Sports Aid Morale In European Theater

NEW YORK CITY, May 22 (Special) Sports are destined to be a new golden era after the war, if the Army's Special Services Division athletic training program is as popular with the G.I.'s as the Army expects it to be. Over 75 per cent of the men in the active European theater are expected to choose sports for the main part of their new "duty" which must be selected from the S.S.D. three part program of training in theatrical entertainment, music, arts and crafts sports and games and education.

As a result of the S.S.D. athletic program which provides selected men and officers with training in all popular competitive sports and a comprehensive course in the functions and methods of the athletic coach, new champions in every field of sports will undoubtedly be developed and the net will be a more glorious sports era than that which followed the last war. Groups of top flight civilian professional coaches organized in this country last winter, are now in Europe teaching the G.I.'s the fine points of everything from ping-pong to football.

In commenting upon the success of the program, C.B. Lister, secretary-treasurer of the National Rifle Association, stated that the work done at the 124 rifle club N.R.A. production training schools had proved of inestimable value in aiding youngsters to become efficient shooters before they entered the armed forces. He also said that better shooting instruction will mean stronger and more permanent rifle clubs after the war is over.

Future Farmer's Part In World Is Told By Johnson

Son Of Professor Is 2nd Place Winner In District Contest

The part taken by the Future Farmers of America in training youth to attain efficiency in agricultural methods, buying and selling, conducting themselves in a public meeting, and in assuming leadership in civic matters, is included in the following address by Ralph Johnson, son of Prof. and Mrs. Alva H. Johnson, which made him second place winner in a recent sub district FFA speaking contest.

"The Future Farmers of America is the national organization for boys studying vocational agriculture in public schools.

As part of the program of vocational agriculture, the FFA has become well known in the past 10 years. Organized in November of 1928, it has served to motivate and vitalize the systematic instruction offered to students of vocational agriculture and to provide further training in farmer-ship.

The FFA is an in school activity having its origin and root in vocational agriculture. Among other things members learn through active participation, how to conduct and take part in a public meeting, to speak in public; to solve their own problems; finance themselves; and to assume civic responsibility.

The foundation upon which the FFA is built, includes leadership and character development, sportsmanship, cooperation, service, thrift, scholarship, improved agriculture, organized recreation, citizenship and patriotism.

Federally aided courses in vocational agriculture under the (Smith-Hughes) Act were first established in 1917. From the very beginning the boys who were enrolled in these courses felt a spirit of comradeship due to their background of country life.

Within a few years, local departments of vocational agriculture had developed organizations, composed of the students of vocational agriculture. Such organizations were, largely social and recreational in nature but certain educational, self-improvement and cooperative features were often included.

As these local vocational agriculture organizations grew in numbers, naturally, the idea of banding together the local groups into a larger organization grew in the minds of leaders.

It is interesting to note that such names as "Junior Farmers", "Young Farmers", "Future Farmers" and "Farmers" appeared in various sections of the country. However, the pioneer efforts of the Future Farmers of Virginia attracted the greatest attention due to the very excellent ideas, purposes, ceremonies, and definite constitution formulated by Henry C. Groseclose.

By 1927 the goal of a national organization of students of vocational agriculture was in the minds of various leaders. The time was ripe. From the western States came a definite proposal to build upon the good work of the Future Farmers of Virginia and similar organizations, formulate a constitution for the Future Farmers of America, and launch it as the national organization for boys studying vocational agriculture.

Accordingly, a constitution was drafted under the leadership of the staff of the Agricultural Education Service of the Federal Board for Vocational Education during the summer of 1928. The first National Convention was held in November of that year and since that time the Future Farmers of America has extended into forty-seven States, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

The FFA is composed of chartered State Associations which, in turn, are made up of local chapters situated in high schools having departments of vocational agriculture. The boys enrolled in such courses constitute its membership.

There are four grades of active membership—"Green Hand," "Future Farmer," "State Farmer," and "American Farmer." Local chapters determine the individual's advancement in the first two grades of membership; the State determines the third degree, and the national organization awards the fourth degree.

Buy officers for each unit of the FFA—local, State and National—are elected annually. Each of these units meet at specified times. There are approved forms for conducting meetings and for passing members to the various degrees. Teachers of vocational agriculture serve as local chapter advisers and State Supervisors of Agricultural Education act as State Advisers.

Programs of work are set up annually by every chapter, State Association, and the national organization. These programs are built on the needs of the individual and the community. A program indicates the direction and course to follow in order to reach definite goals. All FFA activities are boy-initiated and boy-directed. Results attained, therefore, are due to farmer-ship training objectives set up and carried out by the boys themselves.

