"These young children are also excited and more interested in meeting new people and renewing old friendships than being aware of motor vehicles.

"I've instructed all my men to strictly enforce the law as to school zones," Jane concluded.

Two delegations objecting to changes in Seminole County school busing procedures were joined by several others with separate school problems in this morning's confrontation with school officials at the county administrative office on this first day of the 1969-70 school term.

First a delegation of 40 Negro students from the George town area of Sanford protested the lack of busing for students to Crooms High, which was the choice school under the county's freedom of choice school plan for the dissatisfied teenagers.

Andrew Bracken, administrative aide, Hugh Carlson, Sanford Junior High principal, Ernest Cowley, public information officer, and Walter Touge, finance officer, talked with the delegation that had refused to attend classes, explaining the county's new busing schedule prevented the transporting of students past an existing facility to the school of their choice.

The youngsters listened to Bracken, Carlson and Touge explain that under new federal regulations, the school board had no alternative but to eliminate dual busing. Bracken said only the board could change the busing restrictions and suggested the delegation select a committee to represent it in an appearance before the board.

The school board, reportedly, had scheduled a meeting today with delegation of parents from the Midway-Canaan area to discuss the busing problems that have resulted in the drawing of transportation zones around schools that eliminated busing of students from the area located east of Sanford on SR 46 to Sanford Junior High and Seminole High Schools.

Delights By French Chef

NEW YORK (AP) — Raymond Oliver, celebrated chef, teacher of cooking on French TV for over 5 years and author, has written a new book which attempts to make cooking simplified and accessible to everyone, according to the September issue of Atlas magazine, which digests articles from the world press. One of the recipes in "La Cuisine," Oliver has named after the friend of his, Jean Cocteau. It is a delicious dessert of whipped cream and liqueur. Franks Jean Cocteau Saturated macarons with 1/4 cup almond oil, while they absorb the liqueur, whip up 2 cups of cold heavy cream with 1/2 cup powdered sugar and 1/2 cup kirsch. Add 2 teaspoon vanilla extract when the cream stands sturdily in peaks. Cook the macarons with half a box of macarons, sliced, either on the whipped cream and decorate with the rest of the whole berries and 1/2 crystallized violets. Oliver prefers the slightly tempered whipped Creme Chantilly to his whipped cream. An American approximation is achieved by adding 1 teaspoon butterfat to each cup of cream, warming it slightly and letting it stand at room temperature until it thickens, about 6 hours in summer, up to 16 in winter.

'Francelia' Heads To Guatemala

MIAMI (AP) — Fringe winds of Hurricane Franca began striking coastal points along the Gulf of Honduras early today after the storm unexpectedly shifted to a southeasterly direction as it neared Central America.

The National Hurricane Center cautioned residents all along the Gulf of Honduras to prepare for 60 mile and hour winds, high tides and heavy rain later today.

Forecasters predicted that the storm would take it to shore somewhere between the seaside resort cities of Belize in British Honduras, and La Ceiba, on the northern coast of Honduras. In between is the northeastern tip of Guatemala.

Part of the hurricane's wind system covered the northern edge of Honduras early today as it moved west-southwest some 70 miles off the coast. Kraft said.

At 3 a.m., Franca was centered at the entrance to the Gulf of Honduras, near Latitude 17 north, Longitude 85.5 west, and was moving at about 10 m.p.h. The eye, or center of the storm, was about 40 miles east-southwest of Belize and 130 miles northeast of La Ceiba.

Slain Girl's Family In Seclusion

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (AP) — Debbie Nichols' parents, slaying newspapers and ignoring television, have sequestered in their unassuming one-story white home since the young girl was brutally shot to death early Saturday.

Sollicitous neighbors and victim relatives have thrown up a make-shift curtain of privacy for the couple as they try to cope with tragedy.

Debra Carol, 17, and Dennis Anthony McKewen, 21, were out together for the first time early Saturday. A policeman on a routine patrol discovered their bullet-pocked bodies near South Florida Industrial Park.

They had been shot at close range with a small caliber weapon. Miss Nichols' body was dragged about 20 feet from the car. Their money was intact.

Hollywood policeman described the killings as "the work of a maniac."

Monday, two days after the double murder, Debbie's aunt, Mrs. Ray Nichols, stood on the front porch of the girl's home and told a newsmen: "Pray for this family and pray that something will happen to cure this sick society."

Columnist Drew Pearson Expires

WASHINGTON (AP) — Columnist Drew Pearson was described in one of his own books as "either loved or hated; there is no middle ground."

