

### Indian League Organized By Eastern Tribes

#### 16 Councils Attending Growing Corn Meet Bury Hatchet

DARREN, Conn., June 21.—(P)—Ninety original American members of sixteen Indian tribes, celebrated their first annual Growing Corn Festival here and celebrated with tribal dances and ceremonies the organization of the Federated Eastern Indian League which aims to improve relations among Indian groups.

Attending were Mohicans, Menomonees, Powhats, Schaghticoke, Cayugas and Minniscott from New York; Tuscaroras from New York and Canada; Shawanos and a Cherokee from Oklahoma; Wampanoags, Pequotas and Pocumtocs from Massachusetts; Chippewas from Minnesota; a Catawba out of South Carolina; a Hopi from Arizona; and a Mayan from New York.

The Hopi sold trinkets and the Mayan told visitors he was a direct descendant of the last Aztec emperor of the Mayan Empire in Mexico.

The Indian League was established last night by chiefs around the council within the sacred circle, which was bounded by four small fires of hickory and sweet grass representing the four winds. As the pipe of peace was passed, the Calumet dance was presented and a booklet was buried with traditional significance.

Chief Red Cloud, of the Cheyenne tribe, was elected Great Northern. Others elected were: Great Medicine Man, Chief Fire; a Chippewa; Great Fire; Chief Bushkin, a Mohican; and Great Tally, a Narragansett.

George Barrett, first selectman of Stamford, was admitted to the league as an adopted member in recognition of his role in the Bill of Rights of 1787. After being handed a red feather tipped with white, signifying his position, he told the council that he had in mind to...

### 2 Billions In French Assets Frozen By U.

WASHINGTON, June 21.—President Roosevelt has signed an order freezing about \$2,000,000,000 of French assets consisting of short-term French gold and securities held by the French government and its nationals in the United States for safekeeping. The order stops the confederation of these assets by the German invading army.

Later Henry Morgenthau, Jr., Secretary of the Treasury, asserted he thought that if the French government surrendered to the Germans and Italians, the freezing order would stand. Meanwhile, considerable speculation arose here whether the United States would permit the turning over of these assets to the new French government for reparations if Germany and Italy demanded such payments.

In view of the fact that France is a heavy World War debtor to the United States, it is expected that German and Italian reparation demands upon France will raise some very interesting questions here.

### Spiritualist Fails; Woman Wants Refund

SÃO PAULO, Brazil, June 21.—(P)—When there was no sign of her business worries disappearing after she had paid two-thirds of the \$75 fee asked by a spiritualist, Senora Erika Nogueira Oliveira, 65, called in the police.

She said the spiritualist, Carmo Mirabelli, director of the "Brazilian Psychic Institute," had held spiritualist sessions in her home in Taubate and had buried an iron pipe in her garden to draw away the evil spirit of her home, but that her worries continued.

The police said there were other similar accusations against 25-year-old Mirabelli.

"War Guilt"—1914

Yesterday in the historic forest at Compiègne Adolf Hitler and members of his high command met with naval and military emissaries of the French government to conclude an armistice to the present hostilities in France. They met in the same old railway car in which Marshal Foch accepted the surrender of General Von Hindenburg in 1918. Germans viewed this turn about as an act of retribution.

In the preamble to their armistice demands, they said, "In reliance on assurances given to the German Reich by the American President Wilson and confirmed by the Allied powers, German armed forces laid down their arms in November, 1918. Therewith was ended a war which the German people and its government had not wanted and in which the enemy, despite tremendous superiority, did not successfully in any way conquer the German army, navy or German air force."

Let there may be some who have forgotten the causes of the last war and may conclude from Nazi propaganda that the Kaiser's Imperial Germany was less inclined to military conquest than the Germany of Hitler today, and was defeated in the war because perhaps in the pursuit of peace while other nations built up their armies and navies, Germany placed her faith in the sanctity of treaties and sought to settle international disputes by peaceful means, it should be helpful just at this time to review the record.

It should be remembered that for years prior to 1914 Germany had entertained the same all consuming ambition to dominate the Balkans and the Near East, which has characterized Hitler's regime. The "Berlin to Bagdad" railway was a keystone of the Kaiser's foreign policy by means of which he hoped to gain control of everything lying between the natural German frontiers and the Persian Gulf. To this end he built up the largest army in Europe and was trying to rival Britain in naval strength.

He had concluded military alliances with Austria-Hungary and Italy which he hoped would help him to accomplish his purpose. Austria-Hungary then included not only Austria and Hungary, but most of Czechoslovakia, and parts of Rumania, Poland and Yugoslavia. In area alone it was practically as large as Germany, but still outside its borders was another part of Yugoslavia, then known as Serbia.

When the Austrian Archduke Ferdinand was assassinated in Sarajevo, the Emperor Franz Joseph demanded indemnities which no independent self-respecting nation could grant. But the Serbs promised restitution which would doubtless have satisfied the Austrians had it not been for the German Kaiser. It was he who kept after Franz Joseph until he declared war.

But the Serbs had a defensive alliance with Russia, so the Russians declared war on Austria-Hungary. Then Germany declared war on Russia. Up to this time, France had scarcely entered the picture at all, and the British apparently had little taking and even less interest in what was going on. But France and England were both allied with Russia and had been for years. So when Germany declared war on Russia, the Kaiser moved his troops toward France and violated Belgian neutrality.

It was four days later before England entered the war and it is doubtful if she would ever have moved at all if the Kaiser had not treated his Belgian obligations as a "scrap of paper." There is even some question as to whether France would have entered the war if the Kaiser's armies had not attacked first through Belgium. But there has never been any doubt as to where the actual war guilt in 1914 lay.

It is on the basis of such facts as these that the Nazis now say that war was forced upon them.

Tearing Hitler Apart

In a rather restrained speech in the United States Senate yesterday Senator Pepper expressed the moderate belief that "Hitler ought to be drawn and quartered and his blood spilled over the nations he has trampled down," and led to the sensational charge by Senator Holt that the Floridian wants to "tear Hitler apart and scatter his blood in every stream." "I am not that bloodthirsty YET," Senator Holt concluded.

Thus you have the basis for the present debate which is raging throughout the United States. Everyone is in agreement that Hitler ought to be drawn and quartered. Everyone is in agreement that is the final analysis the United States is going to have to do it. But some, like Senator Pepper would prefer to tear him apart while he is still in Europe and while we can have the help of the British in doing it. While others like Senator Holt, would rather wait until he comes over here.

There is something to be said against fighting a war on foreign soil. Nobody likes the idea of going some thirty thousand miles to get into a fight. Nobody likes to clean up the flowers of American manhood and scatter them in foreign battlefields. Only experience in the last war has taught us the sorrow and the suffering which can accrue to soldiers and their families alike when we wage wars in foreign lands.

But there is also something to be said against fighting a foreign enemy on your own soil. Those who remember the devastation in northern and western France during the last war can testify to that.
