

# Lid Lifted On World Electronic Spying

WASHINGTON (AP) — Capabilities of the United States Navy and the Pentagon's electronic spying by the major powers.

It marks a drastic change from the Pentagon's insistence that the Liberty, a spy ship, was a "technical research ship."

"Intelligence collection by naval vessels is a routine activity," a defense official said Tuesday, indicating a more relaxed attitude toward suggestions the United States engages in this kind of activity.

"It is common knowledge that for a number of years intelligence collecting ships have followed U.S. fleet activities in various parts of the world," he added. The official obviously was alluding to the Soviet Union's electronic eavesdropping vessels which show up wherever U.S. fleets are maneuvering and near important Polaris submarine and other bases.

Such ships, in the guise of fishing trawlers, are "in fact positioned in international waters off the shores of the United States and other nations right now," this official said.

The U.S. intelligence vessels which listen in on the radio traffic of other countries, use radar sites and gather information to permit jamming them—and the Soviet Union's deep sea intelligence ships are parts of an extensive electronic intelligence system which has grown up in the Cold War years.

There are spy-in-the-sky satellites, both Soviet and American, whirling about the earth with electronic eyes. The U.S. also has electronic spying by the major powers.

There are unmanned drones with sensitive information-gathering equipment. There are destroyers carrying "black boxes" which slip close to hostile shores to intercept radio talk, record coded messages and pick up other information. One of the two U.S. destroyers involved in the historic Tonkin Gulf attack by North Vietnamese patrol boats in August 1964 reportedly had been on such a mission.

The United States and Soviet Union, say nothing about what they know of the other side's electronic snooping from space. But the U. S. Navy sometimes goes out about the operations of the Soviet "trawlers," some of which get into the flow of the traffic and sometimes interfere with carrier and other operations.

Members of Congress also have expressed alarm about the increasingly active Soviet naval snooping.

Soviet trawlers have been reported standing off Polaris submarine bases at Holy Loch, Scotland, at Rota, Spain, Guam, and Charleston, S.C.

The Red trawlers monitored U.S. nuclear weapons tests in the Pacific in 1962.

U.S. vessels have taken positions in the Pacific to observe the re-entry and splashdown of Soviet intercontinental ballistic

ships, the Barrier, in the Sea of Japan in June 1965.

The 85-ton Pueblo is one of three of her class, all converted light cargo vessels.

The Pueblo engages in hydrographic surveys as well as electronic intelligence, dropping devices into the water to measure its temperature at various levels, its salinity and its density. All these factors are important in antisubmarine warfare work because they affect the penetration of sonar beams.

All told, there are about a dozen clearly identifiable intelligence-type ships in the U.S. Navy, along with about 13 oceanographic survey ships which may well serve an intelligence function also.

Then there are the destroyers and other surface craft which can be equipped with electronic sensors as needed.

The Liberty, at 11,800 tons, was a bigger and more sophisticated intelligence vessel.

Among other things, the Liberty was equipped with a "big ear" diaphone detector that could monitor communications more than 100 miles distant.

There were reports the Liberty was operated by the Navy for the super-secret National Security Agency, whose mission is to track the codes of foreign countries and to pick up and analyze foreign radio communications.

She has about eight whip antennas and two heavy masts hung with special electronic gear.

