There was no indication as to when he might be released.

Student drug use dips Officials credit county school programs for reversing trend

SANFORD -- Nationally, smoking and drug use smong young people rose last year, reversing a three-year trend, a survey found, but the trend does not seem to hold true for most of Seminole County.

According to Edie Valentine, a drug prevention According to Edie Valentine, a drug prevention specialist with the Seminole County school district, drug use overall in the district means to be down, though she said education is still needed if the problem is to be eliminated. The national survey released varies this week by the nonprofit Parents Resource institute for Drug Education was based on written responses from 212,802 tunior high and bits acheed

from 212.802 junior high and high school students in 54 states.

The students, in questionnaires distributed by teachers during the 1991-93 achool year, were asked if they had used eignreties, beer, wine coolers, hard liquor, marijuana, cocaine, uppers, downers, hallucinogens or inhalants.

The number of incidents are rather low.

Valentine said the school district has not done any formal surveys of the drug usage of students, but has spent a great deal of time and effort on the education of students as young as kin-

dermaten. "We not only teach the dangers of drugs, but also work on esteem building and things of that nature with the students."

Among students in grades six through eight, usage was more widespread in all 10 categories, with the biggest increase - 20 percent - in halfucinogens and inhalants. Almost one third reported drinking herr and wine coolers at least once last year, one-burth said they smoked, and one-fifth drank liquor.



Telephone service restored to jail, customers after accidental cable cut

'Quiet' neighbors busted **Cops uncover** drug operation

SANFORD - A Lake Mary couple described as quiet, very friendly neighbors and a Sanford businessman were charged with cultivation of a major marijuana operation near Mount Plymouth.

"This was a pretty big operation." said Orange County sheriff's spokesman Carlos Padilla. Agents with the U.S. Drug En-

forcement Agency and Orange County Sheriff's Office raided the rural site at 2020 Haas Road, west of Wekiwa Springs State Park. Agents report about 1.000 pot plants were seized and 60 bags. containing about a pound of mari-juana each, were setzed. The haul was valued at between \$1 million and \$2 million.

A DEA agent said investigators did not know how extensive the distribution network was, but an investigation is continuing, he said.



Lehman endorses Alcee Hastings

PLANTATION - Retiring 10-term U.S. Rep. William Lehman has endorsed House nominee Alcee Hastings, who's courting Jewish voters.

Hastings announced the endorsement during a breakfast meeting of western Broward County political activities at Temple Kol-Ami. The former federal judge said he will represent all his district's groups and pledged strong support of Israel in Congress.

Official disputes EPA water study

PENSACOLA - A utility official has disputed an Environ-mental Protection Agency study that ranks Escambia County's drinking water second nationally in the amount of excessive lead content.

Random samplings of drinking water at 120 Penascols area homes found an average lead level second only to Charleston, S.C., the federal agency announced Tuesday. Escambia's water samples contained an average 175 parts per billion of lead compared to 211 parts per billion in Charleston.

Executive Director A.E. Van Dever of the Escambia County Utilities Authority said follow-up tests indicated one exc tionally high result was erroneous and may have driven up the average.

Project may reveal life 4,000 years ago

ST. AUGUSTINE — An archaeological dig in the nation's oldest city may uncover more evidence on the people who lived 4,000 years ago in what is now St. Johns County.

4 arrested on federal fraud charges

MIAMI — Four men wanted on federal fraud charges in Wyoming for allegedly bilking investors of \$3.5 million in a bogus bank scam were arrested as they arrived here from the Bahamas, authorities said.

The four, two from South Dakota and one each from Florida and Wyoming, were arrested Wednesday upon arrival at Mami International Airport by officers of a multi-agency task force, said Andrew J. Duffin, special agent in charge of the Miami FBI office.

Duffin identified the four as: Everett Lavay McKinley, 39, of Midland, S.D.; Steve Emery, 39, of Black Hawk, S.D. Philip L. Black, 39, of Casper, Wyo.: and George Jim Conway, 50, of Port Richey.

All four face federal charges of mail fraud, wire fraud a conspiracy in a criminal compliant filed Oct. 16 in Charges Wyo. Duffin and in a new velenat.

