Deal seen with 3 of 6 anchor stores for new area mall

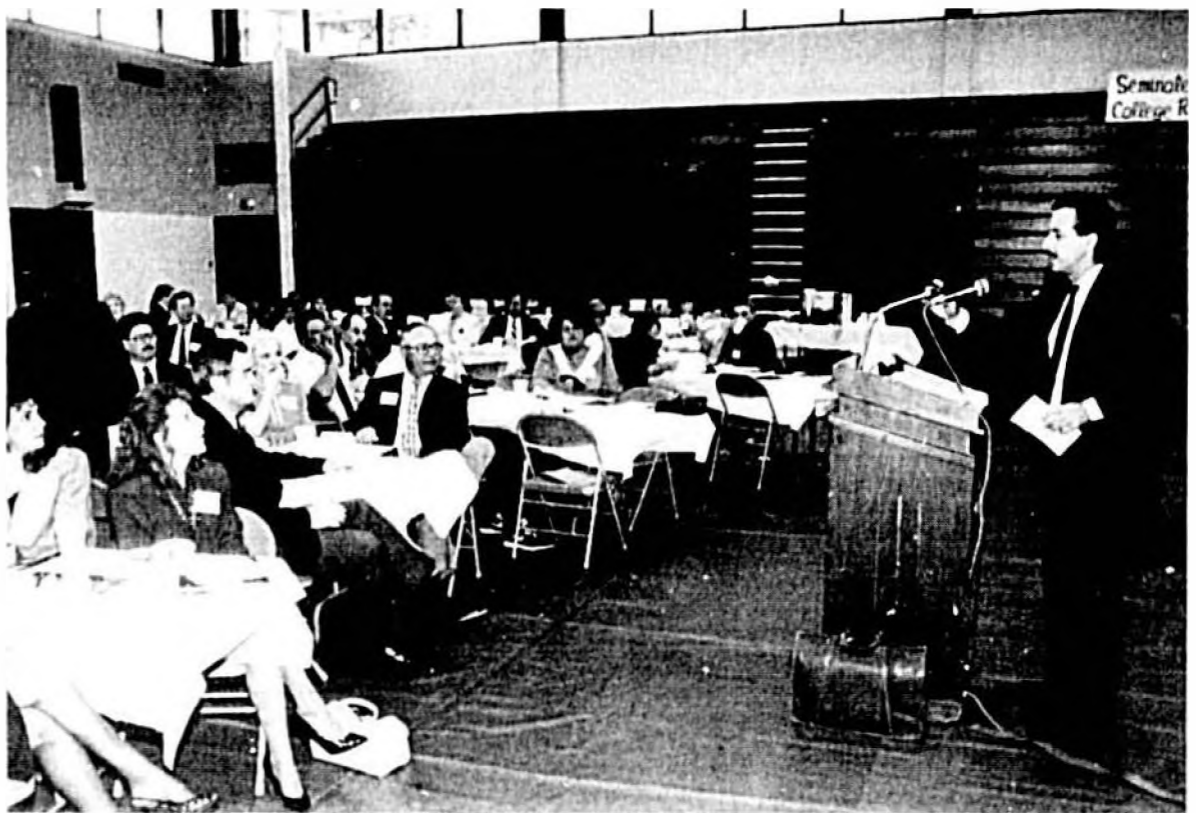
SANFORD — An official for the proposed \$200 million Seminole Mall named six department stores that might anchor the complex and said that the developer was close to finalizing negotiations with three.

Michael McCarty, senior vice president of Melvin Simon and Associates, told listeners at a Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce luncheon yesterday the following department stores were being considered as major tenants for the proposed mall: Belk, Landry's,illard's, Sears, JC Penney, Macy's, and Parisian. McCarty would not say which businesses the developer was close to signing.

To a certain extent, the stores that we sign will determine the shape of the mall, McCarty said. We think that we have the department stores that we need. Once they tell us what they're configuration is going to be, that tells us what our mall is going to look like.

McCarty said \$10 million of the project would be used for parking.

TB detected in six Lyman High students

LONGWOOD — At least six Lyman High School students have been infected by the tuberculosis bacteria, according to the Seminole County Health Department.

When one student displayed symptoms of the disease last week, health officials notified the school that students who had been exposed to her were at risk of developing the infection.

The tenth grader has not been identified.

The health department, located at 240 W. Airport Blvd., Sanford, offered free skin tests for all Lyman students, though only about 200 youngsters had been exposed. The test consists of injecting the tuberculosis antigen below the surface of the skin. The infection is present in the patient if there is a reaction.

IRS still without bids on Sanford home for elderly

SANFORD — With the Internal Revenue Service considering options on how to collect \$115,000 in overdue employment taxes from the Good Samaritan, the adult community living facility has yet another chance at survival.

To raise the money, the IRS put the facility on the auction block for \$105,000 last week.

It was the second time that the home was auctioned and the second time that it failed to find a buyer.

The facility is home to 41 elderly residents who require nursing care and who do not have enough money to pay for it.

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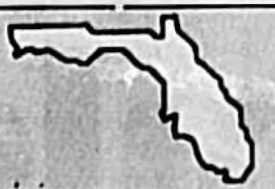

Fisherman snag practice mine

POMPANO BEACH — Two Pompano Beach fishermen had quite a fish tale to tell Friday. The two men snared a practice mine at about 4 a.m. Friday while fishing behind the Native Sun Hotel, said Marianne Avis, a spokeswoman for the Broward Sheriff's Office. "He caught something, pulled on it and the pole broke," said Michael Gray, whose fishing buddy, Tim Flake, hooked the dud. "Twenty minutes later this thing washed up 100 yards away from us. I thought it was a turtle at first. But it kept getting bigger, and bigger. I saw it was white. It had some writing on it and we turned it over and it said it was a mine."

KKK to rally at Hernando Co. courthouse

BROOKSVILLE — The Ku Klux Klan has received a city permit to rally on the Hernando County Courthouse steps in August. A court order had temporarily banned the demonstration, but City Police Chief Ed Tincher said Thursday he had agreed to the permit in a compromise with white supremacist Tony Bastanzio, a former Klan grand wizard and the rally organizer. The rally on the courthouse steps will take place on Aug. 18, Tincher said. In exchange for the permit, Bastanzio said he has dropped plans to appeal the court order. "Tincher and I worked this out man-to-man," Bastanzio said. "We got the permit and the court order out of it."

Ozone levels spark advisory in Tampa Bay

TAMPA — Ozone levels in the Tampa Bay area dropped sharply Thursday from the day before, when environmental officials issued a rare ozone advisory to warn people with respiratory ailments to stay indoors. "It's not a warning or an alert. It's simply an advisory," said Iwan Choronenko, Hillsborough County Environmental Protection Commission air quality chief. The advisory was sent out after commission officials recorded some of the highest ozone concentrations of the year on Tuesday. "If we should have a thundershower, it would actually cleanse the atmosphere, and the problem would go away. But if we don't have a thundershower, this garbage will continue to build up," Choronenko said. Ozone, a key component of smog, is formed when automobile and industrial emissions react with sunlight. Choronenko said the condition in the Tampa Bay area was not life threatening, but it could cause discomfort and difficult breathing for the elderly and people with respiratory problems and could also cause watery eyes.

