(Continued From Page One) City Commissioners will serve on the three man finance committee that will supervise expenditures, it was agreed.

An organization meeting of the new corporation will take place this week, Mr. Spencer said, and plans will be made for improving the locker rooms, installing a new water system to irrigate fairways, and making other improvements. Changes to the club house and additions are also planned. It is expected that nine holes of the course can be put in proper playing condition by Dec. 15, and the entire 18 holes made ready for play within a year.

Mayor Higgins assured the women that the clean-up work would be done as fast as possible. Acting on suggestions of the women to install outdoor fireplaces and picnic equipment in Ft. Mellon Park, the Commissioners agreed to confer with Park Supt. James Moughton to find out if labor and materials would be available for these improvements. Among those who appeared for the women's organizations were, Mrs. Julia Dingfelder, and Mrs. L.E. Spencer of the Garden Club, Mrs. H.W. Rucker, president, and Mrs. C.R. Dawson, head of the civic department of the Sanford Women's Club, and Mrs. E.B. Clements of the D.A.R.

The Commission approved the employment of Miss Sara Warren Easterby and Mrs. Nell Stripping in the City Clerk's office. Miss Easterby succeeds Miss Charlott Smith and Mrs. Stripping succeeds Mrs. Lella Clark.

A bid on magazines and periodicals for the Sanford Library was accepted.

It was agreed to install white way lights between Oak and Wright Avenues. Purchase from the Government of a Huber roller, one pulverizer and one domestic sewer pump for \$565 was approved.

On account of the high water in Lake Monroe and the fact that much of the piling is concealed under water, it was ordered that a sign be placed on the Municipal pier, warning boat owners that all boats tied there would be at their own risk.

Since no primary election will be held for the office of two city commissioners, Mayor Higgins was instructed to issue a proclamation for a general election on Dec. 4.

BIBLE VERSE FOR TODAY

BOMBS OF FANTASTIC POWER HAVE SEATTERED IM-REIGNABLE STRONGHOLDS, BUT GOD HAS NEVER BEEN MOVED. HE STILL SITS AT THE CENTER OF ALL LIFE. Psalms 46:1; God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.

The trouble about so many of these displaced war workers is that they all want to be bank presidents.

Speaking of getting the cart before the horse, we see where the Senate approved the five billion dollar tax reduction bill.

We can't see any reason for increasing the aid to the unemployed as long as the Help Wanted columns are longer than the Situation Wanted columns.

It is not enough for America to feed England by sending thousands of tons of food supplies a day "if-and-when" basis. Judging from the strike of dock workers over there, we are expected to unload their ships for them too.

Dr. Ellwood C. Nance, president of the University of Tampa, says there is too much racial prejudice in the North as well as in the South. That is something we believe, to which all of us who have lived in both sections can testify.

Down in Miami the other day the citizens voted 6 1/2 to 1 in favor of additional taxes for financing a modern sewerage disposal system. We believe they would here if the proposition were put to them in the right way and they understood by continuing to dump their sewage into neighboring lakes and streams, they are endangering their own and their children's lives.

President Truman calls for a year's military training for the nation's youth and warns against such reliance on the War Relocation Council or other non-trusts as a guarantee against future wars. At the rate young men are trying to get out of the Army, this advice will not prove too popular with the public. It is without saying, however, that the mistakes of the past should not be repeated.

After spending billions of dollars for everything else under the sun the government is finally getting around to doing something about hospitals. The Senate Education and Labor Committee has approved legislation authorizing \$275,000,000 in federal aid for construction of hospitals and health centers. If the bill finally becomes a law, it is quite possible that Seminole County may thus be able to secure some federal aid in its hospital plans.

"Price of Pollution"

Using the above heading the Star-Banner, in an article on this page, called attention the other day to the State Board of Health order condemning oysters taken from 28 peninsular producing areas because the waters have been polluted by raw and inadequately treated sewage. The health board warning has attracted attention throughout the state, particularly in coast cities close to the areas where shellfish have been polluted. The Palatka Daily News reproduced the Star-Banner's editorial, with the following comment.