His admirers were many readers of his column, "The Washington Merry-Go-Round," which looked on Pearson as the man who exposed skeletons in governmental closets during four decades.

But his reporting through newspapers and broadcasting brought him into frequent conflict with officials, including two presidents who called him a liar.

Pearson, 71, died Monday after suffering a heart attack at his Maryland farm. He had been hospitalized several weeks, returning home only last Friday.

Jack Anderson, co-author of the past 10 years, said he will continue the column which is carried in 425 daily and weekly newspapers.

Pearson's most recent major crusade in 1968-69 led to a Senate censure of Sen. Thomas J. Dodd, D-Conn., after allegations he had used political funds for personal purposes.

It was Presidents Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S. Truman who denounced Pearson. Roosevelt called him a liar when the columnist reported Secretary of State Cordell Hull wanted to see Russia "bled white" during World War II.

Truman once referred to Pearson as an "a.b." after several columns which angered the President.

And the late Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, R-Wis., resorted to physical violence during a long feud with Pearson in the 1950s. McCarthy admitted hitting Pearson with his hand at a fashionable club in Washington; the columnist said the senator kicked him in the groin.

Merchants Study Minibus Service

Sanford Downtown Merchants Association at this morning's breakfast meeting voted to encourage the Greater Sanford Businessmen's division of the Seminole Chamber of Commerce to investigate the feasibility of having a bus service established to run two days a week from Deltona, DelRay, Enterprise and Lake Monroe to Sanford and return.

The merchants group took this action after hearing Charles Collier, holder of a bus franchise for Sanford, say it would cost \$70 a day to operate a minibus carrying capacity of 10-12 passengers over a devoted schedule to avoid state requirements governing transportation facilities.

The vehicle would, in effect, be a chartered service with a staggered route that might eventually include Lake Mary and Geneva, Collier added.

Alex Serrano, merchant president, suggested that oddity licenses could be used as drivers and this would enable operation without having to hire a full time driver.

Collier said 12 months would be required to get an indication of how the service was being accepted.

In another action, the merchants shifted the annual Christmas Parade to the Saturday morning after Thanksgiving, and left it up to the Jaycees to come up with plans for the Sunday event.

Salary increases for airport employees in line with those fabulous city pay schedules are expected to be approved.

Senior Citizens Park Is Eyed

Conversion of the city park between Oak Avenue and Fourth and Fifth Streets into a "senior citizens park" was given preliminary study by the Sanford Senior Improvement Board this morning.

Preliminary drawing indicated the conversion would cost \$22,000. Proposed park would include shuffleboard, croquet and horseshoe courts, circulating walkways, shelter, benches, tables, lights and a bus shelter (if needed at some future date).

No facilities for children are planned for this area, but it was pointed out that another area for future development is located only a few blocks away.

The Senior Improvement Board will meet Monday morning to further review the plans for the park.

A. B. Peterson Jr., board chairman, reported on the work of the city zoo relocation committee and explained that local opposition and possibility of site selected for zoo being used for an insurance building had stopped the zoo relocation for present time.

Peterson suggested that city should review existing zoning of the industrial park, the site recommended to the city for placing the animal attraction.

Peterson observed if action had been quickly taken the problems could have been overcome and the zoo relocated on the industrial property.

All-Time Enrollment High Seen

20,000 School Roll Pictured

Angel speaking to newspaper, television and radio reporters at his first weekly news conference, predicted total county enrollment might go as high as 20,000 students before the end of the year.

Angel disclosed Tuesday's enrollment did not include some children, mostly first graders, who were not enrolled because they were unable to obtain physical examinations before being allowed to enter school.

Angel said English Estates Elementary School was over-enrolled by as many as 16 children in some of the school rooms.

The educator stated this would have to be adjusted to the facility's capacity by either assigning some children to other schools or adding portable rooms to accommodate the overflow.

Tuesday's 18,947 opening figures showed an increase of over 1,500 students from last year's 17,413 enrollment.

Peak month a year ago was December when total county enrollment reached a high of 17,938 pupils before closing out the year with 17,766 students.

Tuesday's classes showed an all-time high enrollment for the county with still others to be added that could push the year's number to around the 20,000 mark, Angel said.

Answering The Herald's question concerning the two deletion of negro students and parents who protested the busing procedures before school buses yesterday, Angel said no partiality would be shown to the residents of Midway and Georgetown who are unhappy over the School Board's decision not to offer dual bus service this year in line with latest U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) guidelines that prohibit the busing of students past a neighborhood school to allow attendance at another school.