Engineer warned of faulty electric chair

TALLAHASSEE — State prison officials knew as early as 1986 about possible problems with the headpiece that caused flames to shoot from the head of execution victim Jesse Tafero last month, said a sworn affidavit submitted Thursday to the Florida Supreme Court. Fred Leuchter, a Boston engineering consultant who specializes in execution technology, has submitted documents in a motion to rehear the case of Judy Buonoano, dubbed the "black widow." Buonoano is scheduled to die in Florida's electric chair June 19 for the 1971 poisoning death of her husband. She also was sentenced to life in prison for the 1980 drowning murder of her paralyzed son and is a suspect in the 1977 poisoning death of a Colorado boyfriend. In a sworn affidavit filed with the motion for rehearing, Leuchter said state prison officials first contacted him in December 1986 about problems with the state electric chair at Florida State Prison in Starke. "I was contacted by representatives of the Florida State Prison, including Mr. Robin Adair and Mr. Thomas Barton," said Leuchter, who worked for American Engineering at the time. "Mr. Adair told me that the leg electrode they were using in the electric chair in Florida had proved defective on their last execution and that the condition of the head electrode was questionable."

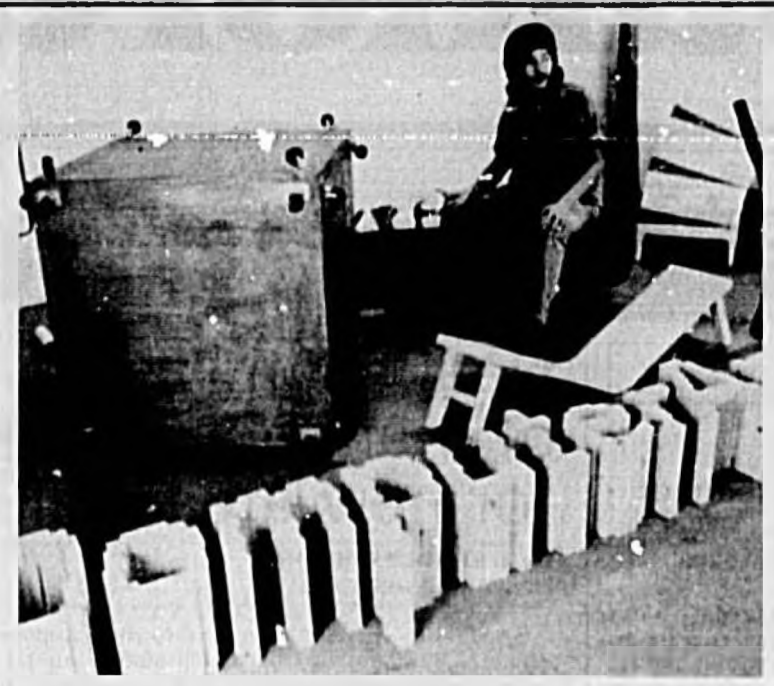

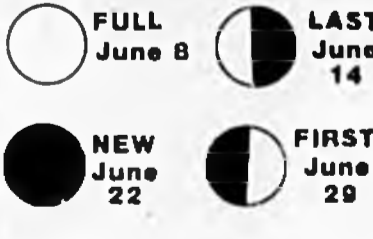

Warm summit chills Moscow

The latest summit conference between Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev and his American counterpart gives telling evidence of the changing times.

The two presidents signed trade and chemical-weapons agreements and made some progress toward further reducing nuclear arms. Then, in their leisure time, they bantered like old friends and played horseshoes.

A few years ago, a summit resulting in relaxed relations and serious agreements between the superpowers might have been viewed as successful, even exceptional. This year, with expectations elevated by perestroika, the spotlight fell on some of the negatives, such as the questions remaining on German reunification and Lithuania's bid to secede from the Soviet Union.

Gorbachev, playing the part of the populist leader, rubbed shirt sleeves with Minnesotans, who warmly received him in Minneapolis. But back home in Moscow, the response to his U.S. visit was chillier. The Soviet public apparently believes that Gorbachev's popularity abroad will do little to solve the country's domestic economic turmoil.

The Soviet president who initiated perestroika and introduced at least a limited form of democracy and open speech is now feeling the cutting edge of those freedoms. The gains he has made are in jeopardy, and, some observers believe, so is his political future.

In part, his problems stem from an antiquated socialized agriculture system that has been failing to feed the Soviet population for years. Gorbachev needed a strong measure of agricultural perestroika early in his reform program. Instead, the changes have been timid. Farmers have been promised hard currency for the surplus crops they raise, but it's not clear whether this modest incentive is working.

When Soviet consumers heard that prices were to be raised, they voted a lack of confidence with their rubles, stripping store shelves in a wave of panic buying.

Meanwhile, a Gorbachev rival, Boris Yeltsin, is using the power as the newly elected post as president of the Russian Republic, to snipe at Gorbachev's program.

Small wonder that for once, Gorbachev came to the United States as eager to discuss business and agricultural investment options as disarmament. Time is not on his side.

In this case, his research on capitalism may well be one of the important results of his visit to America.

A big shtick

It doesn't seem possible, but Congress keeps getting sillier.

Recently, comies Billy Crystal, Whoopi Goldberg and Robin Williams were invited into the hallowed halls to yuck it up on behalf of the Homelessness Prevention Bill.


It isn't easy to see the connection between comedy and homelessness. When did homelessness become a laughing matter?

Not long ago, Sissy Spacek, Jessica Lange and Sally Fields, who had starred in movies about hard-luck farmers, appeared in Congress to advise the lawmakers on farm problems.

It would surprise no one if Congress invited William Shatner, who played Capt. Kirk, and Leonard Nimoy, the pointy-eared Mr. Spock of Star Trek, to help straighten out any future problems with the Hubble Space Telescope.

It's too bad the Three Stooges aren't around anymore. They might be able to give the lawmakers a lesson in dignity.

Soviet thaw will burn conservatives

WASHINGTON — The most fascinating outcome of the George Bush-Mikhail Gorbachev summit has been the contradictions between the theater of smiles and handshakes and the real-life world of tensions and conflicts.

Internationally, the two leaders basked in the spotlight and resonated with all of the grandeur of two major rock stars. Their press releases and manifestos brokered a new era in American-Soviet relations. "Cold War" is an anachronism consigned to the dung heap of historical myths.

Domestically, summit euphoria ought to be good for at least 30 days of spillover popularity when Bush and Gorbachev confront minor crises on their respective turfs. Both face an identical problem: two-front war. Bush faces it on his budget deficit and the prospect of new taxes; Gorbachev faces it on economic and political perestroika.

Tennyson's "Charge of the Light Brigade" is an appropriate poetic metaphor: "Cannon in front of them, cannon to left of them, cannon in front of them...."

