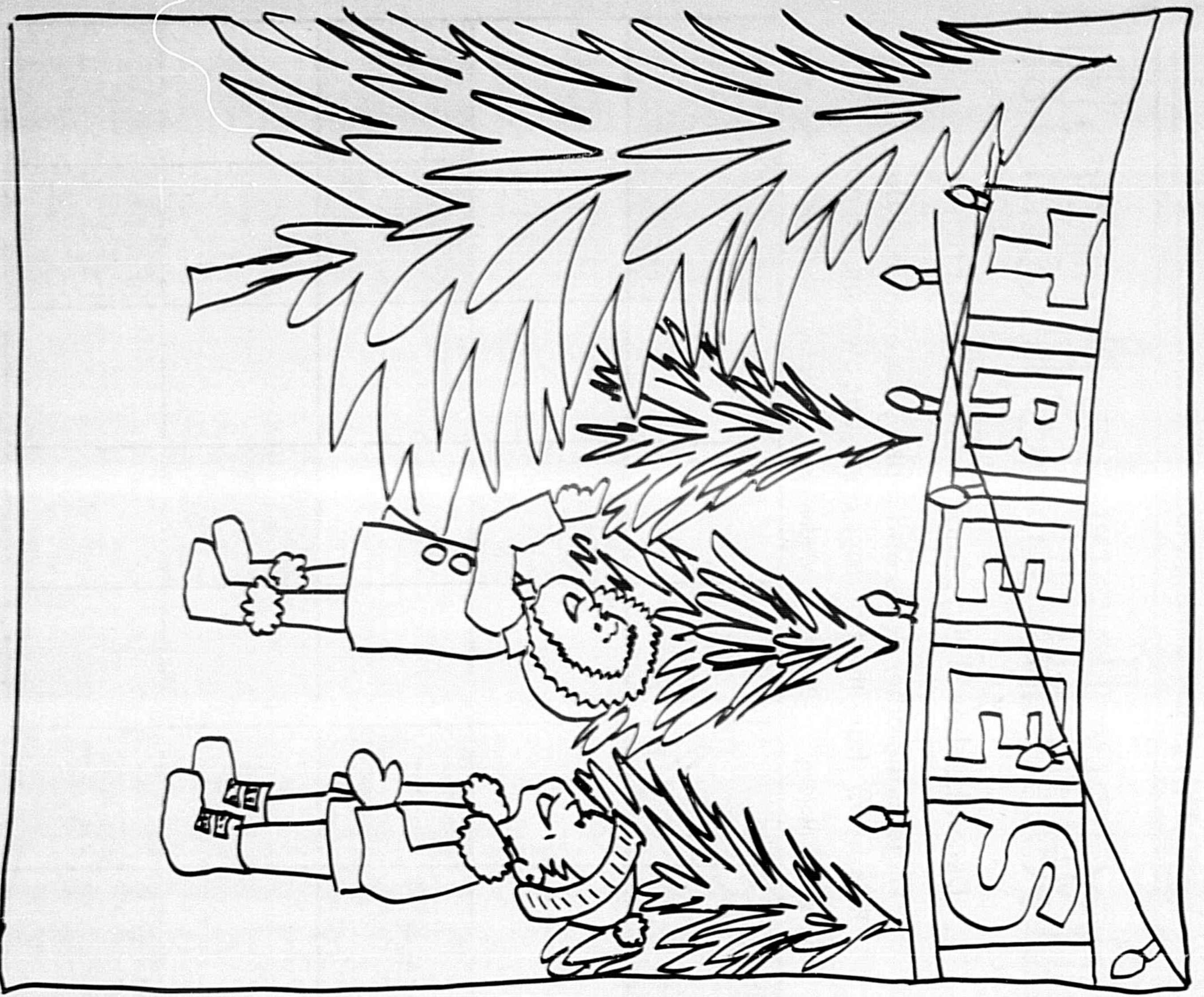


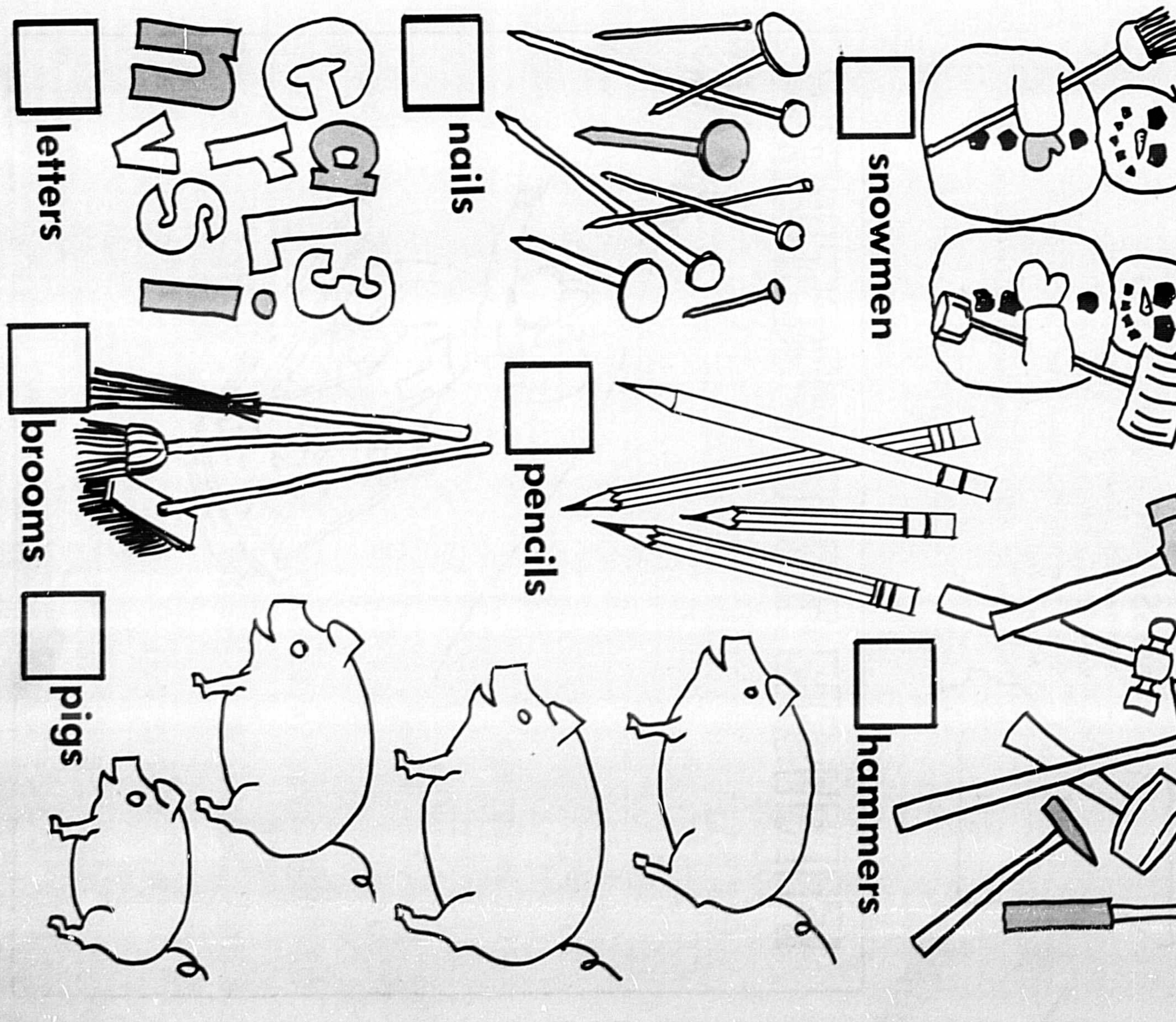

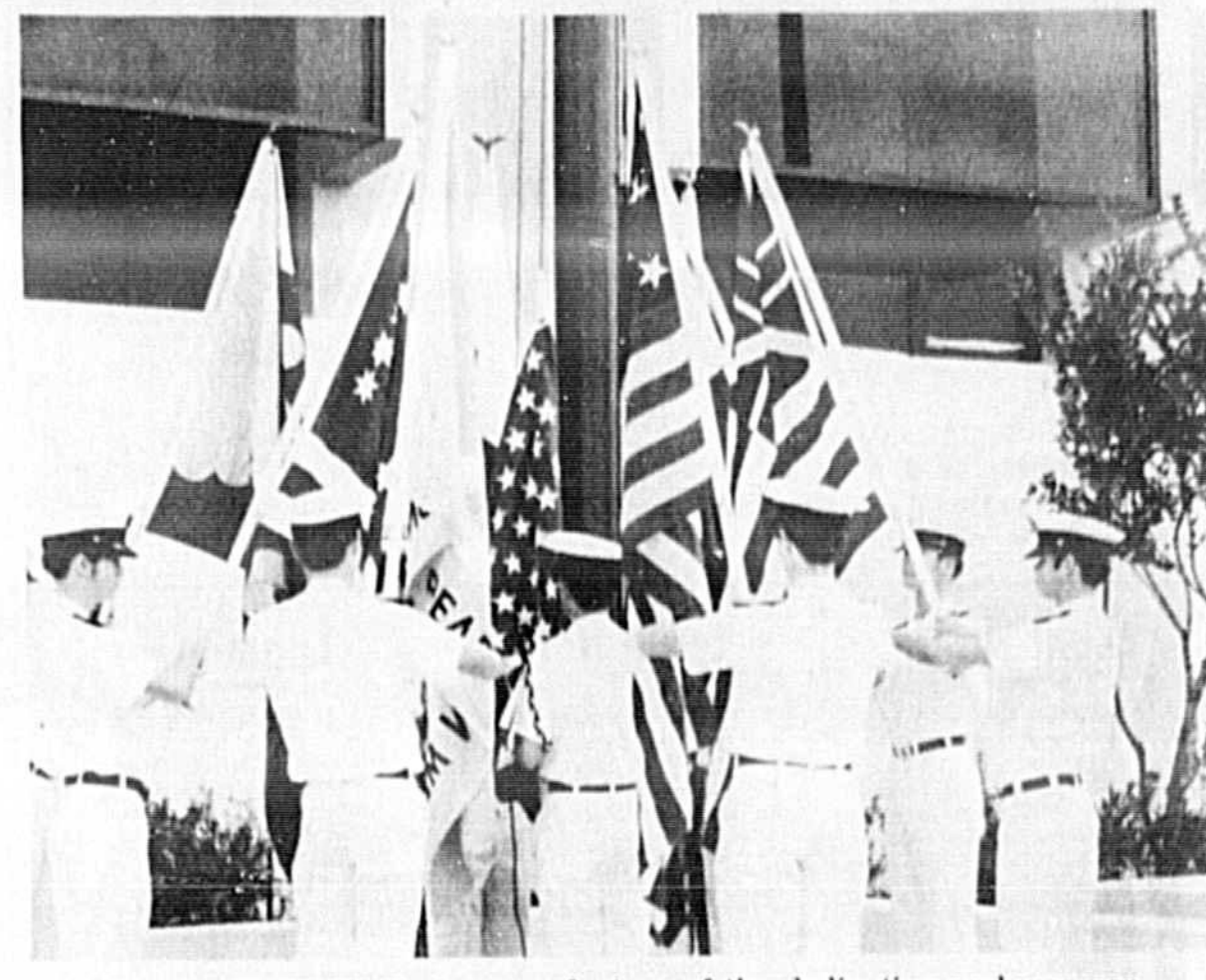

Group Proposed To Study Road Closure

A quickie reminder that the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce will have its Fourth Quarterly Director's Meeting tomorrow morning at 8:15. See you there....

It all goes well, at 6:43 tonight Cernan will become the 11th American to set foot on the moon's surface. Another five minutes later, Schmitt steps onto the lunar surface.

