I hope all private eyes — especially the full-time, non-musicians among them — don't operate the way Staccato does. He's such a bungler that I wouldn't even trust his piano playing.

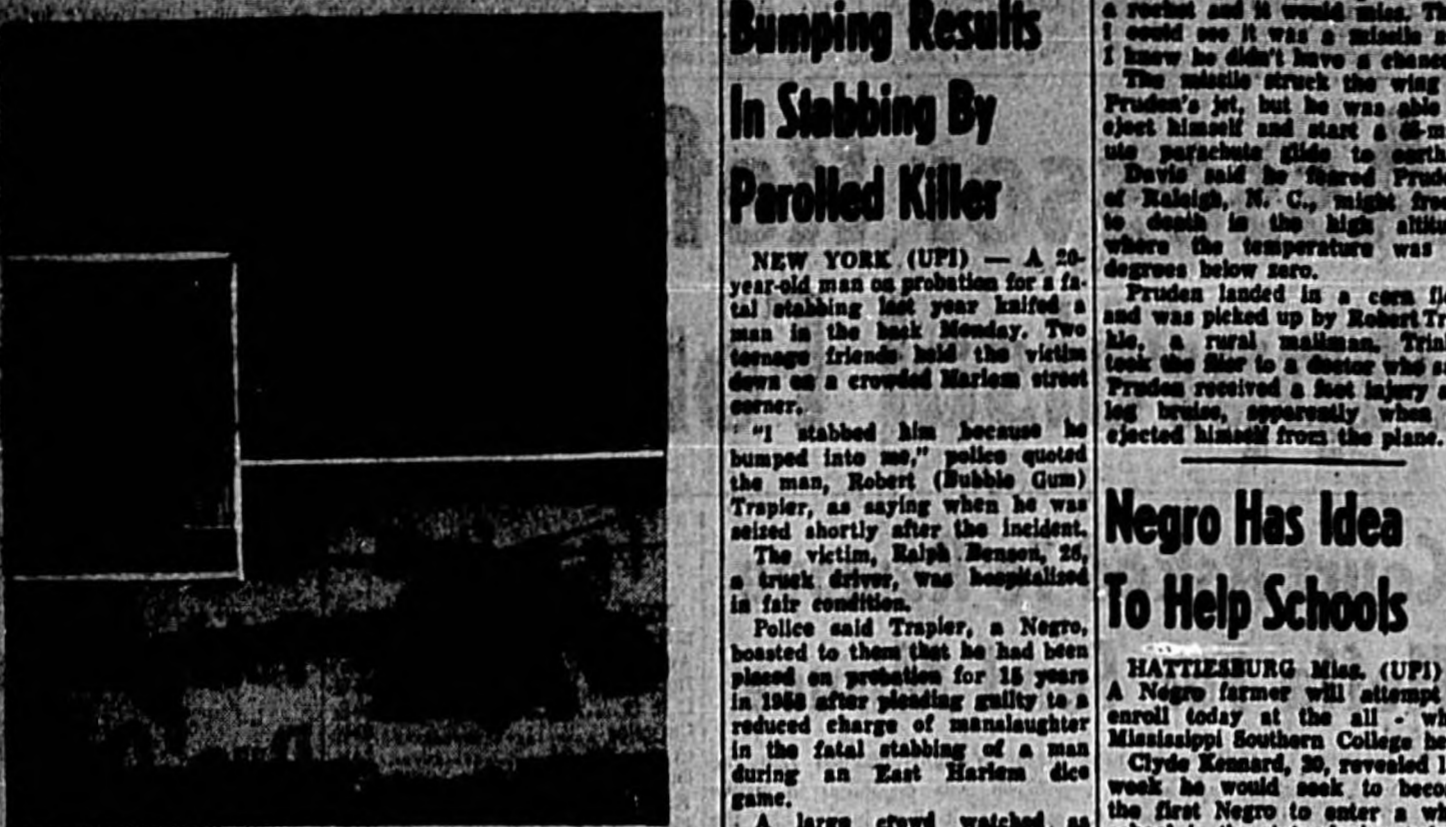

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Jet Shoots Down Companion Plane Accidentally With Missile Fire

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A jet fighter plane who shot down a companion plane accidentally with missile fire today, according to a report from the Pentagon. The jet was an F-105 and the companion plane was a B-57. The incident occurred in the Gulf of Tonkin on Sept. 11. The B-57 was carrying two B-29 Superfortresses.