TALLAHASSEE - Heavy caseloads are

TALLAHABBLE - Heavy caseloads are jeopardizing the effectiveness of Florida's programs to protect abused and at-risk children, a new sudit concluded. There is an average of only one counselor for every 38 cases in the Child Protective Supervision Program, compared to a re-commended figure of 17 to 1, asid Depart-ment of Health and Rehabilitative Services Secretary Bob Williams. ary Bob Wi

"We agree that caseloads are unreasonably high," Williams said in a letter to Auditor General Charles Lester. "Correc-

tive action to improve performance without additional resources is limited." The multi released Wednesday, showed that counselors often don't conduct required risk assessments, fail to visit children and

risk assessments, fail to visit children and families often enough and don't examine whether stale services are doing any good. When the work is done, it's often lais. "When counselors do not periodically reasess cases as required, they cannot ensure that children are not at risk while they are under protective supervision or when the case is closed," the suditors wrote. For example, the audit notes one case where a single mother, her boyfriend and eight children were under protective

supervision until the woman died in a car accident. The children went to live with relatives, some in unstable nobody ever followed up on th

nobody ever followed up on them. The turnover rate for Child Protective Services counselors is 28 percent, much higher than the 11 percent rate for other state employees. The sudit attributes that to the caseload burden and low saleries. The Legislature initially approved \$24.2 million for the program for the facal year that began July 1, but that amount was cut 3.6 percent to \$23.4 million. There original-ly were 787 positions authorised for the program, but the number was reduced to 725 by lawmakers, the audit found.

Elderly grants Alzheimer's victims awarded \$1.5 million

TALLAHASSEE - Florida has received a \$1.5 million federal

received a \$1.5 million federal grant to provide more services to Alsheimer's patients, the head of the state Department of Elderly Affairs said Wednesday. For three years, \$500,000 will be divided among Pahokee, rural Paim Beach County, and the Little Havana neighborhood of Miami, according to E. Bentley Linecomb, adverty secretary.

Lipscomb, agency secretary. Some 288,000 people in Flor-ids have Alzheimer's, according to Lipscomb. Last year the agency saked state lawmakers to double its 94.5 million budget for Alsheimer's but instead got a 5 percent cut.

The state also is getting two other new sources of federal funding for the elderly. basid.

Florida will get \$703.573, the largest single slice of \$10 million

distributed by the federal gov-crament to provide information, counseling and assistance to elderly people about Medicaid. Medicare and other health insurance.

Counseling programs will be set up in 22 counties with information available for distribution statewide.

The state also has just gotten word that it will receive \$1 million to provide disease pre-vention and health promotion services, Lipscomb said. The money comes from recent reauthorization of a section of the Older American's Act.

On another front, the Depart-ment of Elderly Affairs has received \$200,000 in emergency aid from the Administration on Aging to help victime of Hurricane Andrew. The state will also get \$1.6 million in unspent end-of-the-year Administration on Aging funds.

State considers methods to slow spread of AIDS

FORT LAUDERDALE - Flora health officials are considering two controversial methods to slow the spread of AIDS - giving out clean syringes to drug abusers and requiring man-datory reporting of HIV cases by doctors.

State Health Officer Dr. Charles Mahan said giving away clean needles has proven suc-Wash., and New Haven, Conn., and might be an option for Florida.





NEW YORK - A teacher distraught over learning she had multiple sclerosis gave a student \$100 to buy a gun and talked the teen-ager into trying to kill her in a school stairwell, authorities said. The teacher aurvived.

"She asked him to do it, and he did it." Annistant District Attorney John O'Mara said Wednesday.

The teacher. 23-year-old Barbara Mendez, was wounded in the shoulder Friday and was released from the hospital after a short stay. Police said she told them after the shooting that she hadn't seen her assailant.

On Wednesday, the student, 17-year-old Lamar Goodwine. was arraigned on attempted murder and weapons charges.

The shooting had been cited by the teachers union as another example of violence in the city's schools and had prompted the union to call for metal detectors at every high school.

Prosecutors disclosed just before Goodwine's arraignment that Mendez had asked Goodwine to shoot her. Goodwine implicated himself during questioning earlier in the day, an unidentified source told the Daily News.

