

Fenske Gives Up Hopes Of Running Up More Records

LAK, CHARLES, La., Aug. 25.—With the same game that made him immortal in track history, Chuck Fenske has abandoned his fondest hope—a comeback on the cinders with another crack at the world's outdoor mile record.

Fenske, former University of Wisconsin ace. Before that he'd planned to try for fresh laurels after his year in the army.

Now, he's given up practice runs around army camps by which he tried to keep his speedy legs conditioned.

"My main job now is right here in this man's army and I'm forgetting everything else," said the 25-year-old Fenske, unburned, putting on weight and recently promoted a corporal.

"My running is all over now, it seems, but I would have liked another fling at it."

Here with the 138th medical regiment, Fenske helps tend hospitalized soldiers engaged in the mammoth Louisiana war maneuvers, acts as aide in the laboratories and serves as sports editor for his regimental paper.

His exciting indoor and outdoor duels with Glenn Cunningham, the barrel-chested Kansan, still have sports followers talking and both share the world indoor record of 4:07.4, though neither could touch the outdoor mark held by Sidney Wooderson of England. Fenske showed them both his heels in the celebrated 1939 Princeton mile.

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If the overwhelming vote cast in Tuesday's election reveals a predominating sentiment that Sanford's present hospital is not good enough, it also shows that the election results themselves were not good enough.

Although returns from the county precincts are not yet available, unofficial results in the two Sanford precincts show that 694 persons voted, with 417 in favor of the new hospital and only 277 against it.

Another election will now have to be called by the County Commissioners at some time in the near future for the purpose of authorizing a bond issue to pay for the hospital. At this next election it will be necessary not only that a majority of the voters favor the hospital, but also that at least 51 percent of all the qualified freeholders in the county actually vote.

This is where the difficulty comes in. It defeated the bond election for a similar purpose in 1937. In the second election supporters of the hospital project were able to get out 51 percent of the vote only with the greatest effort and by the narrowest possible margin.

It is estimated that there are at present approximately 3,000 qualified freeholders in Seminole County. This means that at least 1,500 freeholders must vote in order to make the election valid.

In Tuesday's election complete returns from the county may push the total vote up to around 800. This is some 700 short of the required 1,500 to constitute 51 percent of the freeholders.

This is not an impossible task. It has been done once before and it can be done again. But it will take organization and work. Those who are against the project, for whatever reason, generally will not vote.

But those excuses won't build the hospital. The only thing that will is a 51 percent vote with majority approval.

Back To The Source

The State Junior Chamber of Commerce has been rendering a distinct service to the state through its efforts to have cattle banned from the highways by legislative enactment, but so far its efforts have been unavailing.

At their mid-summer conference at Daytona Beach, says the Tampa Times, the Jay-Cees emphasized their commendable attitude by naming a committee to cooperate with the cattlemen in promoting the sale of Florida beef.

The road-cow problem has been alleviated in recent years as cattlemen realized that it is to their own profit to keep their stock off the open range and off heavily-traveled highways.

By acting to encourage this solution which attacks the problem at the base, the Jay-Cees, far from quitting their objective to end this traffic menace to the lives of Floridians and visitors—an objective which should never be abandoned—instead have commendably shifted their attack to skirt obstacles, some justified and some not, and to make the maximum amount of progress in as fair a manner as possible.

The cattlemen will no doubt welcome the cooperation of the earnest, enthusiastic young men and might well follow their example by helping the people of Florida launch the sound new tax program with fairness to all and special privilege to none.

By MAX HILL TOKYO, Aug. 21—(AP)—The foreigner, a bit uncertain as to which way he should go because the only signs were in Japanese, went down the stairs into the Ginza station of the subway, there to be engulfed by the mass of Japanese pushing their way into the cars.

He bowed politely to the man in the next seat and asked whether or the English were bound for Shibuya, and by many nations was (it was).

He was the only foreigner in the car. Around him on all sides were cold glances of suspicion. Why was he there?

The Japanese, unable to cast aside the traditional courtesy of the race, responded that yes, this was the train for Shibuya. Then he hurriedly got up and moved to another part of the car. These are usually Japanese (these troubled days who report fellow citizens

who talk with foreigners. Japan today is decidedly spy conscious. Strangely enough this development coincides with the arrival of hundreds of Germans, some of whom have definite official places in the business of censorship and allied matters.

