'We Don't Want Industry' County Commission Is Told

Franklin K. Baldree Funeral Services At 2 p. m. Tuesday

Funeral services for Franklin Kenneth Baldree, 22-year-old city employee, will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock at Brison Funeral Home. Mr. Baldree, who died Saturday morning from accidental electrocution while working on city equipment, will be buried in Oaklawn Memorial Park. He was a member of the Belgrade Seventh Day Adventist Church and had lived in Sanford only two months, making his home at 402 Holly Ave. Survivors include his wife Mrs. Evelyn Baldree; one daughter, Mary Lou Baldree; one stepdaughter, Sherry Rogers, all of Sanford; his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Baldree of Orlando; one sister, Mrs. Wanda Tallos, Liberty Miss, three brothers, Jasper Baldree, Chillocthis, O. Ray Baldree and Paul Baldree, both of Orlando; and his maternal grandmother, Mrs. R. F. Johnston, Jupiter. Rev. Robert Spear Jr. of the Church of the Nazarenes will officiate at the funeral services. Active pallbearers are: W. E. Knowles, S. M. Richard, E. L. Griffith, J. L. Dunn, Robert Kelly, and Russell L. Dallas. Honorary Pallbearers are: A. L. Hood, Quintus Ray, L. H. Wynne, Leroy Lee, Roy Stinson, and Homer White.

Budget Discussion Tomorrow

The Board of Seminole County Commissioners are marking time until their regular meeting tomorrow before deciding on the approval of the proposed million-dollar-plus budget. Two commissioners, John Krider and Lawrence Swafford have stated that they will not approve a budget which will mean additional taxes for Seminole County taxpayers. Two commissioners, Chairman Fred Dyson and D. C. Dodd want additions to the budget to take care of jail expansion and road equipment which will mean an additional tax load of more than three mills. At present, the proposed budget, if adopted in its present form would mean that taxpayers will be forced to pay three mills in addition to millage for proposed improvements. Commissioner Krider called attention of commission members that the proposed budget does not include any capital improvements whatever. Commissioners discussed the budget after hearing Frank Evans, Gen. Joe C. Hutchison and Randall Chase appeal for funds and the General Henry Shelton Sanford Memorial Library can be expanded. They asked for a minimum of \$5,000 annually until \$20,000 is raised for the improvements. Other requests included a request for funds with which to operate the County Airport Zoning Commission set up by the board of Commissioners, and a request for funds with which to operate the County Zoning Commission. These items would add an approximate \$23,000 to the proposed budget. County Attorney Mack N. Cleveland Jr. cited criticism of State Auditors relative to previous budget items such as the Memorial Library, Girl Scouts and similar appropriations. "I feel that it is my duty to bring these criticisms to your attention," said Cleveland. The commissioners argued and discussed the reappraisal of county property relating to the raising of funds and revenues for the operation of the county government. At one time, during the discussions, Chairman Dyson raised his voice to state that "This meeting was called to discuss the budget and not reappraisal." During the budget discussion Dyson commented that "I personally believe this proposed estimate is in line—I don't see how we can cut anything off." However, Commissioner Krider suggested that "We ride out the storm on the millage we had last year and explain to the people how they can get the services they want." Chairman Dyson remarked "I am of the opinion that we have not given Mrs. Walker time to find out whether she should provide additional taxes." W. R. Dyson, sitting in the audience through the discussions, asked to speak to the commission. He said "Don't forget gentlemen, we don't want industry in Seminole County," and added, "I don't think it wise to bring a bunch of experts in here to appraise land—they've got this city in such a shape now our grandchildren will never get out of it." The commissioners agreed to adjourn until Tuesday when additional requests to be added to the budget are expected.

Sufficient Fruit Sought To Supply Concentrate Sale

WINTER PARK. — Florida Orange Marketers, a citrus growers' cooperative seeking sufficient fruit to supply the entire needs of the vast Minute Maid concentrate operations during the coming season, has contracts representing just a shade under 8,000,000 (eight million) boxes, it was announced today at the cooperative's state headquarters here. J. Dan Wright, Sanford, former director of Florida Citrus Mutual and now a member of the Florida Citrus Commission, who is president of the newly-formed cooperative, said the actual volume represented by contracts so far signed was 7,900,350 boxes. "The campaign is showing steady progress," Wright said, "although we are being hampered by the absence of many vacationing orange growers from the state. We expect the signing of contracts to pick up noticeably later this month and to reach its peak in September when growers will be back and making decisions about what to do with their 1951-52 crops." Sen. Walter F. George Dies Sunday In Georgia

