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A List Of Losers

When a strike lasts 150 days, it's hard to judge who won and who lost. In the coal strike that has nearly come to an end, almost everyone is on the losing side.

The winners are limited to those coal miners who have not been enough ahead to balance 150 days of lost wages against the wage, pension and health benefits in the contract they finally accepted. Even when they figure they have made up their losses, there may be a catch.

The 35 percent increase in wages and fringe benefits in the three-year contract will be offset by anticipated increases in productivity in the coal industry, thus becoming an inflationary factor in the long run.

If it affects wage settlements in other industries, the coal strike may be a harbinger of a general wage-price spiral. The coal industry has been a major force in the inflationary process.

As the coal miners gain their pay raise in the next few years, they will also see the value of their investments drop.

The United Mine Workers union loses the 150-day strike only after a split between union locals and their national leadership.

UMW President Arnold Miller suffered the indignity of twice coming to the rank and file reject contracts he supports.

And on top of that he suffered a stroke for which he is hospitalized.

Whether he will live on to his job is now in doubt. Whether the UMW can effectively represent its members in industry-wide bargaining in the future is also in doubt.

The coal companies are big losers. They can gain increased labor costs on the coal they produce, but they were forced to bargain away contract provisions aimed at curbing wildcat strikes.

Consumers of coal products are also losers. They are forced to pay higher prices for coal and coal products. The coal industry has been a major force in the inflationary process.

Energy Secretary James Schlesinger did not exactly gain either. His campaign to get industry to convert from oil and gas to coal must now wait the hand of a rival administration. He has not added to his treasury of an undisciplined budget.

Adding to the losses the thousands of factory workers who weren't involved in the strike but were laid off for varying periods due to fuel shortages and power cutbacks.

Unlike the miners, they got no reward in the meantime.

Mr. Carter is representing a presidential commission on the coal industry to try to work out more satisfactory relations in the long-range problems.

These problems look as formidable today as they did when they were first raised. If that means so.

Given the total record of presidential commissions, they're not holding out much.

But if the commission can bring to light attention to the industry, which means are working on the industry, then the miners go at strike, there's a chance.

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Cruelty To Turtles Charged

HONG KONG (UPI)—For the second time in a month, Thai Airways International has been fined for cruelty to turtles.

A magistrate's court Thursday levied a \$200 penalty against the airline for mistreating 219 live turtles it carried to Hong Kong where they were to be sold in a public market.

A spokesman for the Agriculture and Fisheries Friday said the airline transported the turtles with their feet attached together in crates, which caused "unnecessary suffering."

The same airline was fined the same amount in a similar case a month ago.

