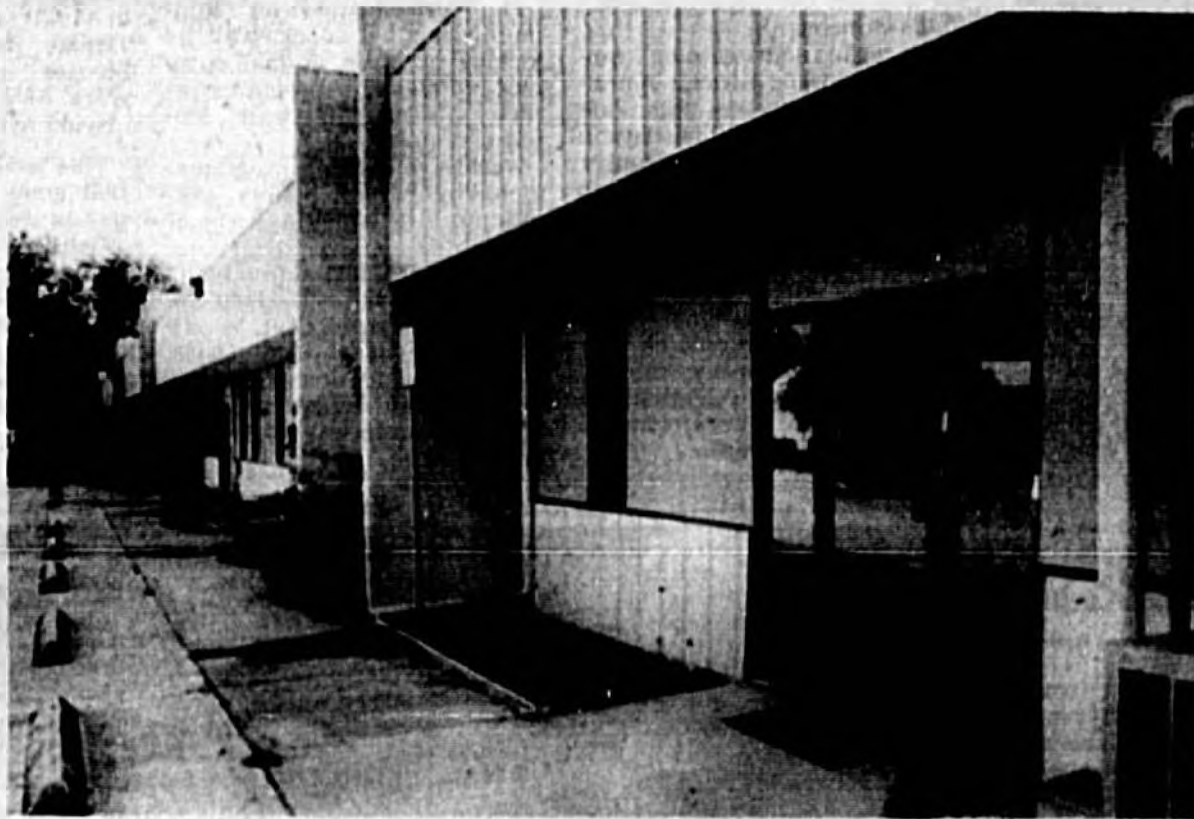

Agents storm area sex club Sheriff vows to keep the heat on

Citizens of the county wanted action, and action is what they received just before 10 p.m. Wednesday night when 20 CCIB (City County Investigative Bureau) and Division of Alcohol, Beverages and Tobacco agents raided a swinger's club at Midway Commerce Center in Sanford.

For the second time in the last seven months, agents stormed into a sex club known as Deanie's Warehouse. They confiscated beer, wine and liquor and took business records, surveillance equipment and anti-bugging devices.

The agents did not arrest any of the 12 club members, whom a spokesman said were fully clothed. In a previous raid at Deanie's in November, Lt. Sammy Gibson of the CCIB said agents found club members engaged in group sex.

Southern Baptists boycott Disney

The tensions between the two groups have been building for years.

Finally, yesterday, the two made it official.

The Southern Baptist Convention voted as expected Wednesday and chose to announce a boycott on the Walt Disney Company, including all her subsidiaries.

The subsidiaries include ABC television and ESPN as well as a gaggle of movie and television production companies.

The Southern Baptists chose to stay away from Disney and the subsidiaries because of what they perceive as immoral content in their movies and television programming and their "gay-friendly" policies.

The non-binding policy asks the 15 million members of the country's largest Protestant denomination to use their economic muscle to show the Disney people that their "anti-family and anti-Christian" morals are not in keeping with the way the American

