

Flags fly at half-mast for former Police Chief Butler

SANFORD — Ben Butler, a 34-year veteran of the Sanford Police Department and former member of the Coast Guard, died Friday morning.

Sanford Mayor Brady Lessard ordered all the city's flags at half-mast for the remainder of the day referring to it "as a sad day for the police department."

The 72-year-old Butler was born on Sept. 5, 1929, and served with the police department from July 1951 to April 1985. He was the department's chief from 1967 to 1985 when he retired. He spent the majority of his life in Sanford and was considered a "father figure" too many.

"He hired me originally, and I was his assistant than successor," said Seminole County Sheriff's Office Chief Deputy Steve Harriett. "He was one of the primary mentors in my personal and professional development. I admired the man — he was a major mentor. My father was a key figure in my life but he's right up there, too."

According to Harriett, Butler was a chief who demanded respect, but was also approachable by all of the community and his officers.

"He always had his finger on the pulse of the community," Harriett said. "He would handle even trivial issues personally. That's something I learned from him. Every problem needs attention and to be accessible and interact with the members of the community."

Harriett said Butler led a disciplined police force that helped establish "the good quality of life" in Sanford. Harriett called him the "precursor" to community policing, 50 years before it was given that title.

"I want the people of Sanford to know that part of their history is passing here today," Harriett said. Visitation will be from 6 to 8 p.m. Monday at Baldwin Fairchild Oaklawn Chapel at 500 County Road 46A in Sanford. The funeral service is tentatively scheduled to be at 10 a.m. Tuesday at Central Baptist Church at 3101 W. First Street in Sanford.

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Commission readies for redistricting

2000 U.S. Census population figures create major changes to boundaries

With little expected opposition, county commissioners will hear revisions to the district boundaries as a result of the 2000 U.S. Census in a 1:30 p.m. Tuesday public hearing.

"People forget that we have districts," said Commissioner Randy Morris, "the are not single-member districts, but we have them."

Unlike neighboring counties, the often controversial issue of reapportionment is going relatively unnoticed in Seminole mainly because commissioners are voted at-large. Recent troubles have been heard

from Orange County, which has single-member districts, and Volusia County, which is mixed with a majority of the seats in single-member districts and the remaining being at-large districts.

"I feel when you're elected county wide, you are more accountable," Commissioner Daryl McLain said. "I'd personally rather have the chance to vote on all of them."

According to Morris, in the past two charter amendment committees, last year

and six years ago, the idea of changing Seminole to single-member districts was brought up, but rejected.

Al Hill, manager of the county's geographic information services, couldn't be happier that the county commissioners are voted at-large because his department helped develop the numerous drafts for the new district boundaries.

"Orange County is getting all the press because of all the issues they've had," Hill said. "There's been no interest (in

Seminole) at all — basically it's a non-issue."

Hill who worked with Volusia reapportionment in 1991 said he has had "a much easier time down here" due to the way commissioners are elected. Hill also noted Seminole's ethnicity is spread throughout the county, giving no one district the possibility of having a dominant black or Hispanic population.

"It was all investigated, but it didn't effect the process," Hill said.

The only two rules, mandated by law, Hill was required to use was to make all the districts as close to 73,039 residents as possible and to redistrict so a county or

Judge Perry presides over swearing-in ceremony for son

Almost two years ago, Jaimon Perry watched his father, James, be sworn in as an 18th Judicial Circuit judge.

Last month, the roles were somewhat reversed when James not only watched, but actually conducted, the formal investiture officially making his son a lawyer.

Jaimon was sworn in on Sept. 19, less than two years after his father was sworn in as Seminole County's first black judge. It was the second time in less than a decade the Perry family gathered together to watch one of their own become part of Florida's judicial system.

Riverwalk funding now in jeopardy

Governor projects at least \$1 billion in cuts to cover state budget deficit

SANFORD — Plans to reconstruct Sanford's 80-year-old seawall may come to a halt as Governor Jeb Bush and state lawmakers sharpen their budget axes to make up for a shortfall in state revenue.

The legislature is expected to meet in special session, possibly as early as this month, to prevent a growing budget deficit that began even before the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11.

Members of the state's Revenue Estimating Conference projected a \$673 million deficit in this year's budget just days after the attacks in New York and Washington D.C. That projection does not take into account the effects the attacks will have on Florida's tourism industry. Bush anticipates cutting at least \$1 billion from the state budget.

Legislators say everything will be on the table during the special session, from an across-the-board 5 percent slash in state spending to hundreds of precision cuts of local projects like Sanford's \$7 million seawall and Riverwalk construction.

"I'm very concerned about the funding for the Riverwalk," Lessard said. "This is a linchpin project for Sanford and the things we want to accomplish. This city needs the Riverwalk project."

Lessard said the city is working with the local legislative delegation, including Speaker of the

House Tom Feeney, to protect state funding for the project.

In addition, Lessard and City Manager Tony VanDerworp are expected to travel to Tallahassee next week to meet with Bush to make their case.

The state constitution requires a balanced budget, and state statutes outline 17 guidelines the governor should use to develop a plan for reducing expenditures.

"My understanding is the governor and his staff will be looking very hard at those criteria," VanDerworp said. "That's where our focus will be."

In an Oct. 2 memo sent to the city's lobbyist, former Lt. Gov. Bobby Brantley, VanDerworp argues funding for the Riverwalk project is protected by nine of the 17 criteria, including:

- The Riverwalk is not a recurring funding request.
• The project is fully implemented. To date, the city has spent \$208,000 in design and geotechnical analysis, and has executed contracts another \$450,000 for final design and permitting. Construction bids will be sent out in February 2002.
• Revoking the \$3 million in state funding would cause the

Hagerty discusses possible funding cuts in education

SANFORD — A "State of the Seminole County Schools" presentation by Superintendent Paul Hagerty Wednesday night touched on a gamut of concerns from teacher shortages to a possible budget crunch.

"Overall, Seminole County is in great shape and will be in good shape for years to come," Hagerty said as he shared the capital improvements planned over the next 10 years with the Council of Local Governments in Seminole County (CALNO).

Many of the projects are heavily funded from the recent passing of the one-cent sales tax extension. Hagerty speculated if Volusia and Lake counties will have the same relative ease passing similar referendums after the recent tragedies. Volusia voters will go to the polls Tuesday while Lake voters will wait until November.

Hagerty also shared some of his frustrations with the FCAT and how schools are graded based on students' performances on the test. He said about 25 years ago, only one-quarter of the students who graduated from high school took algebra, but now it is required for graduation.

"We have ratcheted up expectations

across the board," Hagerty said. "This is a very sophisticated high level test, and I don't know if the public is aware of what's happening in education."

Sanford City Commissioner Art Woodruff, who is also an Oviedo High School teacher, invited commissioners to take the test "to see what these students are having to do. It's not pretty."

As for the school grades given out by the state, Hagerty urged the city commissioners to "take them with a grain salt" as they are "not yet a perfect way to reflect test data."