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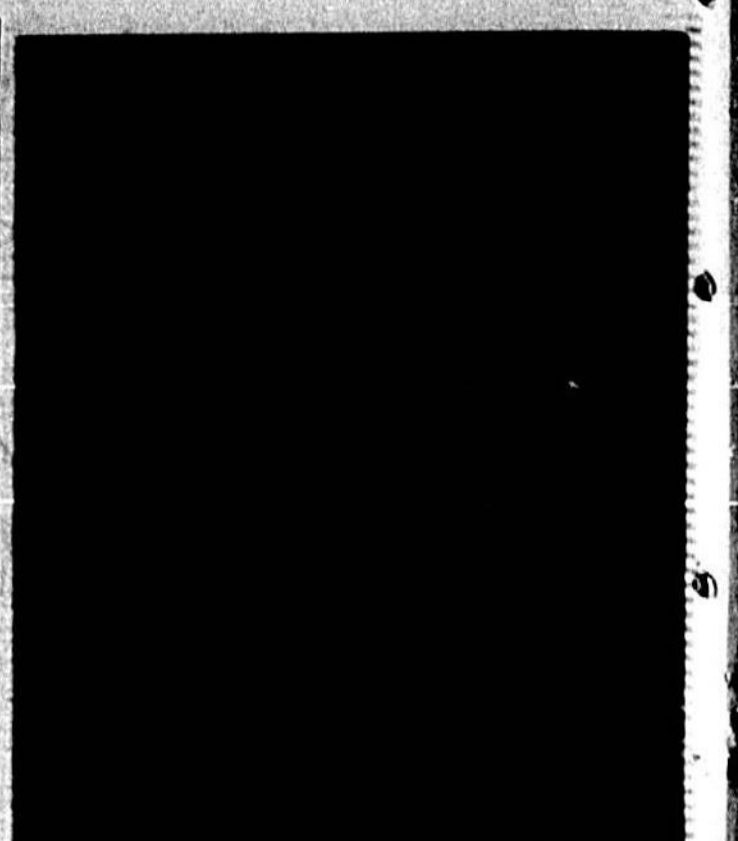

WASHINGTON (AP) — More than 14,000 Force military reservists are being called to active duty in the wake of the North Korean takeover of a U. S. ship, the Pentagon announced today.

The Pentagon's announcement followed quickly on the heels of word from the White House that President Johnson had called for the recall to active duty of a number of Air Force and Navy air reservists.

A Pentagon spokesman said the 14,000 are included in Air Force and Air National Guard units, and other Navy reserve units also are involved. No number was recalled immediately for the Navy.

# U. S. Seeks Ship's Return Through Diplomacy

WASHINGTON (AP) — An attempt was made today to persuade the North Koreans to return the captured ship Pueblo through diplomatic means.

A second effort to get the ship back is being made by the U.S. Navy intelligence ship USS Argonne, which is en route to the North Korean coast.

The ship was captured on Oct. 23, and has been held in the North Korean port of Wonsan. The ship's crew, including the ship's commander, Lt. Commander Eugene S. Sledge, and 39 other crew members, were taken to a camp near Wonsan.

The ship was captured while on a mission to collect intelligence in the North Korean coast. The ship was carrying electronic equipment and other intelligence-gathering devices.

The ship's capture has caused a major diplomatic crisis between the United States and North Korea. The United States has demanded the ship's return and the release of its crew.

Other Administration sources said the ship was always intended to be returned through diplomatic means.

Administration sources reported that at a meeting Wednesday of the Military Armistices Commission at the Panmunjom, Korea, the ship was discussed.

A U.S. spokesman said the North Koreans rejected a U.S. offer to release the ship and its crew in exchange for the release of American prisoners of war held in North Korea.

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# Inch Of Snow Coats Georgia

Winter heaped a miserable mixture of snow and sleet on the East and South today and allowed a wavering punch toward southern New England.

The Weather Bureau issued provisional heavy snow warnings for Massachusetts, Rhode Island and southern New Hampshire as a storm system out in the Atlantic crept northward and intensified.

Gale warnings flew along the southern New England coast and along parts of the Virginia-Carolina coast as well.

Residents of Appalachia awoke to a surprise snowfall in the wake of a surprise storm which hit northern Tennessee, North Carolina and Virginia Wednesday.

The storm swept southward into middle Georgia, coating an area from Atlanta and Macon eastward to Augusta with an inch of snow. Freezing rain combined with the snow to produce dangerous icing on some northern Georgia highways.

