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Stop Reading Word By Word

Ask No Questions, Get No Answers!

Time your reading of column and compare your speed with that indicated at the end. The expected speed assumes a daily five per cent improvement.

If you have a fairly decent grasp of pre-reading from our preceding column, you'll find that unconsciously you have been practicing the next technique: questioning or self-quizzing. Questioning is the natural follow-up of pre-reading and the final step before thorough reading.

This is how questioning works. From your pre-reading

precise as the questions you raise. There is this further advantage in proper questioning: you have completed your summary of your work in question form. Turn them into answers and your summarizing is a very simple matter.

Our next article will be concerned exclusively with speed. Concentrating, pre-reading and questioning are more closely related to understanding than to speed, but they do add speed to your reading by making understanding easier. Up to now we have concentrated on the



of the title page you ask: What is the precise subject and what angle is to be treated here? How is this particular author qualified to deal with it?

You pre-read the table of contents—the author's outline of his book. You saw the whole and all its parts there. You also pre-read at least the beginning and end of his preface, which is his declaration of purpose. Such questions as these will have to be answered in your thorough reading: What is the order of the book's development? What sections are stressed more than others? Why? Does the author prove as much as his preface says he'll prove? Write them all down.

Your pre-reading gave you many answers, but it is at its best when it raises as many right questions as possible. In chapters where pre-reading gave you little or no help, here's a good way of framing the questions. Turn topic sentences in these troublesome areas into questions of "how" or "why."

Questions such as these will suggest themselves from pre-reading most chapters. What evidence does the author marshal? Does he appear to gloss over certain controversial areas, possibly evidence damaging to his case? Why? What authorities does he cite and are they all from the same school of thought? How does this part of the third chapter relate to his final conclusion? These are only a few sample questions.

The main thing is to write the questions down in clear form. Pre-reading is your road map; questioning is the steering wheel. You will get the right questions from your attentive pre-reading; you will get answers from your final reading that are as many and

8 Hurt As Rocket Explodes At Cape

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) — At least eight persons were injured, several seriously, when the third-stage of a Delta rocket apparently kicked into orbit during an indoor test, the Federal Space Agency announced.
Six persons were admitted to hospitals and a Space Agency spokesman said two of them were "in the operating room" undergoing surgery. It was the first major accident involving injuries the Air Force has incurred at this space center.
"Preliminary reports indicated that it (the 'kick') occurred while the spacecraft was being mated to its third stage engine for a series of pre-launch tests," the spokesman said.
The Delta rocket is considered one of the most reliable in the U. S. arsenal. The third stage is a small rocket that gives the satellite the final kick into orbit.
The third stage of the solid fuel rocket engine was attached to an orbiting solar observatory scheduled to be launched next Tuesday, and it was aboard the three-stage Delta rocket.
The accident occurred inside a room where the upper stage and the spacecraft are tested for balance in a simulated flight.
NASA said six persons were taken to the Patrick Air Force Base Hospital and two more to the Cape Canaveral Hospital.

Fire Department Changes Ratified

City Commissioners Monday night ratified changes in the Sanford Fire Department and made at an earlier executive session meeting. The changes will bring the department up to full strength and permit more routine time off for personnel.
The fire chief, Mack N. Cleveland Sr., was authorized to bring the department up to a 25-man force by some new men and replacements for those who have left the local service.
A full "Kelly Day"—an extra 24-hour day off—will be allowed and the chief will prepare a vacation schedule with the men "to harmonize with the work schedule and to post the vacation schedule 30 days before the effective date."
The fire chief is also to work closely through the city manager's office and to keep the Commission informed on the department's status and activities.

Agreement On Paving Reached

County Commission and Casselberry town officials have reached agreement for the paving of Winter Park Drive.
Kenneth McIntosh, town attorney, informed the County Commission the town is ready to place \$20,700 in escrow for materials for the improvement, with the county to perform the actual work.
Commissioner directed County Engineer William Bush to draft plans for a sidewalk along SR 15 for pupils of Lake Monroe School, in response to a request for parents as presented by Mrs. Al Doudney.
The Commission passed over a renewed request by English Estates residents for paving of the south access road to English Estates School until the next budget. The residents said \$9,000 is available in participating funds, and more will be forthcoming later for improvement of the north access road.

City Asks Firm Commitment On Sunland Offer

City Manager Warren E. Knowles was asked Monday night by the City Commission to seek a "firm commitment" on the selling price to the city of the water system in Sunland Estates.
Developer of the housing project, Bralley Odham, had asked whether the city is interested in obtaining the system, noting that it already owns and operates the sewer system there.
He previously had offered the water system to the city for about \$190,000 but no firm figure had been set, the commission noted, for the useable portion of it.
Knowles said he had made an appraisal of that part of the system which could be connected to the city's setup and came up with the figure of \$91,564.81.
"We," he said, "covers the distribution system only with the fire hydrants and the actual house services and meters. The cost figures include city installed costs with labor, equipment, supervision and insurance."
Knowles' \$91,000 figure was declared "too high" by Commissioners Earl Higginbotham and James H. Crappa who suggested the city offer \$50,000 "lock, stock and barrel" for it.
They noted the pumping stations and other water supplying material would be useless to the city should it acquire the system.
An additional outlay of \$38,000 would be needed by the city, it was pointed out, to lay an eight-inch line from the present city lines to Sunland.
Commissioner Joe Baker argued in favor of the purchase, stating the city would realize \$23,000 yearly from users and under present water rates. He noted the cost could be paid off by the city in a relatively few years.
After considerable more discussion, it was decided that Knowles confer with Odham to get a firm commitment on the project.