CHICAGO (UPI) — Swift & Co. said today it has jobs for any of its 17,000 striking workers willing to return to their plants. The nation's largest meat packer said it is not reopening its strike-bound plants but workers are free to return and some already have. However, officials of the striking United Packinghouse Workers and Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen claimed there was no discontent among the strikers. "The strike is solid. There is no restlessness among the workers. They are mad over Swift's contract proposals which we have regarded as inadequate," the unions said. Federal mediators said they hoped to get the two sides together again this week. No talks have been held since Saturday.

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Bumping Results In Stabbing By Paroled Killer

NEW YORK (UPI) — A 29-year-old man on probation for a fatal stabbing last year knifed a man in the back Monday. Two teenage friends held the victim down on a crowded Harlem street corner. "I stabbed him because he bumped into me," police quoted the man, Robert (Bubba) Trapler, as saying when he was seized shortly after the incident. The victim, Ralph Benson, 25, a truck driver, was hospitalized in fair condition. Police said Trapler, a Negro, boasted to them that he had been placed on probation for 15 years in 1969 after pleading guilty to a reduced charge of manslaughter in the fatal stabbing of a man during an East Harlem dice game. A large crowd watched as Trapler plunged a four-inch bone-handled knife into Benson's back but, according to police, did not attempt to help the victim. Trapler was seized when, after fleeing, he returned and stood in the crowd, Benson, also a Negro, spotted Trapler and pointed him out to police. Trapler's companions, a Negro and a Puerto Rican, were being sought by police. According to police, the trio was walking along the street when Benson bumped into Trapler. A fist fight broke out and Benson was holding his own until two of the youths threw him to the ground and pinned his arms.

Negro Has Idea To Help Schools

HATTIESBURG Miss. (UPI) — A Negro farmer will attempt to enroll today at the all-white Mississippi Southern College here. Clyde Kennard, 30, revealed last week he would seek to become the first Negro to enter a white school in the state during today's registration. He said Monday night he intended to go ahead with his plan. "The state should let one or two Negroes into white colleges each year," he said. "Then the federal government would not interfere and the state could maintain control. "If I don't get in now somebody else will pretty soon, and it might be someone who doesn't care about Mississippi. I love Mississippi." Kennard, a bachelor who lives with his mother on a farm near here, attended the University of Chicago three years. He said he would like to complete his education as a political science major but cannot afford to leave his farm to attend any college but Mississippi Southern, which is near his farm. He tried to enter Southern twice before but did not press his application when officials resisted.

Square Pea Urged

CHICAGO (UPI) — The National Canned Pea Council said it would like to see the development of a square pea which would slip off the blade of a knife. "Really I was just a convenient glorified messenger boy, if you want to say that," he suggested. "You had the key to the door and you opened it," said Hebert. "That is correct," said Fechteler. Munitions Lobby Fails To Materialize

Washington (UPI) — I guess investigators have about given up trying to put a finger on what President Eisenhower called the munitions lobby. Chairman F. Edward Hebert (D-La.) after 25 days of hearings admits that his Armed Services subcommittee didn't find one of those terrible fellows who were supposed to be putting pressure on the military to buy one or another plane, missile, or weapon. True, the subcommittee turned up a whole bunch of high ranking retired military men, drawing nice pay checks from defense contractors and also substantial retirement pay from the armed forces. But these were all men of the highest fame and repute, and none of them was ever accused of anything improper. Mostly, they were commended for their patriotic service and zeal. Take this one hearing. The witness was Adm. William M. Fechteler, former chief of naval operations and later commander in chief of NATO forces in southern Europe. Fechteler was released from active duty on Nov. 30, 1954, and the next day went to work for General Electric. He got \$38,500 last year as a long-range planning consultant for GE's atomic products division. He also gets \$12,178 yearly in retirement pay from the Navy. Fechteler said he wouldn't risk his good reputation by trying to influence the Navy in GE's behalf. And besides, he said no man has that kind of influence. He said he never discussed contracts with anybody, in or out of the Navy. All he ever did, he said, was set up appointments for other company officials with people he knew, like the secretary of the Navy and the chief of naval operations.

