









# WARNING: Do Not View With Naked Eye Eclipse Of Sun Will Occur Monday Afternoon

NEW YORK (AP) — A thousand-mile-an-hour shadow will sweep the earth Monday, the mark of an eclipse of the sun. The shadow will dip down at the Sakhalin Islands off northern Japan, then race across the coast of Siberia, northern Alaska, Canada and the Maritime Provinces.

Because the eclipse will be partial for viewers in the 48 contiguous states, millions will be able to see 75 per cent of the sun darkened. From Chicago, 63 per cent will be covered; from Denver, 36 per cent; from San Francisco, 34 per cent.

Such a filter can be made with two pieces of black and white film which has been completely exposed and fully developed to maximum density.

Subtracting the 1,040 mile per hour rotation of the earth, at the equator and traveling in the same direction, the apparent speed of the shadow is 1,060 miles per hour, and increasing as the eclipse path moves away

# 'Tickled' Over Petty 'Goof' Pearson Wins 400 In Exciting Finish

DAYTONA BEACH — Did Richard Petty goof? David Pearson thinks so and it "tickled" him to think about it, Pearson, driving the Wood Brothers Mercury, held off the hard-charging Petty at the finish line to win the 14th Annual Firecracker 400 at the Daytona International Speedway.

Bobby Allison had been lapped by both Pearson and Petty and he fought to unlapp himself. He succeeded once, but soon fell behind Pearson. The next time he unlapped himself, he stayed there until the yellow flag came out. That happened on lap 134 when Frank Warren blew the engine in his 1970 Dodge.

With about 13 laps to go, Pearson was running third with Petty and Allison fighting back and forth for the lead. On lap 184 of the 160-lap event, Allison and Petty both passed Petty in the third turn.

On the backstretch of lap 155, Pearson made his move and took the lead from Allison. On the next lap, Petty went up, possibly brushing the wall as he came into the tri-oval, and took second place from Allison.

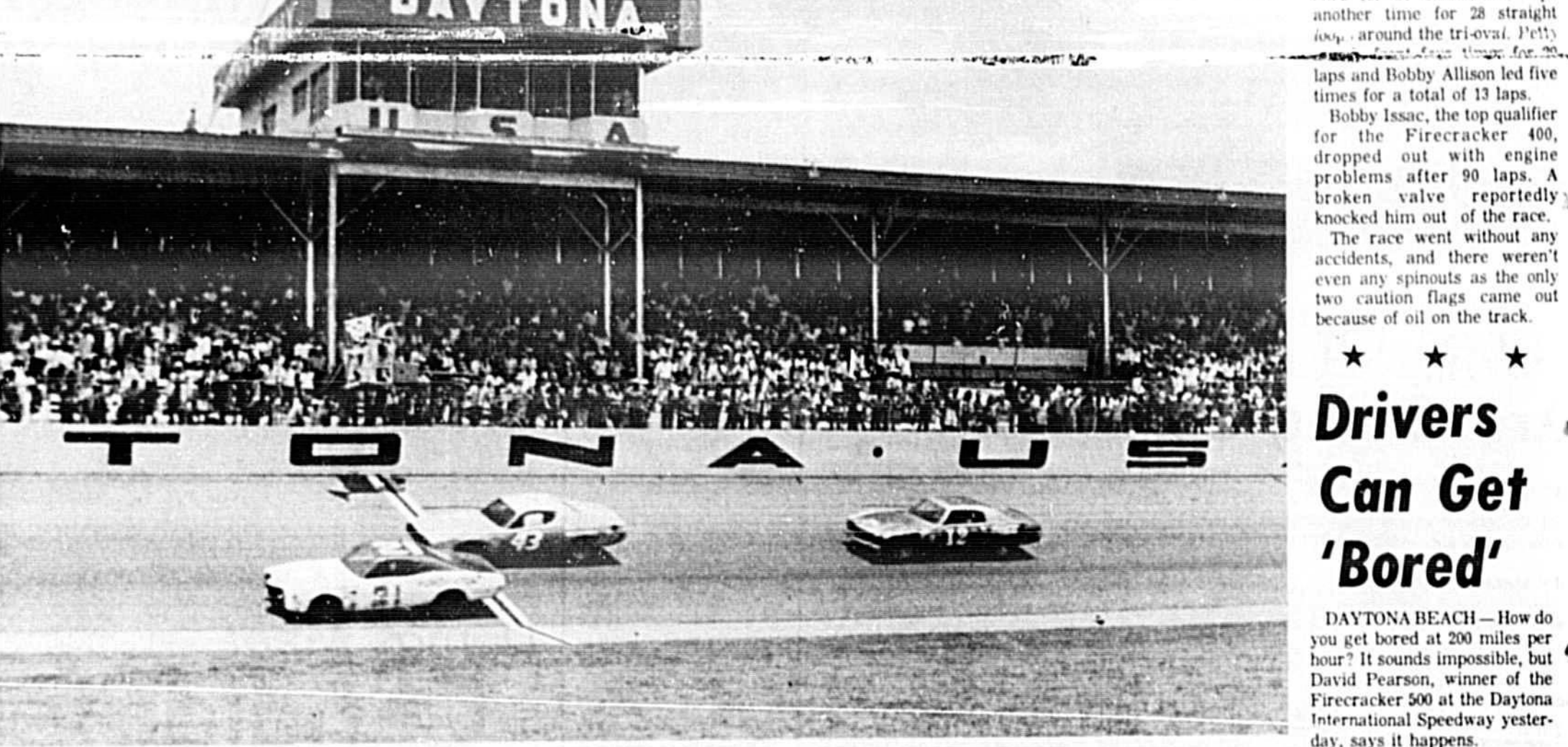
As the three cars entered the backstretch for the final time, it was Pearson, Petty and Allison, with just a few feet separating the cars. It was there that Pearson looked for Petty to make his move. "I had my eyes on him. I knew where he was at every minute."

