#### More robberies reported

LONGWOOD — A man police think was responsible for a convenience store robbery in Lake Mary Tuesday held up a Longwood store Wednesday only a half hour after attempting to hold up a nearby store. The man entered the Circle K store at County Road 427 at U.S. Highway 17-92 at about 9:15 p.m., according to sheriff's reports. Pointing a black handgun to the clerk's head, the man took cash from the register and left on foot, heading north on U.S. 17-92. Only 30 minutes before, a clerk at another Circle K at State Road 434 and Grant Street reported a man matching the suspect's description attempted to hold up that store. No one has been injured in the incidents. The suspect is described as white, 24 years old, five feet, four inches tall, with long, wavy black hair and a mustache. The man was dressed in a red tank top and blue jeans.

#### Charter review hearings

SANFORD — The Seminole County Charter Review Commission will hold the first of three public hearings tonight on five proposed amendments to the county charter. The hearing will begin at 7 p.m. in the commission chambers at the County Services Building, 1101 E. First St. Up for discussion are partisan school board elections, requiring economic impact statements before county commissioners adopt new taxes and fees, allowing the commissioners to occasionally hire an auditor, clarifying the non-interference clause to permit commissioners to ask staffers for information and to have the county attorney responsible to commissioners, not the county manager.

#### St. Johns bridge opens

LAKE MONROE - The drive between Seminole County and West Volusia County will be a tad easier tomorrow morning. Shortly after 10:30 a.m., traffic will be diverted from the last electronically-operated swing bridge in the state to the new, \$10 million fixed bridge. For 57 years, cars and trucks have traveled over the old iron and wood span. The structure will be moved to nearby Lake Monroe Wayside Park to become a fishing pier. Only two lanes of the new bridge will be opened. The last two lanes will be opened by November when the approaches are done. A short ceremony with Sen. Toni Jennings, R-Orlando, and Rep. Stan Bainter, R-Eustis, will precede the opening. The bridge will be dedicated in the name of C.A. "Bill" Benedict, former district road secretary.

#### Back on board

SANFORD — The Sanford City Commission has approved the reappointments of a number of members of the Waterfront Master Plan Steering Committee. The terms of Larry Strickler, Kay Bartholomew, Jack W. Wert, Connie Williams, Mike Davis, Gary Briggs, Chuck Volk and Laura Strachla were to have all expired as of June 28. The Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce reappointed Larry Strickler for another one-year term. Strickler has served as chairman of the committee. At Monday night's city commission meeting, the commission approved, with a unanimous vote, the reappointment of each member whose term would have expired.

## Detailed models of development wow committee

SANFORD — Those who were there said the Sanford lakefront area never looked more beautiful than it did yesterday.

The artistic designs of the buildings, increased number of boat docks, walkways and a tower with a restaurant on top attracted many spectators.

The lakefront was depicted through models created by members of the University of Florida architectural study group working for the Sanford Waterfront Master Plan Steering Committee.

The exact scale models, along with some additional drawings, were revealed yesterday afternoon during a meeting of the committee at the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce conference room. The meeting was also open to the general public.

# Fireworks over July Fourth

## SHDWA says show will go on in '95

SANFORD — The decision came too late to do anything for this year, but next year, it appears there will be fireworks for July Fourth on Sanford's lakefront.

The project is being planned by the Sanford Historic Downtown Waterfront Association, SHDWA. According to SHDWA President Rod Layer, "We discussed it two weeks ago when it became certain that there wouldn't be any more People's Fireworks drives, and just a few days ago, the membership voted in favor of taking the drive over for next year."

Layer said Wednesday that there just wasn't enough time this year to raise needed money, obtain fireworks, locate an individual who would be licensed to launch it, and obtain a special event permit from the City of Sanford.

"If we start early in the year for 1995," Layer said, "there should be enough time in which to take care of this."

"All you would have had to do is see those hundreds of people who have come into Sanford in past years to see the fireworks displays on July Fourth," he commented, "and you realize what a wonderful event this has been, and should continue to be for our city."

Layer said SHDWA doesn't plan to do this alone. "We hope to get some support from others, including Steve Alford who ran the People's Fireworks drives for the past few years, the Jaycees, and maybe some other organizations," Layer added.

He commented that there was considerable disappointment by SHDWA members and other citizens, over the fact that there would be no Independence Day event in Sanford this year. "Where can we go now," he asked, "Lake Eola? That's not local. Sanford is. We should have it here."

In addition to the July Fourth fireworks project, Layer also announced SHDWA has received approval to have community service people

# City sets guidelines for citizens' displays

SANFORD — Citizens who want to stage an impromptu, bring your own fireworks display to celebrate the Fourth of July are welcome to use city park property as long as they use legal fireworks. However, citizens cannot stage the pitch-in party on the city-owned marina property fronting Lake Monroe unless written permission is given by the companies which lease the land.

Sanford City Manager Bill Simmons expressed concern Wednesday over the proposed BYOF

gathering reported Tuesday in the Sanford Herald.

In lieu of a professional pyrotechnics show, Sanford resident Sharon Gonyeau and some of her friends suggested residents buy fireworks and set them off after dusk on Independence Day down by the waterfront.

This is the first year in recent memory there will not be a professional aerial fireworks display.

"The parks are there for the use of the public," Simmons said, "and certainly there is no intention to interfere with that. However, I have a concern if people are coming down thinking they

# City plan aids low income workers

SANFORD — Sanford commissioners revealed a plan Monday that will help low income people find jobs.

The job placement information is being expanded for construction jobs, at Seminole Towne Center Mall, and lien waivers are planned to help establish more employment opportunities.

The low income job creation project was approved with a consensus vote of the commission during Monday afternoon's work session. People planning on establishing new businesses in the city, who can show that they plan to hire present low income workers, may have city-held liens against pro-

posed building sites waived by the city.