For Bush, the cannon are anti-tax-increase Republicans to the right of him, pro-tax-increase Republicans to the left of him and Democrats in front of him. For Gorbachev, they are hard-lining opponents to the right of him, moderate supporters to the left of him and Boris Yeltsin in front of him.

Yeltsin is a potential reality that cannot be ruled out. Ironically, the more successful Yeltsin and Soviet democratic reform are, the more painful it will be for Republican conservatives in the United States.

If you look at the history of American foreign policy since the end of World War II, it has been structured on a deep-seated distrust of Russian foreign adventurism.

John Foster Dulles' "brinkmanship" and Ronald Reagan's "evil empire" capsuled the range of Republican attitudes toward the Soviet Union. Democrats were accused of being "soft on communism," and hard-lining, saber-rattling Republicans believed that only they had a pipeline to ultimate truth. Their response to any

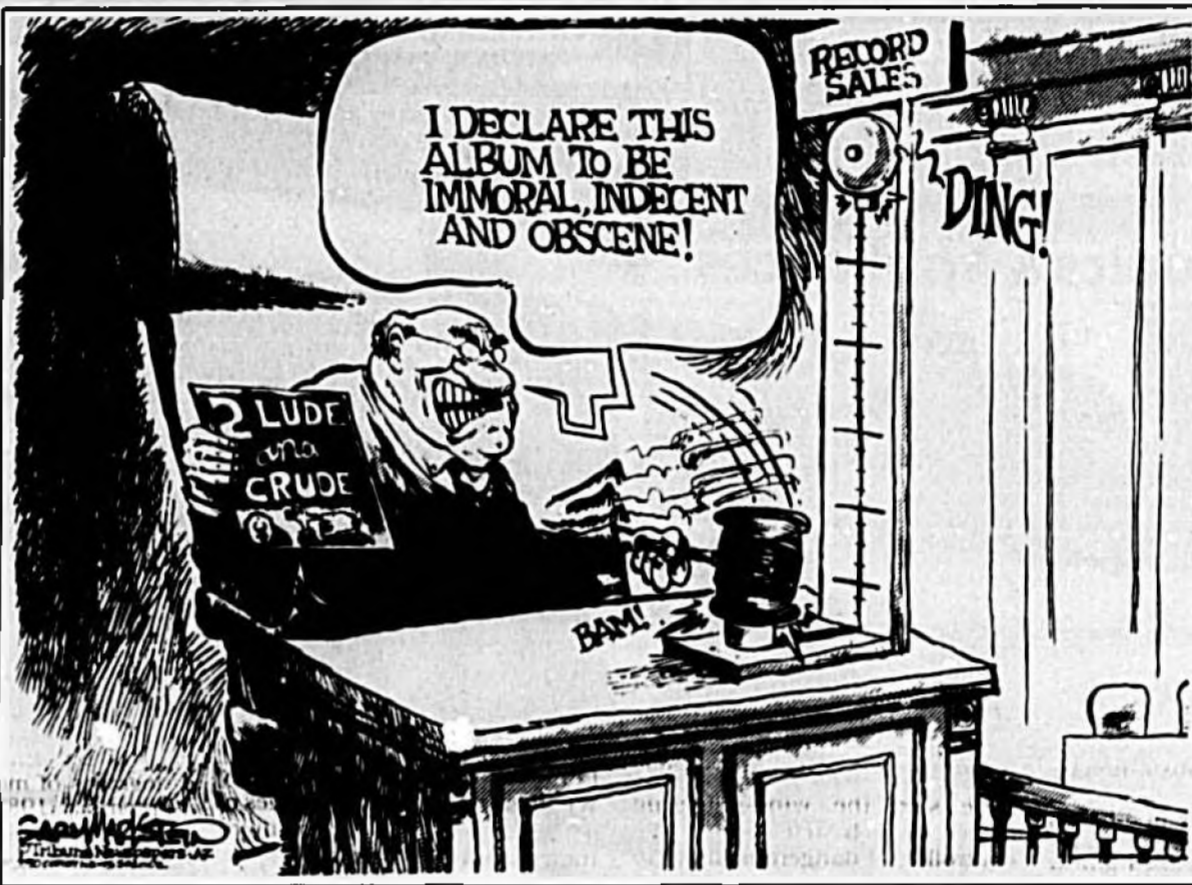
international event was to build a military machine, so we could be prepared, at a moment's notice, to counteract a Soviet thrust.

But they never did use that might against the Soviet Union. Instead, America's magnificent military juggernaut was used by Reagan to invade a militarily impotent Grenada and needlessly sacrifice American lives in Beirut. Bush also used troops to invade the tiny nation of Panama.

With the disintegration of Soviet economy, its concomitant effects on military weaponry and a decline in Soviet adventurism, Republicans are faced with a disconcerting dilemma. How do they continue their demagoguery of waving the banner of Russian expansionism and lobbying for a massive defense budget?

Even worse, what will conservative Republicans do if the peace-loving Yeltsin succeeds the crafty Gorbachev?

The white-haired, apple-cheeked Yeltsin is the nearest thing to an emergent Russian populist, hewed out of the same rustic environment that produced Abe Lincoln. What differentiates Yeltsin from previous Soviet leaders are his bold irreverence; his smoldering democratic tendencies, which are now being fanned into smoking embers of reform; and, most important of all, his ascension to power as an elected representative of the people.

Democrats take needed victories

WASHINGTON — Headlines from the latest round of primaries noted the precedent-breaking victories of former San Francisco Mayor Dianne Feinstein as the first woman nominee for governor of California and former Charlotte Mayor Harvey Gantt as the first black nominee for senator from North Carolina. Both are Democrats and, for a party badly in need of energy, excitement and potential stars, this was welcome news indeed.

Gantt's challenge to Sen. Jesse Helms (R-N.C.), the conservative whom liberals most love to hate, automatically becomes one of the few races in this off-year that will draw money and attention across the country.

Feinstein's battle with Sen. Pete Wilson (R-Calif.) for the California governorship fits into that same small category, and not just because of her personality. The next governor will help determine how the congressional district boundary lines are drawn and which party will control the largest and most rapidly growing delegation in the House of Representatives.

Long ago, both parties agreed that the most important battles this year were the governorships of three fast-growing mega-states — California, Texas and Florida — all held by Republicans today. It is now clear that the Democrats pose a real threat in at least two, and perhaps all three, of those states. In California, it is no secret that the Republicans who recruited Wilson to run for the governorship that incumbent George Deukmejian (R) is vacating after eight years did not fancy Feinstein as his opponent. They would far and away have preferred state Atty. Gen. John Van de Kamp (D), a sincere technocrat with a gaping vulnerability for falling to prosecute one of the Hillside Strangler cases.

As a reporter, I have to keep my distance from that race, because my oldest son worked for Feinstein in her last couple of years as mayor. But there's no bias involved in telling you that influential Republicans regard her combination of femininity, governmental experience and freshness to statewide politics as a potent mixture in an electorate apparently eager to shake things up in Sacramento.

