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Sewage from the New Seminole County Home, under construction, will not be allowed to pollute a nearby lake. Seminole County Commissioners at the regular meeting authorized John Meisch, chairman, and Houston Steele to investigate the matter of disposing of sewage and to advertise for bids for a septic tank.

Stores in every part of the city particularly on First Street and Sanford Avenue, are being decorated and the windows are being dressed with hundreds of articles of merchandise to sell at a price not to exceed one dollar.

A wireless dispatch late yesterday from the Associated Press correspondent at Nassau told of the destruction left in the wake of what has been officially described as the most terrific storm in the recorded history of the islands.

Robbers chiseled the door of a big safe in the office of the Seminole Creamery Company of 419 West Fourth Street last night, and took \$325 in cash and several checks, according to a statement made today.

The agreement of seven years standing, entered into between the baron and his wife following the war and the trouble with Bolsheviks in Russia, caused the couple to plan death.

Two men narrowly escaped fatal injuries early Sunday morning when the roadster in which they were riding struck the center of a train of freight cars on the Florida East Coast Railroad crossing north of the new power plant of the Florida Power and Light Company on the Dixie Highway.

The safe robbers used a crow bar in breaking in the front door of the creamery office. The safe was badly damaged and the combination lock was mutilated by the robbers.

Miami Man Found In Church With A Bullet In His Head

MACON, Ga., Aug. 2.—(AP)—Seriously wounded by a pistol bullet that entered the head, Wiley P. Paul, of Miami, Fla., was found slumped across a small table in the Friendship Baptist Church near Dry Branch, Ga., yesterday afternoon.

He purchased a piece of twine and walked on his crutches to the nearest tree, but found he couldn't climb. Boarding a bus, he rode to a tangled thicket a few miles north of Miami, where he remained throughout the day Saturday. Here he was found by police when his efforts to climb trees to hang himself attracted attention of residents.

**Experiences Of First Trip
Through The Everglades
Told By Member Of Party**

Next morning, Tuesday (22), we
decided to change our course so as
to avoid saw grass, and this nec-
essitated the abandonment of part
of the line we had run the day be-
fore, which I did not like very
much. Early that morning Mr.
Ingraham, Mr. Sydney and Mr.
Moses went off to the south to ex-
amine a large body of timber,
barely visible from where we were.
About noon they returned, bring-
ing with them or rather I should
say brought by an Indian in his
canoe.

They said they had gone to the
cypress swamp, and finding the
ground very boggy had started to
return, when they suddenly came
upon an Indian on foot who said
his name was Billy Fuel. They
tried to hire him to go to Miami
and act as our guide, but he re-
fused; desiring of making any
term with him they started off
again when Mr. Ingraham who had
on boots became bogged up and in
his efforts to get out, exhausted.

The Indian seeing this seemed to
pity them and said, "wait, I got
canoe," he then walked to a thick
clump of bushes nearby, pulled out
a canoe and taking two of our ex-
plorers with him came to where we
were.

We ate lunch that day as we
stood in the water, and potted
ham, crackers and cold coffee nev-
er tasted so good. The Indian
stayed with us until we had camped
and had supper. Before he left
we offered him every inducement
to act as our guide, and when we
offered him whiskey he seemed to
yield to our desires, but said he
had to go home first and see his
squaw, but would meet us at our
next night camp ready to go with
us to Miami, but we never saw
Billy Fuel any more.

That day's march had completely
worned me out, we had advanced
since morning only about five
miles, but these were equivalent to
twenty on dry land. I was so tired
I had lost interest in everything,
didn't care whether Billy Fuel

stayed, went or never came back,
so I could lie down and rest. I
managed to help Mr. Sidney as-
range our bed, flopped down on it
and slept until supper was ready.
As soon as I had finished that I
dropped off to sleep again.

What appetites we had and how
delicious everything tasted. To be
sure our biscuit had a "heart" of
dough and was appropriate called
slinkers, and our coffee was a lit-
tle muddy, and our bacon salty,
and not always well done, but how
refreshing this food was to our
poor boys, wet, weary and muddy
as we were.

The next morning before start-
ing off we reconnoitered from the
top of a large wild fig tree which
grew in the center of our island,
and though we could see an open-
ing through the saw grass lead-
ing in the direction we wished to go,
but about 11 o'clock the saw grass
closed us in and to go forward we
were compelled to go through it.

We stopped a few minutes to
rest and eat our lunch of soda
crackers and fat bacon soaked in
a bucket of grease, and then start-
ed forward again for the nearest
island was several miles ahead of
us, and although we could see no
passage through the saw grass
leading to it, we knew we must
reach it to find food to cook with
and a dry place to sleep.

The grass was high and thick
the ground so boggy that every
step we took we sank into it up
to our thighs, and the sun was
scorching hot. It soon became
evident that at the rate we were
going we could not reach the island
by night and so Dr. Newman pro-
posed that we two go ahead and
fire the saw grass so as to clear
the way for the boats. The grass
directly in front of us had already
been lighted and fanned by the
stiff breeze was rapidly spreading
around the little pond that we
stood in.
