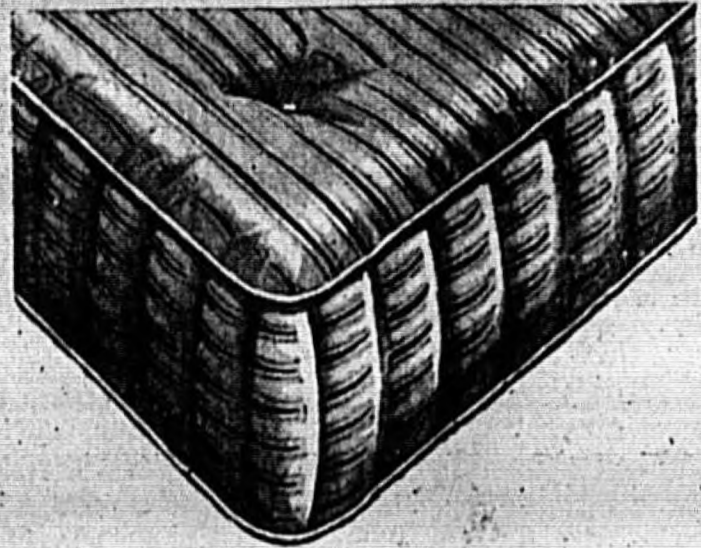

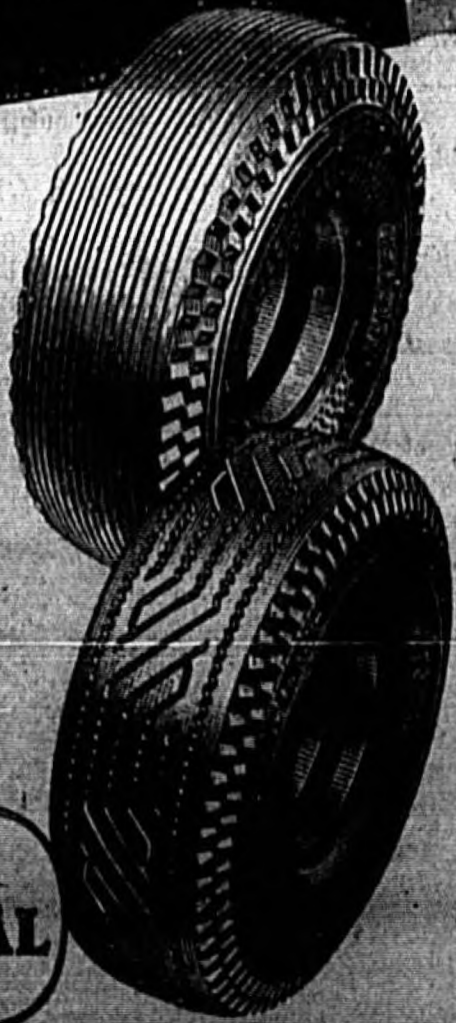

Caldwell Differs With Senate Group On Finance Needs

Governor Appeals To Legislature For Nearly 35 Million In More Revenue

TALLAHASSEE, June 2, (AP)—A \$24,500,000 difference in estimates of state fund needs appeared to be developing between Governor Caldwell and legislative financial leaders today as the Governor prepared to deliver a special message to the Legislature.

Finance and Taxation Committee members who conferred with the Governor today said he indicated to them that \$34,812,000 in additional revenue must be supplied for the next two years if the Legislature is to cover its appropriations and provide the \$10,000,000 cushion against declining revenue that he has requested.

Senate Approves Bill Extending Rent Control

Legislation On Income Tax Slash Is Approved By House

WASHINGTON, June 2, (AP)—The Senate passed on a voice vote today legislation to extend federal rent controls through next Feb. 29. The measure now goes to a conference with the House to iron out broad differences in the two versions of the bill.

Chairman Tobey (R-NH) of the Banking Committee declared the legislation is in such shape that it is in the "best interests of all the people of the country."

Tobey objected particularly to an amendment which permits a 15 per cent increase in rents in cases where the landlord and tenant agree on a lease to carry through 1948. He said this will "nullify rent control."

Allan F. Powers Dies As Result Of Auto Accident

Allan F. Powers of Maitland, formerly of Belmont, Mass., died early Friday morning as he was being rushed to the hospital in the Erickson ambulance following the wrecking of his 1942 Buick sedan at Twenty-fifth Street and the Orlando Highway.

