Nursing Services At Home Studied

The Visiting Nurse Council provides the only home nursing program available to all residents of Seminole County, and no one is denied this service because of economic status," stated Curtis Nelson, president of the Seminole County Public Health Nursing Advisory Council.

According to Nelson, the financial status of the Council is critical at this time. Medicare covered services are steadily decreasing and the request for free or part pay services continues. The professional nursing staff includes one full-time and one half-time nurse which allows for no time off, even on weekends. The agency is certified to provide services for patients covered by Medicare and Medicaid benefits.

City Zoning Maps Will Be Available

In other actions taken at this meeting, the commission voted to recommend the annexation of property in the Silver Lake section with a stipulation that it remain single residence zoning.

Biggest Problem A Way Of Getting Around

Transportation would seem to be the single biggest problem among senior citizens and disadvantaged groups in Seminole County. At a forum held at the Sanford Civic Center recently, sponsored by the Sanford Chamber of Commerce, Seminole Junior College, and the Advisory Council on Aging, the one question which kept coming before the group was concerned with transportation.

William Gordon of Seminole County Commission recently assembled at the Civic Center that a new organization is being formed called RSVP — Retired Senior Volunteer Program —. The function of this group is to establish that there is, in fact, a need in the area of transportation, and apply for Federal funds. "Federal funds are available, if the need is established."

However, in the interim period, help is available, in Seminole County. Through the direction of the Catholic Diocese in Orlando, funds are available to pay for gas for a volunteer vehicle. All that is necessary is that anyone needing transportation, contact the Catholic church nearest him, and that priest or an assistant will contact the Diocesan office for clearance to arrange the payment. It is not necessary to belong to the Catholic church to receive this service. Anyone who needs help need only ask.

5.5% Salary Hike Approved By City

A 5.5 per cent increase in salaries for city employees in the new fiscal year should be included in the budget currently being made up by the city manager, the Sanford City Commission agreed Monday night. This, however, does not mean, it was emphasized, that a 5.5 per cent pay hike across the board can be expected by all city personnel.

In arriving at the percentage, City Manager W. E. Knowles told the commissioners that is the amount which may be increased without going before the federal pay board. He also pointed out another 1.5 per cent increase is permitted for additional fringe benefits.

Commissioner Julian Stenstrom made it clear he will not this year approve across the board hikes as done last year when raises ran from a low of \$8.64 monthly to as much as a \$1,000 annually. He indicated his preference for merit type pay raises.

Commissioner A. A. McClanahan, at the same time, noted the city is losing some employees as fast as they can be trained, due to salary. Meanwhile, Commissioner John Morris questioned whether a valuable employee might not be promoted in pay grade to effect double jumps in salary. Knowles said the actual job responsibilities under such a method must change and not just the job title.

Mayor Lee Moore reminded that increases, if not uniform, will "open a can of worms" and lead employees to believe the hikes are unfair.

As far as raising pay at the lower end of the job scale, laborers is concerned, Knowles said laborers in the city currently are earning more than truck drivers although drivers are responsible for valuable equipment. He said it sounds good to start major pay raises at the bottom of the scale, but the gap between laborers and supervisors has closed to the point where it is no longer worthwhile to be a supervisor.

The manager said the budget is all set and printed except for the salaries' estimates.