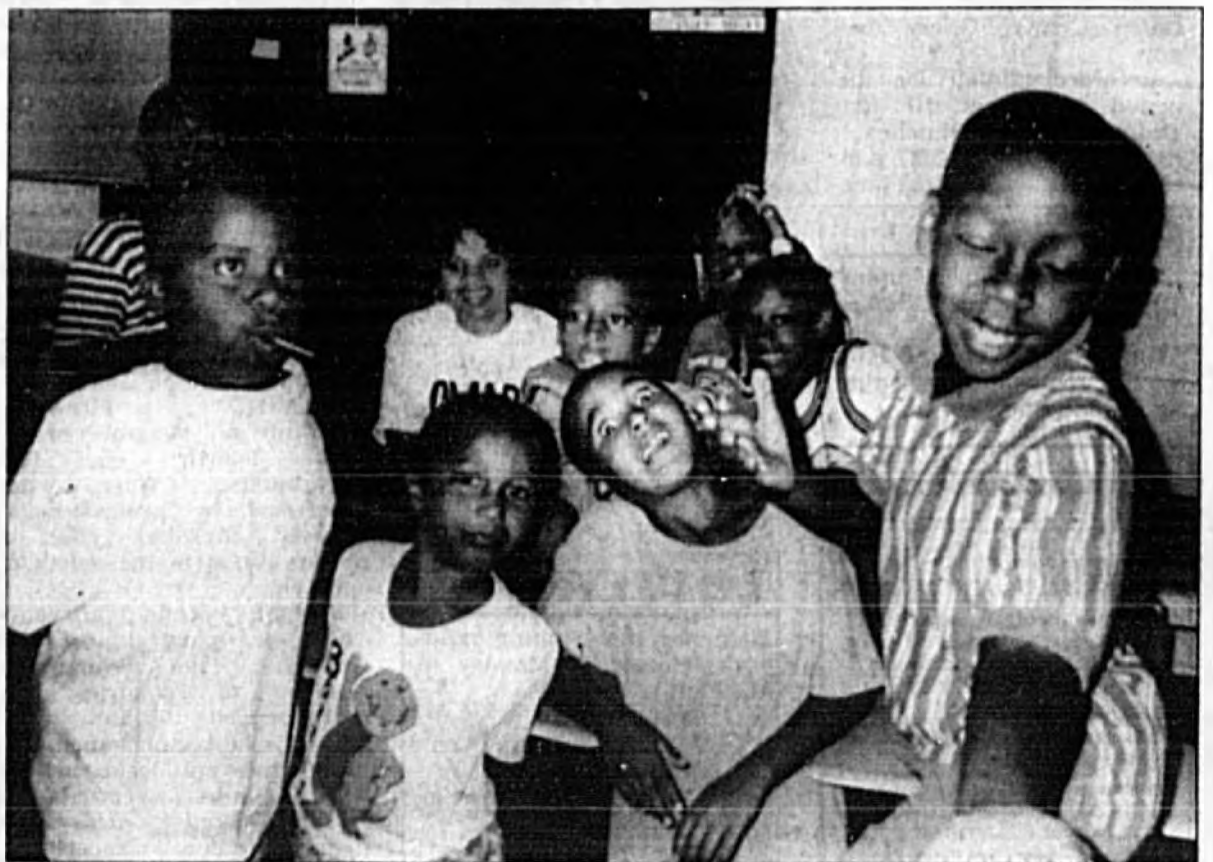
Getting smart is what it's all about at the Boys and Girls Clubs in Seminole County.

The Smart Moves program, which educates and helps children by teaching prevention and awareness, has been instituted in the Central Florida Boys and Girls Clubs.

Funded through a state grant, the national program covers topics concerning today's youth such as drug awareness, teen pregnancy, health, gun and bicycle safety, peer pressure, self esteem and respect. The basic premise of the program is that knowledge is power and the more kids know the better equipped they are to withstand peer pressure and to make the right decisions.

Vice president announces a grant to purchase land in Florida Everglades

MIAMI Vice President Al Gore traveled here Tuesday to announce a \$25 million Federal grant to help Florida acquire 31,000 acres of private land in the Everglades, marking the next significant step in the Administration's landmark efforts to restore this unique, ecologically sensitive area.

"I am very proud of the great strides this Administration has made in the most ambitious environmental restoration project this county has ever attempted," the Vice President said in his morning stop at Everglades National Park. "Parcel by parcel, we have acquired high-priority lands. They will help us both restore his pristine area and contribute to the economy of the entire region."

Along with the \$25 million state matching grant, the Federal funds will enable Florida's Department of Environmental Protection to acquire the con-

iguous parcels that were formerly part of South Golden Gate Estates, Lakahatchee Strand and Belle Meade.

Most of these lands will go to establish Pinxton State Forest in Collier County. The rest will significantly benefit Everglades National Park, Big Cypress Preserve and Florida Panther and Ten Thousand Islands National Wildlife Refuges.

Secretary of the Interior Bruce Babbitt, whose department is releasing the Federal funds, said, "These lands have a history rich in panthers and black bears, royal palms, bald cypress and rare orchids, but more recent history marred by failed land developments, hundreds of miles of dredging and bulldozing for canals and roads. We now stand at the verge of being able to turn Senator Bob Graham's Save Our Everglades initiative, from

his days as governor 20 years ago into reality."

The lands in question have faced increasing pressure from developers due to the rapid residential growth in southwest Florida. Their acquisition will provide not only environmental benefits to the Everglades ecosystem but also recreational and educational opportunities for Florida residents and visitors.

"This is truly a historic moment, almost 50 years from the day former Governor Millard Caldwell gave the Secretary of the Interior, \$2 million to acquire the last private land needed to complete Everglades National Park," Vice President Gore said. "The lands will be acquired can once again become an extraordinarily productive and diverse habitat for wildlife, plant and aquatic species."

Children and fireworks spark a dangerous combination

ORLANDO - Fireworks constitute an integral part of most Fourth of July celebrations. When not supervised by professionals, however, fireworks pose a serious threat to the safety of children.

In fact, because fireworks cause so many injuries to children, the American Academy of Pediatrics has recommended that all fireworks be banned, including those that are legal in the United States. According to *Prevent Blindness America*, a national safety association, fireworks injuries continue to occur because people don't realize how dangerous such devices can be. People often don't comprehend until they are hurt that the risk of blindness or injury outweighs the excitement of fireworks.

According to Joe Bob Pearce, nurse manager of the Children's Emergency/Trauma Center at Orlando Regional Medical Center (ORMC), most fireworks accidents are the most common fireworks injuries, Pearce said.

The major cause of such injuries is the malfunctioning of fireworks, many of which are illegal or unlabeled. According to *Prevent Blindness America*, bottle rockets are the most dangerous fireworks available today, accounting for the majority of all fireworks injuries that lead to permanent eye damage. Bottle rockets travel as fast as 200 miles per hour, explode in mid air and fly in any direction.