Archie A. Garwood, 41 year old resident of Lake Monroe, died yesterday morning in an Orlando hospital following an illness of more than a year. He had been confined to the hospital for six weeks.

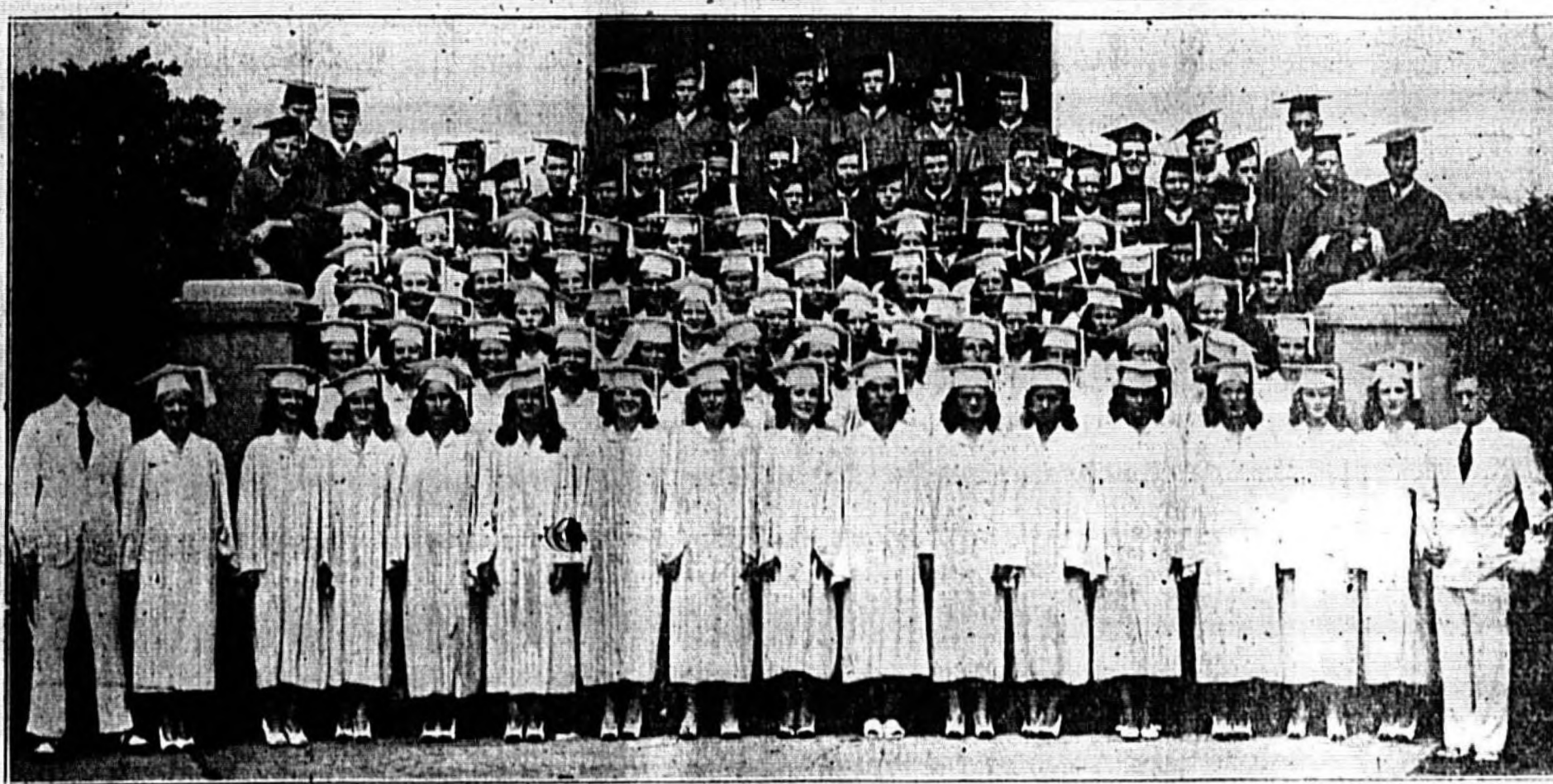

SHANGHAI, June 2, (AP)—Police and the military cracked down on students in widely-separated parts of China today to block a scheduled nation-wide demonstration...