"Palatka might just as well start cocking an eye toward providing adequate sewage disposal for the time is not far distant when dumping waste materials in the St. Johns will be prohibited, as indeed it should be now. Among the list of postwar projects sewage disposal should rank well toward the top, if not indeed in the initial position. So far, health authorities have not registered any violent squeak about the matter but regardless of this Palatka citizens should recognize the shortsightedness of polluting the St. Johns, one of Florida's most picturesque rivers."

Down at Fort Myers, where the News-Press which deals out sledge-hammer blows in defense of the public interest, makes no bones of the fact that something ought to be done about dumping filth into the river. Says the News-Press, in part:

"There are millions of oysters and other shellfish dying of old age each year in the lower reaches of the Caloosahatchee, because the raw sewage of Fort Myers makes them unfit for human consumption. There are dozens of old timers who swear that they wouldn't eat a fish caught out of the river below the bridge because of this same sewage."

"... For a sum perhaps one-third less than we are now spending to patch up our sewers and push the stuff farther into river, the city could build a sewage disposal plant that would free the river from pollution, lift the threat of disease, eliminate unpleasant odors, make edible some of the best oysters anywhere and, perhaps, in time pay for itself by providing local farmers with a splendid fertilizer at a reasonable price."

Hasn't the health board, in warning against using oysters from contaminated waters reeking with sewage filth, called attention to Florida's first problem, correct sewage disposal to protect the lives of our people and an industry (shellfish) which would add immeasurably to the wealth of our state?—Ocala Star-Banner.

Allied Disagreements

In 1815, when Napoleon had been defeated and sent to Elba for perpetual confinement, the victorious Allies proceeded to divide Europe. Soon their interests varied so widely that the alliance was on the verge of breaking up.

Then came the news that Napoleon had escaped and regained his throne. Immediately the broken ranks closed up again, and the renewed alliance defeated Napoleon, this time permanently, at Waterloo.

The differences between the three great powers at London may seem discouragingly great, but the threat of the revival of German and Japanese power would at once abolish all disagreements.

Again in 1919 it took six months to construct the Treaty of Versailles. This did not attempt to settle the peace problems of Austria, Bulgaria and Turkey. Separate treaties were required for these countries, taking many more months.

Viewed in the light of these precedents, the present Allied disagreements need not be too discouraging.

TOO LATE TO CLASSIFY

Death, last week, robbed Florida of a great man and valued citizen, who for years has lived quietly, and modestly at his home in Winter Park, rounding out a full life of amazing achievement. Little known to Floridians, Dr. Brown Landone contributed much to the state's advancement and up to the hour of his death, at the age of 97, he was as active mentally and physically as a man of half his years.

I first met this remarkable man about ten years ago when I visited him seeking information concerning his experiments with Ramié and other tropical plants that offered commercial possibilities for Florida.

Since then, I came to know the man intimately, have visited with him at his home frequently and, on a number of occasions journeyed with him on trips about the state in search of data and information having to do with his work and interests.

Scientist, Doctor of Medicine, Minister of the Gospel, Educator, Lecturer, Author, and Publisher are all titles Brown Landone could justly claim, and what more could point to remarkable achievement in all of them.

Brown Landone was born of English-American parents aboard an American ship enroute from England to the United States on March 6, 1847. He was an American citizen.

He received his early education



of minds of great thinkers of the times, such as Flammarion of Paris.

In his young manhood he was ordained in the High Episcopal Church of England. Keenly interested in medicine, he felt he could be of greater service to mankind in this field. He received his medical degree in England and his work centered around neurology and he was one of the first men to do work in the localization of brain centers.

Turning from medicine to broader fields, he became interested in social welfare and education. In 1895 he organized the first boys work in the YMCA. In 1905 he was head of a group of 100 educators, representing 17 nations and formed an International Committee on Education. In 1911 he and others tried to form a United States of Europe, but this effort was stifled with the outbreak of the first World War. In 1912 and 1913 he lectured at Oxford and the Sorbonne. The same years he made an economic and financial survey of the German Empire and warned the world by public statements in both London and Paris that war would occur within six months. He was hissed and booed, but war came in four months.