According to Hagerty, in a recent discussion with Lt. Gov. Frank Brogan, he

was told "education will be sharing the pain" as Florida cuts funding in the wake of the terrorist attacks.

Hagerty said he told Brogan if that were true, then schools shall not be caught into all this categorical money like in last year's state budget and would need more discretionary funds in the upcoming budget.

With current class sizes in Seminole schools between 20 and 25 students, Hagerty warned commissioners that may change with possible funding cuts from the state. He said to decrease each class in

Don't cut Riverwalk funds

If there were any doubts about an economic slowdown in the United States, they were blown away in the aftermath of the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11. The signs were there all along — the dotcom busts, the repeated interest rate cuts by the Federal Reserve to kick-start the economy — but 10 years of riding an unprecedented bull market lulled many to inflated expectations that could never be sustained.

Now comes the morning-after realization that the party's over and it's time to cure the boom years hangover. Governor Jeb Bush and state legislators face the task of balancing a state budget \$1 billion short of revenues. Cuts will have to be made, and everyone will have to share the pain. But before the state begins cleaving away large chunks of the budget, the governor needs known the importance of Riverwalk project in Sanford.

Yes, at first glance the Riverwalk looks ripe for cutting. It will add amenities to the city's waterfront — places to fish, places to bike and jog and skate, places to relax and enjoy the beauty of Central Florida. However, the heart of the project is the restoration of the seawall. The state should protect funding for the Riverwalk project for these reasons:

- First and foremost, the seawall needs to be reconstructed. It's 80 years old and badly deteriorating in several places. Failure to act now puts the city in a precarious position. How much longer before the seawall collapse and dumps Seminole Boulevard into Lake Monroe? How much longer will the leaky joints and the substandard sheet pilings keep Lake Monroe from turning downtown into Central Florida's newest water attraction? The economy is bad enough without Knight's Shoe Store and the Colonial Room being chased away from downtown by the rising waters of the St. Johns River.

- Long before there were talks of billion-dollar budget cuts, Peter Sechler and his team at Glatting Jackson noted that this project is primarily about replacing the seawall. The amenities aren't pork-barrel spending. They're an updating of the infrastructure that will be uprooted and destroyed while this massive reconstruction project occurs.

- Second, the state is getting a bargain price because the federal government is supplying more than half the money for the project. In tight financial times, the state should move forward with any project that uses a substantial amount of outside funding.

- Third, the Riverwalk project will assist in the revitalization of downtown Sanford. It won't be the sole catalyst for revitalization, but it is an important first step. Tough economic times will not always be with us, but if Sanford is to take advantage of brighter financial days, it needs the proper infrastructure in place. Now's the time to do it, not later when the costs and the needs will require a greater state commitment.

The governor and the legislature must make some tough decisions to balance the budget. They must also make the right ones. Maintaining funding for the Riverwalk project is the right decision.

Time to tighten city budget

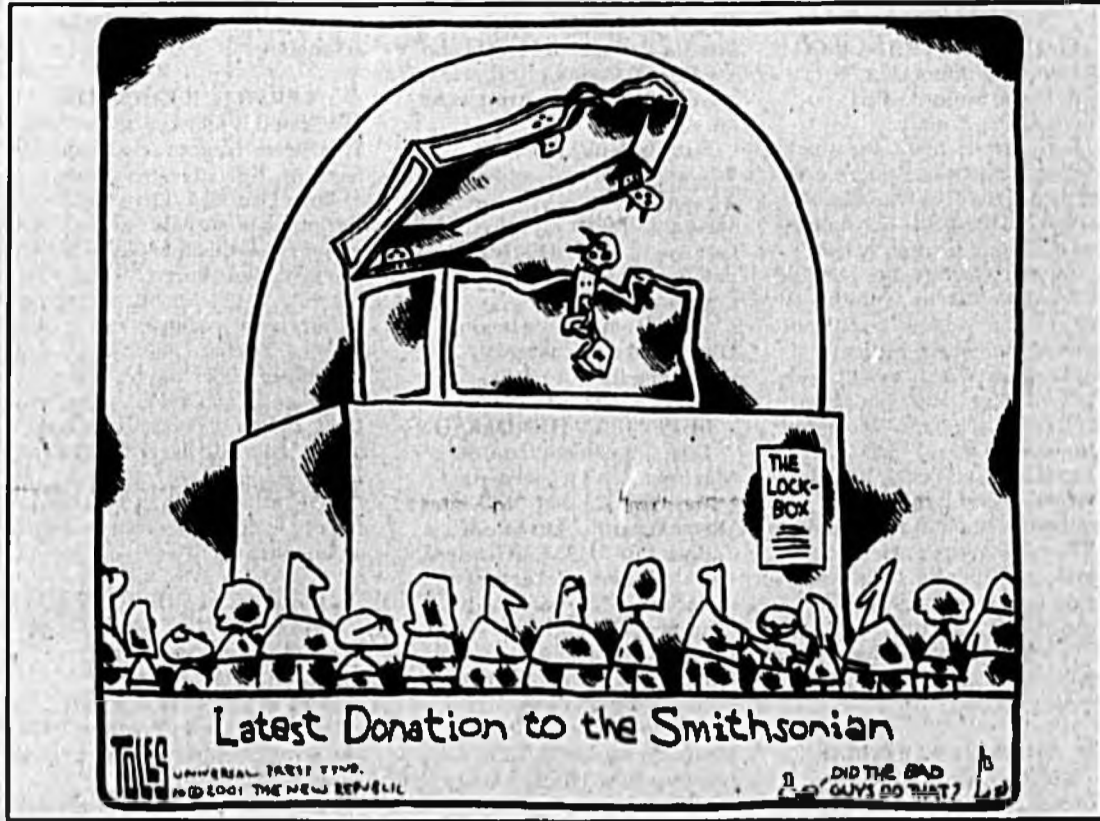
Governor Bush is not the only one who must tighten his financial belt. City leaders must find ways to be more efficient with local government. This is not a reaction brought on by the events of Sept. 11. The city is not running a deficit or being mismanaged, but it is in need of a good austerity program:

Case in point is the city's millage rate. At 6.625 mills, Sanford residents pay the highest municipal ad valorem taxes in the county, and it's nearly double the rate Lake Mary residents pay. Let's not kid ourselves. Sanford's millage rate will probably never be as low as Lake Mary's — Sanford has more needs and provides more services — but that's no reason to shy away from responsibly alicing the rate.

The argument to cut the millage rate is not solely about saving taxpayers money, either. The city needs more revitalization and economic development, not just downtown, but in Pinecrest, along U.S. 17/92 and Sanford Avenue, in Goldsboro and in Georgetown. The city also needs to rebuild or replace critical infrastructure — better street lights, sewers and roads; and a new police station and fire headquarters. It must keep up with ever-increasing health insurance costs for employees and ensure those employees are well trained and compensated. All of these things take money.