Wade H. Garner Jr. Chosen In Fall Medical Congress

Wade H. Garner Jr., senior medical student at the University of Miami School of Medicine at Coral Gables, has been chosen as that school's representative at the forthcoming Clinical Congress of the American College of Surgeons, Dr. Paul R. Hawley, Director of the College, announced in Chicago, Ill. Representatives from thirty-seven medical colleges will attend this year's Congress, to be held in Atlantic City October 14 to 18, at College expense. Dr. Hawley explained. The student participation program was initiated last year as an educational contribution of the College, by action of the Board of Regents. The medical colleges sending representatives to the Congress will be rotated each year, it was explained. Garner, whose home is in Sanford, will graduate from the University of Miami School of Medicine in 1950. The son of a physician and surgeon, Garner is a graduate of the Seminole High School, and took his undergraduate work at the University of Alabama, where he was a member of the National Institute of Health fellowship for study in the Department of Surgery, and a member of Phi Chi Medical Fraternity. Garner is married to the former Marilyn Stinson of Sanford. Student representatives at the Clinical Congress, world's largest meeting of surgeons, will attend a number of special sessions in addition to regularly scheduled lectures, discussions, motion picture demonstrations and televised clinics covering all phases of surgical practice and research. The student program was planned by a special committee of the College Board of Regents headed by Dr. George V. Brindley of Temple, Texas.

VIENNA, Ga. 49 — The nation's leaders today joined friends and neighbors of former Sen. Walter F. George in mourning the death of a small town lawyer who mounted the forums of world statesmanship.

President Eisenhower said the Georgia Democrat, hailed for his bipartisanism in U. S. foreign affairs, "served his country and the free world for many years with distinction and integrity." George headed the powerful Senate Foreign Relations Committee at the pinnacle of his 36-year Senate career and afterward became the President's representative to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. George, 79, died at his home here early Sunday after a six-week struggle with heart disease which last June ended his active role in his new international career. The body was to lie in state until about an hour before the funeral services at 4 p. m. e.s.t. in the First Baptist Church, where George had worshipped most of his life. Services will be conducted by the Rev. I. C. Cutts, pastor of the church, assisted by Dr. T. W. Tippett, former pastor, and the Rev. W. E. Dennis, pastor of the Vienna Methodist Church. Mayor J. T. DeLoessline by proclamation called on the town's merchants and businessmen to close down at 2 p. m. e.s.t. for the day. A detachment of highway patrolmen arrived to handle traffic including automobiles rushing visitors back and forth from the airport at Cordele, nine miles south of here. Special observances were planned in other parts of the state which had sent George to the Senate for five full terms until he chose, in 1936, to bow out of an arduous campaign against Sen. Herman Talmadge. George rose from humble beginnings as the son of a tenant farmer living near Preston, Ga., soon after graduation from Mercer

University's law school, which now bears his name, George became a prominent attorney and jurist. He served as superior court judge, justice of the State Court of Appeals and finally, as State Supreme Court Justice before winning a special election to succeed the late Sen. Tom Watson. George had a lifelong distinction of never losing an election but his sway over Georgia voters was on occasion tested by vigorous campaigns. His most famous political triumph was his defeat of another of the state's powerful vote-getters, the late Eugene Talmadge, who tried unsuccessfully to defeat George in 1938. National attention was focused upon the 1938 race by the unsuccessful attempt of President Roosevelt to "purge" George because of his refusal to go down the line in support of New Deal policies. The President denounced George as an "obstructive conservative." George replied that "democracy is not a one-man party." George defeated both Talmadge and the candidate Roosevelt backed, Lawrence Camp, without a runoff. George broke not only with the New Deal administration but often differed with Democratic colleagues in the Senate on matters of principle. George called himself a "constitutional Democrat." Town officials were advised that about two-score members of Congress would attend, including members of the Senate Foreign Relations and Finance committees. (Continued on Page 4)

City Employee Dies In Tragic Accident

A 22-year-old dragline operator for the City of Sanford died Saturday morning shortly after 8 o'clock, apparently electrocuted as he worked on his machine about one mile south of the city at a booster station. Franklin Kenneth Baldree had been at work about an hour and had not yet put his dragline in operation as preparations were being made to connect the huge booster station pipes to the main water system. City Manager Warren E. Knowles, at the scene when the accident occurred, said he heard Baldree call, and the crackle of the cable on the ground. Baldree couldn't be seen, Knowles said, from the point where he, Utility Department Director Russell Dallas, and Distribution Foreman Quintus Ray were standing. Ray was the first to reach the injured man and kicked him free from the machine. Apparently, Baldree was working on the outside of the machine with his foot on the tread of the huge dragline. A. R. Middleton, Troublemaker for Florida Power and Light Company, who tied a rope line to the dragline cable to pull it clear of power lines, said that the line from which the electricity surge came contained 1620 volts. There are two possibilities which might have caused the apparent electrocution. The machine might have been left free and when the clamshell, operated by a steel cable from the motor of the machine, was disengaged the cable could have been swung into the power line. The other possibility was that the cable, left tense with the clamshell attached, when released, swung into the high powered line. Baldree was said to have been dead on arrival at an Orlando hospital. The young machine operator had been employed by the city for a period of about 2 1/2 months, said City Manager Knowles. Operations at the project where the city forces were in the process of relocating the booster station because of Highway 17-02 widening were ceased Saturday morning following the accident. All operations of the City of Sanford will be closed down tomorrow at noon for funeral services at 2 o'clock for Franklin Baldree. City Manager Warren E. Knowles said that offices and operation of the City with the exception of the Police, Fire and water departments will be halted for the afternoon so that employees can attend the funeral services.