The Chinese press reported raids were carried out at Mukden, Hangchow, Wuchang, Foochow, Kaifeng, Chungking and Tientsin. The newspaper Ta Kung Pao said two students were killed and two wounded in Chungking where garrison troops arrested "more than 1,000 suspects" in a midnight raid.

Power Company Plans \$85,000,000 Expansion

MELBOURNE, June 2 (Special)—A jump in its state-wide expansion program from \$27,500,000 to \$85,000,000 to pace Florida's growth during the next five years was announced Saturday by McGregor Smith of Miami, president of Florida Power and Light Company.

Here for the municipal celebration marking completion of Melbourne's new million dollar causeway over the Indian River to the beach. The utility executive said surveys indicate the territory served by his company will have a population of 50,000 in 1951 compared with about 820,000 today.

The \$85,000,000 expansion program Smith said will give the company an electric generating capacity of 470,000 kilowatts more than 300 per cent increase over the 1939 capacity of 180,000 kilowatts.

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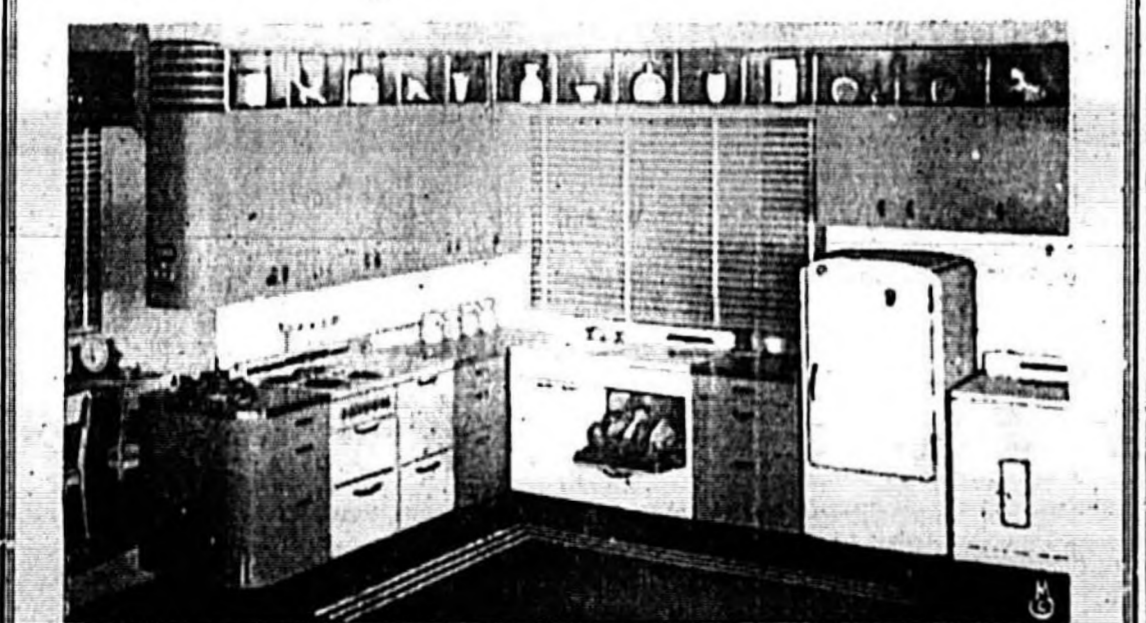

ACL President Gratified Over Report Of ICC

NEW YORK, June 2. (AP)—Directors of Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Co. today authorized acceptance of a reorganization plan for the Florida East Coast Railway Co. under which that road would be merged with the Atlantic Coast Line.

WILMINGTON, N. C., June 2. (Special)—C. M. Davis, president, Atlantic Coast Line Railroad, told representatives of the press Saturday that he has had opportunity to review the Third Supplemental Report and Order of the Interstate Commerce Commission in Florida East Coast Railway Company reorganization, which report and order was released on May 20.

Mr. Davis said that a special meeting of the Coast Line's Board of Directors has been called for Monday, June 2nd, to take the necessary formal action to recommend acceptance of the terms of the plan approved by the Commission.

Mr. Davis reminded that the previous report of the Commission were published before hearings upon the Atlantic Coast Line's merger plan were held, and therefore before the important question of the public interest was injected.

The record upon which those earlier reports were based contained principally discussion of financial details, etc., no representations having then been before the Commission with respect to requirements of the public interest as to control and future operation of the Florida East Coast Railway property.