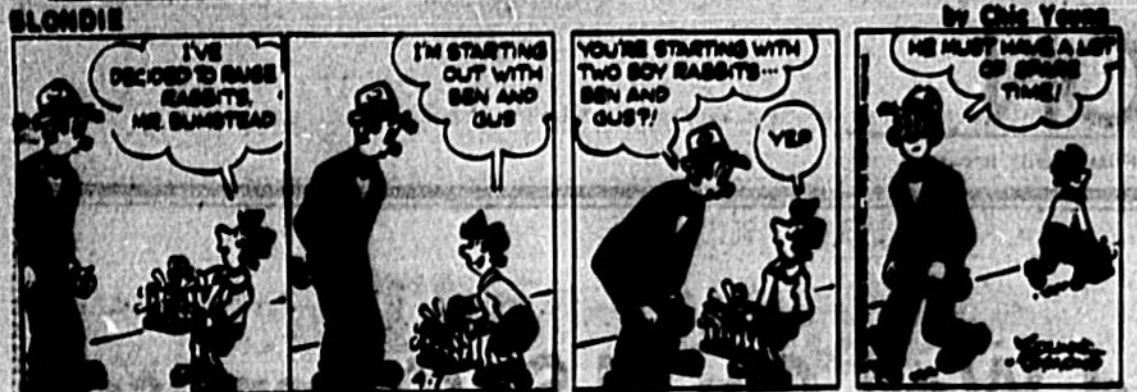

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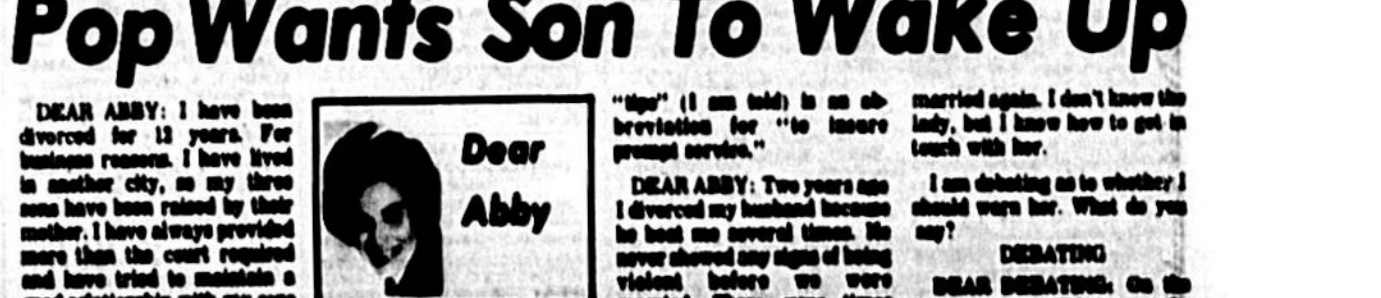

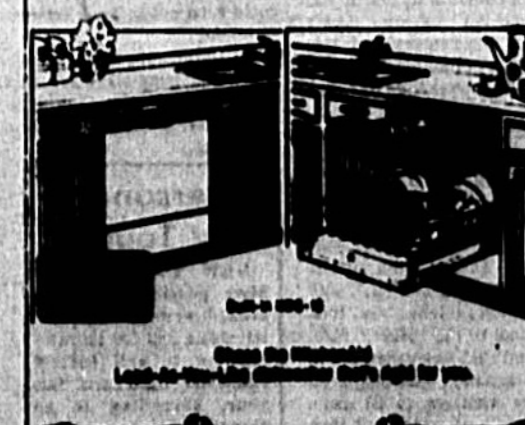
"The all-caribou was required to carry sleds and to make the drive," Davies said. "It was very hard to me in learning the movements and activities of the herd."