Temperatures in the southeastern part fell into the teens and 20s before dawn, adding discomfort to inconvenience. Travelers warnings remained in effect for most of the Carolina and adjacent areas.

Light snow continued in Virginia and North Carolina through the night. Western sections of both states were belted by snowfall ranging up to five or six inches Wednesday. Numerous schools remained closed for a second day in western North Carolina.

Bitter-cold weather which gripped the Midwest for two days rolled across the eastern Great Lakes, pushing the mercury down to zero in part of northern Pennsylvania and upstate New York. Massena, at the northern tip of New York, registered 24 below.

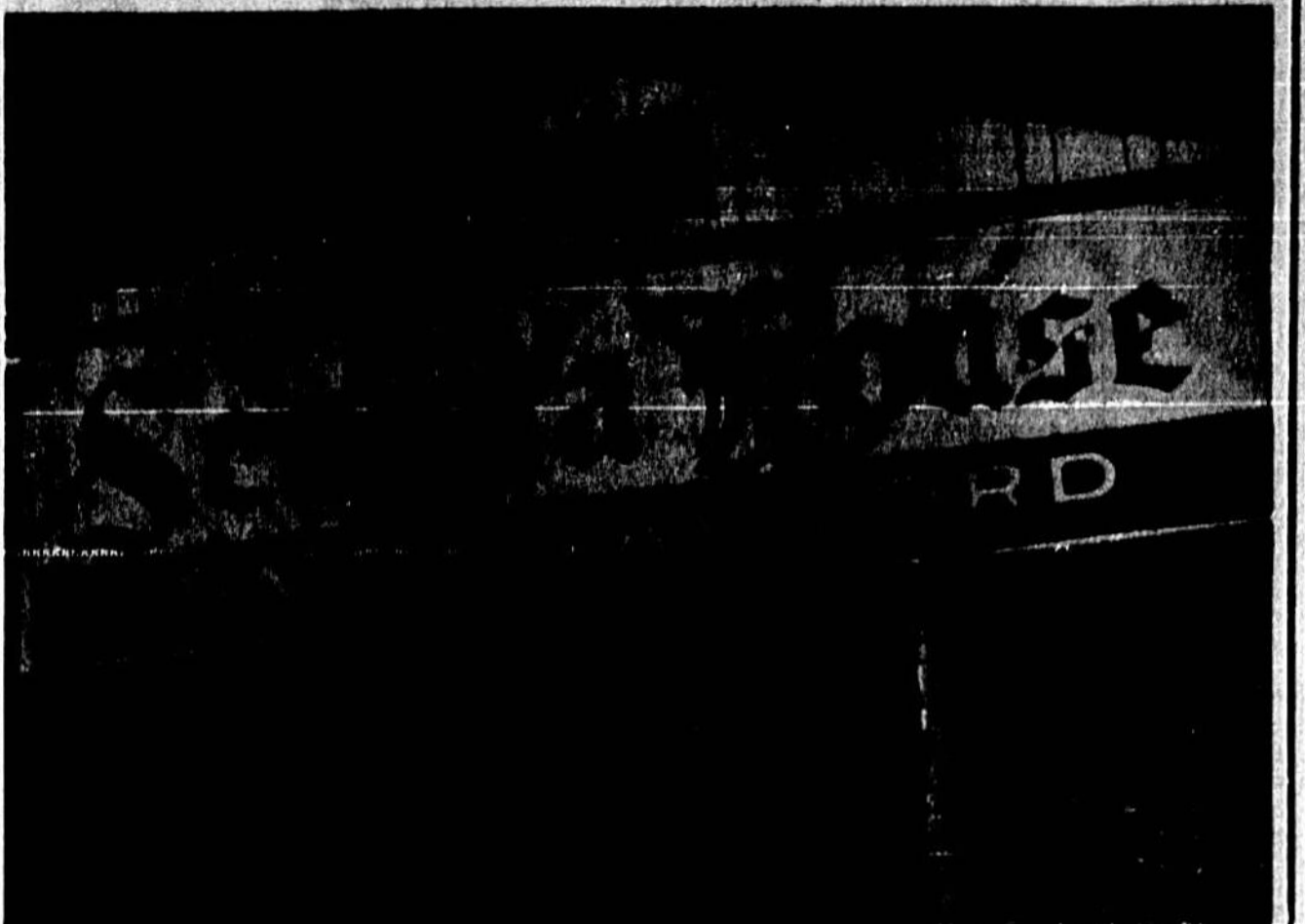
Contrasted with the severe weather through the east, severe January mildness prevailed over much of the western half of the country.