Feinstein is the second woman the Democrats have picked in the banner contests. State Treasurer Ann Richards (D) won a tough primary and runoff for the nomination against businessman and political novice Clayton Williams (R) for the open governorship in Texas. In the third key Sunbelt contest, Florida, Democrats will not choose between favored former Sen. Lawton Chiles and Rep. Bill Nelson until September. But polls already show Chiles running ahead of embattled Gov. Bob Martinez (R).

Feinstein and Chiles are moderates in the contexts of their states. Richards is a liberal in a state that has not elected a liberal governor or senator in the last quarter-century. What

they have in common is an ability to communicate strong personal leadership traits, even to a decidedly cynical electorate.

That cynicism is what strikes the thoughtful analysts on both the Republican and Democratic sides. Robert Teeter, President Bush's pollster, told his partner, Mary Lukens, the other day that "there's no election out there." He meant that voters are ignoring most political ads and passing up in droves the opportunity to pick candidates in primaries. Speaking of the fall campaign, Teeter said: "It will be a six-week war."

Democratic pollster Geoff Garin agrees. "The turnout has been low to a ysmally low," he said. "We are continuing to turn people off to the process, even in campaigns that are free of negatives."

What many suspect is that voters who are turned off by the politicians in the spring would not need much of a stimulus to turn against the politicians in the autumn. And that could pose a danger to the Republicans defending their party's hold on governorships in the three key mega-states — even if it helps the GOP on balance in its uphill battle to regain control of the Senate.

The problem will be worse for Republicans if the economy should stir fresh concerns among the voters. Already, the GOP governors of Florida, Texas and California have been forced to do what President Bush has refused to do. Every one of them has either recommended or signed tax increases this year.

— Texas Gov. William P. Clements (R) last week signed a sales-tax increase to solve a financing crisis in the public schools.

— Deukmejian led the battle for an initiative to double the state's gas tax, narrowly approved by the voters last Tuesday.

— And Martinez has an even bigger tax package (in relative terms) moving through the Florida legislature in order to fill a \$1 billion gap in his \$11 billion budget.

Restrictions on federal domestic spending (unfunded Medicaid mandates, for example) have added to the problems in these growth states. Republicans in all three states now look to Bush — and the Washington budget negotiations — to make the decisions that will help keep the national economy growing.

Saudis, Soviets may form pact

WASHINGTON — The world's largest producer of oil and the largest exporter of it are forging an uneasy bond that could dominate the world petroleum market.

The Soviet Union and Saudi Arabia are strange bedfellows. One has long been ruled by communists and atheists. The other is a strictly religious monarchy and the birthplace of Islam.

But that doesn't seem to be stopping a relationship of convenience between the two nations amid a persistent world oil glut.

On the heels of another summit by the Arab-dominated OPEC oil cartel aimed at bolstering sagging prices, the Saudis and Soviets have opened new talks of their own. They're apparently trying to accomplish without OPEC what the once-formidable cartel couldn't. The Saudis, rich in oil reserves, dominate OPEC. The Soviets, who are not members of the cartel, produce more than Saudi Arabia but have less oil in the ground. The two are trying to stabilize prices.

If Saudi Arabia and the Soviet Union accomplish that by agreeing on production goals — and if they pull in Iraq, the next-largest producer — some say they could dominate the market. It could also mean the end of the impotent OPEC. Of course, the mismatched marriage has some major stumbling blocks. The Saudis detest communism and long have been a strategic U.S. ally. The country's Islamic theocrats have made no secret of their steadfast financial and moral support for Afghanistan's freedom fighters, battling a Soviet-backed regime. One of our associates who visited Saudi Arabia last year said it is not uncommon to meet people who have volunteered to fight for the rebels in Afghanistan.

Soviet troop casualties there over the last decade are largely a product of the hundreds of millions of dollars in Saudi aid to the rebels.

Another hindrance is the Saudis' historical interest in fostering ties with the Soviet Union's own 53 million restive Muslims. Soviet Islamic leaders are challenging the traditional communist hierarchy amid political change there.

Yet problems remain between the United States and Saudi Arabia that could drive the Saudis closer to the Soviets.

The United States maintains close ties to Israel, at least publicly alienating many Arab countries. America has neglected broad-based Arab demands for an independent Palestinian state. And in the Saudis' eyes, Israel exercises veto power over U.S. arms sales to the Arab kingdom.

As far as the Saudis are concerned, the time could be right to cuddle up to the Soviets. As always with the intrigue of geo-politics, they probably can overlook their fundamental philosophical differences for the time being so both can shore up oil prices and bring in more hard currency.

That doesn't mean the Soviets will stop worrying about the Muslims militating for greater freedom on the Soviets' own southern flank.

But it is yet another reminder that money can make even the staunchest foes appear a little friendlier.

New tax package takes effect next week

TALLAHASSEE — The \$1 billion tax package that will take effect next week without Gov. Bob Martinez' signature could create a legal hitch in the state's plan to collect \$199 million in speeded-up sales tax payments, officials said Thursday.

Martinez' refusal to sign the tax bill means it will not take effect until 15 days after he received it. That makes the effective date June 21 — one day after the speeded-up tax payments authorized in the tax package are due.

The Florida Department of Revenue plans to collect the money June 20, notwithstanding the dubious legal authority for the move. The 3,900 retailers involved were not very happy about the situation, industry spokesmen said, but they would likely pay up anyway.

Peter Dunbar, general counsel to the governor, played down the

prospects for any difficulty with the collections. He also denied Martinez' decision not to sign the tax package into law was motivated by any election year reluctance to be associated with the big tax increase.

It's just that Martinez objects to elements of the plan — such as technical changes to the way state trust funds are administered, and language concerning billboards in Dade County — but not strongly enough to veto the whole package, Dunbar said.

Other elements of the package, including a 9.9-cent-per-pack increase in the state cigarette tax, were based on Martinez proposals, and are acceptable to the governor, Dunbar said.

"If the governor has problems with a bill or parts of a bill, he sometimes lets it pass so the Legislature's action stands on its own without his endorsement," Dunbar said.

The package includes mostly excise taxes hitting smokers and

drinkers. It also contains higher motor vehicle fees and levies on corporations and people with large investment portfolios.

The sales tax speedup is a gambit to help the state out of a looming revenue shortfall in the current fiscal year, which ends June 30. Without the extra money, the state's "rainy day" fund would dip from the usual \$150 million to only \$5.5 million, and the interest rate the state pays to borrow money might be affected.

Current state law requires big retailers to remit 10 percent of their estimated sales tax receipts on the 20th of each month. The new law says retailers that pay more than \$200,000 a year in sales taxes must remit 66 percent of their estimated tax this month — a one-shot deal to raise lots of cash in a hurry.

According to Dunbar, going ahead with the speedup actually saves retailers having to make two payments to the state, one on the 20th and another a few

days later when the bill actually becomes law.

"It's certainly not worth getting uptight about from our standpoint," said James Tally, lobbyist for the Merchants Association of Florida. "But if I were the Department of Revenue, I'd want to make sure I was on firm legal ground."

