

## FAA relocates parking at airport

Move is part of tighter security measures implemented at facilities across the nation

SANFORD — Parking at Orlando Sanford International Airport won't require a four-wheel drive, but visitors should expect to go off-road to find parking at peak hours.

Tighter security measures imposed by the Federal Aviation Administration forced airport officials to eliminate parking in the small lot some 20 yards from the terminal. Airports across the nation

are increasing security following last week's terrorist attacks in New York and Washington D.C. The airport has a large parking lot about a quarter-mile from the terminal, but a substantial increase in travelers flying out of OSI is forcing many to park in a vacant field.

"For the time being, passengers are going to be parking further in the grass," said Larry Dale, president of OSI. "During the FAA's security checks to reopen the airport, we had to move the parking away from the terminal."

Some of the parking next to the termi-

nal had already been eliminated in July to provide room for rental car space, Dale said. The remaining space was slated for short-term, paid parking, but those plans are now shelved.

Dale had hoped to receive \$1 million from the state to build a parking garage. Governor Jeb Bush vetoed that line-item in June and the airport again plans to push for state funding in next year's budget.

## Artist selected for festival

Organizers put finishing touches on Lake Mary's annual arts show

LAKE MARY — Final preparations are being made for the Lake Mary/Heathrow Festival of the Arts, but people don't have to wait to view a small portion of the 15th annual event.

This year's original painting used for the festival's publicity poster is currently on display at SunTrust Bank in Lake Mary. The artwork was created by Seminole artist Bettye Reagan.

Titled "Thelma and Louise," the pastel depicts a group of people enjoying a quiet afternoon in the Florida flora. Although a fictitious scene, the setting and characters are, in fact, a part of Reagan's life.

"The scene is from the woods behind my house," Reagan said. "The people are from old family photographs."

It has become a tradition for festival organizers to choose one piece of art each year to represent the show. According to Reagan, it is an honor to be chosen as the poster artist.

"It's always an honor and exciting to have painting chosen for a poster," she said. "It brings publicity for the show, but it also brings publicity to the artist. It looks good on a resumé."

Although "Thelma and

"Louise" is Reagan's first piece to be chosen as the poster for the Lake Mary/Heathrow festival, several of her pastels have been chosen for various other festivals, including Taste of Oviedo and the Maitland Arts Festival. She participates in at least 20 festival shows and museum exhibitions each year in the eastern United States and has had five solo gallery exhibitions. Her work is in many private and corporate collections, including permanent collections in Oviedo,

New Smyrna Beach, Sanford and Winter Park.

Reagan said she began painting 25 years ago. Although she is not a professionally trained artist, she began her painting career by taking classes in Sanford and then at a local junior college. She has also had instruction throughout the years by various artists.

Reagan said she enjoys creating pastel portrayals of the people and street scenes of every day life. She is particu-

larly fond of capturing the expressions and body language of social interactions where each person represents a different idea, but each personality is an integral part of the overall statement.

"But, lately I've done a lot of landscapes," she said. "I do a lot of Florida scenes and historical work."

According to Festival Treasurer Kari Picou, Reagan's painting will be on display at

## Seminole inmate may have ties to terrorists

SANFORD — The terrorist attacks in New York and Washington D.C. hit closer to home this weekend when an Orlando man was placed in federal custody as a material witness to the attacks.

The man is being held in the Seminole County Jail, according to Steve Olson of the sheriff's office, but he refused to comment any further.

At least a dozen individuals have been detained from the State of Florida since the attacks, but the majority of the Federal Bureau of Investigations work has been in South Florida and the Daytona Beach area.

According to state attorney officials, the Seminole County Jail has been used as a federal holding place for quite some time mainly because there is no jail particularly associated with the federal courthouse in Orlando. The man will be held there until a Wednesday hearing before a federal magistrate at a closed hearing in Orlando.

Court records from the man's initial hearing before a federal magistrate on Sunday were sealed with only a case number, but not the man's identity.

