SANFORD - The young ladies in the Teen Age Parent Program (TAPP) at the Crooms School of Choice in Sanford will have an opportunity to learn about business by running their own business enterprise at the school. A general store, selling nursery items such as diapers, formula, baby wipes and powders, will be run by and for the women in

Thanks to a \$250 grant from the Foundation for the Advancement of our Community Through Schools (FACTS) and matching money from the Kiwanis Club of Sanford, the store should be ready for business at the beginning of the second semester of school on

"Essentially, the money from FACTS and the Kiwanis Club is seed money," Jimi Brooks, chairman of the Kiwanis major emphasis committee, said. "They will use it to buy the items for their shelves."

Brooks said the major emphasis of the Sanford Kiwanis Club is improving the lives of children between birth and six years old. Catheryne Gordon, a teacher in the pro-

gram, was one of those who sent a grant proposal to FACTS in an attempt to initiate the on-the-job training for the girls. "They will be learning general business skills by running their own business," she

said. "Everything from simply counting the money to applying adding, subtracting, multiplication and division skills to real experiences.' The young women in the TAPP program

either have or will soon have babies. They are sometimes living on their own, but their lack of education or experience often prevents them from getting a job.

HUTCHINSON ISLAND - One of the two units at the St Lucie nuclear reactor has returned to service after a two-month refueling shutdown, Florida Power & Light announced

FPL took the 839-megawatt St. Lucie Nuclear Unit 1 off line in October to take on an 18-month supply of uranium fuel, the

Unit 1 began operating again Sunday and should be functioning at full strength by Friday or Saturday, FPL spokesman Dale Thomas said.

St. Lucie's Unit 1 is one of the most efficient reactor units in the world, FPL said.

In 1991, through Sept. 20. Unit 1's capacity factor is measure of efficiency) was 96.4 percent compared to the U.S. nuclear industry average of 63 percent, the company said.

Noriega trial judge stable after surgery

MIAMI — The federal judge presiding over the drug and racketeering trial of Manuel Noriega was listed in stable

condition after undergoing open-heart surgery this week.

U.S. District Judge William M. Hoeveler underwent triple-bypass heart surgery at Mercy Hospital in Miami on Tuesday after complaining of chest pains, and was recovering well, the hospital said Thursday.

Dr. James Jude, who performed the surgery, said the judge's chances for full recovery appear "excellent." He said the judge should be out of the hospital within a week.

Friends said the judge expects to return to the bench when Noriega's trial resumes on Jan. 6. The trial has been in recess since Dec. 17.

"I saw him Christmas morning," said Father Robert McCloskey of St. Stephens Catholic Church. "He looks great. He's really doing fine."

Hoeveler, 69, has been rated by attorneys as one of the best judges in the Southern Florida district. He was appointed by President Carter in 1977 and is now on semi-retired status. The Noriega trial is his only case.

Poor AIDS patients face wait for care

WEST PALM BEACH - Reports that poor AIDS patients from other counties are coming to Palm Beach County for free care have prompted the Health Care District to adopt a 90-day

residency requirement. 'We're not really sure there's a big problem, but we've heard some stories," said Doris Ausbrook, executive director of the district. "We've heard that some AIDS patients may be coming here from other counties because our services are better and more comprehensive."

Until now, poor patients needing care paid for by the Health Care District had only to show proof of residency, but there was no time requirement. The district board, at its Monday night meeting, adopted a 90-day requirement.

Broward County has certain tax-supported hospitals where poor patients may go for care. In Palm Beach County, poor patients may go to the doctor or hospital of their choice. Those doctors and hospitals are then reimbursed by the district.

Shauna Dunn. executive director of Palm Beach County's Comprehensive AIDS Program, which provides services other than medical care for AIDS patients, said patients historically have flocked to Palm Beach County from counties to the north. where care and services have lagged.

TALLAHASSES — Some law enforcement officials say it's too soon to tell if gun control measures Florida enacted this year will quiet street violence, but others are already

While controls may deter some suicides and domestic violence, many officials agreed with Tampa Police Department spokesman Steve Cole that "Most people

three-day waiting period had anything to do with it," said Wayne Quinney, a bureau chief at the Florida Department of Law Enforcement in Tallahassee. Voters approved a three-day waiting period for handgun buyers in November 1990, with 84 percent voting yes. It took effect Oct. 1. Other states and cities have waiting periods, but Florida is the only state where it is written into the constitution.