Part of that money will come from broadening the tax base. The mall, new stores and restaurants, they all help to spread the tax burden. But growth alone won't pay for everything, and growth brings with it additional costs. So where does the money come from? With a millage rate of 6.625 mills, the city won't get it by raising property taxes unless it intends to run everyone out of town. The money must come through tighter fiscal policies.

We're not encouraging draconian cuts in service or even layoffs. However, the city commission must begin now formulating policies that strongly emphasize cost containment. Not only will it provide the city with revenue for needed projects, but it will prevent Sanford leaders from facing a budget crisis like the one our state legislators must currently deal with. It's better to make fiscal decisions when you want to rather than when you have to.

1970 Seminole team set aside racial tensions

To the editor:

1970 was an historic year in Sanford and at Seminole High School in particular. It was highlighted by the merger of Sanford's two high schools, Crooms High School, a predominantly Afro-American school, and Seminole High School, a predominantly Caucasian school.

As might be expected from such a merger, which included the displacement of Crooms' students from their school to Seminole High, racial tensions existed, causing severe problems that resulted in school closure on more than one occasion. Both high schools had lost their heretofore valued identity.

Gaining a new one under these conditions would be tough. The athletes who made the varsity football team that summer managed to put aside racial and political differences to become one of Seminole's best teams. Comprised of 20 seniors from the Class of 1971, 13 juniors, two sophomores and led by coach Tom Perrin, they came together not as black or white, but as a team. The impact on Seminole High as a result was substantial, and the school seemed to come together as a group. Sanford's Municipal Stadium on Mellonville Avenue was filled to capacity for home games and crowds at away games routinely were much larger than the host team's crowds.

Sanfordites supported the team, home or away, to witness a bunch of guys who joined forces to produce an undefeated regular season record of 10-0. Despite their perfect record and domination of opponents, which included an offensive average of 36.5 points per game and a defensive average of 6.9 points per game, the Fighting Seminoles did not qualify for the

state playoffs. The increased student population as a result of the school merger put Seminole High in a higher classification. The football team paid the price for having scheduled to play one less team in its classification for state playoff qualifying.

The Seminoles settled for a spot in the Sentinel Star Bowl, which they lost on a last-minute field goal, but for which they were later rewarded with a win because of ineligible Edgewater High players. The Seminoles finished with a perfect 11-0 record.

The Seminole High School Class of 1971 will always be remembered as the transition year in Sanford between the races, and the fall of 1970 as the Year of the Seminole.

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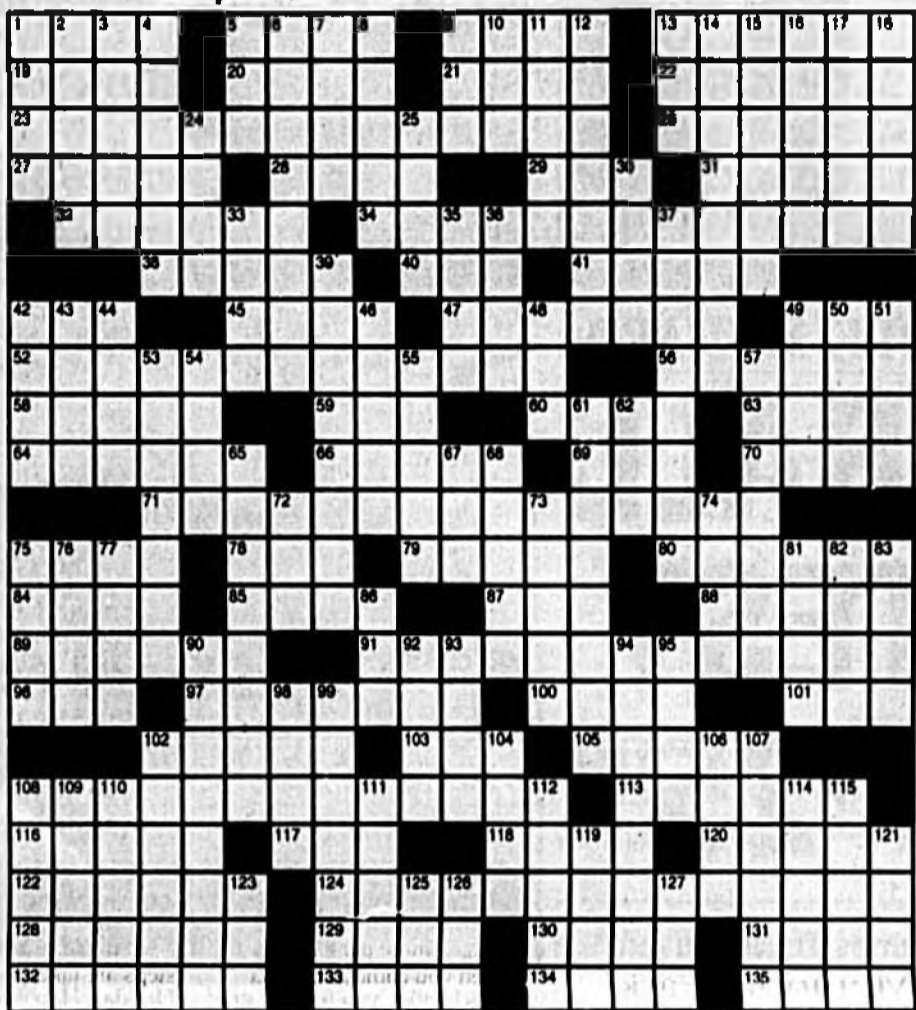

The Way We Were: 'Whiskey Ring' conspirator may have used kickbacks to purchase Sanford land

Charlie Carlson gave me the following with permission to publish it. It is an exciting find, and we are grateful to these two researchers for their work in uncovering this bit of Sanford's history. As Charlie said, "Not only does it bring lost history to light, it causes some other mysteries and implications that need exploring."

Lost History Discovered

For three months Christine Best and Charlie Carlson have been secretly sitting on a major piece of lost history from Sanford's past. Although they were not sure of what they had found, it all began while researching Swedes on the 1876 Trafford map. What they saw was the faint name "Gen. Babcock," a landowner on the southside of Crystal Lake.

The abbreviation "Gen." led them to think this had to be an unknown general living across the lake from Henry Sanford's Belair Grove, but with just a last name it would be difficult to prove anything.

They made a quick check of local references but found nothing. There were no land records, strongly suggesting that the land had been purchased with cash directly from Henry Sanford.

Then Charlie looked up the name in military records and found one "O.E. Babcock" listed in the register of general officers. Chris hit the Internet searching through hundreds of documents and genealogy web pages trying to connect this Babcock with the one found on the old map.

