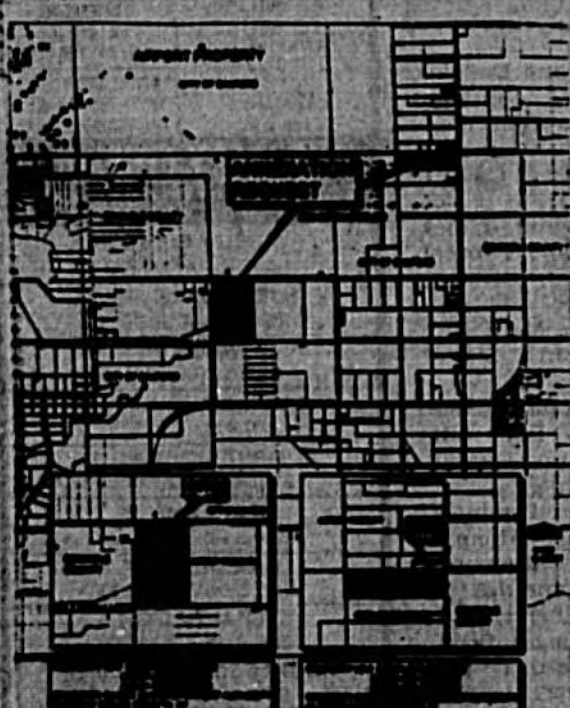

thunderous volley off a Mia Hamm toss after the Portuguese defense mysteriously left the 5-foot-10 midfielder unmarked in the penalty box.

Hamm added the fourth goal in the 45th minute when she received a beautiful driven 40-yard pass from Carla Overbeck on the left wing then dribbled across the top of the penalty box before slotting her shot into the left corner.

It was Hamm's 102nd career goal in 158 games, leading her seven short of breaking the all-time world scoring record, men or women.

Lilly added her second goal in stoppage time of the first half, redirecting a bouncing shot into the net from close range. DiCicco made five substitutions at halftime, bringing on goalkeeper Saskia Webber, defender Christie Pearce, midfielder Tisha Venturini and forwards Danielle

Fotopoulos, from Lyman High School and the University of Florida, and Shannon MacMillan.

"We didn't lose anything when we made changes in the lineup," said DiCicco. "We have players that give us great depth and we must continue to cultivate that to stay at the top. As we move towards the World Cup, it's crucial to have players coming off the bench that keep up the level of our game, or if a reserve is especially hot, bring up the level."

Lilly completed her hat trick in the 58th minute after Joy Fawcett sidined her defender down the right flank and served a cross on the ground all the way to the far post. Lilly slid to bury the ball in the net from three yards out for her 64th international goal in her world record 164th international match.

"At the start of the game, we weren't as aggressive as we needed to be," said Lilly. "We need to attack teams right from the beginning, but we've got a lot of games before the World Cup and we will get together."

MacMillan added the final goal in the 81st minute when Fotopoulos put her behind the defense with a nifty flick pass. MacMillan bent

the ball around the sliding goalkeeper for her 15th career goal.

"It's tough to play the same team two games in a row," added Chastain. "But we have so many areas to improve in, and we didn't finish our chances in the second half. We should have scored a few more goals. We'll use the game on Saturday as one more step to where we want to be at the World Cup. We want to improve every game."

The USA has now gone unbeaten on American soil in 45 straight matches, a team record.

Following the match this Saturday, the USA will take a week break before regrouping for a week of training in Florida and then will depart for San Francisco in preparation for the match against the FIFA World Stars as part of the 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup Final draw. The USA will play the FIFA World Stars on Feb. 14, 1999, at Spartan Stadium in San Jose, Calif., with the Final Draw being conducted at halftime. An extensive 1999 schedule to prepare the USA for the Women's World Cup will be announced in February.

## Corporation can be beneficial

Back in May, we discussed some of the factors an individual starting a business should take into consideration when determining what business form is most beneficial to his or her particular situation. One of the business forms discussed was the corporation.

There are two documents that are central to the incorporation of a business: the articles of incorporation and the corporation's bylaws. The articles of incorporation usually specify the corporation's purpose and its structure as well as the corporation's directors, and the shareholders' powers and limitations, while the corporation's bylaws specify the rules by which a corporation governs its affairs. A listing of what is usually included in each document follows.