Meanwhile, aides to the two Democrats vying for the right to take on Martinez in the November general election said the governor's refusal to sign the bill shows political cowardice.

Former U.S. Sen. Lawton Chiles "laughed and said, 'It sounds like one of the more courageous things I've heard about,'" campaign press secretary Julie Fletcher told the St. Petersburg Times.

"He (Martinez) is playing political games," said Don Pride, spokesman for U.S. Rep. Bill Nelson. "Truman said, 'The buck stops here.' Martinez seems to think it stops anywhere but the governor's office."

would inhibit their ability to make a living and survive, but we could file liens against their property," Michanczyk said.

Michanczyk said levies could also be filed to recover the money owed, but these would not be part of the public record. The assets of the facility could also be taken for payment, she said.

"We can't disclose information on liens," the representative said. "It may amount to the same thing, but it's just a different kind of law. It's not part of the public record."

Michanczyk said if another auction occurs, it won't be for several weeks.

"We'll make it," Mike said. "I believed before, I believe now."

Mike did not want to talk about the issue, but described her reaction to the auction in one word: "Jubilant."

Mike said efforts were underway to raise money to pay the facility's debt, but she would not know anything specific until early next week.

"We may have to go to auction again and start at a lower minimum bid," said Amalia Michanczyk, assistant public affairs officer for the IRS. "We already have a lien against the property of Thelma Mike for \$41,926.65."

Michanczyk said the lien is against Mike's personal property, meaning that if Mike tried to sell her home, or any property that she owns, the proceeds would go toward paying the IRS for the Good Samaritan's \$115,000 debt.

"We're examining our options, now," Michanczyk said. "It's possible that with the extra time they may be able to pay off the IRS."

Michanczyk said the IRS would not file liens against the salaries of Mike or any of the members of the board of directors, but that liens and levies could be filed against their property.

Tuberculosis is a disease of the respiratory system. The symptoms include coughing, sneezing and spitting blood.

Since Wednesday of this week, about 100 youngsters have been tested. Six of those reacted positively to the test. There are still about 300 students who had been exposed to the infected student who have not been tested. Many are expected at the health department's Sanford office today.

Those students who it is determined are infected will undergo additional review.

According to Maureen Jones, R.N., senior community health coordinator at the health de-

partment, the infected youngsters will undergo chest X-Rays and, if deemed necessary by the attending physician, sputum tests to determine whether they have developed tuberculosis.

She said that if they have only been infected by the bacteria, they can take a simple antibiotic to prevent any further progression of the disease.

If, however, the disease has begun to take effect, the students will have to undergo more extensive therapy involving several drugs.

According to Jones, even if the tuberculin bacteria has progressed to the second stage, it is not cause for great concern.

"We have drugs that we did not have a couple of decades ago

which can pretty much cure tuberculosis," she said.

According to health department statistics about 1,000 cases of tuberculosis are diagnosed in Florida annually.

FAA report: Wind sensors not working when storm hit airport

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. — Wind-detecting equipment was not working last weekend when hurricane-force winds ripped through Knoxville's McGhee Tyson Airport damaging planes and buildings, aviation officials said.

The safety devices are also not working at airports in Nashville and Memphis and at 54 other major U.S. airports, the Federal Aviation Administration reported.

Fred Farrar of the FAA said the safety devices have been out of service for about ten days due to computer problems.

"We are not using them," Farrar said. "We are replacing the software and we expect them to be up and running June 18."

Some other airports where the wind indicators are down include Atlanta, Charlotte, N.C.,

Miami, Louisville, Ky., and Birmingham, Ala., according to Arlene Salac of the FAA's Southern Region office in Atlanta.

Strong winds did thousands of dollars of damage Saturday at the airport just south of Knoxville and were caused by a microburst - dangerous, quick forming gusts that push directly downward.

Airport spokeswoman Sharon Pound said a wind speed meter near the runway "topped out at 160 mph" during the microburst.

"I know of no other storm that has caused this much damage," Pound said. "It is fortunate no one was injured. It was pretty intense weather."

The winds damaged 14 parked aircraft, flipping some of them over, and tossed air cargo equipment containers onto the tarmac, according to airport air

traffic supervisor Ed Johnson.

Johnson said no planes were landing or taking off when the afternoon storm hit.

The storm also knocked out the control tower's radar system for more than an hour, Johnson said, adding that microbursts and similar wind shears have been blamed for at least two airline crashes in recent years.

He said the wind-detecting device, which tells air traffic controllers if dangerous shifts in the wind are in the airport's vicinity, is the only way the airport has to detect microbursts and wind shears.

He said six wind sensors are placed at different sections of the airport to pick up sudden changes in weather.

"Anytime you have a thunderstorm, you have potential for hail, tornadoes and microbursts," Johnson said.

Father, son charged in scheme to distribute ton of marijuana

NEWARK, N.J. — The FBI arrested a father and son at their homes in New Jersey, Monday, Wednesday on Florida charges of conspiring to distribute more than one ton of marijuana.

A federal magistrate in Newark ordered Richard Imbert Sr. and his son, also named Richard, detained without bail pending a hearing Friday.

Federal prosecutors in Florida

charge that the younger Imbert, a Berkeley Heights resident, headed a group of 10 people, including his father, that conspired to sell at least 1,000 kilograms of marijuana between September 1, 1988 and December 1989. An indictment was handed up Tuesday by a federal grand jury in Tampa.

If convicted, they face prison terms of 10 years to life and fines of \$4 million.

The government is also seeking forfeiture of property owned

by the Imberts, including the father's house in Madison, N.J., and property owned by the son in Tampa, Fla. Two automobiles and a small quantity of white powder were seized during the arrests.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Marion Percell said she is seeking detention of the Imberts pending trial, arguing that they are both dangerous and likely to flee if released.

The Imberts and eight other defendants will be tried in Tampa.

administration at Florida State University.

"It may well be that younger employees don't have the time perspective afforded older employees. They've just seen the greedy '80s and are perhaps more disillusioned," said Bowman, who conducted the survey.

"I think the basic point is that there is a pervasive sense of unease about ethics in society as a whole," he said. "It's not the kind of thing that lends itself to

easy answers."

Bowman polled 441 city, county, state and federal employees throughout the United States on ethics in government, business and society as a whole.

He found that much of the cynicism results from hostility between career civil servants and increasing numbers of political appointees, especially in the federal government.

"I think there is an increasing split between those two groups that became more dramatic in the '80s," he said. "It has had a very damaging effect. There are far more political appointees than there were before and their quality varies a lot."

For American society as a

whole, 48 percent of those surveyed disputed the statement: "Ethics is similar to the weather; everyone talks about it, but no one does anything about it."

But a large minority, 39 percent, agreed with the statement. The remaining 12 percent were uncertain.

More than 60 percent felt that society suffers from a "moral numbness" after a decade of scandals involving Wall Street, organized religion, the Pentagon and the White House.

Government employees were no more enamored of business ethics. Almost 90 percent disagreed that "government morality is lower than business morality."