Mendez recently learned ahe had MS, and she had also separated from her husband, authorities said.

She apparently was having problems at home and wanted to die," O'Mara said.

Mender began teaching machine shop at the East New

Goodwine at first refused Mendez's request to shoot her, but the teacher worked for two weeks to change his mind. unidentified officials told the News and The New York Times. She gave Goodwine \$100 to buy a gun, the Times said.

Goodwine said nothing at his arraignment and his lawyer. Enid McDonough, would not discuss the case. The teen-ager was freed on \$2,500 bail.



But the net result, over the next half-dozen years, will be to weaken Democratic control of many state legislatures substantially, and thereby improve Republican prospects still further in the next resportionment. reapportionment.

Whatever befalls the Republican ticket this year, therefore, the pressures for Republican gains in Congress and the state legislatures cannot be resisted everywhere, let alone forever. Already, thoughtful observers are tagging the off-year elections of 1994 as the ones in which the incoming Republican tide will manifest itself most dramatically. In 1992, however, it may be hard to distinguish its effects from whatever fate has in store for George Bush.



NASA fuels Columbia, six astronauts, satellite ready

CAPE CANAVERAL - NASA fueled space shuttle Columbia for launch today with aix astronauts and a giant, laser-reflecting ball that geologists will use to track Earth's creeping crust

and learn more about carthonakes. The shuttle was scheduled to lift off on the 10 day mission at 11:16 s.m. EDT. Porcessiers said there was a 70 percent chance of good weather; the only concern was high wind. NASA began pumping the spacecraft's external tank with a half-million gallow of oxygen and

hydrogen before dawn.

hydrogen before dawn. Commander James Wetherbee and his crew will release the Laser Goodynamics Estellite, or Lagcos, a day after liftoff. The 900-pound aluminum and brass hall is covered with 426 prisms for reflecting laser beams fired from Earth. By measuring the round-trip travel time of the light pulses, scientists hope to measure the slow drifting of Earth's tectonic plates. "It's a key point for a better understanding of the mechanisms which are behind the earthquake process," said Busanna Zerbini, a scientist with the Italian Space Agency, which built Lageos to NASA's specifications. "We cannot predict earthquains at the mo-ment. The only thing we can do is to study

Report says staff cuts causing a backlog in disability claims

WASHINGTON - People applying for federal disability benefits can expect to wait months, maybe even years, for their claims to be settled because of Social Security Administration staff

cuibacks, an advocacy group says. Social Security acknowledged there was trouble processing the claims, but the agency said it was working on the problem with some success.

"I really view this as a back-door assault very important part of the Social Socurity system." Ron Pollock, executive director of Families USA Foundation, said Wednesday.


The backlog of people seeking Social Security disability payments has grown from 263,000 in 1968 to 600,000 through the first nine months of this year, a foundation report said. "Right now, people with disabilities are forced to that now, people with disabilities are forced

to wait an average of nearly four months just to find out whether or not they're going to get help." Pollock said.

Pollock said. The privately financed organisation, which is a frequent critic of the Bush administration. blamed the White House and Congress. . "The White House and Congress. aid to severely disabled Assertance, and Congress is going along with the destruction." Pollock said. "By anabing Bocial Security staffing, they've created massive backlogs and outragnous waiting lines for aid. And they plan to make it much worse next year."



Drug companies charge more in the U.S. than in Canada

The Production

WABNINGTON — Drug com-mice sell the same medicines or an average of 32 percent sore in the United States than a Canada, according to a con-

n Canada, according to a con-pressional study. The study of frequently pre-crited drugs found that the rice degenity did not result room differences in the cost of leveloping, preparing or market-ing them. Rather, the Canadian organian resulted from greater wrice regulation there and vol-sme buying by the government o squeeze a better deal out of he manufactures.

the manufacturers. Congress' investigative arm, the General Accounting Office, studied manufacturers' prices for 121 medicines and found that while a few were chesper in the United States most were substantially more expensive here.

The largest discrepancy, a 967 percent price difference, was for isordil, a drug made by Wyeth-Ayerst Laboratories for the control of angina. Birth control pills, an-

tidepressants, sedatives, antibi-otics, pain relievers and other preparations were among those that cost more.