Florida law requires that the articles of incorporation of every corporation include the name of the corporation, the street address of the initial principal office, the mailing address if different than the address of the principal office, the number and class of shares

authorized and their relative rights to each class, the name of its initial registered agent and the street address of the initial registered office, and the name and address of each incorporation.

Additionally, the articles of incorporation are not required to include but oftentimes do include the names of the initial directors, the corporation's purpose, the effective date of the articles, the limitations on the powers of the corporation, the limitations on the powers of the directors to authorize distributions and dividends to the shareholders, transfer restrictions on shares, the right of shareholders to maintain a fixed percentage ownership,

and limits on the indemnification available to directors, officers, employees, and agents of the corporation.

On the other hand, the bylaws of the corporation or rules of governance usually specify when meetings of shareholders are to be held, where the meetings will be held and/or how the location is to be determined, what actions may be taken by the shareholders without a shareholders' meeting, how special meetings are set, how shares may be voted, what constitutes a quorum, the procedures for selection of directors, the number, terms, and qualifications of directors, the compensation of directors, the procedures for removal of directors, the procedures for filling vacancies, the procedures for formation of committees, the general duties of the officers, and the compensation of officers.

Naturally, the subjects in the above listings are not exclusive and, in many instances, they are interchangeable. Many of the optional provisions usually

found in the articles of incorporation may be specified in the bylaws and provisions in the articles of incorporation. Whether the provisions will appear in the articles of incorporation or in the bylaws will turn on the amount of flexibility the incorporators desire as to the terms specified. Bylaws can be more easily amended than articles of incorporation.

The articles of incorporation and the corporation's bylaws are central to a corporation because through their use a person may specify the corporation's purpose, structure, powers, limitations, and the rules by which the corporation will govern its affairs. In the coming weeks we will discuss other aspects of corporations as well as other aspects of business law.

## Women shut out Portugal

SANFORD - Forward Kristine Lilly scored the first hat-trick of her career as the U.S. Women's National Team opened its 1999 season with a bang, dominating Portugal in a 7-0 victory Wednesday at the Seminole County Training Center, home of the USA's residency camp.

The match marked the beginning of the USA's five month march to the Women's World Cup this summer.

U.S. midfielder Michelle Akers, from Oviedo, scored the 99th goal of her international career in the 41st minute, setting up a possible historic 100th score this Saturday at Lockhart Stadium in Ft. Lauderdale as the USA meets Portugal again. The match will be televised live on ESPN at 2 p.m. ET.

With one more score, Akers will join just three other players to net 100 career international goals, teammates Mia Hamm, who scored her 102nd in the 45th minute, and Italian legend Carolina Morace (106) and world record holder Elisabetta Vignotto (108), who are both retired.

Playing its first match after opening residency training camp three weeks ago, the USA looked crisp in the attacking third to start the match, but dominated the game territorially for 90 minutes. The Americans denied Portugal a shot on goal and forced goalkeeper Carla Cristina to make 16 saves, several of which were spectacular.

The U.S. team finally broke through with back-to-back goals in the 22nd and 23rd minutes.