Their research produced a historical treasure-trove on O.E. Babcock, but no proof that he was the one at Crystal Lake. They found that General Orville E. Babcock had been a Union General during the Civil War

and had graduated from West Point with George Armstrong Custer. During the war, Babcock served as General Ulysses S. Grant's aide-de-camp and was the Union officer who escorted General Robert E. Lee to the surrender at Appomattox. Civil War photograph collections are filled with pictures of General Babcock next to General Grant, but this still did not mean that he was the Babcock discovered on Crystal Lake.

Further research found that when Ulysses S. Grant became president, he made O.E. Babcock the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Grounds in Washington D.C. During this time he landscaped the White House with new lawns, fountains and trees. It was Babcock who landscaped Lafayette Square and the Washington monument, where a pond was known as "Babcock Lake." The president brought Orville Babcock to the White House as his private secretary. Nobody got to see the president without first going through General Babcock.

But in 1875, O.E. Babcock's career took a wrong-turn when he was indicted in one of the nation's greatest scandals, "the Whiskey Ring conspiracy." Several high-ranking government officials were indicted for taking kickbacks from whiskey distillers. The scheme worked by charging distilleries less tax than was due and would kick back about half of the unpaid tax to corrupt officials in Washington. This cost the U. S. Treasury millions of dollars in lost revenue.

Those indicted, including O.E. Babcock, went on trial in St. Louis. It has been described in some accounts as one of the biggest trials in U.S. history. President Grant intervened on behalf of his long-time friend, General Babcock, and used his political influence to get an acquittal. One witness testifying in favor of Babcock was General William S. Harney, for whom Lake Harney is named.

Orville Babcock returned to Washington D.C. only to be caught in another Grant administration scandal, called the

"Safe Burglary Conspiracy." Again, the president managed to get an acquittal for his old friend. Still Carlson and Best had not linked this General Babcock to the one they had uncovered in Sanford's history.

The Grant administration decided that O.E. Babcock was too controversial to share the limelight with the president, so Grant appointed him to the job of Chief Inspector of Lighthouses. In 1883, Babcock supervised the completion of the Sandy Point lighthouse in Maryland. Then he was sent to Florida to build the lighthouse at Mosquito Inlet, the one that is still standing today as the historic Ponce Inlet Lighthouse.

Bingo! (As an historian would say.)

Carlson and Best knew they were on to something. This was only 30-odd miles away from Crystal Lake. The two historians then located and ordered 12 letters of O.E. Babcock from the Illinois Historical Society.

Then Alicia Clarke of the Sanford Museum found a single Babcock letter in the Sanford papers, it referred to a deed and was signed, "O. E. Babcock."

In the Illinois letters, Babcock writes to his son about the grove on Crystal Lake. This was the proving link to lost history, General Orville E. Babcock had a place and grove on Crystal Lake.

Things got more interesting when it was discovered that Babcock had bought his property from Henry Sanford on Christmas Day 1874. Just two weeks earlier, Martha B. Amory had bought an adjacent tract from Henry Sanford. She was the wife of Charles Amory, close friends of Henry Sanford, who owned what became the Mayfair Country Club. Carlson and Best wondered why she, instead of her husband, had purchased the property, and why so close in time and location to General Babcock's land purchase.

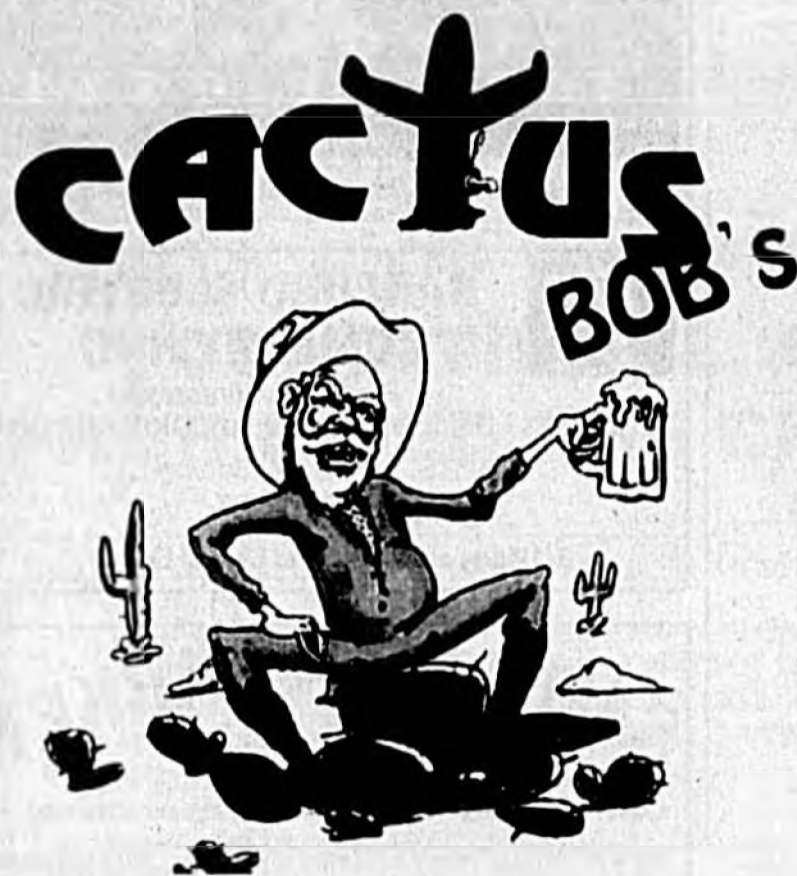
Best did some genealogical research and found the "B" in Martha's name was the initial for "Babcock." Two months

 later, Orville Babcock buys 23 more acres from Henry Sanford for a total of 53 acres.

General Orville Babcock called his property "Baobee" which turns out to be a Romanian name. The main overseer for the Babcock place in 1875 was Nels Julius Stenstrom, grandfather of former senator

Douglas Stenstrom. In 1879, Babcock purchased another 13 acres from Henry Sanford.

Since these purchases had occurred during the time of the Whiskey Ring scheme, could it be that some of the money had come from kickbacks? That certainly remains a mystery worthy of pursuit.

Orville Babcock did not live to

see the completion of the Ponce Inlet lighthouse. he drowned in the inlet in June 1884, while unloading a supply boat. General Orville E. Babcock is buried in Arlington cemetery, but he was very much a part of Sanford's past.

Booklet to be Published
 As noted, above, this find

came to light while Charlie and Chris were researching the Swedes. The results of this research will be published in "A History of Swedes in Seminole County," a Sanford Historical Society sponsored booklet.

It will be on sale at the Sanford Museum by the end of November. The cost is \$6.

city to lose substantial federal money, specifically \$3.946 million in Federal Highway Administration and Federal Donor Bonus Funds.

- Priorating the project is not an option because reconstructing small portions of the seawall does not solve the overall structural problems.

- The Riverwalk has statewide benefits for users of the St. Johns River.

- The city, not the state is administering the design, permitting and construction of the project and therefore funding is not a state agency expense.