School board attorney suspended

FORT WALTON BEACH — A school board attorney beat-known for working out a compromise in a controversial school prayer case has been suspended over the disappearance of nearly \$200,000, officials said Wednesday.

Pledger Sullivan, superintendent of Okaloosa County schools, said school officials suspect David Selby of lying and forging letters regarding the money, which was to be used to purchase land for a school.

State Attorney Curtis Golden said an investigation has been launched into the matter. Sullivan spoke to Golden Wednesday, then met with Golden's chief investigator to review the case.

"The investigation will proceed under the supervision of Jim Murray, the assistant state attorney in charge of Okaloosa County," said Golden, who did not know how long the probe would take.

be spent on road improvements, and one of the projects would be the six-laning of State Road 46 from Interstate 4 to County Road 15.

"This will result in traffic flow far in excess of what the Seminole Mall will bring in," McCarty said.

McCarty also said the construction of the mall would provide 1,500 temporary jobs and the retail businesses inside the complex would provide full-time jobs to as many as 2,500 people, most of them residents from the immediate area.

"Many of the retailers will be providing above minimum wage jobs," chamber Vice President Jim Young said. "I think a long-term effect of it will be that it will bring more people into Seminole County and we will see an increase in activity downtown."

Steve Cooke, Central Florida Regional Airport director of aviation, said the road improvements McCarty discussed were "satisfactory" for the amount of traffic that would be brought in by the development of the area.

"I think what you are going to see is a lot of retail areas developing around the mall — not necessarily in one center, but spread out," Cooke said. "It will be kind of like what we have in Altamonte Springs."

'Microwave' heats up, helps Pistons repeat as champs

PORTLAND, Ore. — Move over Bill Russell. Step aside, George Mikan and Magic Johnson. The Bad Boys have bulldozed their way into your exclusive neighborhood.

The Detroit Pistons gained entrance into the elite club of repeat champions Thursday night, defeating the Portland Trail Blazers 92-90 to complete a record-tying road sweep in the NBA Finals.

Vinnie Johnson, dormant in the first three quarters, nailed a 15-foot jumper with seven-tenths of a second left to snap a 90-90 tie as Detroit won the best-of-seven series 4 games to 1 to join the Celtics and Lakers as the only franchises in league history to capture the crown in consecutive seasons.

"When I was in college (at Baylor) I used to hit them all the time," said the man nicknamed "Microwave." "But never in the pros."

Johnson scored 15 of his 16 points in the final period, including 7 of his team's last 9 points, as the Pistons stormed back from a 90-83 deficit with two minutes to play.

Pistons playmaker Isiah Thomas, who averaged 27.6 points a game in the series, was a unanimous choice to receive the Most Valuable Player award in the Finals.

Detroit, which swept the Lakers last year, needed only nine games in the championship round to win back-to-back titles. That bettered the previous record of 10 set by Boston in 1964 and 1965.

"We believe we are one of the best teams ever to play the game of basketball," said Thomas, who had 29 points on 13 of 20 shooting.

The Pistons joined the 1953 Minneapolis Lakers as the only teams to win three road games in the Finals. The two also are the only clubs to capture the middle three road games in the 10 title series to feature the 2-3-2 format.

"Any team that can come into this arena and win three in a row is a great team," Detroit Coach Chuck Daly said. "I really wanted to get it over with. I did not want to play another game (in Detroit)."

What made this all so amazing was the fact Detroit had entered Game 3 at Memorial Coliseum with a 16-year, 20-game losing streak

at Portland. And the Trail Blazers had won their first nine home games in the playoffs.

Portland, though, faltered after winning Game 2 in overtime at the Palace, and failed to win its second NBA title and first since 1977.

"In the last two minutes they made every difficult shot they had to make," Trail Blazers Coach Rick Adelman said. "That's why they're the world champions."

The Trail Blazers lost three straight home games for the first time since Jan. 1989. The Pistons set a Finals record with their fifth straight road victory dating to last year.

After Buck Williams concluded a 9-2 Portland burst with a jam with 2:07 to play, Thomas came off the bench after a six-minute rest — he suffered a bloody nose when elbowed by Jerome Kersey — and Detroit began its comeback.

Johnson struck for 5 quick points before a Thomas jumper — his only points of the fourth quarter — tied it 90-90 with 36.5 seconds left.

After Portland's Terry Porter threw the ball out of bounds 16 seconds later, Johnson took a pass from a corner, backed into Kersey, then pulled up to swish as game-winner.

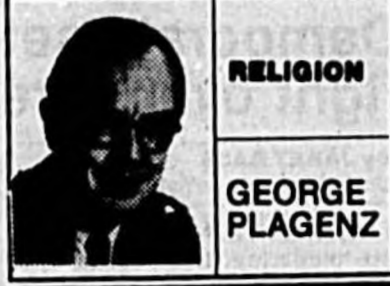
City, churches will sponsor crusade against drug abuse

Along with musical guests Sherman Andrus, formerly of Andrus, Blackwood and Company, Celeste Wyman and the Freedom Singers, Birdella Hall-Walker and Bruce Thompkins, former Harlem Globetrotter Meadowlark Lemon will speak out against drugs. Lemon, who traveled all over the world playing basketball with the Harlem Globetrotters for 22 years and for several more years with his own team the Bucketeers, attributes a great deal of his success to the fact that he abstained from alcohol, drugs and cigarettes. A born-again Christian in recent years, Lemon has continued globetrotting to offer his testimony of substance-free living and his relationship with Jesus Christ.

The Freedom from Drugs campaign is co-sponsored by the City and Freedom Assembly Church in Sanford. According to the church's pastor Randy Hall, the entertainment is made up of many local favorites who live in the Sanford area and want to rid the city of drugs. "They want to bring others to the joys of a drug free life style," he said. Mayor Smith will rally the participants to aspire to doing greater things without relying on drugs. "Mayor Smith is one of the best friends of the war on drugs in this area," Hall noted. 'Live-in' dilemma addressed by elderly church members

Betty is one of a growing number of older people who not only have to live alone but who are having trouble making ends meet. Loneliness and poverty are a cruel combination. What Betty wants to know is whether it is all right in God's eyes for a Christian woman to live with a gentleman friend without benefit of marriage. They could put their meager financial resources together and enjoy each other's companionship. "Actually, I gather from Betty's letter that she already has such a domestic relationship but that her Christian friends are accusing her of living a sinful life. "I cannot get Social Security until I am 62 and welfare doesn't pay enough to live on," she writes. She isn't in love with the "gentleman friend" with whom she shares a household but she enjoys his company. She does all the cooking and housekeeping chores. He chips in on expenses. It works out fine except for Betty's guilt feelings. I read about a widow who was wrestling with the same problem a few years ago. The only difference in that case was that the widow was in love with the man she was living with. They hadn't gotten married, she said, because "I get a pension from my deceased husband's employer which I will lose if I remarry." The "crisis counselor" to whom she brought her problem advised her to see her minister. She did. The clergyman said he would perform a wedding ceremony — an unofficial one in the sense that it wouldn't be registered in the Probate Court — so the woman could feel married in the eyes of God without having to forfeit her husband's pension. A few days after reading about this in the crisis counselor's newspaper column, I was having lunch with an Episcopal clergyman. I asked him if he had ever heard of such an arrangement. "Heard of it?" he said. "I have conducted such a ceremony