Armored Carriers Arrive For Local National Guard

Co. B, 154th Armored Infantry Battalion, Florida National Guard, the Sanford unit, received the first of their M-75 Armored Infantry Vehicles to be returned from Fort Stewart, Ga., where the unit underwent Summer Field Training, yesterday. The 42,000-pound "Carrier" was brought to Sanford by commercial carrier and unloaded by the Company's motor section under the leadership of Sgt. James J. Kendall. This equipment is used in the armored training of the local unit and is also available for use by the Sanford Guardsmen for any civil emergency or disturbance. In all there will be nine different types of vehicles stored at the armory during the year. This equipment will be used primarily for training according to unit commander 1st Lt. John Keeling Jr.

Toastmasters Club Meeting Slated For Wednesday P.M.

An organizational meeting of a proposed "Toastmasters Club" will be held Wednesday evening at 7 p. m. in the Sanford Naval Air Station CPO Club, William F. Holcomb announced this morning. However, said Holcomb, only about 12 have indicated definitely that they would become members. Holcomb extended an invitation to all who would like to attend the initial organizational meeting.

Navy Man Is Bound Over To Fall Court

A young Navy man is being bound over to the fall term of circuit court, according to Justice of the Peace W. Hugh Duncan who conducted a day-long hearing Friday into charges of rape. Clayton J. Beaulieu, 27, will go before a Seminole County grand jury this fall prior to the circuit court term, said Duncan. Duncan postponed a ruling on the hearing until this morning when he announced that Beaulieu will be bound over on a charge of rape.

Telephone Number Ready For South County Subscribers

New telephone numbers for Casselberry, Longwood, and Maitland which will be in effect for the subscribers in the Winter Park Telephone Company when Metropolitan Service begins next month are now being assigned to resident subscribers by the company's commercial office. All telephone numbers, it is announced, will be changed and will include name prefixes. These are to be Midway, Temple and Valley for the Winter Park area exchange. At the same time, all numbers in the Orlando exchange area will be changed and will include the prefixes Garden, Chestnut and Clery. When Metropolitan Service goes into effect any subscriber in the Winter Park exchange can call any subscriber in the Orlando exchange area without paying a toll charge. The optional extended service which some local subscribers now have will be discontinued. The new telephone numbers now being assigned will be mailed to resident subscribers about one week before the service is cut-over, it is announced. The numbers will be mailed in the form of gummed discs which are to be attached to the dial of each telephone set. Complete instructions on how to attach the new number will be mailed at the same time. Business firms in the local exchange area have already received their new numbers so that they can plan their advertising and buy new stationery such as letterheads and business cards. The new telephone directory which is now being compiled will be delivered to subscribers a week before cut-over. It will contain the new numbers in both the Winter Park and Orlando exchanges. Included in the directory will be a section of the "yellow pages" representing business firms in both the Winter Park and Orlando exchange areas. The new telephone directory will also include complete instructions on how to dial with the new prefixes and how to place toll-free calls to Orlando.

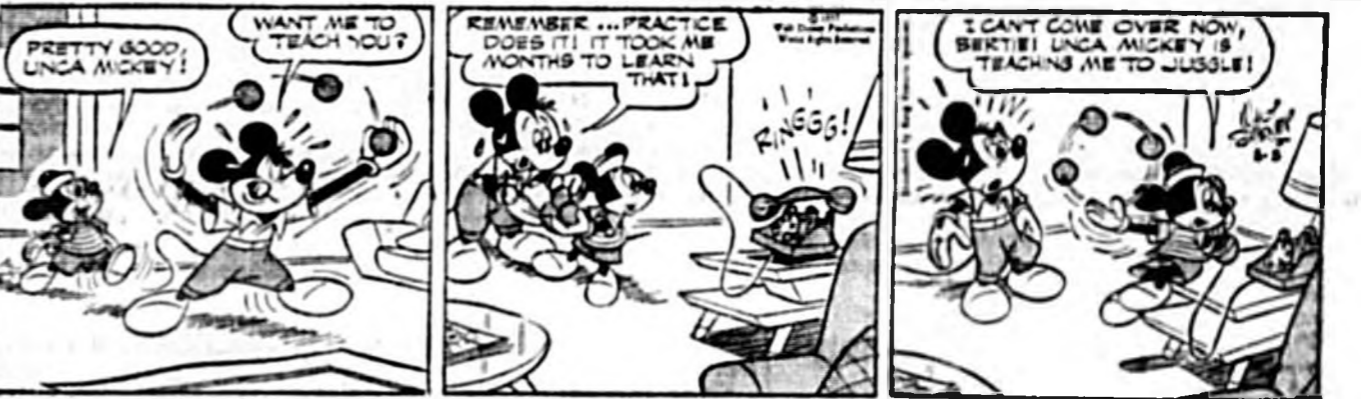

Not only do we need industry in Sanford and Seminole County — we've got to have industry to survive the tax dilemma. Industry realizes that it shoulders a huge part of the tax burden in any community where it locates.