Stockert Jr., 37, president of the Bristol Township School Board and father of five, told his wife in a note that "I am going away for a while. Will get in touch with you soon." He was reported missing by his wife, Mildred, 35, Saturday morning. Mrs. Margaret Connell, 28, mother of three, was reported missing by her husband, Edward, 33, Monday morning. Bristol police, who issued the alarm, said the two may be heading south, possibly to Puerto Rico, in Stockert's station wagon. They said Stockert, who is also Bucks County superintendent of bridges, may be using the name of Ben Steaton. Mrs. Connell, described as 5 feet, 6 inches, 120 pounds, with dark brown hair, worked at the Pennsylvania Turnpike Information booth one mile east of the Philadelphia interchange. Demo Congress Gives Two-Thirds Of Requests

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Democratic-controlled Congress granted nearly two-thirds of the legislative requests made by President Eisenhower this year. But some of the bills were controversial. They included school aid, civil rights, a postage rate hike and a wheat program. The Republican President sent the heavily Democratic Congress two dozen major recommendations this year. Congress approved 15 of them in some form. In a few cases, Eisenhower got less than he asked. In a few others, he received more than he wanted. Congress completely reversed his recommendation against starting new public works projects but it did override as Eisenhower voted for the first time to do so. It voted funds to start 67 new projects. Here is a rundown on how Eisenhower's proposals fared this year: Farm: Congress and the president stipulated in efforts to give the No. 1 farm problem-pooled surpluses. Congress rejected Eisenhower's plan for lower price supports. Eisenhower vetoed Congress' solution — tighter planting curbs and higher supports. Taxes: Congress raised the gasoline tax one cent a gallon, a cent less than Eisenhower asked, extended Korean War corporate and excise taxes another year and revised income taxes on life insurance companies. It did nothing about his proposals to boost the aviation gas tax and impose a new levy on jet fuel. Interest Rates—Congress raised interest rates on GI housing loans and on government savings bonds. It rejected Eisenhower's request to hike interest rates on long-term bond issues. Postage: Congress completely ignored Eisenhower's proposal for a nickel stamp on regular letters and an eight-cent charge for air mail letters. Labor: Congress passed a labor reform law generally along the lines Eisenhower recommended. It did not act on his proposal to extend coverage of the minimum wage law to several million more workers. Housing: On the third try, Congress passed a housing bill containing most of what Eisenhower asked. But it added authority for new public housing units which he opposed. Education: Congress brushed aside the administration's "pay later" school aid plan and rejected Eisenhower's proposal to cut aid to school districts crowded by children of federal workers. Civil Rights: Congress passed one of Eisenhower's seven civil rights proposals — extending the life of the Civil Rights Commission. It plans to take up some of the others next year.

