Housing authority director resigns

SANFORD - Phyllis D. Richardson resigned Tuesday as executive director of the Sanford Housing Authority citing health problems.

Richardson was recently suspended with pay following an interim investigation into allegations of favoritism, misuse of resources and employees. Richardson had been the director about four years. The final investigative report is scheduled for presentation Thursday night. Acting director Tim Hudson is slated to make a recommendation to the board based on the investigation.

In her resignation letter to the board, Richardson states: "The exeruciating malignantly (sic) I have encountered as an employee of the Sanford Housing Authority has caused me severe health problems. Therefore, due to medical reasons. I hereby tender my letter of resignation this 19th day of September, 1995."

The board will meet at 7 p.m. in the Redding Gardens Community Center.

Planning board revisits alcohol sales regulations

SANFORD - Another hearing will be held this week on the city's revised alcoholic beverage regulations. The city's Planning and Zoning Commission will again review the documents. following last Monday's postponement by the city commission.

The new regulations had been prepared in ordinance form for commission consideration last week, but the scheduled public hearing was continued pending corrections in some of the wording of the document.

According to Sanford Director of Planning and Development Jay Marder, the only substantive change in terms of land use issues is the provision of Bottle Clubs.

Marder said this was added at the recommendation of the city attorney because the city is required to provide a location for all land uses. and the ordinance did not include provisions specifically for bottle clubs.

There have been four separate categories for alcoholic beverage sales establishments. They included sale of beer and wine in scaled containers for consumption off premises, sale of alcoholic beverages in scaled containers for consumption off premises, sale of beer and wine for consumption on premises, and sale of alcoholic beverages for consumption on premises. Now the fifth category of bottle clubs is to be

added to the list. Should the present form of the changes to the land development regulations not draw any objections from the P&Z this week, the matter is expected to be brought back for City Commission approval at the next commission meeting sched-Bee Alcohol, Page 5A

Chiropractor charged with fraud

WELLINGTON — A chiropractor and onetime Haitian presidential candidate has been charged with staging false

accidents and filing \$5 million in phony insurance claims.

Joseph Douze, 42, was arrested Monday after a grand jury charged him and six office managers who worked for him with 11 counts of federal mail fraud and conspiracy to defraud insurance companies.

Federal and state investigators believe Douze would send runners or "cappers" onto the street to find people in need of quick money, persuade them to stage minor accidents, then

The accidents took place in Paim Beach, Martin, Broward. Dade and a half dozen other counties, investigators said.

Douze, who ran for president in Haiti in the late 1980s and once was jailed there for trying to blow up a bridge, parlayed his political power into a calling card, investigators said. He also threw lavish parties to attract patients and had a weekly

Execution ordered for child killer

MILTON — A judge has followed a jury's unanimous recommendation by ordering a child killer's execution for a third time after his first two death sentences were reversed on

Warfield Raymond Wike again insisted he was innocent Monday before Circuit Judge Paul Rasmussen resentenced him to die in Florida's electric chair.

The 39-year-old machinist from this Florida Panhandle city was convicted in 1989 of murdering a 6-year-old girl and raping her 8-year-old sister the year before. The throats of both girls were slashed.

The Florida Supreme Court has Wike's first death sentence twice on technicalities.

The case now goes back to the Supreme Court for another automatic appeal, but Assistant State Attorney James Murray was confident the sentence will stand this time. The high court previously upheld the murder conviction.

13 charged with scamming vendors

BOCA RATON - Authorities have charged 13 people with scamming vending machine operators across the country out of \$31 million.

Marvin Wolf. 63. of Boca Raton, would instruct his telemarketing employees to lie to potential customers about the quality of the machines they were selling and how much the operators could expect to make by using the machines,

said U.S. Attorney Kendall Coffey.

Claims that an \$8,000 KT pissa machine, a Pissa King machine, a Pissa Quick or a Pissa Royale machine would take in from \$400 to \$600 a week "were pure speculation, in that the defendants well knew no such record of receipts and or profitability existed." Coffey said Tuesday.

Wolf operated telemarketing offices in Florida, Virginia, Pennsylvania, Arizona and New York.

Prosecutors alleged that the scripts his employees used contained false and misleading information to induce potential operators to buy the machines. In addition, employees would provide potential customers with paid references, who would corroborate the claims made in the sales pitch, prosecutors

Crime: Senate to toughen up on measures of punishment

TALLAHASSEE - The Legislature's next regular session is almost six months away, but the Florida Senate is again cranking up its crusade against crime.