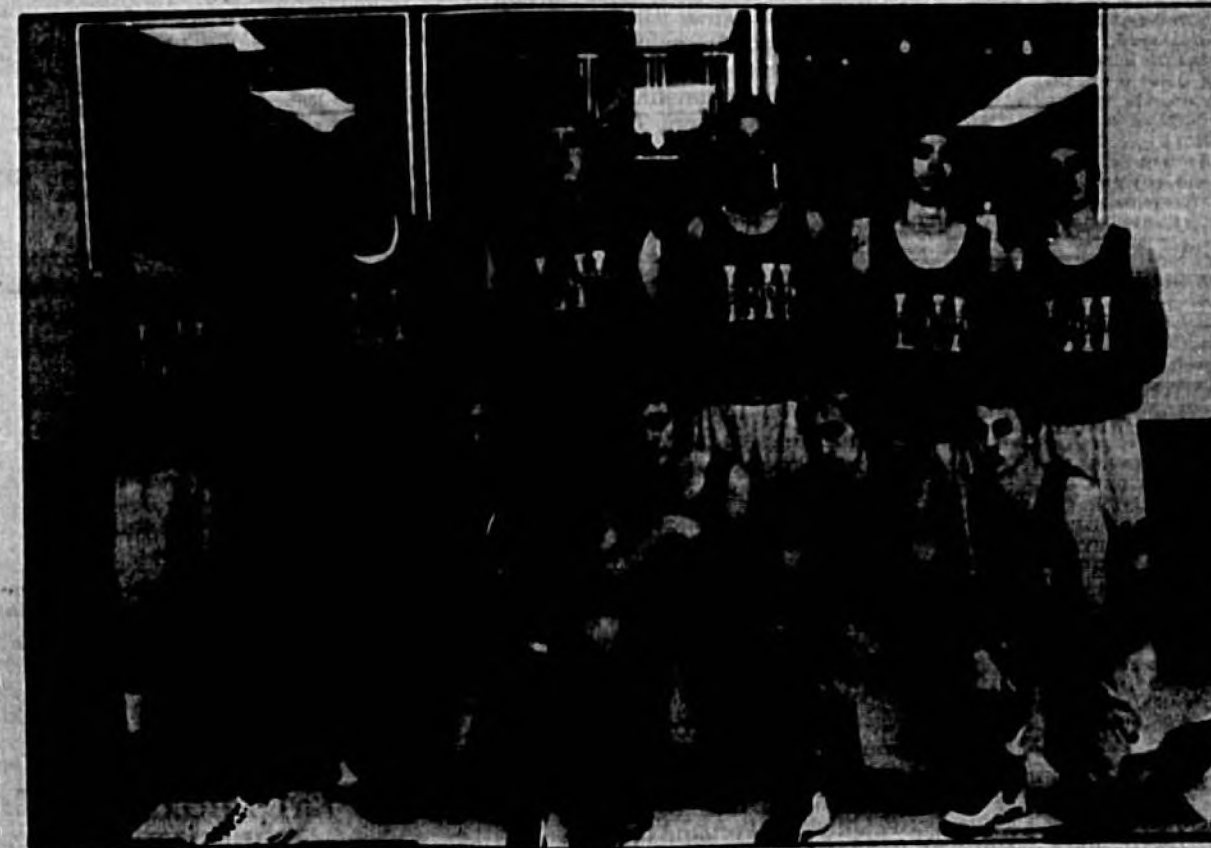
The opening goal came when Joy Fawcett was fouled at the top of the penalty box. Lilly placed the ball down quickly and within seconds after the referee blew the whistle for the foul, Brenda Chanoin ran onto the ball and cracked her left-footed free-kick into the left corner from 20 yards out, catching Carla Cristina totally unprepared.

Lilly added the second goal one minute later, taking a pass from Tiffany Milbratt at the top of the penalty box and hitting a scorching left-footed shot into the upper left corner.

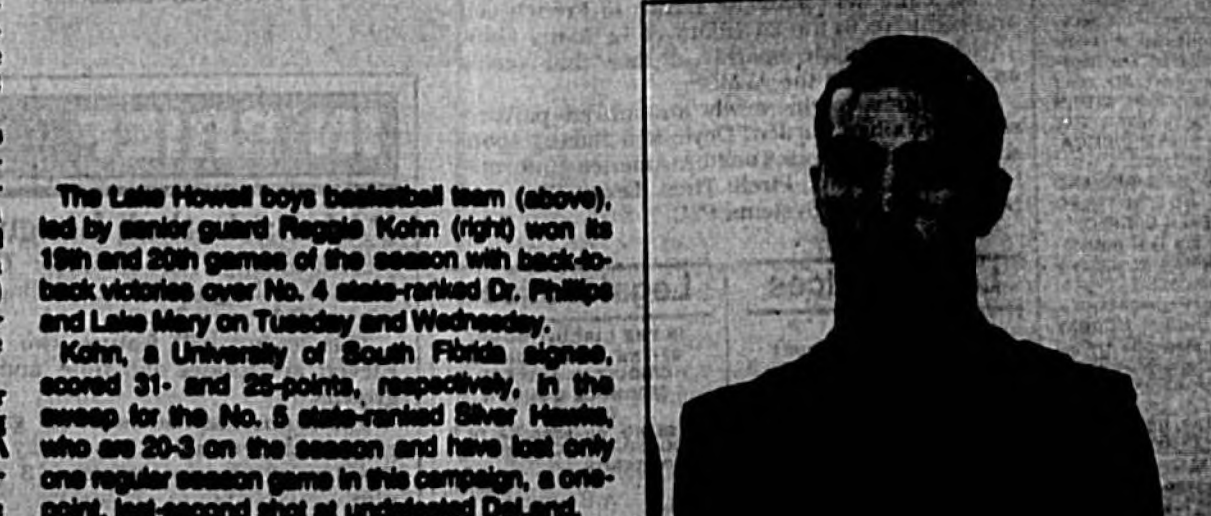
"I think the team was as excited to play a match, that we had some fun in the beginning of the game, but once we started, there were some outstanding performances," said U.S. Head Coach Tony DiCicco.