So far the FBI's in-depth investigations have led to only two arrests nation wide, but as many as 50 individuals are suspected to be in federal custody. The FBI continues to target Florida flight schools as part of their investigation. More than half of the 19 suspected hijackers are presumed to have Florida ties.

## Students make long distance call to space

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — Students at Altamonte Springs Elementary School made a very long distance phone call Friday.

Students, parents and faculty gathered in the school's media center at 12:12 p.m. to converse with crew members on board the International Space Station. It was a conversation that took years to initiate.

Plans for Friday's hook-up with the space station began four years ago when Joe Singer of the American Radio Relay League asked teachers at Altamonte Elementary if they were interested in participating in a HAM radio program with NASA. Fifth-grade teacher Christine Scheer decided the program was a great opportunity for her stu-

dents, and it was also a good way to incorporate life in space with the science curriculum.

"With Joe's help, I filled out the application," Scheer said. "Then, I just had to wait. Each year, I told my class we might be able to do this. This year, I was actually speaking the truth."

According to Michael N. Welch, public information coordinator for the North Florida Section of The American Radio Relay League, the four-year wait wasn't unusual.

"There's a long waiting list —

## 11-year-old's crusade raises \$90,000 for police dogs

SANFORD — She's at it again. Seminole County Casselberry's 11-year-old K-9 crusader is planning her first golf tournament next month.

Since March 2000 Stacey Hillman's "Pennies to Protect Police Dogs" non-profit charity has raised \$90,000 for bullet proof vests for 120 police dogs throughout the state.

"When I got my idea, I was reading in a magazine about police dogs and their dangerous jobs," Hillman said. "I have two German Shepherds and most of them [K-9s] are shepherds. When I go out and meet the police dogs and I go home and see my dogs you realize you have to love them all because they're so friendly and loving."

Police dog vests cost about \$700 and the waiting list in



Florida is growing. Hillman's project started in Casselberry where she first helped the police department vest their two dogs.

"My goal was to get all the dogs vested. I want to get all the

## County asks state to donate land to relieve flooding

SANFORD — Residents around Celery Avenue could find relief from routine flooding if the county can arrange an agreement to take over an abandoned 60-acre plot owned by the state.

As the twin towers of the World Trade

Center toppled in Manhattan, county commissioners did conduct some business in their morning meeting Tuesday. With the terror increasing with a subsequent attack on the Pentagon, commissioners ultimately canceled their afternoon and evening meetings.

All public hearings scheduled Tuesday will be continued to the September 25

meeting. The canceled special called public hearing Wednesday on the fiscal year budget for 2001-2002 was rescheduled for Sept. 18 at 7 p.m.

Nonetheless, the national disasters didn't distract commissioners to unanimously approve a letter to request the Celery Avenue land formerly utilized by the University of Florida Institute of Food and

Agricultural Science to be transferred to the county.

"We're looking at a 10- to 15-acre storm water facility to basically help flooding along Celery Avenue and the Midway area," said Mark Flomerfelt, manager of the county's road operations and

## What made the Greatest Generation great?

In discussing the events of the last week with a group of friends, an interesting point was made: Does our generation have what it takes to keep America great? Specifically, can we be as triumphant as our grandparents, the Greatest Generation?

Some argued that America has gone soft, that Generation X lacks the discipline, courage and value system to make a difference like our grandparents did. Others said Americans will always rise to the challenge. I put myself in the latter group. I'm cynical about a great many things, but I have an unquenchable faith in the American spirit. I'm not a Polly-Anna about it. I understand we've got some difficult days ahead of us. But this country has faced difficult times before. In fact, I would argue that our country is great precisely because we've had to handle adversity.

A good example of what I'm talking about is my hometown in East Tennessee. On Dec. 7, 1941, the 30,000 plus acres of land the city of Oak Ridge now occupies was populated by a handful of farming families and a few hundred head of cattle. Less than four years later, on Aug. 6, 1945, the world learned that a secret city snuggled into the foothills of the Appalachians was the birthplace of the atomic bomb.