Temperatures climbed into the 60s as far north as the Canadian border Wednesday. Havre, Mont., with a high of 63, was nearly 20 degrees warmer than the 45 reported at Tallahassee, Fla. Readings in the 70s warmed southwestern Kansas.

Cooler air fanned into the Pacific northwest, however, and occasional drizzle dampened some sections.

# Bombers Pound Red Guns

SAIGON (AP) — An armada of American bombers pounded North Vietnamese gun and mortar positions threatening the U.S. Marines in the Khe Sanh valley for the sixth straight day today in one of the biggest air assaults of the Vietnam war.

Despite nearly 6,000 tons of bombs and rocket air attacks, the heaviest day of the assault against the dug-in North Vietnamese, enemy guns continued to hit at the Khe Sanh base and the three strategic hills in the Marines control just to the north-west.

By noon today, the North Vietnamese had dropped another 37 mortar and rocket rounds on the Khe Sanh positions. The North Vietnamese fired 18mm guns, their biggest artillery, at Khe Sanh for the first time.

U.S. officers continued to expect a big enemy offensive against Khe Sanh. But the heaviest ground fighting reported was on the central coast, some 200 miles to the southeast, where troops of the U.S. 1st Air Cavalry Division and the South Korean Capital Division reported 170 North Vietnamese killed in fighting Tuesday and Wednesday near Phu Cat.

AP correspondent Peter Arnett reported from Marine headquarters at Da Nang that the North Vietnamese apparently feel they can hold the Khe Sanh combat base but other positions in the neighboring hills are being dangerously encircled.

Despite the massive aerial bombardment, four landing zones in the hills are still too dangerous for helicopters except in extreme emergency. The North Vietnamese are reported to be firing 100mm guns at the planes landing at the Khe Sanh with supplies of ammunition and food.

Communist gunners in the hills have shot down three U.S. fighter-bombers in the past six days.

Another problem for the Marines is about 2,000 Montagnard tribesmen who want to be evacuated following the withdrawal of U.S. Marines and South Vietnamese militia teams from the town of Khe Sanh, 2 1/2 miles south of the Marine combat base. The tribespeople have clustered around the wire perimeter of the Marine base.

Red artillery shells scored at least two direct hits on Marine bunkers but none hit the airfield. Early today a C-130 cargo plane landed with a load of logs to reinforce the bunkers.

Predawn readings ranged from near 30 at Pensacola in the Panhandle to the mid-50s over southern portions of the state.

The Weather Bureau said no snow accumulation was reported in Tallahassee, 15 miles south of the Georgia border.

Friday's forecast called for heavy frost in northern sections and some scattered frost as far south as the Everglades. The heavy frost line is expected to extend as far south as the Sanford area where citrusmen welcome some cold weather because they say it makes the oranges sweeter.

Scattered frost was forecast for the vegetable fields between Sarasota and Naples on the West Coast.

# School Problems Above Politics

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — Lawmakers from both parties who are meeting to plan for the special session say the primary school problems are to be solved this, said Sen. Wilbur Boyd, D-Palmetto, chairman of the Senate Education Committee.

"I think the legislature is trying to sit down and try to solve this," said Sen. Wilbur Boyd, D-Palmetto, chairman of the Senate Education Committee.