Lawmakers will consider legislation that, among other things, reduces criminal appeals and frivolous lawsuits by convicts and toughens

drunken driving and elderly abuse laws. The issues won't be as high profile as laws passed earlier this year to make criminals serve 85 percent of their sentences and impose

mandatory terms on repeat violent offenders.

But they still would have a major impact on the

criminal justice system, proponents say.

"I want to do as much this year in criminal justice as we did last year." Senate Criminal Justice Chairman Locke Burt said Tuesday. "It will be more technical in nature. You won't be able to explain it in percentages."

Bills approved Tuesday by the criminal justice

-Restrict frivolous lawsuits filed by inmates by requiring them to prove they're indigent or make them pay a portion of their legal fees.

-Reform and streamline the criminal appeals process by eliminating certain types of appeals and legal avenues pursued by convicted felons.

-Clarify criminal procedures to allow consolidation of similar offenses committed during the course of one incident.

Other areas the Senate committee plans to consider include increasing penalties for drunken driving offenses and elderly abuse that results in death, said Burt, R-Ormond Beach.

Crime fighting was the Republican-led Senate's top issue in the 1995 session, and lawmakers passed some tough, and costly, laws.

They toughened the state's sentencing guidelines to send more home burglars and auto thieves to prison, imposed mandatory sentences on career violent criminals and increased the legal capacity of the prison system to add another

Clinton bashes GOP on Medicare

President says he has last word

BAL HARBOUR - President Clinton makes it no secret he needs Florida in his 1996 reelection effort and he struck just the theme to get the attention of the state's large retiree community - Medicare cuts.

The president stopped at a waterfront retiree condo complex Tuesday to argue that he — not the Republicans — should have the last word on Medicare.

"We have proposed a balanced budget that slows the growth of inflation (of Medicare costs) and protects the Medicare trust fund," he told about 800 retirees at Point East condominiums in North Miami Beach. "The Republican plan cuts twice as much (up to \$270 billion) to help pay for a balanced budget in seven years and a tax cut for people who haven't even asked for one."

Florida Republican Party chairman Tom Slade called on Clinton to end what Slade termed a "Medi-scare" cam-paign aimed at killing Republican reforms.

"Bill Clinton and congressional Democrats have absolutely no plan whatsoever to save Medicare." Slade said. "However, Republican leaders will not sit by and let our Medicare system go bankrupt as President Clinton remains on the sidelines spreading misinformation once again."

Clinton's plea to stop congressional plans to sharply cut Medicare and the Medicaid health plan for the poor were combined with a pitch in Jacksonville for his crime bill and 100,000 extra police officers provided to communities.

Vice President Al Gore was in Tampa earlier in the day wanting that the Republican Congress will harm the environ-

Neighbors of missing child fear for their own kids now

MIAMI - Parents' worst fear - that their youngster will vanish without a trace - has changed the daily routine of mothers and fathers in an area near Miami since 9-year-old Jimmy Ryce stepped off his school bus and was never seen again.

Somewhere between the bus stop and his home five blocks away on Sept. 11, something sinister happened. The disappearance rekindled memories of Adam Walsh, a 6-year-old boy who vanished from a shopping mail in Hollywood in 1981. Walsh's head was found in a canal, but the rest of his body and his killer were never found.

Twenty-four FBI agents and a team of Metro-Dade police detectives have been trying to solve

Meanwhile, people in Jimmy's neighborhood about 10 miles south of Miami aren't taking any chances that their children might meet Jimmy's or Adam's fate as the kids wait to be picked up, or as they walk home from school.

from an afternoon nap and takes him in her daily two-block walk to pick up her daughter from

Tammy Willard holds her children's hands tighter than ever as they walk to her van parked close to the school's exit.

"I'm always concerned, always," Willard

said."But this is very frightening."

is found," said Anita Cruz. 37, who sends two children to the same school Jimmy attended.

"One tends not to think about these things, but when it's this close to home, it hits you hard."

The FBI and Metro-Dade police set up a roadblock Monday where Jimmy's bus stopped to let him off, hoping to find someone who may have seen him.

"We're checking out some tips that resulted from the road black and from the publicity." FBI spokesman agent Paul Miller said Tuesday. He declined to elaborate.

Authorities have been interviewing people in the neighborhood, checking out pedophiles with records and other people suspected of child-molesting in the South Florida area. Miller said.

Jimmy's picture and a plea for help in finding him appeared in lights in the giant screen at Joe Robbie Stadium on Monday night during the NFL

game between Pittsburgh and Miami.

