It concerns Agnes Govett, a good-looking woman with sea-blue eyes, a curly pompadour and a British accent. Miss Govett, child of an English-Australian marriage, spent her childhood in Australia, went to school in Europe and visited in South America.

So they decided to produce some Christmas cards themselves, chiefly for their own amusement. They offered a class of teen-age art students, taught by one of their friends, ten dollars for any designs which pleased them, bought a sizable portion of the result and headed toward the printer.

and meditation, they began to argue about what they would tell the printer their "firm name" was.

As they reached the door, somebody said "Let's take the first syllable of each of our names—Frances, Vera and Essie. We'll call it 'Fravessi.'" (Miss Govett says for some reason she was nicknamed Essie). The three sold the Christmas cards to their friends and made expenses.

Things might have stopped there had not the depression struck Miss Govett's finances in 1933-34.

"I had to earn my own living," she says. "And the only thing I could think of was those Christmas cards. So my friends and I established headquarters in a basement uptown and made a second set of cards."

Like the other it specialized in modern designs—child angels hanging Christmas wreaths, bright-clad peasants selling Christmas trees, etc. When the line was ready to sell, the three, dressed in their best, took the cards and went to call on the proprietor of a Madison Ave. shop. She was so struck by this unorthodox method of salesmanship that she asked them to stay to tea and, incidentally, placed a big order for cards.

After that, household responsibilities claimed the friends, but Miss Govett, spurred by necessity, went on. In time she joined forces with Mrs. Robert Lamont, an artist producer of Christmas cards. The firm name became Fravessi-Lamont and the business prospered.

Today, Miss Govett, as its president, runs it alone. In private life she is the wife of R. A. Bingham-Spencer, investment counsel. "Since that beginning in 1933 we have moved four times," she says. "Now we own this twelve-story building and have our own printing plant. We produce seasonal cards as well as Christmas cards—about 20,000,000 a year—and have 15 salesmen covering the entire country. Our cards are designed by four women artists—Angeba, Bridget, Ferand and Thelma—and a large part of our staff is women. They all get a share of the profits."

Hints To Housewives

Most of us who want to have turkey this Christmas... If you have too small a family to cope with a whole bird buy a half one. We know how to do them beautifully now.

In buying a turkey, choose a bird which is definitely fat that means you'll get good breast and dark meat. The skin should be clear and waxy and unbruised. Buy a hen turkey if you want a small bird. Buy a tom if you want a bird 16 to 25 pounds.

To Cook a Half Turkey

Rub the cut side of the turkey with salt. Skewer the skin to the breast meat on the keel bone edge so that the skin won't shrink and the breast meat will be protected. Tie the leg just above the knuckle joint securely to the tail.

Put the half turkey into the pan, cut side down on a flat rack. Brush with melted fat and roast at 325 degrees 1 1/2 hours. Do not cover pan and do not add water.

Now make the stuffing, a cup per pound. Mound the dressing on a double thickness of waxed paper

to approximate the shape of the turkey's cavity. Now remove the turkey from the oven and place paper with dressing on the rack. Replace the half turkey over the dressing and continue roasting until the bird is done (approximately another hour and a half).

The turkey should be roasted 25 to 30 minutes per pound. Press the fleshy part of the drumstick with your fingers, protected by a cloth or paper. The turkey is done if the meat feels very soft.

For a whole or a half turkey be sure to make gravy thus:

Giblet Gravy

Cover gizzard and heart with water and season with salt, pepper, onions, cloves, bay leaf and onion. The neck may be cooked with these. Simmer 2 to 1 1/2 hours, or until the heart can be pierced easily with a fork. Add liver 10 or 20 minutes before the rest is done, depending upon the size.

Pour drippings from roasting pan into a bowl. Skim off as much fat as possible. Put 1 tablespoonfuls into a saucepan. Blend in 1 tablespoon flour thoroughly. Measure turkey juice and add enough giblet stock to make two cups. Add to flour mixture and stir constantly until thick.

ened. Chop giblets fine and add Season with salt and pepper.

Here are a couple of sauces which will go well with a half turkey or a whole one.

Cranberry-Orange Relish 4 cups fresh cranberries 2 oranges 2 cups sugar

Put cranberries through food chopper. Quarter whole oranges, remove seeds and put through chopper. Add sugar and mix well. Chill in refrigerator a few hours before serving. Makes a quart of relish. Will keep well in refrigerator for several weeks.

Two raw apples and a lemon may be added to this recipe.

Merry Christmas!

It begins to look as if the Senate would have to throw Bilbo out to save its own self-respect.

There have been fewer strikes during Christmas season than at any other time this year. "Peace on earth, good will toward men."

Senator Pepper told a Marianna audience the other day he hopes the maximum Republican Congress will protect the gains of the American farmer. One thing the Congress could do to help the farmer would be to reduce his taxes.

The increasing number of fires and accidents should serve as a warning to everyone to be more careful. They should not only make us more careful about our own actions, but also more alert to the unpredictable actions of other careless people.