What always boggles my mind is not the fact that our country created the bomb, but that our grandparents built the massive infrastructure that led to the creation of the bomb. The first spade of dirt was turned in mid 1942. Thirty-six months later — less than the term of most of our car payments — a poor farming community was transformed into one of the most technologically advanced cities in the world supporting a population of more than 100,000.

I realize we face a unique situation today. I don't know what it will take to meet the challenges facing us. Point is, neither did my grandfather in his time, but he contributed his talents where they were needed. If that meant building planes or growing Victory Gardens or inventing the bomb, then he and the rest of his generation were willing to do it.

Our generation will do the same. Yes, we're greedy, self-centered, "soft." And future generations of Americans will no doubt forget the lessons we'll be learning over the next many months. We're the world's poster child for attention deficit disorder. Prosperity tends to do that to a nation.

But Americans have never lost their resolve in times of need. You see it on a regular basis — more frequently than you realize. Ask the folks in South Florida after Hurricane Andrew ripped through towns and cities like a buzz-saw. Talk the locals here in Sanford who lost loved ones or belongings in 1998 during the tornadoes and wildfires. Ask Rick Stevens and his family if the American spirit still burns. What you'll discover is neighbors near and far are always there to unite behind a common good, be it a family, a community or the nation.

I've thought about it quite a bit. My grandfather's generation wasn't the greatest ever born. A society is not born into greatness, it must be repeatedly achieved. My grandparents and their peers certainly achieved that goal. Why? Because that's what the times called for. My generation hasn't had to make that sacrifice, in large part thanks to our grandparents. Perhaps now's the time for us to prove our mettle. If it is, I have no doubt that we'll follow the example set by the Greatest Generation.

### Body Found

The body of a missing 15-year-old Winter Springs area teen was found Sunday at 10:14 a.m., in Gee Creek, in about 10 feet of water, under some debris. A member of the Volusia County Sheriff's Dive Team, which was on scene to assist, found the teen's body after doing a hand field grid search of the water.

The teen, Corey Norwood, was swimming with three friends in Gee Creek on Saturday. The creek was higher, and the current faster, since the rains from the tropical storm. The current carried the four toward some logs and other debris in the water. The four apparently were pulled under. Three of them surfaced. Corey Norwood did not.

Authorities were contacted Saturday afternoon and a search was initiated, which included fire rescue divers, a helicopter, fire and law enforcement personnel working from shore, and personnel and equipment from Seminole County Public Works. Search efforts were scaled back Saturday night as it became dark. On Sunday morning, the search resumed with the Seminole County Sheriff's Office and the Volusia County Sheriff's Office Dive Team on scene.

Even though the death appears accidental, the Seminole County Sheriff's Office Major Crimes Section is conducting the death investigation into this case as a matter of course. The teen's body was taken to the Volusia County Medical Examiner's Office for autopsy.