Another foreigner, this time a newspaperman, invited a Japanese friend to have lunch with him, and the next day stern police were on hand to warn the Japanese against such associations. They wanted to know in detail what the two had talked about.

The vernacular and even the government have two favorite terms for the present situation. It is either "delicate" or "tense." Four years of depressing warfare in China have driven the Japanese to suspicious which are alien to their nature. They would like to be friendly, pleasure-seeking employes, but they can't.

Substantial Food Given To Soldiers

KISATCHIE FOREST, La., Aug. 21.—(Special)—The well used phrase that an army "travels on its stomach" may well be used in continuance, so the men of the 31st (Dixie) Division find on the field in Louisiana woods on maneuvers. This is not by any means their first experience on the field, with entire equipment there. They had long since been going to the field for three, four and as high as 12 day problems before they marched to Louisiana—two weeks ago.

The cooks in this division are field trained by actual experience, and the rations they serve are well prepared. The meals are not dainty. They are substantial food for 20 and 30 men, and they use plenty of it in the open. Field kitchens are efficiently mobile, having sometimes three times a day, setting up and preparing meals for men on the march. Strict sanitation regulations are enforced as to food handlers and men who do K. P. duty. No man is allowed to drink water until it has been chlorinated and inspected by health officers of the division. Water is often hauled for 20 and 30 miles to avoid use of impure or questionable drinking water.

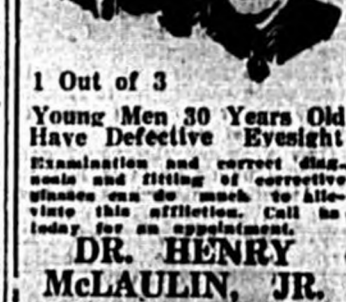

The Ocala school will be conducted by Frank S. Hanley and K. A. Spurgeon, both of Miami, Ind., and will have a maximum capacity of 200 students in overlapping classes. The first group of students, numbering 50, are due to arrive in Ocala on Sept. 10. Subsequent contingents will consist of 100.

Foreigners In Japan Are Spies

Till They Can Prove Otherwise

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He was the only foreigner in the car. Around him on all other cars, cold glances of suspicion were cast.

The Japanese, unable to read the traditional courtesy of the man, wondered that he, who was the train for Shikoku, then hurriedly got up and moved to the next part of the car.

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Latest manifestation of the suspicion attached to foreigners came with the new telephone and telegraph regulations. Inside Japan, except within the limits of the city in which you are talking, all telephone conversations must be in Japanese.

This rather effectively keeps newspaper correspondents in Tokyo, for few if any know Japanese well enough to dictate a story in that language.

Let a group of foreigners—Germans and Italians included—gather in the lobby of the once swank imperial hotel, and almost immediately an unobtrusive Japanese will be seated nearby, studying the ceiling.

Spearhead of the anti-spy campaign, which was marked by a week of special lectures, pictures and posters, is the severe National Defense Security Law, which includes the death penalty for some violations of its provisions; it applies to Japanese and foreigners alike.

Training School To Be Placed In Ocala

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—(Special)—Another primary training school for air corps cadets to be located at Ocala and to be known as the Greenville Aviation School, was announced by the War Department Wednesday. It will be the fifth contract-operated school in Florida, and will be used for training American flying cadets, probably about Nov. 5.

The other schools, currently operating at Jacksonville, Tallahassee, Fort Rucker, and at Dorr Field, Arcadia and at Avon Park, are now being used entirely for the training of British flying students.

The Ocala school will be conducted by Frank S. Huxley and K. A. Spurgeon, both of Munnich, Ind., and will have a maximum capacity of 300 students in overlapping classes. The first group of students, numbering 100, are due to arrive early in November.

Subsequent contingents will consist of 100.

Citrus Group To Oppose Imports Of Cuban Fruit

LAKELAND, Aug. 21.—(Special)—The Florida Citrus Commission will oppose any further concessions on the importation of Cuban grapefruit in a brief to be filed this week with the committee for reciprocity information, statistical and administrative agency in Washington for the State Department in trade agreement negotiations.