Chanoin, Lilly and Brenda Chanoin had great games and almost every one else played very well. There were no defensive breakthroughs and we really moved the ball around in pace for the whole game."

According to the just-released Tourism Works for America 1998 Report, domestic and international travelers spent over \$502 billion (+6 percent) in the U.S. in 1997. As a comparison, that's more money than the combined revenues of the top three Fortune 500 companies, General Motors (\$178.2 billion), Ford Motor Company (\$153.6 billion), and Exxon (\$122.4 billion).

In addition, this spending by domestic and international travelers generated over \$71.1 billion in tax revenue for federal, state, and local governments in 1997. Without this revenue, each U.S. household would have paid an additional \$710 in taxes.

The Tourism Works for America Report is published annually by the Travel Industry Association of America (TIA). American Express Travel Related Services is the first-ever sponsor of the report. TIA is especially grateful for the sponsorship, as it has helped to significantly expand distribution of the report.

Travel and tourism is America's largest services export, one of America's largest employers, and America's third-largest retail sales industry. Spending by international visitors totaled \$94.2 billion, while Americans only spent \$69.5 billion outside the U.S., thus creating a \$24.7 billion travel trade surplus.

The travel and tourism industry continues to be one of the largest employers in the U.S., directly and indirectly employing a total of 16.2 million people. In fact, approximately one out of every 17

Americans is employed due to the patronage of travelers to and within the U.S. Travel and tourism ranks as the first, second, or third-largest employer in 32 states. Travel employment including jobs generated by both domestic and international visitors, produced a total of \$127.8 billion in payroll in 1997.

and tourism continues as the nation's third-largest retail sales industry after automotive dealers and food stores, respectively. Domestic and international travelers together spend \$481.5 billion in the U.S. during 1997. This amount does not include the \$20.9 billion in international traveler spending on U.S. air carriers for transactions made outside the U.S., which increases the total to \$502.4 billion.

"By providing an accurate picture of how the travel and tourism industry performed in 1997, the report validates the tremendous economic, social, and cultural impact the industry has on the U.S.," remarked William S. Norman, president and CEO of the Travel Industry Association of America.

Data for the Tourism Works for America Report are collected and analyzed from more than 80 expert sources in order to provide reliable, concise and accurate data about the economic, social and cultural impact of the travel and tourism industry.

Highlights from the report:  
 • Americans took 1.26 billion person-trips (one person traveling 100+ miles, one-way, away from home) in 1997, an increase of 8 percent from last year.

• In 1997, spending by domestic and international travelers within the U.S. averaged \$1.38 billion a day; \$57.4 million an hour; \$955,800 a minute; and \$15,900 a second.

Guest speaker in the Sunday morning worship service will be Rev. Dean Barley, one of the members of the former youth choir. Rev. Barley is now operator of The Vineyard, a coed Christian Sports Camp near Winston-Salem, NC.

Following its rehearsal on Saturday, the choir group will enjoy a barbecue meal and then participate in other celebration activities.

At 7 p.m. on Saturday evening, there will be a Reflection

and Recognition Service in the W.P. Brooks Chapel (1920 sanctuary). At this time, the 50-year members will be recognized, old hymns will be sung and many memories shared. Following this service, there will be a Birthday Party in Fellowship Hall.