### Grand Theft

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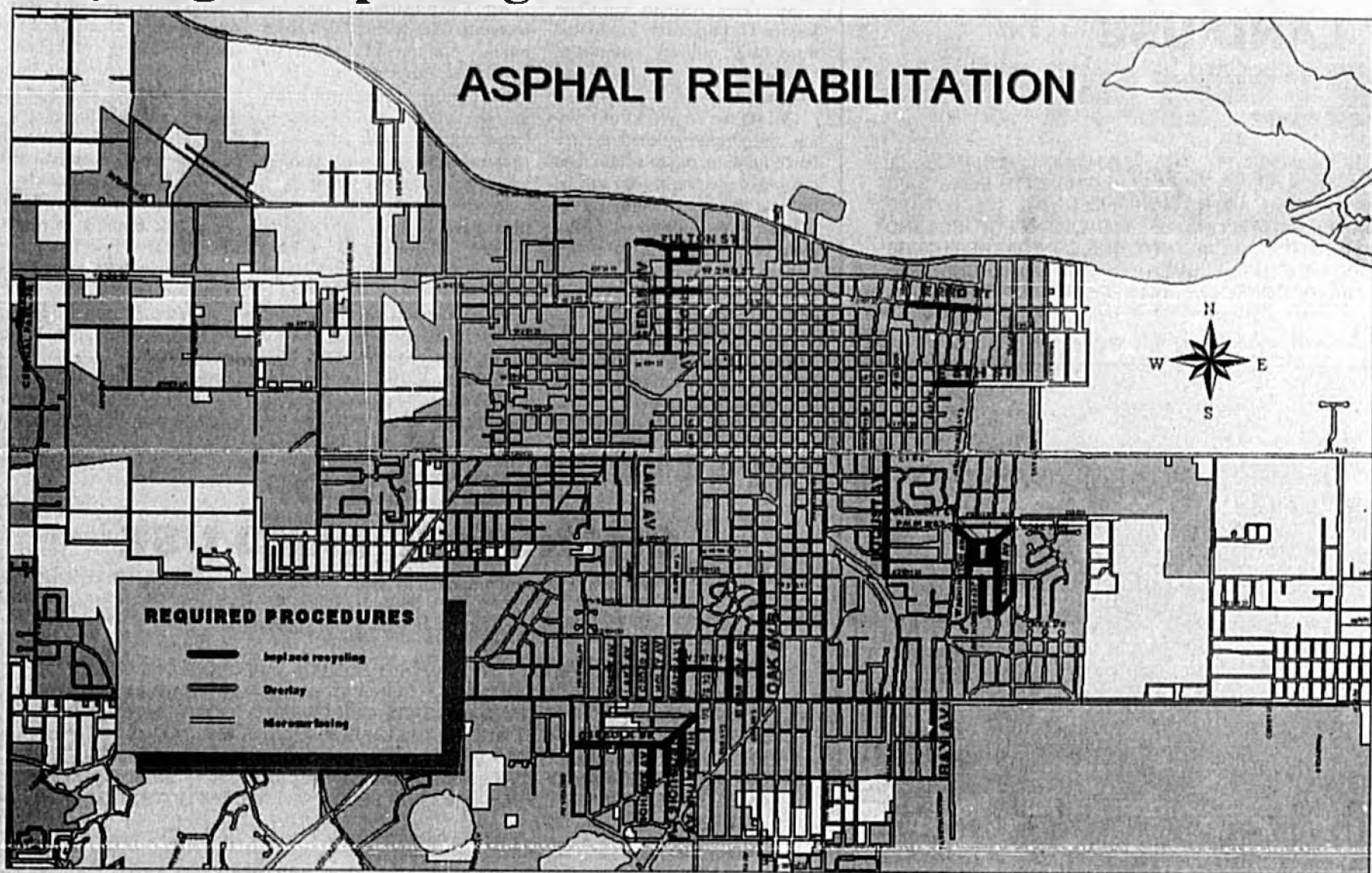

## City begins repairing roads



The Sanford Public Works Department will put a contractor to work this week performing in-place recycling on several roads throughout the city. The start date was set for Monday, Sept. 17. ## AAA offers airport tips

The cliché "Better safe than sorry" is certainly appropriate at airports, especially in light of the recent tragedy this country experienced in New York and Washington D.C. Though we all understand the need for strict security measures, many travelers may find themselves frustrated if they are not properly prepared for them.

The American Automobile Association (AAA) offers these tips to minimize hassles and frustrations related to airport security:

- Curbside check-in for passengers has been discontinued, so expect to proceed to the ticket counter immediately.
- Do not carry any sharp objects, such as a pocketknife or scissors, on your person or in your carry-on luggage that could be deemed a weapon. It is likely to be confiscated.
- Place a tag with your name and address on every piece of luggage, including carry-on bags.
- Be aware of parking restrictions. Unauthorized vehicles left unattended near a terminal could be towed.
- Arrive early. Crowded airports and increased security mean longer waits. Be at the airport two hours prior to departure for domestic flights and three hours for international.
- Carry two forms of photo identification, including at least one that was issued by a state or federal agency such as a passport or driver's license. When booking your ticket, use the exact name on that ID. Airlines will be checking the name on the ticket against the ID to ensure the person whose name is on the ticket is actually flying.

"Some people had labeled the project a 'turkey' or a 'pork barrel project'" Dale said, "but we have a serious need for parking. We've got to take care of that."