- The public's health, safety and welfare would be adversely affected if the seawall is not reconstructed. VanDerworp said continued deterioration of the seawall will lead to the collapse of the structure's backfill material and undermine Seminole Boulevard; damage existing

storm sewers, potable water mains, electric and gas service, telecommunications cable and reclaimed water lines; and cause flooding of downtown buildings and stormwater backup.

VanDerworp also notes that seepage through the deteriorated seawall is the "primary contributor of pollutants and sediments to Lake Monroe," which will lead to depleted oxygen levels causing fish kills.

The Riverwalk project is not traditionally funded by the private sector.

The seawall reconstruction is not duplicated by another branch of government.

Lessard said the city is exploring contingencies if the state cuts funding for the Riverwalk.

At Monday's City Commission meeting, the mayor is expected to provide details of a cost-cutting program he began formulating in April.

"We may explore using city funds as seed money until we can be assured the state is going to come through," Lessard said.

Still, Lessard is not sure the city can cover the entire state funding, and he is hopeful local officials can convince legislators to spare the Riverwalk from the chopping block.

"We're going to see what kind of mayor and city commission the city of Sanford has," Lessard said. "It's going to take a very coordinated effort by the city and our legislative delegation to keep this project on track."

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Seminole Cultural Arts Council awards \$27,000 in grants

SANFORD — School and cultural arts organizations in Seminole County received a helping hand last month when the area's Arts Council awarded more than \$27,000 in grants.

The 2001-2002 Seminole Cultural Arts Council grants were awarded to 28 Seminole County non-profit organizations and public schools, Seminole Cultural Arts Council President Ron Rose said. Since the Council was organized in 1994, more than \$80,000 has been awarded in grants to local organizations and schools.

"The Seminole Cultural Arts Council is the voice for the arts in Seminole County," Rose said. "We are a catalyst and a strong advocate for the preservation of local cultural and historic heritage, including performing, literary, visual arts and sciences, and serves to sustain, develop and advance the cultural life of Seminole County."

Money for the grants is raised through the sale of Florida's "State of the Arts" license plate. The Seminole Cultural Arts Council receives \$20 from each plate sold in

Seminole County, which in turn is distributed to various programs within the county.

"That's why we encourage people to get the license plate," Rose said. "The money stays in Seminole County."

Non-profit organizations and schools are selected to receive grant money following an application and selection process, Rose said. The Council's Review Committee — comprised of Seminole County business and community members, professional non-profit administrators, artists and educators — uses a point system to determine what percentage of an organization's request is funded.

There are four grant categories, including youth activities sponsored by Seminole County cultural and historical organizations; cultural activities in Seminole County Public Schools; non-cultural groups producing cultural or historical program or projects in Seminole County; and general programming support for new Seminole County cultural or historical organizations. the county by one student costs \$3 million.

"The class size is really one of our most significant pieces in our funding," Hagerly said.

In light of the attacks, Hagerly also addressed several safety concerns of the school system. He said the day after the attacks, two bomb scares were reported at schools.

"People think bomb threats are a cute prank, but it's criminal activity," Hagerly said.

He noted that Escambia County schools alone had 30 bomb threats last month. In an effort to curb threats, the schools have teamed with the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, and part of the new prevention will be a \$1,000 fine to bomb threat callers.

In another collaboration, Seminole Public Schools, Seminole Community College and the University of Central Florida are working together to solve the teacher shortage felt nationwide.

The three education systems are encouraging people who have, or had, the desire of becoming a teacher to consider going back to school and receive

training. On Wednesday, individuals who wanted to learn more about becoming a teacher were invited to an information meeting. Hagerly said they expected about 40 people and ended up with a standing room only crowd of about 250 people.

"We said if you have any inspiration of being a teacher, come on over and we will help you," Hagerly said.

"It was a wonderful experience," Jaimon said. "And, I think it was kind of historic — having a father who is a judge, especially an African-American judge, swear his son in as a lawyer."

Jaimon Perry's educational career spans two states. A graduate of Lake Mary High School, he completed his undergraduate work at the University of Florida where he majored in finance.

After receiving his bachelor's

degree, Jaimon began working as an accountant while trying to begin a career as a financial analyst. However, as time went on and he didn't find the opportunities he was looking for, he decided to turn to law. He eventually passed the LSAT (a law test used by law schools for admittance) and enrolled in law school at Georgia State.

"I knew there would be different opportunities offered to me," Jaimon said. "While in law school, I knew I wanted to enter the legal practice."

Jaimon did well in law school. He graduated in the top 30 of his class, and when he passed the Florida Bar Exam, he began working at Akerman, Senterfitt and Eldson, one of Orlando's largest law firms.

As for following in his father's footsteps, the 28-year-old attorney said the decision to practice law was supported by James Perry, but Jaimon never felt like it was a decision he had to make.

"My father has inspired pretty much everything I do in life," Jaimon said. "But, he has also let us make our own decisions and our own mistakes."

Nevertheless, the judge feels honored his son decided to follow a career path similar to his own.

"It's a wonderful feeling to have a child follow in your footsteps," James Perry said. "It's the greatest compliment a parent can have."

Perry, and his wife, Adrienne, are proud of all three of their children. Their oldest son, Willis, is a human resource manager, and their daughter, Kamilah, is in law school.

"My wife and I did a high five the other night and told each other we made it," James said. "I am more blessed than one person deserves, and I am very grateful."

Last month's swearing in ceremony was a reminder to James Perry of how well his children and family have done in their

lives.

"It was the ultimate high for me," James said. "During the ceremony, it was very hard to keep a straight face — I was so proud."

However, the judge's compassion is not limited to his family. Each time he sees a new lawyer making his or her first appearance in front of the bench, he always has a kind word to say.

"When I see a lawyer who is just starting out, I pull them aside and congratulate them on a job well done," James said. "Everybody started some place, no matter who we are."

For Jaimon, his start is at the Orlando law firm, where he works on commercial litigation. In the future, he may continue to follow his father's career choices.

"Becoming a judge would be a great opportunity," Jaimon said. "To interpret the law the way you believe it should be interpreted — that would be wonderful."