The Christmas Tree Of Good Saint Florentin

Deep in the forest of Haslach in Alsace stood a tiny house built of earth and logs. In this hermitage lived a saintly man named Florentin. All the creatures of the forest knew that in the little house was one who would help them when they were hurt or in trouble. When a deer was wounded by a hunter's arrow, it was Saint Florentin who dressed the wound. When a squirrel leaping from tree to tree fell and broke its paw, it was Saint Florentin who placed the broken paw in splints. All day long the animals came to the good saint with their troubles, even the bears, the wolves, and the foxes were his friends.

Not only the animals but the children of the forest loved Saint Florentin. Lisel and Yerri, children of a woodcutter, often came to visit him. When they came Saint Florentin always had a gift for them; it might be an animal he had carved from wood, some apples or nuts, or cakes that he made with honey and flour.

Life was very pleasant in the forest of Haslach. The seasons came and went. Winter drew near. Christmas was coming and Saint Florentin was worried and disturbed. He wished to make this celebration of the birthday of Jesus a beautiful one for his little friends Lisel and Yerri, yet he could think of nothing that he might do. There were no toyshops in the neighboring towns and even if there had been the snow was so deep that he could not have reached them. Besides Saint Florentin had no money. Stronger and stronger grew his wish to celebrate Christmas; the thought of it was always with him. One beautiful morning when the sun shone on the snow and made the frost sparkle, the good saint came out of his hermitage. He had not gone far when he saw a wonderful thing; a straight slender little fir tree all covered with snow and hung with icicles. Labor Legislative Pendulum Seen As Swinging To Right In Congress

By ASSOCIATED PRESS Restrictions of some kind on trade unions will obviously be enacted at the forthcoming session of Congress. The President himself is expected to ask for restrictive legislation, the President who vetoed the Case bill of 1946 as too drastic.

His own proposal for authority to draft strikers into the Army seemed drastic enough, but, after all, this was to apply only in industries taken over by the Government and was to expire six months after the official end of the war. Earlier, in December, 1945, President Truman had asked legislation merely for fact-finding boards and for a compulsory cooling-off period in major industrial disputes.

Thus the labor legislative pendulum swings further to the right. That right-swing began in the United States in 1943 with the enactment over President Roosevelt's veto of the Smith-Connolly anti-strike bill. The preceding swing had been all to the left since the days when unions had had to fight for their very right of existence.

Until early in the 20th century, workers who united into unions faced punishment for conspiracy, with American courts wont to follow the British common law in that respect. Away back in 1549, a statute of Edward VI had forbidden all combinations of artisans, and this was strengthened in the 18th century by acts of Parliament forbidding combinations in specific trades. In 1799 and 1800 new acts had the effect of outlawing workers' associations that might have radical political tendencies.

The first real trade union in the United States was organized in 1792 by shoemakers in Philadelphia, only to die out very quickly. In 1794 the Journeymen Cordwainers organized another union which lasted for a dozen years; it was killed off by conviction for conspiracy to raise wages and to injure employers.

By this time the typographers also had organized here and there. In 1832 Great Britain had recognized in law the actual right of workers to organize, at least for limited objectives, and American courts had begun to question the common-law doctrine of conspiracy as applied to trade unions. In 1842 came the decision in Commonwealth versus Hunt. In this famous decision the highest court of Massachusetts ruled that to be unlawful a conspiracy had to have unlawful aims or to use unlawful means. The activities of a union could not be inhibited if it did not use coercion, duress, force, or fraud. Even a closed shop was not PER SE illegal.

By the 1860's the courts were holding that strikes were legal if intended to advance the self-interest of the workers, illegal if intended to injure the employer. Then came the doctrine that all employers had the right to free



access to the labor market, a right that must not be interfered with artificially after the Sherman Anti-trust law was enacted in 1890. Union leaders at this time actually favored federal incorporation, so as to give unions legal standing. In the Clayton Act of 1914 Congress was supposed to have all but forbidden injunctions in labor disputes, and to have exempted unions from the anti-trust laws, but the Supreme Court decision of 1921 in the Duplex Printing case left little of the Clayton Act. In 1932 came the Norris-LaGuardia Act practically outlawing Labor injunctions in fed-

eral courts, also "yellow-dog" contracts. Section 7(a) of the NIRA act, then the Wagner Labor Relations Act, guaranteed the rights of collective bargaining and organization, and outlawed certain acts of employers as unfair practices. That was about as far as the legislative pendulum swung pro-union. In 1943 came the Smith-Connolly anti-strike act. In 1946 the Anti-Racketeering Act of 1931 was made applicable to unions, the anti-Petrillo Bill was enacted, the House of Representatives came within five votes of overriding the veto of the Case bill. 