Community Development Director Charles Rowe explained, "If they want to build on property on which the city presently holds a lien, all they have to do is prove to us that they plan to hire a certain number of people who presently have low incomes, and the city will consider dropping the lien."

Rowe said it was similar to three structures located on Holly Avenue, on which the city had placed liens for code violations. "We agreed that if the owners would donate the property to someone planning to build low income housing, we would waive

# Postal carriers receive sheriff's special delivery

SANFORD — We got trouble right here in Seminole County.

But letter carriers in this county are hoping to make a difference thanks to a special delivery from Sheriff Don Eslinger and the Seminole County sheriff's office.

The postal workers on 35 residential routes throughout the county were given cellular telephones that will enable them to alert deputies the instant they spot something amiss.

According to Sheriff Don Eslinger, the carriers are piloting a program called CARE (Carrier Alert Residential Emphasis).

Eslinger said it is a program designed to help postal workers, who walk the same neighborhoods day after day, access to help if they see that something in their area is not as it should be.

"We selected neighborhoods where there were few people during the day," Eslinger explained. "They are not necessarily crime-ridden areas. These are residential areas where both parents work, for example."

He said the exact locales would not be announced so as not to tip off potential law breakers in the area.

Eslinger announced the program this morning, stating the money to purchase the equipment came from the seized assets of drug dealers. The three dozen telephones cost \$9,800 and each has been programmed to dial directly into the dispatch center of the sheriff's office.

"They can not be used for any other kind of call," Eslinger noted.

The program has been set up to protect the neighborhoods and residents from all kinds of crime, but children and the elderly in trouble

### Pipe bomb explodes

MIAMI — Life just keeps getting nastier for rap star Luther Campbell. First, his live-in girlfriend accused him of threatening to kill her. Now, someone has thrown a pipe bomb that exploded outside his home, barely missing his new Dodge Viper.

No one was hurt, and there was no damage to the \$50,000-plus, red sports car in the incident late Tuesday.

Campbell, who was inside his Miami Lakes home, heard a blast, looked out the window and saw smoke coming from his carport, said Metro Dade police spokesman Pat Brickman.

"A witness said he heard a loud explosion and a squeal of car tires," Brickman said. "He then saw a vehicle drive by very quickly."

Police have no suspects, and Campbell's spokeswoman, Debra Bennet, said he had no comment on the incident. But she said Campbell and his girlfriend, Tina Barnett — who earlier this year told police he had threatened her with a gun — reconciled after Barnett dropped charges and the couple now plan to marry.

### Woman dies after abortion

PENSACOLA — A woman traveling home after an abortion has died from severe bleeding, authorities said.

The 31-year-old Port St. Joe woman stopped at a Panama City motel late Saturday and was taken to Bay Medical Center where she was pronounced dead early Sunday, Panama City police said.

An autopsy showed that the woman died from blood loss caused by a perforated uterus and lacerated uterine artery, said Dr. Steve Havard, associate medical examiner in Pensacola.

Staff at Pensacola Women's Medical Services, where the abortion was performed, still did not know what went wrong, administrator Sandy Sheldon said.

The case is not being investigated as a criminal matter, said Pensacola police Sgt. Jerry Potts. He noted that the woman was cared for by a licensed doctor in a licensed medical facility.

### Sheriff's deputy saves teen

TAMPA — A sheriff's deputy on her way to work stopped to answer a 911 plea for help and revived a teen-ager who had quit breathing after being struck by lightning.

Matthew Hays, 14, was hospitalized in stable but serious condition at St. Joseph's Hospital after his mother and Hillsborough Sheriff's Cpl. Lynda Vaughn administered cardiopulmonary resuscitation in the driveway of the youth's Lutz home.

The teen had gotten off a school bus and was about 50 feet from the bus stop when he was struck Wednesday.

The mother and the deputy gave Hays CPR and after a minute or so he began breathing again, Vaughn said.

When paramedics arrived and cut away his clothes there was a big burn mark on his right hip. Despite thick rubber soles on his shoes, both socks had been charred and there was damage to his feet and ankles.

Hays was in critical condition late Wednesday at Tampa General.

### \$9 million malpractice award

WEST PALM BEACH — The parents of a 19-month-old girl who never woke up after surgery to correct a drooping eyelid have been awarded \$9 million in a malpractice suit.

Attorneys for the family maintained that Alonette Brinson was killed because faulty equipment delivered too much anesthesia.

St. Mary's Hospital attorney Jeffrey Fulford conceded in court that a machine delivered "slightly excessive" amounts of the anesthesia Halothane, but not enough to harm Alonette.

Family attorney Robert Montgomery said his investigation showed the hospital returned the equipment without disclosing the problem to the manufacturer or anyone else.

Circuit Judge James Carlisle ordered a verdict in favor of the family Monday and instructed the jury in the case to determine the appropriate award. It returned the damage award Tuesday.

"I'm satisfied with the outcome, but more than anything I found out the real, honest truth about what happened to my daughter," Alonzo Brinson said.

### Prison sentence cut

FORT LAUDERDALE — A man convicted of shaking his crying 15-week-old son so hard that the baby died got his prison sentence cut in half because it exceeded the guidelines.

Ricardo Gonzalez's son Ricky died in June 1990. Gonzalez was convicted of third-degree murder and aggravated child abuse, which carry a maximum 12-year prison sentence. He was given 20 years instead.

Circuit Judge Barry Goldstein cited the "barbaric, grotesque and egregious nature of the injuries" as reasons for exceeding the guidelines, but the 4th District Court of Appeal ruled in August 1993 that he was wrong.

# New state laws take effect July 1

## Two measures effect child support, family violence

TALLAHASSEE — More than 90 state laws take effect Friday, with two of the biggest measures designed to increase child support payments and reduce family violence.

Other laws will increase marriage licenses by \$25, increase divorce fees by \$18, grant tax breaks to jail alai frontons, require the teaching of black history and the Holocaust in public schools, and allow the state's \$38.6 billion budget to take effect.