The heat took its toll on both cars and drivers. Only 28 of the original 40 starters were running at the conclusion of the race. Petty reportedly went directly to the infield hospital at the end of the race, suffering from heat exhaustion. But despite the hot weather, a record crowd of 67,200 turned out for the race.

Allison came around the track to make it a three-way battle as the green came on at the start of the race. Pearson, Petty and Allison and Pearson, in that order, as the green came out and they all had a full tank of fuel and fresh rubber on both sides.

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — The sun actually came out twice during the \$150,000 Cleveland Open Golf Tournament.

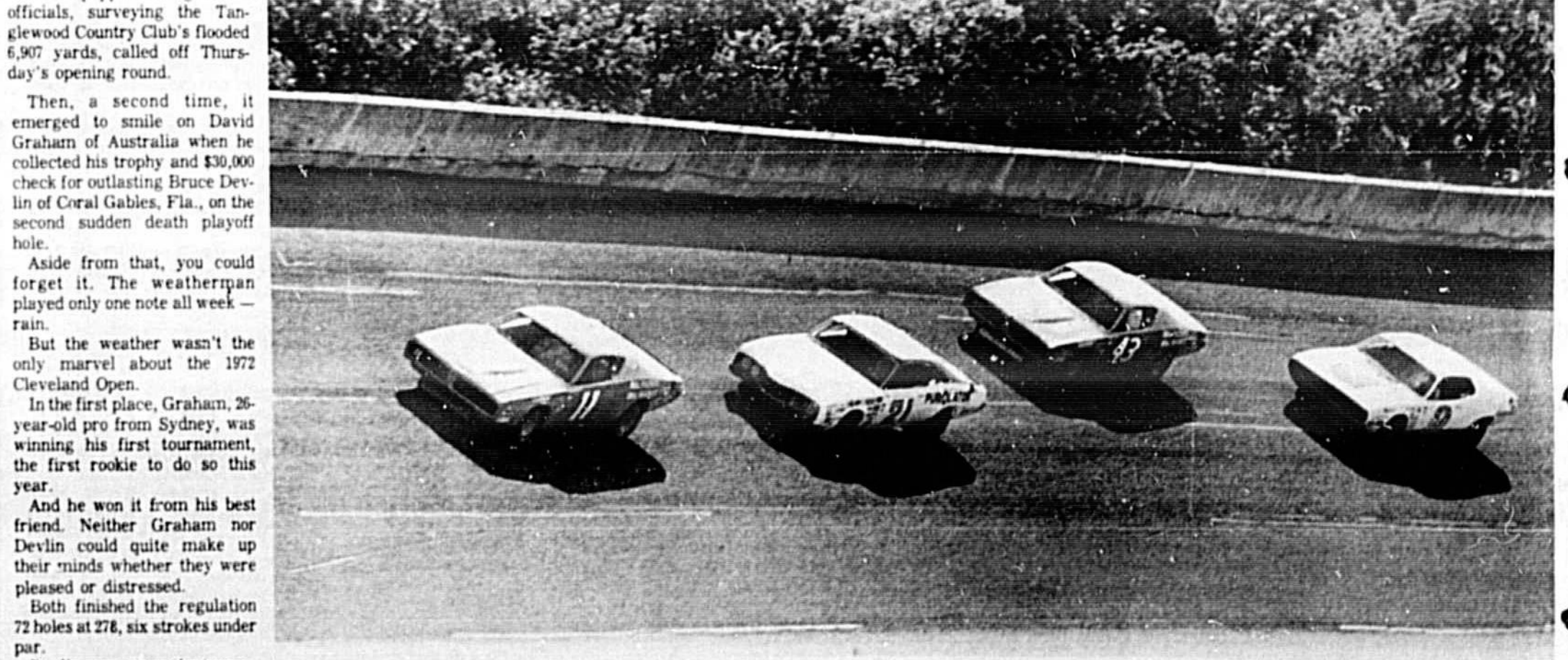
Once it popped out right after officials, surveying the Tanglewood Country Club's flooded 6,807 yards, called off Thursday's opening round.

