





Using the above heading the Star-Banner, in an article on this page, called attention the other day to the State Board of Health order condemning oysters taken from 28 peninsular producing areas because the waters have been polluted by raw and inadequately treated sewage. The health board warning has attracted attention

"Price of Pollution"

throughout the state, particularly in coast cities close to the areas where shellfish have been polluted. The Palatka Daily News reproduced the Star-Banner's editorial, with the following comment.

"Palatka might just as well start cocking an eye toward providing adequate sewage disposal for the time is not far distant when dumping waste materials in the St. Johns will be prohibited, as indeed it should be now, Among the list of postwar projects sewage dis posal should rank well toward the top, if not indeed in the initial position. So far, health authorities have not registered any violent squeak about the matter but regardless of this Palatka citizens should recognize the shortsightedness of polluting the St. Johns, one of Florida's most picturesque rivers.'

Down at Fort Myers, where the News-Press which deals out sledge-hammer blows in defense of the public interest, makes no bones of the fact that something ought to be done about dumping fifth into the river. Bays the News-Press, in part:

"There are millions of oysters and other shellfish dying of old age each year in the lower reaches of the Caloosahatchee because the raw sewage of Fort Myers make them unfit for human consumption. There are dozens of old timers who swear that they wouldn't eat a fish caught out of the river below the bridge because of this same sewage.

'... For a sum perhaps one-third less than we are now spending to patch up our sewers' and push the stuff farther into river, the city could build a sewage disposal plant that would free the river from pollution, lift the threat of disease, eliminate upleasant odors, make edible some of the best oysters anywhere and, perhaps, in time pay for itself by providing local farmers with a splendid fertilizer at a reasonable price."

Hasn't the health board, in warning against using pysters from contaminated waters reeking with sewage filth, called attention to Florida's first problem, correct sewage disposal to protect the lives of our people and an industry (shellfish) which would add immeasurably to the wealth of out state?—Ocala Star-Banner.