It is asinine to take the position that industry "is not wanted" for from these business organizations come payrolls and production—not only from the products that are imported for their manufacturing of wares and commodities, but to use the products that come from cattle and farmlands—vegetables, meat and fruit.

What opponents of industry can't understand is the fact that smokestacks and smoke are both a thing of the past. Industry doesn't throw a pall of smoke over its community in these modern times—not when electricity is available to use and oil can be bargained in by the thousands upon thousands of tons at one time. Certainly Sanford and Seminole County can become the "Pittsburg of the South" and people will like it.

Plan To Jolt Highway Hypnosis

One recurrent problem on the nation's highways is that of waning driver attention. Many are afflicted by what safety engineers call "highway hypnosis," a dulling of alertness caused by the monotony of driving on long, open stretches.

This dimming of a driver's awareness of his surroundings, and especially of roadside warning markers becomes a real menace at intersections. When a driver misses warning signals and suddenly finds himself on the verge of cross traffic, he's in trouble.

Two military safety directors have now come up with an interesting plan to jog drivers into alertness as they approach intersections. The idea is to have segments of the highway painted yellow and red as they approach to intersections. The length of these colored segments would be determined on the basis of the legal maximum speed, the type of road surface and other factors.

The idea is now being considered by the Bureau of Public Roads, which may use it extensively on the new federal highway system. Highway officials in a number of states also are considering the plan.

No such proposal could be put into effect until it has received at least minimum testing. On the face of it, however, the idea of using color to alert drivers as they approach

Industry in every conceivable size is needed in the Sanford and Seminole County area—and unless we get industry, as it has often been said—commercial establishments might just as well close their doors if we lose the bulwark of our economy today.

Some, only recently, have recalled the days which existed right after the Florida boom when homes were sold for a song, and land was worthless in a way.

These same folks will realize that the very same type of exodus should the economy of the community, the area, or the state be pulled out from under it like a rug. That can be done, too, if industry takes a notion.

Bring On The Sweet-Corn!

Some foolhardy soul broke into print the other day with a suggestion for tampering with the ancient and honorable art of preparing sweet corn for the table. To the boiling water this barbarian could add onion, celery, carrot, pickling spice and other items we haven't the heart to mention. After boiling this abominable stew for half an hour, the man would compound the felony by dumping in sweet corn. Serve with lots of butter, says he.

Lots of butter, indeed! As every true sweet corn fancier knows, it would take more than butter to right the wrong thus done this succulent vegetable. The recipe darkly hinted at above may result in a passable corn chowder, but it's no way to treat sweet corn.

Wright said 1,113,350 boxes of the announced total was represented by seven-grower, grower-handlers of fresh fruit packing companies which grow oranges.

"Florida Orange Marketers has a total of 67 contracts," Wright said, "including 60 from what you might call bona fide growers who produce all the fruit they will furnish the cooperative, and seven who will have to buy some of the fruit called for in their contracts."

Wright said he was confident another 150,000 boxes would be signed during the coming week, bringing the total to well over the \$9,000,000 mark.

The new cooperative must get between 10,000,000 and 12,000,000 boxes of concentrate quality oranges under its control to supply Minute Maid's entire needs during the coming season. These oranges will be turned into concentrate by Minute Maid and sold under its two widely known brands: Minute Maid and Snow Crop.

With the proceeds coming back for distribution to grower members of the cooperative, minus only the cost of processing concentrate.

Growers may obtain 89 percent of the market value of their fruit at the time it is turned over to the cooperative, Wright pointed out.

With settlement on the return made to the cooperative for distribution to its grower members on the basis of the pounds of solids in their fruit.

"We are extremely pleased with the reception the plan has received in far from both big and little growers," Wright said. "Every grower knows he must make a choice as to his course of action when his crop is ready for harvesting. He can take the risk of selling it in the open market or he can join forces with other responsible growers, as represented by Florida Orange Marketers, and be part of an organization which will have an identity for the concentrate made from his fruit, building sales on quality and reputation and earning maximum returns for the grower."

"In other words, the grower can, if he wishes, be a 'lone wolf,' trying to get the best of another wolf, or he can assure himself of a steady and satisfactory return by joining with other growers to control and get the benefit of a national brand."