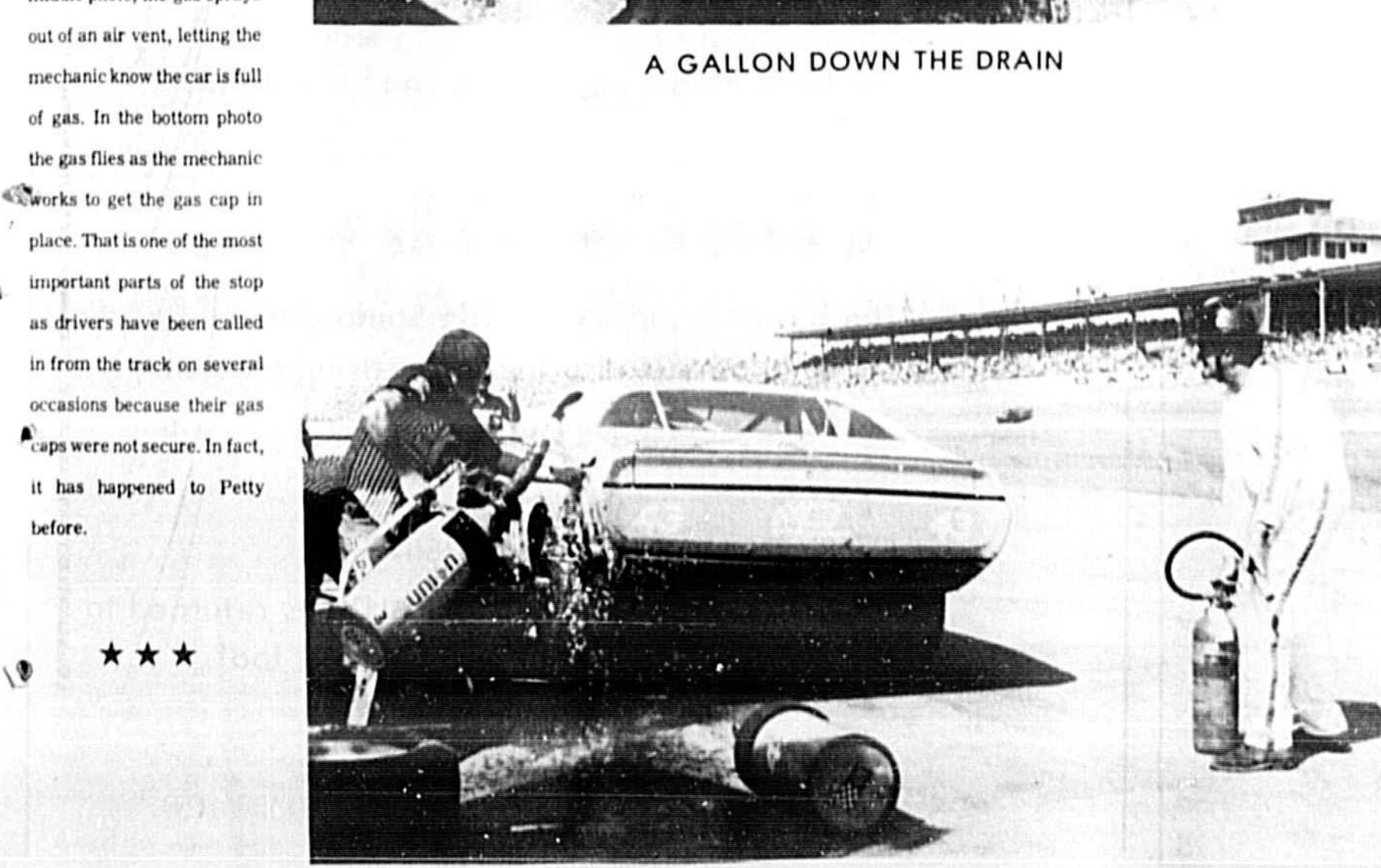
# In The Pits At Daytona Speedway

A RACE can be won or lost in the pits. David Pearson, who probably had the best pit crew in the Firecracker 400 at the Daytona International Speedway yesterday, won the race by a fraction of a second.

At one time, his Wood Brothers crew (above) gave him a 19 second lead over second place Richard Petty. The Wood Brothers Mercury has been in the winner's circle on six out of 10 races they have entered so far this season.

On Pearson's first pit stop yesterday, the Wood Brothers crew changed two tires and filled the car with gas in 16.5 seconds under the green flag. The three photos to the right show the Petty crew in action during a hectic pit stop. The first photo shows the crew adding fuel and putting on tires. In the middle photo, the gas sprays out of an air vent, letting the mechanic know the car is full of gas. In the bottom photo the gas flies as the mechanic works to get the gas cap in place. That is one of the most important parts of the stop as drivers have been called in from the track on several occasions because their gas caps were not secure. In fact, it has happened to Petty before.

# Bob Seagren Emotional After Leap

By DAN BERGER Associated Press Sports Writer EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Tears streamed down Bob Seagren's face. The handsome Olympic champion sat in the light of a setting sun and simply, quietly cried. He had just set the world record in the pole vault, something he had done four times previously. So why the emotion?

The 25-year-old Southern California Strider athlete suffered a severe knee injury in a horseback riding accident late last year and surgery was performed. He came back, however, and made what appeared to many a futile attempt to get back into shape for the 20th Olympic Games this year. His progress was slow.

"He worked so hard," said Verne Miller, head track coach at the University of Southern California, where Seagren was graduated and began his comeback. "He's always been dedicated, but I really didn't think he'd come back this fast."

"When I got to Eugene, I was relaxed," Seagren said. "I was happy with my progress." He had regained a share of the world mark at 17 feet 4 1/2 inches and was considered the old pro of the event.

"Then I started thinking, 'The guys are good. What if my pole slipped?' What if I didn't qualify?" and then I got nervous. "I couldn't sleep. I walked around my room at night. I didn't have any concentration."

