BERLIN, July 31—W?—The Stars and Stripes will not be dipped in salute to Adolf Hitler when the 'American delegation passes the reviewing stand in the opening Olympic parade Saturday. Avery T. Brundage, president of the American Olympic Association, called in German reporters vesterday and saked wide publicity of the following statement:

"According to United States Army regulations, the American flag may never be dipped. Therefore, it is impossible for the flag bearer in the Olympic parade to comply with requests of printed parade instructions."



How is your job affected by machinery? asks The Associated Press in a dispatch from Dayton, Ohio, printed recently in the New York Times. The answer, it suggests, should be based on the cold, practical fact of what

is occurring.
"From 1900 to 1930," says the dispatch, "when we had more new machinery than at any time in our history, there was a gain tion at the Riley Store in Delais!, of 20,000,000 new jobs. Every time a thousand new people were added to our population, 422 new jobs were created by our machine age.

"During the last fifty years the population of the United States increased about 200 , per cent, while jobs have increased about 300 perecent. One out of every four persons today owes his employment to one of these eighteen new industries produced by invention and engineering, says H. A. Toulmin, Jr., of the patent section, of the American

Bar Association. "Occupations that have gono out of vogue have lost 800,000 jobs. The new businesses created by invention have given more than 2,250,000 jubs. The balance is undoubtedly on the right side of the ledger in favor of invention and engineering.

"It is needless to say, because it is common knowledge, that the new jobs are pleasanter, and better compensated than the old. It certainly is better for a man to be running a high-class piece of automatic machinery, where brains and skill count, than to break his back with a pick and shovel.








Air View Of Federal Prison At Atlanta, Ga.






