

# Sanford Cagers Blitzkrieg New Smyrna, 47-37; 38-15

## Surging Seminoles Make Third Twin-Killing In Short Eight-Day Period

Borrowing a page from the Prussian war machine's blitzkrieg tactics, the newly found Seminoles High School basketball juggernaut struck with irresistible force for the third time in eight days at New Smyrna Beach varsity, 47-37, and the 'Cuda JV's, 38-15.

The revolutionary training tactics combined with the frenzied victory spirit, instilled by new Coach John Scott, began to show effect as one of the finest cage machines to represent SHS in over a decade flattened New Smyrna.

It was the Ovidians fourth straight cage win and fourth CFC victory in as many games. Coach Paul Mikler's charges now lead the CFC and hold Seminole County's leading varsity cage record, too, with five wins and only two losses.

Meanwhile, Ovidio's cunning one-handed shooting artist, Johnny Jones, elevated his season's scoring record to 121 points in seven contests for a scoring 17.3 average per game, which likewise leads all county scorers. In fact, Jones is still the only Seminole County player to top the century point mark this year.

With an unblemished 4-0 CFC record this year, the Ovidians will entertain Titusville at the high school community gym tomorrow night in another conference tussle.

In last Friday's fracas, headlined as the Mikler mass, Ovidio showed highly esteemed Umatilla five how the present day game of basketball is played by rolling up 9-5 and 24-13 leads in the first half.

The final two quarters developed into a see-saw struggle on the court for the possession of the ball with each team scoring only 10 more markers, each, before the final buzzer sounded.

Jones' timely fast break lay-ups, deft one-handers and aggressive ball handling proved to be the undoing of Umatilla as the youthful Ovidio star accounted for more than half of his team's points.

Ralph Caldwell, playing the center pivot, tallied 13 times to lead the impotent Umatilla quintet.

## Convicts Defy Ultimatum of Prison Heads

### Spurn Demand To Surrender And Refuse To Release Guards Held As Hostages

BELLEFONTAINE, Pa., (AP)—Shouting defiance, some 325 rebellious convicts again spurned surrender ultimatum today in their barricaded block at the Rockview State Penitentiary and refused to release six guards held as hostages until their "grievances" are honored.

It was the third day of their surprise insurrection. Last night, 100 convicts and 100 guards were held in a demand by Gov. John S. Fine who warned that additional jail sentences would be given to every man who continues to defy authority.

The newest rejection of the state's efforts to bring peace to the prison came in a yelling exchange between Deputy Atty. Gen. Edward Friedman, standing on the ground outside Cellblock "A" and the convicts who were held out in barred windows 50 feet above.

Friedman sought to negotiate a surrender of the convict rebels who launched the rioting Monday night. During the course of the rioting hundreds of mattresses have been burned, and plumbing and other fixtures have been ripped off walls and thrown out cell windows.

Friedman said the convicts must first release the hostages and throw out seven guns before a settlement would be discussed.

At the same time, the first direct word came from the hostages who have been held in the barred Cellblock "A" since the riot broke out. By permission of the convicts, Melvin Williams, one of the guards, came to a window and said:

"I'll tell them (the families) we are well treated. We are okay. No one has forced me to say anything. Come to a decision and give these men a fair hearing."

Friedman told the prisoners: "You have a chance now for a complete hearing of your grievances. Release those guards and throw out the guns."

"How about our 12 demands," one shouted back, referring to the convicts' complaints, among them: "about prison food and the \$10 parole system."

Friedman said he couldn't go into that now.

"If you have no authority to answer questions, you have no authority to make a settlement," one of the convicts replied.

## Nearly \$20,000 In Excess Fees Paid To County

### Surplus Of \$8,164 Is Reported By Clerk; \$5,500 By Assessor

A total of \$19,665.28 in excess fees was paid the County by the County officers as a result of a hearing conducted last year, according to reports filed with the County Commission yesterday.

The highest surplus was collected by the office of O.P. Herndon, Clerk of the Circuit Court, which was \$8,164.11, the amount remaining after total expenses and allowed compensation were subtracted from the gross income of \$30,569.73.

Total expenses amounted to \$11,405.62, including salaries of employees of the office while the compensation allowed Mr. Herndon by law was \$7,500.

The second highest surplus, \$3,627.38, was collected by the office of S. F. Douney, County Assessor of Taxes. Receipts were as follows: State of Florida, \$719.86; Seminole County, \$10,014.55; Board of Health, \$8,588.09; and Central and Southern Florida Flood Control District, \$180.82, making an overall total of \$20,222.97.

Expenses of the office were as follows: Office expenses, \$387.10; salaries of deputies — Mary E. Earle, \$3,630; Louise L. Austin, \$1,800; and expense of car, \$1,254.10. Compensation allowed Mr. Douney also was \$7,500.

The office of Douglas Stenstrom, County Judge was next in surplus, \$2,527.38. His expenses were as follows: Probate, \$2,321.46; certified copies, \$553.10; driver's licenses, \$2,876.80; hunting and fishing licenses, \$1,760.25; notary public stamps, \$1,101.80; occupational licenses, \$287.25; marriage licenses, \$751.75; Kennel Club licenses, \$40.25; and birth certificates, \$14, all from individual.

## Inaugural Parade Would Have Been Baffling In Eyes Of Red Spectator

WASHINGTON (AP)—If Ivan Ivanovich, the Russian John Smith, had attended President Eisenhower's inauguration, what would he have seen?

Probably the most baffling show he could imagine.

The President doubtless would have finished the day with low marks from Ivan for political ideology. Of the parade, he might say: "It was all frills and few guns."

Ivan, the average Russian, is used to thunderous military demonstrations in Moscow's Red Square. He is familiar with a drumfire of oratory, on state occasions, denouncing the capitalist states by name for allegedly trying to conquer the Soviets.

President Eisenhower didn't mention Russia at all. He merely gave the chance to extol the historic masses — or to denounce them constantly.

And what, Ivan might ask, is the cause for the head of a state to pray for divine guidance?

But Ivan would have more trouble understanding the choice of things to put on parade.

Guns he knows, and there were guns from the rifles of marching men to the 80-ton cannon designed to fire atomic shells.

Yet the guns themselves were a subordinate part of the long day. Ivan is used to miles of rumbling cannon and column after column of tanks.

Ivan might have found it difficult to understand why the cheering crowds fell silent, instead of cheering louder, when columns of men in combat green marched by and brought a touch of Korea to Washington.

Ivan knows nothing like the colorful abandon of the high school and college students who almost stole the parade with their bright uniforms, high-stepping majorettes and bougie music.

The children, Ivan might say, were getting too much attention for themselves instead of what they may offer the state. Who can say the state benefiting from a girl throwing a baton?

And Ivan surely would ask: "Where were the labor battalions?" or where were the heroic workers singled out for high productivity? Or the drilling presents from collective farms?

If Ivan had been in Washington he would have seen the heart of America walking down Pennsylvania Avenue.

Too had Ivan had to stay home.