A large banner draped over a wall in front of one section also appealed for help in finding him. A \$100,000 reward has been posted for information leading to Jimmy's whereabouts.

"We were flooded with calls after Jimmy was on the 'America's Most Wanted' program' over the weekend, Metro-Dade police detective Joanie Clark, assigned to Crime Stoppers, said Tuesday. She said the Crime Stoppers office got about

100 calls Monday night after the Ryce story appeared on the evening news in Miami.

Claudine Ryce, Jimmy's mother, said parents are right to be fearful. She said that, except for those few blocks that Jimmy walked alone every day, he was never out of her sight. "Those few blocks proved to be crucial," Ryce

said. "It could happen to any little boy."



Dead man wants inheritance

He was homeless, not dead; and he's back for the money

LONGWOOD - Edwin Prescott is alive, and he wants his share of a \$47,000 inheritance.

Prescott, 51, disappeared nine years ago, shortly after getting \$10,800 in cash from a down payment for the sale of a house in Longwood he and his two brothers inherited.

After failing to find any trace of Prescott, his brothers. Lee and Wayne, declared him legally dead. They wanted to complete the sale of the house and turn the mortgage over to the new

The buyer got his title and the brothers divided the \$47,000 in monthly payments that had been placed in trust by the

But Edwin Prescott showed up earlier this year and found to his surprise that he was officially dead. He had been living as a homeless person in South Flor-

"You're broke and you're

dead," a cousin told him. Edwin contacted his former attorney, Ken Beane, who explained what had happened. Under Florida law, relatives can petition for an official declaration

of death five years after someone disappears without a trace.

Prescott has lived in the woods around Jupiter, collecting aluminum cans for cash after quickly going through the \$10,80Ó.

Take a bite out of crime

Drug sellers and buyers and persons soliciting for prostitution aren't learning. Arrests are being made time and time again, yet certain areas continue to be focal points for these activities.

Police and sheriff's deputies have focused attention many times on specific areas in Sanford and Altamonte Springs in recent weeks, yet there seems to be no let up. Areas include Third Street and Olive Avenue, and First Street and Maple Avenue in Sanford. Also, CR-427 near Plumosa and Magnolia Street in Altamonte Springs.

Note: Don't think that because we are revealing these locations that buyers will stop frequenting them. These are known facts but they don't seem to be making any difference to this type of person.

People are still selling drugs and buyers are flocking in to make their purchases. Men are still seeking prostitutes. It just keeps going on

As a result, law enforcement crackdowns also will go on and on. Why? Simply because neither city, and no where else for that matter, needs this type of activity.

Without a doubt, after a short time, new street corners will become occupied by the sellers. Again, we expect law enforcement efforts will move to those locations and the arrests will continue.

One officer told the Sanford Herald that he knows of several people who have been arrested for purchasing drugs on several occasions during just a short period of time. One was arrested three times within a week. But within a day or two, this type of person is free and back in action once again.

Sanford has it's QUAD Squad and Special Investigative Unit (SIU). The Seminole County Sheriff's Office, in cooperation with the various city police departments has the City/County Investigative Bureau (CCIB). They are doing an excellent job. Each of these officers deserves a great deal of appreciation.

But we can well imagine how demoralizing it is to an officer, striving to eliminate these activities, to see our judicial system allowing violators to practically go in one door of the courthouse, and out the other, free to pursue whatever he or she desires.

Judges say they have limitations. Yes, they have. They can only issue a punishment which has been set down by law. In this case, the people must demand that the laws be changed, that our judicial system gain more teeth in its bite.

We are clearly spending too much effort in helping preserve the rights of criminals, and not enough in protecting the general popula-

There must be a change in our system. The continuous need of our law officers to conduct undercover operations is costing taxpayers a great deal of money.

In many instances, police budgets are among the highest in the city's total expenditures for a year. This is one of the main reasons for this expense.

Until our laws are changed, Sanford Herald readers can expect to see a continuation of reports about drug and prostitution related arrests. Until things get better (with our laws), things will only get worse.

GOP isn't cutting student loans

During his recent visit to Southern Illinois over the next seven years, from \$24 billion a year University, President Clinton invited student leaders to a campus roundtable to talk about how the nasty old Republicans in Washington are trying to cut their government aid.

The White House screened the student leaders to make sure that they all agreed with the prez. And when one young whippersnapper .. 24-year-old William Karrow, president of Southern Illinois' graduate student council -- had the audacity to suggest that maybe the prez was presenting a distorted picture, the White House apparatchiks bounced him from the roundtable.