Now, for the \$64 thousand dollar question....can you name just four of the 11 who made it to the moon before Cernan?

Makes you wonder....an earlier story in The Herald commented of the \$25 per month incentive pay which all of these Seminole County Sheriff's deputies should have been receiving as a result of attending special schools.

Well, it's not the Sheriff's fault that the men haven't received the extra \$88... understand that this money was received by the county from the state offices matched with federal funds, and would you believe that it inadvertently was added to the County's Roads and Bridge Funds?

You may rest assured that after Sheriff Polk made such a successful "raid" in procuring these dollars that in 1968 will get their incentives....maybe a little late, but they'll get it!

More than 100 surf fishermen and duck hunters, incensed by the closure of the only road through some of the finest fishing and hunting territory in the state, assembled Friday night in Titusville to discuss ways of getting this road reopened.

The meeting, informational in nature, was arranged through the combined efforts of U.S. Senator Edward Gurney and U.S. Congressman William Chappell.

State Representative Gene Mooney also took an active interest in the problem. Local people including Bob and Margaret Zitrower, Hank McLaughlin, and Dr. Henry McLaughlin were among the first to alert government representatives and the press on this matter.

Long before the 8 o'clock starting time, every available seat in the Merritt Island Wildlife Refuge building was taken, and still more people continued to arrive.

Robert Yoder, manager of the refuge, attempted to get the meeting under way but was forced to interrupt his opening remarks to try to make room for late arrivals. In attempting to explain the reasoning behind barring vehicular traffic, Yoder stated that five miles of the south end of the management area was set aside for swimming, surfing, and fishing. This section is near Playalinda Beach. On the north end, adjacent to New Smyrna, two miles are left in addition to two miles in Apollo State Park.

The road in question is barred at the site of the old Coast Guard station, where veteran surf fishermen with thousands of dollars invested in four-wheel drive vehicles, start looking for the deep holes and sloughs in which to try their luck.

The manager told how lands for National Wildlife Refuges are obtained: "Hunters," said Yoder, "are paid for buying these lands with their duck stamp money, at least 90 per cent of the total. Some are established by 'overlay' or administration of existing lands."

In the case of Merritt Island Refuge, the latter is true. NASH acquired this land as a buffer strip when the huge modern day rocket launchings were first contemplated.

In 1972, NASA relinquished management of this 56,597 acres to Fish and Wildlife Service, Department of the Interior.

Yoder cited extracts from two studies made in 1968 which stated in part, that driving across the dunes destroys vegetation and creates an erosion problem. As proof of this, his assistant, Robin Fields, showed a program of color slides taken in the area, and pointed out cross-crevices to the beach and erosion caused by water action.

Manager Yoder told the audience, "the big thing is to use but no abuse and where ever it does not conflict with this purpose, we would prefer NOT TO CLOSE THE ROAD!"

With these remarks, the meeting was thrown open to discussion by speakers representing groups from four counties as well as individuals.

Brevard County Commissioner Gene Roberts and Doug Futch, county administrator, both mentioned the

Explorers Leave 'America' Descent To Moon Underway

AP Aerospace Writer SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — American explorers Eugene A. Cernan and Harrison H. Schmitt pulled away from the Apollo 17 command ship in a lunar box canyon and man's last planned moon exploration for decades.

Wearing their white space suits, Cernan and Schmitt sealed themselves in the small cab of the spider-legged Chal-

enger, leaving their crewmate, Ronald E. Evans, alone in the larger command ship, America.

Ahead, for Cernan and Schmitt, were three days of exploration among the craters, hills and canyons of a steep-sided valley called Taurus-Littorale. As the 11th and 12th lunar explorers, they will walk and drive more than 20 miles over the valley floor searching rock and soil for secrets needed to complete the moon history already partially recorded through five earlier American landings.

The third Apollo 17 crewman, Ronald E. Evans, will remain in lunar orbit aboard the command ship America. He will probe the surface from above with an array of science instruments and special cameras.

