



The budget is also based on a property tax millage rate of 8.46 mills, a drop from 8.6 last year. That means Seminole landowners will pay \$8.46 for each \$1,000 of

assessed property evaluation. "It's a "hold-the-line" budget, according to Superintendent William P. Layer, who said that the 1976-77 figures "meet all the state requirements and while it won't allow us to slip backwards, it isn't sufficient enough to move too far forward."

Hospital, Jail **Top Priorities**

Seminole Memorial Hospital will apply for funds from a new deral public works program to construct a \$1-million dollar new

Hospital administrator Bob Besserer has been given the okay from hospital trustees to pursue construction of a new wing. And he said he plans to pursue the federal dollars as one means of

financing the addition. Besserer said he plans today to contact county grant coordinator Shelley Cox to find out the details required in application steps and for additional information about available funds.

Congress last week overrode President Ford's veto of the public works bill, which includes money earmarked for areas with rates of unemployment higher than the national average. At Tuesday's county commission meeting, an ad hoc com-

mittee studying jail space needs was instructed to prepare a money. feasibility and location study in anticipation of applying for federal funds to construct a new 250-inmate, \$3.85-million jail. If federal funds could be acquired, the new jail could be constructed without a special two-year property tax, which would require a referendum. Ad Hoc Committeeman Bo Simpson asked commissioners to

begin a study so the county will be ready when federal guidelines explaining how to apply for the funds are released Aug. 22. Mrs. Cox, who has been in contact with Washington, told commissioners that the federal funds could be used to finance 100 per cent of any project approved by the federal government. The ad hoc committee recommendation that the county begin

Sanford Proposals Include City Hall

Sanford will probably apply for federal help on two projects under the public works bill which became law last week. The new city hall construction, planned for this fall, could win federal funds in the \$3.95 billion job-creating program, said City Manager Warren Knowles. A proposed drainage improvement program which has already been turned down by city voters twice

s also eligible for funding. The public works program was passed by Congress over President Gerald Ford's veto last week.

Sanford city commissioners have had an eye on the bill since February, when they called a special meeting to discuss the possibility of landing federal funds for a local project. Knowles was directed then to get Sanford's application work underway. The program has since been trimmed from \$6.5 billion to \$3.95

billion, but local officials still hope Sanford will get some of the Design work on Sanford's new city hall is already underway, and commissioners are expecting Wayne Heasley, chief architect of Watson and Co., to present them with a schematic plan at the Aug. 9 commission meeting. If work proceeds on schedule, ommissioners hope to break ground for the \$1.5 million building in the fall - just in time for the public works program.

The drainage improvement plan was first drawn up in 1968. Cost estimates were \$3.7 million then, and Knowles figures more than \$6 million would be needed now. Two separate attempts to finance the drainage project have been turned down by city

Consumer Advocates Attack **Decision On Natural Gas**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Federal Power Commission's new \$1.5-billion increase in the nation's gas bill faces immediate challenge from consumer advocates,

who call it too high and too hasty. Energy Action, a consumer organization, planned to ask the commission and the U.S. Court of Appeals not only for reconsideration of the rate hike, but also to stop it from taking effect in the meantime.

The FPC announced on Tuesday it was increasing the nationwide ceiling prices for natural gas in sales by producers to interstate pipelines. The impact of the rate hike on natural gas consumers was expected to vary according to weather, distance from gas-producing areas and other factors. However, the average annual residential gas bill would go up 6 per cent or \$15.60, according to some estimates.

Following the FPC decision, Energy Action said it plans to appeal and said other consumer groups and some state regulators may join it.

7 Indicted In Check Scheme CHICAGO (AP) - A federal grand jury has indicted seven men from three states on charges they participated in a stolen check scheme which could have netted some

The Tuesday indictment charges that the men stole 260 blank checks from an office of the John Hancock Mutual Life Insurance Co., made them out for amounts between \$1,120 and \$4,600 and deposited them in 10 Chicago bank

The indictment says that if payment had not been stopped on the checks, the men would have transferred the money into accounts at 15 financial institutions in Florida and the Chicago area.

Viking Soil Tests To Start

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) - Viking 1's robot was ordered to lay its iron hand on Mars for the first time today, digging up a bit of soil in an attempt to discover if life exists - or ever existed - on the Red Planet. A 10-foot telescoping arm with a shovel-like hand was to extend with a creaky, whirring noise and delve into the

red dirt several times. The soil gathering was set to begin at about 4.30 a.m. EDT on commands of the robot lander's computer. But scientists on earth would not know until later today when pictures of the digging area were beamed to earth whether the mechanical arm had done its work.