So on the evening news, Clinton got the kind of coverage he was looking for. There he was, amid a sea of carefully selected, adoring students, promising that he would fight to protect their loans and grants from GOP budgetcutters.

But lest the students at Southern Illinois and other college campuses be duped by the financial aid-officer-in-chief, there's something they ought to know: The Republicans really aren't proposing to cut student aid. When all is said and done, college loans and grants will be as readily available and just about as affordable as they've ever been.

Indeed, under the Republican plan, funding for student loans will actually increase 50 percent

to \$36 billion. Meanwhile, those parsimonious

Republicans are proposing to increase the maximum Pell Grant award (which needn't be repaid) to more than \$2,400 a student, the highest level in history.

Earlier this spring. the White House warned that funding for certain student aid programs might be subject to draconian cuts. But, in fact, funding for the college work study program is maintained at its current level of \$617 million. Supplemental Education Opportunity Grants at \$583 million and the TRIO

program (which benefits minority and disadvantaged students) at \$463 million.

In fact, the only area of dispute on student aid has to do with college loans. The president wants to preserve a program enacted by the Democrat-controlled Congress two years ago, in which the government, rather than the private sector, makes direct loans to students. The Republicans would restore the pre-1993 system in which commercial banks offered college loans guaranteed by the government.

"It is true that (bankers) are worse off." said Clinton. "They lost a lot of business. But the students are better off.

But are they really? This past July, the nonpartisan Congressional Budget Office released a study indicating that the government will lose \$1.5 billion on the direct student loan program over the next seven years.

If Clinton had offered a credible plan to balance the federal budget before his daughter Chelsea was ready to enroll in college, then Republicans wouldn't be left with the task of trying to find savings in student aid and other federal spending programs.

But the president passed the proverbial buck. So his criticisms of Republican budget balancers is nothing short of hypocritical.

Finally the Senate 'gets it'

astonishing was how astonished we all were.

Common wisdom had said that Bob Packwood might be reprimanded or even censured by the Senate ethics committee, but

Common sense honed from years of Senate-watching said that if he only held out his wrist, his colleagues would slap it and happily get back to business.

But after two and half years of bizarre twists and turns, after allenating his friends one by one, after refusing public hearings and then demanding them, the senator ran out of allies.

The prospect of a split-screen humiliation for the Senate loomed ahead. Imagine the finance chairman leading the debate over welfare reform and Medicare on one channel. Imagine women talking about his hands, his tongue. his abuse on another.

Still there was a shock when the ethics committee unanimously imposed its Capitol punishment. The kiss of death was the recommendation to expel Packwood for what Barbara Mikulski called "a systematic abuse of women, power and this Senate."

With 16,000 pages of testimony weighing in against him at 40 pounds, he ran out of clout. In a somber moment Thursday, he resigned as a "duty," and "honorable thing to do for this country, for the Senate." And so, sadly, ended the career of a man who prided himself on making advances for women in public and degraded himself by making "unwelcome sexual advances" on women in private.

For some, Packwood's most serious breach of ethics is altering the evidence of his diaries or trying to get a job for his ex-wife. But the more remarkable fact is that for the first time, a Senate committee defined sexual misconduct toward women as an abuse of power.

"On the women," Packwood had insisted during the hours when he pursued his punch-drunk defense like a boxer who doesn't know that the fight is over, "I am accused of kissing women, on occasion perhaps overeagerly kissing women, and that is the charge. Not drugging. Not robbing. Kissing.

But the ethics chair, Republican Mitch McDonnell, disagreed: "These were not merely stolen kisses, as Senator Packwood has claimed. There was a habitual pattern of aggressive, blatantly sexual advances, mostly directed at members of his own staff or others whose livelthoods were connected in some way to his power and authority as a senator."

Packwood desperately compared the committee to "the Inquisition." In his angry voice there was more than a faint echo of Clarence Thomas' charge of "high-tech lynching." But

this time, the attitudes and the outcome were

different. Four years ago, the public watched as Anita Hill's testimony was dismissed and her integrity was attacked by an all-male Senate judiciary committee. Back then, the charges of sexual harassment were debunked as nothing but "she said" fantasies.