America and Challenger, still locked nose-to-nose, swept behind the moon and out of touch with Mission Control at 2:36 p.m. EST Sunday. Eleven minutes later, they fired America's powerful service propulsion rocket engine to slow the speeding craft and settle it into lunar orbit.

As in past moon flights, Mission Control waited through the silence for word of a successful firing, this time for 22 minutes.

Then the spacecraft shot from behind the moon; and, from a quarter million miles away, Cernan's voice crackled into the control center.

"Thumbs up, America! has arrived on station for the challenge ahead."

Schmitt, the first American scientist in space, began a chattering catalogue of descriptions of what he saw passing below his window.

With a fluency nurtured by more than a decade of study at Harvard and other universities, the geologist told of craters and mounds and shattered mountains, calling each of them by name.

With their lunar goal at least near, the three explorers let flow the joy and excitement of their view.

Courthouse Is Dedicated; Gurney In Flag Ceremony

Hundreds of persons, led by U.S. Senator Edward Gurney, (R) attended the dedication of the \$3.9 million Seminole County Courthouse in Sanford this morning.

An impressive flag-raising ceremony, under the direction of Commandant Captain LeBlanc of the Sanford Naval Academy, set the patriotic mood for the general public, who later toured the interior of this three-story landmark.

Senator Gurney was joined by County Commissioner Chairman Greg Drummond in the actual "raising of the colors."

The original plans for the edifice began in 1966 by the architectural firm of the late John Burton IV and upon his death, it was completed by his successors Gutman, Dragash and Matz, Inc. of Sanford.

County Commissioners will meet for the first time tomorrow, beginning with the work session at 10:15 a.m. in their new "quarters" at room 203 in the new courthouse. The room is located upon the north wing, second floor, of the new courthouse.

Scheduled for discussion is an ordinance governing plumbing contractors; a bedtime agreement; release of canal easements and flood control; building permits; Palm Valley sewage collection; Central Florida Utilities-Chulista extension; water pollution control contract implementation ordinance; a zoning variance; finalization of the county's annual road program; courthouse carpet averages and road annexation-Skyline's subdivision.

At the regular 2 p.m. meeting, the commissioners will consider the ordinance governing plumbing contractors; the bedtime agreement will be reported upon by the county attorney; County Engineer William Bush will give a report on a school signal request; and there will be a decision relative to the annual road program.

There are five public hearings scheduled for the 7 p.m. meeting of the commissioners. These include: a continued request by Sam Slomovitz for rezoning from M-1A light industrial to R-3 multiple family on property located on lot 14, Clelands Industrial Park; a continued request for rezoning from A-1 agriculture to R-3 multiple family on property located on Red Bug Road at Dodd Road; a continued request for rezoning from R-1 residential to C-1 retail commercial on property located on SR 419, Lake Mills Road on the north, and Cleander Avenue on the south; a continued request for rezoning from A-1 agriculture to CX restricted commercial on property located on the southwest corner of SR 436 and Winter Woods Boulevard; and a continued appeal to the Board of Adjustment in denying permission to park a trailer in an A-1 agriculture zone north of SR 46, west of Center Road on Spring Avenue.

At Winter Springs Council Mulls Insurance

WINTER SPRINGS — Following adoption of a hospitalization program last week, which for the first time covers city employees, City Council tonight at 7:30 meeting, will turn its attention to a divergent, additional insurance matter.

The insurance which the city has covering liability and automobile insurance, is due for renewal in March. Council will approve the coverage indicated and review the program of the city's needs.

Presently, the city is insured with Cass-Knoblock and Associates, Inc. of Casselberry. Council will also discuss social security and retirement for employees. At last week's council meeting, councilman Victor Miller noted the city has no retirement or social security system governing municipal employees at present.

Miller said the city may obtain social security by entering into an agreement with the state. The councilman, however, first queried whether the city is interested in the program and what type of retirement system is desired. Mayor Granville Brown in-

ferred to the city's zoning body last week.