myself — under much the same conditions and for much the same reasons. This couple stood to lose much-needed money — in pensions or reduced Social Security benefits — if they married." But if the clergyman was satisfied that the couple "intend to live together after God's holy ordinance in the holy estate of matrimony," he could give the blessing of the church to their union. As to whether such a marriage is lawful, the Episcopal wedding ceremony says only that "if any persons are joined together otherwise than as God's Word doth allow, their marriage is not lawful." There is nothing in the Bible about having a valid marriage license on file in Probate Court. After I wrote about my conversation with this Episcopal priest, I heard from several readers, including the Episcopal bishop of Southern Virginia, who said my clergy friend was violating the canons of the Episcopal Church. I also heard from a mother in Albuquerque, N.M., whose daughter suffered from cerebral palsy and was slightly retarded. She had met a young man with the same handicaps. They fell in love and wanted to get married but, said her mother, "You wouldn't believe the legal obstacles thrown up to them." Their Social Security would have dropped drastically, said this mother, the young man would have lost his deceased father's service-related benefits, the American Association of Retarded Citizens would have denied them any further assistance — "the list goes on."

Cardinal issues excommunication warning to politicians on abortion

NEW YORK — Cardinal John O'Connor, in a tough 12-page statement published in the archdiocesan newspaper Thursday, warned Roman Catholic politicians they risk excommunication if they continue to support abortion rights. "Where Catholics are perceived not only as treating church teaching on abortion with contempt, but helping to multiply abortions by advocating legislation supporting abortion, or by making public funds available for abortion, bishops may decide that ... such Catholics must be warned that they are at risk of excommunication," O'Connor's statement said. O'Connor said that if such actions persist, "bishops may consider excommunication the

only option." The statement comes just days after the archdiocese rescinded an invitation to Rep. Charles Rangel, D-N.Y., a Catholic, to speak at a Catholic high school commencement because of his support for legal abortion. In early May, the Catholic diocese of Providence, R.I., ordered a church high school to cancel a speech by state Rep. Patrick Kennedy, 22-year-old son of Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., because he supports abortion rights. Last November, in the first such move against a Catholic politician, San Diego Bishop Leo Maher issued an order denying the sacraments to Lucy Killea, a state senate candidate, because of her support for legal abortion.

Flag debate erupts on Hill

Partisan battle expected to rage over amendment

WASHINGTON — Congress used Flag Day to open an election-year debate on a constitutional amendment to ban flag desecration with charges that Republicans are politicizing patriotism.

But House and Senate Republicans, joined by a few Democrats for news conference-rallies on both sides of Capitol Hill, proclaimed the matter a debate on cultural values prompted by an overwhelming need to protect the national symbol from burning, which the Supreme Court has decided is constitutionally protected dissent.

The exchange of rhetoric — both political and substantive — was but a preliminary to the battle that will be fought out on the floor of the House and Senate, where supporters must muster a two-thirds vote before the amendment can go to the states. Thirty-eight states must ratify it for the simple 20-word declaration to be added to the Constitution as the 27th amendment.

Senate Republican leader Robert Dole of Kansas, who was wounded in World War II, angered Democrats Monday by saying 30-second campaign commercials against amendment opponents could be effective. He defended his remarks Thursday, telling a crowd outside the Capitol that "we're not here to demagogue for anyone or anything. We believe this is the right way to go. We tried a statute and it didn't work."

Assistant House Republican leader Newt Gingrich of Georgia, who was joined by a House

Democrat, several Republicans, veterans groups and a member of the Republican National Committee, told reporters that "for those of you who believe that our friends on the left are pained about free speech, this is a debate about cultural values."

There are Democrats and Republicans on both sides of the issue, but the partisan rhetoric has risen with the promises of Republicans to turn the matter into a campaign issue. Sen. Robert Kerrey, D-Nebr., a Vietnam War veteran who was awarded the Medal of Honor, accused President Bush in an emotional speech of using the American flag as a "political issue" and of trying to divide the country.

Kerrey said he was "offended and angered" by attempts by Bush and the Republicans to use the issue politically for the November elections.

At the White House, Bush declined to be drawn into commenting on Kerrey's address. In commemoration of Flag Day, Bush helped to raise the flag at the Vietnam Veterans' Memorial on Thursday morning.

Sen. Dale Bumpers, D-Ark., said he was "chagrined, dismayed and angry that this has to be done before the elections in November. You don't have to be a rocket scientist to figure out what's driving this thing."

And Sen. Terry Sanford, D-N.C., said the Founding Fathers could not have foreseen a president "so frightened of the next election" to try and weaken the Bill of Rights. The United States, he said, will be seen as "whimpering wimps" around the world if the amendment passes, showing that "we are not strong enough, brave enough that we can't stand dissent."

Democrats set for political fight over parental leave bill

WASHINGTON — Democrats are preparing to do battle with President Bush as they try to persuade him that vetoing the family and medical leave act would be wrong for working Americans and break his campaign pledges.

The Senate joined the House Thursday night in passing a bill requiring employers with more than 50 workers to offer 12 weeks of unpaid leave in one year to care for a newborn, adopted child or seriously ill parent, child, spouse or themselves.

Supporters of the measure — mostly Democrats but a few Republican members — say the bill is actually a pro-family bill

that tracks conservatives' views that parents should be with their children in their first weeks of life. And they say the bill is sensitive to small businesses and only affects employers with more than 50 workers — just 5 percent of all businesses.

But Bush, who has threatened a veto, has contended businesses should negotiate worker benefits with their employees and government should say no.

Democratic sponsors of the bill scheduled a news conference Friday to pressure Bush to sign.

"There's no question we're going to lay down the gauntlet and shift the debate to the political arena," said a key Senate aide. "He's got to stop paying lip service to all his pro-family pledges and start delivering."

Louisiana acts on tough abortion ban

BATON ROUGE, La. — The Louisiana Senate is likely to pass and send to Gov. Buddy Roemer a bill that would outlaw virtually all abortions in the state, but Roemer has sent mixed signals about whether he would sign such a measure into law.

The House of Representatives Thursday passed the bill, which if enacted would be certain to go before the U.S. Supreme Court.

The bill would make it a felony to perform an abortion in the state except to save a woman's life.

Central America seeks common market

ANTIGUA, Guatemala — The private industry and business organizations of Central America and Panama sent a joint proposal to their heads of state to form a regional economic community modeled on the European Common Market.

In a letter signed by the twelve organizations that make up the Federation of Private Entities of Central America and Panama, the group urged its member presidents to initiate plans for a common market at their weekend economic summit, which is to begin Friday in Antigua, 28 miles southwest of Guatemala City.

"Today more than ever, especially with the changes in the Eastern European countries. It is obvious that the only fundamental philosophy and doctrine is economic liberty," the five-page letter said.