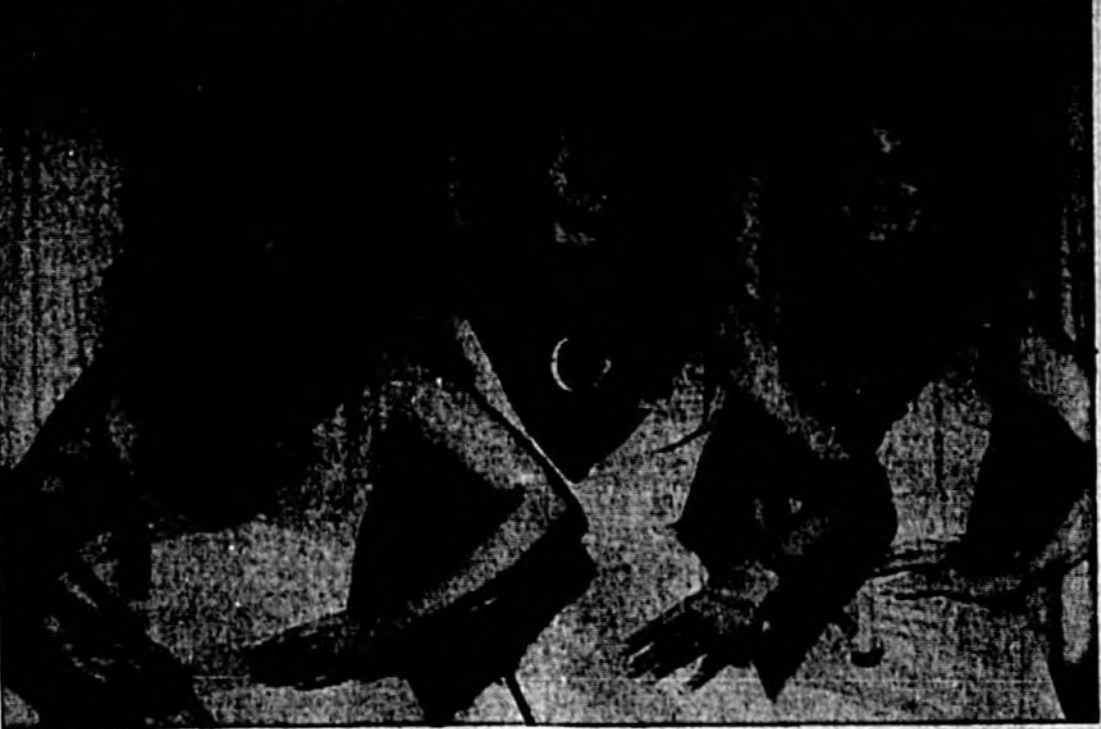

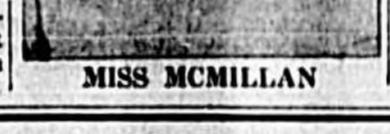

NEW YORK (UPI)—Fight promoter Vincent J. Velia will have his big chance to deny underworld connections today before the New York State Athletic Commission, which suspended indefinitely fight manager Gus D'Amato.

Velia and an unidentified representative of the district attorney's office were scheduled to testify at today's resumption of the commission's open hearing into activities surrounding the Johnson-Patterson fight promotion.

D'Amato, manager of former heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson, was suspended Monday for failure to appear at the hearing's first session. The commission had ordered his appearance in a registered letter sent him on Sept. 2. Chairman Melvin L. Krulewicz announced.

Velia, Harlem politician, was described as a "front man" for Anthony (Fat Tony) Salerno, missing Harlem mobster, during Monday's four-hour testimony by ex-promoter Bill Rosensohn.

Young Rosensohn was president of Rosensohn Enterprises, Inc., when he promoted the June 26 fight at Yankee Stadium, where Ingemar Johanson of Sweden took the heavyweight title from Patterson on a third-round knockout.

Rosensohn's testimony described how he became so financially embarrassed among Salerno, Velia, D'Amato, gambler Gilbert Beckly and Charley Black, a D'Amato cronie, that he ultimately lost not only two-thirds of the stock in his own organization but had to give up all rights to any share in TV, radio and movie receipts from the June fight—and future fights.

Welles Sues CBS

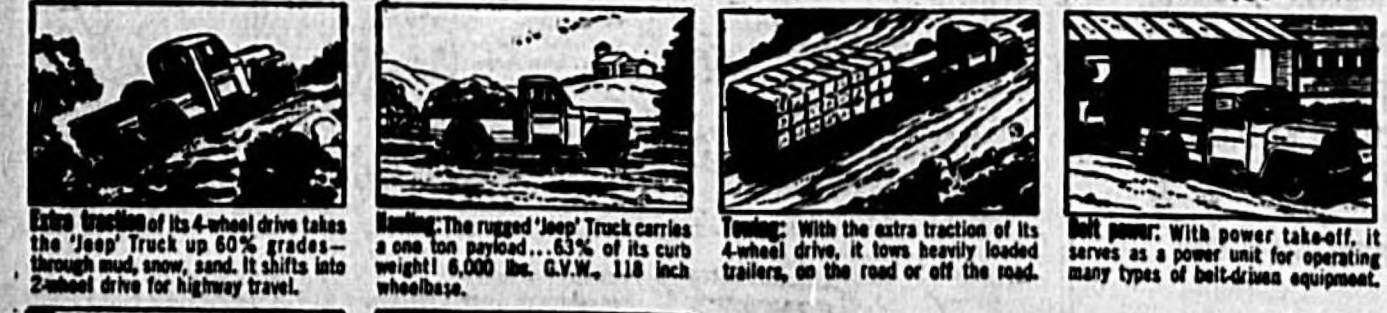

South's School Expenses Raised

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (UPI)—Schools in southern and border states increased expenditures for education 47.6 per cent in the period between 1952 and 1957, a school fact-finding agency reported yesterday.

A new book published by the Southern Education Reporting Service notes that much of the money was used to improve standards of Negro schools in the South. "The book noted that the South's drive to refurbish the whole education system" had begun prior to the Supreme Court's decision but that its progress had been "largely blotted from view by the anguished struggle over desegregation."