Sunday's 10:30 a.m. worship service will feature the former youth choir and speaker Rev. Barley, a brief history of the church and recognition of special guests. Dinner on the grounds will follow and all guests are welcome. The choir will present its concert at 1:15 p.m.

### Church History

A Regular Baptist Church was founded on Feb. 3, 1884, with 18 charter members. The first meeting place was in the

Sanford Town Hall which was located north of Commercial Street on Palmetto Avenue. J.W. Butts, pastor of the Orlando Baptist Church, assisted in the organization and was called to be the first pastor on a part-time basis.

Services were later moved to a school building on Palmetto Avenue at Sixth Street, the one lot at Park Avenue and Sixth Street was donated by the Florida Land and Colonization Company of London and a wooden church building was built there and occupied by 1885.

The church was admitted into the Wekiva Baptist Association on Sept. 28, 1884, at which time it also affiliated with the Florida Baptist Convention. In 1914 the church became a charter member of the present Seminole Baptist Association. On June 20, 1917, the church was incorporated as First Baptist Church of Sanford.

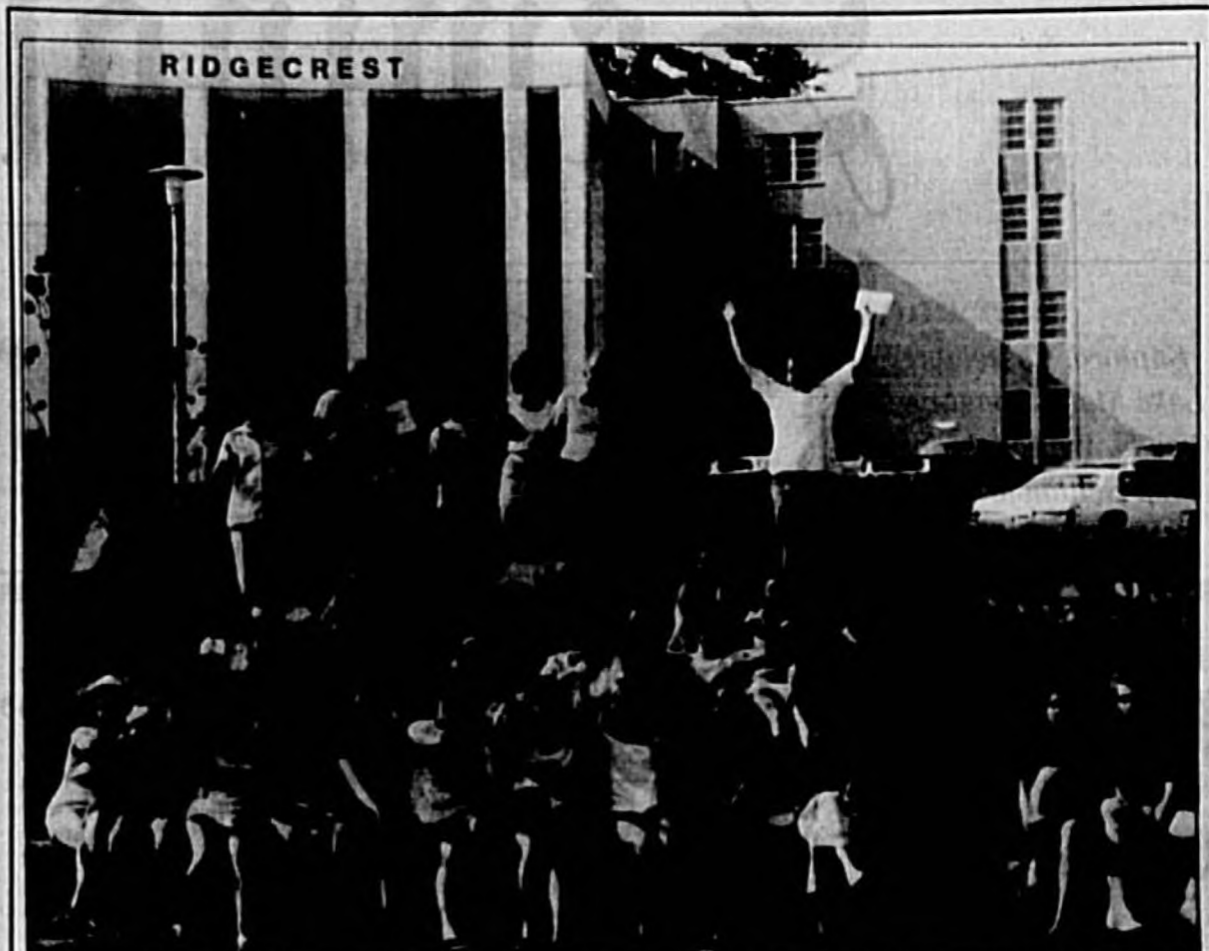
Ground was broken for the front part of the former sanctuary in 1914. Worship services were held in the second floor Sunday School meeting room until the auditorium section was completed in 1920.

