Heading For First Street

The first thing which any organization or any other group or individual does when he wants to raise money is to head for First Street. There the first people he is sure to contact in his appeal for aid are the merchants and other business and perfensional many. They contribute the bolk of the money for most of our "causes."

We wonder how many of the high school students have ever stopped to think that without the aid of Sanford merchants the very excellent annual which they pro-duce every year and which costs about \$800 would be impossible if it were not for the revenue derived from advertisements inserted by local merchants? The trading at home which some people have done made available the money for those advertisements.

How many people have ever stopped to think who it How many people have ever stopped to think who it represent the literate to is that supports the Chamber of Commerce. Some of its measurable of the large money comes from City taxes, paid entirely by local business in the large mess interests (homeowners pay City taxes for bond interest only). Some comes from County taxes, most of which is paid by business interests either in Sanford or in the County towns. And some comes from memberships, most of which belong to business or professional men.

Among the largest contributors to the churches are the business and professional men. Among the largest contributors to the Salvation Army, to the Red Cross, and to most of the other drives which periodically appear in Sanford are these same business and professional men. Through the taxes which they pay to City and County, they provide the bulk of the revenue used for home relief and for the sponsor's share of WPA projects.

Now where do the merchants get the money which they use to support these various institutions and organ-CHRISTMAS SEALS? | Izations? They get it from "trading at home." No money spent out of town helps to support these community necessities. What would Sanford be like if there were no churches, no schools, no police, or fire departments, no parks or playgrounds, no merchants to run to for contributions to this, that, or the other?

That this sort of thing can continue forever with a large part of our trade going out of town is too much to hope for. The farmer knows you cannot continue to take out of the ground while putting nothing into it. We cannot continue to get the support of the merchants for everything which makes Sanford a good town in which to live if we do not trade with them.


Trading out of town has already taken its toll of many active merchants. Think back ten years ago and re-call many an enterprising store, now gone. Ride down First Street and count the number of vacant stores, once fully occupied and busy. Count them all over town. Trad-ing out of town may not be wholly to blame, but it went a long way toward closing most of them.




