All the nations of Europe  
 with the exception of Finland,

 War, notified Uncle Sam the  
 other day, as they have frequently

 ment due on their notes at this  
 time. You would think that  
 Uncle Sam would have learned  
 his lesson, that he should neither  
 borrow nor lend to them.

Nations requiring additional  
 revenue in more additional costs  
 are asking the Interstate Com-  
 merce Commission for an  
 increase in freight rates which  
 they expect will net them over  
 half a billion dollars a year.  
 Such an increase may mean ad-  
 ditional freight charges of \$400,  
 000 a year for Sanford farmers,  
 already wondering where the  
 money for their present freight  
 bills is coming from. And in-  
 cidentally, increased freight rates  
 do not necessarily mean in-  
 creased revenues for the rail-  
 roads.

Sanford may not have its  
 swimming pool when the time  
 comes to swim for ourselves,  
 but from all outward appear-  
 ances we are going to have a  
 very impressive Dairy Avenue  
 ride-on. County Commissioner  
 U. L. Thresher in whose  
 district this road happens to  
 be has been moving heaven  
 and earth to get the State Road  
 Department to do something  
 about it and yesterday officials  
 arrived in town with the de-  
 cided intention of beginning  
 work at once. In view of the  
 government's proposal for sur-  
 tling highway allotments, San-  
 ford can consider itself ex-  
 tremely fortunate.

Newspaper houses, on which  
 newspapers are dependent for  
 the paper on which they print,  
 have announced a 10 per cent in-  
 crease in price effective Janu-  
 ary 1. Thus the cost of Social  
 Security, and other higher wage  
 jobs and similar ones, are  
 passed on down the line, in  
 many cases to the little fellow  
 who can least afford to pay.  
 Many newspapers will raise  
 their advertising rates to offset  
 their added costs, making it  
 more difficult for the little fel-  
 low in business to advertise, and  
 causing to some extent a loss  
 of advertising, and to that ex-  
 tent, reducing sales, increasing  
 unemployment.

**Give A Little Help**

Anyone who has taken the trouble to investigate the plight of under-privileged families who live in Seminole County or who has talked with such men as Capt. Feren of the Salvation Army, who is thoroughly familiar with the dire need of many of the people who live among us, should appreciate the necessity of some such organization as the Christmas Stocking Fund if Christmas is going to mean anything at all to these people.

We realize that everyone in Sanford is confronted with financial problems and that many of our more prominent citizens are appealed to so frequently for funds for one thing or another that they simply cannot contribute to everything, but we believe that most of them if they could actually see the suffering and destitution, which exists in some of our poorer homes would find some way of contributing, at least a dollar or two to the Empty Stocking Fund.

It is worth while remembering, as Capt. Feren pointed out in yesterday's Herald, that not one single dollar of it goes for "organization" or "administrative expense," and that not one single dollar of it duplicates the charity work of other organizations. In other words it all goes to poor families living in Seminole County who otherwise would receive no aid at all at Christmas time.

The Seminole County Welfare Board acts as a clearing house for all charity work done in this county. The Salvation Army gets a list from the Welfare Board of families in need who are not being provided for in any way by any other organization. The Salvation Army then investigates the need of these families on its own account and prepares to deliver such Christmas baskets as it is able to secure to those in the greatest need.

It is estimated that there are at least 150 families in this county who are practically destitute and who cannot be provided for at Christmas in any other way than by the Christmas Stocking Fund. It is also estimated that at least \$300 will be needed for even a modest effort in their behalf. Surely there are enough people here who can spare a dollar or two so that this \$300 can be raised. If it is not raised, it simply means that some Seminole County families will go without necessary food on Christmas day and that their children will have no visit from Santa Claus.

**A Place To Park**

With the arrival of another Christmas season the parking problem has again become acute in Sanford, and the police march up and down the city streets, marking automobile tires in an effort to get some cars to move on and make room for others. Meanwhile thousands drive on wondering where in the world they are going to park.

Automobiles go round and round, says William B. Powell, traffic engineer of Buffalo, New York, in the Rotarian Magazine, "seeking that which is not to be found, wasting time and gasoline, increasing traffic density by rolling up needless mileage, turning additional corners to the consternation of unsuspecting pedestrians, and worst of all, doing all this extra traveling with the attention of the driver distracted by the quest for space.

"It is the downtown retail merchant," he continues, "who seems most oblivious to the dangers of his position. He blindly permits smaller rival establishments in less congested suburbs to flourish on the trade of shoppers who are loath to brave the hazards of downtown traffic. Rare is the downtown merchant who lures trade to his store by free parking in an adjacent lot or free bus transportation from a more distant parking space to the store."