In 1914 he was appointed Director General of the Institute of the Sciences of the Arts in France. At the outbreak of the war, assisted by Major-General Leonard Wood, he wrote "Awake U.S.A." and by permission of the late Theodore Roosevelt, translated into French portions of "The World War." In 1915, by appointment of Raymond Poincaré, president of France, he was made Envoyé Spécial to the United States.

One of the first students of Human Relations and Employer-Employee relations, Dr. Landone was engaged as consultant by the Ford Motor Company, U. S. Steel and Metropolitan Life Insurance Companies.

In peace work during the first World War, he initiated a movement that reached 90,000,000 mothers with messages from the President of the United States, all within 24 hours. This was a rare accomplishment of these days, due to lack of communication.

From 1918 to 1930 much of his time was given to writing. In 1923 his seven volume work "The History of Civilization" was first published. Dr. Landone was editor in chief of this work, which required many years of relentless research.

He is author of over 100 books on a variety of subjects, most of which are now distributed world wide through the Landone Foundation of Winter Park. During the past three months of his life, Dr. Landone completed the manuscripts of five new books and books. These were entitled "Adventuring Freedom," "Four Means for Permanent Peace," "Our Last Chance," "Do Four Things Now," and "The Prospects of Hamis Today."

Dr. Landone edited a weekly column in the Winter Park Herald until the time of his death. He was a member of the Florida Press Association and National Editorial Association.

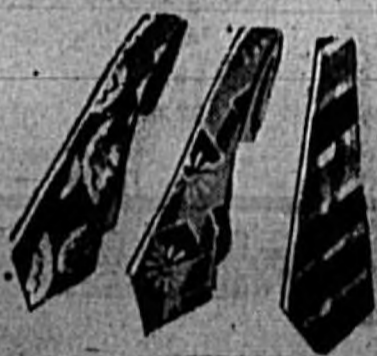

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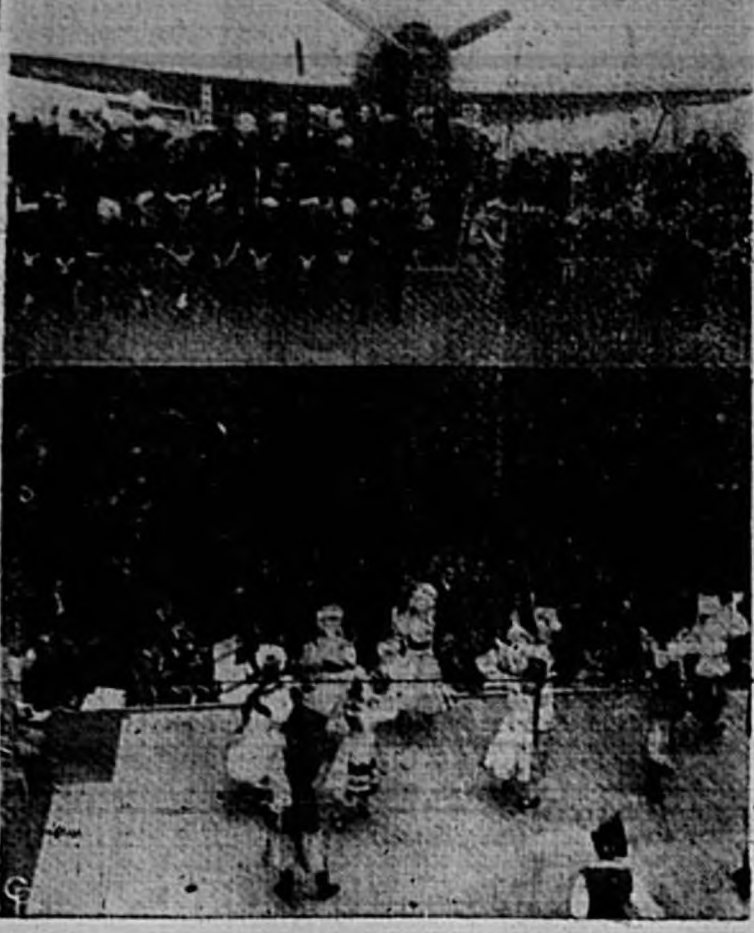

