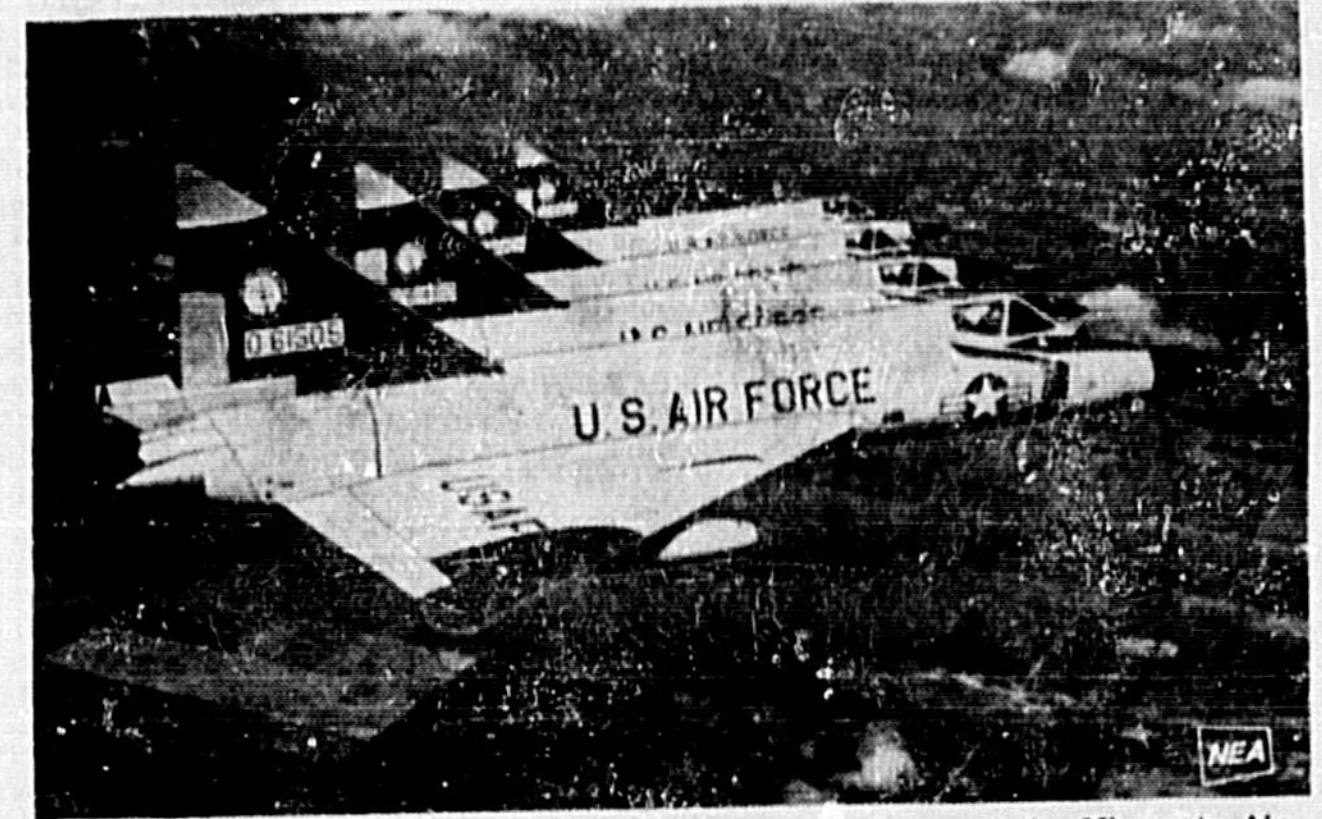
Such a quarantine would be imposed if the country had not participated in an air piracy, provided a haven for its perpetrators, or refused to secure the safe return of planes, passengers and crews.

The President would be empowered to revoke all U.S. air traffic to the nation in question and to any other country not joining the boycott.

In the House, meanwhile, the Foreign Affairs Committee is lining up hearings on several other proposals introduced in the wake of last week's hijacking and dynamiting by Arab guerrillas of four airplanes carrying several hundred U.S. citizens.

One bill, backed by Rep. Sidney H. Yates, D-Ill., and nearly 100 cosponsors calls for President Nixon to seek international agreements to prohibit and punish armed attack on aircraft.

Rep. Joseph G. Minish, D-N.J., said he is drafting a bill to force airports receiving federal funds—in other words, all of them—to refuse any planes "from nations which have harbored hijackers."

