Sewance Builds For Future On Southern Grid

Purple Tigers On Their Way Under Athletic Policy

SEWANCE, Tenn., Sept. 10.—(AP)—Sewance's Purple Tigers are on the way back, but Coach Hol Clark says it will be two years before they can get within yelling distance of their stronger Southern Conference foes.

The little mountain school has a record of 30 men, including 11 lettermen, five of whom were 1935 regulars, and four veterans from junior colleges.

Coach Clark sees a slight chance of an improved team, mainly because of the junior college players accepted under Sewance's new and much-publicized "athletic scholarships."

Three of the lettermen due back have not reported. Rupert Colmore, only 200-pound man on the squad and a splendid tackle and R. L. Fleming, reserve back, are due in this week. Nothing has been heard from Bob Bollinger, counted on to fill the tackle opposite Colmore.

Clark appears well fixed at the flank with the veterans Bert Dedman and Hugh Shelton back, and Seneg Kiser, 180-pound junior college man, Jack Whitley and Carl Chousler fighting for berth.

B. I. Murphy, 180, Ralph Phillips, 185, junior college men, and Baxter Moore, 1936 regular, will handle guard chores.

The pivot position, vacated by the graduation of Jimmy Blair, will go to Houston Crosser or Hill Luce, sophomores, or T. T. Phillips, senior last fall.

Grant Advances To Semi-Finals In Net Tournay

English Woman Gets Spotlight In Brighton With Stunning Play

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 10.—(AP)—Firmly establishing herself as a serious threat to Helen Jacobs' ambition to win the title for the fifth straight time, left-handed Kay Stammers of England yesterday stole the show in the U. S. single tennis championship as she outplayed and outplayed a courageous Corina Babcock in a rousing quarter-final match.

The attractive southern star's 7-5, 5-4, 6-4 triumph, which advanced her to the semi-finals paled into insignificance the other quarter-final victory scored at 6-2, 11-9 by Alice Marble of San Francisco over Gracyn Wheeler of Santa Monica, Calif., and likewise overshadowed the progress of her compatriot, Fred Perry, and Bryan (Bitzy) Grant, Jr., of Atlanta to the penultimate round in the men's championship.

Grant, the pint-sized Southerner, had his hands full with the veteran Johnny Van Ryn in the first and second sets, but through his dogged retrieving managed to pull out a 5-4, 8-6, 6-5, 6-3 victory over the Philadelphia.

Van Ryn's cannon-ball service and spectacular volleys and overhead games were more than Bitzy could handle in the first set and troubled him no end in the second until finally, by playing his shots deep into Van Ryn's territory, he kept the former co-holder of the national doubles title back and seldom permitted him to advance to the net.

The little Atlantan's conquest landed him in the semi-finals for the second straight year. In 1935 he was put out in the penultimate round by Sidney Wood, Jr. This time his next opponent will be Perry, who will be a top-heavy choice to squash Bitzy just as he did during the all-England championships at Wimbledon last year.

Perry advanced at the expense of Al Henry of Santa Barbara, Calif., 6-3, 6-2, 6-1. Colby's blistering shots forced Perry to exhibit some of the best tennis he has shown here this year.

Cody Declares That Citadel And South Carolina Are Not Set-Ups For His Gridiron Protoges

GAINESVILLE, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Coach Cody, head University of Florida coach, stated that he is not taking either of his first two football games of the 1936 season lightly. The Gator mentor regards The Citadel, scheduled to meet Florida on Oct. 3, as one of his stronger opponents, and considers South Carolina, whom Florida meets the following week, a greatly improved grid machine this year.

GARDEN CITY, L. I., Sept. 10.—(AP)—The draw for the 50th national amateur golf championship, announced yesterday by the United States Golf Association, threw Fred Haney, New Orleans, Canadian champion and Charlie Mayo, Jr., Long Beach, N. Y., Long Island champion, together in the first round, gave 46 players first round byes, and definitely favored those who happened to lead in the first quarter.

The championship will start Monday (7 A. M. EST.) over the historic Garden City, L. I., golf course, with 32 matches scheduled and 216 players including eight former champions and 19 foreign stars competing for the title vacated by Lawson Little, now a professional.