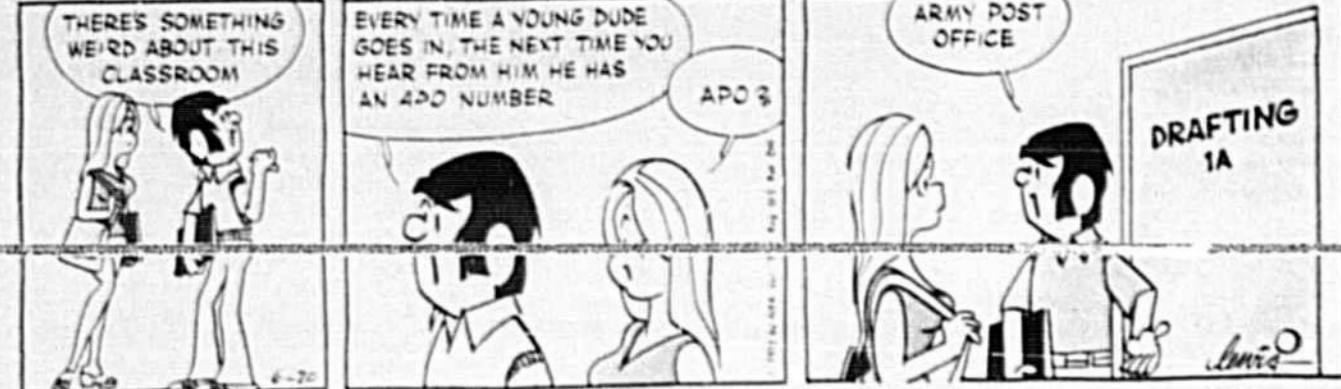

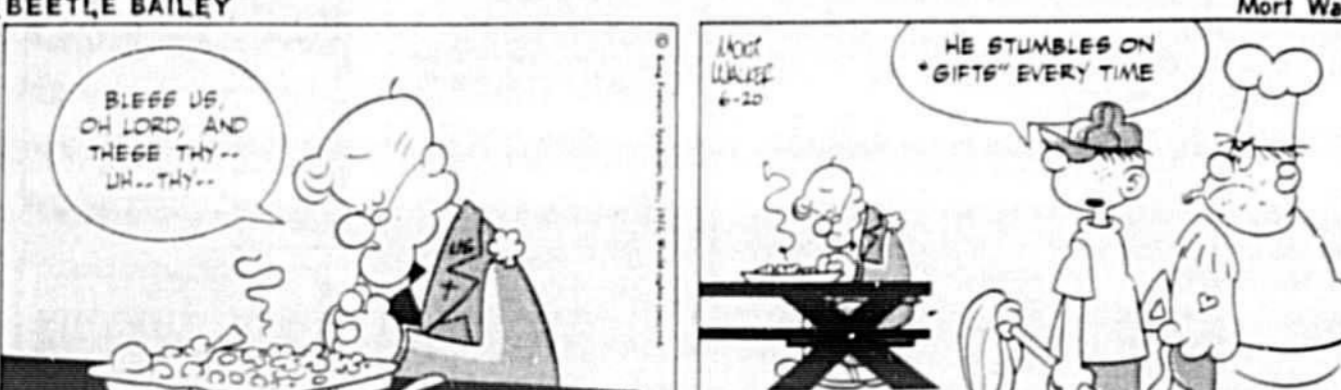

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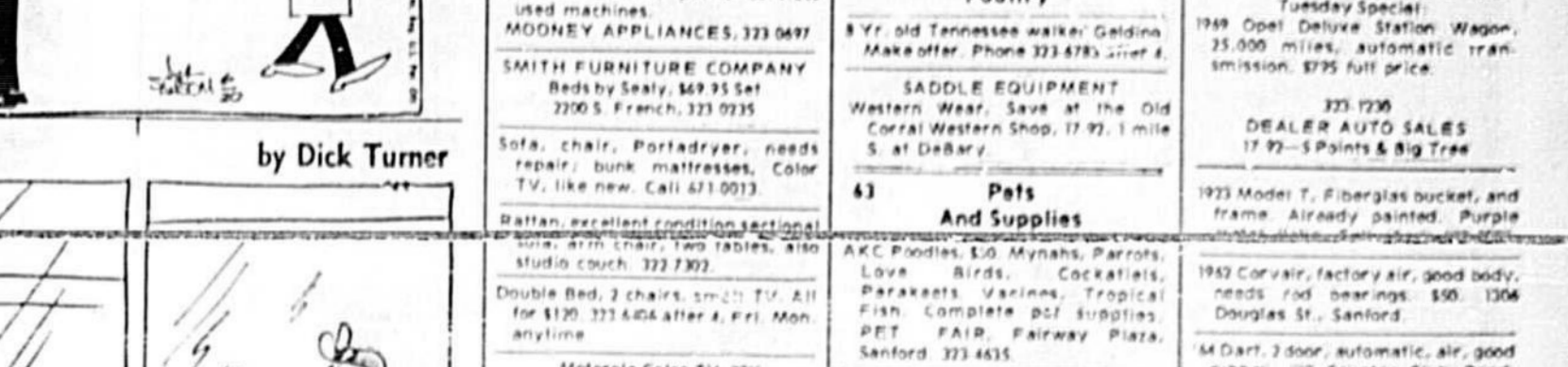

Although County Commissioners were to hear reports only on three agenda items at today's 2 p.m. meeting, they will, in all probability, burn the "midnight oil" with 12 scheduled public hearings at 7 p.m. Then, too, they faced 12 agenda items at the work session which commenced at 9:30 a.m.

At Eastbrook Elementary School, dry chemical fire extinguishers were discharged on carpets, on walls and in the bathrooms. Apparently, nothing was stolen. Deputies reported about \$500 in damages. The Sanford police reported a break-in at Dr. Kenneth Wing's office at 136 San Carlos Avenue. The nurse's office, doctor's office and treatment rooms were ransacked and a small amount of change is missing. Fry marks were found at the back door of an office shared by Drs. Thomas Largen and Franklin Clontz on East First Street and also at Dr. William White's office, 121 East second Street.

Father, Son Sentenced For Income Tax Charge

JACKSONVILLE — U.S. District Judge W. M. Taylor Jr., Dallas, Texas, sentenced two former Dallas men, a father and son, to serve 12 months in the penitentiary and fined each of them \$3,000 for federal tax violations of Internal Revenue laws. The men, Wilbur E. Causey, and his son, David Lee Causey, now operate five health spas in Jacksonville and Daytona Beach. The Causeys pleaded guilty before Judge Taylor on Sept. 30, on charges of filing false income tax returns. Their attorney requested at the time of their pleas that sentencing be delayed until after the trial of John Adam Dantie, Dallas. Dantie who was indicted on criminal tax charges at the same time the Causeys were indicted was scheduled for trial on charges of filing false income tax returns in Dallas. Dantie fled to Canada and failed to appear for his trial. Dantie was indicted on May 30 for failure to appear as a defendant. He now faces a prison sentence of nine years on the tax charges and five years on the failure to appear charge, together with fines totaling \$20,000, if convicted.