House Speaker Ralph Turlington, D-Gainesville, said he has spoken to members of both parties in his trip through the state and all the legislators seem to be completely serious about the education problem.

Jack G. Gurnea, R-Clearwater, agreed with Turlington, saying: "I think it's a good sign."

"Anyone who plays politics with this will lose," said Boyd. "It's too serious."

The Palmetto senator said legislators want to "meet the problem head on and try to solve it and put an end to educational turmoil."

Other lawmakers meeting informally to get ready for the special session which starts Monday were Rep. Carver Matthews, D-Miami; Rep. James Evers, D-Deland; and Rep. George Caldwell, R-Port Landerdale.

House Minority Leader Don Reed, of Boca Raton, will join the group Thursday, Turlington said.

The speaker said the group is trying to digest all the programs proposed by the Commission on Quality Education, but he admitted the job was not completely easy.

Murphy said last minute changes made by the commission and any hassles its members had in Orlando Tuesday won't make much difference to the legislators.

The Republican representative said the legislature will probably start with the commission proposals program "as we have it" at this time.

There has been some disagreement about the education program, Turlington said, but he blamed it on a misunderstanding of the commission's proposals and predicted that the troubles would be ironed out in the special session.

"There will certainly be some ups and downs in this session," said the speaker. "But we must not be discouraged. I still think it can be done."

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# Wash Machine Kills Girl, 9

LAKELAND (AP) — A 9-year-old girl, the object of a widespread search by her parents and police, was found suffocated early today in a front-loading washing machine.

Police said Wendy Sue Delle apparently crawled into the machine which was near the family carport at the home where she lived with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Delle in Lakeland.

A search began in the water-filled phosphate pits and areas near her home when the girl vanished after 5 p.m. Wednesday night.

She was found by an auxiliary policeman in the search party at 1:40 a.m. inside the machine.

A deputy said the girl's body, small for her age, was contorted inside the machine. He said it might have taken several hours for the girl to exhaust the stale air inside the sealed machine.

# Kirk Hammers Wallace Again

CHICAGO (AP) — Gov. Claude Kirk proposed to a Chicago news conference Wednesday that George Wallace run for the U.S. Senate instead of allying off the conservative vote in the next presidential election.

"Ask Wallace if he wants to be effective why he doesn't run for senator in Alabama," Kirk said. "I don't think the people of Alabama would elect him."

He said Wallace would either lose in the primary or be defeated by a Republican in the general election.

Kirk, who was scheduled to meet today in Washington with the Florida congressional delegation, also accused President Johnson of "running the war in Vietnam by telephone."

Kirk, who said he was in the Midwest to attract more industry to Florida, said, "Any Republican nominee can take the nation in November if he doesn't let Wallace alight off votes in borderline states."

The Florida Republican governor repeated charges made in earlier speeches that a Johnson-Wallace conspiracy exists to rob the GOP of conservative voters.

"When is the last time the chief of naval operations has asked, 'When has he seen the heads of the Army and the Marine? I don't think he has seen any of them this year.'"

The governor said the Pueblo seizure incident in Korean waters was a result of President Johnson's "obvious failure to keep track of brush fire situations which confront us with a crisis."

Earlier Wednesday Kirk told the Associated Equipment Dealers of America that the federal government should attack unemployment by providing a job-finding subsidy to move workers to areas where they are needed.

"A direct payment of up to \$100 a month to a worker who has been laid off for more than 12 weeks is a step toward a guaranteed annual income which is willing to move the burden of a jobless state," Kirk proposed.

He said the answer to unemployment is to create more jobs. He said the government is not doing this because it is unwilling to pay the cost of the job program.