Other outstanding matches in the first round are John E. Lehman, former Western amateur champion, v. J. Wood Platt, Philadelphia, v. Walter Knorr, Oklahoma City, runner-up last year, v. Knox M. Young, Jr., Pittsburgh, who lost to Lawson Little in the third round last year; and Johnny Goodman, Omaha, v. Hunter Hicks, Glenwood, Ill.

The 19 foreign players are led by Hector Thomson, British amateur champion, nine other members of the British Walker Cup squad and C. Ross (Sandy) Somerville, Canada, American champion in 1932.

Former champions in the field are Francis Ouimet, Brookline, Mass., 1914 and 1913; Chick Evans, Chicago, 1916 and 1920; E. D. Herron, Sewickley, Pa., 1919; Jess P. Guilford, Auburn, Mass., 1921; Jess Sweetser, New York, 1922; W. C. Maston, Philadelphia, 1923; Sandy Somerville, Canada, 1925; and George Dunlap, New York, 1933.

James Oxford, sophomore center, was given an added load of responsibility when Cody shifted him to guard. Oxford will have to keep in touch with center assignments through the season also, and will probably see as much service in either position. Oxford fought it out with Oscar Davis for first string honors on last year's B-B-Gator eleven.

The Gators splashed through a muddy session yesterday which assumed almost the roughness of scrimmages. The line coaches made no bones about blocking in the forward wall but backs were not allowed to make toady contact. There was no tackling as offensive backs rushed down upon the quarterback defense. In short, the Florida coaches decided to let line men get a taste of real scrimmaging, but held backfield players to a fast game of touch football.

Hitler Plans Active Steps Against Reds

400 War Planes Rear Over Nuremberg As Nazi Convention Awaits Air Show

Germany, Italy May Join Hands

Goebbels Strikes At Jews, Bolshevism In Terrible Address

(Copyright 1936 By The Associated Press)

NUREMBERG, Germany, Sept. 11.—The throbbing motors of 400 war planes gave a military background to Nazi Germany's anti-Bolshevik campaign today, a campaign which observers believe was the approaching announcement of practical steps against Bolshevism.

The planes awakened delegates and visitors in the Nazi convention city at dawn. They will give demonstrations tomorrow.

At the congress itself, German departmental leaders took up the anti-Bolshevik campaign where Hitler and his lieutenants left off. Some observers at the Congress believed Germany and Italy may join in a campaign against Bolshevism.

Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, Hitler's chief spokesman and propaganda minister, yesterday delivered a tirade against Bolshevism.

Commission Meets For Major Confab On 1936-37 Budget

Sanfordite Tells Of Trip To Arctic And To Europe

Mrs. Cooper Finds Fur Coat Comfortable On July 4th While Cruising In Icelandic Waters

"I found I was quite comfortable in a woolen suit and a fur coat on the Arctic Ocean on the Fourth of July," said Mrs. Walter L. Cooper, who with Mr. Cooper, has just returned from a 100-day trip on which they traveled 18,000 miles and visited 100 islands and foreign countries.

"Well, a cold Fourth is something new under the sun, but I suppose it isn't, under a midnight sun," I said.

"Our first glimpse of the midnight sun was between Iceland and the Spitzbergen Islands. It was a quarter after twelve at night and we were on deck. At twenty minutes after twelve the sun was down and it was like our twilight. Then in twenty minutes there was a red glow in the sky just like our sunrise and there was the sun again. It was beautiful and strange and somehow uncanny. I've heard of people sitting on top of the world but we were sailing on top of it. The loveliest part of our trip was from Iceland to the North Cape—the glaciers, the sun shining on the ice, the sea, and all the rest of it."

"Didn't you have some trouble with an ice barrier?"

"Not trouble, exactly, a shock. An ice barrier was drifting southward and the Captain stopped our ship because of it. He just changed our course a bit and it turned out all right."

"You visited Hammerfest, Norway, didn't you, Mrs. Cooper? I have heard that it is the northernmost city in the world."

"Yes, and I believe they have another distinction—more fish than I have ever seen before in my life."

"Did you see any Laplanders?"

"Yes, near Lyngseidet. We visited a Lap village and saw one of their great herds of reindeer." (Continued on page two)

Roosevelt To Start Motors At Huge Dam

President Declares Nation Has Turned Corner Of Depression, Future Bright

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—(AP)—A huge assembly of power experts from many nations gathered here this afternoon to hear a message from President Roosevelt and watch him throw the switch starting the giant turbines of Boulder Dam, highest dam in the world.