Minute Maid's own huge orange production, represented by its ownership of approximately 16,000 acres and operation under lease of another 5,000 acres, will be channeled through the cooperative and paid for on exactly the same basis as all other fruit in the two pools to be established, one for early and midseason

"This provides the greatest incentive for Minute Maid to strive for maximum returns," Wright pointed out. "The by-laws provide for one vote per member so that Minute Maid will have only one vote, the same as the smallest member. There is no opportunity for the processor to dominate the affairs of this cooperative association."

Carney Grove, a Minute Maid subsidiary, has signed a contract calling for 5,350,000 boxes of oranges, while Minute Maid Groves corporation will provide another 1,500,000 boxes. The Carney Grove volume includes 3,000,000 boxes which will be purchased by that grove corporation but still flowing through and under the control of the cooperative as it finds its way into Minute Maid plants to make concentrate.

Sanford, however, seems far in front of such rookie candidates as first base teammate Ed Bouchee, third baseman Ed Kasco and pitcher Von McDaniel of the Cards, Dick Drott of the Cubs,

Danny McDevitt of the Dodgers and Dick Farrell of the Phils.

Kubek appears far and away the best of an American League rookie crop which does not shape up as strong as the National League group. The six-foot, three-inch 21-year-old is hitting close to the .300 mark and has been a valuable part of the Yankee infield.