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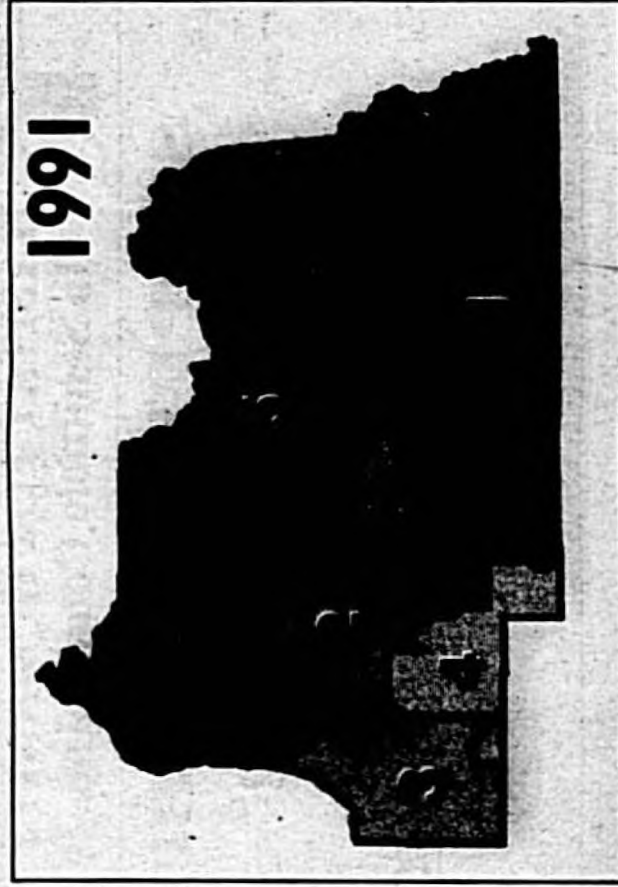

 school board commissioner still lived in his or her district. The district boundaries are the same for both sets of commissioners.

Despite lack of controversy, major changes are planned in the proposed redistricting map partly because of the huge population explosion in south Oviedo. After 10 years, Commissioner Grant Maloy's current District 1 population ballooned to 90,355, almost 30,000 more people than the smallest district.

With Maloy's district being slashed in size and several other changes, the new districts are

closer to equality in geographical size. Currently, the two largest districts are Maloy's District 1, which is 87 square miles and McLain's District 5, which is 175 square miles.

With the proposed reapportionment, Maloy's district will decrease by 10 percent and McLain's district will also decrease by almost 34 percent. The biggest gain from the geographical shift could be Morris' District 2, which is proposed to grow from 40 square miles to 100 square miles.

"We're getting population balance and a little bit more geo-

graphical balance," Morris said. Morris also noted that the rural eastern portion of the county is also getting more balance, as his district is proposed to take over

the Geneva area from McLain. With his added presence in the east, there will be three commissioners instead of two.

Special-opportunity dove fields offer great prospects

OCALA — Dove hunters have some excellent hunting opportunities this year with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's (FWC) special-opportunity dove hunts throughout the state. In central Florida they are offered on three wildlife management areas (WMA) - Caravelle Ranch WMA in Putnam County, Dexter/Mary Farms Unit of Lake George WMA in Volusia County; and Bull Creek WMA in Osceola County.

Regular and combination (youth/adult) daily permits for each WMA went on sale at specific vendors on Sept. 22 and are available for each hunt on a first-come, first-served basis. The permits cost \$35.50 each for a regular permit, and \$45.50 each for a combination permit. A combination permit allows an adult and a youth under the age of 16 to hunt together and for each to harvest a daily bag limit of birds. Regular permits allow an adult, or an adult and a minor under the age of 16 to hunt together, but allows only one daily limit of birds to be harvested between the two.

The daily bag limit is 12 doves per hunter, which can include no more than four white-winged doves. Shooting hours are from noon until sunset. In addition to a special-opportunity dove permit, hunters must also have a valid Florida hunting license (unless exempt), and a Migratory Bird Permit, or have the H.I.P. box checked on their hunting license. Hunting licenses and Migratory Bird Permits may be obtained from county tax collectors or their subagents, by calling 1-888-HUNT-FLORIDA (1-888-486-8356), or through the Internet at www.Angler.com.

Caravelle Ranch WMA, located in Putnam County, has four 50-acre special-opportunity dove hunt fields, and offers five hunts (Oct. 13; Nov. 24; Dec. 8 & 22; Jan. 5). Last year hunters bagged 665 doves on opening day, and 1,170 for the season. There are about 40 daily hunt permits available for each of the six dove hunts at Caravelle WMA which may be purchased on a first-come, first-served basis from Advantage Sports Center, 13426 NE Highway 19 in Salt Springs, phone 352-685-2277.

"After all the recent rains, things are very wet at the moment but we have lots of millet down and there are plenty of birds here right now so I anticipate a good hunt," said Dan Miller, district biologist for Caravelle.

On Dexter/Mary Farms Unit of Lake George WMA in Volusia County, there are about 10 daily permits available for each of five hunts (Nov. 10 & 24; Dec. 8, 22; Jan. 5). Last year hunters bagged 176 at Dexter/Mary Farms on the first weekend of dove season, and 619 for the season. Permits are available on a first-come, first-served basis from Parramores Campground, 1675 South Moon Road, Astor, phone 386-749-2721.

With all of the recent rains in the area, the dove fields are fairly wet and some roads accessing them have been degraded. Hunters should come to the Dexter/Mary See Outdoors, Page 3B

On his fourth trip, the 22-year-old outfielder got to help his team, laying down a sacrifice bunt.

Then came the ninth inning of a 3-3 game and he led off with a booming double to the warning track in right-center field. After a sacrifice and a pair of intentional walks, the younger Raines

scored the game-winning run when Brady Anderson drew a walk.

But on Wednesday, the dream became a fantasy when Tim Sr. was traded to the Baltimore Orioles for a player to be named later.

Tim Jr. was in a shopping mall when Tim Sr. called him on a cell phone to break the news. Tim Jr. actually thought he was kidding, but was pleasantly surprised.

That night, the duo, wearing the same black, orange and white team colors they wore at Seminole High School, became just the second father-son duo to play on the same team at the same time when Sr. entered the game as the designated hitter in the sixth inning and lined out hard to right-center with Jr. on second base.

Tim Jr. had doubled and scored in the first inning and then grounded out before singling, stealing his first career base, going to third on an error and scoring again.

In the sixth inning he walked and went to second on a walk before Tim Sr. flew out.

Tim Jr. lined out to left in the ninth inning and Tim Sr. had a sacrifice fly.

Lopez was not about to be undone in this one, tripling in three runs, singling in another, drawing a walk and flying out to Tim Jr. in deep center as he led the Toronto Blue Jays to a 7-6 win.

On Thursday night against the Boston Red Sox and Hideo Nomo, the Raines' again tied the Griffey's, becoming the second father-son duo to start in the same outfield, Tim Sr. in left and Tim Jr. in center.

Tim Jr. singled in the first, stole second, went to third on a wild pitch and scored a run, but then made outs his next three at bats. He also had two put outs.

Tim Sr. went 0-for-4 with an RBI ground out in the ninth inning and had a put out in left, but the Orioles against lost by one run, 5-4.