One of the biggest changes involves the transfer of the state's child support enforcement program from the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services to the Department of Revenue.

More than \$2.1 billion in child support payments have been made since the program went into effect in 1975. But today, more than 1 million cases remain open and less than 25 percent of the families receive all the money they're owed.

"The Department of Revenue does one thing very well — collect money," Gov. Lawton Chiles said. "That's why this transfer makes sense."

"It's time to get tough with parents who have abandoned their responsibility to their

children," the governor added.

Revenue director Larry Fuchs said the merger would be the largest among state agencies in over 25 years, when state government was reorganized as part of the 1988 constitutional revision.

With the addition of child support enforcement program, the revenue department will increase its staff from 3,200 to 5,300.

Fuchs said the agency would analyze ways to increase child support payments, including suspending drivers licenses, denying professional licenses and garnishing the wages of deadbeat parents.

"It's not a quick and easy fix as we told the Legislature repeatedly," he said. "Any dramatic improvement is between six and 12 months off."

The new domestic violence law would provide \$1.5 million in additional money to each of the state's 37 domestic violence centers. The money would come from increasing the divorce filing fees by \$18.

Last year, 17 percent of all reported violent crimes in Florida were domestic, a statistic some officials say is under reported. Domestic violence has gained national attention as a result of the O.J. Simpson case.

"We know domestics are chronically under reported,

probably at least three times greater than that," said Robin Haasler, executive director of the Governor's Task Force on Domestic Violence. "We know it happens among rich and poor, famous and obscure, all races and education levels."

Another law taking effect Friday will increase the cost of a marriage license \$25 from \$63.50 to \$88.50 to finance family court programs.

To help jail alai frontons, a new law reduces the tax rate on live performances from 7.1 percent to 5 percent and cuts the daily license fee for each game from \$80 to \$40.

The law also creates a special license to conduct the Jai Alai Tournament of Champions and

provides tax credits and exemptions for permit holders to hold the event.

A new program to clean up pollution at dry-cleaning sites around the state also takes effect Friday, though funding for the program won't begin until this fall.

A 1.5 percent tax on the monthly gross receipts of dry cleaners and a \$5 fee on every gallon of a cleaning solvent will go into effect Oct. 1. The tax does not apply to coin-operated laundries.

By June 30, 1995, dry-cleaning businesses must register with the state. Starting Dec. 31, 1995, they must start paying an annual registration fee ranging from \$100 to \$500.

## Manatee deaths double

MIAMI — The manatees just aren't making it.

Despite widespread efforts to increase boater awareness of where the gentle, walrus-like sea creatures gather, the number of manatees killed by boats in Florida so far this year has jumped substantially, according to the Save the Manatee Club.

At least 27 manatees have died in collisions in Florida waters in 1994 through June 21, compared to 14 in the first six months of 1993, the club said.

Jamie Serino, coordinator of special programs for the Department of Environmental Protection's Florida Marine Research Institute, confirmed 20 manatees had been killed by boats by the end of May. He said the June figure cited by the club was probably correct but could not immediately be verified by the state.

The number of manatees to die from watercraft collisions dropped from a high of 53 in 1991 to 38 in 1992, and then to 35 in 1993, according to a DE report.

There are several possible reasons for the increase, including an improved economy that allows more people to purchase and use boats, not enough officers with the Florida Marine Patrol, and delays in posting speed limit signs for boaters.

## New hurricane radar out of service

RUSKIN — A radar that'll help forecasters better predict killer storms and tornadoes could be operational this week, just in time for the hurricane season, according to an aide to U.S. Sen. Connie Mack.

The radar hasn't worked since June 17, when an antenna motor failed. No one had been able to predict when it will be operational again because attempts to get a replacement motor were stalled in bureaucracy and because of overcharges.

But weather service officials in Washington have assured Mack, R-Cape Coral, that a new motor

will be shipped this week, the senator's aide, Mark Mills, said Wednesday.

"The senator was upset, no doubt, especially considering the weather season we are in now," Mills said, adding that he was told the motor's installation should take about 24 hours.

Buying spare parts had been stopped following a U.S. inspector general's investigation that showed that the government was being overcharged by contractors supplying Doppler,

according to Weather Service radar program chief, Steve Rindard of Fort Worth, Texas. Rindard said hundreds of De-

partment of Defense installations around with world have been affected.

Doppler is more sophisticated than the old radar, providing critical information including sensing the motion of winds in storms, meteorologists say.

The backup equipment is a 1950s-era radar blamed for the system's failure to issue timely warnings of Pinellas County tornadoes that killed four people in October 1992.

It also provided scant advance warning of the March 1993 storm unofficially dubbed "The Storm of the Century," which killed 48 in the state.

### Drug sting

# Beef glut

## Lower prices: Bargains for July Fourth shoppers

WASHINGTON — With the July Fourth weekend coming up, look for lots of beef specials at the supermarket.

The lower prices will be the result of a huge oversupply of beef, just in time for the second-busiest cookout weekend of the year. Memorial Day is the busiest.

But the low prices still have far to fall before they get close to what cattle producers are getting.

In a report Wednesday, the Agriculture Department said the June price for beef cattle was \$63.60 per hundredweight, the lowest since July 1988. Just last year cattle brought in \$74.50.

"There's a tremendous amount of tonnage out there in the market," said David Mehlich, spokesman for the National Cattlemen's Association in Denver.

Production so far this year is the highest

for a comparable period since 1986, he said. Average weekly beef supplies are 12 million to 25 million pounds greater than last year.

What's happened is the result of too much expansion because of good prices in the past. Trouble started earlier this year.

Until June, the spring feedlots where most cattle are fattened for slaughter were jammed their fullest since the 1970s. In May, red meat production at slaughterhouses reached a 10-year high.

Shoppers have seen some of the results. The organization's monthly survey June 9 found the average price of six cuts of beef had dropped to \$3.18 a pound, compared with \$3.21 on May 12.