"My first reaction upon reading the report," Mr. Davis said, "was a feeling of gratification that the Commission had found, on basis of the extensive record, that it will be in the public interest for Coast Line to control the Florida East Coast Railway property."

"And when and if the plan of reorganization now just approved by the Commission is confirmed by the Federal Court and when that plan is consummated, it is the earnest desire of Coast Line management to continue to render such transportation service to the east coast of Florida as to justify the Commission's expressed confidence in Coast Line control and operation of the FEC property, and to warrant approval of such control and operation by patrons of the railroad."

State Finance Needs

(Continued from Page One) the final week of the biennial session opened with no definite program for raising new revenues in sight.

The Governor sent word to the House and Senate that he would like to address them during the day. He did not say, in his formal message, what he would like to discuss but there was only one main subject before the Legislature and he told reporters he would talk about "finances."

His message followed an appeal by Speaker Thomas D. Beasley for the House to raise "seven to eight million dollars" in new taxes to keep the Legislature from leaving Florida's school teachers "holding the bag" by virtue of a fund shortage.

A move to bring a 3-percent gross receipts tax out of the Senate Finance and Taxation committee was delayed pending a joint meeting of the House and Senate to hear the Governor.

The Legislature passed and sent to the Governor a bill extending Florida's bribery laws to cover attempts to influence legislative actions and candidates as well as members. The measure, was passed by both branches without a dissenting vote.

The bill was recommended by the special Leon county grand jury which last week indicted Rep. Bernice C. Papy on two charges of attempting to bribe members of the Legislature but said it found no law to cover two other alleged offenses.

The grand jury also said Dewey Hooten, House engraving clerk, had testified before the bill designed to curb race bookmaking at this session.

Neither of those alleged bribe attempts was a violation of Florida law, the grand jury found. It indicted Papy for attempting to bribe Reps. Odham of Seminole and Camp of Marion to vote against the bill. With a motion to expel him pending before the House, Papy resigned from the Legislature last Friday.

The House today passed, and sent to the Senate a bill authorizing free Florida auto license tags for totally and permanently disabled war veterans. Rep. Wilson of Columbia, steering the bill to passage, said only about 1,000 bona fide residents of Florida with service-connected total and permanent disability could comply with the law and it would cost the state about \$15,000 a year in tax revenues.

A bill to establish a five-day, 40-hour week for employees of seven state departments was defeated 43-26, by the House. Supporters said all departments whose heads had objected had been eliminated from the bill and that the 40-hour week actually would add an hour to the present schedule while giving employees all day Saturday off. They now work Saturday morning.

SHIPMENTS OF SPRING PRODUCE IS DIMINISHING

JACKSONVILLE, June 2. (Special)—Diminishing offerings of spring produce, the opening of the watermelon movement, current conditions effecting other crops and the outlook for summer and fall featured the Florida agricultural scene this week-end.

Heavy shipments of various spring crops are still going forward, the peak of the movement has passed, and reports received in Jacksonville offices of William L. Wilson, Director of State Markets indicated that the center of interest will shift rapidly in the next few weeks, to other crops, and to the normal summer-season activities which form an all-important part in the year-round Florida program of production of fruits, vegetables and other products.

"Right now," said the Markets Director, "I'd like to call the attention of Florida housewives to the importance of canning and preserving foodstuffs, for family use later in the year. Normally at this season, as tomato shipments slow down, there are available in producing areas large quantities of this important food product which are too ripe for handling in a commercial way."

These red-ripe, vine-matured tomatoes are at the finest possible stage for food purposes, and large quantities are normally canned by thrifty Florida women. In the producing areas prices for these tomatoes are usually reasonable, and in some instances growers give them away to people who come to the farm and pick the fruit from the vines. Of course there are other products suitable for canning, which are available at various points throughout the State. The fortunate ones who are able to take advantage of the present available opportunities will benefit in health and pocketbook, through the months ahead, when fresh products are not so readily available.

"Some weeks ago I mentioned the poultry products outlook. It was not bright from the consumer's standpoint. I haven't noticed any material improvement in the intervening period. In view of the apparent certainty of light supplies for next fall and winter, I feel it is unusually important for Florida farmers, and others who are in position to handle poultry to maintain their flocks at as near normal levels as possible. Families able to keep enough hens to supply their own table with eggs, and poultry will benefit decidedly, and it looks to me as though those who have such products to sell can be pretty sure of good prices for some months to come."