Pearce said eye injuries account for 16 percent of all fireworks injuries at ORMC. Thirty-five percent of fireworks

accidents affect the hands, while 29 percent affect the head. The skin, torso and limbs are involved in 20 percent of fireworks trauma.

Surprisingly, many injuries are caused by sparklers. "Most people think that sparklers are safe, when in fact they are the second highest cause of injuries that require hospitalization," Pearce said. Sparklers are dangerous because they burn at a temperature hot enough to melt gold—1800 degrees F.

"Most people don't extinguish sparklers completely," Pearce said, "which is especially dangerous to bare feet. And because most sparkler accidents occur among preschool age children, I urge parents not to give sparklers to children who are that

While the best way to ensure a safe Fourth of July is to avoid using fireworks altogether, Pearce recommends the following:

- Never use fireworks without adult supervision.
- Use only fireworks that are labeled with instructions.
- Use only fireworks purchased at a reputable vendor.
- Read instructions on fireworks labels before using.
- Have a bucket of water available for extinguishing fireworks after use.
- Never approach or try to relight malfunctioning fireworks.
- Use fireworks outdoors, never in garages or carports.
- Never put fireworks in any metal or glass container.

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Domestic partners law challenged

SAN FRANCISCO--The American Center for Law and Justice Wednesday filed a lawsuit in U.S. District Court in San Francisco challenging the constitutionality of the "domestic partners" ordinance in San Francisco.

"The goal of this ordinance is to destroy traditional marriage as the bedrock institution in our society and, in its place, substitute whatever sexual arrangements are currently in vogue," said Benjamin W. Bull, regional counsel for the American Center for Law and Justice. "If allowed to stand, this ordinance is a dagger aimed at the heart of traditional marriage."

The ordinance, which took effect June 1, requires all persons or entities doing business with the City of San Francisco

to provide benefits to unmarried heterosexual and homosexual "partners" of spouses of employees. The benefits include health insurance, retirement benefits, and bereavement leave.

In the lawsuit filed in U.S. District Court in San Francisco, the ACLU is representing PM & M Electric Inc., a California and Arizona general contractor impacted by the ordinance. The suit names as defendants the City and County of San Francisco and the San Francisco Human Rights Commission, which is responsible for enforcing the ordinance.

PM & M Electric Inc. is opposed to providing benefits to unmarried or homosexual partners of employees. Under the ordinance, if PM & M Electric submits a bid or enters into a contract with the

City of San Francisco, it can be subject to financial penalties and labeled an "irresponsible bidder" by the City of San Francisco which would damage the company's reputation and result in a loss of business for PM & M Electric outside San Francisco.

The lawsuit contends that the ordinance violates both the U.S. and California Constitutions. Specifically, the suit contends the city ordinance violates the federal Employee Retirement Income Security Act (ERISA) which regulates employer benefits and preempts any state and local legislation from doing so. At the same time, the suit contends the ordinance violates the federal Commerce and Due Process Clauses of the U.S. Constitution by attempting to regulate businesses outside of San Francisco. In addition, the

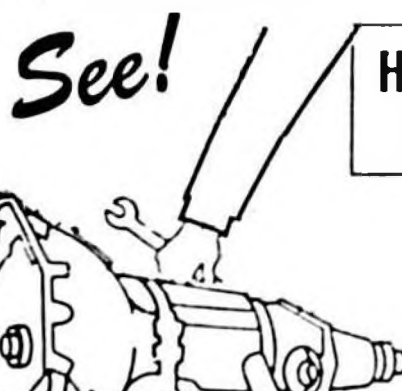
suit contends the ordinance violates the California Constitution which restricts the legislative activity of a city.

Bull said, "San Francisco is attempting to force businesses located all across America to adopt its extremist and radical agenda. Its efforts are not only wrong, but unconstitutional."

In addition to requesting that the ordinance be declared unconstitutional, the lawsuit requests an injunction to prohibit the City of San Francisco from enforcing the ordinance. A hearing date has not yet been set.

The American Center for Law and Justice is a public interest law firm headquartered in Virginia Beach, Virginia with regional offices around the country. The ACLU focuses on profamily, pro-life, and pro-liberty issues.

Tax package includes resident exclusion and college savings

This week Senator William Roth, Chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, released his version of this year's tax package. Senator Roth included both the Graham Principal Residence Tax Exclusion Act of 1997 and the McConnell-Graham College Savings Act.

The Principal Residence Tax Exclusion Act would exclude capital gains tax on the gain from a sale of a principal residence (for profit up to \$250,000 for single individuals and \$500,000 for married couples). To qualify, taxpayers generally must own and use the residence as a principal residence for at least two of the five years prior to the sale.

As in the House of Representatives' version, the legislation would make the capital gains exemption effective retroactively to May 7, 1997.

Under the McConnell-Graham College Savings Act, State-sponsored prepaid college tuition programs would be expanded to include room and board.

The proposal would also allow tax-free withdrawals from State-sponsored programs.

Thus, the benefits of the state prepaid college programs would be completely tax exempt.

The Senate Finance Committee must approve this legislation before it will be considered by the full Senate. Moreo-

ver, the House Ways and Means Committee approved its version of the tax package, which also included versions of both the Principal Residence Tax Exclusion Act and the College Savings Act, and the full House of Representatives is expected to consider this legislation soon.

Message of intolerance

Now that the Southern Baptists have made it official, members voted to boycott Walt Disney Co. and all its subsidiaries for "promoting immoral ideologies." We'd like to commend the Rev. Jim Henry of First Baptist Church of Orlando for considering the feelings of area Baptist parents over making a point that clearly penalizes them.

Henry feels the Disney boycott is a mistake, and we agree. Southern Baptist leaders at their annual convention in Dallas Wednesday voted with an 85 percent margin to shun Disney products and parks for its tolerance of homosexuals and for the adult content in some of its movies and television shows. Disney owns ABC.