Even so, the gap between what producers received and retailers charged reached its widest point in May — more than \$1.42 a pound. The gap should be even wider in June, given the latest drop in what producers received.

"Retail will probably drop, but not as far

as the farm price," said Larry Duerwer, a departmental economist who monitors the retail-farm price spread.

Still, the cattlemen's group appealed to supermarkets to help unload beef by running short-term specials, and stores have responded. "We're starting to see some featuring around the country," Mehlich said.

A check of supermarket ads in Washington, D.C., one of the nation's most expensive cities, bears him out.

One store was selling boneless top sirloin at \$3.39 a pound, compared with the national average price of \$3.98 reported in early June by the association.

Another was selling ground beef patties at \$1.29 a pound, compared with a national average of \$1.57 in early June.

For people who would rather have chicken or pork, the competition from beef will help hold down prices for those foods.

## Simpson hearing plays to audience nationwide

LOS ANGELES — Rumors and innuendo must finally take a back seat to the facts as prosecutors try to bring O.J. Simpson to trial on charges of killing his ex-wife and her friend.

A preliminary hearing was to begin today and is expected to last about a week. Prosecutors, hoping for an indictment, will present the evidence that led them to charge Simpson in the knife killings of Nicole Brown Simpson, 35, and Ronald Goldman, 25.

The defense gets to contest that evidence, and will probably seize the opportunity to sow a seed of reasonable doubt about Simpson's guilt.

Municipal Court Judge Kathleen Kennedy-Powell will decide whether there is enough evidence to try Simpson, 46, on two counts of first-degree murder. Prosecutors have not said whether they want to seek the death penalty.

There are no known eyewitnesses. Media reports, some unconfirmed, suggest that prosecutors have a circumstantial case that relies on clues such as strands of hair, a ski cap and pair of gloves, bloodstains and phone records showing the time of Ms. Simpson's last telephone call. The murder weapon has not been found.

Prosecutors refused to reveal their witness lineup, but it appeared certain it would include the person who found the bodies, law enforcement officers and coroner's investigators, scientists who analyzed bloodstains and other evidence, a caretaker at his estate and the limousine driver who took Simpson to the airport for an 11:45 p.m. flight on June 12. The bodies were found at 12:05 a.m. on June 13.

Simpson's lawyer, Robert Shapiro, has acknowledged that the football Hall of Famer will probably be ordered to stand trial.

The question at hand is not Simpson's guilt, but "whether there is some rational ground for assuming the possibility that an offense has been committed and the accused is guilty of it," said Loyola University Law School Professor Laurie Levenson.

Shapiro will probably use the hearing to plant the idea in the public's mind that police have arrested the wrong man, Levenson said.

"Certainly, if he could stop the train at this point and avoid a trial, the nightmare would go away. But that's not realistic," Levenson said.

Simpson's lawyers filed a motion Wednesday to suppress all evidence seized from Simpson's mansion the day after the murders, the Los Angeles Times reported today.

The motion claims detectives scaled the fence around Simpson's estate, ejected the occupants and improperly viewed the premises without a warrant. The motion says a warrant authorities got six hours after police arrived was obtained under false pretenses because police asserted Simpson had left town unexpectedly even though they knew he was on a planned business trip.

The three major TV networks and CNN planned to preempt shows ranging from soap operas to the Wimbledon tennis matches to bring viewers live coverage. It will be the second Simpson drama to play itself out on live television: His flight from police after being charged with murder was seen by an estimated 95 million viewers.

## Proposal to beautify Longwood medians

LONGWOOD — A proposal to make the medians covered by weedy grass along State Road 434 bloom with ornamental trees and groundcovers is being considered by the Florida Department of Transportation.

Longwood City Planning Director John Brock said a \$153,700 grant funded by federal and state monies is being considered by FDOT. The city would maintain the medians after the plantings are in place. A decision on the grant application may be made by Aug. 1. The FDOT is establishing a combined priority list for funding bicycle and pedestrian enhancement projects and non-bicycle and pedestrian enhancements. The Longwood medians along the state highway are in the second category.

Brock said the landscaping project was recommended for approval by the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO). He has been told the transportation department agrees with the MPO recommendation.

There are a total of 13 medians along SR 434 from County Road 427 near South Seminole Hospital traveling west to Interstate 4.

Preliminary plans call for

xeriscaping the medians, with small ornamental trees, shrubs and ground cover plantings. Some irrigation might be necessary Brock wrote in the grant application. However, utilizing xeriscaping will conserve water usage by using plants which do not require constant watering.

If the grant is approved, the final design would be drawn by a qualified landscape architect, Brock added. The city does not have a landscape architect on staff so one would be contracted to design the final project.

"It would go a long way in improving the looks of it down there," Brock said of the median beautification project. "It's sort of in grass, if you want to call it that, now." The FDOT occasionally mows the medians now.

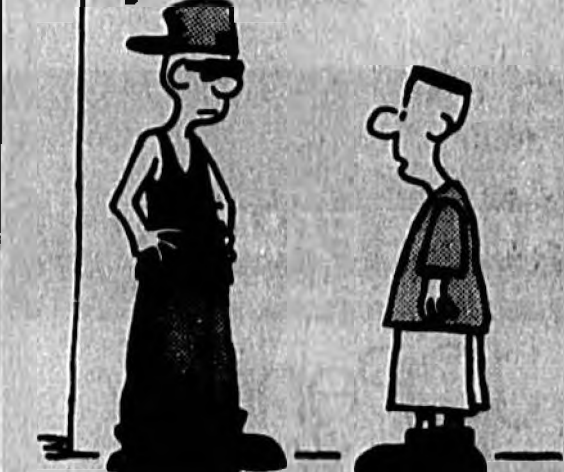

## The hysterics over Ollie North

A dispassionate observer could be forgiven for wondering what all the hysterics are about in the case of Ollie North.