Air Stewardesses Jap Officials Taking Courses Are Seen Slow To Obey Orders

By JACK B. MACKAY
New features
St. Paul, Minn.—Young women who intend to fly high in this postwar world are attending a new kind of finishing school. It is called a "compartments" course and is for the sole benefit of stewardesses of Northwest Airlines, a company which intends to combine cargo and efficiency in its feminine personnel. Each student must pass a thesis before graduation—a booklet in which she sets down her aims and records her daily accomplishments. Here is a sample extract from a typical thesis:

"In building a career, the development of personality is something to be planned—a personality which will not only be successful but also one which she possesses a good personality, and it is her greatest asset."

"There is a physical fitness program, in which the stewardess is taught how to reconduct herself in a graceful and balanced; to walk lightly; to sit without sprawling. Exercise isn't intended to develop bulging muscles, explains instructor Zell McConnell, an expert on the handling and developing of career girls. Its purpose, she says, is to provide flexible figures, weight control, symmetrical lines, grace, firmness of muscles, perfect proportions. She adds:

"For good posture, one must think tall, walk tall and stretch tall. There is a lot more to this physical fitness, from the 'tonic' and 'foot arch' designed to correct foot troubles, to the 'neck nip' to strengthen muscles of the neck, shoulder and throat. Keep smiling—that's one of the injunctions, for a smile isn't just a dimple and a gleam of teeth; it's the reflection of a contented attitude."

"If you can't smile," writes the student, a bit waggishly, in her booklet, "try to imitate somebody who can."

The secrets of makeup, first studying the contour of their faces in order to bring out lights and shadows. They are given formulas for cosmetics.

They are taught how to keep their hair in condition; to pick their wardrobes; to buy jewelry; to budget their earning expenditure of available funds.

"Make yourself believe that your living depends upon perfect grooming," they are told. The course goes further as it seeks to make stewardesses for one of the most exacting responsibilities of her calling—that of meeting the public.

That's a rather large order, since a stewardess on Northwest Airlines, transcontinental system may be called upon to meet the easterner from New York and the Atlantean seacoast, the breezy westerner from the dude ranches and the real ranches of Montana; the dairy farmer of Minnesota; the miner from Idaho; or the fruit-grower and suburban of Washington and Oregon.

Here's where poise comes in for a good deal of attention. The stewardess, of course, must talk with these passengers during the course of flight; so perfect diction is deemed essential. As a basis for this, she goes through a thorough analysis of the alphabet, in which she learns what position of the lips and what muscular effort produce the clearest enunciation of each letter.

Stewardesses, explains Miss Stein, are highly qualified even before they come to Northwest Airlines—most of them are college graduates and have held important positions in other fields. But she insists that they take this course so they may achieve the ultimate. For Miss Stein, who is partial to her stewardesses, put it this way:

"The stewardess is one of the airline's best advertisements." Most of the classes are held at the Minneapolis-St. Paul airport, Wold Chamberlain field. But recently Miss McConnell took her pupils to her own estate on the St. Croix river near Osceola, Wis., where they "rehearsed" some of their exercises.

Dewey Asserts Women's Equal Right To Jobs

Talks To 1st Meet Of Women's Council; Hits Artificial Bars

ALBANY, Oct. 25, (AP)—Governor Thomas E. Dewey, speaking here this week at the first luncheon conference of the newly organized New York State Women's Council, said that "artificial bars" against employment of women are not to have any place in New York State's future.

Observing that "we have made amazing progress in recent years in breaking down the old bars of prejudice against the employment of women, just as we have in the professions and in other self-employed occupations," Mr. Dewey pointed out that in 1943, the number of employed women in New York State was almost 2,000,000.