The Baptists are especially upset that Disney allows "Gay Day" at the Orlando theme park. Disney does not sponsor the day, but simply realizes in a world of diversity, all people have a right to enjoy the Magic Kingdom. We are saddened by the Baptist stand. The very things Christ himself advocated: tolerance, forgiveness, love of all mankind, the Baptist leaders demand their followers, en masse, now forsake.

We would have hoped that each Baptist by the courage of his or her own beliefs, might have considered a personal boycott of places and things in which he or she does not believe. Baptists we know may choose not to watch the television show *Ellen*, whose star recently announced on the show, after much advance publicity, that she is a lesbian. Members of our own staff boycott companies that test products on animals. Most people every day choose something over something else, a small personal boycott.

The Southern Baptist leaders did not recognize the intelligence of its own members to make their own decisions. The world is a vast melting pot of culture, mores, beliefs and practices, including those of the Baptists and those of homosexuals. We think that diversity makes for good debate and allows us to compare ourselves along a continuum that includes all people. It is from there that we learn our place in society, be it a Baptist family man or a man committed to a homosexual relationship; a soccer mom or divorced lesbian mom; we are all of this world. All of have opinions that count.

And in an often cruel and senseless world, Disney offers some respite for all of us. A little magic in *Bambi* or *Hercules*, a few goosebumps in the Haunted Mansion at the theme park, a few dreams with *Cinderella*. It's too bad the Southern Baptists have chosen to abscond with those childhood dreams in all of its members. Their children are the ones who will suffer, not only from the boycott, but from the blind, blanket message of intolerance that Christ himself never would have sent.

Take-charge corrections commissioner

Without warning -- according to a current federal lawsuit -- a Georgia Department of Corrections tactical squad descends on a prison, hauls prisoners, some without clothes, from their beds, shackles them, and beats them. In passing, one of the officers takes a prisoner's family photo album.

Among the correctional institutions in the state visited by these black-uniformed officers in laced-up black boots, without name tags and wearing black berets is the Hays State Prison in Trion, Ga.

In a sworn statement taken in that federal lawsuit charging brutality against these agents of the Corrections Department, a guard at the prison, Phyllis Tucker, described an inmate's head being driven into a wall:

"The prisoner screamed. Blood went up the wall. Blood went all over the ground, all over the inmate. I heard a sickening cracking sound."

She was not the only member of the resident Hays State Prison staff to openly accuse the flying special corrections squad. An Atlanta Constitution reporter, Rhonda Cook, notes that other prison employees saw many of the invaders "jump on the backs of convicts sprawled on the ground."

These "shakedowns" by the black-clad

enforcers are part of Correction Commissioner Warren Garner's policy of not "coddling" prisoners. In the May 30 Atlanta Constitution, Garner wrote that before he came, the public had lost faith in the prison system that had "ignored the impact of crime" on the inmates' lives. He has said that one-third of the inmates -- the Atlanta Constitution reports -- "ain't fit to kill."

A former funeral home operator and state senator, Garner was called to deal with the living when he was appointed to his present post in 1995 by Democratic Gov. Zell Miller.

Garner is so conscientious a keeper of the inmates that he sometimes travels -- wearing the same black garb -- with his impassioned tactical squad to witness their ministry firsthand. And he has been seen congratulating them for their efficiency.

Mike Light, a spokesman of the Department of Corrections, has a ready spin concerning the federal lawsuit: "It's outrageous that the persons who have killed, raped, molested children and robbed would attempt to sue the state for pain and suffering."

That tactic might work. Most people these days, and not only in Georgia, consider prisoners to have even less credibility than journalists. But this time, so horrifying was the raid on Hays State Prison that veteran prison guards risked their jobs to tell, on the record, what they saw.

In a stinging editorial demanding that Gov. Zell Miller remove his corrections commissioner, the Atlanta Constitution pointed out that "like police officers, prison guards" do not blow the whistle on their colleagues. Usually, the blue wall of silence is insurmountable. But the fact that eight members of the Hays State Prison staff

What motivates these liverish pills?

Just to satisfy my curiosity, would the next mad-dog ideologue who writes me a sit-on-this letter throw in a paragraph or two about what makes you guys so sour?

I'm really intrigued. Is it some kind of special pill, say extract of gall? Or perhaps it is a daily glass of garlic juice that backs up on you? My guess is it's a special diet.

I'm talking about the thing, whatever it is, that makes you so dyspeptic that you can't even stand each other. The stuff that makes the young Turks in the House, say, turn on Speaker Newt Gingrich for allegedly being too nice to the opposition.

Right wing, left wing, I'd like to hear from all, although I admit I'm currently more curious about what makes conservatives so choleric and self-destructive. I already know the liberal regimen: They mix up a potion of dope and pudding and wash it down with booze and try to hitch a ride on a comet. Twenty-five years ago, it was the Comet McGovern. Now it's Comet Gephardt.

Take the invective the Republican right has been hurling recently at Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott. Here is a guy who is rated 100 percent pure by such pristine watchdogs as the American Conservative Union and the Christian Coalition, but perfect is not enough for the true sourballs. They want saints who will die at doctrine's stake ere they strike a compromise.

Lott supports a chemical weapons agreement, for example, and suddenly he's a snake. "Dear Trent," wrote Paul Weyrich of the Free Congress Foundation in a letter to Lott, "Words cannot properly express the depth of feeling that I have concerning your betrayal of your principles and all of us on the Chemical Weapons Convention. ... I no longer consider you a friend. A friend is someone you can trust. I no longer trust you."

Whatever it is the zealots ingest, Jesse Helms must gulp it. He has lately taken it upon himself to spike the career of William Weld, the Republican governor of Massachusetts. Bill Clinton wants to appoint Weld ambassador to Mexico. Helms, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, set his jaw and said no. He will not even permit hearings on the nomination.