Some of the 3,000 delegates to the third world power conference expected a major pronouncement from Roosevelt on the Administration's power policies. The address and starting of the power plant at Boulder Dam was scheduled for mid-afternoon.

Boulder Dam, across the Colorado River in Nevada and Arizona, is 727 feet high and backs up water in the greatest man-made lake on earth. The dam cost \$54,500,000. It will supply power for communities as far away as Southern California.

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Sept. 11.—(AP)—A cheering, sopping wet audience heard President Roosevelt assert yesterday the nation has rounded the corner toward prosperity but that individual liberties have not been removed and inherent rights of the sovereign states have not been invaded along the way.

The President, soaked by a heavy downpour, spoke to thousands of persons assembled from seven states at the "green pastures" rally in Charlotte's municipal stadium.

A cloudburst had delayed the President nearly an hour en route from Asheville. Rain began pelting down again as the Roosevelt entourage of cars wound through packed Charlotte streets.

Through the deluge here the President said:

Farmers' Market 1935-36 Season Exceeds \$600,000

Value Of Celery Is Leading Figure In Report Of Firm

A volume of Florida products valued at \$628,992.79 poured through the State Farmers' Wholesale Market here during the 1935-36 season, according to a report released today by J. G. Michael, manager of the institution.

Out-of-state products handed amounted to \$33,851.26, giving the Market a total business volume of \$662,844.05 for the entire season.

While only a small portion of Seminole County's celery was handled through the wholesale unit, \$122,434.40 worth of that commodity was recorded on the market's books.

Second highest in value were beans, of which \$115,714.29 worth poured through the stalls of the establishment.

Other products, in the order of their value, follow: Tomatoes, \$73,635; cabbage, \$68,879; organes, \$37,105; potatoes, \$35,821; grapefruit, \$23,529; beets with tops, \$15,367; (Continued on page two)

JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 11.—(AP)—The Weather Bureau today said a tropical storm is moving west-northwestward through the Atlantic Ocean about 150 miles east-northeast of St. Thomas Island, St. Thomas is directly east of Puerto Rico.

An advisory issued by an observer at San Juan, Puerto Rico, said pressure continues to be low over the extreme northeast Caribbean Sea but no high winds have been reported. Ships advised to use caution.

2,000 Students Of Seminole Schools Assigned Classes

Approximately 2,000 Seminole County students will begin school Monday streamed through County schools yesterday to register for classes and be assigned schedules.

T. W. Lawton, county superintendent, said that while the entire registration list is incomplete, he expected all pupils will have been registered by Monday night.

It was estimated that 5,000 children will be accommodated in the public educational institutions of the County this year. About 1,000 of that number began classes last Monday. The other 4,000 open their texts Sept. 14.

Earlier Citrus Movements Seen By Express Firm

Local Agent Asserts Business Is On Upgrade For Summer

He explained that all citrus fruits dispatched by express are free from the maturity and grade laws, the only requirement being that the shipments must meet the state advertising tax statutes.

These laws, Mr. Schirard said, demand that a one-cent tax stamp be placed on each orange box. Three cents are required on each box of grapefruit, while tangerines make a five-cent tax stamp.

All monies collected from this revenue source are used in advertising Florida out of the state.

French Fear Uprising Of Natives In Northern Africa

The Rebel Junta, which claims it is the "real" national government of Spain, today announced 2,000 Government troops had been slaughtered in an abortive attack on the Island of Mallorca.

Facist Rebels and Socialist Government sources reported a new and violent engagement at the besieged Rebel City of Oviedo in the northeast mining country. Who actually won was hidden in highly conflicting claims.

Madrid announced administrative buildings and a convent had been fired by government bombers, that Rebels tried in vain to flee the city, and that Oviedo had had no water since Sept. 5.

The Rebels said the Oviedo garrison had driven Government soldiers back in battle, taking many prisoners including women.

There was a similar conflict of claims concerning the success or failure of the Rebels' southwestward drive on Madrid and other Rebel fronts.

The Rebels at Burgos, seat of the Junta, declared a final attack on San Sebastian was imminent and said an unofficial truce there, involving negotiations for the city's surrender, had been broken because the defenders wanted safe conduct for 110 Spaniards whom they desired to send to the shores of nearby Bilbao.