Also, under a law that took effect Feb. 1. Plorida's nearly 6,000 gun dealers had to start making criminal background checks on everyone buying firearms.

Before a sale, gun dealers must call the FDLE for an instant background check on the buyer. The FDLE checks state and national records for prior felony convictions.

Probe: No excessive force used

WEST PALM BEACH - A probe of the fatal beating of a hitchhiker in 1990 could not determine whether excessive force was used because of mintakes made while investigating the death, an in-ternal affairs report said.

While the panel found major flaws in how the case was handled, it failed to place blame for Jewett's death on officers Stephen Rollins and Glen Thurlow.

A jury acquitted both of second-degree murder charges in November.

Investigators, however, found "reasonable auspicion" that excessive force was used. The report concluded the officers used poor judgment in handling

There was "an air of secrecy and lack of supervisory direction." Investigator David D'Andria told internal affairs investigators.

The scene at the sidewalk where Robert Jewett died on Nov. 24, 1990, was chaotic. according to a four-volume report released Thursday. Supervisors made mistakes as

basic as neglecting to string crime scene tape and failing to separate the two officers after

The report-contains no rec-ontmendations for disciplinary action. West Palm Beach Mayor Nancy Graham and Chief Billy Riggs will decide what action to take after an independent consultant reviews the report. The Palm Beach Post reported.

PALATKA - Rodeheaver Boys Ranch is home to 26 boys whose misadventures or family situations have left them with a need for structure and refuge. And it operates without state or federal tax dollars.

Rodeheaver's guiding philosophy is: "It is better to build boys. than mend men."

Brian, a 15-year-old bright and cocky high school sophomore, is one of the residents currently in that building process after a rocky start.

"I ran away too many times. I

stole too many things," said the 1950, houses 26 boys ages 8 to a history or arson or have been

It was his plan to sign himself up at a South Florida military school with a forged check that landed Brian at Rodeheaver, a 1,500 acre ranch about 12 miles south of Palatka in Putnam

Brian has taken to the rigors of the ranch, where good work habits and good grades lead to privileges such as fishing, horseback riding and movies.

He now has a 3.3 grade point average and plays in the school band.

The ranch, which opened in

18, said Ashley Jeter, the ranch's executive director. Two cottages are being refurbished and soon there will be room for 24 more boys.

The program was established by evangelist Homer Rodeheaver and Putnam County rancher Harry Westbury as a home for boys whose home environment or whose own attitude had let them down.

For a lot of these boys, this is the first time they have been told. 'This is the way we are going to do things." he said.

McColloch will return for rape resentencing

In September 1990, McCollock was convicted of kidnapping and sexual assault but sentenced to

Sobering

Rarely has there been such a sobering and honest official appraisal of the economy as was given Dec. 18 to Congress by Federal Reserve Board Chairman Alan Greenspan.

Rarely has one been as necessary. It came only hours before General Motors announced the closing of 21 plants.

Greenspan's warning also was blunt: "Congress should approach with great caution any proposal that would expand the structural budget deficit." On a day Washington was alive with rumors the Bush administration was considering a \$30 billion tax rebate, the warning was crucial. Such a rebate would be insane.

The news is not good. GM's restructuring, which will cut jobs by 74,000, will ripple throughout the economy. The massive automobile expansion of the '80s, financed, as Greenspan said in his statement, too often "by debt that carried extended maturities," is

The news from UCLA was equally bleak. Calling the number of jobs lost in California during the past year (446,000) "shocking," the forecasters said that cutbacks in aerospace and construction would keep California in recession at least until late '92.

Maybe, but as Greenspan pointed out, the government has anti-cyclical tools. The trick is to use them right.

His prescription and proscription are on the mark. Any short-term election fix that would increase the deficit and drive up interest rates, would prolong the recession. Rule that CR 42 senth of SR 421, 100

On the other hand, the Fed chairman said a reduction in the capital-gains tax would be "quite helpful. Investment is the key to enhanced productivity and higher living standards," he said. To that end, "reducing the call of the federal government on the nation's pool of savings is essential." Right


His analysis of the '80s was devastating, a decade, he said, characterized by "huge increases in indebtedness." Financial intermediaries "lavished credit upon developers." A "wave of mergers and buy-outs" substituted debt for equity. Consumer debt "ran for a number of years at remarkably high levels." Home purchase was "not simply for essential shelter but as speculative investments."

