

Tuberculosis Xrays

. The State Mobile Xray Unit is expected to arrive in Sanford tomorrow morning and will remain for the rest of the week for the purpose of Xraying everyone in Seminole County over 15 years of age to see for sure whether they have tuberculosis. There will be two Xray units operating in this county, one in the various county towns, the other

Under the present system approximately 150 persons can be Xrayed every hour. A person does not even have to take his shirt off. He simply steps in front of the machine and it is done in less than a minute. It does not cost him a cent, and a confidential report will be sent later revealing what the findings are.

And in this connection, xrays afford the best 'way of discovering tuberculosis in the early stages. No matter how sure you are that you do not have tuberculosis, no matter how healthy you are and always have been, you can't be sure that somewhere down there in your lungs that little bug is not at work and will some day, probably sooner than later, lay you flat on your back. That is, you can't be sure unless you have an xray made.

The advantage of discovering twoerculosis in its early stages is that it can be cured. We have heard people say, "I don't want to be xrayed. If I've got it, I don't want to know anything about it". Well, such an attitude is an open invitation to death. Tuberculosis is simple enough to cure in its early stages; but almost impossible after it has been allowed to develop.

So everyone, if he wants to live long, and stay healthy, should-make it a point to have this xray made. More than that, he should make it a point to see that just as many THAT SEW THE WIND REAP to the attention of his employees and encourage them.