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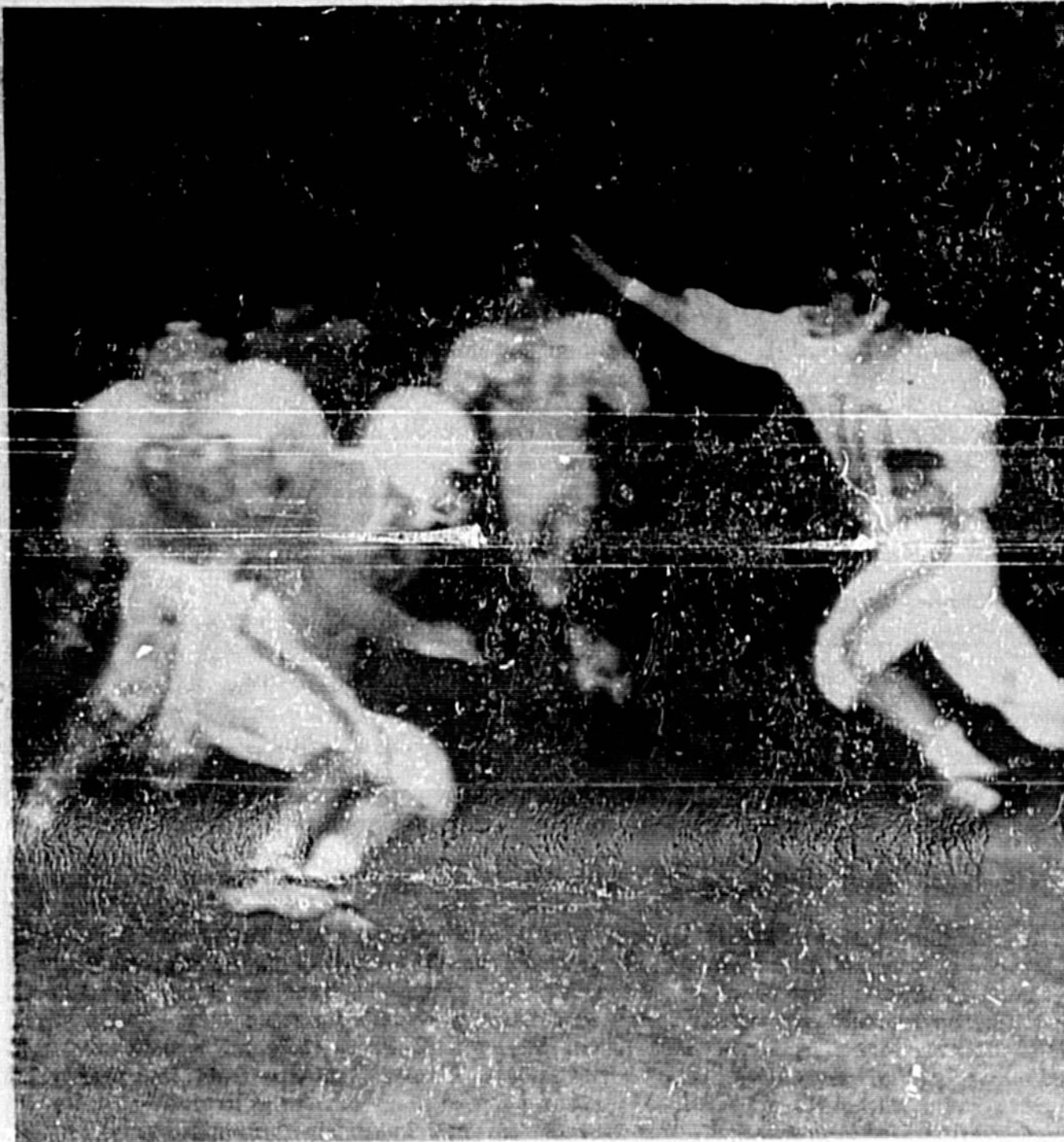