Cites Women's Contribution "The startling thing," he said, "is that women's conspicuous contribution was in the fields where no one had believed it possible before—in the manufacture of electric machinery, scientific instruments and ordnance."

"Perhaps there has never been a time when the talents of women will have wider scope," Mr. Dewey said. "And by no means does this mean an effort to minimize the greatest of fundamentals, those of home-making and of raising children."

"The special talents of women have a vital call in shops and service businesses which again need pioneers, patience and people with imagination. New horizons are opening: transportation, aviation, the vast developments in modern agriculture, cannot help but be enriched by women's contribution."

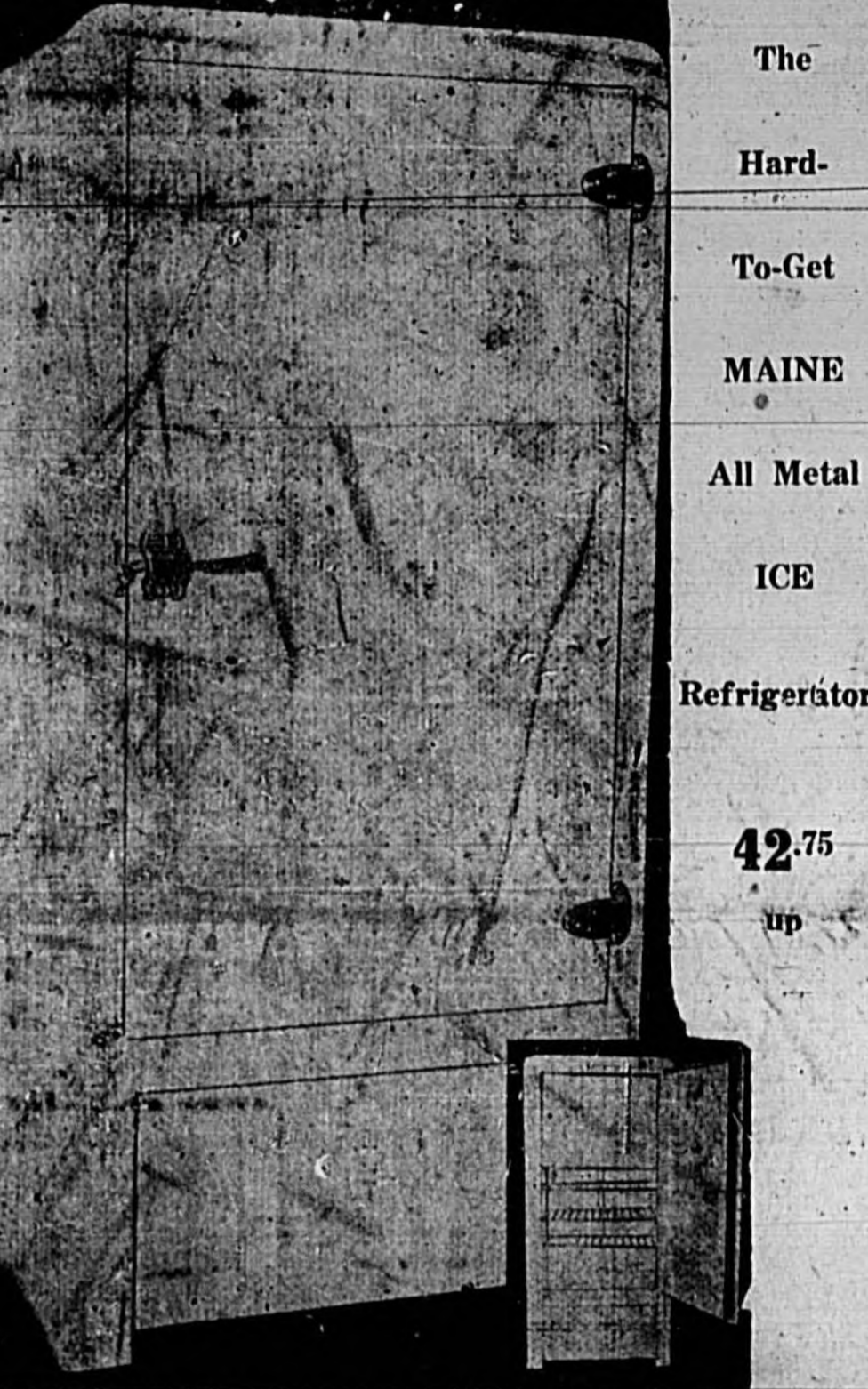

The Varga Girl To Have Day In Supreme Court

High Tribunal To Rule On Barring Esquire From U.S. Mails

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26, (AP)—The Supreme Court decided this week to give the "Varga Girl" a judicial once-over.

It agreed to rule on whether the curvaceous Miss Varga and other features of "Esquire" magazine comprise art and literature, or something else.

The Post Office Department revoked the magazine's second-class mail privileges in December, 1943, because it found that the Varga girl and some of "Esquire's" literary contents were not "information of a public character."

A United States District Court here upheld the order, but it was

overruled by the District of Columbia Court of Appeals, which admonished the Post Office Department to concentrate on carrying the mail and stop trying to compel acceptance of its literary or moral standards.

The Supreme Court agreed to review the case after the Justice Department appealed from the Appellate Court's decision.

"Esquire" contends that the Post Office order violated freedom of the press. It said it would be forced to spend an additional \$624,000 yearly if it had to ship by parcel post.

In another case, the court gave the Federal government permission to file a complaint in a suit to determine ownership of lands containing valuable oil deposits under the "marginal sea." These lands lie between the low-tide mark and the three-mile limit.

The suit, announced last week by the Justice Department, names the State of California as defendant. The court gave California until Dec. 28 to file an answer.

Today's action merely gives the government the right to place the suits before the court. It does not mean that the tribunal neces-

sarily will hear it formally.