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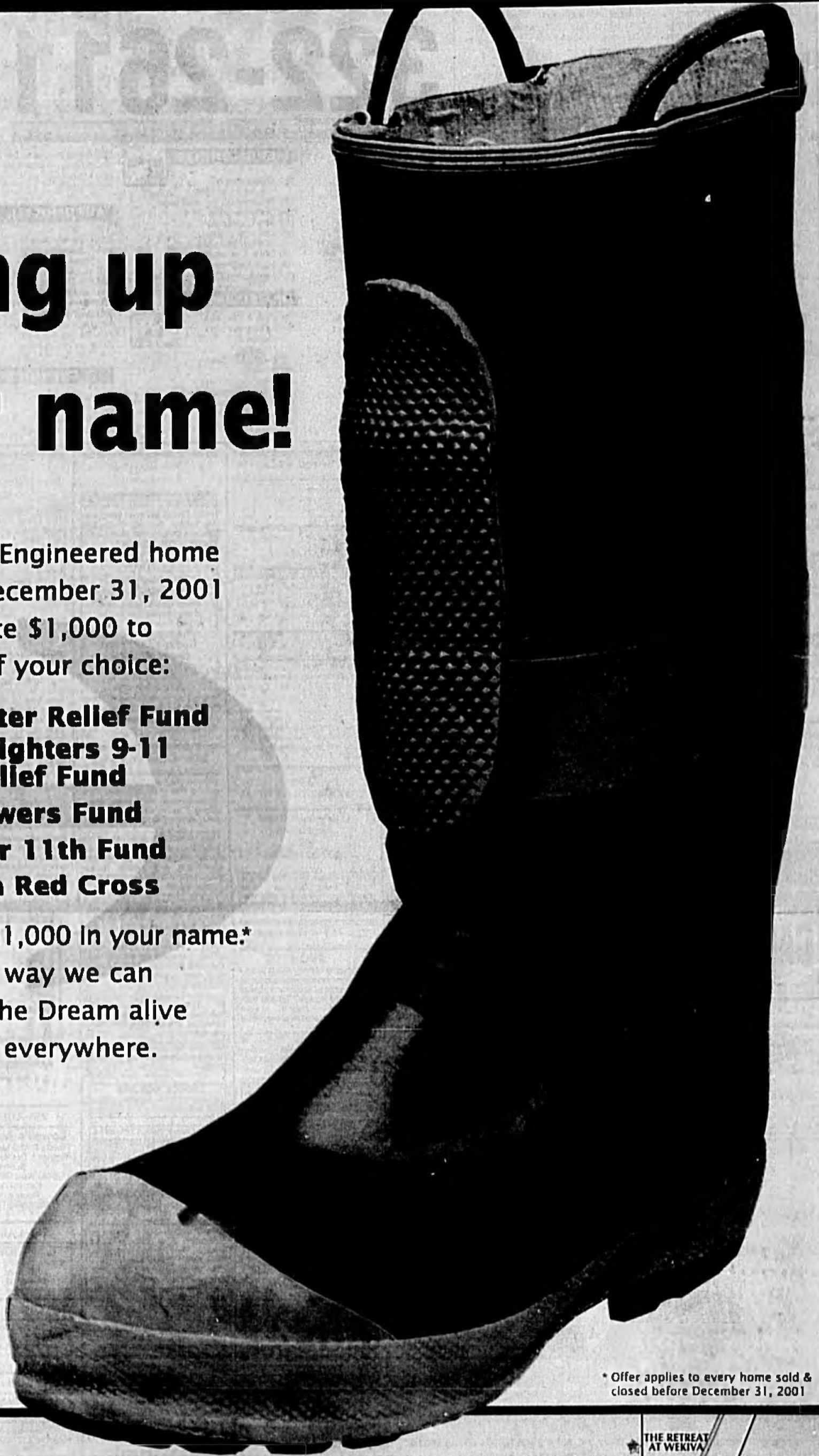
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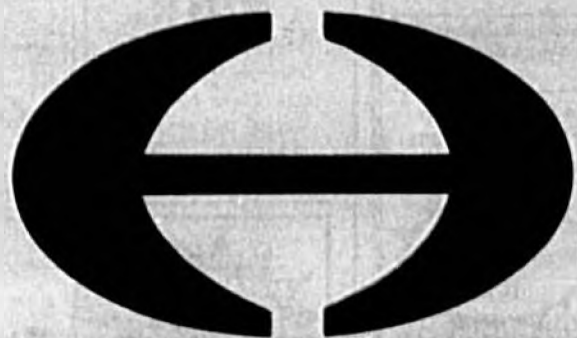
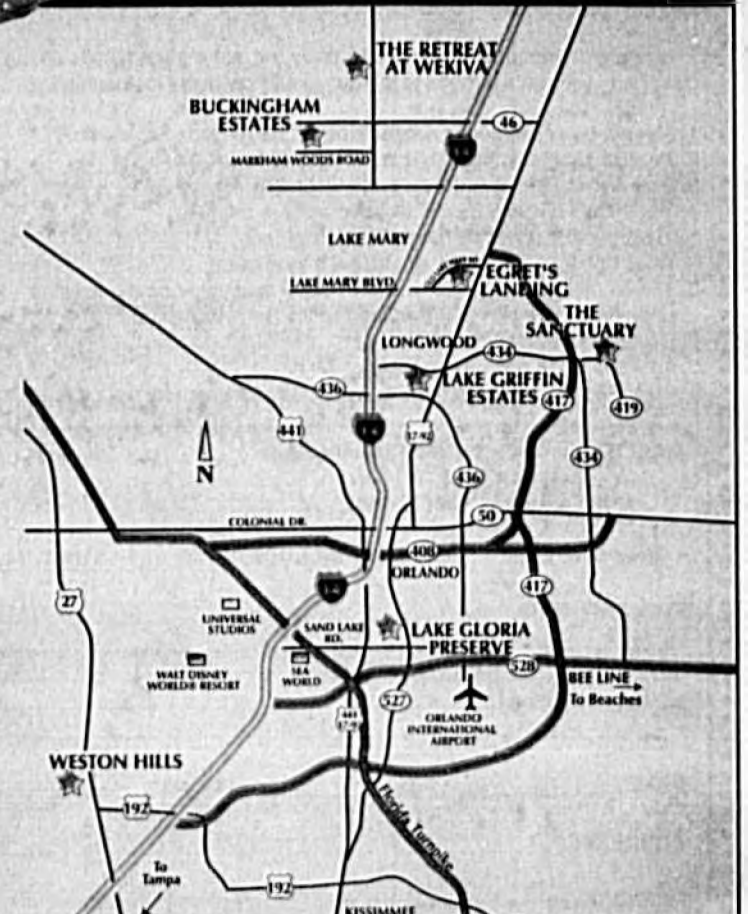

Economic Importance

The larvae and adults feed on the foliage and the fruit by piercing the epidermis with their mouthparts. They prefer the young foliage. The thrips destroys the cells on which they feed causing some leaf distortion, injury to fruit and leaves, and leaving unsightly dark colored droplets or blotches of excrement on the leaf surface. Honeydew excreted by red-banded thrips will promote growth of black sooty mold on affected plants.

Where these thrips are abundant, leaf drop can occur and may cause serious defoliation of trees. Over the last few years, sweetgum trees start to show symp-

toms of their damage about the middle of the month of August.