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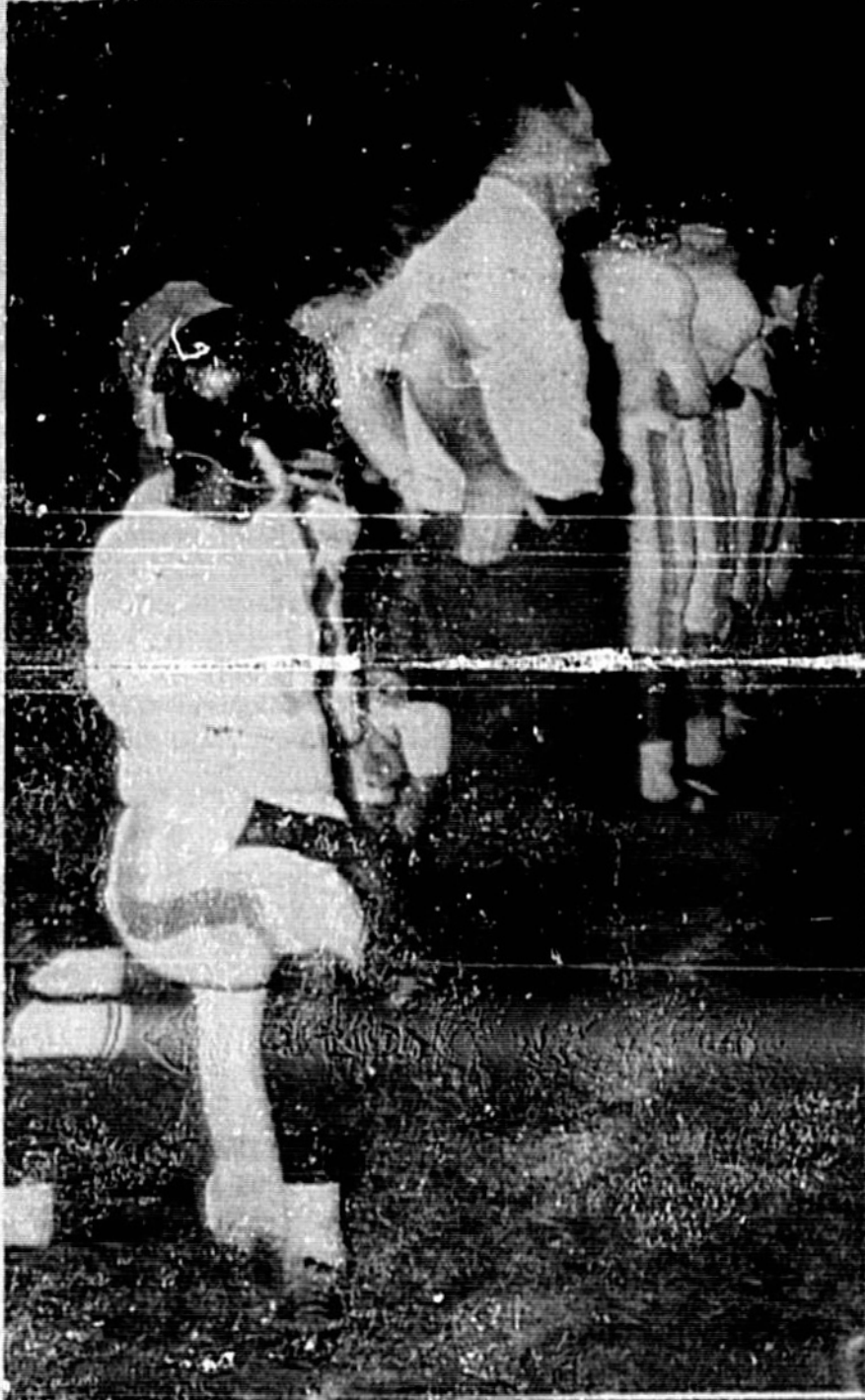