Attorney General Tom C. Clark said the Justice Department is not seeking overturn title to tidelands or lands beneath bays, harbors or other inland waters. He said it is trying to "resolve finally and promptly a genuine controversy that has for a long time overhung the right to valuable resources off our shores."

California, since 1921, has asserted title to lands off the coast and has leased rights to a number of oil corporations.

Mr. Clark contended that California never had any "proprietary" interests in the lands and, therefore, does not have authority to grant rights to remove oil and other minerals.

McNutt Optimistic Over Marketing Of Florida's Citrus

LAKELAND, Oct. 26, (Special)—Taking an optimistic view of the possibility of marketing Florida's 86,000,000 box crop of citrus this season at a fair price to the producer, M. H. McNutt, chairman of the Florida Citrus Commission's advertising committee today cited several "plus" factors in the current merchandising picture.

Admitting "we hear a lot about the difficulties—the serious problems—which the industry faces during this coming season," the ad chairman said he refused "to be a pessimist." The large crop, which must be moved principally into civilian channels since the government has greatly curtailed its buying program, will be spread out over a longer period of time than usual—and that is to the state's advantage, he believes.

Referring to "the uncertainty and the government meddling and continued government interference in respect to prices and price ceilings," McNutt said "and this continues—right up to all that the industry has to do this season, has been able to do about it." He also cited the "shortage of labor and the marketing of citrus blooms as being on the debit" side of the ledger.

"I refuse to be a pessimist," he said. "It is my firm conviction that there are just as many, if not more, facts which can be cited on the credit side of our ledger as there are on the debit side. Let's look at some of these facts.

"In the first place, there has been a much slower movement of early fruit. Last year by this time the industry had moved over 1,100 cars of oranges more than in the comparable period this year. Only the grapefruit movement shows a comparable volume in respect to last season.

"These figures have a direct bearing on the success of our marketing effort. The fruit which has not moved is still on the trees. It is maturing, and when it does go, it will be of such quality that we will hear little, if any complaint from the trade or consumer. In other words, the consumer reluctance created by the heavy movement of inadequately matured fruit, altogether too common in other years, will not be with us this season. That very definitely is on the credit side of the industry's ledger."