Because of the difficulty the church had in repaying the debt on this sanctuary building during the Depression, the Memorial Educational Building was built on a pay-as-you-go basis. It was completed in 1950 at a cost of \$50,000.

Surrounding houses were gradually acquired during the 1950's and 1960's and were used as space for a growing Sunday School. These were torn down for the new \$315,000 educational building which was completed in 1966. In 1972 it was named the Fred B. Chance Memorial Educational Building following the untimely death of this beloved pastor. The Youth Activities Building was built in 1983.

First Baptist has sponsored four missions which became churches in the years indicated: Southside (now Central) in 1938; Elder Springs (New Victory, an independent Baptist) in 1967; Fincrest in 1957; and Oaklawn (now Westview) in 1965. Lake Mary Baptist Church was accepted as a mission in 1976 and was led to reconstitution as a church in 1983. It is now known as Celebration Church.

Sixteen ministers have been ordained by First Baptist and 18 persons have been licensed. There have been many others go into full time

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## Learning the space business, first hand

ORLANDO - "When you come to the Cape for your launch, you live two halls over from here, and up one flight of stairs."

"There would be 15 of us in this room for a launch, and the bathroom was on the other side of the big steel blast doors."

"We could have had Explorer up before the Russians launched Sputnik, and we could have been in space 90 days after them, but the politicians wanted to use the Vanguard rocket..."

"This is the room where the shuttle mission managers sit and decide if the mission is ready to go or not..."

The history and the present operations of the Kennedy Space Center and Cape Canaveral Air Station swirl around the 84 students taking the course "Space Technology: Past, Present and Future," offered for the first time this semester by the University of Central Florida's Florida Space Institute. Former shuttle astronaut Sam Durrance leads the class, which includes visits to the sites where space history was and is being made.

For example, the first session included a trip to the Air Force Space and Missile Museum, the Kitty Hawk of the Space Age, where the original American satellite, Explorer 1, and the early Mercury manned shots originated. The launch pads, original hardware and the block houses, complete with original radio and computer equipment, are on display. The museum docents, volunteers leading the tours, are former space workers who were part of the early space program. What was an exciting adventure to them is history to the students.

"I love the smell of vintage electronics," says one student gesturing to the blackboard equipment, "and my pocket calculator is more powerful than the computers they used to put men into space."

"Hearing it first hand from the guys who were there is real impressive," says another student. "They were innovative...and mighty brave."

The students, many of whom intend to be part of the space business, are from UCF, Florida Institute of Technology, and Embury-Riddle Aeronautical University.

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## Henley ends bickering, delivers compromise

**SEMINOLE COUNTY** - Each of the county commissioners came out of a work session on Wednesday, satisfied with a process to find a county manager to succeed Gary Kaiser, who is retiring on April 16.

County Chairman Carlton Henley came up with a compromise that ended a heated dispute between the other four board members - one of whom said that "any way we go, there is going to be dissension throughout."

Not so, Henley said as he

suggested that a national recruiting firm and a three-man local screening committee be used to choose the next manager. The commissioners will pick the manager from a short list of the most qualified candidates.

"There may be disagreement, but let's hope we're not going to have dissension," Henley told Commissioner Grant Maloy, who had expressed his doubts. Maloy wanted to use a panel of area managers and save the costs of hiring a recruiting firm.