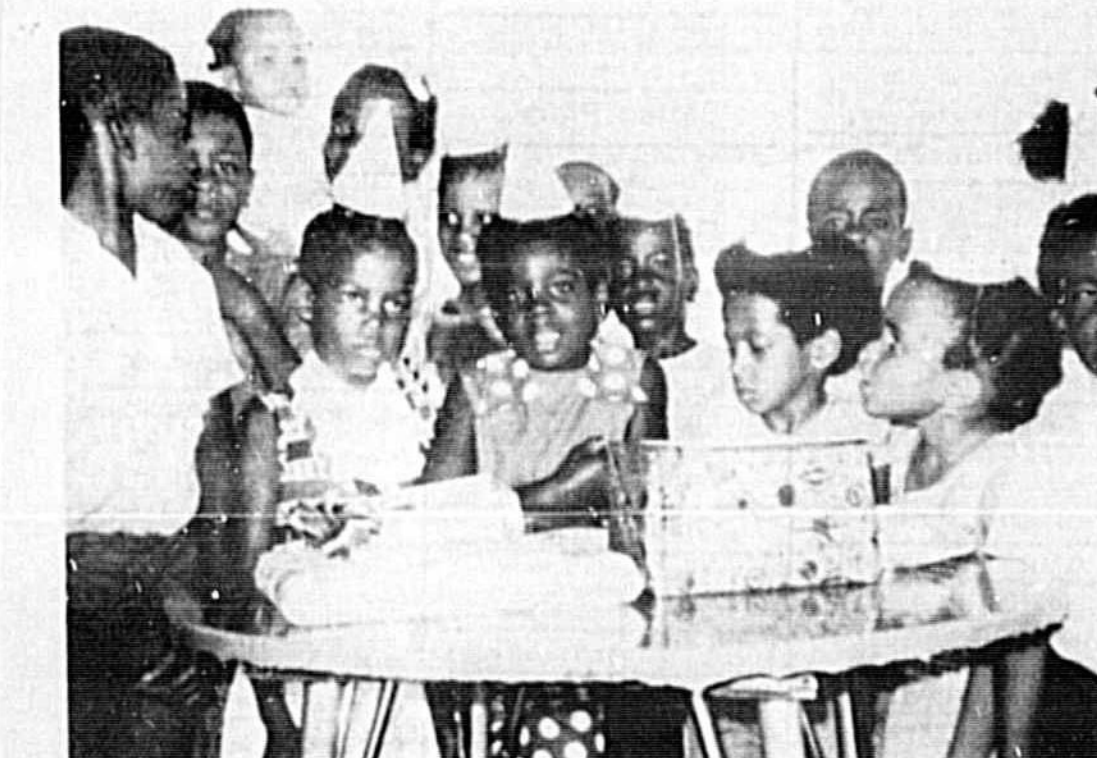

## Getting In' Big Problem Security Tight At Confab

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP)—The people who attend the Democratic National Convention next week will be admitted by people, not machines.

McDonnell-Frain will supply 400 guard-usbers, all unarmed, including a proportionate share of women and minorities—just like the convention itself.

## Rabbi Aids Yuppies, Receives Threats

MIAMI BEACH (AP)—A rabbi who let young people gather for convention protests sleep at his synagogue says he received telephone bomb threats and complaints his action would depress neighborhood property values.

Rabbi Meyer Abramowitz allowed about two dozen Yuppies spend the last two nights in the social hall of Temple Menorah at the request of Police Chief Rocky Pomeroy.

The rabbi sent his secretary early Tuesday and answered the telephone himself for four hours.

"The calls included threats to bomb the building and those from people incensed that I had turned the building over to people they felt were irresponsible and dangerous," said Abramowitz.

"The reaction ranged from that kind of hostility to positive comments from people who felt it was time we finally did something for these kids."

About 75 per cent of the calls were critical, Abramowitz said.