The commission went on record against the proposal, opposing further concessions, and is considering sending representatives to public hearings in addition to filing a brief.

Cuba at present ships grapefruit into the United States during August and September under a minimum duty of six-tenths of a cent per pound, or approximately 64 cents per box. The normal duty is 23 cents per pound, effective during the other 10 months. Trade agreement laws permit a maximum reduction of 50 percent in normal tariff rates, and this was granted Cuba in 1934 for the months of August and September.

In announcing its intention to negotiate revisions of the Cuban trade agreement, the state department made known that further concessions on grapefruit would be one of the items on the agenda. Any further concessions would take the form of extending the period during which the 50 percent reduction in normal tariff rate is in effect, in addition to August and September.

After slumping drastically in 1937 and 1938, Cuban grapefruit imports into the United States rose to 134,000 boxes last year, more than 75 percent was imported during the two-month period of low tariff rate.

Officials of the Citrus Commission stated the brief is in process of preparation and will be ready before the "deadline" September 8 in Washington.

Formal adoption by the commission of a policy of opposition to further concessions might bring similar action by members of the Florida congressional delegation.

Cuban grapefruit comes from the Isle of Pines, and already has made its appearance in the North Florida markets this season. Informal sources say this year's crop will run between 100,000 and 125,000 boxes. It is probable whether any concessions involving October or other months could be worked out in time to affect this year's crop.

Citrus Group Studies Hurricane Warnings

LAKELAND, Aug. 21.—(Special)—With the hurricane season close at hand, the Florida Citrus Commission, in the interest of owners of citrus acreage and property, has made contacts with the United States Weather Bureau to discover the most efficient method in which warnings may be obtained. It was learned that the Weather Bureau has established a special hurricane teletype circuit connecting all city and airport offices on the Gulf of Mexico and South Atlantic coasts from Brownsville to Jacksonville.

All stations on the circuit receive, instantaneously, all messages written on the line by any other station on the line. Also a teletype circuit connects the three forecast centers on the Atlantic coast, Boston, Washington and Jacksonville, to the hurricane teletype circuit. In this way, all special reports and all warnings and advisories are available at all connecting stations without loss of time.

Another Acting Barrymore, Diana, Goes Along In Her Own Sweet Way

The daughter of John Barrymore is one person the Great Profile won't overshadow. Diana Barrymore is a dark-eyed, dark-haired, spirited girl of 30 with the manner and voice of a woman of 30. She loves and respects the theater with all her Barrymore heart. She already has appeared in two Broadway plays, expects to appear in another in Fall, has had several seasons in summer stock, and says in the Spring she will join Hollywood's ranks. (A six month's contract was in process of arrangement when I talked with her.)

Diana spends money like a Barrymore; has a passion for politics; hates cafe society; won't discuss her love affairs; likes dancing, people, tennis, horseback riding and the Midwest.

Now, let Diana take the floor—that's what she did when I walked into her dressing room in the Riverview Theater in White Plains, where she was appearing in "Captain Jinks of the Horse Marines," 40 years after her famous aunt, Ethel Barrymore, starred in the same play.

"My career? Oh, I know what I want to do with that," she said. "Part of the year on the stage—drama, rather than comedy—and six months of the year in the movies. Some time I want to do a musical show. I have a sort of torch voice. I can do tricks with it."

"Most of all, of course, I love the stage. But I'd like to be in the movies as a money making business. Money slips right out of my pocket. I've made a lot and there's nothing in the bank. I don't know where it goes."

"Marriage? Oh, that can wait. I'm not engaged. No, I won't say who's head man. Daddy talks about these things. But I won't. They're not the kind of things I want to discuss."

Diana leaned toward her mirror and smoothed her make-up with a rabbit's foot. Above a pair of black slacks she was wearing a mannish beige shirt with the front ends knotted and tucked in, leaving a triangle of the Barrymore diaphragm in view.

As she cinched the knot a gray-haired maiden lady poked her head in the door to say "Just wanted to tell you how much I enjoyed you in the play. You're lots better than your aunt."

Diana answered her sweetly then turned to me with a big-eyed look: "That wasn't the thing to say."

Here are two more opinions on Diana's acting ability:

"Daddy loves my acting," Diana said. "I tried to get him to bowl me out. But he said nothing was wrong."