Among other drugs showing the greatest pricing discrepan-cies were Ativan, an anti-anxiety drug made by Wyeth that cost 702 percent more in the United States; Regian, a gastrointestinal drug made by A.H. Robins Co. that was 545 percent more; MeMeil Decementical's Trimes McNeil Pharmaceutical's Tylenol with codeine, 464 percent more: and Valium, made by Roche Biomedical Laboratories, 434 percent more.

The drug industry contends its prices and profits are justified because large investments are needed to get new drugs to market. Development costs are high because many compounds are tested before effective ones are found.

But Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., chairman of the House **Energy and Commerce sub**committee on health and the environment, said the study

The group said the study compares actual Canadian market prices with a U.S. price list that overstates the am ts paid by wholesalers and highne insurers and managed care plana.

But Schondelmeyer disputed that, saying the study had used the most conservative figures available. Other price data would have boosted the U.S.-Canada price difference to an average of 50 percent or more, he said.

In the 1980s, the U.S. retail cost of prescription drugs rose by 151 percent, the fourth-highest rise among components of the consumer price index. The rate was more than double the increase in prices for the economy as a whole.

One proposal before Congress last year called for a study of drug price regulation. Others sought to lower prices paid by federally funded health pro-grams. A Waxman aide said the congressman plans hearings on drug pricing next year.

The trade group said Canada's raises the possibility drug com-panies are reaping excessive profits from American con-sumers. GAO noted that U.S. drug makers generally are more pro-



is there a cure for husband's snoring? provide better drainage.

DEAR DR GOTT: My husband and I are newlyweds with a sleep problem. He's a snorer and I'm a ght sleeper. The only way we on get a good night's sleep is in liferent rooms whit she

can get a good night's sleep is in different rooms. We've read about a tiny plastic clip 'manufactured in Sweden called the Nosovent, designed to widen the air passages. The plastic clip is 2 1/2 inches long, shaped like a double-ended cance paddle. The snorer bends the device in the middle and sticks the ends up both nostrils. The product is not available in the United States, but I would like your opinion before in-vestigating further. DEAR READER: I'm not famil-iar with the product you de-

iar with the product you de-acribe. I think your husband would obtain more appropriate relief if he were to see an ear-nose-and-throat specialist, because snoring in a young person can be due to blockage of the upper airway during sleep. The ENT specialist can advise him whether, for example, he needs surgery to remove polyps or other causes of obstruction. DEAR DR. GOTT: My husband

has a high cholesterol level, and we have a question about cook-ing oil. I'm under the impression that the higher ratio of unsaturated fat to the saturated fat is best. He feels the reverse is better. Who's right? DEAR READER: You're cor-

rect. The higher the unsaturated fat, the better. Saturated fats (those which are solid at room temperature) have been associ-ated with health risks, such as heart disease. Therefore, anyone with high cholesterol levels should be on a low saturated-fat diet.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I suffer from daily headaches. An MRI and CT scan both confirmed a large encapsulated cyst in the right maxillary sinus. An operation actually found this to be a large polyp that wasn't removable by that surgical procedure, but the sinus opening was enlarged to

Today's deal was sent in by Richard Johnson from Houston. It arose during the Epson Worldwide Pairs event held last June. Mr. Johnson, who doesn't say where he sat, asks for an analysis of the bidding and play. The auction was reasonable except for South's bids. His opening pre-empt was hardly textbook, and it wasn't his job io sacrifice in five clubs. To make matters worse, four no-trump must go down. West can win at most nine tricks: one spade, four hearts, three diamonds and one club.

West led off with three rounds of hearts. Declarer ruffed, played a club to dummy's king, and followed with another club to the queen and ace. West did well.

dummy, which allowed East to win with the spade king and lead his last heart, promoting West's club 10 as the sixth defensive trick. In duplicate scoring, the result was plus 800 to East-West.

For his bid of four no-trump, East was almost certain to have the spade king. I think declarer should rise with dummy's spade ace, discard a spade on the diamond king, ruff a diamond, draw the last trump and concede a spade trick for three down.

Note that if West leads the spade jack before cashing the diamond ace, declarer can afford to play low from the dummy. When East leads the 13th heart, South discards his diamond loser and the contract is only three down.