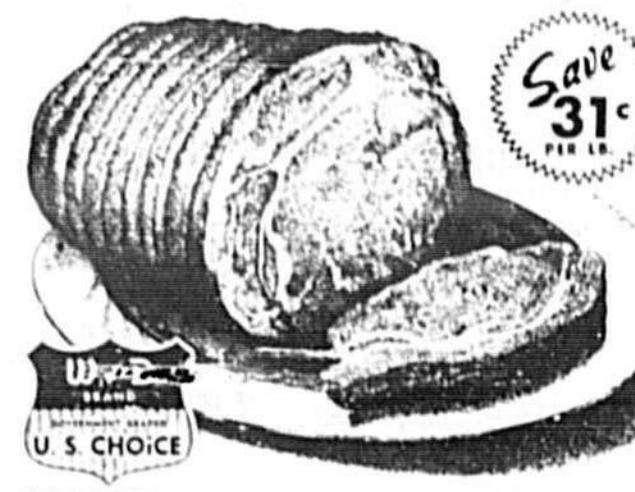

# Marinated Salmon Comes From Swedish Cuisine

One of the most interesting and delicious dishes in Swedish cuisine is fresh salmon treated to a marinade and served uncooked. It's called Gravlax and is always offered with an alluring sweet-sour mustard sauce. If you have any qualms about curing rather than cooking salmon just remember that pickled herring is not cooked either.

2 egg yolks  
1/4 cup cider vinegar  
1/7 cup oil  
1/2 cup finely chopped fresh dill  
In the small bowl of the electric mixer, or in another small

deep bowl and using a hand rotary beater, beat together mustard, sugar, egg yolks and vinegar about 1 minute. With mixer at medium speed, gradually beat in oil. With electric

mixer, pour oil in a steady thin stream near the beaters. With hand rotary beater, add only a few drops oil at a time, beating well after each addition. Sauce will thicken but not hold its

shape. It will thicken slightly more on standing. Makes 1 1/2 cups sauce.

2 egg yolks  
1/4 cup cider vinegar  
1/7 cup oil  
1/2 cup finely chopped fresh dill

SWEDISH MARINATED SALMON (Gravlax)  
1 1/2 to 2 pounds fresh salmon, cut from center of fish  
2 large bunches fresh dill  
1 tablespoon whole black peppercorns  
1/4 cup sugar

Swedish Mustard Sauce, see below.  
Ask fish dealer to remove backbone and small bones from salmon. To marinate the fish, use an enamelware, stainless steel, pottery or glass dish in which the fish will fit snugly. An oblong 1 1/2 quart dish (10 by 8 by 1 3/4 inches) is fine.

Wash and dry dill. Finely chop enough of the feathery tops to measure 1/3 cup; set aside for use in sauce. Coarsely chop remaining feathery tops and stems — there should be about 2 cups.

Coarsely crush peppercorns in a mortar with a pestle or in a pepper mill that has a coarse grind. Place 2/3 cup of the coarsely chopped dill in bottom of dish. Add 1/3 of the crushed peppercorns. Mix together sugar and salt and rub into fish covering both sides of both pieces and using all the sugar-salt mixture.

Place 1 piece of fish, skin side down, on top of dill-peppercorn mixture in bottom of dish. Add 1/2 of the remaining pepper and another 2/3 cup coarsely chopped dill. Place second piece of salmon on top of fish, skin side up, and with thicker portion of top piece opposite thinner portion of bottom piece. Add remaining crushed pepper and remaining 2/3 cup coarsely chopped dill. Cover with transparent plastic wrap and place a board and weight on top. Refrigerate for 24 to 48 hours, turning fish and spooning accumulated marinade between pieces every 12 hours.

To serve, remove fish from marinade and scrape off dill mixture. Place 1 piece of fish on a board, skin side down, and with a sharp knife, cut salmon on the diagonal into thin slices, cutting each slice away from the skin. Remove any bones that may turn up. (Finished Gravlax keeps in refrigerator for 1 week.)

Serve as an appetizer with Swedish Mustard Sauce and dark bread or freshly buttered toast. Gravlax may also be served as a main course with the sauce, boiled new potatoes, cucumber salad and dark or crusty bread.

SWEDISH MUSTARD SAUCE (Graviasaus)  
1/2 cup prepared yellow mustard  
3/4 cup sugar

LANCASHIRE HOT POT  
An English version of a stew that is popular also in France, Belgium and the Netherlands.  
2 pounds boneless lamb shoulder, cut into 1-inch chunks  
1 tablespoon flour  
3 cups thinly sliced pared potatoes  
1 cup sliced carrots  
1 chicken bouillon cube  
1/4 cup boiling water  
2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

Trim excess fat from lamb. In a large mixing bowl stir together the flour and salt, add lamb and toss to coat. Grease a 2-quart casserole, arrange layers of potatoes, onion, carrot and lamb, beginning and ending with potatoes. In measuring cup, dissolve bouillon cube in water, add Worcestershire sauce, pour over lamb and vegetables. Cover and bake in a preheated 375-degree oven 1 hour, uncover and bake until potatoes, lamb and carrot are tender — about 30 minutes longer. Makes 4 servings.