The next is the opinion of a producer. "She has real talent. But right now everything she does is overlaid with the Diana Barrymore stamp, instead of being given its own character. When she comes on stage, it's all Barrymore—and the rest might as well go home. But if she ever gets real direction, she'll be a star."

Diana has an unusual heritage. On her mother's side she stems from a New York social register family, on her father's from the royal family of the American theater. She lives in New York with her mother (Michael Strange, the writer), who is now Mrs. Harrison Tweed. A few years ago Diana made her debut and played around dizzily in cafe society.

"But you couldn't print what I think of cafe society now," she said. "I haven't been inside a night club for six months."

"I'd rather sit over a glass of beer and discuss politics. I'm crazy about it—read books and papers a lot, though I'd really rather get my information straight from people who know. I've always had a social consciousness, you know. Mother gave me that."

At this point two handsome males came in and took Diana off to dine before the evening show.

Will That Wheeler Roosevelt Feud Rank Among Classics Of History?

By ALEXANDER S. GEORGE
WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—(AP)—The feud between the President and Montana's "Betting" Burr Wheeler has become the No. 1 political/antiquity of the battle-studded Roosevelt administration. It may turn out to be one of the classic epics of American political history.

Since the days when silk-stockinged Thomas Jefferson and Alexander Hamilton almost came to blows in the cabinet of President Washington, the voters have been stirred by bloody-shedding feuds of this kind.

Senator Wheeler, long a rough and tumble political fighter, has been the generally recognized leader of the opposition in President Roosevelt's two most spotted political struggles—over the Supreme Court enlargement plan and over the country's war policy.

War, the threat of war and party splits have dramatized the nation's famous political antagonisms. Most of these feuds have been between members of the same party. One deprived Maine's brilliant James G. Blaine of the Presidency.

Secretary of State Jefferson and Secretary of the Treasury Hamilton frequently were on the verge of fistfights during cabinet controversies over the rights of

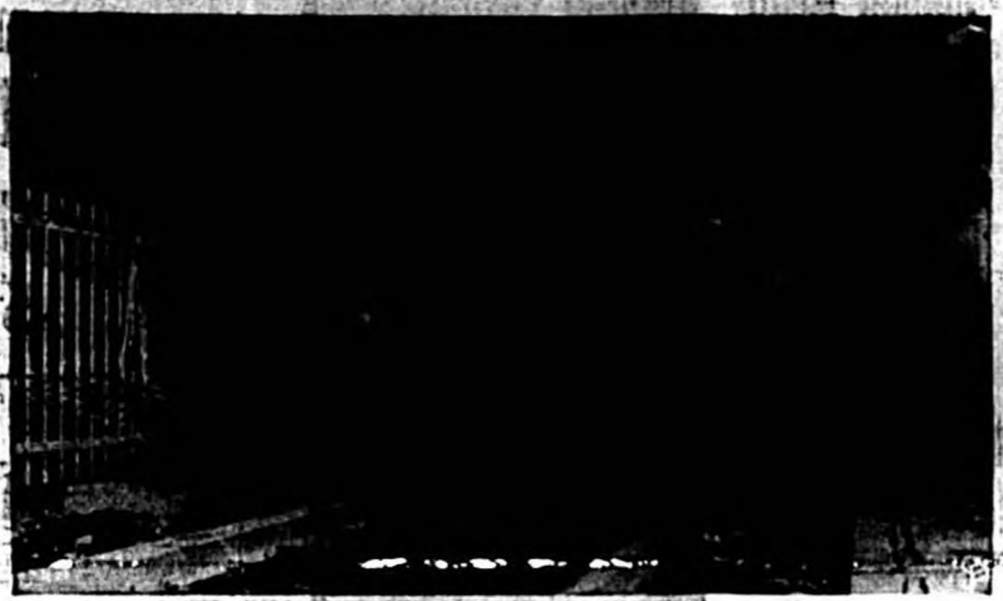
the individual and the separate states as against those of the federal government, with Hamilton the proponent of a powerful central government.

Although Federalist Hamilton and Republican-Democrat Jefferson were said to have tried to remove each other from the cabinet, neither leader publicly indulged in rabid verbal onslaughts upon the other. Their duelling, fist-fighting followers, however, tossed torrid invectives.