Though travelers may have to park in the grass from now, Dale noted they no longer must walk to the terminal. Regular shuttle service from the parking lot to the terminal began in August.

Dale said the airport experienced no major problems during the nationwide ban on flying last week, though as many as 15,000 international passengers were stranded until service resumed.

"We had our hands full, but our staff did an excellent job handling it," Dale said. "We also got a tremendous boost from the Sanford Police Department and the sheriff's office. The SPD added extra officers and helped us make sure there were no security problems."

"In fact, Chief Tooley has gone over and above what was needed. He and his officers have been great to work with."

The FAA cleared OSI's security procedures, including more comprehensive baggage checks.

"We can't obviously talk about all the security things we're doing," Dale said. "Suffice to say, we're going to ensure the safety of passengers coming in and out of the Sanford airport."

Some of the airline industry's biggest carriers — Delta, Continental, and United among others — expect to cut flights and lay-off employees. So far, carriers using OSI have not announced any cutbacks.

"The charter flights coming in from England have been packed," Dale said. "The tour operators have reported very few cancellations. Pan Am has been flying their full schedule since the FAA lifted the restrictions."

Dale said he does think travel will decline in the coming months, particularly during the fall which is a seasonal slowdown period. However, he doesn't expect a significant decline in OSI's passenger numbers.

"It's possible we could see a 10 to 15 percent decrease from the carriers we have right now, but you've got to remember that Vacation Express will begin flights in December," Dale said.

"They're expected to bring a 30 percent increase in passenger traffic."

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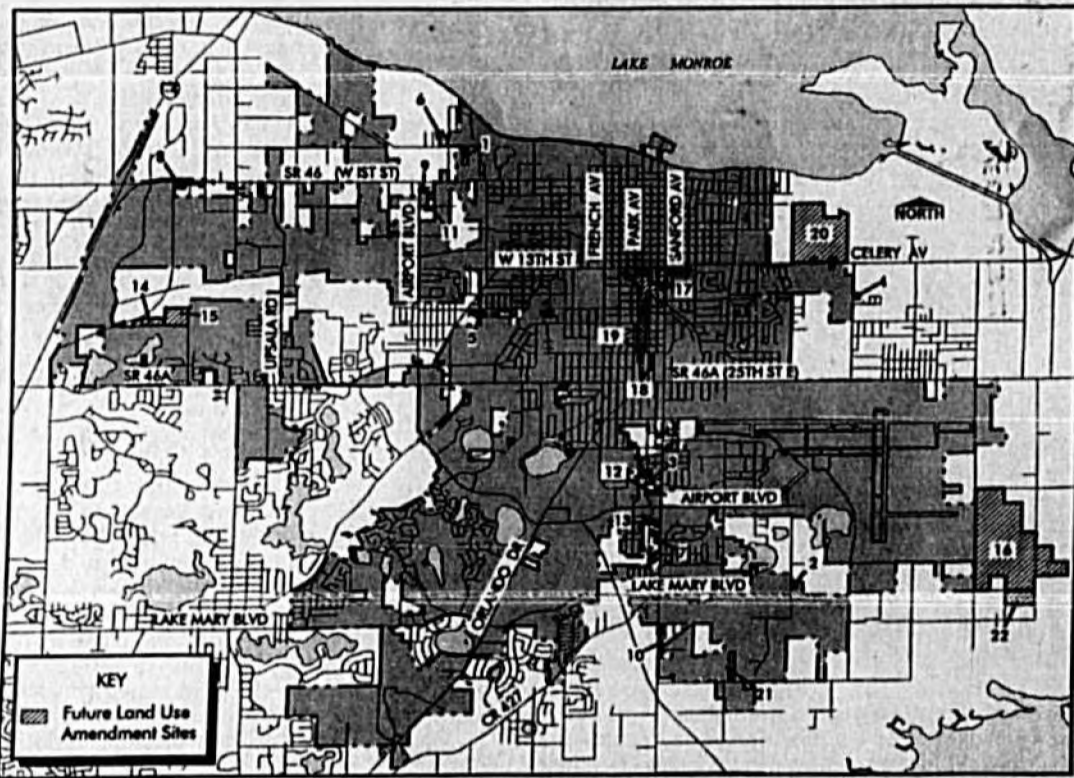