The call for a Central American trade bloc that would compete with other world cooperatives has been echoed by public and private officials over the past few months, especially since the change of government in Nicaragua opened that country to more favorable western trade.

The announcement is the first concrete

agreement by the private sector on forming a common market, and the topic is expected to be high on the agenda of the presidents of Panama, Guatemala, Honduras, El Salvador, Nicaragua and Costa Rica.

Foreign and economic ministers met Thursday in advance of the summit, and Guatemalan Deputy Foreign Minister Julio Martini said regional disarmament would also be a key theme.

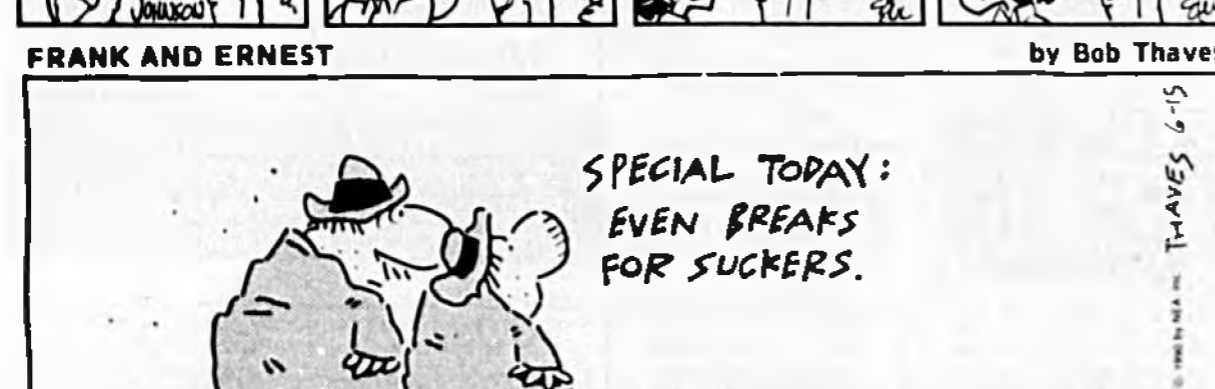

Emphysema helped by respiratory therapy

DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband has emphysema and has difficulty breathing — primarily in the afternoon when he tires. What's your advice?

DEAR READER: Emphysema is a chronic lung disease marked by destruction of alveoli, the feathery air sacs that provide for the elimination of waste carbon dioxide and intake of fresh oxygen by lung tissue. Patients with emphysema experience difficulty exhaling stale air; the lungs become over-expanded because of retained carbon dioxide. This leads to breathlessness and difficulty breathing on exertion. Because emphysema patients have to work so hard simply to breathe, their respiratory muscles tire easily; hence, the affliction typically worsens as the day wears on or during exercise.

Emphysema is a common consequence of cigarette smoking, air pollution, repeated respiratory infections and asthma. There are several ways your husband can improve his breathing.

First, he should be given antibiotics for any pulmonary infection, no matter how trivial, because even small areas of infection can further compromise his already overworked respiratory system.

Also, if he is prone to asthma (spasm of bronchial passages), he would be helped by bronchodilators, drugs to relax the airways and permit him to breathe more easily. Bronchodilators are available by prescription in pills, liquid and aerosols.

Second, your husband should have respiratory therapy by a qualified professional. Mucus plugs can be dislodged and coughed up by gravity drainage as part of a treatment program including nebulized drugs administered by vapor from a machine. Further, special breathing exercises, taught by an inhalation therapist, may enable your husband to learn how to use accessory breathing muscles (in the chest wall and

between the ribs) to compensate for the over-work of breathing.

Third, low-flow oxygen, delivered from a tank or oxygen concentrator through a plastic tube to the nose, may make your husband more comfortable by supplying the extra oxygen he so desperately needs. The oxygen can be used constantly or, preferably, intermittently to control

symptoms, relieve breathlessness and permit him more independence.
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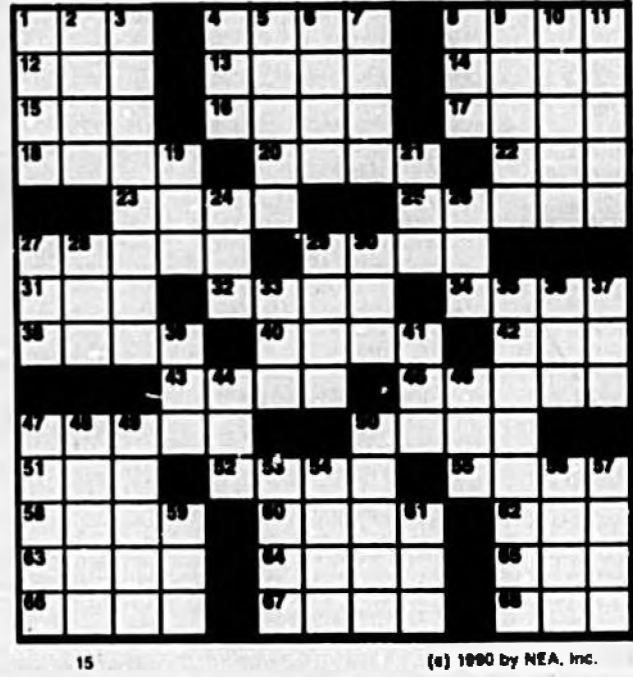
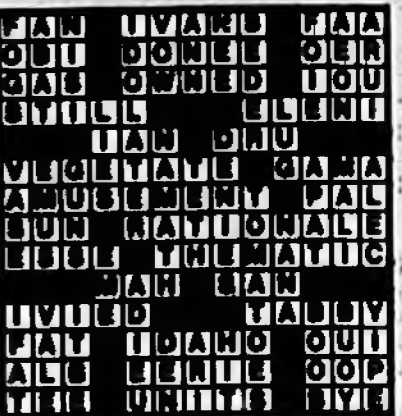

WIN AT BRIDGE

Greed is a terrible thing, as illustrated by this deal from tournament competition. West made a pre-emptive jump overcall, and North's double was negative, announcing enough values to compete in either black suit at that level. When East raised diamonds, South rebid his six-card heart suit. So far, all was well and good. West led the jack of spades. Declarer won in dummy and cashed the queen of hearts. Now what? At tables where declarer was greedy, a spade was led back to the king. West ruffed, underled his ace of diamonds for a second spade ruff, and then got off lead with a high diamond. Declarer ruffed and drew trumps but had no way to get to dummy to take the

club finesse, so he was down one. Most declarers realized that the spade jack was a likely singleton. They came to their hand with the ace of clubs and drew trumps. Then they tried spades and gave up a club. The defenders cashed their diamond trick to hold the contract to 11 tricks. One declarer was quite lucky. He won the king of spades, played a heart to dummy's queen, and then led dummy's queen of clubs. When that held, he played a club back to his ace as the king fell. He now drew trumps and made all 13 tricks. This was not the right play (East could have a singleton small club, either opponent could have the singleton king of clubs, etc., etc.), but he won all the marbles.