Back in 1997, there was a serious outbreak of this insect in Seminole County. They also feed on the surface of Muscadine grapes scarring the fruits by their feeding action.

Description

The female is about 1/25 inch long, and has a dark brown to black body with a visible red pigment in the first three abdominal segments. Wings are dark, long and narrow and fringed with long hairs. The male is similar but smaller and is seldom found.

The larvae is light yellow to orange with the first two abdominal segments colored bright red. The nymph and

pupa are light yellow to orange with first three and last segments of the abdomen red but only immature thrips have the bright red bands. The life cycle is completed in Florida in about 3 weeks, and there are several generations a year depending on the weather conditions.

Eggs of the red-banded thrips are inserted singly under the epidermis of the undersurface of leaves. Each egg site is covered with a drop of excreta that hardens and provides protection. Larvae and adults feed on foliage rupturing the epidermis with their mouthparts, killing the cells at the feeding site.

Leaves suspected of being infested with thrips should be shaken over a white sheet

of paper to better observe the insects. A 10-power magnifying glass or hand lens will also aid in their detection.

Control

Insecticidal soaps can be purchased for controlling insects and related pests. If one of the commercial soaps is unavailable, 4 tablespoons of liquid dishwashing soap per gallon of water may be applied as a foliar spray to the plants. Repeat weekly until the problem is controlled. Soap is effective in controlling thrips and safe for people and the environment.

Chemical controls are not always necessary for this thrips, as natural controls are apparently affective most of the time. If chemical con-

trol is necessary, apply one of the suggested insecticides such as orthene, malathion or Sevin.

Spray the plants to the point of runoff. Be especially careful to cover the undersides of the leaves. Continue to inspect the plants periodically and apply an insecticide only if plants become re-infested. Insecticides are poisons and should be handled as such.

Read the manufacturer's label carefully before opening the container and observe all instructions and precautions.

Lost & found

Minuscule microchips help reunite pets with their owner.

Hurricane season is a reminder to many that an effective disaster plan is needed to remain safe during an emergency. However, people don't always realize family pets can also be victims.

That's why Dr. Carmen Battaglia recently visited several Florida chapters of the American Kennel Club (AKC) to promote the organization's Companion Animal Recovery program. Sponsored by the AKC, the program provides pet owners with a unique way to ID their pets during this year's hurricane season.

According to Battaglia, Companion Animal Recovery (CAR) program president, a rice-sized microchip can help reunite a pet with its owner. The microchip identifies an animal for life, even without a collar.

Available from many local veterinarians, the retrieval system involves injecting the microchip under the skin between the shoulder blades of a dog or a cat, in much the same way a vaccine is administered — and as painless.

Each chip has a unique 10 digit code that must be registered with the CAR program by completing an enrollment form. When a lost pet arrives at a shelter or veterinarian clinic, a special hand-held scanner is passed over the animal's shoulder blades. An identification code locates the owner, who is immediately contacted.

"We want to make sure every pet that is separated from its owner during severe weather can be reunited with that family," Battaglia said. "It is so easy to have one's pet microchipped

and enrolled in the database, it would be heartbreaking to let that be the one thing to keep a pet and its owner apart."

The microchip doesn't just help in times of natural disasters. Sometimes, tags are not enough. Battaglia gives the example of Django, a gray and white tabby, whose collar came off when she was hit by a car.

The cat was taken to an emergency vet clinic, a veterinarian found her microchip, and her owners were contacted. Django's collar was found much later lying in the road where she was hit.

The microchip isn't only available to cats and dogs. Of the more than 1 million animals enrolled in the CAR program, 156 are rabbits, seven are rodents, 253 are ferrets, and there is even one cow registered. All animal species, regardless of age or size, are eligible to enroll.

Since 1995, more than 50,000 pets have been returned to their owners as a result of the program. In Florida, there are 76,095 animals enrolled in CAR, and 4,454 have been returned to owners after being lost.

According to Battaglia, the cost of the microchip is between \$30 and \$50, and the cost of enrolling an animal in the CAR program is \$12.50, which includes lifetime enrollment and recovery services.

For information about microchipping your pet, call a local veterinarian and ask about the CAR program.

Red-Banded Thrips: Small but troublesome

The red-banded thrips, was first described from specimens from Guadeloupe, West Indies, where it was causing considerable damage to cacao. The red-banded thrips, is a tropical species found throughout Florida. Thrips are very small insects, less than 1/25 inch long. Many gardeners may see the damage caused by thrips and never realize that

this little insect can produce a lot of damage.

Distribution

This insect occurs world wide, but found mainly in tropical and sub-tropical areas. In Florida, it is found from Key West all the way up to Seminole County.

Hosts

This thrips is a pest of

many plants.

Its host plants include both fruit and shade trees and numerous woody ornamental shrubs and vines, such as avocado, lychee nut, tung, acacia, persimmon, sweetgum, Brazil pepper tree, and pyracantha. In the West Indies it has been a serious pest of cacao and mango.

The favorite tropical fruit hosts in Florida are mango

The museum is one of the oldest structures in Lake Mary. For many years, it even served as city hall. It is the only historical structure in Lake Mary that is owned by the city and therefore the only one that can be protected. And yet someone came up with the misguided idea to move it.

Sure, the Egyptian government moved a lot of historical monuments when they built the Aswan dam, but that was to save them. Of course, the Egyptian government also permanently destroyed Egyptian historical sites and Nubian historical sites. (Nubia was a country south of Egypt with a culture that rivaled that of Egypt.)

There is not a valid reason to move the Lake Mary Historical Museum and destroy part of Lake Mary's history. If you think Lake Mary's history should be saved, call Lake Mary City Hall and let them know. The number is 407-324-3000.

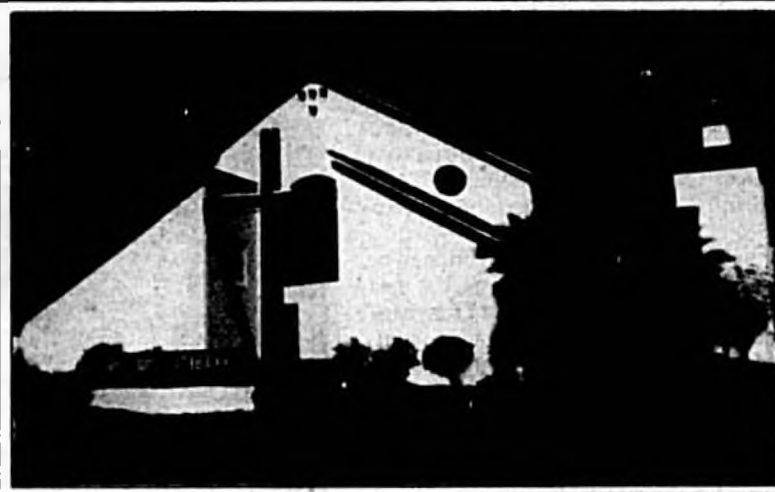
