

Exiles To Hear



New Bomber A Must, LeMay Warns President

WASHINGTON (UPI) -Gen. Curtis E. LeMay said in destimony made public today he had warned President Johnson that national security "demands" a new bomber to replace America's aging B52s and B58s in the 1970s. The testimony before the House defense appropriations subcommittee showed the Air Force chief of staff offered to revamp his service's budget to get started on the DFW glane.

Congress has authorized an extra \$52 million for the aircraft's design over the objections of Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara, who feels more studies are needed before such a step is taken. But LeMay said enough studies had been made already and the delay could hold up development of the bomber by a year.

As for the Air Force's existing bombers, LeMay said: "They cannot last forover...."

He said that even if the United States came up with a perfect missile—and he doubted this— this country would find itself in a "musclebound position" without bombers.

"You are endangering the defense of the country by depending on this weapon system missiles alone because you have no flexibility," Le-May said. "You only have two choices. You are either off the button and are at peace, or you are on the button and you are et war."

LeMay, who once headed the Strategic Air Command, said if action were taken now, the first operational squadron of new hombers could be on the job by 1972.







Still A Forked Tongue

Governments, like young suitors, should not be taken seriously when they use a word like "forever."

In 1794, the nation of the United states signed a treaty with the Seneca Indian nation granting it a reservation along the banks of the Allegheny River in western New York which the Senecas were to enjoy undisturbed forever - or at least "as long as the grass grew green."

In 1964, the Indians are being dispossessed because most of their land will be submerged under water when the Kinzua Dam flood control project 27 miles downstream is completed.

The Indians may, in their wisdom, understand that the living cannot always be bound by the promises of the dead. In 1794, America west of the Atlantic coast was a great wilderness that Thomas Jefferson thought would take a thousand years to settle.

No one could foresee that the U.S. population would multiply 45 times in 170 years. No man dreamed of the mechanization, the rapid transportation and all the other things that place a larger human gap between 1964 and 1794 than existed between the infant United States and the Roman Empire.

One thing the Indians cannot understand, however, is why it should take so long for them to be paid for their land. A \$20 million reparations and rehabilitation bill passed by the House (and cut down to \$9.1 million by a Senate subcommittee) still lies in limbo, sidetracked by more pressing business.

Some 140 Indian families must find new homes by Oct. 1. They no longer refer to the President as the Great White Father, but as far as they can tell, the white man still speaks with a forked tongue.



"When you were threatened," he said, "with the possibility of losing your Naval Air Station, your community leaders didn't piddle around with the problem. Instead, you sent your best men right to Washington to deal with the Navy and your Congressional delegation.

He continued, "We faced the same problem where I live in the north. They are closing our base. I like the way you people down here do things."

The visitor was right. The Seminole County Chamber of Commerce did send its best men to Washington. State Senator Mack Cleveland and Randall Chase went to the capital along with John Krider, manager of the senior trade body, and accomplished their mission. The Naval installation will stay. It may even become a permanent fixture.

As most people in this area know, this was not the first time the possibility of losing the base had come into the spotlight. In September of 1956, for example, a move was afoot to move the installation. On this occasion Senator Cleveland, Brailey Odham and Andrew Carraway went to Washington. The result was soon known - the base would remain. In 1957, the problem arose again. Consideration was given to moving the installation to northern

Florida, or possibly to a site in southern Georgia. The Chamber of Commerce here raised \$8,475 in a matter of minutes to keep a representative in Washington in an effort to retain Sanford Naval Air Station. It's still here.

Much can be said about those who have successfully fought to keep the base in Sanford. But not enough has been said about the individuals who from time to time have served unselfishly on the trade body's armed forces committee.

During the most recent and successful fight to keep the base, Senator Cleveland led a committee composed of Carraway, Karlyle Householder, A. K. Shoemaker Jr., Howard Hodges, James Smith and Dr. W. V. Roberts. All of these men are to be "appreciated" for their efforts. In addition to these, thanks is also due to Odham and Gene Tucker. Although they are not now members of the committee, in previous years they were ready, willing and did utilize their time and talent to help Sanford remain the home of this important air arm of our national defense.





transformed into a medieval picturesque fantasia, with an authentic pink foil castle atop the stage area, surrounded by water and greenery, A draw bridge spanned the moat, which was an ingenious replica so descriptive in the legendary and romantic King Arthur Tales.

In the blue irridescent lighting of the dungeon, a ghastly lifelike monstrosity, electrically operated, rose at fifteen minute intervals, from an Iron Maiden, covered with spikes. A boiling vat filled wiith dry ice produced an unusual smoke effect, as a beheaded figure lay lifeless on the guillotine.

The rear of the auditorium was converted into the enchanting Forest of Morgan le Fay, complete with a fluorescent dragon spitting fire from the cave entrance. Unusual lighting effects created an aurora borealis from the waterfall.

Miniature silver war helmets and the summary of Camelot were placed on each table, complete with place cards and napkins embossed with pink castles. The dainty sandwiches were shield and floral shaped, and each individual cake was centered with a miniature sword, symbolic of the Sword in the Stone. The authenticity of the Medieval era was exposed to the final minute detail.

Jeri Wheatland, popular vocalist, represented a comely princess, attired in a pastel pink gown and a sparkling tiara, furnished the musical program, featuring two arias from the album of Camelot. Debbie Dalton, talented dance artist, presented a classical toe hallet to the Camelot Overture.

GOOD OL' FASHIONED

MOSCOW (UPI) - Premier Nikita Khrushchev angrily pledged today he would be "ruthless" against the Communist Chinese whom he charged had brought world communism to the "verge of split."

Shaking his fists, Khrushchev told 6,000 people jamming a Kremlin Soviet-Polish friendship rally that he was now in "open conflict" with the Chinese leaders.

An hour later, Polish Communist Leader Wladyslaw Gomulka rose to declare-for the first time-his party's support for Khrushchev's proposed world Communist summit conference to take action against the Chinese.

Khrushchev accused Peking of "subversive activities seeking to divide and conquer the world Communist movement and said the sino-Soviet conflict was now "much graver" than a theoretical dispute.