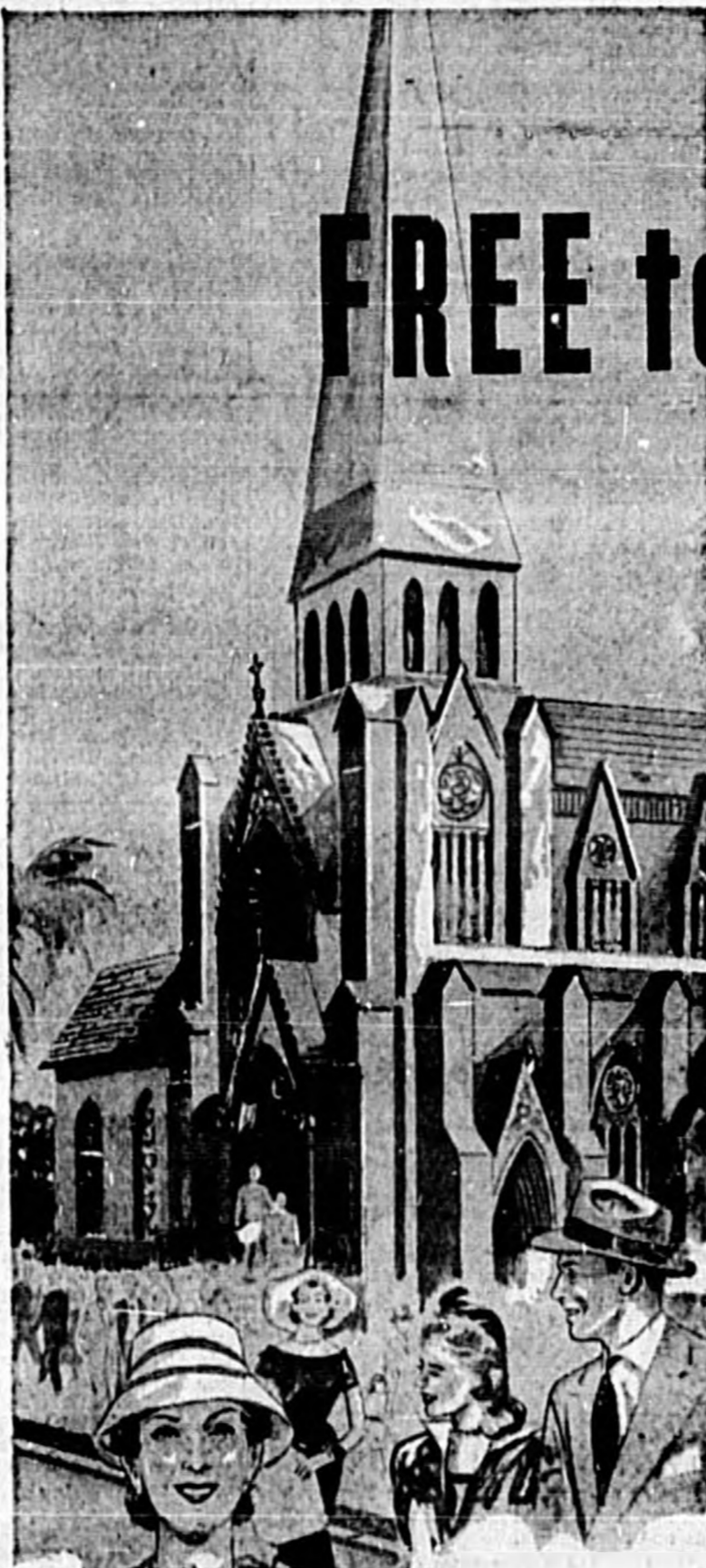

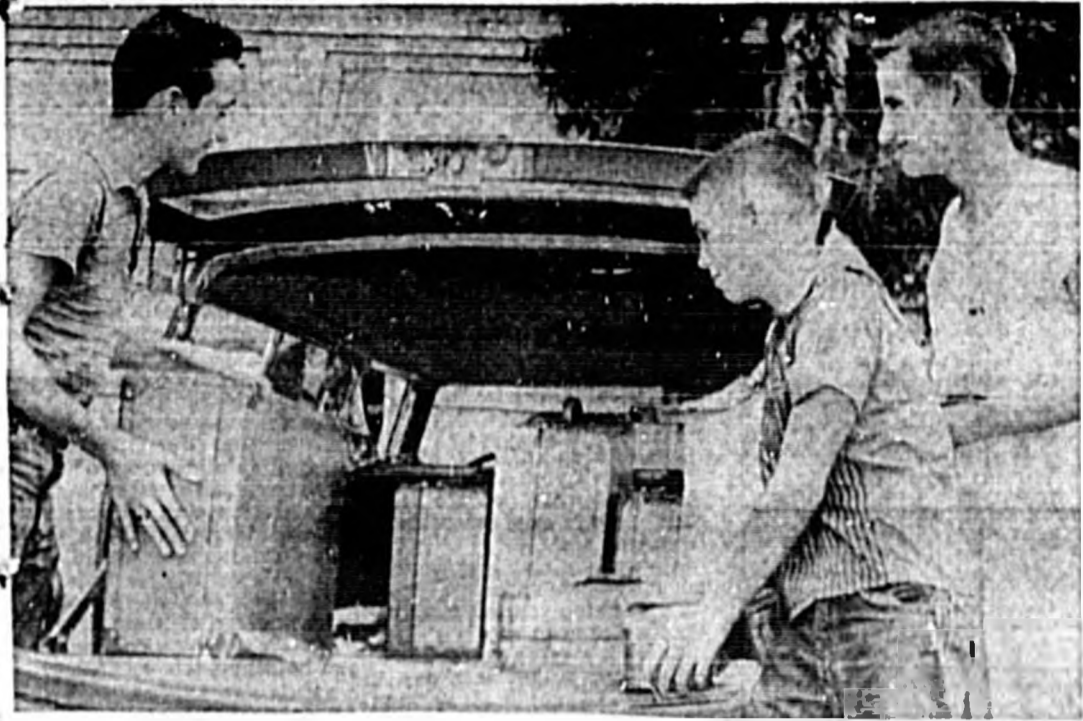

Jaycees Request \$1,500 Fund From County Commission

The Board of Seminole County Commissioners was asked this morning to appropriate \$1,500 for the operation of the Seminole County Junior Chamber of Commerce during the next fiscal year. M. L. Raborn Jr., president of the Jaycee group presented the request at this morning's session. "We asked for and received \$500 last year and we're asking for the same amount this year," he said. Raborn pointed out the various activities of the Junior Chamber of Commerce in Seminole County, to the membership, and to the various funds raised separately from the county appropriation. He said "We ask for your favorable consideration this year." Commissioner John Kridler told Raborn "I think you've done a wonderful job and I hope you continue. The Jaycee president told the board of commissioners "We propose to build a new Tourist Information Booth on French Ave. but funds for this project will come from sources other than this appropriation."

Man Pinned Under Car In Deep Water Over 35-Minutes

A Sanford man was pinned underneath his automobile for more than 35 minutes Saturday night in a deep water-filled ditch on State Road 46 about 3 miles east of the city. Apparently Raymond E. Lord's car went out of control headed toward Sanford and threw the driver out into the ditch as it went into a spin. The car apparently came to a stop over Lord, headed in the opposite direction. Imbedded in the mud and muck around the ditch the car held Lord underneath with only his mouth and nose out of the water. Lord received a bad gash in his left temple but otherwise was unharmed. Lord was driving a 1949 Ford sedan. His clothes were torn nearly off him as he was thrown clear of the spinning automobile. The car was found by Sheriff A. E. Evans and H. E. DeWitt as he was chasing a speeding automobile west on the highway. Evans was joined by Constable Galloway before a wrecker was summoned to the scene. The wrecker lifted the car into the air in order that Lord could crawl from under the mired automobile. The accident occurred shortly before 11 o'clock Saturday night. Lord was admitted to the Seminole Memorial Hospital for his injured head and exposure and shock.

Soap Manufacturer Slated To Relieve Charles E. Wilson

Manufacturer Neil H. McElroy planned another conference with Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson today to talk about succeeding him. Sources here believed McElroy, 283,000 a year president of procter and Gamble, has the \$22,500 a year job sewed up if he wants it. An aide to the 52 year old businessman told the United Press that taking the position would require him to make "what he has to do to take it on, the conflict of interest" problem and other matters. "This is the nature of the considerations that are going on," the spokesman said. He said "it's obvious some consideration is being given to him" for the post.