Pro-western Hungarians have seen a Communist coup, aimed at a police state, in these shifts in which Hungary got a new premier and a new foreign minister, both reputed to be pro-Communist members of Nagy's majority small landholders party.

Nagy, who meanwhile is on a Swiss vacation and has not returned to Hungary, was replaced Saturday by Lajos Dinnyes.

The ex-premier was accused of taking part in a revolutionary conspiracy in purported depositions from Hungarian politicians quoted in all Budapest newspapers yesterday. These supposed depositions were taken by Russian military authorities in Hungary.

A man in high position who was close to Nagy and his family said that interior minister Laszlo Rajk, a Communist, objected, permitting the former premier's four-year-old son, Laci Nagy, to leave the country. This man said that the Hungarian Communists wished to hold the child as a political hostage to prevent his father from doing anything "rash."

The informant said, however, that despite this the Russians had already granted clearance for Laci and a nurse and chauffeur to take him out of the country along with the former prime minister's "mess," high black peasant's boots, which Nagy asked for apparently in a moment of nostalgia.

A reliable informant said today that Bela Varga, speaker of the house and No. 2 man in the government of former premier Ferenc Nagy, had fled Hungary to avoid Communist arrest and was presumed to be in the American zone of Austria.

POPE PIUS XII MAKES PLEA TO PEACE-MAKERS

VATICAN CITY, June 2. (AP)—Pope Pius XII today portrayed "fruitless conferences succeeding one another" and appealed to the world's peace-makers to grasp the remaining opportunities to restore normal relations among nations. "The peoples, bitterly deluded in their desire for order, peace and reconstruction, are coming to lose patience and hope," the Pontiff said; but he admonished them: "Fear not."

"There is always room for a necessity," he added. "May the rulers of the states not let slip this opportunity; it may be, God forbid, the last opportunity." The Pope spoke after receiving the cardinal's greeting on his name day. The address was broadcast in several languages by the Vatican radio.

Pope Pius said stalemated commerce and unemployment in some nations might spread to others in the near future. "The prosperity of nations cannot be safe and secure if all do not share in it."

Bookie Bill Comes To Life Again But 'Is Knocked In Head'

Legislature Dilly-dallies On Taxes But Hears Plea For 3% Gross Sales Tax

TALLAHASSEE, June 3, (AP)—The rebounding "bookie bill" which has provided the greatest sensation of the 1947 Florida Legislature was revived and knocked in the head again today.

Finances remained the No. 1 question in the closing days of the biennial session, with the focus on differences of millions in the estimates of needs supported by Governor Caldwell and legislative taxation leaders. Nearly all finance activity still was in committees, however.

Despite Governor Caldwell's estimate that \$34,800,000 must be raised, there was a strong tendency in the Legislature not to attempt to produce any appreciable part of that sum.

Sales tax foes received public assurance from Rep. Murray, of Polk, chairman of the House Finance Committee, that there would be no need for passage of such a bill at this session.

A fourth, new version of the bill denying telegraph and telephone services to race bookmakers, which brought on bribery charges that led to indictment and resignation of Rep. Bernie Papp of Monroe, was brought in by the rules committee at the top of the calendar today.

It immediately was ruled out of order and sent to the railroads, telegraph and telephone committee which has defeated or withheld approval of three predecessors.

A motion to withdraw it from the calendar was defeated.

New Government Of Hungary Will Recall Envoys

BUDAPEST, June 3, (AP)—Hungarian political informants said today Hungarian representatives abroad, including Aladar Stegedy, Maszok, minister at Washington, would be recalled to the capital by the new Communist-dominated Hungarian government. The diplomats are to "report to the government," the informants said.

Prominent among those said to be scheduled for recall were Paul Auer at Paris, who was pro-West, and a number of others who left Hungary and Ferenc Gerdon, minister at Bern, a friend of, former Premier Ferenc Nagy, who resigned as head of the government last week while on vacation in Switzerland.

Developments in the Hungarian political situation moved swiftly. It was announced that the new premier, Lajos Dinnyes, the left-wing small holder, had chosen two Communists to head his office's press department.

Rumors circulated without confirmation, that minister of Finance Laslo Rak, a Communist who several times has threatened to expel the foreign press, planned finally to do so when the Hungarian peace treaty was ratified.

An allied diplomatic source said today that Bela Varga, speaker of the house who fled Hungary yesterday in Paris, a Communist, had crossed the Russian zone of Austria without incident and is now "in a safe place."