Greenspan's statement is must reading. Elections approaching, panicky politicians prefer to defer problems, to borrow now, pay later. That was the mistake of the '80s. Did we learn from it?

Pat vs. Jesse: Double standards

The media has hardly been able to conceal their collegial respect and quiet enthusiasm for Patrick J. Buchanan's candidacy for the Republican presidential nomination.

Oh, a few journalistic spoilsports have alluded to his rhetorical affinity for Hitlerian anti-Semitism and pre-Civil War racism. But they are a minority. And who takes minorities seriously these days?

By now, ex-Ku Klux Klansman David Duke must be wondering: Why are the people who said all of these nasty things about me gushing like teen-age grouples over Pat Buchanan's identical political philosophy?

Jesse Jackson must also be wondering why an evangelical firestorm of condemnation followed his egregious "Hymietown" remark, but no similar "righteousness like a mighty stream" has risen to condemn Buchanan for his unrepentant anti-Semitic remarks and descriptions of immigrants as "Zulus"?

The answer is simple. Pat Buchanan is a member in good standing of the "good ol' boy" media network. Many secretly admire his gutsy spicen-ventilation brand of journalism.

At a time when a considerable number of white

males are feeling beseiged by a rambunctious tide of change engendered by women and minorities, an authoritative Pat Buchanan comes

off as Charles Martel, who defeated the Moors at Buchanan's stren call for "America first" and a Tours and "saved" Europe.

Buchanan' arch-conservative philosophy in today's conservative environment and his po-litical intimacy with Richard Nixon. Gerald Ford and Ronald Reagan endear him to many voters.

That doesn't mean that a candidate's philosophy and former associations are necessarily step-ping stones to a nomination. Candidates stand or fall on their personalities and their ability to communicate.

revived Madisonian republic without those "Zulus" could play well in New Hampshire.

Buchanan, unlike his Republican forebear, Lincoln, does not represent "the better angels of our nature." And his candidacy sighlights a double standard in media coverage. When Jackson ran for the presidency, the media representity released two cuestions. What qualified repeatedly raised two questions: What qualified Jackson to be president, given his glaring dearth of executive or legislative experience? And what did Jesse, want?

Like any red-blooded American boy or girl, Jesse just wanted to be president. But the media still couldn't back that lack of experience. Even Washington, D.C.'s former mayor and current prison inmate, Marion Barry, derisively quipped: "The only thing Jesse has ever run is his

But Buchanan's mouth is bigger. It spouts off in his newspaper columns and in his television shows. And a big mouth can pay off. One former grade-B movie actor ran his cinematic mouth all the way to the presidency.

As for Buchanan's history of bigotry differentiated from Duke's legacy only by his avoidance of white sheets and swastikas — it won't be fatal:

Sound, fury signifying little

WASHINGTON - As a weary, bitterly divided Congress adjourned until next year, its leaders praised its accomplishments in 1991, A look at Congress' scorecard, however, shows that most of what it did this year it was forced to do, and very little is likely to have any lasting impact on the country's most pressing problems.

So far the 102nd Congress has reacted to international and domestic events rather than formulate and pass innovative legislation. Even in those areas where it did act, this Congress tended to do the absolute minimum required.

The obvious example is the banking bill finally passed minutes before adjournment. With banks and savings and loans continuing to fail, the federal insurance funds that guarantee deposits were in danger of running out. It was clear that Congress simply had to

infuse new funds into the insurance system. Beyond that, there was little agreement about what else should be done. The White House and some congressional Republicans wanted to overhaul the rules governing banks. allowing them to enter all sorts of new fields and allowing non-banking corporations to own banks. Democrata and some congressional Republicans were against this, wanting instead

to tighten government control over banks. In the end, Congress did little more than it had to, moderately increasing the powers of federal bank regulators and appropriating an unprecedented \$95 billion to pay for falled banks and S&Ls and to refinance bank insurance funds.

Much of what Congress did pass falls into the category of replacing expiring laws. Examples were the trade bill extending the president's authority to "fast-track" trade negotiations and the \$151 billion surface transportation bill.