Traveler Leaves Average American Is "Magellan"

William Robinson Asserts Voyage Around World Is Secret Ambition Of Many U. S. Residents

NEW YORK, Sept. 11.—(AP)—The average American is not content with leading in the heart of the world alone to sail around the world once in a lifetime, according to William Robinson, a travel expert who has had first hand experience on voyages of that sort. He has been around the world once with a single companion in the Pacific (where the Navy rescued him from the Galapagos archipelago after an attack of acute appendicitis) and is bound now on another expedition in a 66-foot schooner to the China seas.

"From the fan letters I get, half the country must be sitting around in their beds thinking about going to far lands in small boats," said Robinson, telling in a news column in a suite at a downtown hotel.

"They write me by the hundred. They tell what good companions they would make or ask where they can get a boat and how free the world gets are with their families."

"But the ones that write letters will never get there. You have to go out and learn how to row."

Robinson was a young (until) cadet just out of college in Massachusetts when he started to "row his" seven years ago. He bought the ship for \$2,500 and a new "anti-noise" by law.

and in three years on the world trip spent another \$5,000. He's made that up by writing books.

"I wouldn't advise many people to do it," he said. "It takes a certain mental outlook as well as physical ability and knowledge of boats."

Danger? He pulled the one about being safer in a boat than crossing Fifth Avenue.

Robinson has his own ideas about expeditions that infest the South seas. Members often spend their time carousing with liquor and native women, he asserts, then try to cash in on whatever publicity they can obtain.

As for himself, he takes pictures of natives in unspoiled regions and gathers other information of scientific value.

With Robinson on his trip through the China seas will sail his wife, who was with him also in the Pacific Ocean expeditions to the Galapagos and to Tahiti. They will take passage to Singapore, buy a native teakwood schooner which he covets, refit it, and return home by way of the Cape of Good Hope.

Army To Abandon Heavy Clothing Used By Airman

Closed Cockpit Ships Coming Into Own, Efficiency Greater

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—(AP)—Fear and panic generated in military pilots by extreme cold when flying at high altitudes is forcing abandonment of the old open cockpit type of airplane.

Captain Harry G. Armstrong, director of the Army's physiological research laboratory at Wright Field, writing in the Military Surgeon, declared that as cold increases the heavy winter flying suits used by service fliers become ineffective and "we find progressive mental distress, loss of morale, indifference or indubitate for the mission, a tendency to panic and finally stupor and death."

For this reason, he declared,

heavy flying clothes is definitely a handicap, Captain Armstrong said, and protects the flier only from freezing temperatures down to about 30 degrees above zero. "Most pilots lose some degree of confidence while wearing winter flying clothing, being conscious of the fact that they are not then able to control the airplane, operate equipment, or 'fall out' in an emergency."

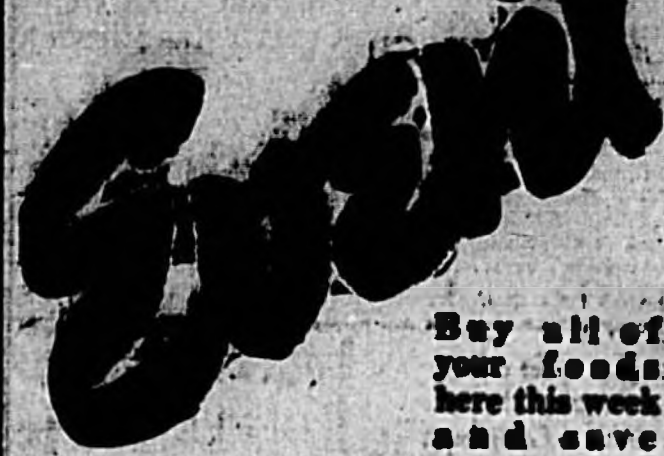
In contrast, it was revealed that on the first flight of Admiral Richard E. Byrd's party over the south pole the group wore comparatively light clothing in their cabin plane and Pilot Bert Balchen flew the ship without gloves or mittens.

Many planes purchased by both the Army and Navy recently have retained the old open-cockpit construction but the new high speed heavy bombers and many observation ships are cabin type

or are constructed with transparent covers over machine gun compartments and cockpits to provide good visibility and warmth.