Commissioners Randy Morris and Daryl McLain argued that the cost would be well worth the investment to bring back a

candidate "with no strings attached." They also feared the process could become politicized if area managers were employed.

Ideally, the five commissioners will give unanimous approval to the selection of a manager. "Who would want to come into a jurisdiction where there's a 3-2 vote on the pick?" Morris asked. "It's important we get on the same page. And Chairman Henley's compromise is the start."

The commissioners picked Orange County Manager Ajit Lalchardari, Altamonte Springs Manager Phil Penland and retired AT&T official Owen

Wentworth to serve on the local screening committee. Lalchardari and Wentworth have agreed to do so. Penland is considering the invitation.

County Attorney Robert McMillan began the Wednesday workshop with a brief history of the process the county chooses its five previous managers. Kaiser was a direct appointment after Ron Rabun was forced into a resignation late in 1998.

Maloy and Commissioner Dick Van Der Weide voted against Kaiser's appointment, saying they wanted a national search. Another complaint was that Kaiser, the county's Public Works Manager, Page 2A

## Truancy efforts pay off

**SEMINOLE COUNTY** - A decrease in daytime burglaries could be a result of aggressive truancy efforts by local law enforcement agencies.

Seminole County Sheriff Don Ealinger has said enhanced truancy enforcement, which started in November 1998, would result in a significant decrease in daytime burglaries.

"This is the result of all seven municipalities working together," Ealinger said.

According to the most recent report released by the Juvenile Assessment Center, total daytime burglaries in Seminole County, in November 1998 before the JAC opened, are down from 241 to 202 for the same period, according to a quarterly report released by the JAC, which processes all the truants in the county. The numbers don't include Longwood and Lake Mary.

The Lake Mary Police Department was unable to contribute to the report because of a software change, and the Longwood police experienced a computer system crash in April 1998.

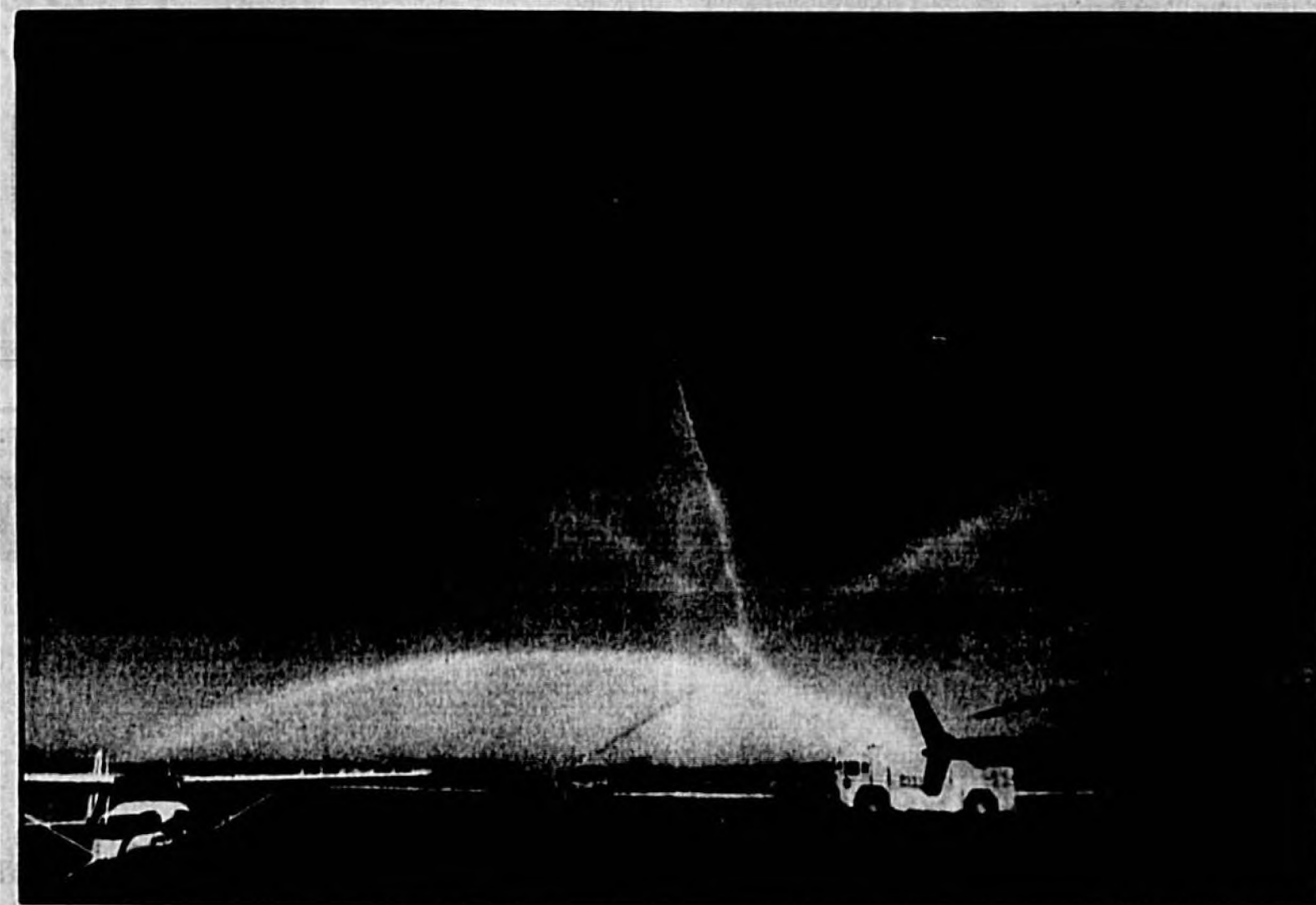
Residential daytime burglaries in Seminole County are down from 101 to 88. Non-residential daytime burglaries for the same period are down from 30 to 18. Vehicle burglaries are down from 110 to 86.