Most other major 1991 legislative accomplishments were forced on Congress by outside events. These included the Persian Gulf war authorization, unemployment insurance benefit extension, Soviet aid, arms control treaty approval and the Clarence Thomas nomination to the Supreme Court.

For this Congress, the tough work still lies ahead. Already on the agenda are tax reform. campaign financing reform, education, health care, foreign aid and trade with China. If that wasn't enough. Congress also will have to try to refashion a crime bill and a massive overhaul of energy policy in a way that will not result in a presidential veto.

This would be a punishing agenda for a cohesive Congress. But the 102nd Congress has become as divisive as any in recent memory, and it will only get worse as the 1992 election approaches

This Congress is not only pitting Democrats against Republicans, but Republicans against Republicans and Democrats against Demo-

This was vividly shown in Congress' final hours during the debate over a package of financial incentives to get the economy moving again. There is an absolute lack of agreement between Democrats and Republicans and between Congress and the White House as to what these measures should be, or even if they

are needed. This disagreement evolved into a consensus that It was better to do nothing now and wait until January when there is a better indication of where the economy is going.

However, just before adjournment. conservative House Republicans demanded passage of a measure built around a capital gains tax cut. The president at first opposed the measure, then did an about-face and supported it. Democrats called the White House's bluff by

threatening to reconvene after Thanksgiving for a wide-ranging economic reforms debate. In the end. Senate Republicans begged their House counterparts to withdraw their measure and agree to adjourn. Almost no one in Congress - Democrat or Republican - is happy with President Bush or the White House. As almost all view it, the president on virtually every domestic issue - has made no attempt to put together coalitions to pass legislation he supports. Rather, he has simply sat back and vetoed what he does not like and then worked tirelessly to gather enough votes to sustain those vétos

· Even Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., is unhappy with this posture. "It's time," says Dole, "for the president to step forward and assume a leadership role. He must fashion a program that the American people

It is assumed that Bush will run against Congress as the centerpiece of his re-election campaign. Given the strong feelings already running between Democrats and Republicans on Capitol Hill, and between Congress and the White House, the second session of the 102nd Congress may be one of the most divisive in

The CIA looked to Bible for wisdom

WASHINGTON - The Central Intelligence Agency is an institution in search of a mission. Budget cuts, the decreased importance of espionage and the lingering bad taste of past renegade operations have everyone at the spy agency spooked.

Like a protective polemic, some CIA sources are reminding us that despite the breakup of the "Evil Empire." "spying is the world's second oldest profession." and will always be around.

As proof, and with the season of Christmas to remind him, one CIA source referred us to an in--house treatise that critiqued the spying techniques used in the Bible.

The piece, "A Bible Lesson on Spying: One More Round with Espionage by Moses and Joshua. appeared some years back in the classified CIA quarterly. 'Studies in Intelligence." It argues for less congressional oversight of the CIA's covert activities, cit-ing Bible tales as an example of how

things can go wrong when secret strategy becomes a matter of public debate. According to the unnamed author, the CIA

is confronted with a "perplexing situation:" how to satisfy the demands of a democracy and still conduct secret operations that don't always conform to the ethics and morals of

When the question involves morality and spying, look to the Bible, which has a lot of one and a little of the other. The earliest recorded espionage operation was conducted by Moses. He picked 12 prominent men, one from each of the 12 tribes of Israel, to be his spies and sent them to the "Promised Land" to scout it out. They spent 40 days in what is now Israel. When they came back, they reported their findings publicly to Moses and the 12 tribes. The CIA could have told him that was a mistake.

The spies agreed on the obvious - the lay of the land, the number of people, the fact that indeed the area was "flowing with milk and honey." But 10 of them reported that the people in the promised land were so huge. that an invasion would be a debacle for the Israelites. "Only two of the spies reported that they were confident that they could succeed and argued strenuously to go forward with the invasion," the CIA analysis says.

The Israelites were spooked by the information and decided to stone the two spies who said an invasion was possible. As punishment, God held the Israelites back from the promised land for 40 years — one year for every day the spies spent on their mission.

Forty years later. Joshua tried, only he had learned the lesson about keeping the information under wraps. He sent two sples to reconnoiter the city of Jericho. They were protected by a harlot named Rahab who gave them information in trade for their promise that her family would be spared during the attack. Joshua used the information supplied by Rahab to successfully take Jericho.