Clarence Thomas was elevated to the Supreme Court. But the country was changed in ways that eventually led to Packwood's

downfall. Florence Graves a reporter watching the Thomas-Hill hearings, was sure that "the next logical story" would be about sexual harassment in the Senate itself. When no one else pursued that line, she did. Graves began the long, painstaking process of getting 20 women (out of 40) to go on record and break the Packwood story in The Wash-

ington Post.
"I think it would have been difficult to get the Pakewood story into the paper before the Thom

we all were. as-Hill hearings," she says now. "It just wasn't

the story." Barbara Boxer was carried into the Senate on the Year-of-the-Woman tide fueled by anger at those hearings. She was the one who doggedly held the Senate's feet to Packwood fire.

"In the Thomas-Hill hearings, the Senate was just not in step with the public. It was way behind," Boxer said Thursday, "One thing about being in a democracy - it catches up."

The vice chair of the ethics committee, Richard Bryan, is right: Packwood's conduct "would have been unacceptable at the time Christopher Columbus discovered America." But he would never have been taken from the

Politics, religion and voting blocs

When you think of a Christian, what do you picture? Do you see a humble, selfless person. dedicated to serving the less fortunate?

Or do you see a right-wing zealot, someone dedicated to denying civil rights to homosexuals, welfare payments to needy mothers and reproductive services to women?

Chances are, these days you see the latter. The Christian Coalition has made big news with its tremendously successful effort to mobilize evangelicals and form a voting bloc so powerful that political analysts believe no Republican can gain the presidential nomination without its support. The coalition has also been a key proponent of the gress' legislative agenda, spending more than \$1 million to help to pass the GOP "Contract With



The Christian Coalition does not speak for all, or even Americans.

America. At their recent convention, Executive Director Ralph Reed commended the troops for a job well done.

"We have gained what we have always sought - a place at the table, a sense of legitimacy," he sald.

Reed and his boss, TV minister Pat Robertson, may have found a place at the table with Republican cost-cutters, but there is at least one group of citizens who have little interest in breaking bread with the Christian Coalition: the religious mainstream.

"They are promoting an agenda that promotes the welfare of the rich." says Sister Kathy Thornton of NETWORK, a national Catholic social justice lobby, "As I understand it, the message of Jesus is to be loving and compassionate and just and to create a social order where the needs of all are provided for."

"There isn't a single one of their proposals that we agree with," says Nancy Chupp. executive director of Church Women United, a national organization of Protestant, Roman Catholic and Orthodox women. Chupp says CWU strongly disagrees with the Christian Coalition's support of the Republican stand on fiscal issues such as welfare and the minimum wage. "My organization takes a different view of the economy. Instead of seeing capitalism as an uncomplicated good. we see a need to temper raw market power.

Not all mainline religious groups are alike. NETWORK is going to have obvious differences with, say, the Religious Coalition for Reproductive Choice, but on one issue their voice seems unified: The Christian Coalition does not speak for all, or even most, religious Americans.

That's a message that groups like The Interfaith Alliance want politicians to hear. The 1-year-old organization was formed in direct response to the growing power of the radical religious right. It is run by Christian and Jewish leaders from groups such as the Presbyterian Church (USA), the Episcopal Church and the Synagogue Council of America.

"Mainstream religious leaders came together to say enough is enough," says Jill Hanauer, Interfaith's executive director. "Pat Robertson does not speak for all people of

Although Hanauer's 10,000-member organization is still dwarfed by the Christian Coalition's 1.7 million active supporters, membership at interfaith has been growing by 2,000 a month and the alliance was able to raise more than \$1 million in its first year.

Interestingly. Interfaith has employed many of the same grassroots tactics that proved so effective for Robertson's group.

Personal watercraft are small inboard powered boats that use waterjets for propulsion. They are designed for use by one or two people.

Orange County Sheriff detective Paul Anderson is the class instructor. When the class was launched, Anderson noted. the upcoming legislature will consider requiring boat operators to be licensed. The class materials and structure follow the guidelines set forth by the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators working to develop minimum nationally recognized boating standards.

The course includes information about various types of boats, required equipment, trailering and transporting, judging weather conditions and hazards as well as dealing with accidents and emergencies.

The personal water craft class is incorporated in the SCC Fire Science program. The Bombardier Corporation and Magic Tilt Trailers donated equipment for the class.

Carl Gill who helped organize the class at SCC noted City of Lake Mary officials have issued a "no wake" rule preventing motorized water craft from using Little Lake Mary until the high water recedes.

The property is open and practically treeless. Such an atmosphere is not suitable to the kind of shelter the homeless prefer so they have moved on.

According to Whitmire, most of those who lived in the area near Fulton Avenue have taken up residence in a wooded area near Central Florida Regional Hospital, near Mangoustine Avenue.

"They're in there for now," he said. "We'll have to see what they do."