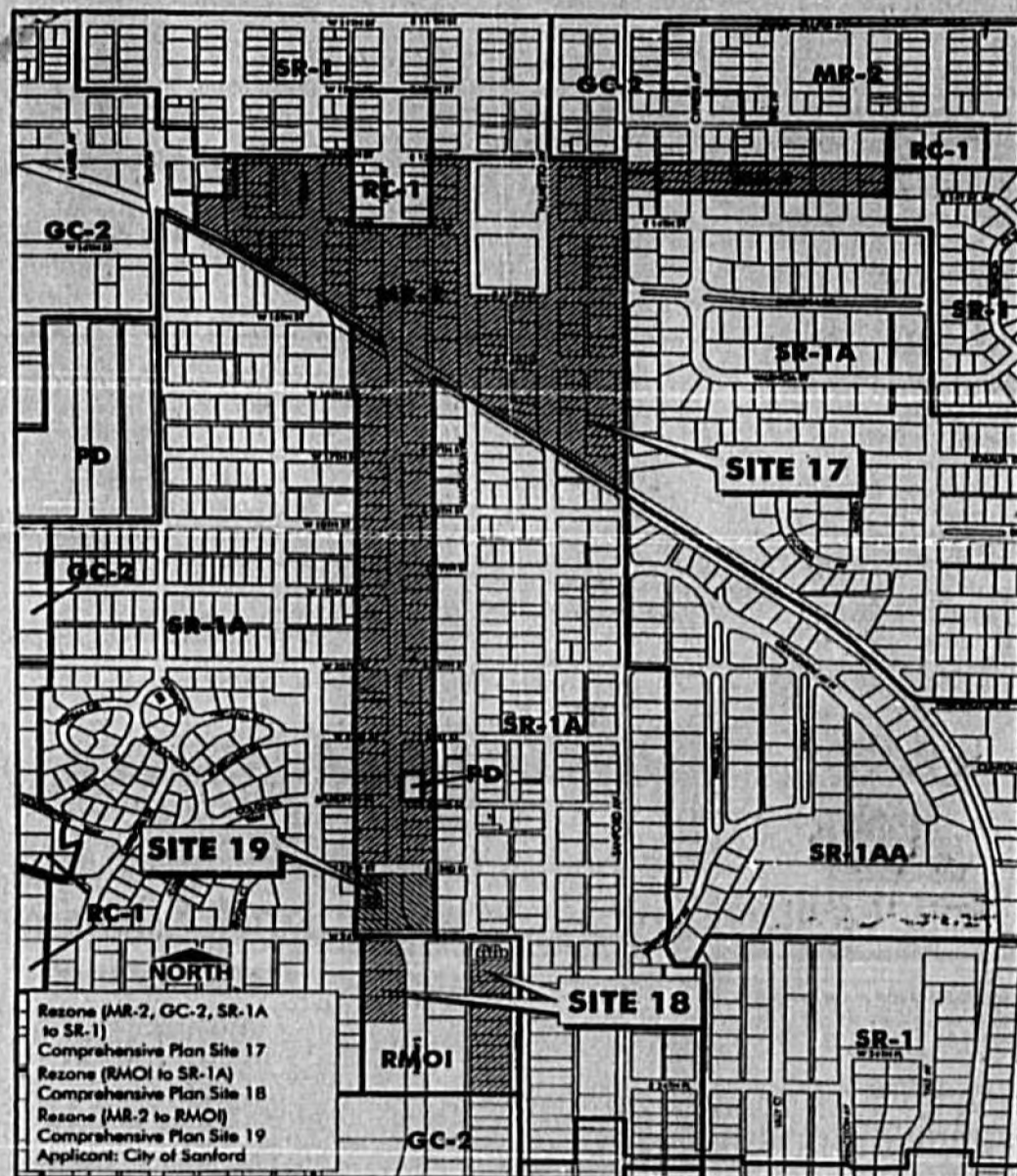

'we didn't want to bring it up for fear of making them sad'), the grieving parents feel hurt and abandoned."