The CIA author finds that "the contrast between these two incidents is significant." Moses' spies were amateurs, and Joshua's apparently were professionals. Moses' spies skimmed the surface, reporting on the physical characteristics of the land, while Joshua's spies came back with valuable information about how the people of Jericho were afraid of the Israelites. Then, there was the big difference: Moses' spies made their report openly, and a heated public debate followed. Joshua's spies kept their report for official eyes only, and Joshua didn't take any public opinion polls about what he should do.

"The consequences of these two operations are significantly different." the CIA report says. "Moses' operation, conducted by amateurs more or less in the public domain. resulted in a weakening of Moses' position.

Duke would OK black VP. praises Cuban-Americans

MIAMI - David Duke, the former Nazi sympathizer and Ku Klux Klansman trying to run for president as a Republican, said he wouldn't mind sharing his ticket with a black man and parise Cuban-Americans.

"I wouldn't take Jesse Jackson, and I wouldn't pull Clarence Thomas off the Supreme Court because we need him there, but if there was a black person who believes exactly as we believes of course I would consider him." Duke said on a radio call-in show in Mismi Thursday night.

Duke praised Miami's Cuban-American community on the broadcast by the Spanish-language station WRHC-AM in the Little Havana section.

The Cubans certainly are European descent. They've been a tremendous asset. They're Christian people. they're anti-Communist," Duke said.

But he had a different view of another of Miami's major immigrant communities: the

"I don't know if they're going to make a great con-

tribution," he said. Duke, who planned to kickoff his Florida campaign at a raily tonight in Miami, said lie will concentrate his efforts in the Deep Boath and in Florida, where state Republican leaders have vowed to keep his natile of the party's March 10 primary ballot

Tve getten thousands and thousands of letters from Miami and from auti-Communists around the country, so I know I have a lot of support in this region,"
Duke said.

The WRHC-AM interview was his first appearance in Plorida since enhancing his candidacy, hi drew about 100 mostly Jewish protestors who shouted "Six Million — Never Again" and "Smash the Nazis

The angry crowd rushed the station doors at one point and jeered as Duke's motorcade eft, but police made no ar-

Duke appealed to Se Florida's Cuban-Americ promising that if elected, foreing Fidel Castro from Cuba would be a top priority.

"As president of the United

States I will support efforts to immediately give what mili-tary assistance the Cuban people desire and need," Duke said. "I will not commit American troops to that, but I will commit American materials, friendship, help and support to free Cuba."

Castro talks tough at home, tells foreigners he's flexibile

WASHINGTON - One day he looks like the militant communist of old. The next he seems much more willing to accommodate a radically

Cuban President Fidel Castro, used the eve of the resignation of Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev to denounce a pair of familiar targets - the United States and capitalism.

"The Cuban revolution will uphold its socialist option at all costs. ... Nobody will ... force us back into capitalism ... a system in which the property owners worry more about dogs and cats than about men.

He added, "U.S. imperialism has concentrated all its attacks on our country because we are the bastion of socialism, a country that has been given a historical mission."

Castro seemed to be telling his people that the notion of Cuba undertaking a Gorbachev-style reform movement is out of the question. Gorbachev tried it and lost not only his job but his party and his country.

But when speaking to foreigners, Castro sounds more flexible, less ideological. Here's what he told Gillian Gunn of the Carnegle Endowment for International Peace last month:

"No book of Marx. Engels or Lenin says it is possible to construct socialism without capital. without technology and without markets. ... It is for this reason that we have no alternative but to associate ourselves with foreign companies ... (for) we are dealing with ... a world in which a large part of the socialist system has collapsed. The alternative is to renounce the independence of the country, the revolution and socialism, to return (to) being a colony of the United States and this we will not consider.

He went on to say that "nobody denies" that the presence of foreign companies will have a "capitalist ideological influence" on the Cuban

Foreign investment in Cuba has focused on the tourism industry but Cuban officials have recently suggested that other sectors of the economy are being opened to such investment and that limited domestic entrepreneurship is being encouraged as well.

Beyond that. Cuba has been trying to reverse its steep economic decline by opening discussions with some of the newly formed republics that have split off from the Soviet Union.

