FLORIDA MAY LEARN FROM MICHIGAN

The Michigan legislature, now in session, is wrestling with certain problems which inevitably suggest those which will confront the Florida solons when they come together in April. The question of reapportionment is uppermost as it is with all states, following the last federal census. So far as we know, however, there is no ill feeling hanging on this question in the northern state.

Michigan, like Florida has a vast acreage of cutover lands, legacy of her once great lumbering business. The lumbermen exhausted the white pine forests and moved on leaving behind them a barren, unprofitable wilderness.

Sanford has the finest location for a big meat packing plant in the state and it is strange that such an enterprise has never been induced to come here. In the center of population, with water transportation and cheap rates and railroad facilities second to none and in the very heart of the cattle industry of the state Sanford would be the place for a big meat packing concern or several of them.

Sanford should have a packing plant. The Palatka News thinks that such a plant should be established in Palatka and we agree with the News that such plants should be established all along the St. Johns River. The News says: "With a population of less than two thousand, Chipley, in Washington

county, has paid out to the farmers and poultrymen and stock raisers more than a half million dollars during the past year, from one packing concern. It is easy to understand why the population has increased nearly 50 per cent during the past decade, and why farm values have taken an upward slant during the past two years.

For one establishment in a county having a population of 11,923 in 1920 to pay through one house more than a half million dollars in one year is something well worth crowing over.

Putnam county had a population in 1920 of 14,586. It is practically double the area of Washington county; hence there is a greater opportunity to produce more and to sell more for the soil is considered equally productive. Yet there is no such an institution as Chipley possesses in the packing house; a packing house where growers can carry their dressed hogs and beef and have them cared for by hams and shoulders may be cured in the best manner; and where practically all produce is handled on a commission basis.

Putnam county should take steps along this line. It might be made one of the aims of the county agricultural agent to agitate such an institution; not to run in opposition against the investment of Chipley, but to be conducted in conjunction with it—for there will be markets for all, provided the quality of the products are equal. It would require considerable propaganda upon the part of the county agent through the press, and it would require much heart-to-heart explanation upon his part; but the press of the county would extend the one in equal parts with the agent himself.

There are still a few things that can be advertised in a magazine without using silk-clad legs as an illustration.

FEAR WAS CAUSE OF "GUILTY" PLEA

OF "GUILTY" PLEA WITNESSES CLAIM

(By The Associated Press) LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 23.—Declarations of two witnesses—"Red" Orr and Luther Wise—that they pleaded guilty to a charge of arson, of which they were in no sense the cause, for fear that they would be lynched if they went to trial, and assertions that high officials of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen were forced to leave Harrison, Ark., by a "mob" are before a committee of the Arkansas legislature at the end of the opening session yesterday of an inquiry ordered in connection with recent disorders incident to the strike of railroad workers along the line of the Missouri and North Arkansas Railway.

Orr and Wise, strikers, who declare they accepted penitentiary sentences or from seven to ten years each, asserted that when they demanded a trial they were told by Circuit Judge Shinn that their lives were in danger.

"Wise and I were brought to court last Wednesday and Judge Shinn asked us if we did not want to change our stories," Orr testified. "I told the court I wanted a trial and the judge said: 'All right, you will be tried tomorrow, but I warn you that your lives are in danger.'"

Wise's testimony was in substance the same as that of Orr. Both denied any connection with the burning of the bridge with which they were charged.

JACKSONVILLE MAY JOIN NEW LEAGUE AND MAY HAVE EFFECT ON THE STATE LEAGUE

Mullaney May Attend the Savannah Session as Jacksonville's Delegate

The going ahead of the Florida State League has been held up awaiting the outcome of the Jacksonville squabble on account of the Mullaney claim, and from the dope handed out after the last meeting of the League it was rumored that the Florida State League would not continue if Jacksonville's franchise fell through.

It is doubtful in the minds of the many fans that know of Jacksonville's inability to properly support their clubs in the league in past years as to whether or not they will care to support a club in class B circuit, but according to the Jacksonville Journal, although uncertain at this time, it is probable that Jacksonville will be represented, Dominick Mullaney being chairman of Jacksonville's interests.

The other towns and cities mentioned in the new league are: Savannah, Jacksonville, Columbus, Macon, Montgomery and Albany. Augusta and Brunswick are also interested. The Journal has the following to say about it:

The base ball committee representing the cities of Jacksonville, Savannah, Columbus, Macon, Montgomery and Albany, all of whom are making sincere efforts to organize a new circuit that would probably have a class B rating are to meet in Savannah on Wednesday for the purpose of outlining plans and determining if such an organization can be formed and placed upon a paying basis.

The meeting was originally scheduled for today but postponed at the request of several of the representatives. It is uncertain whether Jacksonville will be represented, or not, though Dominick Mullaney is chairman of Jacksonville interests.

Brunswick appears to be greatly interested, it is indicated in Savannah, and the committee will meet with L. J. Leavy, jr., in Brunswick on Thursday to discuss plans. Mr. Leavy is chairman of the Young Men's Club in Brunswick.

In addition to Brunswick and the six other cities already named, it is said that Augusta is interested in the formation of such a league and willing to consider taking over a franchise.

Two Columbus, Georgia, baseball fans are the chief instigators of the circuit and are making every effort to see that plans do not fall through. Those being given credit for attempting to form the league are Cliff Blankenship and O. R. McCallister.

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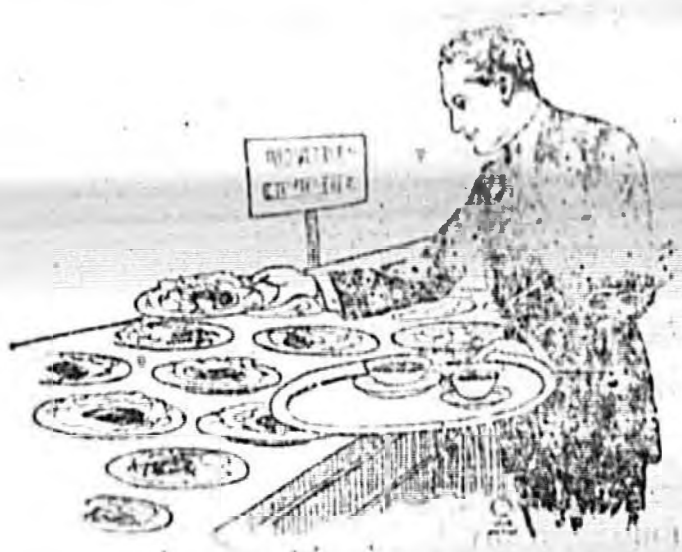