The Political Pot At A Rolling Boil

There is just no telling what the overheating political pot will brew up and spill into an atmosphere which has already provided some smells which are as unbelievable as they are noxious. The last weekend provided such an instance. This, of course, was the detection and arrest of five men involved in a break-in at the Democratic National Committee headquarters in Washington and the identification of one as on the payroll of the Committee For The Re-election of the President.

Former Attorney-General John N. Mitchell is the chairman of that committee and he, informed of the arrest, immediately issued a denial that the man in question was "operating either in our behalf or with our consent." Chairman Lawrence F. O'Brien, of the Democratic National Committee, bristling with indignation, has now asked that the FBI investigate the affair and do so with the newly appointed Attorney-General Richard G. Kleindienst providing the spur.

But this is not the case, at least right now. Yet there is a haunting symptom which surfaces from time to time. It gives a flavor to this '72 political pot which is not only rare but stimulating. Some months ago it was hailed as the "new populism." At present it has fallen to the generalization of the "new politics." This, as a long shot surmise, could be the development which has caused jitters in the outwardly confident and happy Nixon camp.

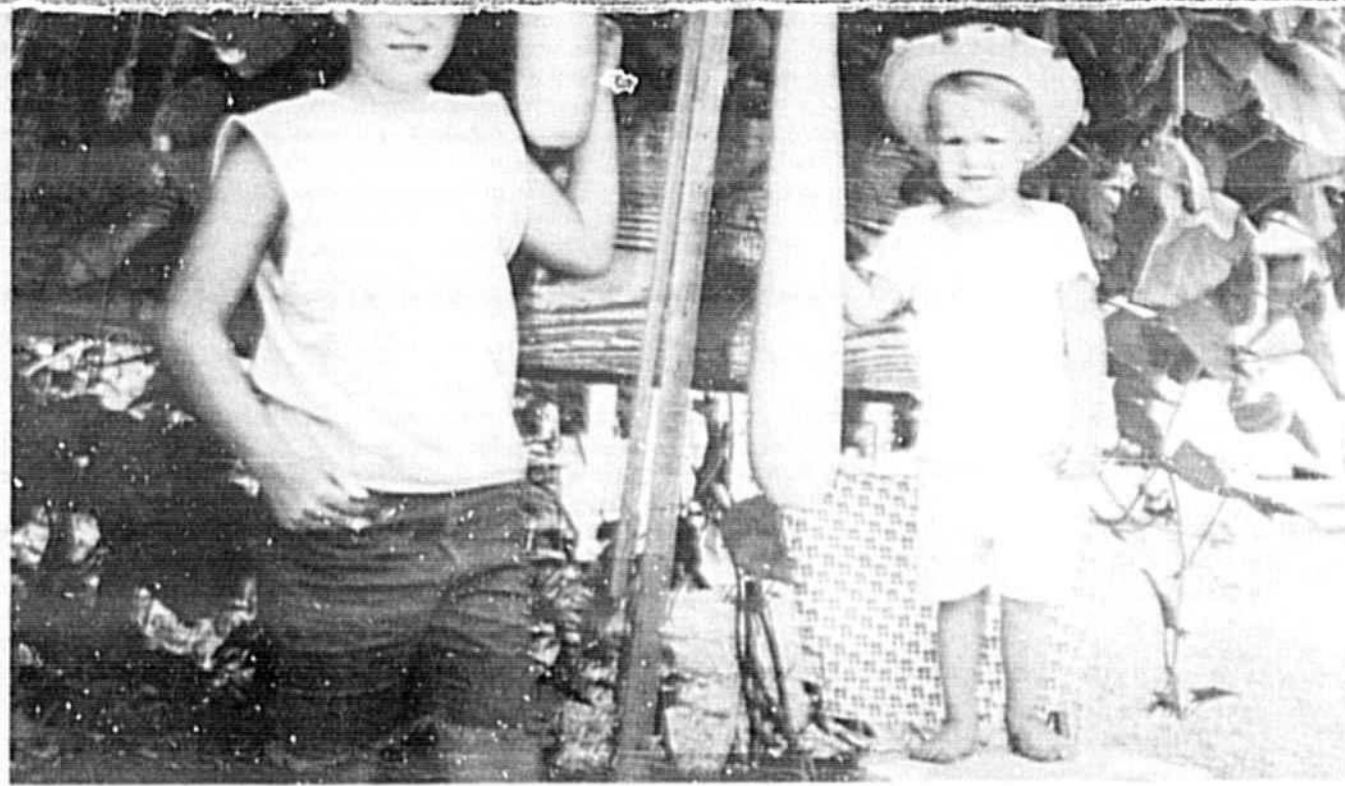