Weld could be a brilliant star in the GOP galaxy if the radicals would let him. A Boston blue-blood, he attended Harvard, Oxford and Harvard Law. He is a family man with five children. He is a former prosecutor who served in Ronald Reagan's Justice Department. He was elected governor of Massachusetts in 1990 and promptly began pushing for tax reductions. He trimmed the welfare rolls and privatized state programs. A more resolute conservative would be hard to find.

Well, almost.

He irritated more than a few fanatics when he left the Justice Department as a protest to Attorney General Ed Meese's ethical lapses. He thinks the government has no right to compel women to give birth to unwanted children. He supports gay rights. He sanctions the medicinal use of marijuana. And he made the mistake, while running for the Senate last year, of not endorsing Jesse Helms' stewardship of foreign affairs. "I am not one of those who think foreign aid is evil," he said.

Next thing you know, Weld is up for a diplomatic post and Sen. Pruneface is on Fox News.

Girls have a sporting chance

BOSTON--Think of it as The Field of Dreams Theory of Social Change: If you build it, they will come.

In this case, the tool used by the dreamers and builders was Title IX. And the athletes who have showed up on the playing fields newly created are not mythological figures. They are myth-shattering girls and women.

On June 23, we will officially mark the 25th anniversary of the landmark legislation that banned sex discrimination in education. In honor of the event, the president quite properly reminded a pre-silver-anniversary crowd assembled in the White House Tuesday (June 17) that the federal legislature helped women in all areas of academic life, not just athletics.

But it's not surprising that Title IX has been most visibly and powerfully associated with women in sports. This is where the change has been most visible. And where the opposition has remained most tenacious.

In the history of sports, women athletes once carried extra burdens as heavy as the 30 pounds of clothing-floor-length skirts and button-top shoes--worn by a 1910 Vassar College baseball player. They carried the social burden that said sport weren't feminine.

There was always a handful of superstars who managed to overcome the odds. The indomitable Babe Didrikson Zaharias for example was asked by a journalist in the 1940s, "Is there anything at all you don't play?" "Yeah," she answered. "Dolls."

But as long as dolls and basketballs, dolls and baseballs, were at cultural odds, most girls sat out the struggle. Schools kept them on the sidelines cheerleading.

In 1972, Title IX was passed in the name of fairness. Why pay the tax dollars so our sons could play but not our daughters? But on a deeper level, the legislation was also about changing sex roles and self-images.

All in all, the change has been remarkable. In the time it took a grade school girl of 1972 to become a soccer mom of 1997, girls' sports exploded. Before Title IX, one out of 27 high school girls played sports. Now it's one out of three. Before Title IX, there was \$100,000 in sports scholarships available to female college athletes. Now there's \$180 million.

"What was barely a dream for my generation, is an expectation for the next," says Mary Jo Kane who teaches women and sports at the University of Minnesota. "Instead of saying, 'I hope there's a team for me to play on,' they say, 'I hope I make the team.'"

We built it and they are still coming. But the playing field is not yet truly level. There is barely a school in the country in

which the proportion of women athletes matches the proportion of women students.

Colleges budget about 25 cents on women's sports for every dollar spent on men. They award women about one third of the athletic scholarship dollars awarded men. Indeed in "honor" of this silver anniversary the National Women's Law Center filed complaints against 25 colleges.

The opposition is also surviving. From the very beginning, a composite including coaches and congressmen argued that The Field of Dreams Theory was an illusion. Some colleges fought Title IX in and out of the Supreme Court, arguing that females just aren't as interested in sports as males--even as that female interest soared with every opportunity.

They have also argued, bitterly that the expansion of women's sports comes at the expense of men's sports. But as a Women's Sports Foundation study points out this week, college men's sports programs have actually increased. The only schools that show any cuts are, ironically, the richest: Division I-A and I-AA. In some of these schools, football, the sacred cow, has become a cash hog, eating money that might be shared.

It does seem that the opposition to full equality in sports has less to do with football and dolls than guys and dolls. As Sheila Tobias, author of "Races of Feminism," believes, women athletes, like women warriors, strike at the heart of gender identity--how we define men and women.

Sports, she says, "has challenged age-old views of what is normal for males and normal for females. The qualities it takes to make a woman an athlete--go for the jugular, learn to be a team player, learn to be a leader--conflict with old ideas. The bottom line is that once women are as strong and confident physically as they can be, they won't be pushovers."

This may be the real success story of Title IX. Out there on the field of dreams, there are palpably fewer pushovers. Sugar and spice has made room for sweat and muscle. The game is by no means over, but girls now have a sporting chance.

One of the youngsters, Terrence Quinn, 8, was anxious to discuss what he had learned. "We learned about African dancers and we learned don't do drugs and don't mess with guns," the fourth grader explained.

Brother and sister team, Matthew, 8, and Jennifer, 6, Figueroa, have attended all six sessions so far of the Smart Kids portion of the program which is geared toward 6 to 9 year-olds. After 10 sessions, the children will graduate and receive certificates for their participation.

"This is good because we learn about safety and don't do drugs," Matthew said.

Vernon Johnson, 9, who will be attending Hamilton Elementary School as a fifth grader, also has perfect attendance. He recites all the topics covered so far by Torres such as gun safety.

"You never know when it will happen to you so it's important to know what to do," he said.

During a previous class, the children completed an exercise where they used a drawing of a map showing a child locating a gun and trying to find the dad to notify him of the discovery.

The drawing was done in a maze style, Torres said. "The children learned that if they find a gun they should not touch it and tell an adult as soon as they can," she said.

Torres, who was recently appointed program coordinator for Central Florida, is tasked with training Boys and Girls Club staff members to teach Smart Moves at all levels to kids starting at age 6. She currently instructs at all Seminole branches in Altamonte Springs, Midway Elementary and West Sanford. In addition, she travels to locations in Orange and Osceola counties. Peer leaders who have graduated from the program also help teach the younger kids.