One-party rule won't disappear

MEXICO CITY - Cuban lawmakers have approved direct parliamentary elections but they are not expected to alter Cuba's one-party Communist system or ease President Fidel Castro's 32-year grip on power.

Some analysts say the direct elections expected late next year might give people a sense of being closer to their government as they face severe hardship from an economy nearing collapse.

Cuba's official news agency Prensa Latina said the National Assembly opened its two-day session Thursday by passing a resolution supporting measures taken to deal with an economy battered by mismanagement, a U.S. embargo and the loss of Soviet aid.

Public transport has been cut, beasts of burden and bicycles are replacing motor vehicles, hundreds of factories are closed, virtually everything is rationed, television broadcasting has been cut, and movie theaters and restaurants closed.

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Body Identified as U.S. hostage

BEIRUT, Lebanon — A body dumped overnight near a highway was identified today as that of slain American hostage William Buckley, the CIA station chief kidnapped by pro-Iranian Shittes in 1984.

The discovery of the remains came hours after U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar said in New York he hoped Buckley's remains would be returned by the weekend. bringing a close to the American hostage saga in Lebanon.

The last living American hostages were freed earlier this month. The body of U.S. Lt. Col. William Higgins, a U.N. observer, was also dumped on a Beirut street last weekend.

Police today discovered the body near the airport highway before dawn on an anonymous telephone tip. Police said the body was wrapped in cotton and bandages, shrouded in a blanket and placed in a plastic bag — as were Higgins' remains. Coroner-General Dr. Ahmed Harati examined the remains for

two hours. He said afterward: "We have established that it's 100 percent Buckley." The remains were taken out of the hospital morgue in a

casket draped with the Stars and Stripes and whisked away in a white U.S. Embassy van at about 11 a.m. There was no immediate U.S. comment.

A caller claiming to speak for the Islamic Jihad, the pro-Iranian Shiite Muslim group that kidnapped Buckley on March 16, 1984, said after the remains were found that Buckley's body had been released.

Plane crashes in Sweden, 16 hurt

GOTTRORA, Sweden - An SAS Jetliner with 129 people aboard crash landed and split apart in a snowy field today moments after the pilot reported both engines failed, officials said. At least 16 people were injured, but no deaths were

reported. The pilot also reported ice on the wings, but an SAS executive said the aircraft was sprayed with anti-icing liquid before leaving Stockholm's Arlanda airport. The plane came down three minutes after takeoff.

The McDonnell Douglas MD-80 plunged from nearly 2,000 feet into the field, about 10 miles north of the airport. The plane reportedly clipped tree tops, hit the field, split into three pleces and stopped just short of a forest.

"The captain did a tremendous job ... setting down the aircraft as he did, because he apparently managed to fly it to a reasonably good emergency landing site and near roads," said John Tulin, chief of SAS flight operations in Stockholm.

Fighting rages on in Yugoslovia

ZAGREB, Yugoslavia - Serb-led forces pounded Karlovac with mortar fire today, subjecting it to its flereest attack in the 6-month-old war, Croatian officials said.

The alleged attack on the town of 55,000 people 30 miles southwest of Zagreb, the capital of separatist Croatia, reportedly ended before daylight, as did scattered clashes

They followed a Croatian push Thursday in the Pakrae area, about 35 miles southeast of Zagreb. Associated Press photographer Greg Marinovich reported that the Croat fighters burned and looted abandoned Serb houses as they advanced.

There have been frequent allegations on both sides of atrocities, looting and wanton destruction, highlighting the brutality of Yugoslavia's war.

The fighting has cost thousands of lives. Serb irregulars and the Serb-led federal army have captured more than a third of Croatian territory.

Woman picked to run commerce

WASHINGTON - Commerce Secretary nominee Barbara Franklin has carned a reputation as a big-league player among Republicans and she's backed that with more than \$60,000 in recent personal contributions to the GOP.

In November the high-profile businesswoman with government ties dating to the Nixon White House augmented her donations by helping to raise nearly \$1.2 million at a fund-raising dinner in Washington for President Bush's re-election bid.

On Thursday, Bush named her to replace another longtime political ally. Robert Mosbacher, as commerce secretary. Mosbacher has been named chairman of Bush's re-election campaign.

Bush called Franklin a "leader and role model for many women in business" and promised "her first priority is the same as mine - jobs and economic growth."