Since the center opened on Nov. 3, 1997, 753 truants have been processed through the JAC. Students are referred to the center primarily through local law enforcement agencies. Many students, 538, were runaways.

"It's making a big impression," Robinson said. "Parents are increasingly referring their own kids to Operation Right Track, which is held every Saturday from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m."

## County schools score some extra points

**SEMINOLE COUNTY** - Fourteen Seminole County schools have been named five-star schools for drawing from the community to improve student education.

The five star elementary schools include first year winner Altamonte Elementary, third year winner Bear Lake Elementary in Apopka, first year winner Casselberry Elementary, first year winner Idylwild Elementary in Sanford, second year winner Keith Elementary in Winter Springs, and third year winner Lake Mary Elementary School.

Idylwild Elementary School principal David Scott said students at the school put in more than 10,000 Dividend volunteer hours last school year. Students at Idylwild this year participated in a canned food drive with the Salvation Army and volunteer at nursing homes.

The Parent Teacher Association is active in cultural arts programs, such as putting on live theater performances.

"It's not just about entertaining the kids," Scott said. "It's about relating the performances to things the students are learning in the classroom."

Idylwild Elementary has 15 active business partners, including restaurants that give award lunches to students and

other businesses that give T-shirts. The school also has a partnership with the Seminole County Fire Department for CPR lessons in Mary Ann Alban's third grade class every Monday.

Other five star elementary schools include second year winner Pine Crest Elementary in Sanford, first year winner Spring Lake Elementary in Altamonte Springs, second year winner Stonstrom Elementary in Oviedo, third year winner Sterling Park Elementary in Casselberry, and second year winner Woodlands Elementary School in Longwood.

Tusculwilla Middle School in Oviedo was the only five star winning middle school.

Lake Mary High School and Lyman High School in Longwood also won the five star award.

The Five Star School Award is offered statewide by the Florida Department of Education and the Commissioner of Education's Community Involvement Council. The winners must document substantive community involvement in school improvement planning and implementation.

Schools qualify in five areas in order to win the award, including business partnerships, family involvement, volunteers, student community service, and school industry councils. Principal Gloria Flanagan of

Lake Mary Elementary said parents, staff, and teachers regularly volunteer their time to help students who are at-risk of falling behind in class. Last school year, 200 volunteers worked with students at Lake

In Lake Mary Elementary's Reading Association Program, students receive one-on-one tutoring from parents and staff assistants. Students at the school give gifts to needy children to build an appreciation for what they have, Flanagan said.