Some cities are experimenting successfully with metered parking, but, according to Mr. Powell, "metered parking is not a final solution to the problem; it awaits a fundamental change in city planning. One school of thinkers, looking far ahead, forecasts a decentralization of industry, with small, airy communities gradually replacing great cities. Another envisions supercities, with many businesses housed in monumental structures large enough to accommodate motoring tenants and customers."

But, irrespective of the method used, says this traffic authority, rebuilding will be essential. "We'll clear a whole city block! Around it we will construct a fringe of attractive small shops fronting not only on the surrounding streets, but also on an inner court, sheltered from the weather and lighted from a transparent roof. A sidewalk will give a rear-entrance access to all the stores, which will have display windows similar to those on the street side. Ample driveway entrances will open on this court from at least two streets. If there's a demand for it, we will erect a garage in this central area. . . . All these will contribute to the popularity of our enterprise that everybody will wonder why it wasn't done before!"

**Florida Aids Aged From All Over U. S. Statistics Reveal**

JACKSONVILLE, Dec. 15. — Native of all but three of the states of the American Union are now receiving old age assistance in Florida.

Statistics made public today at the headquarters of the State Welfare Board reveal that only Colorado, New Mexico and South Dakota natives are unaided among the 18,758 persons who had been accepted for old age assistance prior to November 1st.

Foreign born, numbering slightly more than 2 percent or 1,054 are credited to 25 nations. One many, with 125, takes the lead, although England with 123 and Canada-English with 122, combined would probably give numerical supremacy to the English-speaking. To these could be added Scotland with 25, Wales with 6, Ireland with 45. Other aliens are credited as follows: Norway 12, Sweden 62, Denmark 19, Netherlands (Holland) 9, Belgium 5, Switzerland 12, France 24, Poland 11, Czechoslovakia 4, Austria 22, Hungary 5, Yugoslavia 1, Russia 12, Finland 2, Romania 1, Greece 2, Italy 21, Spain 1, Portugal 1.

**"TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY"**

Why is it when death takes a close friend we find it so difficult to give expression to our thoughts and feelings? It is the one time when mere words seem utterly inadequate.

The passing this week of W. G. Broder, president of the Peninsula Telephone Company and president of the Florida Fair, leaves his state and his city stunned.

Countless columns in tribute to this great and kindly man will be written by able writers than I, but none who write can feel more deeply his passing.

During the many years of our close association we conferred often by phone. Always, when he lifted the receiver in answer to a call, his first words were "All right."

Never was his response the conventional "Hello."

And those two little words, to my mind, typify the man and his life. To anyone who knew him, the name "W. G. Broder" and "All right" are synonymous.

And I am sure, when the last call came from the Great Beyond, W. G. Broder answered, as he had always answered, just two little words that express, as to others, the thought that all is well: "All right."

While all expressions of the Governor may not have met the approval of press and public, his plain-spoken refusal to permit the consideration of pardons in "wholesale" lots has gained for him almost unanimous approval.

It is bad enough when over 1,200 applications are filed at one hearing, but when one attorney seeks to represent 200 or more applicants on one appeal, it's time somebody called a halt.

State officials who compose the Pardon Board are all busy executives. Each is entrusted with numerous other important duties and to ask or expect such men to give thoughtful and serious consideration, conduct careful investigations and arrive at an intelligent decision in the matter of 1,200 individual appeals in the limited time they can give to the matter, is on its face ridiculous.

This month is certain, however, the Governor, by eliminating the "wholesale" lots business, will eliminate one phase of racketeering from the granting of pardons and will allow a great deal of criticism to which the Board has been subjected, and will go a long way toward cleaning up a situation which threatened to develop into a statewide scandal.

Condemned for his efforts at leadership, President Roosevelt has been keeping "hands off" as far as Congress is concerned and results so far do not indicate that such policy is particularly helpful. Allowed to stay in its own mess a bit longer, perhaps it will welcome the return of a guiding hand.

Indications point to a complete change of policy in the administration's attitude toward business. Suggestions from the White House the coming year undoubtedly will be such as will inspire confidence

**Lake Wales Paper Plans Rate Increase**

LAKE WALES, Dec. 15.—(AP)—In line with many other newspapers over the nation which have been fighting increasing production costs for many months finally being compelled to increase subscription rates, the Lake Wales Weekly News has announced that it would raise its annual rate from \$1.50 to \$2.00.

"Desiring to keep up the standard of the paper and give a complete coverage of the news of this section we are compelled to raise the subscription rate of the News and beginning Jan. 1 it will be \$2.00 a year," a front page article announced.