Commenting on the labor shortage, he said that this one factor

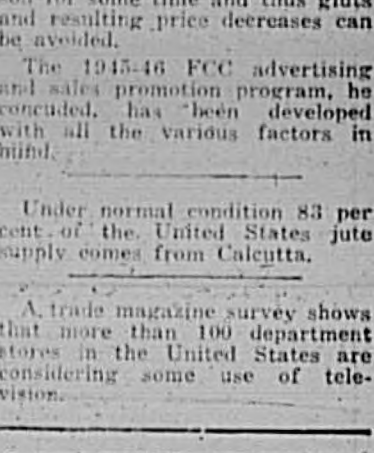
is probably responsible to a great degree for the slowness with which the current crop is going out, and that a far more orderly movement is in prospect.

The late bloom fruit, he said, would extend the marketing season for some time and thus glut and resulting price decreases can be avoided.

The 1945-46 FCC advertising and sales promotion program, he concluded, has been developed with all the various factors in mind.

Foundation Spends Million Dollars To Fight Polio

NEW YORK, Oct. 26 (Special)—Close to \$1,000,000 in emergency aid to polio epidemic areas was disbursed by The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in 40 weeks of this year, Foundation President Basil O'Connor said yesterday.

Of this amount, Mr. O'Connor said, a little more than 75 per cent went to four states, as follows: North Carolina, \$223,188; Illinois, \$218,200; New York, \$175,400; and Virginia, \$186,000. Total for the country was \$886,826.

Principal expenses in connection with polio epidemics, he contended, are hospitalization, salaries of doctors and other professional personnel, purchase of special equipment, transportation of patients, and the like. Infantile paralysis, he added, is one of the most expensive diseases in medicine. Few families can meet the cost of the average case of polio, which is around \$1,000.

Funds sent to states, Mr. O'Connor said, supplement resources of the Foundation's county chapters, which retain every year, for the care and treatment of local polio patients, one half of all contributions in the country. In the annual March of Dimes, the other half goes to the National Foundation for scientific research, education and emergency aid in epidemic areas.

While there are fewer infantile paralysis cases throughout the country in the first 40 weeks of this year than there were for the same period last year, 26 states reported higher totals than last year. Utah reported nine times its 1944 total; Texas and Massachusetts almost five times; Oklahoma, Tennessee and Wyoming more than three times.

So far this year, \$30,000 in emergency aid has been sent to Utah, which experienced the most severe epidemic in proportion to population of any state in the union.

Funds sent to North Carolina, it was explained, are being used for not only for victims of this year's outbreaks, but for continuing care

Vet Program Adopted By Salvation Army

NEW YORK, Oct. 26, (Special)—A five-point program of aid and assistance to veterans and their families was adopted by Salvation Army Commissioners of the United States at the closing session of a three-day conference on an expanded post-war program for the organization, held at the Salvation Army National Headquarters, 120 West Fourteenth Street.

The entire program was presented in Washington, D. C., by General Omar N. Bradley, head of the Veterans Administration, by a seven-man delegation of the Salvation Army, which pledged full cooperation to the Veterans Administration and to the veterans themselves on behalf of the thousands of Salvationists serving all over the nation.

The Salvation Army's program which embraces family aid, civility assistance, and of an individual nature, vocational re-education, and children were

discussed. In 40 weeks of 1945, a total of 10,250 cases have been reported for the United States, against 11,000 for the entire year of 1944. Mr. O'Connor said, were sent to the county alone, Winnebago County, Illinois, to fight the epidemic centering in Rockford.

"The National Foundation and its chapters," Mr. O'Connor declared, "stand ready at all times to provide care and treatment for all needy victims of polio—regardless of race, creed, color or sex."

"Even after the epidemic has spent itself, the task of caring for patients must go on. All polio attacks do not result in paralysis of the victim, but where paralysis is an after-effect, patients require extended care."

Tennessee received \$50,000 disbursed under the supervision of Dr. R. H. Hutcheson, state health director. As of October 6, this year, Tennessee had reported 217 cases, compared with 103 for the entire year of 1944.