There are 28 kids in her West Sanford group of Smart Kids and she is here twice a week. The children learn about self-respect and self esteem, Torres said, adding "It's very important to start teaching them young."

"It teaches them respect and they learn about how to communicate without being verbally abusive," she said. "The main focus is self-esteem."

Although there is an official manual for Smart Moves, Torres explained, the program is flexible and she uses additional outside sources such as visual aids and games and tries to stay away from the lecture format.

The next level of the program, Start Smart, is geared toward 10-12 year-olds. They learn about drugs and pregnancy, puberty and some anatomy, Torres said, noting, "we teach abstinence and do not teach contraceptive information as part of the program. However, she added, one-on-one, if a child has a question on contraception I will try to answer it and refer them if necessary."

Level three for ages 13 and up is called Stay Smart. The focus is on anatomy, sex, drugs and peer pressure. Although there is not yet a group for this age in the county, Torres said she expects one to be formed soon when school starts, probably at the teen center at Midway Elementary. She currently teaches a teen group at the Boys and Girls Club at the Coalition for the Homeless in downtown Orlando.

"It's not too late for them to learn, she said.

A questionnaire she distributes to teenagers offers insight into some of the things going on in a teen's mind.

When answering the first question, What do you want more than anything else in the whole world?, some of the responses were: a dad, to marry a rich man, and I don't want to die young. Another question, What are you afraid of?, elicited responses such as, my father,

drugs, don't want to be a bum or a drug addict and don't want to be homeless.

"They go through so much. They need somebody to care for them and to tell them they will be okay," Torres said.

Based on pre and post tests, Torres said her organization has noticed increased knowledge following the Smart Move sessions.

"They can change their behavior if they learn the facts," she said. "For example, we teach them that wine coolers have substantial amounts of alcohol and they shouldn't drink."

The program teaches them about choices and that choices have consequences."

Another exercise Torres uses with her classes effectively is counter advertising where print ads are shown to youngsters and they are asked to come up with a counter ad telling what the product really does. Torres uses the example of the Camel cigarette ads telling students to describe the effect of cigarettes. The kids also practice role playing, addressing peer pressure and resistance.

"The kids are very creative and artistic and this gives them a chance to use their abilities," she said.

Torres, a native of Puerto Rico, comes to this job with enthusiasm and optimism. A resident of Central Florida for nine years, she graduated from the University of Central Florida with a bachelor's degree in anthropology and she is working on her graduate degree in public administration. Prior to her current assignment, she worked as an education coordinator with Mothers Against Drunk Driving and before that she was a VISTA volunteer working with single mothers.

"I love doing this," she said. "We are also expanding the program to other agencies such as the Apopka Community Center. We'll be starting a Smart

Girls program focusing on self respect."

Smart Moves will remain an ongoing program at the Seminole clubs, according to Don E. Miller, area director. Miller said staff members encourage participation by the children and will notify parents with more information.

"Parents are always interested in prevention," he said.

Miller added the program is in place in Orange County schools and efforts continue to incorporate Smart Moves into Seminole County schools.

on mattresses in back rooms.

No sex charges were filed at that time because the activities at the private club did not involve prostitution. As a private club, Deanie's Warehouse operates under a less stringent set of rules than clubs open to the general public. Customers pay a \$20 membership fee and \$35 for each visit.

A Deanie's Warehouse employee told the Sanford Herald on Friday that women "rule the roost" and that men who won't take "no" for an answer are escorted from the building by security.

The employee also said the club provides complimentary beer, wine and mixers and that its members are allowed to bring their own liquor.

The owners of the club were charged in November with selling alcohol illegally, and the state beverage division is expected to file new charges with the State Attorney's Office according to Seminole County Sheriff Don Eslinger.

"We are absolutely delighted to assist the beverage department," Eslinger said this morning. "We have made a commitment to work together to ensure that places such as this follow the law."

Surprisingly, Deanie's Warehouse, which is identified on its front entrance at 5461 Bryant Ave. as Deanie's Lodge Inc. has established itself in the Midway Commerce Center, which is headquarters for the Central Florida Chapter of Paralyzed Veterans of America and the Florida District of Kiwanis International.

"We were stunned when we found out what's been going on," said John Paskoski, president of the Midway Commerce

Center Property Owners Association. Paskoski and others from the center registered their complaints at last Tuesday's Board of County Commissioners meeting.

BCC Chairman Randy Morris said that Wednesday's raid of Deanie's Warehouse was "serious evidence" that law enforcement is going to keep the heat on sexually-oriented businesses such as Deanie's. "This is just the beginning," Morris said. "The people who live and work in this community have a legitimate concern. They got results last night - 20 agents in that raid."

The county is drawing up strict new adult-entertainment ordinances, which will be approved at a BCC public hearing Tuesday at 7 p.m. At the same time, the county is engaged in

what figures to be the first of many, drawn-out court battles against the adult entertainment industry.

There are many complexities, including just where adult-entertainment and sexually-oriented businesses are going to be located. The majority of the existing clubs are located along U.S. Highway 17-92 in Fern Park and Casselberry. An effort to relocate them in the Sanford area is being fiercely challenged by Mayor Larry Dale and the citizens of the community.

The two sites proposed by the county's planning and development are both in Sanford - one near the airport and the other at Midway Commerce Park.

"It's going to take a team effort to win this war," Morris said. "But it will be won."

people think. By an 85 percent margin, the group overwhelmingly made the choice.

The Baptists have contended that they disapprove of the company's policies of allowing homosexual employees to include their partners on insurance and other benefits packages and for advocating "homosexuality, infidelity, and adultery, which are biblically reprehensible and abhorrent to God" by allowing activities such as Gay Day to take place in their Orlando theme parks.

Local church ministers have been relatively silent on the matter since the Convention began asking the Disney company to change its ways two years ago.