The FFA is designed to supplement training opportunities for boys who are progressing toward the goal of establishment in a farming business. Through FFA activities the cooperative spirit is fostered and individual talent is discovered and developed. Here is a school of experience in the art of working together for a common good. The organization embodies the fundamentals of true democracy—each member has voice in setting up policies and making rules and regulations by which he is governed.

Future Farmers not only work well together, but they know how to provide organized recreation for themselves and others in the community.

Any male student of vocational agriculture enrolled in an all-day, day-unit or part-time vocational agriculture class is entitled to membership—and a member may retain his active membership through his high school career.

The FFA is developing a trained leadership and a farm citizenry which serves and exerts an influence for good wherever found. The FFA is 100% American in its ideals and outlook and has no outside affiliations. There is no secrecy in connection with any of its activities.

The rapid but healthy expansion of the organization, the keen interest of its members, and the whole-hearted support accorded it has been gratifying to all who are concerned with the welfare of farm boys and young men throughout the length and breadth of the land.

Capt. Hughes Is Again At Sea On New Block Island

(Continued From Page One) Eynon, II, and Masie, Jr., 31, live with his sister, Mrs. Anne Haas, 801 N. E. Third Street, Fort Lauderdale, was skipper of the Naval Air Station at Sanford for a year ending November, 1942. His home town is Selma, Alabama, from which state he received appointment to the Naval Academy at Annapolis.

On commissioning of their new ship at Tacoma, Wash., last Dec. 30, Capt. Hughes and 14 members of his crew were decorated. Capt. Hughes was awarded the Legion of Merit by Rear Admiral J. J. Ballentine, with the following citation:

"As Commanding Officer of the USS Block Island and Commander of an Atlantic Fleet anti-submarine task group, Capt. M. Hughes distinguished himself in combined air and surface operations against enemy submarines.

"Searching out and attacking the enemy at every opportunity, the task group under Capt. Hughes' command repeatedly exposed itself to certain danger in its determined action against the enemy. Throughout the entire series of operations, which resulted in the sinking and damaging of a large number of U-boats, his aggressive and determined spirit of the attacking units and the close cooperation between all units of the task group resulted in achieving a record of destruction of enemy submarines which was unequalled by any other similarly engaged task group during the same period."

The German sub which sank the first Block Island and damaged the destroyer escort USS Barr a year ago was destroyed in the same engagement by the destroyer escort USS Eugene E. Flanore.

At the time she was lost, the Block Island and her escorts had to their credit one of the two best scores against enemy subs in the Atlantic. The Hughes took command in March, 1944, after the carrier had been seasoned by a year of fighting. Within six days after Capt. Hughes took the carrier to sea, her fleet and destroyer escorts in her task force had sunk two German U-boats.

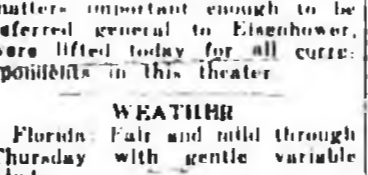

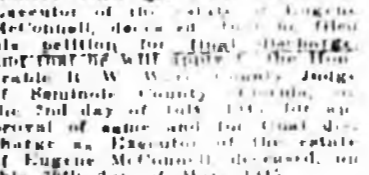

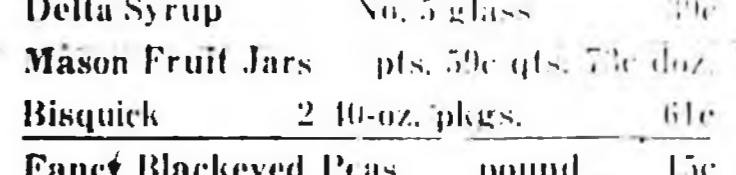

Industrial City Of Osaka Hit By Superforts

Churchill Calls For London Conference To Decide Syrian Independence Plea

WASHINGTON, June 1. (AP)—President Truman declared today that the U. S. Army in the Pacific ultimately will be twice its present size and "bigger than our Army" in Europe at its height. In a special message to Congress, reiterating American determination to fight the Japanese to "complete finish," the president called for workers in ship repair yards to meet the Nipponese suicide attacks.

Great waves of Superfortresses today lighted fires in Osaka sending smoke 27,000 feet above Japan's most highly industrialized city amid an announcement that a similar raid burned out 6.9 square miles of Yokohama Tuesday. An Allied ground force drove Japanese troops back on virtually all fronts. Guam reported "the principal portion of Yokohama virtually was destroyed" and returning aircraft indicated they left Osaka in the same condition today. Tokyo broadcasts admitted flames were started throughout Osaka's manufacturing center and were only "gradually being brought under control" claiming the Japs destroyed 47 Superforts. The raid was made by 450 B-29 and 150 fighters.