34 Prisoners Being Held In County Jail

There are 34 prisoners being held in the Seminole County Jail, Sheriff J. L. Hobby said today. One prisoner was brought in and six released during the past 24 hours up to midnight last night, the Sheriff said. Of the total, 11 are white male, 19 colored male, 3 colored female, and 1 colored female incompetent.

3-Auto Collision Nets \$650 Damage

A three-car collision in Sanford Saturday morning shortly before 11 o'clock caused property damage in excess of \$650, according to the Sanford Police Department. The collision involved automobiles driven by Stanley L. Brumley, traveling north on Mellonville Ave. John R. Crow, traveling south on Mellonville Ave., and Henry Deterville Jr. an Oviedo Negro who was traveling west on Celery Ave. Lt. Jack Hickson and Patrolman Edward Hayden, investigating the accident, said in their report that Deterville "ran the red light" causing Crow to swerve in an attempt to avoid hitting the Deterville automobile. Crow collided with Brumley's car, according to the Sanford Police Department report, throwing it 10 feet off the pavement. There were no injuries reported. Damage to Brumley's car was reported at \$400; to Crow's car at \$250; and to Deterville's car as negligible.

Social Security Benefits Denied Firemen, Policemen

WASHINGTON — The House has refused to make policemen and firemen eligible for social security benefits. The House Monday voted 120-64 in favor of the plan. But the measure failed because it was brought up under a procedure requiring a two-thirds vote for passage. The bill, sponsored by Rep. Herman P. Eberhart (D-Pa.), would have permitted policemen and firemen already covered by state or city pension plans to receive social security coverage. Chairman Jere Cooper (D-Tenn.) of the House Ways and Means Committee told the House there was widespread demand for the legislation. He said it would be "purely permissible" and not mandatory.

Navy Submarines Collide Below

NEW LONDON, Conn. — Two U. S. Navy submarines collided underwater at dawn today in the Atlantic about 100 miles south of here, but damage was minor and there were no injuries, the Navy reported. A spokesman at Atlantic Fleet submarine headquarters said the USS Tusk and the USS Cobble were "returning to port under their own power." The Tusk, a New London-based craft and the Cobble, a unit of Submarine Squadron 6 out of Norfolk, Va., collided at 3:49 a. m. est the Navy said. The subs were engaged in maneuvers at the time.

Strike Cripples Harbor, Buenos Aires

BUENOS AIRES — The huge Buenos Aires harbor was crippled today by a wildcat strike. Longshoremen, who had staged slowdown strikes for several days in support of demands for higher pay, walked out when their attitude was declared illegal by the government. Servicemen were called in to man wharftide cranes and work in the holds of ships.

Two Local County Men Named To Convention Posts

Two Seminole County men have been appointed committee chairmen for the coming convention of the Florida Fruit and Vegetable Association Convention, according to an announcement made today by Roy Vandegrift Jr., Pahokee, General Chairman for the convention. Named to head committees are Harold Kastner of Sanford and John W. Evans of Oviedo. The three-day meeting of the growers and shippers of Florida's vegetables and tropical fruits will be the 14th Annual Meeting of the group. It will open on Oct. 9 at Miami Beach. Among the southern projects included in the military construction projects recommended today by the House Appropriations Committee was the Sanford Naval Air Station with a \$2,953,000 expenditure for expansion. President Eisenhower had asked for \$1,860,746,967. The committee recommended to the House an appropriation of \$1,581,300,587, a cut of \$279,446,380.

Scouts Evacuate Jamboree Park

SUTTON COLDFIELD, England — Hundreds of Boy Scouts were evacuated during the night from this World Jamboree Park near Birmingham when thunderstorms flooded the area. One inch of rain fell during a one-hour period, sending miniature rivers pouring through the tents. There were no casualties among the 34,000 Scouts. About 600 boys were lodged in private houses, town halls and schools. The Royal Air Force sent emergency transport from Castle Bromwich, three miles away, to evacuate the tentless Scouts. A camp spokesman described as "a grossly exaggerated" reports that a thousand Scouts had been moved out. He added, "our program will be carried on—after all we are Boy Scouts and we are prepared."

A-Bomb Memorial Today As Japanese Ask Nuclear End

HIROSHIMA, Japan — The Japanese nation, joined by its rapidly and the people of many countries, appeal for an end to nuclear weapons today on the 12th anniversary of the atom bombing of Hiroshima. Prince Mikasa, brother of Emperor Hirohito, and Princess Mikasa, led 20,000 Japanese at Hiroshima in paying respects to the memory of those who died in the world's first atom-bomb. In Tokyo, 200 foreign and Japanese delegates opened an international conference dedicated to seeing that there would be "no more Hiroshimas."