\$85,000 Budget Approved By Casselberry

For the first time in its history Casselberry has a fiscal budget. Monday night the town council put its stamp of approval on an \$85,000 budget which will govern expenditures made thus far during the current calendar year plus those for the remainder of 1964.
The largest single item of anticipated receipts listed in the budget is \$45,100 expected from Casselberry's share of the cigarette tax and the largest single item of expenditures is \$20,700 for roads and bridges within the corporate limits. This figure will not include \$15,000 which the town will borrow to pay its share of paving Winter Park Drive from SR 44 north to Seminole Boulevard.
The Council approved the borrowing of the \$15,000 at a 3.8 percent interest rate from the Florida State Bank of Sanford. Council Attorney Ken McIntosh was scheduled to notify the County Commission this morning of the Council's action and request that the paving work begin as soon as possible.
In other action, the Council voted to name Dentzel Long as the town's new building inspector, advertise for a public works superintendent, leave the current dog problem up to Mayor Owen Anstey until the Council can find a solution and authorized the town clerk to advertise for bids to pave two sides of a triangle at the intersection of Queens Mirror Circle and Winter Park Drive.
The Council approved an ordinance annexing the area commonly known as Seminole Plaza in the Town of Casselberry.
The Council accepted from the town's zoning board a comprehensive zoning ordinance. Councilmen agreed to meet with County Zoning Director Robert Brown before making a final decision on the proposal.
Several petitions for annexation from various property owners were presented to the Council which instructed Attorney McIntosh to request rulings from the attorney general before any decisions can be made.

Exiles To Hear Brazil Officer

MIAMI (UPI) — Brazilian Adm. Carlos Pennabotto, who played a prominent role in the recent anti-Communist revolt in Brazil, will be among the speakers at a Cuban exile rally Sunday to "pay homage to the anti-Castro Cuban resistance movement."

\$800,000 Sanford Water Job Gets Green Light

An \$800,000 water system improvement program got the green light Monday night of City Commission and bids for the project will be received June 1.

Commissioners approved on second reading an ordinance which will allow the sale of bonds for \$800,000; money which will be used to place another pumping station at the Mayfair Golf Course which will service wells to be sunk there.
The ordinance, which required nearly a half-hour of City Atty. William C. Hutchison to read, was declared an "emergency ordinance" and all legal technicalities will be expedited to bring the project into being.
The bids will be advertised for as quickly as possible and all will be subject to confirmation of the court on the ordinance and awarding of certificates by the bonding company.
This is believed to be a formality but city commissioners insisted that the city not be bound to any contract should a snag appear in the procedure.
Considerable discussion was

increase the proposed salary of a city engineer from \$6,600 to "up to \$7,800" annually so that a competent person can be hired. It is expected the new engineer would be able to take care of the day-to-day supervision demanded by Commissioner Earl Higginbotham.
Higginbotham cited past incidences in which the city had, as he put it, "been stuck for a considerable additional outlay of city funds" when snags developed in the projects.
The commissioner said he was not insinuating Conklin's firm would do this but he wanted the assurance spelled out in "unmistakable language."
The water plant now serving the city and located at French Avenue and W. 13th Street was built by private enterprise in the 1920s and later acquired by the city.
It will continue to function but be augmented by the new plant scheduled to be built west of Highway 17-92 and south of Onora Road.

Mathews Blasts Promises Of Car Tag Cut

Fred O. Dickinson of West Palm Beach and Sen. Scott Kelly of Lakeland were blasted by a fellow candidate for governor today on charges they are trying to fool the voters by promising to reduce automobile tag fees.
Sen. John Mathews Jr., Jacksonville, leveled the charge in Fort Lauderdale, saying the loss of this \$50 to \$70 million in revenue would mean that a sales tax on groceries and medicine would have to be substituted.
"Dickinson and Kelly know this full well but they are not telling you," Mathews said.
"An extension to include food and medicine was advocated by some of the last session of the legislature and I believe it would have passed had not the tag tax raised much of the money needed."
But Dickinson stepped back at opponents pessimistic about reducing the license tag cost and removing price control powers from the state milk commission.

An old-fashioned political rally in behalf of the campaign of Sen. John Mathews for the Democratic nomination for governor will be staged at 7:30 p. m. Wednesday at First Street and Magnolia Avenue.
Speaker will be State Sen. John McCarry, of Fort Pierce, who will be introduced by Dr. W. Vincent Roberts, Seminole County co-chairman of the Mathews campaign. A high school band also will be featured.