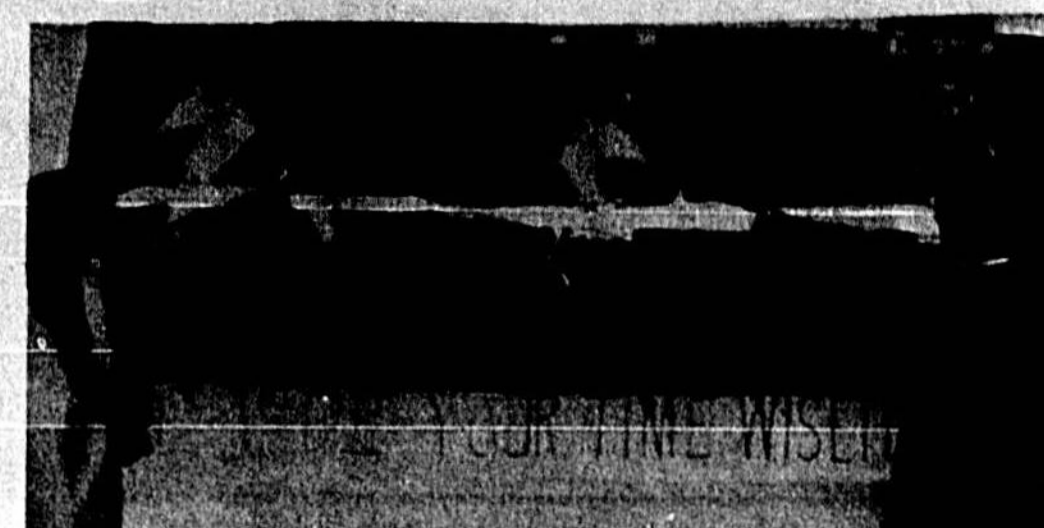

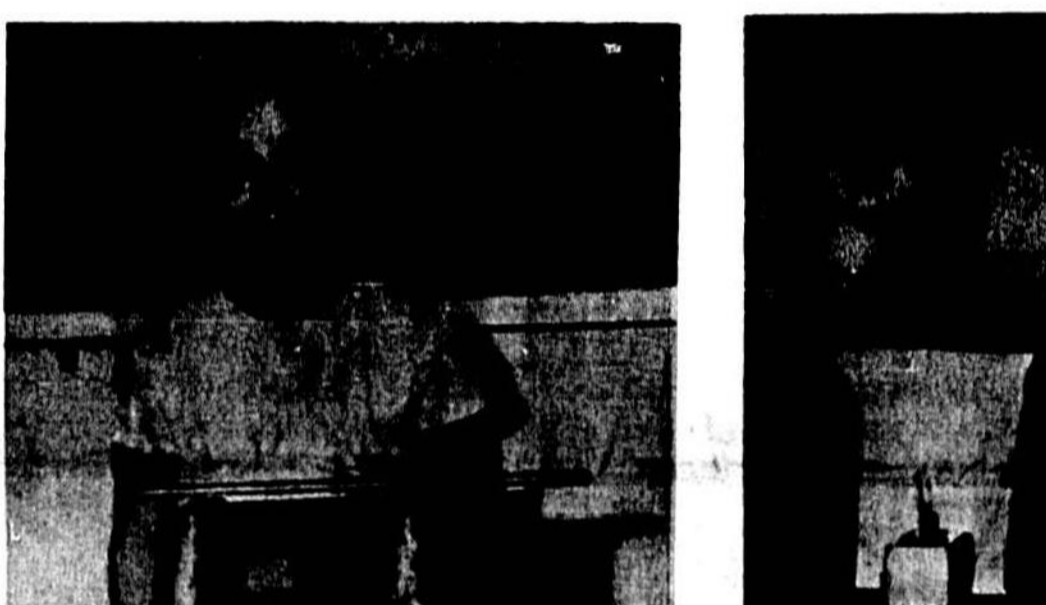