Abby, this is also true when a child is placed for adoption. The decision is agonizing and the loss is profound. The mother experiences the pregnancy and birth and often bonds with her child in the limited time after birth that she has with him or her. Virtually every birth mother wants her child.

It takes courage for a woman to go through the often humiliating experience of placing her child for adoption. We mothers are not copping out or neglecting our children. We are trying to do what we think is best for our children.

I could name five families in our neighborhood who did not have the courage to do right by their children and let them go. Their children are berated and ignored and left alone to raise themselves. In the case of the more fortunate of these children, the neighbors guide the young people and show them the respect, encouragement and affection they so desperately need, and more important, deserve.

So, please, Abby, tell your readers that if they know someone who has been through the horrendous experience of los-

ing a child, whether it be through death or adoption, they should offer their sympathy. It is a loss like no other.

 averaging about three years — to have the chance to communicate with the space station," Welch said. "Then, NASA gets to choose who communicates with the station."

Once Scheer was notified this summer her application was selected, plans began for Friday's hook-up. The fifth-grade teacher went through a series of classes to become licensed as a HAM radio operator, and a date and time were determined for the communication.

"Everything has to be just right," Welch said. "It all depends on the curvature of the Earth, where the space station is and other factors."

On Friday, members of The American Radio Relay League

arrived at Allamonte Springs Elementary School with the equipment needed for the radio hook-up. Antennas were placed on top of the school, and huge battery was placed outside the school to guarantee there would be no interruption during the communication.

At exactly 12:12 p.m., when the space station was above the south-central United States, communication between students and Space Station Commander Frank Culbertson began.

Brooke Hoffman asked Culbertson how fast the space station travels. Although the commander's answer was hard to decipher through the static, the student left the microphone beaming.