For more than three years the cost of print paper, ink and other expenses connected with the publication of newspapers have constantly advanced, the paper noted.

Within the past few months other advances in paper and ink have taken place, the announcement said, "and now we are faced with the latest increase in the price of print paper which amounts to \$10.50 per ton and becomes effective January 1. Even with normal conditions it is often difficult to keep the subscription department of any newspaper out of the 'red' and with costs as they now stand it becomes impossible to issue fifty-two copies of the News without a most decided loss."

## Claims Dream Has Come True

### Says Name Of Thomas Girdler Is Synonymous With Murder

PITTSBURGH, Dec. 16.—(AP)—John L. Lewis denounced the operators of "little steel" today and told an uproarious convention of steel workers that his dream of seeing the nation's mill men "handed together" in unionism "has come true."

The founder of CIO, welcomed amid a wild demonstration to the floor of the first national convention of the steel workers organizing committee, assailed Tom Girdler, president of the Republic Steel Corporation, declaring that the name of Girdler "should be synonymous with murder."

The shaggy-haired labor leader took the platform after a 20-minute ovation and then declared "you have found out for the first time in your respective lives that you could organize if you wanted to organize."

For the locals, the work of Altman, Odham, and Harnage, who made a 67-yard sprint from scrimmage, was outstanding, although the entire squad received high praise from Coach Williamson, who admitted today that he was greatly pleased with the play of the squad. The Blackcats made 9 first downs to the visitors 8.

Immediately, committee members said they would attempt to obtain consideration of the measure after the House disposes of its current business—the wages and hours bill.

## Economy Need Is Seen Imperative By Governor Cone

### Executive Sees Political Revolution Unless Action Is Had

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 16.—(AP)—Governor Cone told the state cabinet yesterday there would be a political revolution unless economy in government is made effective.

He spoke as the cabinet discussed increased bills for electric current supplied to the capitol. He concurred with Secretary of State Gray that steps should be taken to reduce the bills.

"We must have some economy or there will be a political revolution about the cost of government," the governor said. "I have an economy into my department."

Electric current bills increased from \$774 in July to \$837 in November. The 1937 legislature made no increase in the appropriation for maintaining the capitol building and supplying it with light, heat and water.

Increased bills resulted, Gray said, because of additional electrical machinery, such as calculators, and because of new offices opened in the capitol annex recently constructed. The increase, he added, resulted in a state situation.

State bills unpaid because of insufficient funds in operating accounts passed \$1,000,000 with others piling up about \$300,000. (Continued on Page Three)

## Motor Inspector Locates Here To Regulate Trucks

Declaring that strict enforcement of State provisions regulating licenses and trucks and trailers will be carried out, J. C. Burt, motor vehicle inspector of the Motor Vehicle Department in Tallahassee, informed a Herald reporter today that his department had been tenacious with firms and individuals for a long time, but that continued violations in large numbers necessitated strict inspection and enforcement henceforth.

Mr. Burt, who is in charge of this district, is located in Sanford permanently at the Gilbert Hotel, having come here on Nov. 1. "We have a new form out for trucks and trailers," he said, "and drivers will be required to give us all the information that we want. There have been 400 violations of the law in the past few months and we are going to clamp down right now."

Tested scales have been introduced in the city and the trucks and trailers will be weighed here, he said. Trucks found to be carrying improper tags will be halted and cases made out against their owners.

Mr. Burt also pointed out that winter guests who place their children in school and fail to buy a Florida license tag are subject to penalization unless they pay tuition. A fine of \$500 or six months in jail is provided under the law, he said. The same penalty pertains to transients engaged in compulsory work who have failed to provide a Florida tag. Drivers of used cars who fail to have the title of the machine transferred to their name in 10 days, also are violators of the law and subject to the fine, he said.

## Hull Opposed To Having War Hinge On Vote

### However, Bill Calling For Referendum Has Good Chance Of Being Okeyed By House

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16.—(AP)—The state department aligned itself yesterday against a strong movement in congress to require a favorable vote of the people before the United States could declare war, except in event of invasion.

Secretary Hull told reporters that, from the standpoint of promoting peace and keeping the country out of war, he was unable to see "the wisdom, or the practicability" of the proposed requirement.

Nevertheless, study of a petition pending in the house indicated there was a good chance the chamber would approve a constitutional amendment by Representative Ludlow, democrat, Indiana to require the national referendum on declarations of war.

The petition bears 218 signatures, enough to make possible a house vote on the Ludlow amendment on Dec. 27. Congress probably will be in recess on that date, however, and thus the vote is expected to be delayed until January.