"She has been a determined advocate of free and fair trade, keenly aware that when the playing field is level. American workers can compete with anyone, anywhere," Bush

"I am deeply honored, almost beyond putting that into words. I am absolutely thrilled to be a new part of your team" she told the president at the news conference.

"She's always been a presence, always worked hard. ... There's hardly a CEO who doesn't know her," said Sheila Tate, a close friend of Franklin and a former Bush spokeswoman.

Franklin, 51, heads her own management consulting firm, serves on seven corporate boards and is a member of Bush's Advisory Committee for Trade Policy and Negotia-

Ms. Tate said the president had tried since taking office in 1989 to lure Franklin to a full-time position in his administration.

"I know he wanted to recruit her to an appropriate job. But it's taken three years to get her take something." Ms. Tate said. Franklin has been an increasingly active contributor to GOP campaigns, donating

\$67,050 since 1985, according to federal campaign records reviewed by The Associated Press.

Her donations since 1989 include \$40,000 to the Republican National Committee and another \$5,500 to congressional campaigns. including \$2,000 to Labor Secretary Lynn Martin's unsuccessful 1990 Senate campaign and \$1,000 to former Attorney General Dick Thornburgh's unsuccessful Senate bld this year, the Federal Election Commission records showed.

In 1985-86, she donated \$10,000 to Bush's political action committee. Fund of America's Future, while in 1987 she gave \$10,000 to the RNC, the records showed.

Before 1985, Franklin donated only \$2,000 to federal campaigns, according to the records.



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
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
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


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



Dome food preserver recalled

SANFORD - Barbara Hughes/Gregg, the Seminole County Extension Home Economist, recieved the following recall information and wants to make consumers aware of the problems with this product.


The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission in cooperation with Micro-Dome of San Ramon, Calif., warned consumers of certain safety hazards associated with the use of "Micro-Dome Food Presever" manufactured after August 1987.

The CPSC urges consumers to destroy all food that has been preserved using a Micro-Dome. and to call 1-800-736-2320 for instructions on how to receive a \$50 rebate for return of the food

The Micro-Dome is used in microwave ovens to preserve fruits, vegetables and prepared dishes. The appliance is a plastic container that can process one standard metal-lidded canning jar at a time. Generally priced at \$50, about 18,000 units were

Micro-Dome informed the commission that the top of the plastic container may blow off in the microwave if the vent stem or safety release becomes plugged. The pressurized plastic container may also explode during or after removal from the microwave, or if the container is hit or dropped. Furthermore, the plastic container may also crack and develop lines, called crazing. that could increase the risk of explosion. Explosion of a presaurized Micro-Dome containing hot water and food could cause severe injuries such as blindness and burns from flying fragments and liquids.

CPSC is also concerned about possible food poisoning in certain foods prepared using the Micro-Dome. While CPSC is unaware of any incidents of food poisoning, it is concerned that the product and its accompanying recipe and instruction failing to kill bacteria while the





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
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How to cope with chronic back strain

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have a 20-year history of lumbar muscle strain with persistent pain. I've had X-rays, myelograms, acupuncture and a four-week in-patient program of chronic pain management, all to no avail. My primary-care physician now speculates I have fibromyalgia. What can you tell me about this, and what modalities have been used to relieve patients with this afflic-

DEAR READER: The clusive causes of chronic back strain can lead to much frustration for patients, as well as for their doctors. Once the usual causes (such as arthritis or a herniated disc) have been ruled out, patients are often left hanging: normal tests and continuing back pain.


You seem to have run the gamut of medical testing and treatment, only to be left with a diagnosis, by exclusion, of fibromyalgia. This poorly understood syndrome of muscle spasm, achiness and "trigger" points appears to be related to stress and anxiety in many patients — sort of a colossal, misplaced tension headache. Fibromyalgia is not harmful to health but it can, as you've discovered, severely upset a normal life.

Traditional therapy, under the supervision of an orthopedic surgeon, includes stretching exercises, heat, massage, aspirin and anti-depressant drugs (such as Elavil) at bedtime to promote sleep and help treat the depression frequently experienced by fibromyalgia patients.


If these methods have not helped you, I suggest you see a chiropractor. I know my colleagues will jump all over me for saying this but chiropractors are good at treating chronic back problems, and I believe this is an appropriate alternative for you.