1 cup real mayonnaise

In a saucepan heat corn oil and onion, green pepper and celery, cook gently, stirring often, until vegetables are tender. Stir in curry powder. Dissolve bouillon cube in boiling water; stir into curried mixture. Remove from heat and cool. Gradually stir into mayonnaise, blending well. Chill. Makes 1 1/2 cups.

Webster says that an aspic is a savory jelly made from fish or meat stock thickened with gelatin and seasoned and used cold to garnish meat or fish.

Here then is a new aspic made with condensed beef consommé plus tomato juice, unflavored gelatin, seasonings and garden-fresh vegetables. We served the aspic with cold baked ham when we were entertaining guests from England and they applauded it. We felt this was an accolade because British cooks are known for the delicious aspics they make.

1 1/4 cup tomato juice  
1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
1 can (10 1/2 ounces) condensed beef consommé, undiluted  
1 teaspoon lemon juice  
1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
1 drop hot pepper sauce  
1 cup grated (medium-line) carrots  
1/4 cup finely diced celery  
2 tablespoons minced green pepper  
2 tablespoons minced scallion (green onion)  
Salted greens or parsley sprigs  
Into a 1 1/2-quart saucepan pour 1/2 cup of the tomato juice. Sprinkle gelatin over puree and let soften about 5 minutes. Place over low heat and stir until gelatin dissolves.

Off heat stir in the remaining 1/4 cup tomato juice, undiluted consommé, lemon juice, Worcestershire and hot pepper sauce. Chill in saucepan until slightly thickened. Fold in carrot, celery, green pepper and scallions.

Turn into a 1-quart mold. Chill until firm, cover. At serving, trim around and garnish with salted greens. Makes 6 servings.

1/2 teaspoon salt  
Wash the spinach and cut off any heavy mid-rib stems at bottom of leaves. Place spinach in a large saucepot over moderately low heat, cook covered, in just the water that clings to the leaves — 3 to 10 minutes. With a long-handle fork turn spinach several times during cooking until it is wilted but still a bright green. In a colander or strainer drain spinach, with a kitchen scissors coarsely cut up spinach. In the empty saucepot melt the butter; add raisins, pine nuts, spinach and salt; mix well and reheat. Makes 4 servings.

## County Tightens Crossing Ordinance

An amendment to the railroad crossing ordinance was approved by the Board of County Commissioners. The railroad will have 90 days following execution of a contract to provide signals at specified crossings, provide a flagman at the crossing or restrict the speed of locomotives. W. I. Crabtree and M. E. Smith, spokesmen from the railroad, indicated it would be difficult to meet the 90-day requirement inasmuch as the equipment must be ordered by specification.

Crabtree said that with demand and crossing protection systems approved, there is no alternative but to give this job preference over all else and "other areas may have the same problems. Right now there are 21 crossings where installations are being made. There is a crash program in Orange County now. You must realize our company problems, with six states to serve."

Commissioner Al Davis asked if the holdup concerned men or materials. Crabtree said that both were part of the problem. "You just can't go out into the street and pick up a run-of-the-mill laborer. Even the Interstate Commerce Commission tests these men."

Howard Marsee, acting county attorney, said he regretted the misunderstanding on the part of some editors regarding his statement about the control of speed through mainline crossings. Marsee said he would recommend the attitude that the Board of County Commissioners can regulate speed at the crossings but that on the main line crossings, a degree of reasonableness must be established. "A degree of reasonableness must be established. 'X' might not be a reasonable speed for crossing 'X' might not be a reasonable speed for crossing 'Y'."

"Unreasonable restrictions are the ones which might cause conflict with interstate commerce regulations, and it is these restrictions which must be carefully chosen to avoid the conflict, but still serve the interests of Seminole County."