Whitmire said the homeless are free to live where they want unless the property owner doesn't want them there or they begin to cause problems in the surrounding community.

"We don't know who the property owner is where they are Whitmire said. "But If they (the homeless) become a problem again, we'll find out and





Trade deficit sets record monthly high of \$11.50 billion

WASHINGTON - The U.S. trade deficit jumped to a record monthly high of \$11.50 billion in July, reflecting a big drop in American exports such as aircraft and a big rise in imports of German luxury cars.

The Commerce Department and today that the deficit in goods and services increased by 1.9 percent from a revised June level of \$11.28 billion. It marked the second straight month a new record has been set in the monthly series on goods and services, which the government began in 1992.

The worsening deficit caught economists by surprise. They had been expecting a small improvement in the belief that slower growth in the United States would cut into the demand for imports.

Imports of goods and services did decline during the month, dropping 1.7 percent to \$74.59 billion. But this drop was surpassed by a 2.3 percent decline in exports, which fell to \$63.09 billion. The deficit is the difference between imports and

"We continue to have a very large imbalance in trade," said Robert Dederick, economic consultant at Nothern Trust Co. in Chicago. "The fundamental reason is that we are a high spending country and a low

savings country. That will not change overnight."

The wider-than-expected trade deficit put downward pressure on the dollar, with the U.S. currency declining slightly against both the Japanese yen and the German mark immediately after the trade report was

So far this year, the U.S. deficit in just goods is running at an annual rate of \$188 billion, on track to be the worst showing in history.

ine country's worsening trace problems represent a severe political problem for the Clinton administration, which has made trade a key priority of its foreign policy.

The administration has insisted the strategy is working, pointing to record high levels for U.S. exports, but critics note that imports are also at record highs, an increase they claim represents a transfer of American jobs overseas.

For July, America's deficit with Japan as usual represented the largest imbalance with any country, even though the \$5.12 billion was 3.3 percent lower than the June deficit.

it marked the fourth straight month the deficit with Japan has declined. Today's report came as the Japanese government announced a new government stimulus package that U.S. officials praised as a constructive effort to boost Japanese demand for American exports.

The deficit with China shot up 11 percent to \$3.33 billion, as America imported more goods from China than ever before.

The deficit with Germany also set a record at \$1.9 billion as exports of Germany luxury cars and auto parts climbed by \$300 million.

Analysts had forecast this increase, believing that Germany would be the principal beneficiary of a summer trade fight with Japan in which the United States had threatened to knock Japanese luxury cars out of the American market. Before the dispute was settled at the 11th hour, Japan had curtailed shipments of many of the targeted autos rather than risk punitive tariffs of 100 percent.

With all of Western Europe, the United States recorded a deficit of \$3.1 billion, the highest since July 1987. Analysts said weak economic growth in this region had cut into U.S. exports.

America's trade deficit with Mexico totaled \$1.28 billion in July, down 14 percent from the June level. However, the United States is on track to record a record \$15 billion deficit with Mexico this year. This sharp turnaround from a surplus last year reflects the severe consequences of Mexico's currency crisis. which has reduced the ability of Mexicans to buy Amerlean products.

Senate votes against fresh rule, kills mink subsidies

WASHINGTON - A chicken can be fresh and "deeply chilled" as well, Senators decided in voting to scuttle new rules that would deny the "fresh" label to poultry so cold it's hard to the touch.

The 61-38 vote Tuesday followed arguments from Southern lawmakers that the Agriculture Department made the rule last month at the behest of California poultry interests trying to keep cheaper Southern birds out of the state.

California's two Senators said they were protecting consumers against fraudulent labeling.

The poultry debate took place during consideration of a \$63.8 billion spending bill for the Agriculture Department and other agencies.

As it neared final passage of the measure, the Senate voted to stop tax dollars from being used to support promotion of U.S. mink products in advertising and fashion shows abroad.

Agriculture Department's Food Safety and Inspection Service took up the longest debate. The rule, to take effect next August, says birds cannot be labeled fresh if chilled below 26 degrees, the point at which the flesh hardens. Birds now can be chilled to O and still labeled

"The point is, the Food Safety and Inspection Service has concluded that fresh is the opposite of frozen," said Sen. Thad Cochran, R-Miss., chairman of the Agriculture appropriations subcommittee. "Fresh is the opposite of stale, or unfit for consumption, or something that

doesn't taste good." He referred to the extremely cold poultry as "deeply chilled."

