(Continued from page one) called for "extension and revision" of the draft law. Before today's hearing, Senator Bridges (R-MI) came out for a two or three year extension of the act, which is due to expire July 9. Some other law makers were talking in terms of a 10 to 20 year continuation of the law.

Secretary of the Treasury Snyder said President Truman is going to ask Congress this week to adopt a pay-as-you-go taxation policy. Giving a preview of Mr. Truman's economic message, due Friday, and his budget message, which will be presented next Monday, Snyder told a news conference.

The President is going to say that the taxes to protect revenues should be levied to balance the budget. Details of the President's program are expected in a special tax message before Feb. 1. Snyder declined to give any estimate of the amount of new taxes that will be needed, or the size of the 1952 budget. There have been guesses it would take as much as \$20,000,000,000 more revenues to keep the Treasury's books in balance next year.

Before Snyder spoke out, there had been some talk on Capitol Hill that individual income taxpayers might get a year's "breather" from an additional load. "Snyder's remarks about his willingness to confer with Taft or other Republicans also came at a news conference. Taft, in a speech at the National Press Club yesterday, said he was ready to sit down with President Truman or anybody else on the majority side to work out a domestic and foreign program that would commend the nation's support.

Meanwhile, five Democratic Senators worked on speeches upholding Mr. Truman's program for strengthening Western Europe. Majority leader, McFarland, of Arizona, and Chairman Connally, Texas, of the Foreign Affairs Committee, were two of the five who started work on foreign policy speeches.

The others were Senators Douglas (D), McMahon (Conn) and Fulbright (Ark). Douglas tentatively proposed that the Senate go on record as approving preliminary defense agreements made at the Brussels conference for setting up a 12-nation European defense force.

The President's right to commit U. S. troops to that force was challenged last Friday by Sen. Taft, of Ohio, the Senate GOP policy chief. Secretary of Defense Marshall was called before a Senate Armed Services subcommittee to brief the members of the Administration on the overall military manpower request.

In another military manpower session today, the House Armed Services Committee called upon the top civilian and military men of the Air Force for details on a bill to reorganize the youngest branch of the service. Air Secretary Finletter and Chief of Staff General Vandenberg want the tactical (troop supporting) branch of the Air Force put on the same command level with the strategic (heavy bomber) command.

Committee members said they would question the two officials.

A tank-supported company of the Second Division swept into the town from the southeast after beating off fierce Red Korean counterblows. A second column driving up from the south brushed off Red counterattacks mounted by six battalions and occupied the southern sector of hills looking down on the scorched town. This second division unit was only two miles from Wouju. There were no Reds in the city.

A. P. correspondent William Barnard reported from the front. The American-French assault teams launched their assault to retake Wouju in a swirling snowstorm Tuesday. They fought through a hail of enemy mortar and small arms fire. Wouju controls a web of roads leading into the heart of South Korea.

The attack by the Second Division and Chongchon River battles of last summer was the biggest United Nations offensive effort in days. "We are in contact with North Koreans now and we intend to give them hell," the Allied commander said as the attack started.

Correspondent Barnard said the battle scene was like a Christmas card picture. He added: "There was the soft white valley, majestic frosted mountains and a peaceful looking road, snow sifted down. "But murderous enemy fire from foothills... Swept the valley and the road. The thunder of Allied artillery rolled continuously and echoed through the valley and around the peaks. Anonymous Sniper Fires At Bus With Small Bore Rifle

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 10.—An anonymous sniper shot cranking through the windows of a bus, fired at a bus with a small bore rifle. The Red Throat threatened the Taejon-Taegu escape corridor for Eighth Army forces withdrawing in the west toward the old Allied Pusan beachhead.

General MacArthur's Wednesday afternoon summary said a "very large" Communist force strung along a 70-mile front from Osan to Wouju was "capable of mounting a powerful offensive supported in great depth." MacArthur and Eighth Army estimates placed the strength of the Red force along the Osan-Wouju line or in close reserve at possibly 250,000 troops.

The top commander's report said the Communists in an "impressive buildup" had moved seven Chinese armies (corps) of 21 divisions—about 210,000 men at full strength—into the Osan-Wouju line or nearby for quick reinforcement. A Mongolian cavalry division of 4,000 to 5,000 men—experts in mountain reconnaissance and quick harassing thrusts—and a Chinese artillery division also were reported in the area.

At the western end of the line, MacArthur's report said, a Red Korean corps of three divisions, about 30,000 men—was in position. In addition, Eighth Army reports said three North Korean divisions were massed around Wouju where the day's heavy battle swirled. "This very large force is capable of mounting a powerful offensive supported in great depth," MacArthur's summary said. "Because of its large manpower potential it can strike in a number of places at the same time with ample reserves to support each forward thrust."