Vandals Injure Pet

Mrs. Clayton E. Hagwell, 1101 West Second St., reported that "a 2 year old pet dog had been shot." "They ought to think of the suffering before they shoot," Mrs. Hagwell said. "Our dog came home Saturday morning badly wounded," she explained, "and the unmerciful shooting of a pet is causing us considerable expense." "We don't know whether it was a shotgun or pistol used in shooting our dog," she said "if anyone shoots at animals, they should shoot to kill," she added. "My part bull and part cocker is a pet of our son," Mrs. Hagwell said.

2,953,000 Recommended For Sanford Navy Base

Sen. Walter George Buried Yesterday In Vienna, Ga.

VIENNA, Ga. — Former Sen. Walter F. George, his statesmanship in foreign affairs praised by the nation's leaders, was buried in Georgia clay late Monday with this tribute of his minister. "He hath showed thee, O man, what is good and what doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy and to walk humbly with thy God." The Rev. L. C. Cullis quoted this passage from Micah VI, 8 in his 45-minute service for George in the First Baptist Church packed with dignitaries from Washington and the Georgia Democrat's local friends. Hundreds of persons heard the service over loudspeakers outside. A mile-long caravan then proceeded to a cemetery headed by 17 limousines bearing such officials as U. S. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge and George's colleagues in Congress. George's widow, well known in Washington circles and here as "Miss Lucy," was led to the graveside on the arm of her son, Heard George. Another son, Marcus, was killed as a Navy flier in World War II. This South Georgia town of 2,500 population was jammed by visitors. Businesses shut down at noon and hundreds of housewives passed by the casket while the body lay in state. George died Sunday following a six week illness from heart disease. He had been appointed President Eisenhower's personal envoy to NATO on retiring last January after 34 years in the Senate.

Seat Belt Safety Value Proved Thru Four Year Tests

WASHINGTON — An Air Force authority on crashes said today he wouldn't be "caught dead" without seat belts in his automobile. Col. John P. Stapp told a House traffic safety subcommittee that four years of experiments at the Aero Medical Field Laboratory at Holloman Air Development Center, N.M., have proved the value of seat belts in autos. Stapp, director of the laboratory, said he has them in his own auto. He said the Air Force is debating whether to make the belts a requirement in its government-owned autos, and possibly in the personal cars of airmen. Subcommittee Chairman Kenneth A. Roberts (D-Ala.) said he was "dismayed" that 1958 models will have "more of just about everything except one vital feature... more built-in safety." Rep. J. Carlton Lister (D-Tenn.) suggested that the "big three" in the auto industry ought to start installing three-inch wide belts as standard equipment in all new cars starting this fall. Stapp outlined tests which he has directed for 12 years into aviation crash injuries, and for four years into auto accidents. He said the Air Force embarked on the auto study because auto injuries have become "the number one cause for admission" to Air Force hospitals. In 1956, he said, 873 airmen died in auto wrecks—almost as many as in plane crashes.

Three County Boys Attend Wildlife, Forestry School

Three Seminole County boys left yesterday for Camp McQuarrie, in the Ocala National Forest, where they will attend a Wildlife Management, Forestry, Soil Conservation, and Gun Safety School. Tommy McLean of Geneva, Buddy Long of Sanford, and Robert Miller of Slavia, accompanied by County Agent Cecil Tucker II, will spend five days at the camp participating in the classes and field trips on the four subjects. County Agent Tucker said that the highlight of the week will be a trip to Silver Spring where they will tour all of the wildlife facilities including Ross Allen's exhibits and the fish exhibit. Tucker, accompanying the three boys to Camp McQuarrie, will also serve as an instructor in the Gun Safety school.

Changes In Policies Seen In Milk Board

TALLAHASSEE — Gov. LeRoy Collins is confident that any price-fixing done by the "new" State Milk Commission will be ordered only after "clear and positive" proof that it is necessary to the public interest. Collins, in his monthly report to the people, hinted he gained away for his own philosophy of price-fixing through his recent appointment of three new members and a new administrator of the agency. The government backed unsuccessful moves in both the 1955 and 1957 legislatures to have the commission abolished and was also behind fruitless attempts by Col. Dexter Lowry, administrator and former chairman of the commission, to have the agency do away with price controls. "I think there will be some changes in past policies which have kept this commission under

constant criticism by the public generally and which, in my opinion, have resulted in far more injury than benefit to the dairy industry," the governor said in his radio report. Pointing out that under the American system private and special interests "are entitled to no special advantages of price fixing except in the extent that such may be necessary in serving the public interest," the governor said a "clear and positive showing should be required to justify any infringement on the right of free enterprise." "This is my philosophy and I believe you will find it will be the philosophy of the new milk commission," the governor said. The governor also touched on tax equalization and said he was confident he was making in the field.