North captured the Republican nomination for the Senate in Virginia, and stands an excellent chance of winning the seat in November. He is a staunch conservative, and won with the help of the much criticized "Christian right." But these facts hardly seem adequate to explain the downright furious opposition he has generated in various quarters.

The opposition of the liberals is easiest to understand. North was one of President Reagan's chief agents in arranging the secret sale of arms to Iran, for which, rightly or wrongly, Mr. Reagan was subsequently much criticized. And North and his boss, National Security Council Director John Poindexter, were also instrumental, though in this case without Mr. Reagan's knowledge, in trying to use part of the proceeds of that sale to provide aid to the Nicaraguan contra, which the Reagan administration was backing against the pro-Communist Sandinista regime.

A record like that is certainly enough to put Ollie North on the liberals' "enemies list," and they are highly accomplished smear artists. Small wonder that they are feverishly peddling a picture of North as a chronic "liar" who perjured

himself before Congress and got away with it only because his conviction was reversed on "technicalities."

Not one American in 10 knows the truth, which is that North never lied under oath and was never convicted of perjury. His only "sin" in that regard was to conceal White House policy initiatives, (which the White House had no constitutional duty to disclose) in private briefings of congressional Democrats bent on mischief-making.

As for the vague allegations of money corruption, they are even phonier. The only money North has ever even been charged with accepting from an improper source

was the \$14,000 put up by Gen. Secord to pay for a security fence around North's home, at a time when this husband and father of two minor children was a logical target of Arab terrorists. And even that conviction was set aside on appeal.

Such smears, I repeat, are par for the course. As to these, I have a theory of my own. All through the first half of the 1980s Marine Lt. Col. Oliver North was a hot-shot operative of President Reagan's National Security Council (which in turn was the chief agent of Mr. Reagan's foreign policy), forever being sent hither and thither on secret missions for the president like some upscale James Bond.

It doesn't take a degree in psychology to imagine how others (involved in the formation and execution of policy, not to mention higher ranking officers of the armed forces, must have regarded this young whipper-snapper. And that would also explain the animosity of his greatest enemy, Republican Senator John Warner of Virginia, who just happens to be the ranking Republican on the Senate Armed Services Committee.

Oliver North was a great public servant, and he would make a brilliant United States Senator from Virginia.

## Press buried real O.J. story

A dozen helicopters whirling above a spaghetti strand of Los Angeles freeway, tracking scores of black dots with flashing red lights that were chasing a white dot that contained a celebrity with a gun to his head.

Down below a whole continent with nothing better to do watched and waited. Watched — on all TV networks — this epic Hollywood chase, screened in slow-mo yet somehow riveting, even though it was about as eventful as watching grass grow.

And waited — through hours of interminable, undistilled anchortalk — for something horrible to happen; maybe the human tragedy of a suicide; maybe helicopters colliding and plummeting onto the story they were covering.

But make no mistake: What was really occurring was a classic illustration of how news media coverage no longer magnifies, but merely mirrors, America's obsession with "celebrity." On the night of June 17, 1994, it is bizarre but probably accurate to say that it was not excessive that all networks deep-sixed all programming to feed us the chase and surrender of O.J. Simpson, the football superstar turned sportscaster/actor turned fugitive, charged with murdering his former wife and her male friend. (NBC flipped between the cops vs. O.J. and the Knicks vs. the Rockets.) When it comes to celebrities from sports or entertainment — let alone both in one package! — cab driver charged with wife/rape.

O.J. Simpson had for years been given the celebrity treatment, not just by his fans and the media, but even by the American system of justice. Nine times O.J.'s ex-wife, Nicole Brown Simpson, had called the police to her home complaining that her husband had become violent. In 1989, she suffered a split lip, black eye, swelling and bruises, and told police: "He's going to kill me."

O.J. pleaded no contest to a charge of battery. Yet when prosecutors asked that he be jailed for 30 days, a judge gave O.J. a superstar/celebrity consideration: no time in jail, but two years probation, six months of psychiatric counseling. But because O.J. was busy being a superstar, the judge said he could receive his counseling by telephone — just phone it in and promise to be good.

Now a new court will decide whether the celebrity who got off with a Dial-a-Shrink sentence in 1989 committed double murder in 1994. But this much we already know: No carpenter or cab driver charged with wife battering would have gotten a celebrity-special sentence like that. Nor would they get the celebrity-special treatment from police that O.J. got after being charged with murder: an

honor system request that he please take himself in to be booked for murder, RSVP. No, the carpenter or cab driver would have awakened to find police surrounding his house, coming through the doors and windows to make the arrest. No escape, no chase.

Looking back, there are lessons for all to learn. By now, the lessons for the courts and cops should be self-evident. But there is also one lesson to be learned by the news media — not about too much coverage of a celebrity, but too little.

When Simpson, a publicly nice guy who was popular with all the media, was charged with wife beating back in February 1989, the Los Angeles Times covered it on page eight of the sports section, in a nine-paragraph wire service report. Simpson's no contest plea three months later was covered in five brief paragraphs in a "Metro Digest" roundup. (Nationally, the New York Times ran a one four-paragraph report on page D26; the Washington Post ran three roundup briefs.)

No one examined critically the leniency of the celebrity-lite sentencing. The good news is that we in the media may have learned a valuable lesson.

"I would not, in any way, right now defend the small coverage that we gave the incident in 1989," Los Angeles Times city editor Joel Sappel, said candidly on "CNN's Reliable Sources" show (where I sit as a regular panelist). "... we should have ... probably written more on that story."

## Can 32 billion soccer fans be wrong?

(Soccer is boring.) I put parentheses around that sentence to indicate that I whispered it. I did this because I am a hospitable guy who does not want to offend the thousands of foreign soccer fans who are currently in the United States to root for their national teams in the quadrennial World Cup matches.