Ringling Re-instated As Head Of Circus

DOVER, Del., June 3, (AP)—The Supreme Court of Delaware today reinstated Robert E. Ringling, 50 of New York, as president of the Ringling Bros.—Barnum and Bailey Combined Shows Inc.

The court's decision, also removed James A. Haley, John Ringling North and James E. Griffin, who claim the offices of president, first vice president and secretary-treasurer, respectively, by enjoining them from "in any manner interfering with the conduct of the business and affairs" of the circus.

REAL ESTATE SALE

One of the largest real estate deals this year was the purchase by E. W. Eaton of five different tracts of vegetable producing land located in Black Hammock and the Orlando and Chululota sections from E. F. Long and wife.

The land, developed and undeveloped, totals more than 250 acres. Various stamps on the deed indicate that the purchase price was \$80,000.

124 Receive Diplomas At SHS Exercises

Graduation Program Planned By Students, Announced By S. Dingfelder

Actual demonstrations of how modern, audio-visual methods of education have supplanted those of the "horse and buggy" days in preparing modern youth for world citizenship provided the theme last evening of the highly impressive graduation exercises at Seminole High School in a program planned by the senior students in which the usual outside speaker was dispensed with.

Principal Herman E. Morris presented diplomas to the 62 boys and 62 girls of the graduation class following the regular program which was announced by Simon Dingfelder, president of the Senior Class.

Pointing out that it is now a "Must" for a youth with a high school diploma to become a "world citizen" in view of rapid progress in transportation and communication, he declared that education and its methods of instruction must correspondingly raise its tempo.

Judging student intelligence by which page he was on in a certain speller or reader went out with the horse and buggy, said Dingfelder, who added that as spheres of influence widen, so education must expand its scope.

Seminole High School is fortunate, he continued, "in having as its principal, Herman E. Morris and a faculty that keeps abreast of the newest methods in audio-visual, manual, laboratory and the learning-by-doing system of education. We proudly acknowledge that we have earned a high rank among high schools of similar enrollment in the Southern Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges."

Almost the entire platform was taken up for the program with a large globe spotlighting the world citizenship theme, and against the backdrop in large letters the motto: "Progress through knowledge."

The act of Chapultepec called for elimination of Nazi influences in this hemisphere. The United States has demanded that Argentina fulfill these commitments before this country will negotiate a proposed inter-American mutual defense pact.

The White House statement gave no clear indication whether the United States considers satisfactory the most recent steps which the Argentine government has undertaken to clean house of Nazi influences.

Ten days ago the Argentines aimed a new series of actions at alleged Nazis in their country. Foreign Minister Bramuglia said at the time that this cleaned the slate of commitments under the Chapultepec pact.

Additional Students Arrested In China

SHANGHAI, June 3, (AP)—The arrest of 140 students and a professor at Tsingtao was reported today as students in Shanghai and Peking boycotted classes, expressing resentment against crackdowns yesterday by police and soldiers to forestall anti-Chinese war demonstrations.

Chinese press dispatches said at least 50 students and several professors of Shantung University at Tsingtao were beaten in a clash with soldiers Monday night. Earlier, the newspaper "King Tao" reported three students were killed at Hankow and two others killed and two seriously wounded at Chungking in fights with police.

Curley To Ask Court To Reconsider Case

BOSTON, June 3, (AP)—Mayor James M. Curley will appeal to the U. S. Supreme Court to reconsider its refusal to reverse his conviction on mail fraud charges. The 73-year-old former governor and congressman said last night his counsel would file the petition within 25 days and indicated he had no intention of resigning even he had to serve the city of 300,000 from jail.

Curley faces a 6 to 18 months jail term and \$1,000 fine. He was convicted as one of a group who allegedly falsely represented they could obtain government contracts for elephants.

JACKSONVILLE, June 3, (AP)—No fatal accidents occurred during more than 18,000 hours flown in the Naval Air Advanced Training Command in May, the first calendar month in the Command's history during which there was no fatal crashes.

Navy Unit Establishes Record In Safe Flying
WASHINGTON, June 3, (AP)—The \$4,000,000, 500-a-year income tax cut cleared the Senate today and headed for the White House, where its fate is uncertain. The compromise bill, worked out by a House-Senate committee, passed the Senate by a 48 to 25 vote, short of the two-thirds majority which would be required to override a veto.