Federalists, shouting for war against the France to which Jefferson was friendly, thus taunted the new President, John Adams: "To Adams, may he say thousands of Frenchmen with the jawbone of Jefferson."

Republican-Democrats called Hamilton "an English monarchy-loving Tory" and spread malicious stories of his affairs with a Mrs. Reynolds.

The break between President Andrew Jackson and his vice president, John C. Calhoun, came in "an era of political hydrophobia." Calhoun resigned as vice president and won a seat in the senate when Old Hickory took a strong stand against "nullification." State-Righter Calhoun held that if an act of Congress seemed unconstitutional to a state, the latter might properly suspend or "nullify" operation of

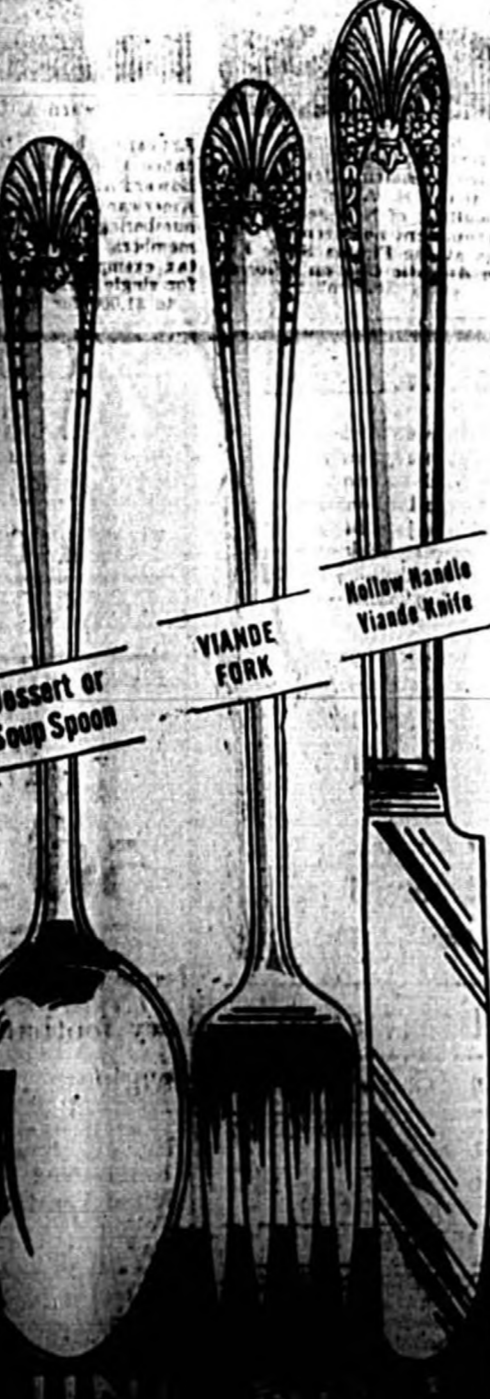

Defense Work Isn't Lagging, Roosevelt Says

President Sharply Assails Figures Mentioned By Senator Byrd Of Virginia

Plane Output Is Admittedly Slow

Surveys By War Department Show Estimates Being Met

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (AP)—Sharply assailing the figures cited by Senator M. Byrd (D-Va.), President Roosevelt asserted today that while American defense production never had been completely satisfactory, on the average it was up to estimate.

Roosevelt, commenting on Byrd's statement made earlier in the week that defense production is lagging seriously, asserted a War Department check showed Byrd was wrong in all categories except planes.

President Roosevelt said last night he thought that Democrats in Congress who have joined "obstructionists" of military preparedness were "in the wrong party."

In a message to the national convention of the Young Democratic Club, the President said: "I like the rest of you, but I don't like the way you are trying to keep us from doing what we can do. You are trying to keep us from doing what we can do. You are trying to keep us from doing what we can do."

That portion of the President's letter may prove to be the only statement of a political nature made at formal sessions of the convention since Homer M. Adams, national president of the club, has announced the gathering would devote itself to matters of patriotism and defense, leaving politics aside.

"I would be the last person," the President continued, "to dispute or limit the right of every citizen to express his own opinion and to express it as he knows best. But whether an individual who campaigns against the principles and policies of a political party retains the right of membership in that party is a different question."