Officials at Disney noted comment on the announced boycott this morning.

Instead they issued a tersely-worded official statement: "We are proud that the Disney brand creates more family entertainment of every kind than anyone else in the world. We plan to continue our leadership role and, in fact, we will increase production of family entertainment."

testified against the commissioner's special traveling squad means they can't easily be dismissed as soft-hearted prison reformers." Steve Bright, director of the Southern Center for Human Rights in Atlanta -- which represents prisoners shorn of their constitutional rights -- tells me that unlike the Atlanta Constitution, most of the other papers in Georgia have been largely indifferent to what could be a historic prisoners-rights lawsuit.

The attorney bringing this federal lawsuit, Robert Bensing, is on the staff of the Southern Center for Human Rights. During a deposition, he interviewed Linda Hawkins, a guard at Hays Stair. After watching the work of Wayne Garner's peacekeepers, "I went to my office and cried. Then I went to the restroom and threw up."

Magic need an attitude—and Rodman would give them one

What's so bad with the idea of a cross-dressing guy with pink hair and the temptation to kick men in the groin, joining the Orlando Magic?

Dennis Rodman is the man in question and, while he may not fit the Magic's Magic Kingdom image, he fits the image of a Chuck Daly player who knows how to get his hands dirty and mix it up inside.

Rodman's fingernails may be chartreuse, but at least there's dirt underneath. Flash back to the original Bad Boys of the NBA. In the late 80's, Daly drafted an unknown out of Southeast Oklahoma A&M Southern State, or some godawful place like that, and turned him from an unknown NAIA player to the best rebounder in basketball.

Daly also shares something with Ru-Paul: he's got Rodman's respect.

After helping the Pistons to NBA titles, Daly left Detroit and Rodman followed, heading for San Antonio where he got to play for one of Orlando's other candidates for the recent coaching opening, Bob Hill.

In his autobiography, *Bad As I Want To Be*, Rodman showed the respect he has for 99 percent of the coaches in the NBA. Hill was referred to as "Boner."

Daly was called "God." When Rodman wants to, he can be the best rebounder in the NBA. He can take over a game physically and, more importantly, mentally.

Remember how he single-handedly turned the Seattle Supersonics into mental patients during last year's NBA finals and how the Miami Heat was more focused on Rodman than winning during the Eastern Conference finals last month?

That's what Rodman brings to the table and, if you can turn your head and giggle at all the other "stuff," Rodman is the perfect addition to a team in need of an attitude.

That team is Orlando.

First off, Rodman will need to accept a pay cut. None of the other so-called glamour teams in the NBA, including the Magic, have the kind of money to give Rodman anything near what Chicago paid him this season.

Second, Chicago has to decide if they want to put up with Rodman for one more season. All indications are they don't. Besides, Jason Caffey proved during each of Rodman's suspensions that he is capable of stepping in while helping jump start the Bulls' youth movement.

If that happens, Rodman is a man without a team in a league where few teams would be willing to take a chance.

Orlando doesn't have the money but they have "God," a coach Rodman respects and a team where he clearly is needed. If Daly wants to coach the Magic like he coached in Detroit, he needs an intimidating rebounder, certainly not Horace Grant. He also needs someone to start a fire under a team which could be awesome one night and lose a home game to Philadelphia the next.

Remember one more thing. Rodman is a winner.

Only two other players in the NBA - Michael Jordan and Scottie Pippen - have more rings than Rodman's four (two in Detroit, two in Chicago).

Except for Horace Grant, the Magic have a team of players who have suffered more than their share of playoff sweeps and don't know what crunch time in a Game 7 is like.

Rodman, who probably needs another ring for his nose, is a winner.

Don't let the act fool you.

Last Second Shot: Wouldn't Brian Hill be better off ignoring the Vancouver opening and waiting for something more attractive to come along? Last season, seven NBA coaches were fired in mid-season and Hill is on the short list of a lot of teams with potential coaching openings this fall.

Congresswoman Brown offers Bill to honor women athletes

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congresswoman Corrine Brown last night announced her bill to honor the beginning of two new women's professional basketball leagues: the American Basketball League (ABL) and the Women's National Basketball

Association (WNBA).

Congresswoman Brown made the following statement during a special order last night:

"Women's basketball has come a long way. Even though the first national women's basketball tournament took place in 1926, college educators opposed basketball for women. They believed that women

weren't adequately prepared for such a rough game, and that the game of basketball was not an appropriate sport for women.

"The stereotype of women's inability to play basketball and other sports carried into the second half of the century. By 1970, only one out of 27 women participated in any kind of high school sport. It wasn't until

1972, with the passage of Title IX to the High Education Act, when women's participation in basketball began to increase.

"It was this amendment that guaranteed the success of women's sports and created a fair, level playing field for sports equity. Now it's 1997, and we are celebrating the 25th anniversary of Title IX of the High

Education Act. One out of every three high school girls participates in a sport, and basketball is recognized by girls as the most popular youth participation sport in the nation.

"In college, participation and attendance at women's basketball games have been at their highest ever. Since 1982, women's attendance at National

Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) sports events has steadily increased from 1.1 million to 4.2 million.

"Because the female student-athlete participation rate is at its highest ever, there were more women's basketball teams sponsored by NCAA institutions than men's basketball

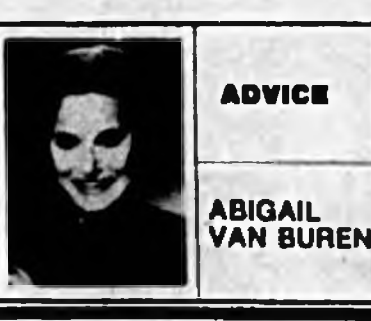

Heart condition needs diagnosis



DEAR DR. GOTT: About two months ago, I had a considerable amount of fluid removed from my heart sac. Despite the use of cortisone, I have continued to have a cough and low-grade fever. For the past two weeks, I've noticed increasing shortness-of-breath. Has the fluid returned? What should I do?