## Wekiva Acreage Sold \$6 Million Land Deal

Major Realty Corporation, an Orlando-based development company, has completed negotiations for the purchase of a 5,809-acre tract of land on State Road 46 in Lake County, just across the Wekiva River from Seminole County.

Ernest Southard, president of Southward Investment and Realty Company, whose firm negotiated the sale of the property known as the "Three Rivers Tract," announced today the purchase price was nearly \$6 million or \$1,000 per acre for the property, which was originally a part of the Moses E. Levy and Peter Mirande grants.

The property is located approximately six miles west of I-4 and 10 miles from downtown Sanford.

Comprising nine square miles, including 16 miles of water frontage on some of Central Florida's most scenic rivers — the Wekiva, the St. Johns and Blackwater Creek — the specific development plans are expected to be announced after the completion of land use studies.

Southward advised the transaction was the largest single real estate transfer ever in Lake County. He said, "Major Realty will build a new city out there," in explaining the land area is larger than the City of Sanford. The property was acquired from Florida National Bank of Orlando, as trustee for the owners, Southward added.

P. P. Radtke, Major Realty chairman, said, "We are pleased to have been able to acquire this beautiful property and believe it has a great potential for development."

Radtke cautioned that since one of the property's greatest attributes is its esthetic qualities, careful planning in development will insure that



## Casselberry Objects To Site New Annex Is Pondered

County commissioners in a work session next Tuesday will consider options of City of Casselberry officials relating to the proposal of placing a courthouse annex at Casselberry. Robert Oldo, representing Moose Lodge, told the Commission yesterday the plans to construct a meeting place, with sufficient space for county offices, near the Casselberry postoffice and motor vehicle inspection station.

Hodney Loyer, county administrative assistant, who said 113 auto parking spaces would be available at the site, quoted Dr. Edith Duerr, Casselberry City chairman, and Donald Bergman, Casselberry city manager, that location of the branch courthouse at that site would create undue hardship on the city during peak traffic periods.

Loyer said he asked for a place on the agenda at the Monday meeting of the Casselberry City Council but was told that it was already too crowded. Bergman was to poll the members of the Council and let Loyer know their feeling.

The building, as proposed by Oldo and his lodge, has adequate building space at this time. According to Loyer, the tax collector would need 1,520 square feet, tax assessor, 200 square feet, supervisor of registrations, 200 square feet, and building and zoning officers, 200 square feet. If half of the voting machines are moved to the new location, storage alone would require only 750 square feet but with working space 1,800 square feet would be needed.

Oldo said if additional space is needed, the county floor could be enlarged without loss of parking space. The county would be assigned the second floor of the building. He was of the opinion that the attitude of the two City of Casselberry administration members was analogous to stifling progress. Commission Chairman Greg Drummond said it should be understood that the opinion given concerned only two members, not the majority of the Council.

"A decision must be made soon," Oldo reminded the board, "as plans and regulations must be met and construction completed before the Jan. 1 deadline."

Another work session is scheduled next Tuesday, to consider the opinions of the City of Casselberry.

## Grand Jury Probes Jail

The state attorney said Jack Fulenwider, his investigator, had talked to all prisoners incarcerated in the jail and received complaints on food and living conditions.

He explained the grand jury might also want to look into the manner by which prisoners are being held on pre-sentence investigation after having been adjudicated guilty by the court, but never sentenced pending the results of an investigation.

Herring said the normal pre-sentence investigation runs from five to six months and the prisoner is held in jail during the time. "I'm not saying that's an unusual time, but the grand jury might want to look into that," Herring added.

Charges of mistreatment while incarcerated in the county jail were first brought before Circuit Judge Dominick Salti by Thomas Todd, sentenced to serve a year in the jail, and received complaints on food and living conditions.

Todd later reduced his own statements and told the court he "made up" the charges.

Brown told Judge Salti he "feared for his life" and was made to strip and was placed in a creek cell (isolation). Brown also accused a jailer of kicking him while shackled after an escape attempt.

Sheriff John Polk is out of the county today attending a sheriff's conference and was unavailable for comment to Herring's preliminary findings. However, it was Polk who first requested the state attorney to conduct a jail investigation in view of the statements by Brown to Judge Salti.
