TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - Florida Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Conner told a Senate subcommittee on food prices today that President Nixon's lifting of meat import quotas smacks of "political expediency" that isn't

helping either housewives or producers. Conner said that instead of opening up the market to foreign beef. Nixon should have encouraged consumers to look for other sources of high quality nutritious foods - such as poultry,

pork and eggs. Conner testified before a twoman subcommittee of the Senate Agriculture and

Forestry Committee headed by Sen. Lawton Chiles, D-Fla. "Until we are able to successfully control inflation and bring our economy into a better balance we will not solve the rising food prices plaguing the consumer," testified Conner. "The President's action in lifting import quotas on

meat is not a solution and his placing of controls on shell eggs and vegetable products has further compounded the problems," said Conner. Conner said Nixon's actions might offer "some modicum of relief by election time but it seems to me by his short sighted actions the President has sacrificed the day to serve the hour." He

urged the committee to balance the needs of the consumer with that of the farmer in writing farm legislation. He also urged Nixon to reconsider his Claiming farmers and housewives "should be natural allies," Chiles said that today's hearing

in Florida and Thursday's in North Carolina would provide "valuable import" toward writing a new farm bill next year. "The trip to the grocery store has become a very unpleasant task for thousands of Floridians







# Boom Days For Sanford Are Here

Now that the summer-holiday-tourist season is in full bloom, it seems as though the beautiful, lakeside city of Sanford, Seminole's county seat, is confronted with an almost embarrassment of

It is as though the ordinary facilities which visitors and residents expect in a city-proper traffic control, adequate lodging, attractive and modern shops, eating places for all persons and all pocketbooks - are yet to be attained.

Beautification a problem which we have consistently and persistently published over many years, has yet to be properly pursued.

It is not, to be sure, that the merchants and leaders of the downtown area of Sanford - the place where the greatest opportunity for betterment exists - have not been aware of this

For instance it was on Tuesday, March 20th, 1956 that The Herald printed this editorial of which only the first three paragraphs are enough.

"Forward thinking has always been rewarded, especially when wen conceived plans have been backed with confident action. But in the rapidly advancing age in which we are now living, when the keynote seems to be s-p-e-e-d, it behooves anyone interested in keeping abreast - to say nothing about ahead - to think long and well about the immediate future and how best he can be competitive.

'The spotlight in recent months has been focused on city progressiveness - with an almost imperative necessity on long-range planning and a strong concerted movement geared for fast action to make the plans effective.

"Nowhere is this more imperative than in our lovely, attractive Florida. Lolling leisurely like a man enjoying a siesta in the seaside sun, we have found ourselves engulfed by the rising tide - a tide of incoming residents - that is about to swamp us before we can snap awake and get once more on the safe ground of planned preparedness."

During the intervening 16 years there have been many plans made, interested business men and civic leaders have devoted time and money in studies as to how best to cope with the general condition of inner cities where antiquated structures have hampered progress.

Our downtown leaders have had spurts of energy which have, however, not always borne

## Desegregating Schools Deep Issue

The recent U. S. District Court order to desegregate Detroit and 53 suburban school systems by merger must be considered a lost skirmish for antibusing forces. But the ruling by federal Judge Stephen J. Roth is a tactical success for the constitutional concept separating our executive,

legislative and judicial branches of government. Within the same two-week period that decision was announced, a similar ruling creating the nation's first courtordered, considered, consolidated metropolitan school system in the Richmond, Va., area by merging a city and two county districts was overturned by the U.S. Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals and Congress passed an omnibus Higher Education Act containing antibusing provisions that restrict

set for a confrontation between Congress and the federal courts. The executive branch joined this tug-of-war when the Nixon administration submitted stronger antibusing and court-restricting legislation before the Higher Education Act

Judge Roth's decision in Detroit, however, put both branches on notice that the federal judiciary will not allow interference with its prerogatives.