Farm Labor Camp Will Remain Open Two More Weeks

The WEA Farm Labor Camp at Seaside, Fla., will remain open for the next two weeks in order to meet the needs of growers. It was announced today by County Agent C. Dawson.

At the present time there are 226 of British negro subjects from the Bahamas at the camp whose contracts expired Thursday. All but 105 of these will be shortly for northern labor camps on the eastern seaboard where they are vitally needed in agricultural areas.

Mr. Barnes pointed out that the government's labor program had proved of great value in filling the farm labor shortage of the country where men had left farms to enter the service or to work in factories.

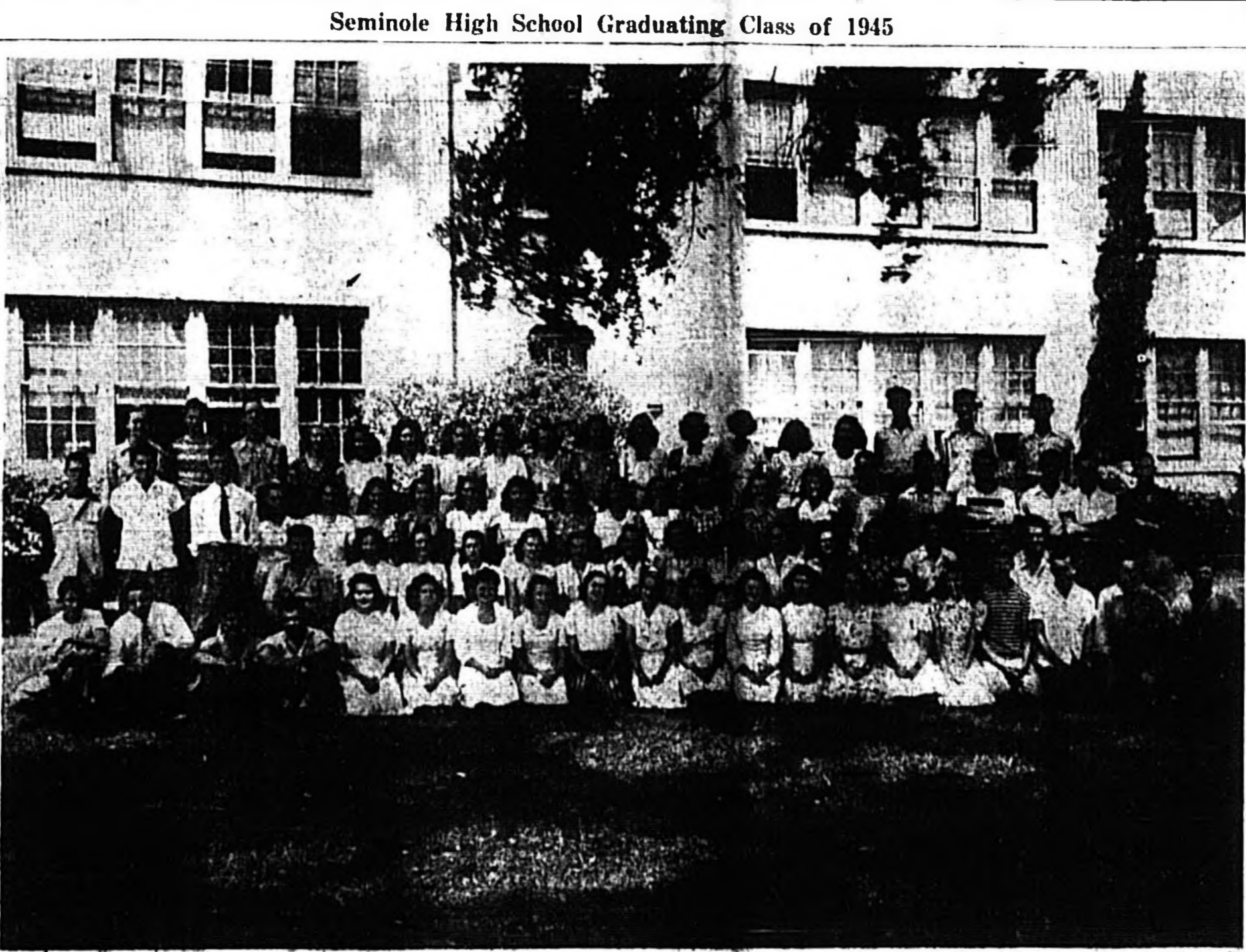