They seem to be having so much fun, don't they? The Mexicans in their sombreros. The Dutch dressed in orange and sporting large foam wooden shoes on their heads. The Norwegians wearing Viking helmets. The American fans a painted head to toe in red, white and blue. Even the aficionados of undetermined national origin wearing soccer balls on their heads.

What I cannot understand, though, is what it is they get so excited about.

Bunch of guys running around in an open field for an hour-and-a-half kicking a ball this way and that. Kick it north, kick it south. Kick it in, kick it out. Bounce it off your head once in a while. Get touched by an opposing player and fall to the ground, flopping like a freshly landed flounder, hoping to get a penalty called on the other guy.

And, slightly more than twice every game, on the average, the ball goes in the net and the stadium erupts and the players pile on top of each other in sweaty ecstasy.

I want to repeat that, because it gets to the heart of why (soccer is boring): Two times every 1.5 hours, somebody scores. I tell you, there is more action in synchronized swimming.

I realize a lot of people are going to say I am missing the poetry of the game, and this is a sign of a deep hole in my soul. In my defense, I remind you that I love baseball, which is arguably the most poetic game played by humankind.

I also realize I am on the tail end of a curve here. When the World Cup tournament started, polls showed six or seven Americans out of 10 did not even know it was being played in this country. Now, they say, the figures are completely reversed. With the success of the U.S. team, people are said to be pouring into sports bars to watch. ESPN is doing World Cup reports. USA Today says interest is soaring.

I concede that futbol is the universal game. More than 140 countries, I read somewhere, have national teams. During the World Cup, global commerce screeches to a halt while people watch. In Thailand, they get up at 2 a.m. to see this stuff. In Bangladesh, prisoners threatened a hunger strike if they were denied television privileges during World Cup matches. By the time this extravaganza ends in mid-July, said somebody who is paid to keep track of these things, the aggregate television audience for all matches will be 32 billion.

I'm at odds with billions of people! Curmudgeon's Heaven!

I jest, of course. I know I'm going to get many angry letters for writing these things, and that stings the hide of even the most toughened crank. Still, I cannot help myself. I played the game in sandlot leagues as a kid and even earned three high school letters in the sport, but I still believe (soccer is boring).

And that sums up the problem perfectly. (Soccer is boring) but the scoring is soaring fun. If somebody started a Soccer Channel on cable, I'd be the last to sign up. If they started a Soccer Highlights Channel, I'd consider it.

# Securities regulators warn Rules of computer line robbers

MONTPELIER, Vt. — Say you're cruising the information superhighway from the comfort of your home computer and come across what appears to be private, inside information on a hot new company.

You spend \$10,000 on stock — and lose your money.

You've just become a victim of what securities regulators say is the latest trend in investment scams: frauds perpetrated over computer networks or bulletin board services by hard-to-track hackers.

Call it l-way robbery. Regulators in Vermont and several other states have issued warnings due to the growing number of scams perpetrated via connected computer networks, called the Internet, and the booming computer bulletin board services.

The scams have just begun to spring up in the past year or two as on-line computer services have become more popular.

People worldwide use these services and the Internet to conduct conversations via their personal computers, and many conversations are available for all to read. Con artists often stage "private" conversations that they intend to be read by others.

"We are just now starting to get complaints, and a growing number of states are in the first stages of focusing on this latest variation on the

lending theme of investment fraud and abuse," said Craig Coetsch, Iowa's superintendent of securities and the president of the North American Securities Administrators Association.

Some recent scams: — Missouri regulators say a stockbroker not licensed to do business in that state marketed dubious stock deals, implying in one case that Donald Trump was a major, behind-the-scenes player in a tiny cruise line. The firm that employed the broker said he advertised the deals from his home computer.

— The New Jersey Bureau of Securities filed a cease-and-desist order against an electronic mail chain letter promoted by a San Antonio, Texas, man and other people around the country. The letter asked for \$5 in return for information about investment opportunities.

— The Texas State Securities Board was investigating a case in which a retiree sent \$10,000 to an out-of-state man who promoted himself on a major bulletin board service as a skilled money manager. The mutual fund he touted didn't exist and he apparently pocketed the money.

— Investigators reported two "pump-and-dump" schemes in which Canadian companies were heavily hyped on computer bulletin board services. Their stock prices tripled or more in a short period of time, then collapsed. One of the companies was said to have won a major housing contract in the former Soviet Union; the other was said to own a diamond mine in Zaire where a major strike had been made.

# Broadcast networks select UCLA to monitor TV violence

WASHINGTON — By next year, broadcast television viewers should have more information about the violent content of shows.

The major broadcast networks selected the Center for Communications Policy at the University of California, Los Angeles, to monitor violence on television and report annually to the public.

The first report should be out 13 months from now, CBS senior vice president Martin Franks said in an interview Wednesday. Franks has organized the networks' effort, which includes CBS, NBC, ABC and Fox.

UCLA will be reviewing programs through the May "sweeps" period, he said. Critics have said stations are more likely to air programs with lots of violence during this important

ratings period.

The center also will examine programs on cable, public TV stations, films, home videos and video games to compare them to network programs.

The cable industry has its own violence monitor, Mediascope, a California-based nonprofit research group.

the liens.

"We decided that if this worked for residential liens, it would also work in the commercial or business community," Rowe explained.

"We don't have any specific areas in mind at this time," Rowe added, "but I'm sure there are some out there which might be developed if there was the hope that the lien against the property would be removed."

Regarding the job placement project for the Seminole Towne Center Mall construction work, a marketing display has already been set up at Florida Job Services, as well as at the actual construction site.

"Now we plan to put a similar display at city hall," Rowe said. The display will be placed on a window at the Recreation Department office, to the west of the city hall breezeway. "We want it so everyone will be able to read it

from the breezeway," Rowe said, "even during hours when the City Hall may not be open."

Over 1,000 jobs are expected to be available during the construction period at the new mall. "People can already go to the Florida Job Services office and fill out applications," Rowe said.