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New Bomber A Must, LeMay Warns President

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Gen. Curtis E. LeMay said in testimony made public today he had warned President Johnson that national security "demands" a new bomber to replace America's aging B52s and B58s in the 1970s.

The testimony before the House defense appropriations subcommittee showed the Air Force chief of staff offered to revamp his service's budget to get started on the program.

"I told the President when we appeared before him that I felt so strongly on this—in view of his low budget this year... that I would reprogram some other money to do it if it was necessary," LeMay testified.

Congress has authorized an extra \$52 million for the aircraft's design over the objections of Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara, who feels more studies are needed before such a step is taken.

But LeMay said enough studies had been made already and the delay could hold up development of the bomber by a year.

As for the Air Force's existing bombers, LeMay said: "They cannot last forever..."

He said that even if the United States came up with a perfect missile—and he doubted this—this country would find itself in a "musclebound position" without bombers.

"You are endangering the defense of the country by depending on this weapon system missiles alone because you have no flexibility," LeMay said. "You only have two choices. You are either off the button and are at peace, or you are on the button and you are at war."

LeMay, who once headed the Strategic Air Command, said if action were taken now, the first operational squadron of new bombers could be on the job by 1972.

North Orlando Charter Board Holds First Public Meeting

The first meeting of the North Orlando Charter Board, which was officially elected by registered voters of the village on March 17, was held Saturday with Bob Dean, chairman, presiding. There were 20 persons in attendance.

Among proposed changes in the charter brought before the board at this time were:

Former Mayor W. W. Anderson—(1) change the method of electing a mayor so that all registered voters may cast a ballot in this race; (2) make provisions for a recall election and (3) make it mandatory that any and all forms of bonded indebtedness be put to vote of the people.

Mrs. Mary Campbell suggested that Article 3, Section 31, be changed to prohibit any ordinance being passed by three consecutive readings during a single meeting and a Mr. Carawan stated that he would like it spelled out in the charter that no taxes or assessments could be levied against the people by the council without a referendum.

The unidentified staff of "The Informer," which distributed a mimeographed letter pertaining to the charter board and to alleged statements of the former mayor, was invited to attend the charter board's executive meetings, as well as the regular meetings, in order that the people could be "well informed" as to just what the board is doing at all times.

An executive session will be held Saturday to consider proposals made at the first meeting. The next public meeting will be held at 7 p.m., April 25, in the Civic Building.

It is felt by both the council and the administration that these additions will make for a better student government and in turn a better Lyman school.

As you read this paragraph, place your fingers on your throat. Outside of the normal pulse, is there any other movement there as you read? If there is, you are a word-by-word reader, and your silent reading is no faster than reading aloud. The fellow who mouths his words really betrays himself.

Now read this paragraph. While you are reading it, count out loud till the end of the paragraph. If you are able to get full meaning from what we're saying here while you keep up the count, then you are on your way to phrase reading.

Throughout this series of articles we are going to keep that circle up there at the top. Through the hole you make in that circle, observe a friend's eyes as he reads, then have him count your eye fixations. If he takes 41 fixations for 41 words, he is reading word-by-word.

To cut the number of fixations to a bare minimum, we'll start by reading in phrases. In the following paragraph we'll use larger spaces to separate the phrases. It will help if you focus on the tiny dot above each phrase as you read.

So far—we have learned—the real need—of pre-reading—and questioning—for comprehension—in our reading.

Now we must—place the emphasis—on your eyes.—It is likely—that most of us—are word-by-worders. This paragraph—is just one way—to help become—phrase readers instead. Much practice—is required here,—so don't have—your reading friend—do all the work. Have him observe—your eyes move—from phrase to phrase. There are 31 phrases. There should—

have been—only 31—eye fixations.

We don't have to tell you that you must practice. So, go back with your friend over the preceding paragraph and work for improvement. In the following paragraph, make the phrases yourself. Put diagonal lines between phrases, then read that paragraph in phrases, making use of that peephole.

Now try this. Focus on the third word of the next line. You saw also the second and the fourth words, right? So your eyes naturally take in more than a word at a time; so let them. Besides, phrase-reading is a more intelligent way to read since we don't think in partial ideas.

You marked off the preceding paragraph for phrases. This time let your friend observe your eye fixations. Count your phrases then your eye fixations. Keep an eye-jerk record.

As a final exercise, read the following columns, down the first, then down the second and third. One fixation to a phrase.

If I read word by word, my eyes need help for speed. So we work to improve visual span.

If I can read this short line with one fixation, I'm on my way to increasing speed (comprehension, too) to quick advantage and self-enrichment.

The very precise aim of this exercise is to eliminate as many eye fixations as I possibly can. This requires practice so that I may combine speed and comprehension. You should have completed this reading in 73 seconds. (NEXT: Slow is Not Thorough.)