House Committee Decides To Study Military Training

WASHINGTON, June 3, (AP)—A congressional examination of universal military training is ordered today after Karl Compton, chairman of a special presidential commission, warned that present safeguards against international " intrigue backed by force" are insufficient.

The House Armed Services Committee will begin public hearings on the proposal in a week or ten days. Its decision came little more than an hour after Compton's telegram to Chairman Andrew (R-NY), termed the international situation "too serious to justify delay or to gamble on other solutions."

"There is no certainty that an intrigue backed with force has been abandoned as an instrument of national aggrandizement, and unhappily, the present actual evidence in some quarters points otherwise."

Andrews declined to guess whether Congress will pass universal training legislation during this session, but indications elsewhere pointed to no final action at least until the next session, beginning in January.

Andrews said Compton and his associates on the president's commission will be the first witnesses. They will testify on their recommendations for the compulsory training of up to 850,000 American youths a year at a cost of between \$1,750,000,000 to \$2,000,000,000. They will be followed by testimony from national representatives of civilian groups, among them the veterans groups and their auxiliaries, and then by chiefs of the War, Navy and State Departments.

Landis Says Russian Airlines Are Inferior
WASHINGTON, June 3, (AP)—James H. Landis, chairman of the Civil Aeronautics Board, said today that Russian airline services "are infinitely inferior" to American and that neither the Soviets nor the British threaten this country's supremacy in commercial flying.

Landis testified before the Senate Commerce Committee which is studying a bill to force merger of United States international airlines into a single company. Opposing it, Landis stated a policy is "the path to socialism."

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Britain Gives India Choice Of Own Rule

Transfer Of Power Will Take Place This Year On Dominion Status Basis

NEW DELHI, June 3, (AP)—Rival Indian leaders advised the Viceroy today they would divide the vast country between Muslims and non-Muslims and take over power from the British as peacefully as they knew how.

This would mean the creation of two nations, each among the largest in the world in population, but in resources, it meant the creation of one relatively powerful nation composed mostly of Hindus and one far less powerful nation containing the vast bulk of the Moslem population.

LONDON, June 3, (AP)—The British Government announced today that it will transfer power in India to the Indians almost immediately and leave it to the Indian people to decide whether these shall be one or two governments.

The announcement was made simultaneously by Prime Minister Attlee in the House of Commons, by the Viceroy Lord Mountbatten, in a broadcast to the Indian people and by the British Government in a White Paper.

Legislation will be introduced during the present session of Parliament for the transfer of power. This will give a dominion status to one or two Indian governments, depending on which system the Indian people subscribe to.

Thus until the absolute withdrawal of the British, scheduled for July 1, 1948, India will be composed of one or two self-governing countries which will belong to the British Commonwealth of Nations.

Attlee said the new British plan, with its offer of temporary dominion status, had been "favorably received" by the leaders of the Indian people.

The Secretary of State testified before the House Armed Services Committee in support of legislation authorizing the President to send peacekeeping military missions to foreign "some other country" will.

Asked by Rep. Charles (R-Ill.) if passage of the legislation would create any adverse feeling on the part of Russia, Marshall replied: "No more than they have now, with respect to our mission in China."

He emphasized in response to another question by Attlee that it is not the intention of the legislation that the United States should assume the burden of policing the entire world.

Hobby Pullen has been selected by the Elks; Louis Reynolds by the Kiwanis; Bobby Park by Rotary; Porter Lansing by the Lions and Key Shoemaker by the Jaycees. Character and scholastic leadership were the basis of the selections.

Advisers to the five boys include Simon Dingfelder, who last year was Commissioner of Agriculture at Boy's State; Francis Wilson, who was Superintendent of Public Instruction, and Edward Marshall, Junior High School instructor.

OCALA, June 3, (AP)—Two young Harvard University students, both members of prominent Ocala families, were fatally injured shortly after midnight this morning in an automobile accident three miles north of Belleview on State Road 500.

They were J. J. Taylor, Jr., 20, son of the head of the Ocala Manufacturing Company, one of the county's largest landowners, and J. J. Rus, 21, son of the superintendent of Swift and Company's packing plant here.

Taylor and Rus in a car driven by the former were traveling north when the car swerved slightly on to the shoulder of the highway and went out of control, turning over several times. Taylor was killed instantly. Rus died in the local hospital shortly afterwards.