"It is not about California, it is about common sense," countered Sen. Barbara Boxer. D-Calif., who described a vote against the new rule as "a low point for common sense."

In other amendments, the Senate voted 78-18 to deny use neither the chicken amendment of funds under the Agriculture nor the one on Lyons.

A new regulation from the Department's Market Promotion Program to promote mink exports. The House had voted for a similar ban, supported by taxpayer advocates and animal welfare activists.

The Senate also voted 51-42. along party lines, to effectively fire Agriculture Undersecretary Jim Lyons after Western senators complained about his handling of the Forest Service. The Agriculture Department called the vote an "unfortunate" way to handle policy differences.

The spending bill provides \$63.8 billion for the Agriculture Department, Food and Drug Administration and Commodity Futures Trading Commission. The bill cuts \$5.2 billion from 1995 spending. It provides \$2.6 billion less than President Clinton requested but \$1.2 billion more than the House.

The Senate and House versions must be reconciled before the measure goes to Clinton. The House-passed bill contained

Assessination attempt fails

MOSCOW — A powerful bomb exploded near the Chechen capital today, narrowly missing Boris Yeltsin's personal envoy but wounding at least one other official, news agencies reported.

In a separate incident, an explosion sparked a huge fire at the Grozny oil refinery, the Interfax news agency said. It was unclear whether the explosion was an accident and no other details were immediately available.

Oleg Lobov, secretary of Yeltsin's Security Council and the president's representative to Chechnya, was driving from the airport to central Grozny when the bomb went off, the ITAR-Tass news agency said.

Lobov was not injured, but another official in his party suffered minor injuries and his bodyguard was alightly wounded by bomb fragments, the agency said.

The bomb exploded on a bridge just as the first car in Lobov's motorcade started to cross. It appeared to have been detonated by remote control.

Seriously squeezing the Serbs

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina — Washington's push for peace in the Balkans hangs in the balance as government and Croatian forces seriously squeeze the Serbs for the first time.

The Serbs, meanwhile, have until this evening to pull back their heaviest guns from around Sarajevo under an agreement reached with U.S. envoy Richard C. Holbrooke last week.

Holbrooke, who has shuttled around the Balkans for days to keep his peace effort alive, said late Tuesday that he had encouraging news from Sarajevo, but refused to give details. He left for Washington late Tuesday night.

NATO airstrikes that crippled Serb communication systems were called off last Thursday to allow the Serbs time to meet demands to withdraw the guns from around the city they have besieged for 3½ years.

An initial deadline expired Sunday night, but was extended when the Serbs were deemed to have withdrawn enough guns to make the world believe they would eventually remove all the large-caliber weapons.

Brothers jailed in Canadian steroid scam

TORONTO — Two Canadian brothers who defrauded bodybuilders — most of them Americans — by offering steroids by mail have been sent to prison.

Justice David McComba on Tuesday sentenced Paul Fuller. 35, to two years in prison and a \$30,000 fine and his brother, Peter Fuller, 38, to six months and a \$10,000 fine. The younger Fuller pleaded guilty to defrauding the public; his brother pleaded guilty to conspiring to commit fraud. Both also pleaded guilty to possession of the proceeds of crime.

The judge said the victims of the scheme were guilible bodybuilders — most of them from the United States — who "sought a shortcut" to bulking up by using illegal steroids.

Popcorn king Redenbacher dead at 88

CORONADO, Calif. — Orville Redembacher's wholesome, Middle-American Sunga and his cheerful, folksy commercials for gournet popcorn turned him into an advertising icon.

Instantly recognizable by his natty bow tie and suspenders, and neatly parted white hair. Redenbacher delighted in his fame, once joking that he developed his promotional shills as a member of the Purdue University marching band: "That's where I learned to toot my own horn."

Redenbacher drowned Tuesday after suffering a heart attack in a whiripool apa in his condominium. He was 88.

"Many people thought he was a media creation, but what people saw on television, that was him," said William E. Smith, executive director of The Popcorn Institute in Chicago and a riend of Redenbacher's for 43 years.

"He had the kind of total commitment and dedication to what he was doing that spells the difference between a wannabee and the real article," he

Redenbacher's image overshadowed his agricultural savvy, which he used to create and promote a fluffler, tastier popcorn with his friend Charles Bowman.

Born into an Indiana farming family. Redenbacher became a county agriculture agent after graduating from Purdue with a degree in agronomy.

In the early 1940s, while managing a 12,000-acre farm where he was growing popcorn. Redenbacher and Bowman used the fields to experiment with corn hybrids.