"Patriotism is immensely more important than party loyalty, but when party loyalty goes hand-in-hand with devotion to our country, and a determination to keep that country free and safe there is no division of allegiance. I have no doubt that the youth of this nation... I only ask you to keep your ranks clear and clean of whatever subversive influences may seek to cut down its protection."

Subversive Activity Charged To Official
CHICAGO, Aug. 22 (AP)—Earl Southard proclaimed his loyalty to the United States and denied all charges of subversive activity Thursday before a court martial conducted by a secret marshal of Foreign Wars.

Southard, secretary of the Citizens Keep America Out of War Committee, was recently convicted of subversive activity under the Espionage Act. He was sentenced to 30 days in prison and a fine of \$500.

Teachers Must Be In Florida By Sept. 26

Efforts Made To Lay New Link In State Highway 44

While preliminary work is under way on State Road 44 preparatory to paving it, efforts are being made to lay a new link to this highway which would run through Geneva and Indian Lakes shores. Edward Higgins, secretary of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, reported today.

The "center line" or proposed route of the new link already has been mapped by engineers of the State Road Department. Mr. Higgins said, and surveys are being made so that the rights-of-way may be secured.

There was no indication of progress towards a solution as Jeffries resumed his meetings with leaders of the striking A. F. L. Amalgamated Association of Street Electric Railway and Motor Coach operators.

Earlier yesterday Thomas Donahue, chairman of the State Labor Mediation Board, declared "there are signs of a break."

He did not elaborate, and the mayor yesterday afternoon said "I do not share Mr. Donahue's feeling that there is a crack of light in this situation."

Generous motorists hauled their neighbors to work yesterday morning and home again last night, and interruptions in the city's business and industrial life were reduced greatly from Wednesday when the start of the strike at 4:00 A. M. caught Detroit's workers unaware.

Gas Allowance May Be Cut 40 Percent
NEW YORK, Aug. 22 (AP)—Federal authorities have before them all industry plans to cut gasoline consumption in the next two weeks in eastern seaboard states by 40 percent, compared with July.

Deputy Petroleum Coordinator Ralph E. Davis has a recommendation from the Eastern Petroleum Marketing Board for this drastic slash.

Meanwhile, at Hyde Park, N. Y., President Roosevelt indicated there was no objection to a congressional investigation of an oil and gasoline shortage.

Second Ship Fire In Two Weeks Rages

Finnish Vessel In New York's Harbor Burns Five Hours; First Officer Dies

NEW YORK, Aug. 22 (AP)—A fire of mysterious origin aboard the Finnish motorship freighter Aurora raged five hours today, the second ship fire within five days.

The first officer suffocated as he slept on the 4,965-ton vessel. Other members of the crew of 18, including two waitresses, were rescued by police and private craft.

Simultaneously, police announced seven more deaths resulting from the \$1,500,000 Brooklyn waterfront blaze Monday, bringing the death toll in that fire to 26.

Fire officials said 12 persons were still unaccounted for, while a Cuba Mail Line list, compiled from reports of foremen and relatives showed 18 missing.

No evidence of sabotage was uncovered in the Aurora blaze.

Auto Production Cut Of 50 Percent Seen
WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (AP)—Production of 1942 model passenger automobiles probably will be slashed 50 percent, defense officials said Thursday after announcing definitely that output in the first four months of the model year would be cut 1-2 percent.

A total of 4,297,000 passenger cars were made during the 1941 model year which ended the first of this month. A 50 percent reduction would bring this down to 2,148,500, the smallest in any year since 1934.

The curtailment, announced jointly by the Office of Production Management and the Office of Price Control and Civilian Supply will start at 25-1-3 percent for August, September, October and November.

Spanish War Vets Support Roosevelt
OMAHA, Aug. 22 (AP)—Joseph R. Hanley of Perry, N. Y., newly elected commander of the United Spanish War Veterans, pledged the support of the entire organization Thursday to President Roosevelt.

"We are ready to serve you, our commander-in-chief, in any capacity, and with the same loyalty, patriotism and devotion that we exhibited in 1918," a telegram sent to the President said. "You may count upon us to the last man."

Britain's Illustrious Is Repaired In U. S.