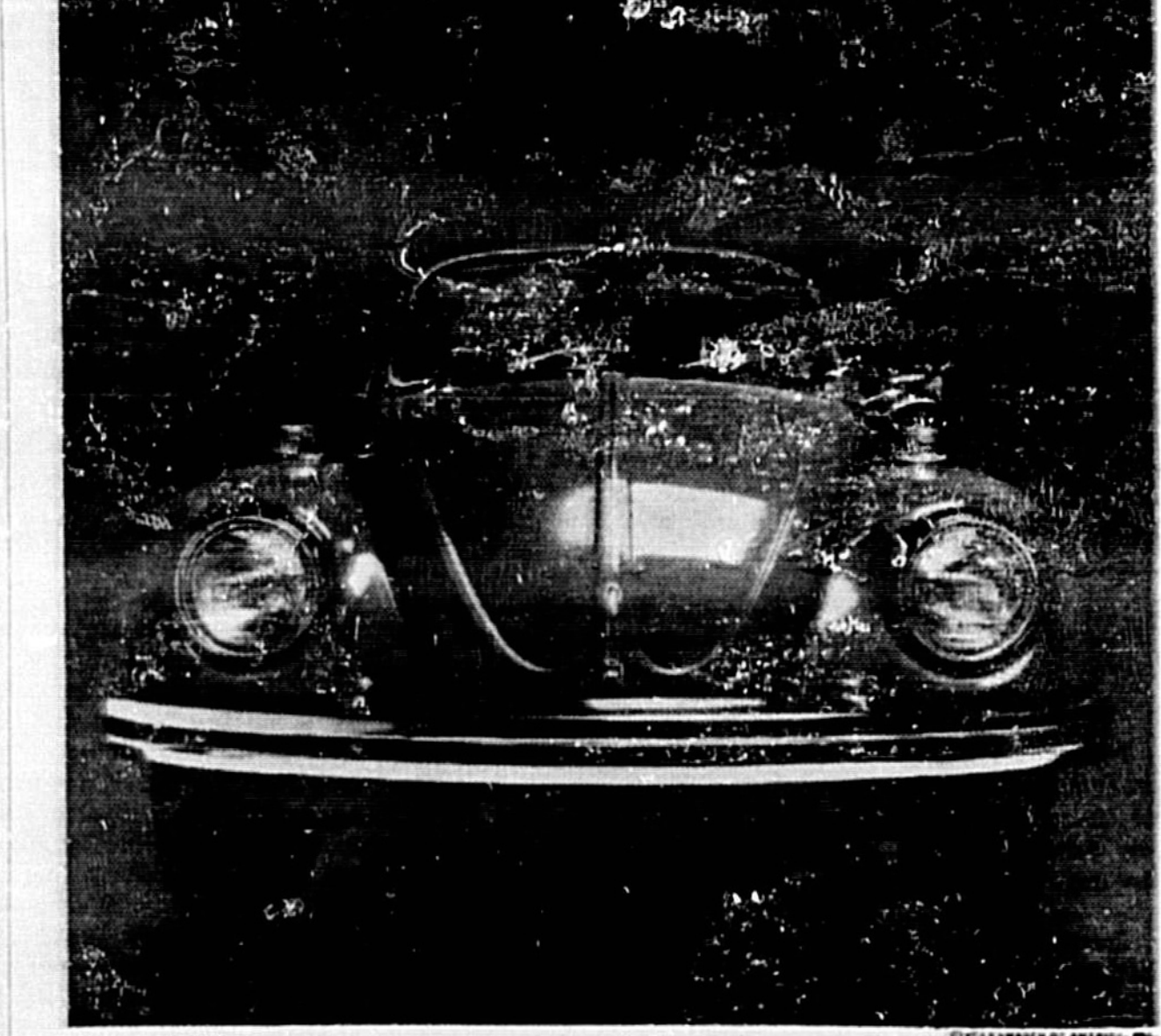

and West Virginia, another No. 20, blasted William and Mary 27-7. 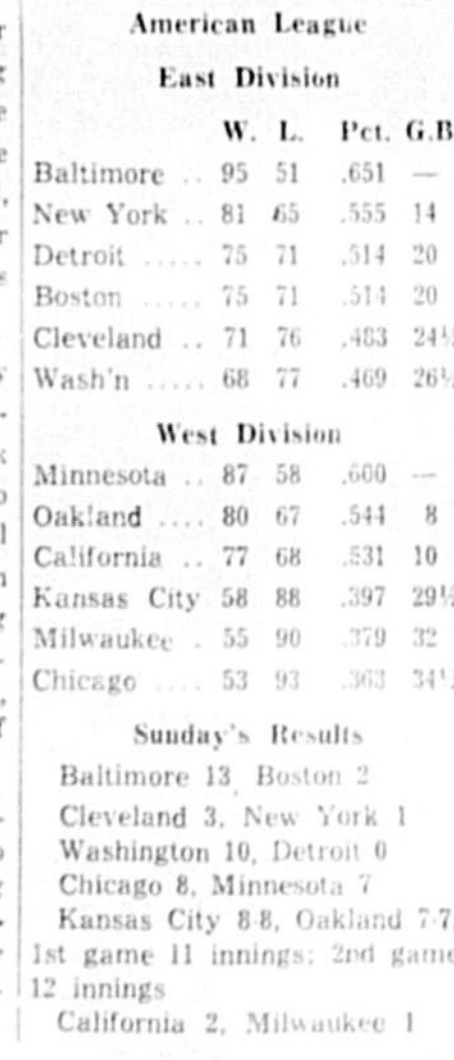