When the plan was presented to council last week, considerable discussion ensued over a proper engineering letter. However, Mayor Brown said he had no objection to the plan if there are rights-of-way along Duskawilla Road.

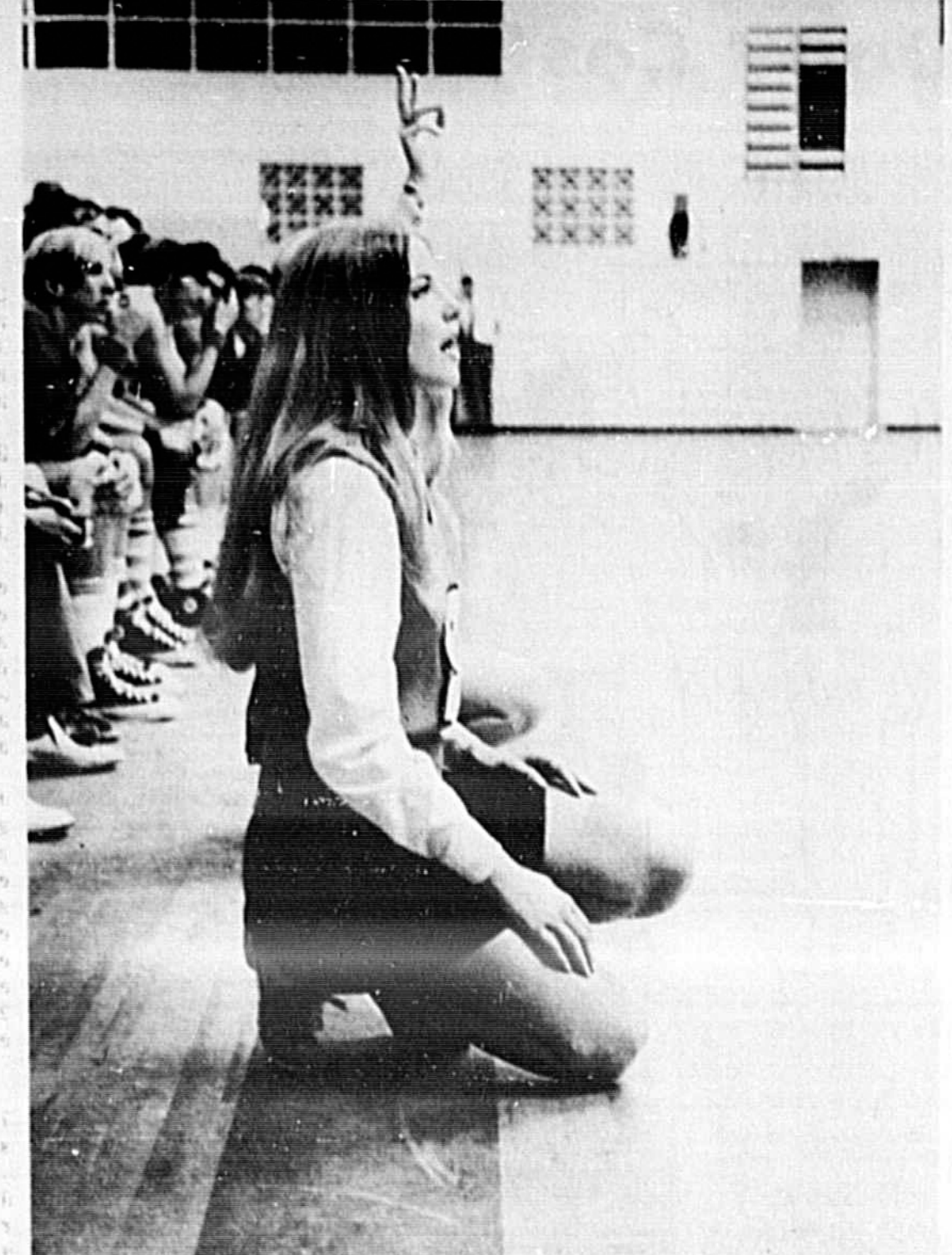