DEAR READER: The condition you describe is called a pericardial effusion: the appearance of fluid around the heart under the pericardium (the thin, tough, unexpandable membrane that surrounds the heart).

This is an extremely serious disorder, because as the amount of fluid increases, it presses against the heart, preventing the cardiac chambers from completely filling with blood. As cardiac filling is progressively compromised, there is less blood expelled, so circulation becomes deficient and heart failure will occur. Unless the effusion is removed with a needle (to allow the heart chambers to re-expand), the affliction can be fatal.

There are many causes of pericardial effusion, including various virus infections, Lyme disease, tuberculosis, rheumatoid arthritis, lupus, pneumonia, renal failure, cancer, radiation, and trauma. Thus, testing is often extensive. In many cases, however, no cause can be identified. Symptoms include cough, difficulty breathing and pain. Fever may or may not be present.

The diagnosis is suggested by certain findings on the physical examination and the cardiogram, but is confirmed by a cardiac ultrasound, which usually conclusively demonstrates the fluid beneath the pericardium.

Aside from withdrawing the fluid and analyzing it in the lab, therapy depends on the cause. As a practical matter, cortisone is usually prescribed because it reduces inflammation and retards the fluid buildup. I do not know the cause of your pericardial effusion, but given your increasing breathlessness, I am concerned that the fluid has returned. In my opinion, you need immediate medical attention from a cardiologist, including another ultrasound exam. If an effusion is present, it will have to be drained again — only this time, the doctor may choose to perform a procedure called "pericardial window," during which part of the sac is surgically removed to prevent fluid accumulation and subsequent heart failure.

Keep me informed of your progress. DEAR DR. GOTT: What can be done about neck wrinkles? I'm a healthy 68-year-old woman who used to bask in the sun. Now my skin seems to have lost its elasticity. Although I no longer sunbathe, my sagging skin looks older than I feel. Moisturizing lotions have not helped the problem.

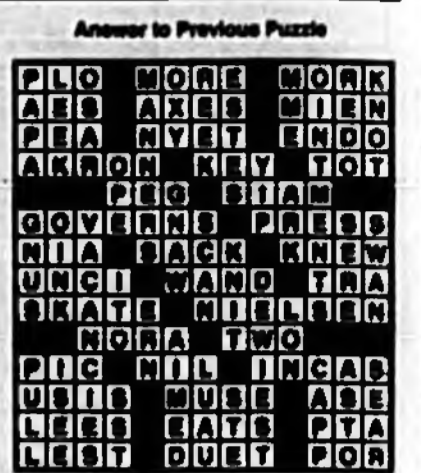
DEAR READER: One of the unpleasant consequences of the aging process is loss of skin elasticity, with resulting wrinkles and sagging. This tendency can be markedly aggravated by chronic exposure to sunlight. Given your history, I'm afraid that the damage has been done. Creams

and lotions will not cause your skin to regain its youthful turgor. I believe that your best bet would be to see a plastic surgeon. Smoothing out neck wrinkles is not particularly difficult surgery and most cosmetic surgeons are quite adept at removing the sagging tissue.

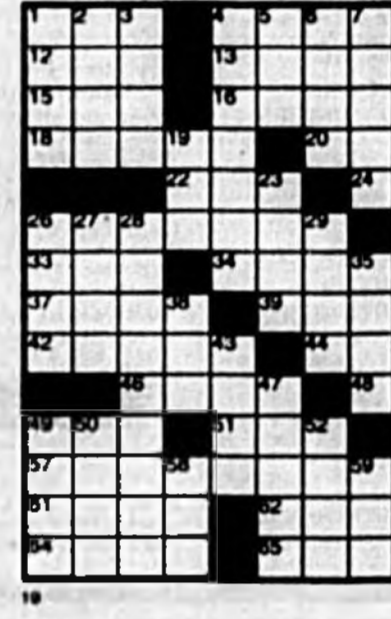
Although such a procedure is expensive and will probably not be covered by insurance (because it is for cosmetic reasons only), the end result may be more than worth the price. Small wrinkles and crow's feet can often be treated successfully with special creams (of which there are many brands).

However, in my experience, more extensive wrinkling almost always requires surgical correction.

WIN AT BRIDGE

A deal of capital letters

Golfers say that when they are playing well, the cup looks like a bucket. On this deal, Geir Helgemo, the Norwegian Tiger Woods of bridge, probably felt that the cards were the size of advertising boards. The deal occurred during his team's victory in the Open Swiss Teams at the Spring Nationals in Dallas last March. West opened with a modern weak two-bid. Then, over East's jump to game, Helgemo boldly bid six diamonds. No laying up for him. A club lead is lethal, but not surprisingly West selected the heart king. After ruffing and drawing trumps, Helgemo needed three spade tricks. He began with the spade two, four, seven, jack. East returned the spade five. How did Helgemo read the position?

Being vulnerable, East probably had four trumps to jump to four hearts. And if West had opened with a five-card suit, Helgemo judged he was more likely to have begun with 2-5-1-3 distribution than 3-5-1-4. (If spades were 3-3, Helgemo could run the suit from the top.) And if West had begun with a doubleton spade, there was only one hope. So, Helgemo played the spade six from his hand, winning the trick with dummy's nine! Helgemo cashed the ace-king of spades (discarding a club from the dummy), took the club ace, and ruffed his club loser in the dummy. Give Helgemo the green jacket! This outstanding piece of card-reading makes Helgemo the favorite to win the Best-Played Deal of the Year award from the International Bridge Press Association. Helgemo's teammates were Bart Bramley, Brian Giubok, Edgar Kaplan, Norman Kay and Walter Schafer.
