## **U.S. Finds Documents Of Peary At Pole**

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28-6P) -The State Department said to-day a United States expedition to the Arctic last summer found documents left in 1905 by Rear Admiral Robert E. Feary, discoverer of the North Pole.

An announcement, made jointly with the Canadian government, said the three Navy and Coast Guard vessels also had discovered records left by the British ex-plorer Sir George Nares in 1875 and 1876.

The brief statement gave no details. It said "as is usual on northern expeditions. Pearys notes found in the Cairn were replaced by appropriate docu-ments." The navy now has the originals.

The spot where the documents were located is in the extreme northern part of Canada on Ellesmere island about 450 miles from the North Pole. Peary visited the area in 1905

and 1906. He reached the North Pole on another trip in 1909.