Kidnap Suspect's Trail Cold

SAN LEANDRO, Calif. (AP) - James L. Schoenfeld, wanted in the Chowchilla mass kidnaping, has left behind him a trail of gun deals and aborted attempts to reach Canada, officials say.

But the most painful fact for the authorities is that the

trail is already a week old. Schoenfeld and another suspect, Frederick N. Woods IV, continue to elude officers despite the new clues, and despite a much-publicized manhunt for them. They are being sought on arrest warrants.

Former Sen. Ervin Agrees With Death Penalty Ruling

At a news conference Tuesday, Ervin also said President Ford's pardon of former President Nixon will be a definite factor in this year's presidential race. Scientists Find Parasites

LOGGERHEAD KEY (AP) - Scientists say one of 30 whales found beached in the Dry Tortugas was infected with parasites similar to those discovered in other stranded sea mammals, but they are still baffled by the

recent suicide runs. "There are 20 to 30 people working on it," biologist Dr. Daniel Odell said as scientists Tuesday conducted an autopsy on the lone whale that died on Loggerhead Key, a tiny island 70 miles west of Key West.

That false killer whale and 29 others beached themselves Sunday on the isolated islet in the Dry Tortugas. The survivors, weighing between 1,000 and 2,000 pounds, were pulled free Tuesday by two small boats, then shooed back into the safety of deep waters in the Gulf of Mexico.

Inmate Attempts Bribe

Or are Americans to believe we have had only one branch of government recently? Could two Republican presidents have created in eight years the plethora of problems that Mr. Carter describes? Or did the Democratic Congress that the nominee now embraces bring the nation to the

How will Mr. Carter pour more money into cities, increase revenue sharing, fund new employment programs, increase federal aid to transportation, provide aid to a national health plan, increase Social Security benefits, and still



Is a battle shaping up between judges of the 18th Judicial Circuit over trying juveniles as adults for

It appears so, especially after Circuit Court Judge J. William Woodson refused to abide by a ruling by Chief Circuit Judge Joe A. Cowart Jr., on Monday, when he refused to dismiss armed burglary charges against a 14-year-old.

Over the past several days, Judge Cowart has dismissed charges against a number of juveniles because he said juveniles can only be tried as adults for felonies that carry a maximum life sentence and

he said that the law does not specify armed burglary to be a life felony.

However, Judge Woodson said he disagrees with that ruling and argued that armed burglary charges correspond with a first-degree felony which carries a maximum of 30 years in prison or for a term not to

exceed life imprisonment. Present state statutes do not clarify the law to any great degree in that they don't specify armed burglary as either a first-degree felony or a life

Circuit Judge Kenneth Leffler has also freed some juveniles from the adult charges and apparently agrees with Judge Cowart - or else he's just going along because Judge Cowart is the chief

One way or the other, it shapes up as quite a legal football that will be kicked around for some time at least until some sort of interpretation is handed down by Florida Attorney General Robert Shevin. Strong New Earth Tremor Strikes Northeast China

TOKYO (AP) - A strong new earth tremor joited northeastern China today after the world's most powerful quake in 12 years struck the region before dawn, causing heavy damage and probably many casualties in the coastal metropolis of Tientsin.

The Italian news agency ANSA said the new tremor was felt in the Chinese capital of Peking at 6:50 p.m. (6:50 a.m. EDT) and sent residents into the streets for safety. There was no immediate word of casualties or damage. The U.S. Earthquake Information Service in Golden, Colo., recorded the magnitude of the aftershock at 7.9 on the Richter scale, almost as strong as the overnight quake and capable of massive damage.

The original quake, recorded by the Denver center at 8.2 on the Richter scale, also shook Peking. At least several major buildings were reported damaged there.

Minority Cabinet Due In Italy Pleas

ROME (AP) — Premier-designate Giulio Andreotti will probably soon give Italy a minority Christian Democratic government dependent on the Communists for survival. Other top leaders of the party voted unanimously Tuesday night in favor of a minority cabinet - Italy's second this year - after two weeks of negotiations by Andreotti failed to get the Socialists and other small parties to join him in a coalition and give him a majority

in parliament. The Christian Democratic party secretary, Benigno Zaccagnini, called on the Communists, the second largest party in parliament, and the smaller parties to abstain when Andreotti seeks a vote of confidence next month "in order that the country can have a government."





Stevenson talked to reporters in his slightly arrogant style after beating Drame. He said he never heard of Tate; no, he wasn't bored; that he's fighting for the Cuban people and Fidel; that, sure, he's improved, and that no fights are easy.

of here," and was just about to go when a reporter asked about his record. "It's 134 and two, with 95 KOs," he said. Stevenson had forgotten a couple of losses in the bargain, including a knockout defeat in