Several decades and 30,000 hybrids later, they introduced gourmet popcorn, which Redenbacher described as fluffler and of higher quality, but also more expensive to produce.

"We tried to sell the different processors on the idea that people would pay more for a better quality product, that this was a good marketing concept," he told The Associated Press in 1987. "They said we were crasy, and we tried to prove them wrong."

Redenbacher peddled the popcorn himself, driving across the country to convince store owners that Red Bow, named for its inventors, would sell.

Sell it did, and in 1976, Redenbacher and Bowman sold their operation to Hunt-Wesson Inc., the Fullerton, Calif.-based company now owned by ConAgra.

Orville Redenbacher's Gourmet Popping Corn remains the leading brand among microwave popcorn, said Hunt-Wesson publicist Jill Saletta.

Redenbacher's role as popcorn icon dates to 1971, when Marshall Field's, the Chicago department store that at the time was the only retailer carrying his popcorn, saked Redenbacher to autograph his grand

"It took off from that," Redenbacher said later.

product at a downtown store. The Chicago media were

He nurtured his popularity by giving out cards that said: "I met Orville Redenbacher" to everyone he met.

In 1987, Redenbacher's grandson, Gary Fish, changed his last name to Redenbacher and began appearing in commercials with his grandfather and on occasion has taken his place at promotions.

After selling his popcorn enterprise, Redenbacher and his wife, Nina, moved to California. Nina Redenbacher died in 1991. His first wife, Corinne, died in 1971.

Redenbacher is survived by two daughters, Gail Tuminello, of Valparaiso, Ind., and Billie Ann Atwood, of San Jose, Calif.; and 12 grandchildren.

would kindly forward my mother's name and address to Julia Ruth, as she and my mother had been childhood friends and had lost track of each other.





Does surgery cure hiatal hernia?

52-year-old with a hiatal hernia. I've heard of a type of surgery for correction and wonder about it. I'm on several medications and have the head of my bed elevated four inches. Will some-

thing further, such as surgery, help? DEAR READER: Histal hernia is caused by a weakness in the ring of muscle that encircles the esophagus where it joins the stornach. As this ring becomes weaker with time, acid reflux (the backwash of stomach contents into the esophagus) may occur, or part of the stomach itself may move through the ring up into the chest. In both cases, pain, indigestion, heartburn, and bloating - often in conjunction with a cough - are the conse-

In most instances of hiatal hernia, the discomfort can be relieved by a variety of techniques, including raising the head of the bed, eating small meals, using antacids, and taking prescription drugs (such as Prilosec).

However, despite these measures, some patients continue to experience symptoms. In such instances, surgery must be considered. During the operation, the ring of weakened muscle is tightened and the hernia repaired.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've had a sore throat for several years. My doctor can't find anything wrong but it definitely hurts. I have a constant backy cough and feel as if I'm choking all the time.

What's wrong?
DEAR READER: Assuming that your doctor has checked (and X-rayed) you for the common causes of cough - such as bronchitis, pneumonia and cancer -- he should now address the more unusual causes. The two that spring to mind are post-nasal drip and acid reflux.

In the first instance, the body responds to air pollution, tobacco smoke and pollen by the struses. This clear, watery but trritating fluid drains down the throat, inflaming tissues and leading to violent attacks of dry. hacky cough. Ordinarily, the discharge can be seen at the


back of the throat. Treatment includes avoidance of irritating substances in the air culprit.



South arrived in four spades after Davies, East, had opened 12-14 points. (South's overcall isn't recommended because, against a weak no-trump, you might have game available on high-card power. So, you should keep overcalls up to strength.)

West, Phil Souter, started with the diamond five, a MUD (middle-up-down) lead that is popular in Britain but has few advocates in North America (wisely, in my opinion).

Declarer won in the dummy. played a spade to his king. returned to dummy with another diamond and led dummy's spade 10, won by Davies with his ace.


South apparently had 10 tricks: five spades, four diamonds and the club ace. But his communications were tenuous. To East, a club switch CCopyright 1991 by NEA Inc. looked appealing. However, with this layout, South would win with the queen, draw East's last trump and play a diamond to dummy's two winners. (This witch would be equally hopeless if South had a singleton club.)

Davies found the winning defense, leading his last diamond. Declarer couldn't both draw East's third trump and return to dummy to cash the fourth diamond winner. South was left with two heart losers: one down.

Now to come clean. Declarer actually had the 10-8 of clube, so a club switch would have worked. However, over the long haul, if you only make the second-best plays, you won't be a consistent winner.