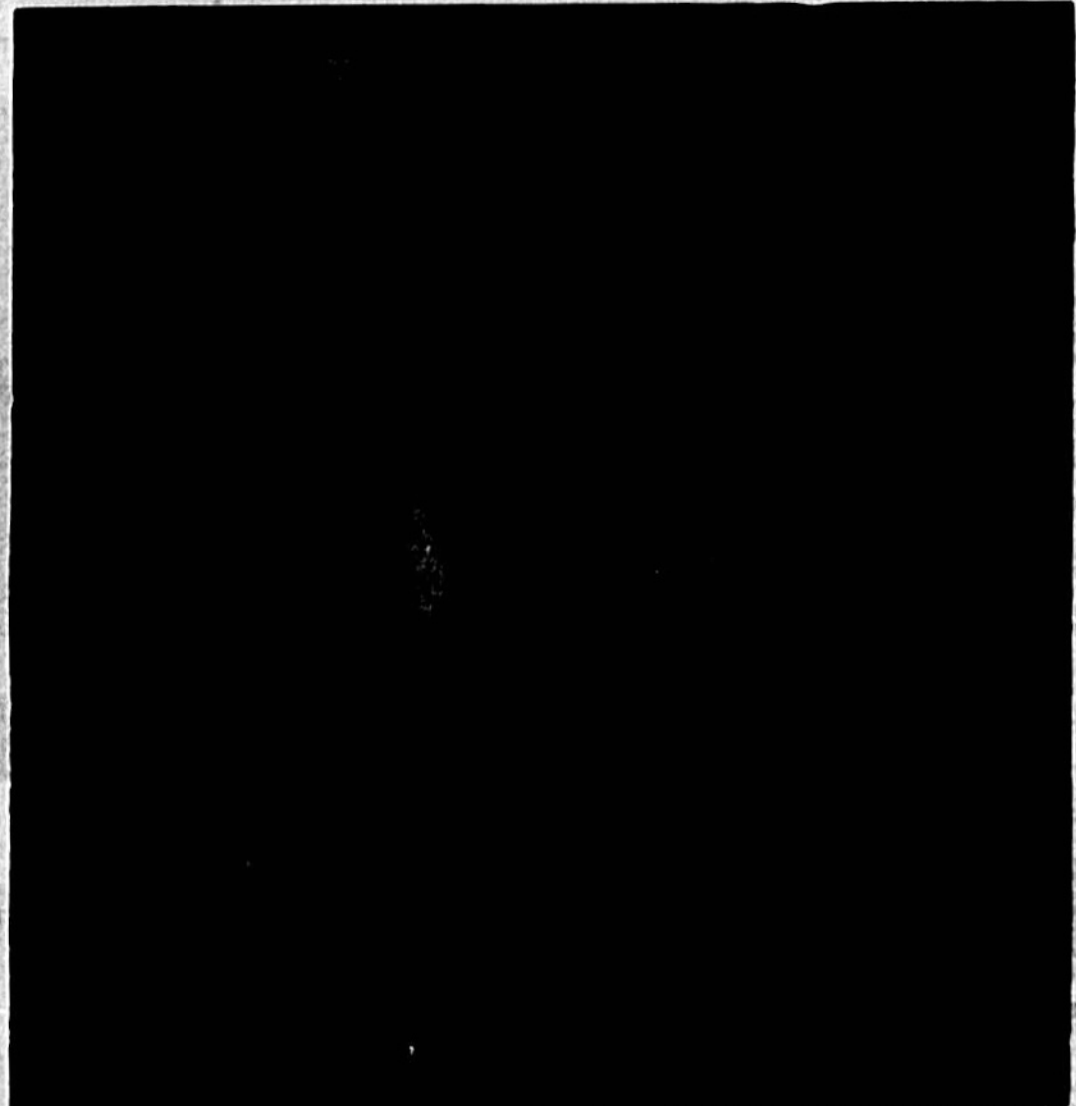

 In Seminole County

Seminole County probably will not institute a resort tax in the near future, according to the county administrator who responded to the matter after

praise last fall of a law allowing county governments to collect up to a two percent sales tax on hotel and motel rentals.

The law must be approved by referendum.

"I can't see that we can do anything with it given the restrictions placed on it currently," Commissioner Robert French said.

The law specifically mentions that the tax revenue "shall be used" to acquire, construct or repair for the county certain schools, libraries, courts, police and fire stations.

The money can also be used to promote tourism. The revenue from the tax can also be used to fund a variety of projects, including the acquisition of land for parks and recreation facilities.

French was interviewed in providing the tax as a method of supporting the Central Florida Regional Authority. At present there are no plans to allow for the tax revenue to be used for such.

"I want to Gary Regal (the county administrator) and asked for a legal opinion and he said that the law did not allow for the tax revenue to be used for such," said French.

French, Regal wrote: "I can find no provision allowing broad interpretation of the law. The word 'shall' is mandatory and the express mention of one or more things in the context of all others..." Regal said he interpreted that to mean the money could not be used for the job, but could be used for other purposes.

If the law were amended, it would mean about \$67,500 a year for the county, according to French. He said the county had about 1,500 hotel and motel rooms as of January 1977.

Some 20 percent of those rooms were occupied in the average month from August 1977, according to Regal from the Seminole County Industrial Development Authority. The average daily rate for rooms is \$35.00. By comparing those figures, French said the projected revenue could be determined.