He pointed out that the jobs were, at this point, strictly for construction. "We haven't received the listings for retail store jobs yet," Rowe said, "but we will eventually be getting those, so that's another good move for the time to come."

The mall is not scheduled to be officially open until September of 1995.

In the meantime, Rowe recommends persons seeking construction jobs at the mall to stop at Florida Job Services, 500 E. Lake Mary Boulevard, in the Reflections Plaza.

The market job lists are to be posted at city hall in the very near future.

are going to see spectator oriented fireworks, arials, etc. because those are illegal unless they are put on by a licensed, insured professional. I was concerned because there might be a dichotomy of expectation with some of the people and then what would be their reaction if they get down and all they see is a bunch of sparklers? It's a problem."

In the past, thousands of spectators have gathered at the lakefront to watch the professional fireworks show. City officials do not know how many people may come to the waterfront this year, out of tradition or habit, expecting to see a show nor what their reaction will be when they find the display has been cancelled.

Simmons said although the city did not directly finance the fireworks display, it contributed indirectly by paying police officers overtime pay to direct traffic. Last year, the city paid over \$3,000 for the Fourth of July event in overtime, Simmons said.

"My concern," the city manager said, "really is from reading the article in the paper there is a high potential for a significant number of people coming down expecting something that they weren't going to see in the way of aerial fireworks (illegal fireworks). It is pretty evident illegal fireworks are available. From a public safety standpoint, we are going to be closely monitoring the fireworks people have."

City police Chief Ralph Russell said police will enforce the law by confiscating any illegal fireworks found rather than making arrests, unless individuals possessing the illegal fireworks make a scene. Then arrests will be made. Possession of illegal fireworks in Florida is a misdemeanor.

A simple way to identify illegal

see something happening. Eslinger admits that the idea of having community lookouts is nothing new. Arming them with a direct line of communication to law enforcement, however, has never been done before.

"It's exciting," he said. "We're using technology and community support to help fight crime in Seminole County."

Eslinger said the postal workers are being given a brief orientation on how to use the equipment before the phones are distributed. He noted that in addition to reporting what they see along their routes, the letter carriers might also receive a call from the sheriff's office to help be on the lookout for something.

"They are not going to be called on to apprehend a criminal," he said, "but they could be invaluable in helping us do our job."

The sheriff said if the program is as successful as he hopes it will be, he plans to expand it a little at a time.

"It's a financial consideration right now," he said.

fireworks is to remember the phrase, "If it goes up or blows up, it's illegal," according to city fire Chief Tom Hickson.

Steve Alford of the Jaycees, who had worked for three years presenting "Peoples Fireworks," gave up on the project this year when he was unable to find anyone to help him.

Prior to Alford's effort the fireworks display was sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. Simmons said in the nine years he has served as city manager, the city has not financed the fireworks display, except indirectly by providing police to ensure public safety.

Dave Farr, executive director of the chamber of commerce, said that group's sponsorship of the fireworks ended in 1989 or 1990. Farr noted the crowds drawn by the display did not benefit local businesses because spectators drove in, watched the fireworks, then drove home.

In addition, the chamber office received calls of criticism, not praise most years after the Fourth. "The day after the Fourth was one of the worst in the office," Farr said.

The Sanford fireworks paled in comparison to the extravaganza put on nightly by area attractions, especially Walt Disney World.

"Some callers would say, 'if that's the best you can do, I'm not coming back,'" Farr said.

Simmons said he made a quick check of other local governments in Seminole County and did not find any that

sponsored fireworks displays. Liability is a major concern as well as financial considerations of spending precious tax dollars on 15 minutes of fireworks while having to cut department budgets due to lack of money.

"I would have great difficulty supporting it (city financed fireworks) from extremely limited tax revenue dollars," Simmons explained. "We just went and did our budget with the city commission. I reported to them that I had to trim approximately \$3 million out of the departments budgets requests for things that I consider to be valid, simply because there is not enough money to go around. And to basically burn up \$5,000 or \$10,000 in fireworks, I don't consider to be an appropriate use of scarce tax dollars. Obviously, if the city commission said 'Do it, I'd salute and we'd go off and do it. But my recommendation would be to the contrary, until we become a lot more well-heeled than we are. Even under the best of circumstances, I don't think we could compete with the big time folks (Disney)."

"I guess I don't understand why someone would suddenly be angry because the status quo has not been preserved," Simmons commented. "The status quo doesn't get preserved for very long in anything and particularly in a high change area such as Florida. I mean very little remains the same in very few years. Certain types of change we like but some people decry any change."

Kiernin Quinn, a graduate assistant at the university, explained each of the proposed plans. Of primary consideration were three models showing present buildings and streets, with proposed new facilities displayed in darker colors.

One of the largest models had a large expansion out into Lake Monroe from approximately the northern end of Sanford Avenue. In a crescent shape, it contained streets and sidewalks. Stairways down to the waters edge were in the interior of the crescent.

At the end of the area was a double-awning, covering an outdoor amphitheater area. From the center, a tower jutted skyward, with a revolving type structure at the top commonly thought of as the ideal place for a sky-view restaurant.

Other projections in this particular model included additional docking spaces for boats, and an expansion of the present Monroe Harbour Marina area toward the east, with additional shops and stores throughout the entire area.

Away from the water, were several additional buildings. Of major consideration was a proposed convention center. On one plan, it was projected for the land immediately west of the present Sanford City Hall.

On another model, which seemed to draw more attention by committee members, the convention center was located on property immediately north of the Sanford Herald building, on the southwest corner of N. French Avenue and Seminole Boulevard.

A third plan gave consideration to the convention center being located further west near the Seminole Towne Center Mall, but that proposal did not receive much support.

Waterfront Committee Chairman Larry Strickler called for a raising of hands regarding whether or not the suggested downtown area convention center should continue to be consid-

ered on the future University of Florida planning project.