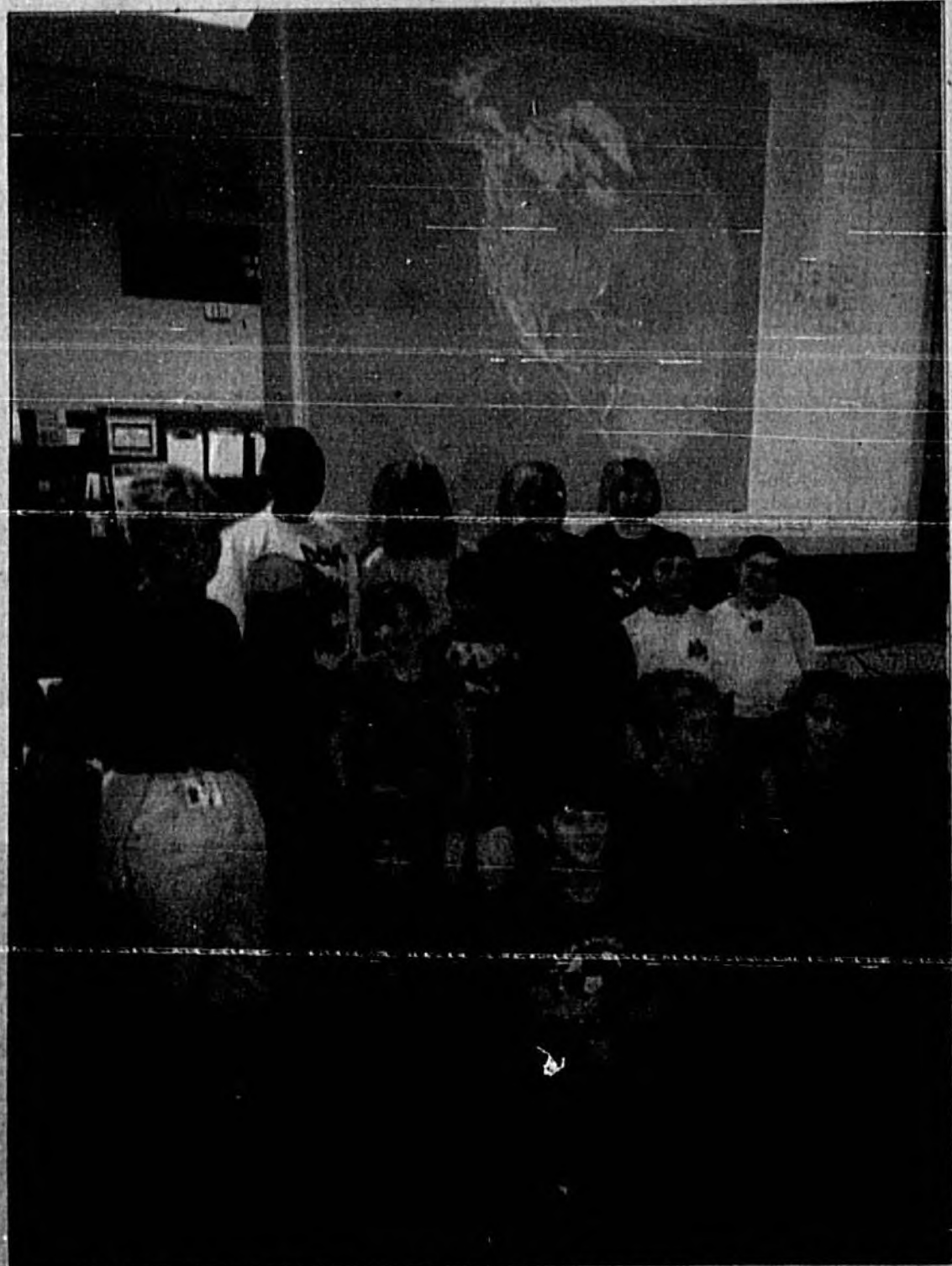
"It was so exciting to talk to the

astronaut," Hoffman said. "I loved it."

Ten minutes after first contact with the station, the school lost its reception with the facility. Nevertheless, Scheer said many of her students will never forget the short, but exciting, HAM radio conversation they had with the astronaut.

"It was nice for the students to see a different method of communication other than the telephone or the Internet," Scheer said. "Many of them might not understand right now what a great opportunity this was. But, when they get older, they will realize, 'I really got to talk to an astronaut.'"

**FDLE warns public of tragedy scams**

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement is warning citizens about scams involving "charities" allegedly collecting funds for victims of last week's terrorist attacks. Intelligence FDLE has uncovered indicates the callers are identifying themselves as a charitable organization created to provide additional monetary assistance to those affected by the disasters. The caller then asks for a credit card number.

"While we all want to help and

lend our assistance, we need to be smart about it," said Tim Moore, FDLE commissioner. "Legitimate charitable solicitors do not conduct telephone solicitations asking for credit card information."

Moore advised citizens to be wary of telephone solicitors and strongly urged people to never provide solicitors with any credit card information.

"If you choose to make a donation, make the initial contact to the charitable organization," Moore

suggested.

The big news is the opening of snook season, and Sebastian Inlet was packed. The full moon had the current ripping, but most anglers managed to catch at least one inlaid. Live bait and one-ounce jigs tipped with a plastic worm are the top offerings at Sebastian.

Bass action is dead slow in the river due to the extreme heat. Fish at night for the best action. Bream, catfish, and mullet are all hitting off the Sanford seawall, and all anglers are going home with fish.

**Captain Jack at Port Canaveral** reports that king mackerel are the most consistent offshore species. Kings can be found from just off the beach to wrecks and reefs. Slowtrolling live bait is the best tactic. A few cobia will be mixed in with the kings. Expect a few kings and tripletail in the buoy line, while sheepshead and flounder will be biting inside the Port. Trout and redfish are slow to fair in the Banana and Indian rivers.

Besides sharks, Ponce Inlet has sheepshead, drum, redfish, small bluefish, and a few flounder. Live or dead shrimp is the best bait. Sheepshead prefer fiddler crabs. Trout and redfish are rated as fair to good in Mosquito Lagoon.