Britisher Ends Chevy Road Race Domination

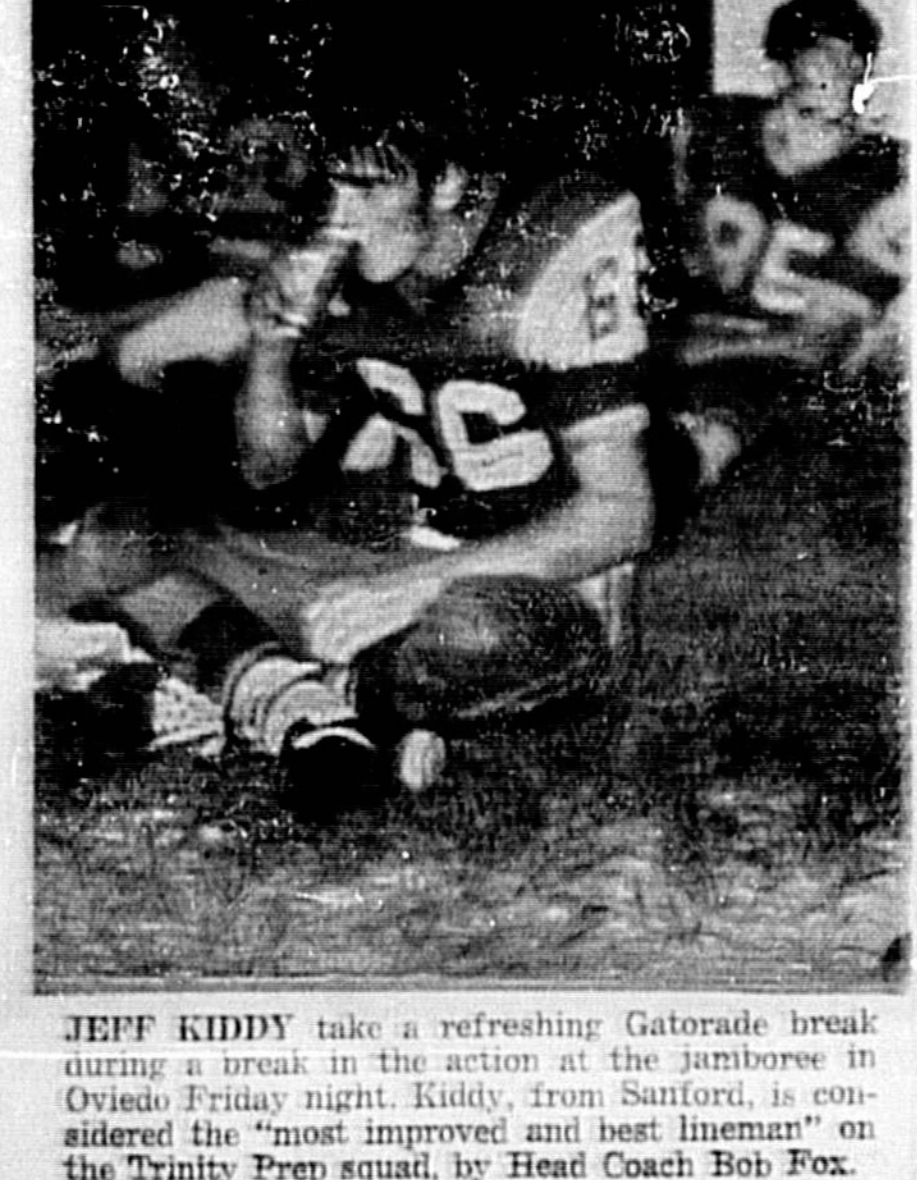

The golden era of Team McLaren's domination of road racing in North America came to an end in the red clay hills of Georgia Sunday. The driver who did it was 36-year-old Tony Dean, a Britisher whose 18-cubic inch Porsche Spyder 908 shouldn't even have been racing against the likes of the 600-horsepower McLaren Chevrolts. Dean, a budding veteran of many European courses, mostly in small machinery, hurried to be the guy who was sitting in the right position at the right time as the more powerful contenders dropped out one by one in a wet-rundown Canadian American Challenge Cup race at the new Road Atlanta Circuit, 40 miles northwest of Atlanta.

The Britisher romped home to collect \$15,400 from the \$61,500 purse—the largest payday of his career—and end Team McLaren's string of Can-Am victories since 1954. McLaren team leader, Jim Clark, was the last to drop out, finishing 19th in a 30-car race. McLaren's last victory was in 1968, and they had won the series title three times in a row. All signs of getting his seventh victory of the season and all ready with more than \$360,000 in the bank, he left A.J. Foyt's challenge to romp home ahead of the pack in a 100-mile championship race at Indianapolis Fairgrounds Saturday. The victory gave Indianapolis 600 winner Unser a \$100,000 lead in his quest for his first USAC driving title. There is only a mathematical chance that anyone will stop him.