Strickler said it would be proper to determine if the convention center was foolish to consider at this time, or if it should be included in the plans, with a possibility that it might be needed in five to 15 years.

Only one man voted in favor of having it in the mall area. Ten members held up their hands to favor the downtown location.

"This isn't something which we are planning to build immediately," Strickler stressed this morning, "and we're not saying it's necessarily feasible, but it may be in the future, if the citizens want to add such a structure to the Sanford lifestyle."

In addition to the convention center, other program elements included an expansion for the current historical museum, a community art center and gallery, expansion to the county courthouse and county administration buildings, covered walkways, increased parking, and additional buildings for public use to be located on the grounds of Fort Mellon Park.

Regarding the overall models, Strickler said, "These must be considered as a broad concept. It is designed to give the committee a sense of direction and we will be going after those portions of the plans which we believe are best for everyone concerned."

The showing of the models and additional drawings yesterday is considered the conclusion of the first phase of the development. Quinn explained that the goal of yesterday's meeting was to determine which direction the committee wanted the study group to follow, as all of the plans are to be combined into one as part of the second term.

Sanford Director of Planning and Development Jay Marder, who serves on the waterfront committee, said that although the study group has allowed the models to remain in Sanford, there are presently no plans to have them placed on public display.

# Repetitive counting considered disorder

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've seen elderly patients in nursing homes count aloud, perhaps to 100, and immediately start over. I have an unconscious habit of counting when doing anything repetitive such as going up or down stairs, peeling carrots, or walking for health. This leads me to wonder if I might do the same if I become senile. Do you have information on this malady?

DEAR READER: Repetitive counting, at any age, is often a sign of obsessive behavior that, in its full-blown form, is called obsessive-compulsive disorder. In the elderly, we tend to blame this on just plain old age. In the young, it may merely be a habit, a method of dealing with basically uninteresting activities, or an indication of behavior that may need medical attention, if it interferes with normal activities.

I don't believe that your counting will necessarily haunt you as you age; and since it is harmless behavior, you can disregard it. DEAR DR. GOTT: What is the difference between a CT scan and an MRI? I've heard that an MRI can be upsetting to people who might suffer from claustrophobia.

DEAR READER: A computed tomography (CT) scan is a type of X-ray examination used to view structures within the body. It gives better definition and shows more detail than standard X-ray tests. Magnetic resonance imaging (MRI), on the other hand, is not an X-ray test, although it produces pictures on X-ray film. In many instances, MRI gives astoundingly detailed pictures of internal structures, of higher quality than those obtained by CT scanning. Also, because MRI doesn't require X-rays -- it utilizes electromagnetic energy

Instead -- it is safer than CT. Unfortunately, MRI scanning is noisy, a quality that upsets many patients. In addition, the gantry of the MRI machine is quite narrow and confining, which bothers some people who are uncomfortable in closed spaces. However, in most cases, these attributes do not prevent

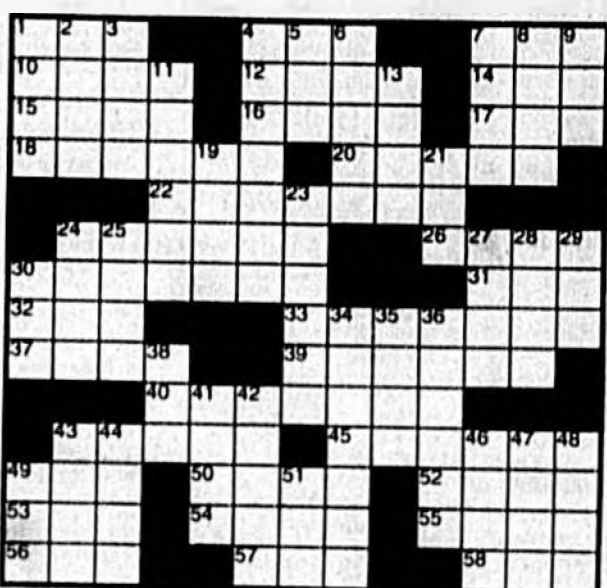
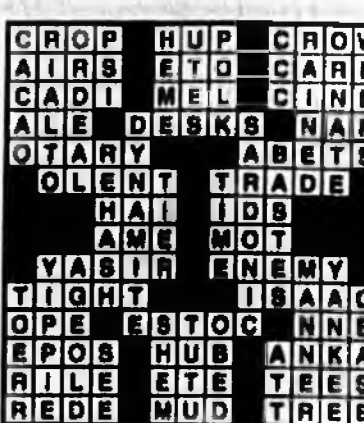

## WIN AT BRIDGE

By Phillip Alder

It is probably true to say that most players don't double enough. How often do the opponents go two or more down undoubled against you? It happened twice against me last night. Once I was "right" not to double, but the other time I was chicken. (That's my euphemism for stupid.)

Many players double when they shouldn't, telling declarer how to make a contract that probably would have died "unaided." Today's deal is a classic example.

North's two diamonds was a Michaels Cue-Bid, showing a major two-suiter. With West bidding as high as five clubs, East wasn't willing to pass over six hearts, or to sacrifice in seven diamonds. Without East's double, South

might have found the right line; with the double, it was easy. West led a top diamond and switched to the club queen.

East had to be 4-4 in the majors, so, after winning trick two with dummy's club ace, declarer immediately played a heart to his 10. As he was going to have to ruff a spade in hand to establish the suit, South couldn't afford to start with dummy's heart ace.

After West, as expected, discarded, declarer played a spade to dummy's queen, a heart to his nine and a spade to dummy's king. West discarding again, South cashed dummy's spade ace, ruffed a spade in hand, took the heart king, ruffed a diamond to get into the dummy, drew East's last trump and claimed. His 12 tricks were four spades, five hearts, two clubs and one spade ruff in hand.

Before West could criticize the double, East asked, "Why didn't you lead a club, partner?"
