There are reasons to wish that the spreading public de-bate on foreign policy might have been avoided. The airing of wide differences on this all-important matter, at this particular time, may add to the uncertainty felt in friendly capitals as to what our intentions are and how far we may be relied on to pursue a hard and dangerous course in the present world crisis. It gives the other side a better chance to measure our preparations and estimate our future plans. It may seem to weaken us at home with confusion and dis-

Yet the public discussion is both inevitable and indispensable. When the course of the nation lies so perilously close to world war, it is necessary that the people make certain fundamental choices as to whether we are willing to go into a world war, for what objectives we are willing to risk war, and what price we are willing to pay for further attempts to secure peace. These are choices which should not be made by the White House or the State Department, nor even by the Congress, without reference to the people. The outpooring of critical attacks by notable public figures is a symptom of public alarm over the fact that we we have traveled so far along a dangerous path without full

we have traveled so far along a dangerous path without full examination and clear choice by the representatives of the people. To go further without this examination would only increase the perils of uncertainty.

Now that the discussion has begun, it is best to have it out thoroughly. No single idea should be accepted as the ultimate wisdom, none should be cast aside as not worth notice. 




