



Officials of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) are of the opinion "any elected official who does not apply for federal funds should be impeached," Ken Brown said at this week's meeting of the CALNO Council of Local

Brown with Lawrence Swofford of Altamonte Springs and Granville Brown of Winter Springs stressed to Edith Duerr, acting mayor of Casselberry the necessity for CALNO and the added necessity of going across the county line to Eatonville and Maitland to encourage their inclusion in the

Swofford said the way the federal agencies are thinking in administration of federal funds is that any of the cities wishing the money must show a contemplated project is part of an overell plan for the area.

"Altamonte Springs has gotten \$6 million in federal money and we can get more," Swofford said. He predicted there will be only three sewer plants in operation in the area within the next five years and that federal money will be forthcoming by Dec. 31 for a joint Altamonte Springs-Longwood sewer plant on the basis of studies being com-

Swofford also said, Jack Ravan of EPA indicated, while he and Brown of Longwood and advisors were in Atlanta recently, that funding will be approved only for a joint system.



Food Stamp Program Is Discussed

Representatives of the food stamp program, Seminole Community Action and the County Extension program were invited to appear before the County Commission Tuesday, for the purpose of discussing the nutritional field worker

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has previously dispersed information on the nutritional food program through the Home Extension service as has the Community Action, also. Funds for this program have been stopped. Ruby Combs of the Community Action program told

commissioners that their program had attempted to provide food for unemployed persons, with restrictions as to medical and dental problems. She said that most of their funds were Chairman Greg Drummond inquired if there was any

educational effort connected with the program - efforts which might help those receiving help to a better choice of foods and to more nutritional methods of preparation and use of food. There was, according to Mrs. Combs, a hope to begin such a program.

Louise Gill, extension agent for Seminole County, said that there were 1,700 recipients of the food stamp program and she had prepared information such as the chairman described for these recipients. She said that she took the material over to the food stamp office for distribution, but then a recent check indicated that only a few of the information packets had been given to those coming in for their food stamps. She said that there were volunteers working on the program, but they got little cooperation.

Drummond inquired about the possibility of holding a school for volunteer field workers, to provide training in preparation as well as purchasing. He said that the food stamps program is not adequate under the present

Mrs. Gill remarked that nutrition is not a one day thing. And she reminded commissioners that volunteers have to be carefully chosen. Instructors must be of a certain calibre in order to acquire the information necessary and be able to

relate it to those who enroll in the nutrition classes. According to Mrs. Gill, the Food for Families program would include sections on basic information on how the food can help families feel better, be better looking and have more vigor. It will also deal with why families should use a simple guide to plan their meals and to improve their food habits. There will be sections on bread and cereals, which will help families choose and use cerals and breads to get the

most food value for their money. A special session on milk,



Although Jean-Claude's formal education has been relatively limited, in contrast with that of his father who was a doctor of medicine, he was immediately dubbed "Baby Improverished Haitians, accustomed to Papa Doc's iron-

fisted rule, showed no signs of discontent on his death, perhaps because the men who ruled the republic for the father were bequeathed to the son. Among them was Cambronne, who became Baby Doc's

bronne was ousted, may well have played a part in the fast

Marie Denise and her husband were exiled from Haiti during part of Papa Doc's 14-year reign, and they were sent abroad again last May, presumably because of difference with Cambronne, who was said to have enjoyed the support of the older Mrs. Duvalier.

Few details of the political infighting in Haiti filter out to the world, or even to the people of Haiti.

Trim White House Problems? No Way

WASHINGTON (NEA)

When President Nixon talks now of trimming back his White House staff and giving his department heads greater voice and authority, it is not unfair to remind the country that he said the very same thing in 1968, before he took office. This is not said to question his sincerity But it is a simple fact that he did not bring it off when he assumed the office in 1969, and a good guess is that

he will find it extremely difficult to do so this time, though his intent seems earnest enough. In the first instance, in late November of 1968, I wrote that what Mr. Nixon was promising would not work out, and the reasoning offered then strikes me as still applying. What intervenes here are the hard facts of life-the steadily mounting difficulties attached to managing a huge government in an ever more populous country.

Scholars who might be called basically White Housewatchers, and there are quite a few, generally note that the White House as an establishment has grown steadily in size, function and power since the days of Franklin D.

Many things lie at the core of this trend.

In times of crisis, the call from the country is for action. As the one great representative of all the people, the president is looked to as the initiator, the innovator, and the man who can make the engine go.

From Roosevelt's time on, we have lived on an almost continuous diet of crisis. For him it was both domestic and foreign, with the Great Depression and World War II. Then it was that the White House made its great leap

But the troubles and the tense days did not end when Roosevelt died and the big war ended. Since then we have had two more wars, innumerable economic recessions, flare-ups all over the globe. Often many at a time. So it ran through the presidencies of Harry Truman, Dwight Eisenhower (whose years are mistakenly remembered as "placid"), John Kennedy, Lyndon Johnson, The White House thus become the great locus of power the center of national management, not least because so many problems were "foreign" and the president's au-

thority in this realm is legally great. You can argue, from good evidence, that the natural consequence of presidential and White House growth is diminished power and influence in both the federal bureaucracy and the Congress. On its face, the proposition

Yet there is more to the matter than that. The bureaucracy burgeoned as government grew along with an enlarging nation. It became an almost immovable glacier. Presidents puzzled over how to make it move. The late Robert Kennedy, then attorney general and confidant to his brother, once told me: "We can't figure out how to get things going at state."



Two-Way Radio Is Too Overcrowded

The radio waves are a national resource which the government "conservatively" values at more than \$20 billion. That resource, especially the part set aside for land mobile radio, is seriously threatened today by congestion and interference, warns the General Accounting

Land mobile radio is the two-way radio used by police, fire and other public safety units. It is also a vital communications tool for railroads, taxis, truckers and utility companies, as well as a broad segment of industry. The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) re-

ports that as of June 30, 1971, there were about 215,000 land mobile stations operating 4.2 million transmitters, with the number growing rapidly. The Electronics Industries Association estimates that by 1985 there will be nearly nine million transmitters in operation.

But because the radio spectrum is a limited resource which cannot be expanded, the airwaves which these land mobile units have to share are getting so crowded that stations frequently jam each other's signals, sometimes knocking essential calls off the air.

In the Chicago area, for example, one radio police frequency is shared by 37 individual suburbs. An average department sends and receives 600 messages every hour, and police have difficulty getting as much as five seconds of free air time for a message. The problem is similar in other large cities. Sen. Charles Percy, R-III., contends that crowded police


