It is natural for Duval or Hillsborough to be amongst on account of the vast field of material they have to draw from and aside from these two we firmly believe that Sanford, with its fine coaching and good head work, will carry any of the other to the top and until we see Sanford defeat this big five or Plant City who is sixth, all we have to say is we are from Missouri.

Dr. Freeman no doubt meant well when he left Sanford, who has not lost a game this season, out of the elect, but just trot your champs along to the goal and let the results look for themselves. Mr. Freeman writing for Tampa Tribune says the following:

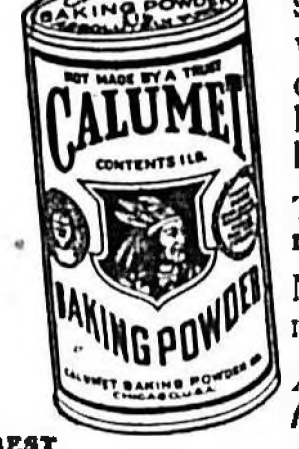

### DANGER IN STEEL HORSESHOE

Substitution of Copper, It is Believed, Will Lessen Possibility of Destructive Forest Fires

Copper horseshoes as a means of preventing forest fires have recently made their appearance in several of the national forests of the West and if the plans of the forest service are carried out, this metal will be substituted for the iron of all horseshoes to be used in the national forests.

According to the report of the United States forest service, in the national forests, many have been the cause of some of the most serious fires that have occurred in the forest reserves. The steel horseshoes striking against the logs and stumps of the trees, and the sparks that are produced, are the cause of many of the forest fires.

### Moth Proof Wool

A moth repellent has been introduced in the German market, which it is claimed will positively make the wool fabric absolutely moth proof. An additional advantage of this product, known as "Lindol", is that it does not discolor the fabric, so that the wool can be dyed in bright shades without any difficulty. The product is a white powder which does not dissolve very easily in water. Acid must be added to make it dissolve. In this condition it is used in the textile mill, and it is preferable to put the woolen fabric through the mothproofing treatment in the factory. Another form of the product is sold for use in the home. In this form the powder will dissolve in water. The woolen fabric is placed in the solution and permitted to dry. One or two percent solution is required. "Lindol" is now on the market in Germany. From the Industrial Digest.

CLAIMS AGAINST GERMANY BEGIN TO ADJUST AMERICAN

Washington, Nov. 2.—The mixed claims commission to adjust American claims against Germany arising out of the war, got preliminaries out of the way today and will begin tomorrow the task of arranging the mass of claims for orderly consideration. Today's session, the first at which Dr. Wilhelm Kieselbach, German commissioner, was present, was confined to an exchange of courtesies with Justice Day, umpire of any disputes that may arise, presiding.

In opening the session, Justice Day gives, and Judge Edwin B. Pariser, American commissioner, followed by Dr. Kieselbach in his appreciation for the reception given himself and colleagues. Robert C. Morris, in charge of the presentation of the claims to the commission, is an American agent, and the system he proposed to follow, and invited the cooperation of Karl Von Lowinski, the German agent, which was promised.

The nature of the claims is varied, including many cases of loss of American lives at sea, prior to American entry into the war. Every part of the country is represented among the claimants, although the bulk of these entries is about the East coast seaboard, particularly in New York city.