Judge Robert R. Merhige Jr.'s ruling in Richmond would

have established a school system with more than 100,000

pupils spread over 750 square miles, requiring the busing of

78,000 children, 10,000 more than ride currently. The Detroit order would set up a 750,000-pupil system in a 300-square-mile area. Although the number of bus riders was not disclosed, the court said busing should be kept to a minimum "Consistent with complete desegregation." Both decisions will be

The Detroit appeal is certain to be influenced by the Circuit Court ruling in Richmond. The Fourth Circuit Court said, "... the only 'educational' reason offered. . . in support of consolidation was the egalitarian concept that it is good for children of diverse economic, racial and social background to associate together . . . The experts thought that the optimum size school district was one having a school population of from 20,000 to 50,000 pupils. . . the consensus was that the three separate school distrists were about the right size and the consolidated district much larger than desirable for

educational and administrative purposes." In Detroit, Judge Roth said the racial makeup of schools and classes within schools must reflect the racial distribution

In the South, the Circuit Court said, "... the adoption of the Richmond metropolitan plan. . .viewed in the light of the stated reasons for its adoption, is the equivalent, despite disclaimer, of the imposition of a fixed racial quota, The Constitution imposes no sluch requirement and the imposition as a matter of substantive constitutional right of any particular degree is beyond the power of a district court."

The Japanese government is deeply worried over the continuing huge trade imbalance between itself and the United States. It fears new U.S. trade restrictions may come soon if ways are not found to narrow the gap. A high Japanese official told me that most hope is placed in the idea of increasing Japan's imports from America, since that country's exports to us have remained high despite substantial changes in the currency

exchange rate and consequent price increases. Amicable negotations with U.S. officials go on steadily, but nothing has yet been worked out. The Japanese are even considering buying more American raw materials than they presently need and stockpilling them here

'home front" consumption of U.S. products is a necessary step, but it is concerned at what it believes will be the inevitable slowness of such a move.

Though Japan has made progress in lowering tariff batriers, some still remain. And their reduction or removal is tightly entangled in internal Japanese politics. The intensity of Japan's fears is related directly to official conviction that President Nixon may feel compelled to move before the fall election to try to squeeze down the embarrassing U.S. world trade deficit. Yet, while it is afraid the United States will drop the other shoe, Tokyo does not think any new American re-

strictions would have the harsh, almost hostile sounds it ascribed to our stiff trade curbs imposed in 1971. The Japanese believe they have given strong proofs an understanding of our trade difficulties, and of a willingness to cooperate in solving them. They think they gained basic points with us when they sided with our representatives last October in the effort to keep Taiwan (the Republic of China) in the United Nations. They also think that U.S.-Japanese relations

were improved by their gulping down tough restrictions on textile imports here, and accepting sharp upward revaluation of their currency. What shows through in all this is the same unshakable element I found in my visit to Japan last fall: The Japan ese devoutly feel that their links to the United States and to other nations in the free western world-are truly their lifeline. It never occurs to responsible Japanese officials to take any course which would imperil that in-

ispensable connection. This does not mean Japan is not looking about with a fresh eve. High circles suggest that not too long after a new government replaces Prime Minister Sato this July, Japan's own overtures to mainland China may



#### Global View Kremlin Cooks Up Mao, Army Rift

WASHINGTON (NEA) The Soviet Union has begun a campaign to separate the Chinese Red army from Mao Tse-tung and to stir up Mao's opponents to take action against him. Whatever Soviet underground agents may be doing secretly, the Moscow radio is openly beaming broadcasts to China, some of which, in effect, seek to incite the army

officers. They assert Mao's army purges will not stop with the top men. They predict hundreds of thousands of 'night and middle ranking commanders' will be replaced

Some appeal to the army's patriotism. These broadcasts assert that Mao is causing disunity within China, that Mao's policies are a direct threat to the country and that therefore Mao must be stopped. 

WAUGH AP Education Writer WASHINGTON (AP) - Mass ayoffs in the aerospace and electronics industries in 1969-70 had a severe impact on enrollment in engineering schools this past year, and it could add up to a shortage of engineers in 1975. There are signs that freshmen enrollments will bounce back somewhat this fall, but

educators are not looking for complete recovery from the 18to-25-per-cent decline registered in the fall of 1971. Paradoxically, at a time many advance-degree graduates are finding job-hunting tough, engineer graduates are faring much better, according to Dr. N.J. Palladino, dean of the College of Engineering a Pennsylvania State University. "Engineering will never be come obsolete," said Palladino.

Seriousness of the situation was underscored by a survey by the Engineers Joint Council which showed there were 26,000 fewer engineering students in 1971 than a year earlier. The baseball pitcher, the football quarterback, and the tennis player all must transfer their weight from the right foot (back foot) to the left foot to