While the Wouju battle raged, A. P. correspondent John Randolph reported there was no contact southeast of Osan where Eighth Army forces were withdrawing. Eighth Army officers said mud and snow may have slowed the Red advance but there was no lessening in the Communist buildup. MacArthur's summary said. "U. S. P. correspondent Ruth said Eighth Army reports indicated Communist tanks had moved into the Chechon area 30 miles south-west of Wouju. Communist prisoners said they had heard tanks moving there two nights ago. They said also that they had seen 1,000 to 3,000 Red troops six miles east of Chechon. U. N. patrols likewise reported hearing tanks rumbling during their scouting of the area north of Chechon Tuesday night. Eighth Army reports indicated one area of Red buildup was north of Wouju. That the marksman was the same man who has terrorized Oak Lane for two months, Oak Lane is some five miles north of Roxborough. But police did not rule out the possibility that the assailant of the buses was the so-called "Mad Sniper" sought for the killing of Mrs. Claire Cohen, 28-year-old housewife and for the shooting of seven seven or eight other persons. One bus, operated by William C. Linden, was peppered shortly after 7 P. M. yesterday and two windows were shattered. The second, driven by James Cole, was hit at about 2 A. M. today and one window was splintered.

Lieutenant John Ragnell of the detective bureau said the sniper may have used either a .38 rifle or a .22 caliber rifle. Police have theorized that the Oak Lane sniper used a .22 caliber rifle to kill Mrs. Cohen. Other victims were attacked by an unseen marksman using a .22 caliber rifle. Mrs. Cohen was killed last Dec. 16 while she was washing dishes at the home of her mother. The fatal bullet was fired through closed venetian blinds. Police have been patrolling the northern and western streets of the city ever since in a hunt for the killer. One police officer said "there's no doubt there's a maniac on the loose."

Prime Minister Calls Arming Of Japan Dangerous

Yoshida Advises Free Nations To Begin Nerve War On Reds

TOKYO, Jan. 10.—(AP)—Japan's prime minister, Shigeru Yoshida, told the world tonight that rearmament of his nation should not be undertaken without "discreet handling as well as mature deliberation. The political chief of Japan's 80,000,000 people said putting arms into the hands of the Japanese was not to be taken lightly.

In a speech at the Tokyo correspondent's club, Yoshida said there were two prime reasons why building up of an army would be a serious move: "Some nations are deterred by the implications of the rearmament of Japanese armies. Internally, we have every reason to avoid doing anything which might intensify that fear. "Moreover, the cost of rearmament would upset our entire program for economic rehabilitation."

Yoshida advised the Democratic world to adopt "war of nerves" tactics to counteract Communist moves and penetrate the Iron Curtain. He advised the free nations to fight fire with fire, to "employ the same methods and tactics" the Communists have used successfully. Yoshida told the Tokyo press corps that they, as representatives of the free world, had an important role to play in the fight to penetrate the minds of those in Communist nations.

The Japanese leaders said they thought the Communists were out to "scare the governments of the free nations out of their wits." He expressed the hope that those nations would "stay cool and firm." The Prime Minister said his nation was "ranced wholeheartedly" on the side of the United Nations and was giving every support to the U. N. cause. Yoshida said the foreign press corps— including two for Tass, the Soviet News Agency— that this government and the Japanese people hoped for a peaceful treaty "so that we may play a more active and effective role as a sovereign and independent nation." The 73-year-old leader said he considered his primary job to be

"institute such economic measures as will insure independence of substance as well as in name." Yoshida said Japan could not be independent unless it was self-sustaining economically. Earlier, a strong advocate for Japanese rearmament—ex-prime minister Hitoshi Asada— predicted defeat of a proposal to rearm the nation for defense. The constitution Japan adopted after World War II renounces war. A popular vote is to be taken on the question of revision to permit rearmament.

southeast on the Wonju-Chechon highway.

Otherwise, Bernard reported, the front was stabilized Thursday, with only some small-arms fire south of the wrecked and empty town of Wonju.

On that front, 55 miles southeast of Seoul, the Reds lost an estimated 2,100 troops in an earlier fight that lasted seven hours.

The Allies abandoned Wonju Monday. On Wednesday, a tank-led patrol of the U. S. Second Division pushed back into the town from the southeast.

Finding no Reds there, the patrol looked around for a while, then voluntarily withdrew towards the overlooking hills in the south. South on the road towards Chongju, the company-sized patrol was jumped by more than 7,000 North Koreans. At one stage the Americans fixed bayonets and charged.

After other Allied forces reinforced the patrol, the Reds broke off the battle Wednesday night.

But the greatest menace to Allied arms was shaping up in a 50-mile stretch between Chongju and red-held Osan in western Korea.

Chinese and Korean Red forces estimated at 255,000 were in the area or moving toward it in an apparent bid to cut off the main forces of the U. S. Eighth Army on the road south of abandoned Seoul.

In that area roads fan out through the hills, affording many avenues of approach to the Allied forces.

AP correspondent John Randolph said the Chinese evidently hope to force the Eighth Army to accept battle in the rough country suitable for swarms of night-fighting Red infantrymen.

Six Chinese armies were in the general western area, south of Seoul, and seven armies were north and west of Wonju. This force included wily Mongolian cavalrymen. Intelligence officers said 500 Chinese planes and 200 tanks are available to back the push.

Another hint that the Reds may be about to challenge Allied mastery of the Korean skies came in far North Korea. Fifteen Russian-made MIG-15 jet fighters attacked a B-29 Superfortress as it lagged behind a formation because of engine trouble.

The B-29 took cover in a cloud
