General MacArthur himself has uttered some brave words on this subject though he has...cautioned against over-confidence. In leaving Corregidor, he has promised to return to the rescue of the island fortress.

And though he has pointed out that the success of his efforts depend in large measure upon the men and equipment furnished him by the Allied governments, he declares his faith in ultimate victory is invincible.

To what extent General MacArthur can be supplied with reinforcements depends largely upon the people of the United States. This is the only way man can contribute the manpower for the armies and for the factories which make the guns, tanks and planes. If they waste time quibbling among themselves over working hours, wages, profits, MacArthur is doomed.

And this is the kind of work we make in this country can go to Australia. A no less important front, though we have no Americans fighting there, is in eastern Russia. There the Red armies will meet the powerful German invaders. They will be the ones most needed if they are overwhelmed the Nazis will be forced into a long night in other directions. We must get equipment to the Russians and keep them in the fight.

It is not easy assignment, this second World War, and it will be won by the side which relieves the least upon miracles and depends the most upon its own courage, strength and resourcefulness.



U. S. Army Has Novel Plan For Delivery Of Mail From Soldiers

WASHINGTON, Mar. 26—WW There are hardly any lengths the mail goes through to be important of all his Army postoffice business.

Mail for overseas soldiers must be addressed to the Army post office office in care of the postmaster at New York, Seattle, San Francisco, etc., depending on the location of the soldiers and station letter not having been received can be traced to improper address.

The address should carry the name and grade of the soldier, his serial number, if known, communication. It should never be addressed to any foreign city. Letters so addressed would inform anyone where they are located of the identity of a closely guarded military secret.

Next to decent and regular food, the Army considers mail from home the most important morale builder for troops. So far, says Brig. Gen. William C. Rose, only one ship carrying mail to Army forces overseas has been sunk. Since most of the mail is carried on lightly armed supply ships, the safety factor in flying "V-mail" is one of its most important.

The Army post office now has 100 offices and 1,000 employees, nearly all formerly post office employees. And right now they are handling 1,000,000 pieces of mail a day to and from such distant spots as the British Isles, Australia, India, Japan, China, Korea, the Indian Peninsula and the United States. When "V-mail" delivery really gets under way, it will be possible even to get up deliveries to troops making an isolated stand, simply by dropping it by parachute.

Even if more mail everyday ships are sunk, says General Rose, the mail won't come up to the total that now is lost by misdirection.