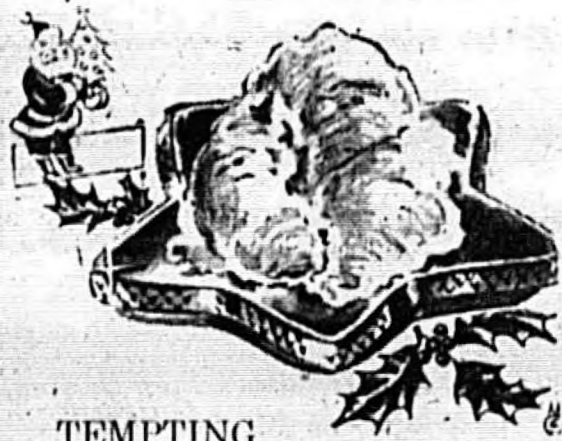

Florida Teachers Are Paid \$1,661 Annually

TALLAHASSEE, Dec. 24.—(Special)—The average salary paid to classroom teachers in the State for 1945-46 was only \$1,661 a year or \$31.94 a week for 52 weeks, according to reports submitted to State Superintendent of Public Instruction Colin English by the county school superintendents.

Bade county classroom teachers received the highest amount with an average salary of \$2,268 a year, or \$43.61 a week for 52 weeks and Jefferson county paid the lowest with only \$1,009 a year or an average of \$19.21 a week for a period of a year. Only 13 counties paid more than the average of \$1,661. These are: Dade, \$2,268; Palm

Beach, \$2,088; Pinellas, \$1,943; Broward, \$1,916; Duval, \$1,887; Orange, \$1,807; Hillsborough, \$1,760; Monroe, \$1,731; Sarasota, \$1,699; Charlotte, \$1,692; Hendry, \$1,680; Volusia, \$1,677; and Polk, \$1,670. The average in Seminole County (Sanford) was \$1,446.

The figures submitted include both Negro and white classroom instructors and do not include salaries paid to principals or other staff members.

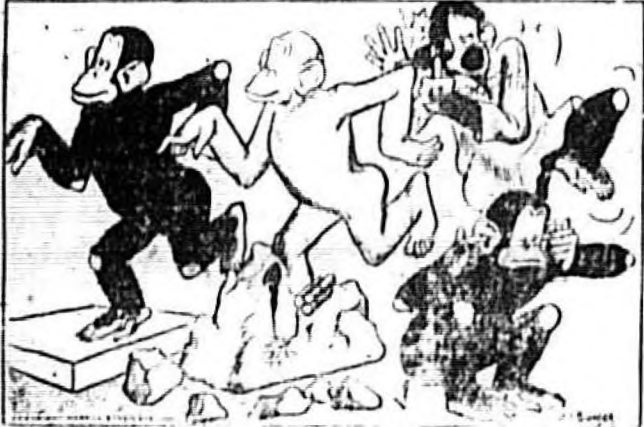

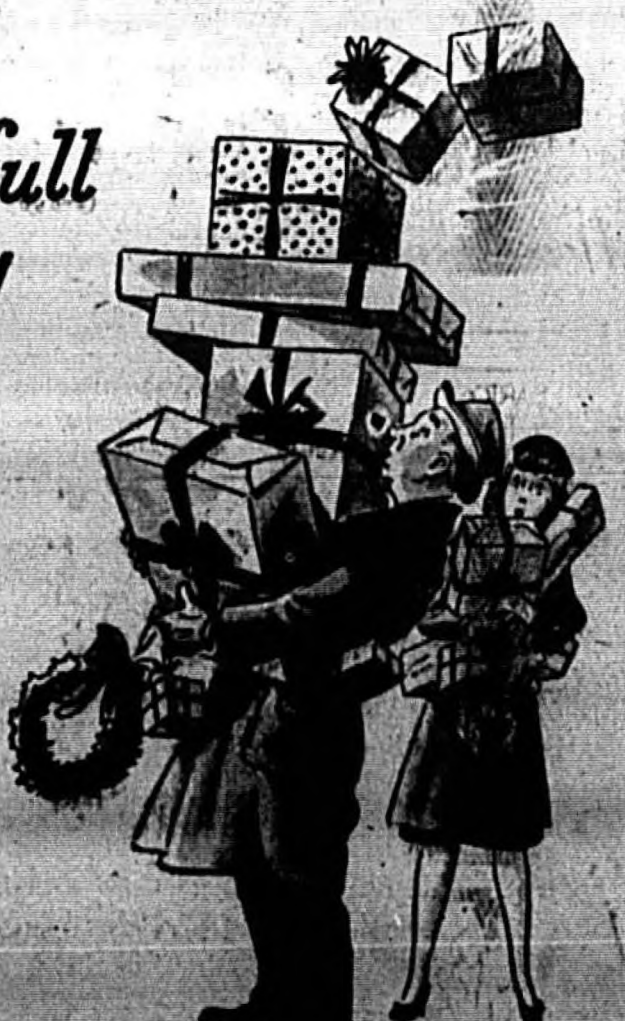