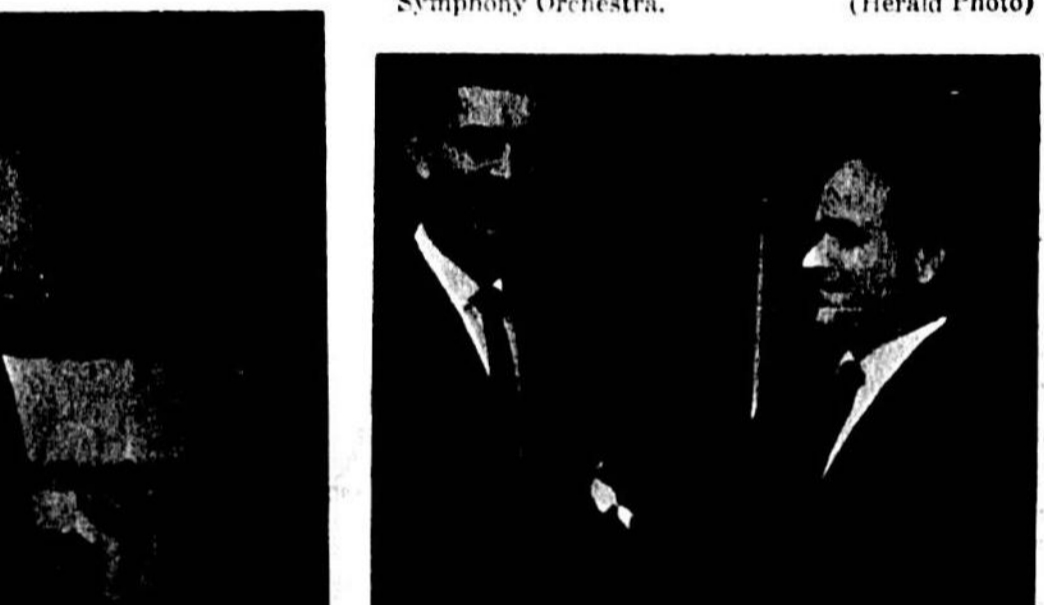

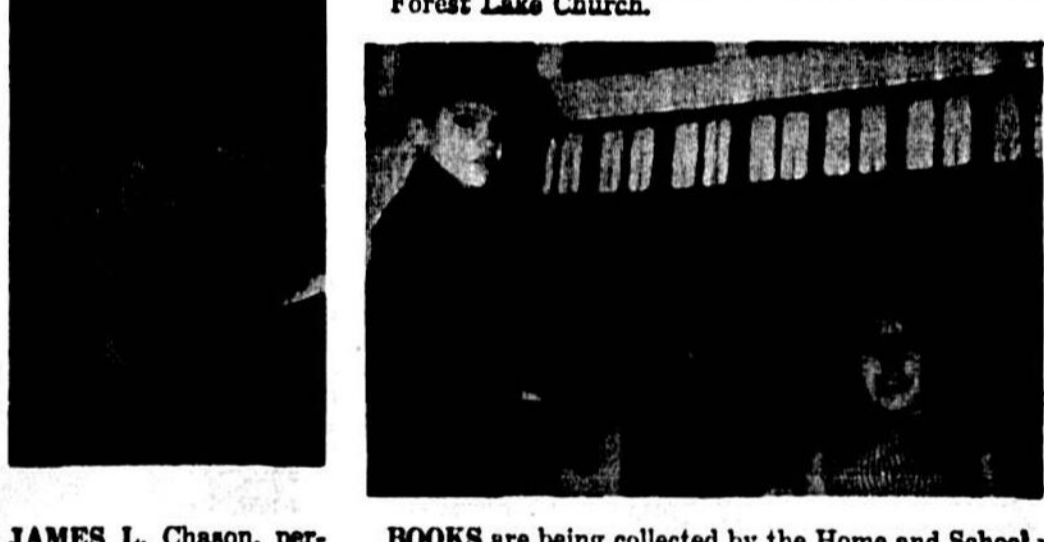