Many of the other states, too, are still caring for victims of the 1944 epidemic, some worst in the nation's history, when 19,272

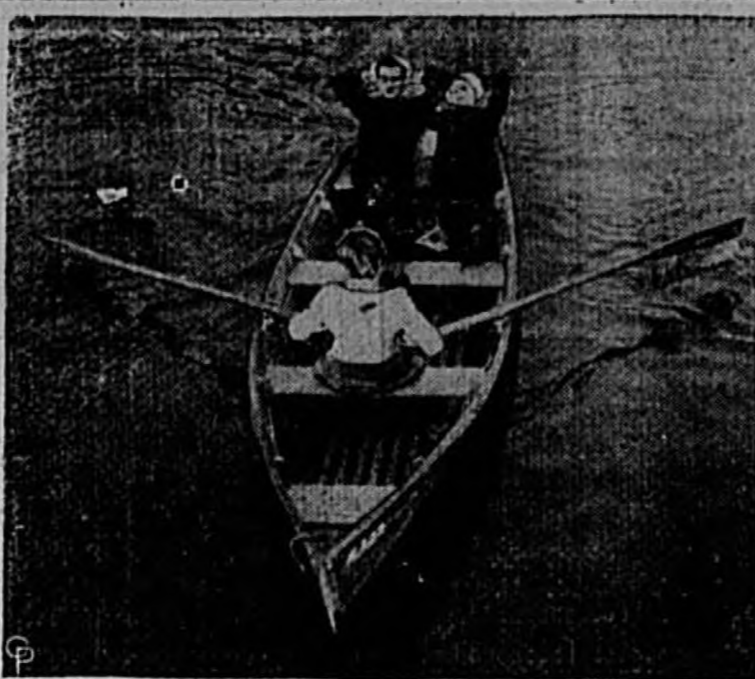

Gov. Thomas E. Dewey was defeated by the late President Roosevelt, has emerged as a powerful new figure in the determination of American foreign policy. Although Secretary of State James F. Byrnes had almost a score of advisers during the critical five-power conference of foreign ministers here, reliable sources said he leaned most heavily on Dulles, whom he later described as his "partner."

These sources reported that Byrnes almost ignored some of his other aides, so greatly did he depend upon the tall, slightly stooped international lawyer who advised Governor Dewey on foreign affairs during the 1944 presidential campaign.

Held Firm
 It was Dulles, according to authoritative sources, who was responsible to a considerable degree for the American delegation's firm stand against Russian insistence that France and China

is excluded from discussions on Balkan peace treaties. While he had a weighty record of international experience as a lawyer, Dulles really was brought to his present position of influence by Dewey. In pre-election talks conducted by former Secretary of State Cordell Hull last year and bi-partisan foreign policy, Dulles participated as the Republican representative.

When the late President Roosevelt chose the American delegation to the United Nations conference in San Francisco, the gray-haired, bespectacled Dulles was asked to go along as an advisor. At first he refused, contending he could be more helpful from the outside. Later however, he accepted under urging by the White House and the State Department.

Actually, the London peace discussions were no new experience for Dulles. He accompanied the American delegation to Paris in 1919. This fact, coupled with his Republican connections, probably was an important reason why Byrnes listened attentively to his views.

On the other hand, Byrnes obviously was not forgetting that he would have to have the approval of two-thirds of his former Senate colleagues for any peace treaty. Aside from politics, Dulles speaks for a large group of Americans on his own as chairman of the committee for a just and durable peace of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ, representing about 6,000,000 persons.

Although he has been described as firmly international and opposed to power politics in his views, the mild-mannered churchman likes to stand fast and firm when he feels sound democratic principles are being ignored.

As an example, he strongly opposed the big power veto rights in the United Nations' security council.

Despite his emergence abroad as an influence upon American policy, if offered a diplomatic post Dulles probably would refuse it. That would be in keeping with his blunt and frequent avowals that he wants to remain free to criticize.
